County moves toward becoming a Certified Local Government

If the public expresses no opposition, Lincoln County may become the only county in New Mexico to become a Certified Local Government.

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Karon Petty instructed county manager Nick Pappas to begin the publication process to advertise public hearings scheduled March 12 in Carrizozo and March 13 in Lincoln.

Lincoln County Heritage Trust (LCHT) representative

Bob Hart and Lincoln Historical Preservation Board president Bill Morris brought the Certified Local Government (CLG) proposal to commissioners Petty, Bob Hemphill and Rick Simpson at their regular meeting Monday. CLG is funded through the New Mexico Historical Preservation Office in Santa Fe and provides expertise in the historical preservation field.

Morris said CLG will give strength to the preservation board which has had prob-

lems with its membership—mainly its inability to form a quorum at meetings and resignations. Currently the preservation board serves to enforce the zoning ordinance in the Lincoln Historical Zone, a function which has led to a negative image of the board.

"It's neighbors enforcing neighbors' violations," Pappas said.

By joining CLG, the preservation board will take a "positive step" by providing education and guidelines to

those who live within the Lincoln Historical Zone, Hart said.

Since the commissioners will be the CLG and it will encompass the entire county, experts could be called in and the county could apply for federal grants if situations such as archaeological sites are discovered in areas other than Lincoln Historical Zone.

To qualify for CLG, Hart requested changes to the current preservation board as defined in the Lincoln Historical Ordinance. He prop-

osed reconstituting the board from its current five members—four property owners and one at-large—to seven members—three property owners, one at-large, a professional in such fields as architectural restoration, landscape architecture, archaeology and such, a member from LCHT and the New Mexico Museum Monuments Division. The request was not the only way to qualify for CLG, Hart said, "but it would be the ideal way to go."

The board also will have an attendance requirement,

which will remove a member if three or more meetings are missed without a legitimate excuse.

Currently the municipalities of Las Vegas, Santa Fe, Taos and Albuquerque participate in CLG. No southern community and no counties are involved.

Federal funds through the US Department of Interior also will be available through grant applications. In-kind services time spent can work toward matches for the grants, Hart added.

Petty questioned if the

county will have to add property owners from other historical areas to the board if other historical districts are formed.

Hart said the county will have to create a separate board to oversee separate districts, but the current historical board will only have jurisdiction in the Lincoln Historical Zone.

Hemphill expressed no problem with the board change but requested more information on CLG. He also requested at least one public hearing be conducted in Lincoln where the CLG would most affect county citizens.

Pappas said he would try to get someone from Santa Fe to come to the hearings also.

"It will open doors for a lot," Hart said and added it would be a clearing house of information also.

Also Monday, a system which will not only will assist county emergency personnel and utility workers but will help the county road department update its maintenance maps was put on the front burner.

Rural addressing met with a more favorable response than the first time it was proposed in spring 1989. At that time the opposition expressed was the invasion of privacy of people who live in isolated areas of the county.

Last week, Pappas, chief appraiser Paul Baca, county road supervisor Tommy Hall, emergency response director Maggi Bohks and county financial administrator Migron Sims met with Continental Telephone Company special projects coordinator Larry Bigler to discuss the rural addressing system. Contel will provide house numbers and road signs at every intersection of the county roads.

Pappas said Monday projects as Enhanced 911 and the county zoning have created a desirable climate for the rural addressing system.

The cost to the county will be for personnel and vehicles to put the signs in place and updated maps, which the county already is paying for with the zoning ordinance project.

"The road department will be the primary beneficiary," Pappas said.

"What about the privacy of persons in the outback area of the county?" Simpson asked.

Pappas said he appreciated the privacy but the "good outweighs the few who want privacy."

Simpson then said he would be in favor if they consider the feeling of those who don't want to participate.

Hemphill said the addressing would provide numbers and locations that will not be public information.

Pappas suggested the ordinance could allow an exemption for those who do not want to participate.

An Angus subdivision resident said the rural addressing is a must for ambulance services to respond in a reasonable length of time. Bohks said the rural addressing is not totally necessary for E911, but it will not be as effective. Because of the nature of the system Bohks did not believe criminals would have access to the addressing.


But when Hall brought the county road map before the commissioners, Petty said, "Oh, this is wonderful."

Hall pointed out roads which were listed but do not exist in the field.

Capitan seeks funds for sewer system; eyes cemetery update

The Village of Capitan will apply for funds to construct a new sewer system.

Capitan Board of Trustees made the decision to apply for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds at a hearing conducted before the regular town meeting Monday.

At the hearing, Yvonne Acosta from the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD), reviewed the CDBG qualification guidelines for funding: abatement of blight and slums, health, welfare and safety and service to low-to-moderate income families.

Capitan is in dire need of a new sewer system as the current lagoon pond method will not be accepted under Environmental Improvement Division regulations. Dr. Bernard Reimann of Capitan has worked on a project for a sewer system and has drawn up specifications for it. A dollar amount for the application will be determined by an engineer based on the specifications.

Other CDBG input included improving or adding streets, sidewalks and streetlights, a youth building, acquisition of additional cemetery property and a recreational park.

Since Capitan qualified under the required 51 percent of families with low-to-moderate income and the health, welfare and safety of its citizens is involved, trustees voted to apply for the grant for the sewer system.

About a dozen Capitan citizens were present at the CDBG hearing, which was the only public hearing required for the grant application.

At the regular meeting, Francis Shaw, Dorothy Smith, Lois Aldridge and other members of the Capitan Cemetery Board appealed to trustees to consider purchasing about two acres of land adjoining the cemetery. The land is the only way the cemetery can be expanded as it is bordered by roads on three other sides.

Shaw said owners of the land have lowered their price to \$4500, which was considered the bottom price. If the land is purchased, the board will be able to implement new projects at the cemetery, but not if the board must pay the purchase price.

Although the cemetery is not full, the board encouraged the purchase because no other land will be available.

Capitan resident Larry Brinkley warned trustees to watch out for persons who will try to bring bodies to the Capitan Cemetery if the new proposed cemetery in the Ruidoso area is not approved.

Trustees Norm Renfro, David Rouleau, Myrl Ray and Jack Pogue approved the village enter into an agreement with the owners with an option to purchase the property.

Planning and Zoning member Frank Warth announced the village is addressed. Street names and house lot numbers have been compiled and will be put into the computer. The village worked with the Continental Telephone Company which provided the house numbers.

However, trustee Pogue was not happy about the changes of the street names. Warth said changes were made only where it was needed to clarify locations, such as in the suburbs.

Support was given to the house numbering by Joel Bandy, an ambulance driver who said response time will be shortened. Jimmy Wright said the project went through a professional planner with Contel and was not arbitrary numbering.

Village attorney Don Dutton was a bit concerned about the street name changes as the original names were part of a Planning and Zoning (P&Z) ordinance. Because of this the changes will need to go through a public hearing process.


Warth said some of the streets had names and others didn't but the changes were meant to give a better sense of direction.

All trustees but Pogue voted for the plan as presented by P&Z with notification to be given for public hearings about the name changes. Pogue voted no.

Sid Goodloe was appointed to chair a committee to work with the trustees and the New Mexico State Parks to secure the old depot building as a citizens-youth center for Capitan. Goodloe requested the trustees help find a place for the youth of Capitan who at present have nowhere to go outside of the school.

Trustees debate leases for golf course, rec center

The Carrizozo Town Trustees concluded their regular business in about 30 minutes Tuesday, with major business dealing with the leases for the golf course and recreation center.

Trustees reviewed a draft lease for the golf course and added such items as making the town responsible for maintaining equipment. At the last town meeting trustee

Harold Garcia had requested updating the lease to define the town's role in maintaining the golf course.

Ted Turnbow, who holds the golf course lease, was present at the meeting but did not request the items to be included.

The trustees also reviewed the draft lease with Val Reyes for the Carrizozo Rec Center. Reyes was not

present at the meeting.

Both leases will spell out responsibilities the town has toward the facilities.

The final drafts of the leases will be reviewed and approved at the next regular town meeting.

Trustees also adopted an amendment to Ordinance 72-100 which grants certain

Memories of Katina Chavez linger on

Outwardly the Hondo Valley community of San Patricio has recovered from the murder of Katina Chavez.

But the tension, anxiety and rumors continue two years after the 15-year-old athlete's death sometime on Feb. 20, 1988.

The popular basketball star was found strangled, her body half-submerged in the Rio Ruidoso. Searchers spent hours the night before looking for the girl. She was last seen alive about 4 p.m. the

day before when she was getting ready to go to Cloudcroft with her basketball coach to accept a trophy as all-district basketball player.

The actual circumstances surrounding her disappearance and death were inconclusive and continue unsolved.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, led by then-sheriff Don Samuels, investigated and interviewed dozens of people and finally charged 16-year-old classmate Matt Surratt with the

murder.

After three months in juvenile detention in the Otero County Detention Facility in Alamogordo, Surratt, who turned 17 while in that jail, went through a hearing to determine if he should be tried as an adult.

District Judge Robert M. Doughty ruled Surratt's case should remain in juvenile court. After the hearing Surratt was ordered to leave the state and stay with relatives in Texas, for his own protection.

Surratt said in court and to investigators he played a little basketball with Katina at her father's house the afternoon of her disappearance.

Another three months were to pass before Surratt would go to trial on an open charge of murder a delinquent act since he was a minor, and not in Lincoln County. Instead, District Judge Richard A. Parsons moved the trial to Ft. Sumner in DeBaca county because of the extensive pre-

trial publicity.

Ruidoso attorney Gary C. Mitchell was employed for Surratt's defense and children's court attorney Scot Key provided the state's evidence—which turned out to be slim. So slim Judge Parsons dismissed the jury and closed the case; not enough evidence. Matt was free to go and he returned to his San Patricio home and to school at Hondo High School.

group which Goodloe is involved with meets at the Lincoln County Fair Building in Capitan, but is finding the facility is not suitable for the group's needs.

"There's a lot of enthusiasm among the kids to find something," he said.

He added the center would be for everyone, not just for the Christian group.

The old co-op building which the village owns was ruled out as unsuitable.

Capitan resident George Beaudry suggested the group restore the old depot building with volunteer labor to make it a community building.

Goodloe was open to the old depot idea and said he was present mainly to let the town know the youth needs volunteers and to let older people in town know there is a positive influence for youth in Capitan.

Goodloe also said the center would not be church oriented, but the youth need a place to go without "beer cans."

Mayor Benny Coker requested Goodloe submit names of persons who will serve on the committee to secure the old depot building or any other suitable place.

In other business, the trustees:

Directed village road supervisor Guy Henley to survey the village street lights with the help of a map from Buddy Guthrie of Otero Electric Co-op. The survey will be presented to the council. The survey came after Henley requested a light at the corner of 2nd and Stanton Sts.

Approved publication process stage of Ordinance 90-1 for the Taylor Annexation.

Heard Coker call a workshop to review and make recommendation on the proposed updated Personnel policy.

Turned over an annexation request from Paul Finegan to P&Z for review and recommendation.

Gave Beaudry a stamp of approval to maintain the tiny square park east of the old village hall. Beaudry plans to put a plaque on the monument in the park and

dedicate it to all veterans. Beaudry represented the Smokey Bear Lions Club and the Capitan American Legion.

Directed David Cox meet with Dutton to negotiate and establish the water pipeline easement on Cox's land.

Heard Coker express thanks to Dr. Reimann for his "countless hours" spent on the solid waste and sewer projects. Reimann reported on the meeting in Roswell on the regionalized landfill concept. Capitan may join in the regional landfill which will incorporate recycling and reprocessing of solid waste into useable products such as bricks. Dr. Reimann is involved with the committee to select an engineering firm for the landfill concept.

Accepted a petition from Wright appealing to the village to reinstate the second police officer position. Wright called the list a "public opinion poll" but the paper listed the names as a "petition."

Fire scorches five acres

Firefighters from the Capitan Volunteer Fire Dept. (VFD), New Mexico Forestry and US Forest Service battled a blaze which scorched about five acres of private land just north of Capitan.

Two brush units from the State Forestry with four firefighters, one unit with two firefighters from the Forest Service and a brush unit with three firefighters from Capitan VFD responded to the fire which began about 2:55 p.m. Monday on the Jody Roberts property.

The fire started from a field where workers were welding together a pipe fence.

No structures were involved, but firefighters worked to keep the blaze from crossing a road near which several residences are located.

Dog survives brutal drag by neck down Central Ave.

Carrizozo Police are looking for a man who broke into a pickup truck about 1 a.m. Sunday at the Four Winds Restaurant, abducted a Siberian Husky dog named Nahanni, tied it to the bumper of his white Subaru and dragged it by the neck down Central, onto a dirt road, and left it to die.

Dog owner Niels Rikof, a college student at New Mexico Tech in Socorro, rushed the dog to a veterinarian after it had been found in critical condition by Police Officer John Northrup.

The dog is in stable condition, but Rikof is still looking

at some \$200 damage to his vehicle.

He is also looking for witnesses to the incident which will help him in prosecuting the guilty party. He says several high school students were at Allsup's Convenience Store and could have seen the break-in and "dogsnapping."

Also, there were people at the Four Winds who saw the man and could identify him.



Considering that Mandela was walked out of prison and into the arms of sainthood, we should brace ourselves for another national holiday honoring him for having spent 27 years behind bars. Some city streets will be re-named Nelson Mandela Avenue, and Feb. 11 will henceforth be celebrated as Nelson Mandela Day.


● No doubt the event signals the beginning of the end of apartheid in South Africa. It also signals the beginning of much chaos and bloodshed because the white-dominated government isn't going to relinquish power without a fight. The black majority is set to seize control of the government and the country's institutions, and is pledged to die to achieve such domination. Apartheid is a bad thing, but is it worth the slaughter of millions of people? The South African government has made substantial progress toward racial equality, but it wasn't coming fast enough for the black majority, or for the United States. If Mandela is assassinated, which is likely, the disaster will come much quicker. Already a group of blacks want Mandela killed, and the militant right-wing of the white community also want him dead. Between the two divergent groups, Mandela doesn't stand much of a chance for survival. They are trading one tragedy for another.

● I can understand Nelson Mandela Day. I cannot understand National Condom Week, Feb. 14-21, which is being promoted by the New Mexico Health & Environment Department, Public Health Division. In a packet distributed to New Mexico pharmacists, et al, by Dan Burke and Lorenzo Olivas, suggestions are given on how to promote condoms in public schools. While the ideas are said to target ages 18-24, most public school students are much younger. No matter. Here are ways they suggest to educate, with humor, the use of condoms to kids: Meet with editor of school paper to brainstorm condom story angles, Schedule in-house education on condoms and safer sex workshops and seminars. Dramatic arts groups can perform about unintended pregnancy which are poignant, educational and humorous (?). Organize a comedy night with local comedians who include condom and safer sex humor and jokes. Organize condom quiz shows in dorms, bars. Have a vegetable stand where people can learn how to put condoms on cucumbers—and how to take them off. Play "Pin the Condom on the Person." Have people guess the number of condoms in a jar. Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—The regular session of the 1990 legislature ends today at noon.

It will end whether or not all the players are ready for that to happen. Until about 15 years ago lawmakers would simply "stop the clock" at noon and continue—sometimes for as long as another day or so. But a court suit put an end to that and legislative leaders have been quite diligent about ending at exactly noon ever since.

Two-thirds of the more than 1200 bills that were introduced this year will die on adjournment—many of them in the finance committees of the two houses. In New Mexico's wacky system of legislating, lawmakers will introduce bills for nearly anyone who asks but then virtually forget about them once they reach committee.

Few bills are important enough to hang up the session. If not passed, most measures can simply wait until next year or be permanently forgotten.

One of the "must" bills is the general appropriations act that finances the ongoing operations of state government. Never has it failed to pass during a regular session. But by last weekend, lawmakers had passed their self-imposed deadline for getting the \$1.8 billion spending bill to the governor in time to override any vetoes he might make in the measure.

In last year's 60-day, "long" session, the legislature got an appropriation bill to Gov. Garrey Carruthers in sufficient time for him to veto the entire measure. That was an all-time first.

This year's lack of timely action made it necessary for House-Senate negotiators to communicate much more closely with Carruthers to work out something on which all parties could agree. The stumbling block this year, however, has not been problems between the legislature and governor so much as between lawmakers themselves.

The House passed a budget to which the Senate made 513 amendments—another all-time record. The House's version assumed passage of Carruthers' \$70 million tax increase proposal. Demo Senate leaders didn't want any tax increase without strong Republican support, which they didn't see coming.

The Senate's failure to act angered many House members. The system of developing the appropriation measure came under attack. House members complain they spend weeks conducting hearings and writing the measure. Senators then take the bill, and in the course of a few days, with no hearings at all, make massive changes to the measure.

Many found it interesting that it has been Demo senators, who don't face election this year, who have worried about the effect of raising taxes. Senators run every four years and all of them stood for election in 1988.

But there is a gubernatorial election this year and Demos in both houses are frustrated over the public approval enjoyed by Republican Garrey Carruthers. They would love to hang a tax increase around his neck. And if that won't work, then maybe a hold-the-line budget would be the best idea. Postpone any state or education employee salary increases until Carruthers has left and kick them in come January 1991, when they hope a Democrat will be occupying the governor's office.

Another measure that must always pass before lawmakers go home for good is the special projects bill, allocating money for needs in each legislator's district. More commonly called the "pork" bill because it gives lawmakers something to which they can point as a specific benefit they gained for their district.

The "pork" bill, often referred to also as the

"Christmas tree" bill because it has something in it for everyone, is going to be a lot leaner this year. Severance tax funds are the most popular source of money for these projects. In the days when minerals and oil were being severed from our land in great abundance, there was a huge pot of these funds. It has been stripped so bare in the past few years that there is essentially nothing left for a few years.

The other two sources for special project funds are the leftovers from the current year's revenues and bond issues that can be put on the ballot for next November's election. There is always stiff competition for the current year's surplus from agencies that went over their budgets. And voters have a tendency to approve bond elections only for the more popular projects such as school buildings.

So lawmakers are worried at this point about voter reaction if they have to go home with a tax increase in one hand and a very meager basket of goodies in the other.

Human Services responds

EDITOR—Recently I received a copy of the Dec. 28, 1989 article regarding the withdrawal of Sims' Family Pharmacy from participation in the Medicaid program.

I am disappointed the staff of the state Human Services Department was not contacted or given an opportunity to provide information which would have resulted in a more accurate and balanced article. Since no contact was made, I feel certain facts must be brought to the attention of your readers.

Mr. Sims is quoted as saying other states chose not to participate in the federally mandated 10.5 percent reduction in reimbursement to pharmacists "because they realized it could hurt rural health care." What wasn't pointed out is that some states have, in fact, sought to avoid implementation of the reduction and may lose federal Medicaid program expenditures approximately \$20 million annually for prescriptions. Of this amount \$14 million is federal funding. The remainder is state funding. Loss of federal funds for this service would require HSD to either eliminate the purchase of drugs as a Medicaid service, or increase its budget with state dollars in order to make up for the loss of federal funds.

In an effort to respond to the concerns expressed by pharmacists regarding the reduction, we initiated a study of pharmacy acquisition costs to determine whether the 10.5 percent reduction is appropriate. This study is being conducted in cooperation with the New Mexico Pharmaceutical Association. Only through this study will we be in a position to propose an alternate reduction to the federal government.

Mr. Sims states that pharmacists had no input in the development and administration of Medicaid. I would like to point out that a member of the New Mexico Pharmaceutical Association has served on the Medicaid Advisory Committee for a number of years. In addition to the opportunity for pharmacists to voice their concerns through representation on the committee, we established a pharmacy work group to examine appropriate policies. Many pharmacists attended the meetings of this group as well as other meetings held to solicit the ideas and concerns of pharmacists.

Because of skyrocketing Medicaid program expenditures, some reduction in reimbursement is necessary. Ten years ago, Medicaid expenditures were \$61.2 million. The budget for the next fiscal year is expected to be \$350 million. Unless we do everything possible to contain growth the budget could reach \$1 billion annually within ten years. Unfortunately, New Mexico does not have the resources necessary to support a program of that size. Taxpayers would be required to bear the burden of significantly higher taxes to support the program.

The problem of rising medical costs affects all health care providers. Because Medicaid is a publicly financed program, HSD will continue to secure the best possible price without affecting access to services. I urge Mr. Sims to continue to participate in the Medicaid Program until the survey of acquisition costs is completed. Together, I am certain we can identify an approach which will benefit Medicaid recipients who must rely on the pharmacy in Carrizozo to obtain their prescriptions.

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'Apache Trail' would exploit area's tourist attractions

Mystery, adventure, excitement!

Those three words will summarize what awaits visitors along the Apache Trails if the concept reaches its goal of inception by this summer.

The concept took a step closer to reality last week when representatives from chambers of commerce and other groups met in Ruidoso to discuss the Apache Trails.

Apache Trail was first conceived by Mescalero Tribal Chairman Wendell Chino several years ago, but the concept was shelved until recently when Chino began to discuss it with Ruidoso Village Manager Frank Potter.

So in December, Chino, Potter and Jerry Watts, director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, and a few other met to begin the discussions necessary to make the concept a reality.

The Trail idea is taken from the Turquoise Trail promotional idea in northwestern New Mexico. Chambers and other groups in the Navajo area of the state distribute brochures which show a map and list attractions at each location.

Apache Trail will be similar with brochures which will show a map of the area and list different attractions in each. Unlike the Turquoise Trail, the Apache Trail will encompass several loops, not just one.

A rough draft of the map and a brochure was distributed at the meeting Thursday in the Ruidoso Valley

Chamber of Commerce. Representatives from the chambers of commerce of Cloudcroft, Capitan and Ruidoso and representatives of the Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo, the Alamogordo City Promotional Board, the Hurd Rinconada Gallery in San Patricio, the National Center for the Western Horse, the Lincoln County Hospitality Association (LCHA), Lincoln County Heritage Trust, the New Mexico Museum and State Parks and three local media reviewed the brochure and discussed all aspects, including funding.

Bob Hart of the Heritage Trust, Sid Goodloe of the Center for the Western Horse and Betty Bechem of LCHA worked on the routes and the rough draft of the brochure and the map was drawn by the Alamogordo Promotional Board.

Although all entities were anxious to include points of interest in their communities, Hart suggested they keep the map clean and key in points of interest, rather than listing them on the actual map. The key will have a reference for the areas included in the brochure. Hart said they propose to put the major routes in color and side roads with side trips in another color.

Hart also said the attrac-

tions along the "loops" of the Apache Trails would have attractions listed under geographic areas and would lead to another folder which will be more specific about the particular areas and would be distributed by each chamber in that area.

By having the second folder all attractions would not have to be listed and thus cluttering the initial brochure.

Goodloe suggested symbols be used on the map to designate areas such as the Ruidoso Down racetrack, Sierra Blanca Regional Airport and so on.

The maps will designate certain highway routes as the Apache Trails, with signs along the routes indicating the attractions and that the visitor is on the Apache Trails loop. The group initially is designating Highway 380 from Valley of Fires through Carrizozo, Capitan, Lincoln to the intersection with Highway 70 at Hondo; then Highway 70 from Hondo through Ruidoso Downs, Mescalero, Bent, Tularosa, Alamogordo and White Sands; Highway 54 from Alamogordo to Carrizozo; Highway 82 from where it begins near Alamogordo, through the tunnel, Cloudcroft, Mayhill and Elk. The route from Highway 82 to Highway 70 will tie the loops together.

The tour will be self-guided with no chance to get lost.

"The whole idea is a vehicle to give opportunity to promote a larger area than the reservation (Mescalero)," Watts said. "It's not one route like the Turquoise Trail. They had to grope for points of interest, here we have to limit the amount of information to be put in the brochure."

The signage will be done in cooperation with the New Mexico Highway Dept. but actual production of the signs will be after the Trails promotion begins.

As for funding, the group anticipates applying for a grant from the New Mexico Tourism Dept. for money available from unused advertising grants.

Watts said 12-20 entities signing on an application for funds to produce the brochure will generate interest and be "attention getting" in Tourism. "It's a great opportunity at an opportune time for us," Watts said.

Dick Beck, president of the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, said the tourism department is more inclined to appropriate or even notice requests which represent regional promotion.

The group agreed to keep their focus on having a printed "collateral piece," as Watts called the brochure, ready by the summer season.

The group also discussed the need for the right pictures in the brochure that convey the feelings of the theme—mystery, adventure and excitement. The kind of paper and narratives for the brochure also were dis-

cussed. Hart showed slides of pictures which could possibly be used.

The cost of the brochures were listed at \$5100 for 10,000 pieces if the group goes with the Phil Price Agency, which does all the Ruidoso Chamber printing. However, the Alamogordo people said they could get printing done at much lower rate, and were asked to check into these for the next meeting.

All at the meeting agreed New Mexico's cultures are a drawing card and there is a need to send the word out about the Apache Trails in other states. "Indians and New Mexico are hot national topics," Watts said.

However, most of the national attention goes to the northern part of the state. Watts said New Mexico is planning a feature on the Turquoise Trail and if it is printed, "they will have no choice but to give equal billing (for the Apache Trails.)"

"Things here cause the Turquoise Trail to pale," he added.

Publicity with press releases and good photos were suggested by Cloudcroft's publication Mountain Monthly's editor Gary Wood.

Watts credited the volunteer work done so far as a major step to seeing the Apache Trails a reality.

From now until the next scheduled meeting March 8 in Cloudcroft, all communities or areas which have attractions can contact Bob Hart at the Lincoln County Heritage Trust to add input. "This is no formal organization," Watts said. "All are

welcome, any groups can get involved by contacting us."

"We're just all working together to create something to help everybody, there's nothing exclusive about it," Watts concluded.

The next meeting will be

at the Cloudcroft Convention Center at noon, March 8.

Anyone interested in helping with the concept or adding points of interest to the brochure is invited to attend or to contact any of the groups mentioned.

Ruidoso businesses whammed with more regulations

Pawnshop, junkshop and second hand store owners in Ruidoso will find themselves doing more bookwork because the Ruidoso village council adopted an amendment to an ordinance requiring records of purchases of used items.

Ruidoso police chief Steve Newman presented the amendment and said it would help the police and victims of burglary recover stolen property. Previously only pawn shops were required to keep a list of items purchased and the names and addresses of those persons who sold the property.

The amendment will change the Ruidoso municipal code on requirements for licensing such businesses.

Councillor Al Junge expressed his dislike of the amendment because it would place an extra burden on the businesses and could lead to closure of many of those businesses.

"I think it's horrible," he said.

Newman said the requirement will not be administered where every little item purchased, such as a box of plumbing odds and ends, would have to be recorded, just a generalized accounting of such purchases.

Bob Power, who operates the Swap Mart, a second-hand store in Ruidoso, said he would have to "hire three secretaries" to keep up with recording purchases. "Listing all the items will take four times longer to buy than what it's worth," he said about used items.

Power also said he can spot items which are possibly stolen, and in that case he refers the people to the pawn shop "across the street." Newman said the situation was a "non-problem" as nothing in the ordinance says to keep a complete inventory only a record of purchase.

Ruidoso Mayor Lloyd Davis, said, "you know what's in your store, I see no problem with this."

He also said most businesses need accounting for tax purposes anyway.

Power also questioned trade-ins and said that could be a possible "loophole."

Newman said there is no problem when a person trades in a new item, such as a television, for a new one. That would not be required to be recorded as would second-hand items.

When Ruidoso clerk Tammie Maddox called for the vote, all councillors—Tom McNeil, Larry Simon, and Jess Stinson voted for the amendment, but Junge voted no.

The amendment will supplement state laws which require pawn shop owners to keep records of purchases to assist law enforcement personnel in recovering stolen items.

When discussion turned to the application for a Community Development Block Grant, (CDBG) village administrator Leon Eggleston presented a series of pictures which represent "blight" in Ruidoso. In order to apply for the CDBG Federal funds for the village MainStreet project, Leon Eggleston and

MainStreet director Mary Maul took several photos of old, dilapidated buildings within one block of Sudderth Drive.

Since the village does not qualify for funds under the service to low-to-moderate income families and the health, welfare and safety of its citizens, the village will send a resolution and pictures to the Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to show the village qualifies under abatement of blighted areas.

"We don't want to advertise Ruidoso is a blighted area by any means," Eggleston said.

Another resolution was passed dealing with indigent burials. Councillor J. D. James, a mortician, tried to abstain from voting, but the council voted to allow him to do so.

Eggleston explained the fund will provide money for a plot and opening and closing as provided by state statute. However, the indigent status must be declared by the county commissioners for any person who dies without any funds or assets.

Eggleston said the fund has been used once in recent years.

By state law the fund will provide \$110 for persons under six years old and \$135 for those older and the village approved adding \$500 for the funeral home, rather than the \$100 allowed by the state. The special definition which will allow the extra funeral home funds will be for Ruidoso citizens only.

County citizens also can receive the money toward burial and only \$100 toward funeral expenses, if the indigent status is declared by the commissioners.

All councillors agreed the money does not meet the costs of modern funerals. The state statute was established

in 1941.

A person cannot be declared indigent if any funds or assets are available.

The resolution passed unanimously.

Ruidoso village manager Frank Potter gave a brief update on legislative activity.

At the meeting the group learned House Bill 448 for video gambling was killed on the floor Tuesday. Ruidoso had hopes of having video gambling machines as do the Indian reservations.

Potter also said it is quite possible the funding for the civic center, Main Street sidewalk project and the Ruidoso-Lincoln County media blitz will receive funding. Potter thanked all groups who traveled to Santa Fe to lobby for them.

Councillor Junge also questioned village infrastructure director Becky Bell-Durham about the solid waste situation with Roswell.

She said the village is still working with a group representing a regional area

which is in favor of the regionalized landfill concept. The group plans to work on a study to determine if the regionalized site is economically feasible. The Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District is also working with the group on the study.

Junge questioned if the village has worked with Lincoln County, which is now under contract with a private firm from Alamogordo. Durham said she was familiar with the contract and the firm the county is working with. However, the landfill to which the county garbage will be taken is in Otero County and is operated by Waste Management and is strictly for Otero County trash.

Durham said Roswell, where the village garbage is now taken, gave the village a "very good deal" and is strictly a favor from that city.

Councillor McNeil said he talked with a county commissioner to request a breakdown of costs for solid waste removal, and nothing has come from his request.

No landfill problems will be solved until the state legislature settles the situation at the state level.

Is your fantasy an exercise that takes no special training or equipment, fits easily into your daily routine, can be done anywhere and is easy, painless, costs nothing and helps improve aerobic fitness, strength and endurance? This ideal exercise is good old-fashioned walking.

As a registered dietitian and nutrition consultant to health fitness spas, I know the addition of a brisk 30-minute walk each day is the easiest, most enjoyable way to burn off about 9 pounds in a year. (Assuming you don't increase your calorie intake.) But, if 30 minutes sounds like too much, too soon, it's easy to build up to it with this 8-week walking program.

Just repeat the WARM-UP-COOL-DOWN pattern, exercising 3 times during each week of the plan.

based on mileage, this must be accurate," Petty said about the map.

"That's where I started (checking into the map) by determining the mileage," Hall said.

To help update the county road maps and to institute rural addressing, Petty and Simpson agreed to seek funds to accomplish both tasks. The commissioners proposed to provide \$40,000 for Hall to hire two persons and obtain a vehicle to update road maps and to work on rural addressing.

Hemphill directed the rural addressing to the county Planning and Zoning Commission with all work to be done "in-house" first.

A consultant for rural addressing will not be hired. Petty also said a three, five and 10-year strategic plan to identify road needs could be implemented at the same time the rural addressing is done.

In other business the commissioners:

—Conducted the final public hearing for the county's application for a Community Development block grant.

—Confirmed names submitted by Bonito Fire Chief Fire Department Vol Chief Howard Puckett for qualification to the Volunteer Firefighters Retirement Act.

—Awarded the bid for an 1800-gallon stainless steel tanker/pumper for Bonito VFD to United Fire and Safety Equipment Inc. for \$98,440.
