Commissioners receive

Emotional funding requests

Requests for funding got emotional at the Lincoln County Commission meeting Tuesday.

Representatives from the Otero/Lincoln County Mental Health Counseling Center desperately asked commissioners Monroy Montes, Stirling Spencer and Bill Elliott not to cut their \$20,000 funding request to \$5,000 as proposed.

Ruidoso mayor Victor Alonso asked for county funds—for the library, parks and recreation and airport, because the village supplies \$1.1 million in property taxes. But county

manager Andy Wynham defended the county's use of those property taxes to support county services—an old issue between municipalities and counties.

With increased demands for mental health, alcohol and drug abuse counseling, and increases in court-referred cases, center representatives asked for county funds to cover the portion of their budget which is not provided by the state. Center board members predicted services to the county would be drastically cut if the county cut any of the center's budget.

Representatives from offices which refer people to the

counseling center also told of the need to increase its support. Assistant District Attorney Viola Rhodes said, "If (the center) breaks one chain in family or physical abuse it is invaluable to the community."

Lincoln County Sheriff James McSwane said the county will have to pay more in professional counseling services to prisoners, as well as experience an increase in persons jailed, if the center has to cut back services. "The majority of people in jail have alcohol and drug problems."

School counselors from Carrizozo and Ruidoso both attested to the "live-saving"

help from mental health therapist Sandra Clark.


"Sandra saved at least one life from attempted suicide," said Earlene Price, Carrizozo school counselor, whose voice left her in the emotional account. "She's always ready to come to help."

Clark carries a 150-person case load. Alcohol and drug abuse counselor Paul Gallegos visits prisoners in the jail as well as overseeing group and individualized counseling.

The Center, a not-for-profit, private corporation gets 80 percent of its funding from the

Court rules candidates on ballot

Two candidates for Lincoln County Commission, who first were told they were ineligible to run, will be on the June primary ballot.

Wilton Howell, Republican candidate for county commission District 4 and Lonnie Ray Nunley, Democratic candidate for District 2, who were disqualified by county clerk Martha Proctor because of state election code requirements, will be on the ballot after rulings by District Court Judge Richard Parsons. Howell received his order on Thursday, April 23 after a

hearing in district court. Nunley's order was signed by Parsons Monday.

Both men had filed for the offices on April 7, but were disqualified by Proctor on April 10. According to the election code, the men had to list their current physical residences on their voters' registrations before the January 27 governor's election proclamation. Neither had done so, although they had lived in their current locations for more than a year.

Howell immediately used the only recourse—he took it to district court in a writ of mandamus filed on Proctor and the

Lincoln County Commissioners.

Last year's move from a three-person county commission to a five-member board required a change of precinct boundaries. But candidates argued they were not informed of the need to update their registrations before Jan. 27.

Lincoln County candidates were not the only ones who challenged the registration rules. New Mexico Supreme Court ruled that Valencia County district attorney candidate Mike Runnels be listed on the ballot in that county, even though he had not updated his voter

registration. Runnels challenged his qualification from the office by the Secretary of State because of the voter registration. He, like the Lincoln County men, had lived in the county for more than a year, but his registration did not indicate such.

With the Supreme Court ruling as a precedent for the registrations, Judge Parsons ordered Proctor to certify Wilton H. Howell's name to the primary election ballot of June 2.

Judge Parsons ruled Howell is a resident of Commission District 3 and was physically present

in the district for 19 months prior to Jan. 27. He acknowledged the county clerk prepared and submitted to the secretary of state all documents necessary to comply with the Boundary Adjustment Act and the New Mexico Election Code in regards to alignment and approval of precincts and polling places—all which were proper. But he also found the secretary of state failed prior to Jan. 27, to formally approve the resolution of the county regarding the creation of precincts and polling places.

The order also stated the State Constitution requirements to be a candidate for public office have been complied with by Howell. But the statutory requirements on where a candidate resides can be rebutted by showing that the candidate physically resided in the district on Proclamation Day (Jan. 27).

"The Petitioner has met this burden by the filing of his declaration of candidacy and stating under oath his residence within the district."

Parsons ordered Howell's name be certified to the June 2 primary election ballot.

In a similar order signed by Parsons Monday, April 27, Nunley also became a candidate on the June 2 primary election ballot. Terms of the order were nearly identical to Howell's. Nunley's attorney Gary Mitchell presented the order to Judge Parsons.

Nunley, contacted after the ruling, said he was thrilled to be on the ballot. At first he chose not to challenge the disqualification in court, but when the Mike Runnels decision came down he called Gary Mitchell, who also handled Howell's case.

"I thought why not go ahead and ride the horse," Nunley said.

Howell's name will be listed with fellow Republican candidates Bill Elliott and A. Tommy Hall for the Commission District 3 on the June 2 primary ballot.

Nunley will run against fellow Democrat Bob Harcrow for the District 2 position in the primary election. Karon Z. Petty filed as the Republican candidate for that district.

LCMC mill levy election set

Lincoln County Medial Center in Ruidoso will get its special mill levy election.

The hospital operates in part with taxes collected on county properties. Every eight years registered voters must approve continuation of the tax, or mill levy.

This year, commissioners voted to place the mill levy question on the November general election ballot, in order to save money. LCMC administrator and board of directors had asked for a special election, fearing the mill levy question would be lost on the "busy" November ballot. But the \$4,000 minimum price tag for a special election made commissioners hesitant.

Tuesday at the regular county commission meeting, LCMC board president Dub Williams and Jule Duffalo, director of nursing, asked commissioners to reconsider a special election.

"We got private funding for a special election," Williams said.

The hospital board had learned of a special fund for LCMC that contained about \$50,000 for unrestricted hospital uses. At the last LCMC board meeting, members were concerned their mill levy question would be on the negative side of the ballot, and could lose. The board decided then to make one last attempt to convince the commissioners of the need for a special election.

Commissioners unanimously rescinded their action to place the mill levy question on the general election ballot. The

4.25 mill levy question will have its own special election.

Previously LCMC asked for a special election Sept. 15,

which would conform to election regulations. An exact date and the type of vote—whether a mail-in ballot or voting

machines—will be set in a resolution, which commissioners will approve at their next regular meeting.

Police Chief to receive orders

Carrizozo Recreation Center has a new manager.

Beginning May 7, Carrizozo resident Bobby Vallejos will take over the operation of the town-owned center. Vallejos finalized the terms of the one-year lease agreement with town trustees at their meeting Tuesday.

In the terms of the agreement, Vallejos will pay a lease

of \$1 for the period of May 1, 1992 to April 30, 1993. The town will pay all electricity used by the center, and trustees agreed to pay at least 50 percent of the natural gas needed to heat the facility in the winter. Some users of the center have complained the building is too cold for comfortable bowling. Trustees also agreed to get the numerous solar panels working before winter, to alleviate some heating bills.

Groups who use the facility for meetings or whatever will be required to make a \$100 deposit. If the group leaves the room in clean condition, \$50 of that will be returned. The other \$50 will go to defray Vallejos' time spent supervising the center during the group's use.

Mayor Cecilia Kuhnelt wanted terms in the contract that would bind Vallejos to cer-

MRS study gets OK

Mescalero Apache Tribal Council will continue its study of a Monitored Retrievable Storage (MRS).

The U.S. Dept. of Energy last week awarded the tribal council \$200,000 as part of Phase 2 of the MRS feasibility study. The tribal council had applied for an additional \$2.8 million for a more detailed study which will pinpoint sites and an environmental impact study for a nuclear waste storage facility and an environmental impact study.

DOE representatives said, in a published account, the money must be spent within the next three months. The tribal council must reapply to the DOE and an independent feder-

al agency to receive the additional \$2.8 million.

Congress must approve any site before the MRS can be constructed. If approval is given, actual construction would be included in Phase 3.

The tribal council was the first in the nation to accept an invitation from the DOE to host the MRS, a temporary storage for spent, but still radioactive, nuclear power plant fuel rods. The council's disclosure of its intent to study the MRS to its neighboring governments last year has sparked formal opposition from those governments, local citizens' groups, Gov. Bruce King, the New Mexico State Legislature, and Congressional delegates.

state, and charges clients on a sliding scale based on ability to pay. Clients are from Carrizozo, Capitan, Corona, Hondo and Ruidoso area and most are indigent. The center has access to a psychiatrist for medical prescriptions for clients also.

In response to Spencer's question, the center has not asked any other local government for money, but plans to do so. More than 50 percent of the clients are from the Ruidoso area alone.

"We beg you for your people to help us," Clark asked.

Dr. Bob Walters, who serves on the center board, said the county could also be confronted with a wrongful death suit in the future if the jail has no adequate counseling services.

Ruidoso mayor Alonso asked for a funds for different types of needs—fun things. He used charts to show the percentage of county residents who use the Ruidoso facilities, then asked commissioners to consider helping pay the \$183,000 which he figured was the cost to provide services to county

residents.

"We have an \$800,000 deficit in our general fund," Alonso said.

Without any formal request from the village, commissioners okayed \$3,000 for the Ruidoso Public Library.

But commissioner Elliott wanted to know where and when to separate tax money.

Wynham defended the use of tax revenues for county services because many are provided to the municipalities—such as those from the clerk's, treasurer's and assessor's offices. "The bulk of land parcels are in municipalities," he said.

As for taxes, he reminded that all county residents and many who live in municipalities, spend their money in Ruidoso and pay gross receipt taxes, which are not county revenues.

"We all take care of each other better than we realize," Wynham said about the relationship between the municipalities and the county. Wynham has served as both a city councilor and a county elected official and recognizes both sides of the issue.

Alonso said he was not offended by Wynham's rebuttal, but he invited the policy makers to sit down and talk about cooperative effort between the municipalities and the county for use of tax money.

Carrizozo town clerk Carol Schlarb and trustee Doug Whitaker explained why the town needs \$5,000 to repair the Jane Turner Memorial Public Pool

and to make it handicap accessible. The pool is the only such facility on the entire west side of the county. This year, the town hopes to promote the pool more and to have it open soon after school recesses for summer.

While Schlarb said the request may go down next year if the needed repairs are done, she would not commit to that. Commissioner Elliott said he would be more favorable of the \$5,000 request, up \$1,500 from last year, if she could assure it would go down.

Extension Service Agent Barry Herd and extension home economist Betty McCreight asked for funding to continue the service's programs in the county. The state service had proposed to cut the home economist position in Lincoln County, but has changed its plans. Rather it will retain the home economist and extension agent and hire a part-time 4-H assistant.

The two also explained why

their office is in charge of the county's booth at the State Fair.

Spencer requested the home economist work with the senior citizen's centers to provide programs.

Commissioners will conduct one more worksession for the budget before it is approved on May 19.

In other business, commissioners:

—Approved the grant award agreement between the New Mexico Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Dept. and the Glencoe-Palo Verde and Hondo Fire Departments, for fire equipment. Both departments had funds to provide the necessary match.

—Accepted two resolutions, which will be delivered by Montes to the Western Interstate Conference (Montes is state representative): one asking congress to appropriate current or increased levels of Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) to counties which contain federal lands and

the other asking Congress to recognize private property rights and private use rights on public lands when considering the reauthorization of the Endangered Species Act.

—Okayed the state and federal funding request for the Zia Senior Citizens Centers for the next fiscal year.

—Approved applications for the Bonito, Ft. Stanton, Hondo, Lincoln, Nogal and Glencoe-Palo Verde Fire Departments to participate in the 1992 Fire Protection Fund Distribution.

—Heard a report from Wynham about the second phase funding of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council's study of a temporary nuclear waste facility—the MRS. He said the commission would do little beyond the resolutions and letters it already had approved. Wynham was personally irritated officials such as Joe Skeen and the governor are saying the MRS will not be built here, when the government is giving

the tribal council more money. "If not here why throw away \$200,000.00."

Commissioners told Wynham to watch the MRS situation closely.

Dave Dale, director of Sacramento in Ruidoso, asked commissioners to take a stronger stand against the MRS proposal. "Don't just sit and watch, take specific government action."

—Approved a US Forest Service Cooperator grant with the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office. The grant will provide funds to install a repeater on the Gallinas Mountains near Corona, thus giving radio communication to that area and north of the Capitan Mountains. The grant also will pay for a portable trailer and a horse trailer.

—Okayed purchase of data processing for the Civil Emergency Preparedness program.

tain days and hours of operation. But trustees agreed with Vallejos it will be hard to do such this first year. Most usage of the center is in the winter, since summer is filled with outdoor activities.

The town will carry fire and building liability insurance. Vallejos will supply a \$250,000 property damage, \$500,000 personal injury and \$1 million per personal injury incident insurance.

The lease must be renewed annual for up to five years.

Trustee Harold Garcia had requested a closed session to discuss the terms of the Rec Center contract and the final

form agreement with the Environmental Protection Agency. Town attorney Robert Beauvais disqualified the two items for closed session under the terms of the New Mexico Open Meetings Act. The contracts were discussed in open session.

In personnel action, trustees returned from an hour-long closed session and directed the mayor to write police chief Choncho Morales and order him to report back to active duty. Morales had taken leave of absence last week, on a workman's compensation claim.

Kuhnel said there was no medical documentation to support Morales' reason to remain off the job. The other town policeman John Northrop Jr. resigned April 21, leaving the community without a town policeman. Lincoln County Sheriff's Office was asked to help provide law enforcement for the town until Morales' return and agreed to do so.

Trustees also reviewed the second police officer applications in closed session. When they returned, they authorized the mayor to interview an applicant Wednesday. She will make a recommendation on hiring at the next board meeting. Salary will be determined after the May budget workshops.

Part of four Carrizozo area roads belong to the county—but the town is maintaining them. County road manager Bill Cupit reviewed the town road map with foreman Faustino Gallegos and trustees and came up with a list of four roads which are partially owned by

the county. Cupit offered to upgrade the entire length of the roads, provided the town maintains them. After discussion, trustees voted to adopt a written agreement with Lincoln County for the Water Canyon Road, E. Ave. (southeast of the tracks), Country Club Road and 19th Ave. Currently the county maintains 17th Ave. which is entirely within town limits.

Ownership of one road remained in limbo, however. The road, often described as the Airport Road, which runs from the intersection with the road to the airport terminal to Schlarb Road (which the county definitely owns), appears to have no owner. It was paved years ago with funds provided by Mrs. Jackie Spencer, whose home was off the road. But Cupit said the road is not on the county road list, and Gallegos said it was not the town's. As a result, the road is not being maintained, and cannot legally be maintained by either county or town, since it can only be classified as private.

To become a county road, since it is not in town limits, 10 property owners within a 10-mile area of the road must petition the county to have it opened. The road will then go through the road review process before consideration by the county commissioners.

In other business, trustees:

—Considered an \$8,000 request from Sheriff James McSwane to help defray dispatch equipment expenses and pay for additional manpower.

Carrizozo emergency personnel are dispatched through the sheriff's office. McSwane also wanted an agreement to allow Carrizozo officers to assist sheriff's deputies.

—Set 6 p.m. May 13 and 19 for budget worksessions. The public is invited to attend.

—Approved the final form agreement with the EPA to pump contaminated water from the Cimarron Mill Superfund Site into the town sewer system. Foreman Gallegos will be trained to test the water at the mill source. Beauvais expects the state environment department to evoke a rejection clause in an agreement between the town and Sidden's Ranch in order to prevent any possible liability if any contaminated water reaches the sewer pond. The agreement allowed sewer pond overflow to be used on the ranch.

—Approved the 1992-93 fire department budget and tabled the acceptance of the new fire department bylaws.

—Heard clerk Carol Schlarb say the town has gotten a verbal okay on funding for a new airport beacon. The airport fuel station will get a cover to prolong the life of pumps and hoses, reported airport manager Hal Marx.





Court rules

Proctor told county commissioners at their regular meeting Tuesday that the courts were lenient in their interpretation of the voter registration laws, because of the changes in districts and precincts. New Mexico precincts had not been rearranged since 1862 when they were first organized.

Proctor also said the commissioners were named on the court petitions because they were the ones to formally take action which rearranged precincts.

On the June primary ballot, voters will also choose their party's candidates for state representative, state senator and district attorney. Incumbent state representative for Lincoln County (District 56) John Underwood (Democrat) is unopposed either by a Democrat or Republican.

For the state senate office for District 8 which includes Lincoln County are Democratic candidates—incumbent Pete Campos of Santa Rosa and Margarito Valdez of Las Vegas. Dana Mossman-Lucero of Las Vegas is the only Republican candidate for the senatorial position.

Incumbent district attorney Bert Atkins will square off with fellow Democrat Gail Wade Brownfield of Cloudcroft in the June 2 primary election.

Because of the court rulings, the printing of absentee ballots is running late in Lincoln County and all but two other counties statewide. To cast a ballot in the primary election, persons need to register to vote by 5 p.m. May 5.

Carrizozo school wants music program

Carrizozo Board of Education wants the music program back in its school.

At the conclusion of the April meeting where the board rehired staff and accepted resignations, members approved the proposed 1992-93 school budget. Based on a projected enrollment of 237, the budget includes expenditures for a half-time music program teacher. Money was moved from the emergency fund to finance that position. All other staffing remained the same.

Board members also discussed what could be done with the budget if the projected enrollment is not met on the 40th day of school next fall. All state funds for schools are based on the 40th day count, which school superintendents must project in the spring. If the projected enrollment is not met, the school will receive less money and cuts must be made. The 237 count is near to what enrollment is this spring at Carrizozo schools.

Carrizozo Supt. Jimmie Banks and administrative assistant Nenna Vega took the proposed budget to Santa Fe April 23. It was reviewed by Don Rodriguez in the State Dept. of Education and no problems were found. Banks will return to Santa Fe for a formal budget hearing at 9 a.m. May 5.

The school is now advertising for the half-time music teacher.

Al's Musings

Some new experiences we'd just as soon do without. One is riding almost 200 miles in an ambulance from Ruidoso to Presbyterian Hospital in Albuquerque. But even so-called bad experiences have a plus factor, usually.

The plus factor in this case was gaining a new appreciation of the dedication and professionalism of emergency medical technicians (EMTs) and of the hospital and medical setup in Lincoln County upon which we all lean at times.

Believe you me, in November we'll certainly vote for the mill levy continuation which guarantees continued existence of the fine hospital Lincoln County enjoys, the clinic at Carrizozo and the ambulance service for which we have a new appreciation.

Yep, we spent a week in Presbyterian Hospital after suffering a heart attack, but we're doing fine on the road to recovery, thanks.

We can recall a number of experiences in life which may have been educational and character-building to a degree, but which we could have done without. We have very little recollection of early childhood except for a few experiences which couldn't fail to make an impression.

We recall at the age of five standing near a hydrant in the front yard at home in Roswell. Suddenly a bee for some reason was attracted to a thumb and sank his stinger deep into tender flesh. We can't figure out if there was anything character-building in that experience. It did give us a lifelong appreciation of what some flying insects are capable of, especially yellow jackets with which we have had some other unfortunate experiences.

As a youngster one day we were playing in the yard of Bill Shrecengost in Roswell. Bill, later of old Lincoln town, was a long-time childhood friend. What we were doing was swinging as high as possible in a backyard swing and then launching ourselves into space. On one extra high flight, we crashed to the ground and succeeded in knocking our left elbow out of place. That's worse than a break.

Sometime later we were at a softball game where dad was playing in some league, sitting in the stands with arm in a sling. Suddenly without warning, a batter connected with the ball; it sailed into the stands and, wham, whacked the ailing arm a blow we'll never forget. That was our first experience with Murphy's Law. Believe you me, Murphy's Law is operative at all times.

Another experience we could have done without concerned mail and World War II. Newly married, we soon were overseas. All mail was censored of course, in our case by the immediate superior officer in our cryptographic unit. We thought this was very unfair since letters to a new bride tended to be a little (quite) mushy, you might say, and it was embarrassing to have someone we worked with reading them.

So we asked the adjutant if someone else could censor our mail. He said he would do it personally. Gee, that was swell. But the mail clerk misunder-

stood and dumped all of headquarters mail on the adjutant's desk, presumably to be censored by that formerly accommodating officer.

Well, we were called on the carpet, and we've never heard such language.

The old system of censorship was immediately reinstated.

There was nothing character-building in that experience except we learned that the status quo is sometimes better than the status unknown.

The good experiences of life have far outweighed the unfortunate ones. For that we thank God, who continues to hold us in His hand.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—When he ran for office, state Land Commissioner Jim Baca promised he would create an incentive plan to reward ranchers for improving their land. No one realized that this program would be plowing new ground—or grazing new range so to speak.

It seemed like a good idea at the time. Jim Baca wasn't exactly the darling of the ranching industry. During his previous tenure as land commissioner, he had begun the movement that eventually raised state grazing fees to 80 percent higher than fees paid on federal land. And he is firmly positioned in the environmentalist camp, a group that is often at war with ranchers.

But ranchers knew Baca understood his job and they knew he had a good chance of winning. When someone said he felt it was unfair that all ranchers paid the same fees when some kept their land in better condition, Baca said he'd fix that.

It was logical that a range improvement incentive would be good for ranchers and good for the land, a win-win situation since improved land means improved carrying capacity which means higher grazing fees.

Creating a new program hasn't been easy, however. There are many questions left to be answered. In order to get the dialogue going Baca has assigned his assistant Lee Otteni to conduct a series of hearings around the state to present his program and solicit comments. Those comments have resulted in some reworking of the program and several items still at issue.

Unanswered questions include whether the incentive will mean a lower fee or if it can mean an increase in the number of animals that can be grazed on the land.

If it means a lower fee, two different amounts have been mentioned in Land Office materials—25 percent and 33 percent. Another publication says the figures can't be determined until an economic feasibility study is conducted.

If more animals are allowed by the state, what happens to the federal limits on animal units? Currently there is no federal incentive program and, therefore, no flexibility. Could a rancher get in trouble with the feds for grazing too many animals and lose his lease for non-compliance?

Otteni says he'll have to talk with the federal Bureau of Land Management on that and see if something can be worked out.

And who determines the quality of a guy's rangeland? Baca says he has only one full-time range conservationist so the State Land Office will be offering a training school to orient range specialists in the performance of range condition and trend assessments.

But at the first hearing, held in Las Cruces, where the training school is scheduled to be held, ranchers were given the impression the Land Office has four range specialists who will be doing the assessing.

And how are conflicts over all these issues going to be resolved? Will a rancher have to go to court to protest the evaluation of his rangeland? Or will there be an appeal board? Or an arbitration process?

Although no one has done this before, others are beginning to think along the same line. For a couple of years, Congress has tried to raise grazing fees on federal land. Some proposals would more than quadruple the fees.

At the U.S. Department of Interior, Secretary Manuel Lujan is seeking some middle ground. His solution? Provide rebates to ranchers who make improvements on their range leased from the Bureau of Land Management.

And that's not a totally new concept for the feds. At the U.S.

Department of Agriculture, the Forest Service has come up with something called a Stewardship Incentive Program, surprisingly similar in name to Baca's Range Stewardship Incentive Program.

The Forest Service's purpose is to encourage private landowners to improve their forest land through a cost-share assistance for installation of approved practices.

Sounds like they're all on the right track. Unfortunately no one has a track record yet for others to follow—and New Mexico is leading the way. Otteni says he knows it's a crapshoot.

But I'd rather see the crap-shooting done in New Mexico where both the government and ranchers are willing to talk to each other—and listen.

The Other Side

When I started on my column last week, because of the interest that had been generated in the media by the execution of Robert Alton Harris in California and the continuing controversy over the abortion issue, I dashed off a diatribe about the inconsistencies between the views of the participants in these controversies, but, after the cooler head returned, I decided that both issues deserved more discussion than I could give them in a single column.

The thrust of my approach was that the advocates of abortion seem to be the same people who are opposed to capital punishment, and conversely, the critics of abortion seem to favor the ultimate penalty. I find myself opposed to both abortion and capital punishment, which puts me in a third group of one or more individuals. (I only know of one such individual at the present time, me.) But, when I got started, it became apparent that there was more to talk about than I could do justice to in a single gasp, so I will have more to say about these issues in the future after I educate myself some more on them.

I have always considered myself a free thinker, or at least that has been the result so far. My thoughts have yet to earn me a dime.

If the end justifies the means, what justifies the end? This sounds like a subject that has enough substance in it that I should write something about it and I will do so as soon as I figure out what it means. ("That's a pun, son!")

I finished reading the latest book by Jim Garrison on the John Kennedy assassination last week, and I guess I could also accept the Warren Commission version if I could overlook the destruction, alteration and planting of evidence that apparently occurred, the last minute change in the motorcade route, the insistence that Oswald was responsible for the murder of Officer Tippit which occurred over a mile away within a few minutes of the Kennedy assassination, and that a nitrate test on Oswald to determine if he had fired a gun within the past 24 hours was negative. Other than that, it seems a logical assumption that he did what they said he did. However, if Oswald had been tried for murdering Kennedy, any podunkus defense lawyer from Backwoods, U.S.A. could have won the case with such a smorgasbord of reasonable doubts to select from. Any prosecutor who could have sold that mule to a jury would have missed his calling as an encyclopedia broker.

For those of you who don't recall who Jim Garrison is, he was the District Attorney from New Orleans who prosecuted Clay Shaw for conspiracy in the Kennedy assassination. He lost the case, primarily because of the nature of the charges and the fact that Shaw was a pillar of the community, but he did uncover some interesting questions about what happened with respect to the assassination. The primary thrust of his conclusions were that the C.I.A. was involved.

There have been other critics of the C.I.A. over the past 50 years or so who have questioned the actions of that agency, and in light of Watergate, the Iran-Contra scandal, the invasion of Panama, and the Gulf War, there may be some moat on those bones. Whether or not it was instrumental in the Kennedy assassination remains to be seen, but keep in mind that an organization's first interest is survival, and any threat to its existence will be opposed, and because of its nature, the methods of this agency are without parallel. The prosecution of Ollie North involved just

Carrizozo Grizzly boys track team won the Tularosa Relays Track meet Friday.

Several wins and state qualifying times and distances gave the boys the edge to shut out Hagerman by two points for the first placing. There were teams from at least 12 other schools. James Silva ran away with several events to earn the meet's individual high point plaque. He won the 110M hurdles with a dash of 15.8 seconds, the 300M hurdles with a sprint of 41.9 seconds and long jump with a leap of 19 feet, 8 1/2 inches. Archuleta was fifth with a long jump of 18 feet, 4 inches. Sims was sixth in the 800M run with a time of 2:16.1 minutes and Najar was sixth in shot with a heave of 39 feet, 9 inches.




