Town Is In Good Hands

The Town of Carrizozo is in good hands these days.

Without a police officer for several weeks, the town got lucky when Charlie White came along. Although White had come to town to open a business, he saw the town's need for a police officer and applied for the job.

At first, Mayor Cecilia Kuhnel hired White as an emergency officer and he served in a part time capacity. Then on June 9, the Carrizozo Board of Trustees unanimously approved Kuhnel's hiring White as a full-time officer.

White comes to the town with about 18 years law enforcement experience under his belt. He started his varied career in the law enforcement division of the New Mexico

Motor Transportation Dept. He then joined the Army where he served as a military policeman for three years, stationed all over the world.

After his stint as a military policeman, White returned to New Mexico, and was hired as a firefighter with the Artesia Fire Department. After two years fighting fires, White returned to law enforcement with the Roswell Police Department.

During his nine years with the Roswell PD he served as SWAT team entry leader, field training officer and senior patrol officer. White was named Officer of the Year in 1984 and received the Department Life-saving Award for saving a seven month old infant from suffocation.

Fly-In Set For July 25

Carrizozo Airport will be the destination for a number of pilots this July 25.

The date has been set for the

Carrizozo Air Force Fly-in, an event originated by airport manager Hal Marx.

"We're trying to raise enough in the scholarship fund for a \$1,000 scholarship to a deserving graduate from each of the county's school districts in 1993," Marx said.

Pilots will land at Carrizozo Airport between 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. during which time they will be served coffee and doughnuts. About 2 p.m. a bus will take the fly-in visitors to White Oaks Saloon for a show presented by Glen Ellison, then a short tour of the White Oaks area.

It's back to Carrizozo Airport for barbecue ribs from 3:30-4 p.m.

Marx is a member of the New Mexico Pilots Association and the American Association of Airport Executives.

Federal warning signs were recently installed at Carrizozo Airport. The signs warn persons it is a federal offense to drive on the runways. The signs indicate the penalty for theft or damage to the airport or its associated facility is \$20,000 fine and/or 10 years prison.

Any crimes against an airport facility are reported to the FBI.

4-Day School Week Not For Everyone

A four-day school week is not for every school district and the more than 70 Carrizozo parents, students and community members who attended an informational meeting about the alternative schedule appeared to agree.

Tuesday night, Carrizozo Board of Education queried the public concerning a proposal to put the Carrizozo Schools on a four-day week. But the audience appeared unconvinced that a four-day week will work in Carrizozo, even after a panel consisting of two superintendents and three board members from three school districts with the four-day week presented information supporting the alternative schedule.

Most questions from the public centered around the extended day, which would mean students would leave and arrive at home earlier and later than they do now. Some students who live in remote areas and ride the bus could have 11 hour days. A student athlete worried she would not have enough time after practice on an extended day to do her homework.

Bus drivers worried about their 20 percent cut in pay and the early and late hours for transporting students.

Working families worried about the need for day care or having their children at home unsupervised on the day off while others wondered about the teacher turnovers.

When a parent asked why the district was considering the alternative schedule, Carrizozo superintendent Jimmie Banks said the idea started with the former superintendent and he followed through by issuing a survey. The returned surveys indicated the majority of parents and students favored the four-day week. But at least one student said the survey was given to students with information only about how it will save the school money, not any of the negatives, then students were required to fill it out quickly.

With the four-day week, the school year will not be longer in the number of days, however, each day will be extensive by

about 45 minutes. The extended hours would allow the district to meet the state's minimum hours of instruction.

Dora Superintendent Jack Tarver told of the benefits to his school district in the terms of energy savings and the popularity of the day off. Dora has been with the four-day week since 1980-81 school year and has no desire to go back to the five-day week.

The Dora district lies within a very agricultural area, where most students live on farms and ranches. The Corona and Hondo Districts, also represented on the panel, also are in agricultural areas. The day off allows students to spend more time with a parent on the farm or ranch. He said the Dora patrons' biggest opposition to the four-day schedule was what students will do on their day off.

Corona Voters Say OK

Voters in the Corona Municipal School District No. 13 overwhelmingly approved the continuation of the Capital Improvements Tax for the next three years.

Of those who voted on June 30, 66 were for continuing the tax and 10 against.

The two-mill tax, or \$2 for every \$1,000 worth of taxable property, can be used by the district for erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings, activity vehicle purchases and public school grounds. The tax cannot be used for salaries. All tax money stays within the district.

Voters in the district have approved the tax for more than 10 years.

Last year the tax question was brought before voters, who approved it then. However, the election was declared invalid because the tax was not for renewal until this year.

Property owners in the Corona District will experience no property tax increase with the renewal.

Daily services in the tabernacle will be at 9 and 11 a.m., 3 and 8 p.m. Meals are served at 6-8 a.m., 12:30 and 6:30 p.m. Group prayer meetings are at 5 p.m., with other youth meetings and activities. The registration booth will list schedules, directions, and give information.

"Believe me it works out."

Carrizozo, on the other hand, has only 15 ag-oriented students from agricultural families. The 230 other students live primarily in a town or suburban setting and would not necessarily have a parent or job at home on their day off.

"It's not a rural community," Wally Ferguson said. Ferguson was a former Carrizozo Board of Education member.

Another parent said many students need to come to school on that fifth day in order to get a hot meal, often the only one they get all day.

Tarver agreed the four-day week is not for everyone. "It's like a size nine shoe, it doesn't fit all schools." But his district decided to go with what it saw was best for its children. He admitted there are some negatives, mostly administrative.

Among the positives Tarver and the Hondo Board of Education members Frank Sisneros and Victoria Sanchez told of static or improved student test scores after their districts started the four-day schedule. Sisneros said he measured the academic success of the schedule when the number of student on the honor roll increased within the first year.

Also more students had qualified for sports with improved test scores. Sports practice and games were not hindered because of readjustments to schedules. As for increased cost to parent to transport students to school to participate in practice and other activities on the day off, Tarver said most students drive to school for such activities with the five-day week.

All persons on the panel reported improved morale among teachers and students alike.

Corona Schools went on the four-day week as a pilot program this spring semester. Board member Melvin Johnson said the school "fought for four years to get the four-day week." At first, half the Corona patrons were for the proposal and half against. The school conducted about 11 surveys in the four years before it achieved the required percentage in favor of the schedule.

Hondo patrons expressed even stronger opposition to the idea when it was first presented, but now worry their schedule may not make it through the required three-year pilot period.

In order to qualify for the four-day week, the New Mexico Dept. of Education requires schools to meet 11 criterias. Of

those is the requirement that at least 70 percent of the public approve the four-day week schedule. Others include fiscal and academic soundness of the district.

Once a district goes with the four-day week, it is evaluated by the State Dept. and must show marked energy savings, same or improved academic scores and enrollment must not exceed 500 in the first three years.

While the panel maintained that teachers tended to do a better job with the four-day week because they have more time to prepare lessons, many in the audience said that teachers who are dedicated will do a good job regardless of the number of days.

All the panel members did not want their districts to go back to a five-day week. Only three New Mexico districts which tried the four-day week are back to five days, and not because they chose to do so. The districts had failed to meet the state's criteria and were required to return to the five-day week.

Sisneros also pointed out the four-day week could be a potential bargaining chip when districts will be required to deal with unionization of school employees and collective bargaining beginning April 1993. He said the district could point

out how teachers get an extra day off for the same amount of pay they would receive for five days in the class room.

A parent asked why the big schools like Albuquerque do not have four-day weeks and was told the state law allows the schedule for schools with enrollment of less than 500. Regardless, even the large schools are interested in the alternative scheduling.

Tarver concluded by saying it takes more than just the board of education to get into the four-day week. It takes painstaking decision making with students, staff and community, he said. However, if board members go with a change the public does not like, the public is entitled to petition to get them out.

After the fact-finding meeting, Carrizozo Board of Education members returned to a special meeting which they had begun an hour before.

The board invites any person living within the district and who is interested in a position on the board of education to submit his or her name to the superintendent. A vacancy was created on the board when former president J.C. Richmond resigned due to poor health.

The regular July meeting of the Carrizozo Board of Education will be at 7 p.m. Tuesday, July 21.

An open letter to members of the Otero County Electric Cooperative

Recently the general manager of the Otero County Electric Cooperative issued a letter to its members that contained misinformation regarding Texas-New Mexico Power Company. The letter contained the following statement:

"Our neighboring investor-owned utility, Texas-New Mexico Power Company, is currently financially stressed and is itself proposing to raise rates. TNP Enterprises, which owns Texas-New Mexico Power Company, showed a \$1 million loss the first quarter of 1992."

The statement was incorrect and misleading about two major points.

TNP not requesting rate increase in New Mexico

•TNP is not currently proposing to raise rates in New Mexico. TNP has not requested a general rate increase in New Mexico since 1982, and its rates have been relatively stable in New Mexico for the last ten years. In fact, TNP's residential and commercial cost per KWH to its customers was approximately 4.5 percent lower in 1991 than it was in 1982.

TNP Enterprise's 12-month earnings showed increase

•In the first quarter of 1992 (January-March), TNP Enterprises did experience a net loss of approximately \$1 million. However, the net earnings for the 12 months ending March 1992 (which is a more important consideration) were \$16 million, a \$2 million increase from the 12 months ending March 1991. A primary contributor to the first quarter 1992 reduction in earnings was a reduction in kilowatt hour sales caused, in part, by milder than normal weather throughout TNP's service territories.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—It has been six months since legislative and executive staff moved back into the newly-renovated Capitol. The 1992 Legislature convened two weeks later and held a grand re-opening ceremony.

During the legislative session the renovation appeared to be complete. We in the media knew there were still final touches necessary in our work areas, but to the untrained eye, the job was just about over. Apparently the contractor had met his obligation to have the building finished in time for the 1992 Legislature despite a considerably delay due to squabbling over maple vs. cherrywood.

But as soon as the final gavel sounded on the legislative session, workmen were back in the building on a schedule that appeared to be almost as busy as when construction was in full swing.

Both entrances to the Capitol are currently festooned with strings of multicolored plastic flags cordoning off areas where workmen are digging up six-month-old pavement, jackhammering recently-laid concrete, and replanting flower beds for the third time in three months. Inside there is an equal flurry of activity as doors that were installed six months ago are blocked and other construction apparently starts over.

Across the street in the

Lamy Building, the Tourism Department is moving into space that housed the Secretary of State's Offices during the renovation. When questions were asked about when the Capitol Renovation Project Manager's Office in the Lamy Building would be vacated, the answers were along the lines of "What makes you think we're ever going to leave?" Capitol wags are wondering when the construction crews go on the state payroll as permanent employees.

Another factor that should help gain job security rights for the renovation crew is implementation of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. The Legislative Council Service, landlords of the Capitol Building and the State Library next door that also was built in 1966, currently is soliciting public comment on proposed modifications necessary to provide handicapped accessibility. Copies of the proposal can be secured at the Capitol. A public hearing on the proposal will be held July 22 in Room 307 of the Capitol.

Complicating plans to meet accessibility provisions of the new federal act is the fact that construction is already in progress to meet current state handicapped standards that were overlooked when the \$34 million renovation took place last year.

But watch any extra renovation expenditures, above the \$34 million, be blamed on the Americans with Disabilities Act. It also appears that none of the delay for finishing the renovation will get assessed to the project contractor.

Rumors are circulating around the Roundhouse that the American Civil Liberties Union is snooping around counting the crosses and other religious articles in the traditional Spanish art commissioned for the Capitol from native New Mexico craftsmen. Don't be surprised to see a suit to protect us from viewing such things.

The prime space occupied by the Governor's Office in the PERA Building during renovation of the Capitol has been assigned to the Commission for the Blind. Capitol insiders are getting a chuckle over that one because the space has the best views of any in the state Capitol Complex. Former Gov. Garrey Carruthers said he never wanted to leave those temporary quarters. Present Gov. Bruce King wasn't excited about the move.

The Capitol and the PERA Building are administered by different state bodies, but it still seems ironic that it is taking two tries to provide the necessary accessibility to the disabled while we give the blind a great view.

Healthcare Program Works For Federal Workers Only

For Americans worried over the ever higher costs and complications of health care, there's good news: Congress has found a benefits program that really works. The bad news is that it's available only to federal employees.

Created in 1959, the Federal Employees Health Benefit Plan is opened to all government officials and workers from the President and members of Congress on down-including spouses and retirees, some 11 million lucky people. According to a Heritage Foundation study, it could also provide "the answer to America's overall health care problem" - or "crisis," as some would say. As outlined by Heritage's Robert Moffit, a former personnel management official in the Reagan White House, the federal employee health program works because it combines consumer choice and competition - the hallmarks of any successful private enterprise.

Under the program - its acronym is FEHBP - government employees nationwide can pick and choose from more than 400 health care plans, typically with about two dozen choices available in any particular locale. Every fall, during what's called "open season," federal employees receive a form listing the plans available

in their area, along with basic details on benefits and premium prices. They simply check off the plan they want.

Federal workers in the most popular plan - the Blue Cross standard option - pay \$39.82 each two-week pay period for family coverage, or \$18.95 for single coverage. They can change plans every year, if they so choose. They cannot be dropped or refused coverage because of age or pre-existing medical conditions. The government pays more than 60% of the average premium, up to a maximum of 75%.

Contract all this to private-sector employees who for the most part must take what their employer-arranged health care plans have to offer. And for the 65-year-olds and over, it's Medicare-only coverage, like it or not.

Also unlike most private health coverage, FEHBP keeps premiums down by emphasizing competitive bidding among providers. And when it comes to red tape, there's no comparison at all. The law creating the FEHBP is only 8 pages long with 16 pages of regulations and fewer than 100 pages of instructions. By contrast, the law covering Medicare is 142 pages long with 400 pages of regulations and nearly 11,000 pages of instructions.

The government employee plan is more economical, too. Between 1980 and 1988,

FEHBP's annual rate of increase in costs was 12%, compared to an average of 14% in the private sector. There's less paperwork as well for federal employees. They don't even have to write a check to an insurance company, or request reimbursement from the government for its share. Instead, the government makes a payroll deduction for the employees' share of the premium, adds its own contribution, and transmits this money to an FEHBP Trust Fund which then pays the plan chosen by the employee. Only 1% of each premium goes to administrative costs.

FEHBP enrollees have another advantage. If they move from one government job to another, there is never an interruption of benefits. If private-sector employees lose their job or change jobs, they are often left without family health insurance.

According to Heritage's Robert Moffit, "members of Congress would not think of giving

County Will Get Share Of Forest Funds

Lincoln County will get \$42,141.46 as its interim share of national forest receipts collected by the U.S. Dept. of Agriculture Forest Service in Fiscal Year 1992.

By law, the U.S. Forest Service pays 25 percent of the revenues it collects from timber sales, grazing, recreation, minerals and land uses to states in which national forest lands are located. The funds are used for schools and roads.

New Mexico's interim share is \$1,904,493, an increase of 46 percent from last year. The interim payment represents 75 percent of the estimated total amount each state will receive as its share of funds collected during the year from the sale and use of a variety of national forest products and services.

Lincoln County's estimated total payment is \$58,199.61. New Mexico's estimated total payment is \$2,539,324, up from last year's \$1,240,949.



Royal Road Exhibit At Race Track

Ruidoso Downs Race Track is hosting an exhibit which heralds New Mexico's "Royal Road."

"El Camino Real: Un Sendero Historico" exhibit will be open to the public on non-race days from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and from 8:30 to 10 a.m. on race days (Thursday through Sunday). There is no charge to see the exhibit on non-race days.

The exhibit is a colorful and informative 36-panel display which invites visitors to take a fascinating journey through time as it commemorates the rich cultural heritage embodied in the long history of New Mexico's "Royal Road."

The highway, dating back more than 400 years and known as El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro, linked colonial Mexico with its northern capital at Santa Fe. The route in its entire length was blazed in 1598 when Don Juan De Onate led a group of Spanish settlers into the wilds of present day New Mexico and established the first formal European municipality west of the Mississippi.

The exhibit, which opened to the public in June 1990, was prepared under the direction of the Camino Real Project in collaboration with the University of New Mexico's Latin American Institute. An officially recognized 1992 Columbus Quincentenary Project, the exhibit was funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities, with grants from the New Mexico Endowment for the Humanities, the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Dept. and New Mexico State Historic Preservation Division going toward related project activities such as an archaeological survey of the Camino, and an official auto route and historical marker project.

Livestock Board Keeps Mill Levy

RUIDOSO—The New Mexico livestock board kept the current mill levy that was set by the board a year ago when they met June 26 for a regular board meeting. The mill levy adopted by the board is 9 mills for range cattle and horses, 5 mills for dairy cattle and 18 mills for sheep and goats.

The board also discussed at length finances of the board and heard John Wortman, executive director, express concerns over the declining number of cattle inspected by the board. Wortman says real numbers of cattle which fund the activities of the board have been declining and consideration must be given about finances way in advance of loss of revenue.

Board chairman Harvey Tindell said staff should keep them informed of finances and the situation with revenue so adjustments can be made to avert trouble. The board is prepared to respond so that its work in thief and disease protection can continue, Tindell said.

State veterinarian Steve England said the introduction of a veterinarian to meat plant inspection is working well. This additional veterinary support is a result of the federal government's comprehensive review of New Mexico's meat inspection program. The board's meat inspection division receives about one half of its funding from the federal government.

Crown will again serve the lunch for the NMSU Ram Sale early in September. Lee Sultemeier will chair this event.



Importance Of Public Lands

LAS CRUCES—A new study evaluating the contribution western public lands make to the nation's supply of meat and wool indicates the nation's livestock industry is more dependent on public land for grazing than earlier estimated by some, but the use of that land for sheep and cattle production is not as extensive as other estimates.

In a newly published study, "The Importance of Public Lands to Livestock Production in the U.S.," researchers of New Mexico State University's Range Improvement Task Force found that most western ranches depend heavily on federal and/or state trust lands for providing forage for livestock.

L. Allen Torell, one of the study's authors and ranch business specialist with NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station and Cooperative Extension Service, said 51 percent of beef cows and 68 percent of the sheep and lambs in New Mexico are produced on ranches with at least five percent grazing capacity coming from either Bureau of Land Management (BLM) or U.S. Forest Service (USFS) lands.

The study shows 69 percent of the beef cows and 88 percent of the sheep produced in 11 western states in 1990 were from ranches using federal land for at least five percent of their grazing.

"About 41 percent of the beef cows in those 11 states grazed on federal lands for part of the year during 1990," said Torell.

On a national scale, the study indicates that 15 percent of the nation's beef cows and 44 percent of the sheep and lambs were raised on western ranches that depend on BLM or USFS lands for more than five percent of their grazing capacity. About four percent of the forage for the nation's 1990 beef cow herd was supplied from western public lands.

The importance of public lands for beef production is much greater than the widely quoted estimate that only two percent of the nation's beef is

raised on public lands, said Torell. However, the numbers are also far lower than the livestock industry estimate that 40 percent of the national beef-cow inventory spends time on public grazing lands.

"Even the debate about the importance of public land ranching has been a part of the conflict about the management of public lands," said Torell.

Analyses of land use patterns for New Mexico ranch sales and grazing statistics of BLM and USFS documents provided the data for the study's conclusions.

Torell worked on the study with John M. Fowler, Professor of Agricultural Economics and Agricultural Business at NMSU's College of Agriculture and Home Economics; and Marc E. Kincaid and Jerry M. Hawkes, NMSU research assistants.

A copy of the study, Range Improvement Task Force Report 82, is available from NMSU's agricultural information department.

RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF HOSPITAL MILL LEVY SPECIAL ELECTION

RESOLUTION NO. 80-87

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Medical Center, the Carrizozo Health Center, the Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic are integral to the health care and economic development of Lincoln County; and

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Hospital Funding Act provides a mechanism whereby a mill levy can be approved by the public for the continued maintenance and operation of the hospital and clinics; and

WHEREAS, there expires in 1992, the existing mill levy, which was approved "to maintain the Lincoln County Hospitals . . . with the Lincoln County Medical Center receiving three (3) and twenty-five (25) hundredths and the Carrizozo Health Center receiving one (1), for eight years"; and

WHEREAS, Presbyterian Healthcare Services has done an excellent job of utilizing the existing authorization at the enumerated facilities to the benefit of the citizens of Lincoln County; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to place into effect a new mill levy to make funds available for purposes in addition to those approved by the 1984 levy, as follows: "to operate and maintain the Lincoln County hospital and clinics . . . with the Lincoln County Medical Center receiving three (3) and twenty-five (25) hundredths mills and the Carrizozo Health Center, Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic, in the aggregate, receiving one (1) mill, for eight years".

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County, New Mexico as follows:

SECTION 1. On the 15th day of September, 1992, there will be held in the County of Lincoln a special election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the County the question of whether or not a property tax should be imposed for the purpose of operating and maintaining the Lincoln County Medical Center, the Carrizozo Health Center, the Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic.

SECTION 2. The Precincts in the County in which the election is to be held and the location of each polling place in the precincts shall be as follows:

- Precinct 1.....Corona at the Village Hall
Precinct 2A, 13.....Carrizozo-County Courthouse
Precinct 2B.....Nogal at the Nogal Fire Station
Precinct 3.....Capitan at the Fair Building
Precinct 4, 5.....Alto at Bonito Fire Station
Precinct 6, 7.....Ruidoso at the County Sub Office
Precinct 8, 9.....Ruidoso at the Public Library
Precinct 10, 11.....Ruidoso Downs Sr. Citizens Center
Precinct 12A.....San Patricio-St. Judes Parish Hall
Precinct 12B.....Hondo at the Hondo School
Precinct 12C.....Capitan at the Old City Hall

In addition there will be an Absentee Voter District established as described in Section 7 herein.

SECTION 3. The polls for said election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7 p.m. on the day of the election.

SECTION 4. At such election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified registered electors of the District:

LINCOLN COUNTY MEDICAL CENTER, CARRIZOZO HEALTH CENTER, CORONA HEALTH CENTER AND HONDO CLINIC MILL LEVY QUESTION

Shall the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County be authorized to impose a levy of four (4) and twenty-five (25) hundredths mills as provided in the hospital funding act to operate and maintain the Lincoln County Hospital and Clinics? The funds from said levy will be divided with the Lincoln County Medical Center, Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic, in the aggregate, receiving one (1) mill, for eight (8) years.

SECTION 5. The tax contemplated by the hospital mill levy question is authorized by the Hospital Funding Act, Sections 4-48B-1 to 4-48B-27, N.M.S.A. 1978 as amended and supplemented.

SECTION 6. A person is a qualified elector of the County in he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least eighteen (18) years of age on the day of the election and a resident of the County on the day of the election.

In order to vote, qualified electors of the County must be registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County in accordance with law. Any otherwise qualified elector who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such election must register prior to 5:00 p.m. on August 18, 1992, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election, at the Office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, Lincoln County Courthouse, or through any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerk of Lincoln County.

SECTION 7. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by Section 1-6-1 et seq., N.M.S.A. 1978. Qualified electors may procure an absentee ballot or vote absentee in person at the Office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., from August 11, 1992, being the thirty-fifth day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m., September 11, 1992, being the Saturday immediately prior to the day of the Election.

SECTION 8. This proclamation shall be filed with the Lincoln County Clerk after adoption by the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County. Thereafter, but not less than fifty days before the date of the Election, the Lincoln County Clerk shall publish the proclamation once each week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within the boundaries of Lincoln County. The proclamation shall conform to the requirements of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended. PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED this 5th day of June, 1992.

JTPA Youth Employment Increased

The State of New Mexico has received an additional 2.1 million dollars funded under the Job Training Partnership Act to expand the Summer Youth Employment Training Program. The funds are part of an emergency urban aid package agreed to by President Bush and the Congress. This funding will allow the New Mexico Department of Labor to increase employment of youths statewide for the summer.

Eligible youth must be age 14-21 who are economically disadvantaged, a resident of New Mexico, a U.S. citizen or other legal resident, and have a social security card. Youth selected for this program will be paid at the rate of \$4.25 per hour for job related training and attending education enhancement classes. The program will start on July 6, 1992 and end August 14, 1992.
