

Gross receipts taxes increase in county

Effective Jan. 1, 1991 the gross receipts tax throughout Lincoln County will increase.

The new rates reflect a .0625% municipal environmental services gross receipts tax imposed by the towns of Ruidoso, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona and Ruidoso Downs and a .125% county environmental services gross receipts tax imposed by Lincoln County.

Ruidoso gross receipts tax will increase from 6.75 to 6.8125%. Capitan, Carrizozo and Ruidoso Downs gross receipts tax will increase from 6.00% to 6.0625%. Corona gross receipts tax will increase from 5.75% to 5.8125%. Lincoln County gross receipts tax will increase from 5.00% to 5.125%.

FoodSHARE program in Carrizozo

Helping your neighbor is a value taught to most.

People helping people help themselves with food is the basic idea behind the FoodSHARE program now in its infancy in Carrizozo. The program helps families, or individuals, stretch their food dollars and get help to the community where it is needed.

Elaine Valderrama is the co-host for Carrizozo, and she is working to get a larger group together under the FoodSHARE program.

"Every unit you buy, you donate two hours of community work," said Valderrama.

There are no income qualifications, the only requirement is to donate the two hours of community service per unit. The service can be such things as chopping wood for elderly, assisting elderly or sick persons. Even donation of old eye glasses act as the two hours of community service, she added.

Each "unit" consists of 25-35 pounds of food including fresh fruit, potatoes, canned fruit, winter squashes, top-quality meats like chicken, weiners, ground turkey and cheese. The pack-

Ending the year's business

Commissioners end terms, welcome the new members

It was all eyes at the final county commission meeting Wednesday morning in Carrizozo.

Commissioners Bob Hemphill, Rick Simpson and Karon Petty signed their names to the draft joint resolution to bring about the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority. The county approval was the last step in the process to beginning the authority, an idea conceived during the term of the three commissioners.

New Environmental Improvement Division rules on landfills closed the county landfill in May 1989. Faced with a crisis, commissioners took action which allowed the county dump to stay open. But room was running out in the dump.

In the next following months, it became a scramble to figure out what to do with the trash. In that scramble, an idea was conceived to form a countywide

trash "government" to deal with the trash.

Formation of a special commission district with Petty and Simpson serving with Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso, led to the draft joint resolution tying all the county municipalities into a Solid Waste Authority.

With the county commissioners signatures Wednesday, work can begin on formation of the actual authority board, which will create bylaws and begin to set policy. A detailed report of the joint resolution and the authority will be printed in next week's issue of THE NEWS.

More than \$48,000 worth of unpaid ambulance bills will be sent to those who owe them, commissioners decided. The original request was to "write-off" the unpaid bills, but commissioners voted to send certified letters to debtors, then to publish the list of names of debtors from as far back as 1983-84. If the bills are still uncollected the

next commission can deal with them.

A remodeling project for the Carrizozo Zia Senior Citizen's Center was delayed and all bids rejected because of unclear specifications. Commissioners voted to redo the specs. Consequently, the contract with the New Mexico State Agency on Aging was extended to allow for extra time for the remodel. Three months will be given to the center before the funds are forfeited.

Petition to open a road by Robert M. Yriart, in the Pine Lodge area was denied. The road goes to the Yriart ranch headquarters. A road-review committee inspected the road and recommended it not be made a county road, which commissioners upheld.

A Planning and Zoning request by Jane Crockett for a variance on the Fox Run Subdivision roads was approved to allow for shorter radius on a cul-de-sac. Another P&Z action was

Carrizozo finally gets its "water act" under control

The Town of Carrizozo has plenty of water, but documentation of those rights need updating in the state engineer's office.

Carrizozo board of trustees, Harold Garcia, Dale LaMay, Patsy Vallejos and Gilbert Archuleta, and mayor Cecilia Kuhn learned of the need to update the 1956 water rights at its meeting Dec. 11. Suzane Strong, with the state engineer's office, reported on the work the town has done so far to update those rights on file. The 1956 declaration shows the town with one water well with 300 gallon/minute claimed. No indication was given on the amount that would be in acre-feet.

Now, the town has three wells (including the McBride well) which will come to about 672 acre-feet per year for the city wells. This does not include the golf course well.

Strong said a new declaration should include the pumping capacity figure, which usually is 60 percent of the total amount claimed. Strong arrived at the figure by researching, with town clerk Carol Schlarb and town foreman Faustino Gallegos, a study made by Leedshill-

Herkenhoff which estimated population at 1,650 by 1996. With 3.4 acres to irrigation of parks and recreation (swimming pool) and 47 acres for possible irrigation and population use at 2,838 gallons (200 gallons a day per person), she arrived at the 672 acre feet.

After a question about selling water commercially, Strong said she estimated 12 million gallons a year for commercial water sales, more than the town has ever sold to date.

A 40-year-plan also was discussed in relation to such a plan's effect on the town. Town attorney Robert Beauvais told of the plan conceived in the Elephant Butte litigation to keep New Mexico waters from being imported to El Paso, TX. The 40-year-plan would require complicated documentation, a "serious undertaking."

However, the town cannot pass the 60 percent useage even if it has a 40-year plan, Strong noted.

As for the golf course well, which is not part of the municipal supply, there is much documentation, initiated during Johnson Stearn's term as mayor. When filed, the town had pro-

jected to expand the course to 18 holes (it is now 9 holes.)

Strong said the town could claim however much it considers necessary for the wells. However, if the course is expanded to 18 holes, 674 acre feet a year would be the minimum needed.

For the four wells at the golf course, of which two have never been used, 885 acre feet could be claimed at 60 percent usage.

"These wells have never been used until this year for commercial," Strong said. Then she cautioned the town to not use the golf course wells for any commercial use (such as selling water to state highway sub-contractors), unless it applies with the state engineer.

Dec. 13, current water sales at the golf course cease, Strong emphasized.

"We know that," replied Garcia. Then he asked how long it will take to apply with the state to use the golf course wells for commercial purposes.

Strong told of the application process for the wells; filing application, publication of intent for three weeks, and all subject to protest. After the 10-day protest period, if

no protests are made, the center will be processed. Garcia explained the reason why the golf course wells were used to sell water for the road projects—mainly access to the pump without having heavy trucks on fragile town streets.

Strong acknowledged the problem with accessibility of selling water from the McBride well, but noted the sale of the public water would not be fair just for that.

"I realize the city was not aware of the illegal appropriation of water," Strong said. She noted the "fancy footwork" by the New Mexico State Highway Dept., Mayor Kuhnel and her office to legalize the sale of water from the golf course well.

"We want to keep you out of trouble," she added.

Strong said there is no problem selling water from the McBride well. Kuhnel commented on the McBride well in relation to testing being done by the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) on the Cimarron and Sierra Blanca Mill sites. Paul Seiminski of EPA indicated to Kuhnel he was 95 percent confident the well is not contaminated. EPA was to make final tests last week.

After discussion, Beauvais suggested the board consider a 5 percent increase on the well use on the applications. Garcia moved to initiate the 5 percent increase for the town primary wells (golf course). All trustees approved the motion.

Trustees also approved the draft joint resolution for the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority. Approval brings the authority close to reality, as only Lincoln County has to approve the document before the authority can form. (See related article).

Ruth Hammond, president of Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, requested space in the Zia Senior Citizen's

Center for a rack for chamber brochures and other information. Center director Barbara Ward had no objection to the request, but trustees reminded Hammond the town owns the building in which the center is housed. The chamber also requested additional space, when the center expands. The building also houses the fire department trucks. When the new facility for the fire department is completed plans are to vacate the truck bay and turn that space over to the senior citizens.

Although trustees approved the request for the rack space, the additional office space request was tabled for later discussion.

Rosemary Gallegos, Carrizozo police secretary, will get a new copier. The low bid of \$1672 from A.B. Dick for a AB Dick 2012 copier was approved.

Since no request for proposals (rfps) were received for legal service, none were opened, and the board decided to place an advertisement in Ruidoso News concerning rfps for legal service.

A vacancy on the Airport Committee will be filled by Dr. David Rouleau who flies out of Carrizozo Airport. The other vacancy will be considered at the Jan. 8 meeting.

The airport manager's position remains unfilled, with another suggestion to place an ad about the vacancy in Albuquerque Journal. The item was tabled until Jan. 8 also.

Action on the animal control ordinance revisions was tabled.

Resolutions for the "Open Meetings Act" and 1991 official holidays were approved.

The board went into closed session for more than an hour to discuss personnel matters and pending litigation. When trustees came back into open session at 10:15 p.m. they voted to hold a closed session personnel meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 18, and gave the attorney the okay to start legal action to recover the land at the Belco Industrial Park deeded to Belco.

Trustees canceled their next regularly scheduled Tuesday night meeting since it falls on Christmas Day.

The next meeting of the town trustees will be at 6 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 8.

New Year's Eve party for students

Mountainair's violent, obscene conduct at game is challenged

Again this year Carrizozo High School students will have somewhere safe to go on New Year's Eve.

Students from grades 7-12 can attend the school-sponsored party which begins at 7 p.m. Dec. 31 at Carrizozo Rec Center. Once a student goes into the party, he or she must stay. If that student leaves, his or her parents will be notified, said principal Mel Holland to the Carrizozo Board of Education at its meeting Tuesday. Holland said the purpose of the party is to give the kids a chance to "say no to drinking" and have a social event.

Each year the annual party has gotten bigger. This year, plans are to have a disc jockey type of music program.

"If it keeps one kid safe, it's worth it," said board president Wally Ferguson.

How to deal with potentially violent situations at athletic events, especially those on the road, was discussed again Tuesday night. Board members had directed Supt. Danny Burnett to send a letter about an incident at the Mountainair-Carrizozo volleyball game on Oct. 19 in Mountainair. Food was thrown at the girls while on the bench, crude and obscene remarks were made, the Carrizozo girls were denied access to their locker room by threatening and harassing student-age people, and while leaving, the bus was pelted with water balloons and other debris. Garbage also had been stuffed into the tail pipe of the bus, and the driver found someone urinating on the bus. The letter was mailed to Mountainair superintendent on Oct. 26, but Carrizozo has yet to receive any type of reply.

"It's really had business not to acknowledge the problem," Ferguson said.

The question was, what to do about the situation—wait for the next time, ignore it, or contact the New Mexico Activities Association board? Member Nat Palomarez wanted to contact the state board. "To cover ourselves," added member Hoot Gibson.

Burnett explained the newest letter addressed to the Mountainair school board president was to show the school did not "over-react" to the incident.

Ferguson commented the school did not over-react; if it had, the upcoming games with Mountainair would have been canceled. "If the people are fighting, it's not worth the contest to go there," he said.

It was noted in the letter that the questionable behavior at Mountainair was not by its coaching staff or players, rather from fans.

NMAA is aware of the incident, since Carrizozo

coach reported it. But Gibson said to forward the letters, that are addressed to Mountainair, to the NMAA.

"We need a little assurance their board wants to help out," Ferguson said.

The letter will be mailed to the Mountainair board of education.

The board also heard about completion of the new

computerized bell, alarm and communications system at Carrizozo Schools. Favorable comments have come from staff and students about the way the system is working. With the system, all buildings hear chimes for the end of class. The national anthem is played at 8:30 a.m. to all



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CREATIVE HOLIDAY APPETIZERS



Variety—it's the spice of life. In cooking and baking, variety is essential. A good cook is always looking for ways to turn out creative, interesting and great-tasting foods that invite compliments.

Developed by home economists in the Betty Crocker Kitchens, these recipes offer several unique uses for a conventional item—pie crust mix or sticks. Ideal for holiday entertaining, Cheddar Blossoms, Cheese Straws, Pastry Pinwheels and Empanaditas are hot appetizers to please any crowd.

And they're versatile. Different ingredients and flavorings can be substituted for a variety of combinations.

Cheesy Pastry Appetizers

1 package Betty Crocker pie crust sticks or mix
1 cup shredded sharp natural cheddar cheese

Heat oven to 450°. Prepare pastry for Two-Crust Pie as directed on package except — add cheese with the water. Shape into Blossoms or Straws as directed below. Bake until golden brown, 8 to 10 minutes. 40 to 48 appetizers.

Blossoms: Shape pastry into 1-inch balls. Place about 2 inches apart on ungreased cookie sheet. Press thumb deeply in center of each ball. Just before serving, fill indentations with softened cream cheese, mushroom caps, olives or sliced pimientos.

Straws: Roll pastry into rectangle, 15x9 inches, on lightly floured board. Place on ungreased cookie sheet. Cut pastry lengthwise into thirds with sharp knife. Cut each third crosswise into 15

strips (do not separate). Sprinkle with salt, caraway or puppy seed and paprika.

Pastry Pinwheels

1 package Betty Crocker pie crust sticks or mix
1 can (4 1/2 ounces) deviled ham

Prepare pastry for One-Crust Pie as directed on package except—roll into rectangle, 15x10 inches. Spread with deviled ham. Roll up, beginning at 10-inch side. Wrap and refrigerate until chilled, at least 1 hour.

Heat oven to 400°. Cut roll into 1/8-inch slices. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet until golden brown, 10 to 12 minutes. 3 dozen appetizers.

Empanaditas

1 package Betty Crocker pie crust sticks or mix
Chicken Filling or Ham Filling (below)

Heat oven to 425°. Prepare pastry for Two-Crust Pie as directed on package except—roll each round of pastry into 13-inch circle; cut each into 2 1/2-inch circles. Place scant teaspoonful Chicken Filling on each circle. Fold circles in half; press edges together with fork to seal. Bake on ungreased cookie sheet until golden brown, about 12 minutes. Serve warm. About 3 dozen appetizers.

Chicken Filling: Mix 3/4 cup chopped cooked chicken, 3 tablespoons chili sauce and 1/8 teaspoon chili powder.

Ham Filling: Mix 1 can (4 1/2 ounces) deviled ham, 2 teaspoons prepared horseradish, 2 teaspoons prepared mustard and 1/4

teaspoon pepper.

Note: Empanaditas can be prepared up to 8 hours ahead of time and refrigerated. Bake as directed.

Capitan's substitute teachers get raise

Substitute teachers in Capitan School District will receive more pay for their services.

Capitan Board of Education approved a 15.8 percent increase, making the rate \$38, from \$32 a day for degreed substitutes and \$32 from \$28 a day for non-degreed subs. Supt. Scott Childress recommended the raise to keep the good pool of well qualified substitutes the school now has. Board members Preston Stone, Tom Trost, Kan Cox, Hollis Fuchs and Ron Roybal approved the increase.

was placed at budget time in case the school did not meet enrollment. Since enrollment exceeded the projection, the funds were in both the high school and elementary. Based on the regular special education enrollment count on the 40th day of school and the Special Education count on Dec. 1, Capitan Schools will receive \$87,918 in additional revenue. Because of the large numbers one full-time special education teacher was added and a current staff will add one more period of Special Education.

The board also considered and approved a \$10,000 budget transfer from the equipment line item, where \$52,447 excess cash balance

A budget increase will need action when Santa Fe concurs with the schools budget figures, Childress said.

available. Childress requested the transfer to the building item to replace the 20-year-old furnaces in the old gym. Because of the age of the heaters, parts are hard, to impossible to find. Four quotes were received for new heaters, the low quote being \$7,130 by Alek Mechanical of Albuquerque. The heaters will be gas fired infra-red tube type.

The board approved the low bid and the heaters will be installed during Christmas vacation.

Childress also told of a need to develop a long-range building program, since there is no additional classroom space in the high school and the old gym needs major renovations. The board discussed the program briefly and decided to wait until after the February board election before beginning the actual list.

A Collection Of Distinctive Dips For Harried Holiday Hosts...

SPINACH DIP
 1 1/2 cups sour cream
 1 cup Best Foods real mayonnaise
 1 package (10 oz.) frozen chopped spinach, thawed and drained

Stir all ingredients until well mixed. Cover; chill. Makes about 2 cups.

CUCUMBER DILL DIP

1 package (8 oz.) cream cheese, softened
 1 cup Best Foods real mayonnaise

THE BUSH-BAKER SIREN SONGS ON SANCTIONS EFFECTIVENESS

On Aug. 8, six days after Iraq invaded Kuwait, President Bush announced: "The economic sanctions should begin to bite very soon."

One week later, at the Pentagon, he announced "Sanctions are working."

One-and-a-half months later, at a news conference, Bush modified this to: "We're still giving sanctions the time to work, the time to be effective. And I'm a little encouraged that perhaps they are having a strong effect."

Two-and-a-half weeks later, Secretary of State Baker testified: "Sanctions are beginning to be effective."

Three days later, Secretary of Defense Cheney

announced: "We believe (sanctions are) beginning to have an effect."

Three weeks later, Mr. Bush, on a CNN interview, announced: "I know that they (sanctions) have had some bite. We get different reports from countries near Iraq. But I can't give you and the American people a total assessment of that question."

And three days later, Secretary Baker announced: "We know that sanctions are beginning to have some impact."

Which was just about exactly what Baker said one month earlier. And what Bush said three months earlier.

Has Saddam shown any signs that these sanctions have motivated him to withdraw from Kuwait?

As a matter of fact, he has

moved 200,000 more troops into Kuwait and Southern Iraq, in addition to the 300,000 troops he has there already! And this is while Commander Bush, instead of commanding, tried, with his Secretary of State, to snow-job the American people with the supposed efficacy of sanctions.

The *Washington Post*, which compiled this chronology of Bush-Baker sanctions salutations, also quoted several specialists in sanctions, including Georgetown Economics Professor Gary Hufbauer. His study of 115 sanctions since World War I found only a few instances of sanctions success in less than one or two years. "The median period was four-to-five years."

So much for all those sanctions-assurances from President Read-My-Lips.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Today Gov. Garrey Carruthers heads for Washington, DC, accompanied by Gov.-elect Bruce King, Albuquerque Mayor Louis Saavedra and Carruthers' science advisor Art Gunther.

Purpose of the mission is to meet with New Mexico's congressional delegation and others about bringing more science and technology industries and government contracts to New Mexico. King discussed the trip at a press conference last Wednesday. That same day US Secretary of Education Lauro Cavazos announced his resignation about six hours earlier.

Announcement of the cabinet vacancy created excitement in several state capitals around the country. New Mexico's Garrey Carruthers is thought to be near the top of Pres. George Bush's list of possibilities. Capitol Hill insiders figure as of last Wednesday that the only people ahead of Carruthers might be former Tennessee Gov. Lamar Alexander, former New Jersey Gov. Tom Kean and Energy Secretary James Watkins.

Alexander served as Tennessee's governor at the same time Toney Anaya was governor of New Mexico. Both worked diligently to push education reform measures through their legislatures. Alexander was successful in his first effort. He is now president of the University of Tennessee.

Kean is a rising star in the GOP. In order to win election in New Jersey, Kean made a strong pitch to the working class, the poor and

minorities in what he called "the politics of inclusion." He is also a university president.

Word circulated months ago that both Alexander and Kean promised their boards of regents they had a long-time commitment to their respective universities and would not leave to accept a Bush appointment.

Another story circulating among Capitol Hill insiders is that Alexander and Kean are both unimpressed with the prospect of having to deal with Domestic Affairs Advisor Roger Porter. It was Porter who strong-armed the nation's governors earlier this year to adopt a set of national education goals that he had tailored. Carruthers can, perhaps, communicate better with Porter than anyone else as a result of having participated in the White House Fellows program.

Watkins, a former Navy admiral, always has maintained his chief interest is in education. He has directed the four national laboratories, two of which are in New Mexico, to become involved in the improvement of math and science education wherever and whenever they can.

Another name prominently mentioned for the education post is Cavazos' deputy Ted Sanders, a former New Mexico assistant state superintendent of schools. Sanders went from here to Nevada and then Illinois to fill the top education job in both states. He reportedly told the folks in Illinois when he left for the second-fiddle job in Washington at a lower salary that he was doing so only because he was

told he could move up to the top job when Cavazos departed. Nevertheless, Sanders is considered a dark horse because he does not have the political stroke enjoyed by his competitors.

Also mentioned as possibilities are Missouri Gov. John Ashcroft, former Illinois Congresswoman Lynn Martin, former Hawaii Congresswoman Patricia Saiki, National Endowment for the Humanities Chairman Lynne Cheney and former Education Department official under Bill Bennett, Chester "Checker" Finn. Martin and Saiki both gave up their House seats to challenge unsuccessfully for the US Senate. Some observers think that will give them an inside track for appointment to the Education and Labor posts that are currently vacant. Martin is known to prefer the Labor appointment.

As of Wednesday Carruthers said he would be glad to make recommendations if asked. He reiterated his determination to "take a sabbatical" before looking at anything else. It was obvious he had not been contacted by the White House and was trying to lower expectations as much as possible.

If no one is appointed by tomorrow, Carruthers' trip to Washington could provide him with an ideal opportunity to make his recommendations in person.

Conservationists meet in Clovis

As the public's interest in and influence on environmental issues increase, conservation districts must develop strategic plans to better represent concerns of the people they serve.

Robert Wetherbee, president of the National Association of Conservation Districts, made this challenge to participants in the 44th Annual Meeting of the New Mexico Association of Conservation Districts in Clovis, on Nov. 27.

In his keynote address, Wetherbee outlined major trends which conservation districts must address to meet the demands of the 1990s.

"Because federal support of conservation programs will be increasingly targeted to areas of greatest need, state and local programs must be expanded to fill in the gaps," Wetherbee said. The association president stressed that local programs have a proven track record of meeting the conservation needs of agricultural producers and land users as well as those of local units of government.

"You must be poised to seize the opportunity to assist New Mexico's farmers, ranchers, and other land users as we move into the 'decade of environment,'" Wetherbee advised.

Nearly 200 conservationists, primarily officials representing the State's 47 soil and water conservation districts, attended the three-day meeting.

Soil and water conservation districts are political subdivisions of the state. District boards of supervisors

are responsible by law for directing conservation programs within their district boundaries.

Attending the meeting from this area were John and Mary Cooper, Arabela; and Howard and Mary Shanks, Capitan.

The association elected a new slate of officers, including Louis Oliver, president, San Lorenzo; Ben Arguello, first vice-president, Ocate; and Joe Jaquez, second vice-president, Flora Vista.



approval of a request from Ron Green to exempt his land in the Lincoln Valley from the county subdivision ordinance. The unique circumstances of the land transactions did not reflect a subdivision is intended.

The November election was officially certified when commissioners signed the certificates of election for county clerk Martha M. Proctor.

Commissioners also pulled the permit to Lincoln Cablevision to make trenches and bury cables, after safety concerns were voiced by Otero Electric Coop and Zia Natural Gas Company. Because of so many underground lines in the Alto area, digging has become a danger. There are no plans or organized routing of any of the lines, which lead to the county decision to suspend the permit until the various groups get together and agree to do it right.

The mid-year budget review showed some depart-

ments with more than 50 percent of their budget expended. To adjust those departments, commissioners approved the transfer of funds in department with plenty to those with little. Santa Fe requires no more than 50 percent on any budget item be expended, which leads to the transfers and adjustments.

When commissioners came to the accounts payable, Hemphill made county manager Nick Pappas explain the warrant for \$378 to former reporter Rich Harold. Pappas said Harold worked on a comprehensive development strategy for the county, which at first was to receive funds from Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County. When EDC did not meet its deadline for funding, the county paid Harold out of professional services.

At the end of the business, elected officials said their goodbyes. Jack Page, probate judge, learned a lot in his 5th career; Shirley Goodloe enjoyed the experience as treasurer in the last four years and noted the excellent personnel policy and salary classification compiled in the last year.

Hemphill also took a last bit of action and approved letting county employees have Jan. 1 as a day off. Since the new commission does not take over until Jan. 2, Hemphill took the initiative to give the extra day vacation.

Commissioners presented Pappas with a bronze sculpture of an Indian warrior because Petty said Pappas was a "good warrior" during their term.

Simpson concluded by wishing that every Lincoln County citizen could take a turn at the commission, which was quite an education and experience.

Hemphill thanked all in the county offices and said he accomplished the goal of pulling the county government back to where it should be—like a family.

Rick Emmons found guilty on disorderly conduct charge

"Guilty." Carrizozo Municipal Judge S.M. Ortiz concluded the disorderly conduct case filed against former police officer Rick Emmons by Patty and Maxie Saucedo with a guilty verdict Wednesday, Dec. 19.

The incident which led to the charge, and subsequently the guilty verdict, happened during the early hours of Aug. 19. Emmons had stopped John Saucedo (Maxie's son) for open container and contributing to the delinquency of a minor (it was after curfew for the juvenile with Saucedo). According to reports, John was taken to the sheriff's office for a blood test to determine if he was driving while drunk.

Even though a blood test was administered, no consent form was found. And then Emmons' citation book disappeared, setting the stage for the angry, loud confrontation at the Saucedo's home.

Witness Angelo Vega testified at the court hearing Wednesday that he went to the sheriff's office to follow John home, Vega took John to his car, waited until John talked with someone for a few minutes, then followed John to his home. When they got to the Saucedo home, Emmons arrived behind them, already angry.

Vega said Emmons told him, "John f---ed up and stole the citation book."

"I knew he was upset," Vega said. Then Vega told Emmons to cool off.

Emmons' attorney Don Dutton directed questioning to establish how long the angry exchange lasted, which was determined about 15-30 minutes.

Patty testified Emmons was "very, very obscene" and very loud. "We don't use words like that," she said.

The exchange was so loud, Patty testified she heard it in her bedroom, located on the far side of the house from the porch where the incident happened. She awoke her husband, who then got up to see what was happening. When Max got to the porch he told John to come in. Emmons then used profanity to ask for the citation book, she added.

Once Max delivered the citation book which he got from the house, Emmons angrily asked for the consent form. John allowed his body to be searched and was about to give consent for a search of his car, but his father declined.

After Max and Angelo talked with Emmons for a while, Emmons finally cooled off and even agreed to drop the charges, since there was no consent form for the blood test. He shook hands with the Saucedos.

And how did Patty feel? asked town attorney Robert Beauvais.

"Relieved," she replied. When Angelo Vega testified, he told of the incident which was "quick action." Emmons slammed the citation book on the porch floor after Max gave it to him, still angry about the consent form, and said he wanted to take John to jail.

Vega never saw the citation book either, until Max brought it from the house.

Numerous objections from both attorneys filled the hearing and twice Ortiz called for Police Chief Choncho Morales, who served as bailiff, to quiet people in adjoining rooms. Once, Ortiz called for a five-minute recess, to quiet the personnel in the front office in town hall. The wind was blowing hard outside and rattling the roof and walls, and no noise came from that side of the building.

Ortiz also took advantage of the cold room to ask Beauvais to ask the town counsel to do something about the cold and noisy conditions of the courtroom.

In closing arguments, Beauvais told of the defiance of disturbing the peace and disorderly conduct as "violent, tumultuous, offensive conduct." But the "key" to the case was Emmons' unprofessional conduct as a uniformed police officer. It was the town's position that officer Emmons went outside the bounds of propriety of an officer. Beauvais alluded to the fact that Emmons was armed and capable, to which Dutton interrupted and objected, because he found it beyond the realm of the offense.

But Beauvais persisted because of Emmons' conduct,

which was also a breach of peace.

Beauvais agreed Emmons had good cause to be angry at John Saucedo, but the "yelling match" with the Saucedos was a situation which would have frightened him. He told of a police officer's duty to not react or retaliate in such a situation. And thus he requested the judge rule guilty.

Dutton responded, the situation was beyond propriety, since even he was not sure what he would have done if he had seen a "young rascal" run and hide behind his mother and father's coat tails.

He related a 1978 New Mexico Supreme Court ruling that lists disruption of public order as an act of violence or any act likely to make violence. He argued the Saucedos were not awakened by Emmons, rather by John coming home.

"Max wasn't awakened by Emmons' actions, his peace was disturbed by his wife waking him," Dutton said.

Dutton then used the example of undercover police breaking down doors, to show that often police situations disturb the peace.

"The only thing I find questionable is why he (Emmons) did not arrest the little man (John) for the felony of taking public records," Dutton continued.

He also argued the neighbors weren't awakened nor did they come over during the incident. And he justified Emmons' anger as he had reason to be at the Saucedo house to conduct a search. Though Dutton conceded the search was "not by the book it alleviated what Emmons needed, return of the citation

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

He is survived by a half-sister, Marilyn Vironet of Tempe, AZ and many friends in the Capitan area.


