

# Lincoln County unique in its garbage disposal plan

While some small communities in the state are crying of the burden created by new solid waste regulations to the legislature, Lincoln County barged ahead with its pilot program of "garbage government."

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) met as a group for the first time Friday, in Ruidoso's Cree Meadows Country Club. The group was finally

able to organize after resolutions were approved by every municipality and the county forming the LCSWA.

County commission representative Stirling Spencer said Lincoln County is ahead of the rest of the state and "we're recognized as unique" in the legislature. He told of LCSWA being organized enough to pursue part of the \$750,000 available for solid waste programs from the state.

Presided over by Ruidoso

Mayor Victor Alonso, the group first summarized events which led to their presence in the room—the landfill crisis of 1989 created by new solid waste regulations, closure of the county landfill, no where to go with trash for various communities, transport of Ruidoso trash to Roswell and the resolve of Alonso that if Ruidoso has to accept Roswell's charity of allowing dumping in that city's landfill, then Ruidoso should help other Lincoln County munic-

ipalities and the county solve the solid waste problem.

With that in mind, a small group began to meet and formulate a plan to help the municipalities—through cooperation. A 5-member Special Commission District was formed by the county commissioners which began to work on a quasi-government to collect, transport, and dispose of solid waste generated in Lincoln County. Thus the LCSWA became the child of that spe-

cial district and approval by all municipalities and the county formalized its existence.

"I feel strongly this is one area where government has a legitimate role," Alonso said. He further explained the need of government to control solid waste to keep taps on rates and profits which could be arbitrarily set by private solid waste industry. Also the public would have no control over any part of the solid waste if private

industry is allowed to take over.

To emphasize that potential, a concerned citizen and new resident of Ruidoso, Dave Dale, told of eastern contractors who threatened and sabotaged small solid waste contractors in Bernalillo County to drive out all business, leaving it to one private contractor.

"The control factor is very serious," Dale said.

By unanimous vote, Ruidoso Mayor Victor Alonso

was elected president. Capitan Mayor Frank Warth was elected vice-president, and county commissioner Stirling Spencer secretary-treasurer.

Other members of the 11-member board include Carrizozo Mayor Cecilia Kuhnel, Ruidoso Downs Mayor Bonnie Addy, Corona Mayor Ernest Lueras (not present at the meeting), county commissioner Bill Elliott, and Ruidoso representatives councillor Al Junge, village manager Charles Norwood and appointed by mayor were citizens Bill Allen of Ruidoso and Kerry Krumsiek of Alto.

Representation on the board was determined by the population of each municipality and the county. Initially, all mayors of municipalities will serve as representatives for the various communities.

An Open Meetings Resolution was passed first, establishing the rules for notification of meetings—five days for regular meeting, 24 hours for special and three hours for bona-fide emergency meetings where health and welfare are concerned. A quorum of six members from the 11 must be met to conduct business. But a question was raised whether two county commissioners meeting in the same group would constitute a quorum of that county body. Spencer said the issue would be clarified to avoid having two clerks, county and village, at each LCSWA meeting.

All members approved the open meetings resolution.

When discussion moved to financing the authority in its initial months, Warth told of how Capitan borrowed \$51,000 from the county to finance conversion of its Class B household solid waste landfill to a Class C for all county construction waste. The loan was made interest free.

Alonso said the authority could approach Ruidoso, but the village has no line item for solid waste alone.

Commissioner Elliott noted the special environmental gross receipt tax earmarked by each municipality and the county government for such things as solid waste. But those funds, collected by the state, trickle back to the communities too late to help with financing the initial costs.

Members approved asking the county commission for an interest-free \$10,000 loan to serve as "seed" money. Warth will convey the request to the commission at its Feb. 12 meeting.

Attending attorneys Robert Beauvais, for the county, and Dave Thomson, for Ruidoso, advised on various subjects. Beauvais, who has worked on the resolutions and formation of LCSWA with county manager Nick Pappas, suggested the bonding of those in charge of the finances, since it is a quasi-governmental entity which is its own fiscal agent, go up to \$100,000 for now, with increases as funds increase. Bonding was approved.

Once the subject of seed money was settled, members pursued the job description for an authority manager, with salary and qualifications the most argued. Agreement was the manager should have the minimum of five years experience in a solid waste management or related field, finance management, administrative skills, budget creation, personnel management and communications skills. Beauvais suggested taking the Ruidoso manager job

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### Carrizozo mother files lawsuit against school for child abuse

A Carrizozo mother has filed a civil lawsuit against the Carrizozo School principal, superintendent and board of education for abuse of her child.

Linda King filed a civil suit in district court Jan. 16 against Mel Holland as an individual and Carrizozo principal, Danny Burnett as an individual and Carrizozo Schools superintendent and the entire board of education on behalf of Jay King, her son.

In the suit King alleges Holland, in an illegal and negligent manner, hit Jay, then 13 years old, with a board on his butt and kidney area on Jan. 18, 1989. King alleges the corporal punishment was not justified, since it was against her orders. She claims she had signed a form not allowing corporal punishment for her son.

Because of the alleged abuse, King stated she has been forced to send her son to school in Alamogordo, then to Capitan.

Other charges in the suit include negligent employment of Mel Holland, and King is asking for punitive damages from the court.

District Judge Richard A. Parsons in Carrizozo recused himself from the case on Jan. 16 and the suit was referred to District Judge Robert Doughty in Alamogordo.

On Jan. 22, a summons was filed requesting the defendants respond within 30 days.

King's attorney is Charles Hawthorne of Ruidoso.

The alleged abuse was first aired in an article in the Feb. 2, 1989 issue of THE NEWS. King said the Jan. 18, 1989 incident involved her son and two other teenagers playing a game of "Smear the Queer" on school grounds. She said the game was broken up and Mel Holland as principal spanked all three with a board that caused bruises and broken skin.

Carrizozo police were notified and pictures were taken of all three teens. The boys were then taken to the Dept. of Human Services where they were examined and photographed.

"It was the opinion of Human Services nurses that these children had been abused," Mrs. King said, the article quotes.

The district attorney was scheduled to review the case that same week of the article. But in the following issue, Feb. 9, 1989, ADA Scot Key reported no formal court hearing, instead a private meeting was held to discuss the situation and no charges were filed.

After that King took her charges to the Carrizozo Board of Education.

At that Feb. 21, 1989 board of education meeting, King requested the school discipline policy be changed and Holland's contract not be

### School board election is Feb. 5, mil levies sought

Next Tuesday, Feb. 5, all Lincoln County School districts will hold elections for members to their respective boards of education.

Capitan, Corona and Hondo districts also will ask voters to approve the Public School Capital Improvements Tax question. The question seeks authorization for districts to impose a 2 mil property tax, or \$2 per \$1000 of net taxable value of property. The tax can be used for capital improvements in the districts such as erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for or furnishing school buildings, purchasing or improving school buildings, purchasing or improving school grounds, maintenance

of buildings and purchasing activity vehicles for extra curricular activities, but not for salaries.

All districts currently have the 2 mil levies in place. In Capitan the levy has been in place since 1979 and provides the district with about \$119,489 a year.

With the 2 mil levy districts have no interest or financing costs as with a bond issue, yet buildings can be erected or remodeled with the funds. The levy also provides for maintenance and supplies. Revenues from the tax can also be invested at the highest rate without restrictions.

If the 2 mil levy tax questions are approved, the duration of the levy is three years.

Because districts already have the tax in place, taxpayers will not realize an increase in their property taxes.

Carrizozo voters passed the 2 mil levy last year when they also passed a bond issue.

Ruidoso already has the 2 mil levy in place, but this year will ask voters to approve a 1 mil levy for an off-campus instructional district of Eastern New Mexico University. The levy will provide up to 55 percent of the first year operations. The off-campus instructional center will utilize existing Ruidoso school district facilities and proposed municipal

### Council hears objections, and the air gets cleared

The Ruidoso City Council opened the Jan. 29 meeting with a moment of silence for our country's forces in the Middle East.

Councilor Al Junge congratulated Village Clerk Tammie Maddox for her preparation of the minutes of the Jan. 22 special meeting which lasted seven hours. See "RCC Special Meeting," in the next issue.

Councilor Bill Karn questioned City Manager Charles Norwood if there had been any reports from the Water Study Committee. Norwood reported that Planning Administrator Cleatus Richards is currently looking into the number of feet needed to be replaced in the distribution system.

A strategy of dividing the system into sections, isolating problems, and working on each one was suggested by Norwood.

He also mentioned metering the water coming out of the treatment plant, rather than just metering ingoing water. The report will be submitted, he continued, and indicated that development and expansion of the study is very positive.

Four individuals protested the Permit Application to the Environmental

Improvement Division for construction at the Street Yard. John Stowe, Tom White, David Bonnell and Judy Miller, all representing affected business interests if the application was approved, were welcomed into the open climate promoted by the council.

Mayor Victor Alonso asked the city manager to verify the purchase of a screening plant and rock crusher was not an all in one request, but a two-phase plan.

The business interests protested both phases on the

grounds that the village would be competing with local enterprise.

In spite of other facts supporting the application, such as acquisition costs of a used screening plant summing to only \$3500 and the idea of stockpiling the four different types of material in village maintenance "off-time," objections ruled the discussion.

Questions of the longevity of the site, air and noise pollution, public entity vs private enterprise, and that entity's responsibility to sup-

### Capital improvements levy important to Hondo Schools

Feb. 5 is an important day for this small rural district. Not only will a school board election be in progress, but the important Capital Improvements Levy will be up for renewal. The school district is planning now for the future.

Current needs of the district can be financed through a continuation of the levy. It has been in place since 1976 and is re-issued every three years. The monies are of major importance because they provide for construction, remodeling and additions to buildings; they help purchase equipment and furnish class rooms, offices and shop building as well as improving and maintaining

buildings and grounds. It can also be used to purchase activity vehicles for transporting students to and from extra-curricular activities.

During the last three years the funding was used to purchase new lockers, repaint the high school and replace old curtains with venetian blinds as well as assisting in buying badly needed equipment for maintaining the grounds.

On the wish list for the coming year is maintenance of wood trim and some basic outside painting and purchase of computers. A smaller activity vehicle in addition to the bus now in use is also needed.

Administration officials

emphasized that there will be no additional cost to the taxpayers since this tax is already in place. There is no money borrowed, like with a bond issue, and thus no interest or financing costs are paid for by district taxpayers. It is not a new tax.

The election will be Feb. 5 from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Hondo Gym. Additional information may be obtained by calling the school at 653-4411.

description and "plugging in solid waste."

After lunch the group "got the ball going" and agreed to assign the executive committee to creating an advertisement with job description for the manager, attorney and appraiser. The reason for an appraiser will be to determine how much inventory each community will have to add to the authority.

Ruidoso will have the largest input of physical inventory and staff. It owns collection trucks, dumpsters, a compaction plant and semi-tractor and trailer for transport. Capitan has its Class C landfill, which also will be appraised and acquired by the authority.

Plans are to have three appraisals made of all facilities to determine the most acceptable prices.

Although each community has the special gross receipts taxes, those funds will not begin to finance the authority. Rather, up to \$1.5 million in revenue bonds can be issued based on those funds. Once the bonds are bought and the funds become available, the county's initial loan will be repaid, Ruidoso and Capitan will be paid for their inventories and 30 days after the transfers, LCSWA will be in business, with big money, Alonso said.

But billing for solid waste collection may become the thorn in the side of the authority.

The villages and town now bill its residents for solid waste with water and sewer bills. But the county has no means with which to collect for solid waste pick up.

Spencer suggested billing through the assessor's office which has the data base to separate county resident charges from municipal residents.

But the high cost of billing may not be feasible for the authority, and Warth said to wait until analysis is done to determine how it can be accomplished.

Members finally got down to fine-tuning the Joint Powers Agreement which will be processed through each entity involved with the authority. Beauvais told of the history behind the resolution and the passage of the special environmental gross receipt taxes. He noted the authority is the only entity in the state where all the municipalities and the county passed the special tax just for solid waste. Because of that, the revenue bonds can be issued on the funds earned from the tax.

But, Beauvais warned, no commitment can be made to the bonds, until the joint powers agreement is entered into by all government entities involved in the authority. Also, if they commit, the various governments can not opt out of their share of the special tax until the bonds are paid off. Beauvais considered the situation way beyond getting out, however.

"Since it (the authority) is a monopoly it can't fail, only by gross mismanagement," Beauvais said.

The authority could also pursue financing with general obligation bonds and ad valorem taxes up to 10 mills. Alonso said the group made a conscious decision not to impose the 10 mills. "If we do, we might have a war on our hands," he said.

Other fine tuning determined each member would get \$25 each meeting and \$65 per diem.

The chairman will serve for two years. Quorums will be determined by a simple majority (any four similar votes of six members) unless rates, tipping fees and money is considered, then an absolute majority will be required. An absolute majority is when six members vote unanimously,

even if all 11 are not present, or six votes similar with 11 present.

The chairman will have voting power, explained by Alonso to keep the balance so small towns can chair without losing the vote. Conflict of interest will be determined by the group after it is declared by the member. When the vote came on voting rules, all members present but Junge voted yes.

All members unanimously agreed to create staggered terms by having the mayors serve only one year and other members two. After the one year, the municipalities will appoint members.

Groups such as sanitation districts and homeowners associations will be allowed to serve as "ex-officio" members, with no voting power, to allow the citizen groups to add their input.

Although Alonso worried of problems arising over representation for the smaller towns on the authority, Junge predicted "the thing will work so well and make so

much money there will be no problem with the board."

Beauvais also told of a need for a section concerning revenue bonds to set limitations to acquiring hardware and personnel of the solid waste systems in place. The authority is committed to retaining all employed solid waste personnel in the two communities (Capitan and Ruidoso).

Kuhnel asked what a community with no personnel or equipment will gain from the appraisals and bonds. Alonso said in that case the community would get no money.

Rather, communities involved will turn over the

collection, transport and disposal of solid waste at some future date. Carrizozo, Capitan and the county now contract with a private company.

After approval to make request for proposals for manager and appraiser, the group unanimously approved appointment of Beauvais as legal representative at a rate of \$60 an hour.

"We'd be crazy to get another guy," Junge said.

The next meeting of the LCSWA, to further iron out the joint powers resolution, will be at 9 a.m. Feb. 8 at the Inn of Pine Springs in Ruidoso Downs.

facilities. Although the levy will be confined to the Ruidoso district, it has a built-in mechanism to allow other districts to come in with their own 1 mill levies at a later time. Enrollment of students will not be confined to those living in Ruidoso however.

The \$1 per \$1000 taxable value property (or 1 mil) will be added to the current rate of tax in the Ruidoso district. In addition to the capital improvements tax questions and the special off-campus instructional district in Ruidoso the school districts will ask voters to select members of their boards of education.

Candidates will be listed in the order they will appear on their respective ballots.

In Carrizozo District #7, all candidates vie for 4-year terms. The polling place will be at the superintendent's office or school administration building.

Position 1: Jan E. Barham, Paul W. Collins, J. Peter Aguilar Jr., Nat. Palomarez (incumbent).

Position 2: Wallace H. Ferguson (incumbent), Gary A. Hightower, Carol Schlarb.

That was a stupid mistake, because the ranch sold for \$527,000, as readers found when the correct sum was mentioned in the story itself. So readers have a choice. They can charge the error up to my obsession with rising inflation or to my encroaching Alzheimer's Disease.

● "Krug replied: 'I don't know where they got that from. It appears to be another assertion, unsubstantiated, because we've spent hundreds of millions of dollars surveying the environment to see if that was occurring and we don't see that occurring.'"

● What is the public to believe, a reporter for the New York Times or a half-billion study conducted over a 10-year period by 700 leading scientists? Why is the media married to environmental weirdos to promote their agenda while ignoring the findings of 700 scientists? The media claims to be unbiased. So, why wasn't the scientific findings on acid rain published? More than two dozen readers of the NEWS have blasted me for an insignificant error in a headline. 3,000 OBSCENE PHONE CALLS

Those ideological purists who oppose Caller ID were undoubtedly redfaced yesterday, when this new device helped police catch a suspect who may well be the notorious "Bridal Kidnapper." He is so-called because for 24 years he has been making obscene phone calls — often to new brides, whose wedding announcements he had seen in the newspapers. Aided by a device called "Caller Trace" at Goucher College, detectives of the Baltimore County Police demon-

strated dedicated patience, skill and ingenuity in mounting surveillance around a pay phone, which Call Trace traced. This incredible creature told some of his telephone call targets that he had kidnapped members of their families — and he provided them all sorts of information about the allegedly kidnapped person. But when the police arrested Victor Herbert Gardner Sr., of South Baltimore, he was booked — and then, incredibly, he was released on his own recognizance.

Is this suspect now back on the phones? What else boggles the mind is the possibility that 3,000 obscene phone calls may have been made by this one man. This is like porn-crowded 42nd Street in New York, which Norman Cousins once observed is much more likely to cause impotence than sex crimes. But the question of the hour is, if the alleged obscene phone-caller is found guilty, and serves his time, will he be hired to teach at Washington's American University?

This man has had enough of anti-war mattoids

My notes for this article were taken a few days before the decision of our president to go to war with Iraq.

At that time the news media, both in print and television, were going full force to show that President Bush could not gather a majority of votes in the congress to support a declaration of war against Iraq.

Perhaps we pay too much attention to the matter of our RIGHTS and not enough to our obligations to be good citizens.

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# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE**—Three Republican lawmakers are determined to place some limits on the New Mexico Legislature.

Los Alamos Sen. Steve Stoddard wants to cap the number of bills any lawmaker may introduce. Albuquerque Rep. Mark Caruso and Clovis Sen. Walter Bradley want to limit the years a state legislator may serve. Bradley also wants to limit congressional terms.

Every 60-day session sets a new record for bills introduced. If the 1991 session holds true to form, the number of bills will top the 2,000 mark for the first time. Stoddard would like to limit each lawmaker to six bills. If all 112 legislators introduced six measures, the total would be 672, about one-third the present number.

Such a quota would make some lawmakers, such as Albuquerque's George Buffett, valuable people. Buffett seldom introduces a single bill, so could expect to have a long line of lawmakers and lobbyists at his door late in the session with dozens of bills that "just must be introduced." The limit would not apply to the governor and to the legislature's interim committees.

Stoddard says because legislators are spending more and more time trying to get their own bills passed, they are unable to attend committee meetings. As a result, committees fail to achieve quorums necessary to consider legislation, and bills die without action. "It's a catch-22 situation that's got to end," Stoddard says.

Stoddard has been working with Albuquerque's Sen. Les Houston, the Senate GOP leader. Houston plans to include the initiative in the Republican legislative package that will be introduced this week.

Some lawmakers find it easier to sponsor potfuls of legislation than to say no to a constituent or lobbyist. But one rural lawmaker had a new twist to the argument. He notes his constituents are spread over several counties and have a much wider variety of needs than some urban lawmaker with a district only a few miles wide.

Rep. Caruso and Sen. Bradley want to limit to 12 years the amount of time a lawmaker can spend in

office. Their similar proposals would be introduced in both houses—something Stoddard is trying to stop. Duplicate bills are already a target of legislative leaders.

Contrary to some news reports, both sponsors exempt all service through the end of next year. The slate would be wiped clean in 1993. But despite the grandfather clause, Caruso and Bradley are having major problems. Caruso says he feels "like a biblical David standing up against Goliath politicians and lobbyists."

Obviously, those in power, who hope for long careers at the top, will do what they can to slow down such a proposal. And because they are powerful, they should be able to slow the bills to a halt.

There is disagreement among the bills' proponents as to whether lobbyists like the term limitations. Some observers say lobbyists will fight the proposal because they have developed close ties with key legislators they don't want to lose. Others say lobbyists would become more powerful with term limitations on lawmakers. Obviously, there cannot be limita-

tions placed on the number of years lobbyists come to the Capitol, so they would soon have the advantage of experience over any lawmaker.

In other words, the "new blood" Caruso is seeking may be "fresh blood" for seasoned lobbyists.

And what do members of the lobbying community have to say about their preference? Nothing. They're too smart to get caught meddling in lawmakers' internal battles.

Caruso and Bradley are not optimistic about passage of their proposals. It requires a constitutional amendment to limit legislative terms. Both lawmakers are confident voters would approve the proposition in a second. The barrier is with their fellow lawmakers.

The term limitation idea is catching on in other states but those in places where propositions can be put on the ballot by petition of registered voters. That has never been possible in New Mexico and will probably be the downfall of term limits.

renewed. She told the board of a form which she signed, which claimed parents would be notified if corporal punishment was to be administered. King was not contacted. She also told of going to Human Services, the police department and district attorney. She had reports from two different doctors, testimony from Holland and a deputy sheriff.

King even went so far as to take her grievance before the State Dept. of Education evaluation team which was at the school in late 1989. But she was given no guidelines other than to follow the "chain of command" because she claimed she had already filed the lawsuit.

Even though there were other claims of child abuse toward Holland, some parents and former students

defended Holland in public meeting. He continues as principal, football coach and girls basketball coach now.

Carrizozo Supt. Danny Burnett said Tuesday, Jan. 29, the lawsuit had been turned over to attorney Dan Friedman with the firm Simon, Gaddy and Friedman of Santa Fe. The firm specializes in school legal affairs.

"We are confident our attorneys will handle the case well and in the end the lawsuit will be proven frivolous with no content and all in question will be exonerated," Burnett concluded.

Members of Carrizozo Board of Education who the alleged abuse occurred were Wally Ferguson, Nat Palomarez, Hoot Gibson, Richard Hollis and Tommy Guevara.

No court date has been set at this time.

port local business filled the room.

The already village owned "hot mix" plant was accused of taking away business. "What we need is street maintenance," said White. He told the council to get a cost expert to analyze the hot mix plant. Costs will not be effective there and it will be the same for the screening plant, he said. "Let the people who have these businesses do the work."

Councilor Junge commented that the hot mix plant was purchased several councils ago, when the village had a large project to complete. "Back then, we didn't have any other choice."

Councilor Andrews added that the business interest's "information had not fallen on deaf ears."

Councilor Jess Stinson stated that he supports free enterprise and voiced concerns. Councilors J.D. James and Junge both assured the interests that due to the high expense, the council will be conservative.

Upon a previous suggestion of Councilor Barbara Duff, the city manager opened the presentation of the Award to the Employee of the Month. In recognition of the city employee's contribution to the success of city government, said Norwood.

Mayor Alonso presented the plaque and savings bond to Rudy Lugo. Cake and coffee were served at the break in his and his family's honor. Dedication, innovation, and courtesy were remarked as the recipient's qualifications.

Councilor Karn offered a proposal for a resolution supporting the troops' efforts in the Kuwait Crisis. Everyone agreed that such a resolution should be drawn for the next meeting.

Junge pointed out that only 250 to 300 had added themselves to Ruidoso's population since the census 10 years ago. Further, that in a New Mexico tourism study, Ruidoso ranked at the last. So many advertising dollars are concentrated on racing and skiing (when people are bound to come anyway, suggests Junge), that those dollars should be concentrated in the Fall and Spring, and alternative seasons.

The motorcycle festival, continued Junge, is a good example of the importance activities like these are to the village. Concerns of good feelings about the rally in particular were also expressed in the audience. "Underneath their attire, beat the hearts of real folks," Junge said.

He also addressed the construction costs of the civic events center that recently increased .5 million dollars. "Something is going to have to give," he commented. Junge has repeatedly advised contacting a construction company in Fort Worth, TX that may cut construction material costs by more than \$10 per square foot.

The council did not sit quietly by and accept the additional costs of construction, said Junge; approaching the state legislature to cover additional funding is not the only way to address these issues.

"We may even be able to get local help," said Junge, but the point was that the building is costing too much.

Andrews also spoke on the fact that in the tourism department, Ruidoso is not doing a good job. He presented a study from the University of New Mexico. The study shows that 50 percent of tourists drive, and only 30 percent fly. The Texas market may be our biggest, but it only makes up 18 percent continued Andrews. He suggested that the study people be invited to discuss the issues with the council. The council supports this action. Alonso interjected his

wishes that the Mescalero Apaches and villagers of Ruidoso rise above legal battles to cooperate in the tourism economy. "Historically old attitudes must change," said the mayor.

Junge again expressed his support for the ski area and race track to advertise in their associated season, and the village to concentrate on the others.

\$2,100 dollars in the Lodger's Tax Fund was recognized by the mayor as non-allocated, and so possibly could be used for bringing in experts for discussion on how to improve Ruidoso's ranking.

In response to a number of concerns about the proposed "rivertrail" walk, Andrews appealed for local cooperation. "It's not a San Antonio Riverwalk with shops and restaurants," he said.

Alonso added that it is a low impact, low profile approach. The council is united in approaching property owners on a personal one-on-one basis with regards to surveying and other projects involved in Mainstreet Ruidoso.

Dick Weber addressed the council to make a proposal to consider providing some matching money to Sun Country Airlines. Backed by extensive research into the airport transportation matter and major interest representatives of the village, Weber presented the council with a packet including a feasibility study from the department of transportation.

\$25,000 from the state, \$7,500 in matching funds from three communities are proposed. Weber indicated, "We are serious about the need for air service."

Twenty-two businesses have already made pledges for \$75 a piece to be collected. Additional contributions are urged to be made by contacting Weber, David Thomsen, or Charles Norwood. Helena McCoy was recognized for her contributions and research of critical data in this project.

To develop an airline schedule that meets the needs of the public, and to communicate that Ruidoso is "hospitality oriented," not equipment oriented."

Alonso commended the committee for its dedication to research and inclusion of a regional approach which will be formally presented Feb. 12.

Councilor Duff moved that \$1,000 donated by C.R. Hicks be transferred to the Airline Feasibility Study, which was seconded and passed.

Fonda Hazel recommended that the bid award for electrical services for the village be given to P.D.Q. Electric. Her opinion is based on recommendations and

lowest bid for services. Her recommendation was accepted and the award was granted.

Highway 48 street lighting specifications and options were presented by City Manager Norwood. The council opted for the lesser expensive method of placing light poles from the Sudderth intersection to Alto Hill.

A public hearing to make decisions concerning the development and use of the

Grindstone area will be Feb. 6 at 4:30 p.m.

Barbara Westbrook proposed an Arts Commission which was approved by the council. "It's time to put our money where our mouth is," said the local artist. Working in cooperation with the council and other city entities, the commission will make recommendations for public art and associated endeavors toward supporting art, business, and village interests.

## Budding fighters for Saudi Arabia?

Six Carrizozo residents were charged with assault resulting from an incident at Carrizozo's Allsup's late Friday night.

Steve Ortiz was arrested after he turned himself in to the sheriff's office Tuesday, Jan. 29, on charges of assault, and aggravated battery and great bodily harm, a third degree felony. His bond was set at \$5000, which he posted later that day.

The charges stemmed from a fight at the Allsup's at 11:08 p.m. Jan. 25 where Johnny Culley, 19, Carrizozo, was beaten severely enough to be transported by Carrizozo ambulance to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso.

Reportedly, Ortiz and his wife Debbie, had tried to enter the store earlier in the evening, but Culley was in the parking lot. Trying to avoid him, the Ortiz couple left without entering the store and returned later. Culley was still in the store's parking lot and confronted Ortiz. The confrontation grew to include several bystanders in the parking lot.

Reportedly the incident grew out of an on-going domestic situation between Ortiz and Culley.

Also charged in the incident was Debbie Ortiz, on a count of assault and a count of battery, both misdemeanors. Her bond was set at \$400, which was posted later.

Other persons involved and who were served summons on petty misdemeanor charges by Carrizozo Police Chief Choncho Morales on Jan. 29 were Carl Lueras on a charge of assault; Jessie Gallagos on charges of assault and battery; Michael Vega on charges of assault and battery and Donna Lueras on a charge of assault.

Ortiz made his first appearance before Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. on Jan. 29. The others have been ordered to appear before Dean at 10 a.m. Feb. 8.

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

Parsons, District Judge will hold a hearing to determine whether a guardian should be appointed for Claude Newton. The purpose of this proceeding is to protect Claude Newton. A copy of the Petition requesting appointment of guardian is attached to this notice.

At the hearing the Court will determine whether Claude Newton is an incapacitated person under New Mexico law.

If the court finds that Claude Newton is incapacitated, the Court at the hearing shall also consider whether Desert State Senior Resources Center should be appointed as guardian of Claude Newton. The Court may, in its discretion, appoint some other qualified person of entity as guardian. The Court may also, in its discretion, limit the powers and

duties of the guardian to allow Claude Newton to retain control over certain activities.

Claude Newton may attend the hearing and be represented by an attorney.
