# Will Wind-Surfing Be On Grindstone

Non-motorized boating may become a part of the recreation possibilities for Grindstone Lake in Ruidoso.

A large contingent of wind-surfing enthusiasts filled the Ruidoso Council meeting room Tuesday and convinced the councilors to support their request for non-motorized boating on the lake. A petition with 500 signatures asking for boating was presented also.

After considerable discussion the council adopted the concept presented by Larry Schneider, president of the Lincoln County Windsurfers' Association (LCWA) and other members, to open Grindstone to small non-motorized boats and windsurfing. However, boating will not be allowed until all legal concerns are studied, addressed and a plan for the boating adopted.


Village staff and councilors worried about access to the lake and the liabilities involved with boating. Currently, the property surrounding the lake belongs to FDIC and is for sale. The village actually has no legal access to the dam or reservoir itself, but it has not closed off access either.

LCWA members argued the fishermen now have access to the lake, setting a precedent. As for liability, member Joe Zagone said fishermen could also fall into the lake, creating a potential liability for the village. Councilors agreed a detailed and thorough legal analysis of allowing boating should be conducted.

The legal access and no defined legal boundaries of the lake were finally considered village problems which need to be addressed regardless if boating is allowed. Councilor Ron Andrews suggested the community get behind a letter writ-

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## Constructed Wetlands In Capitan's Future

Capitan Village Trustees gave the green light to the Constructed Wetlands project preliminary designs Monday, during their meeting which was filled with information.

Thomas Andrews, design engineer for Southwest Wetlands Group of Santa Fe, presented his preliminary designs for the sewage treatment project. Southwest Wetlands contracted with the village to provide designs for the project, which is financed by a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

Andrews' group is one of few which specialize in natural wastewater treatment systems, such as the constructed wetlands. Andrews gave a tenta-

tive time frame for the project, with August 15 being the goal for completion of the construction documents, necessary for the bid process. Bidding will take place from Sept. 15 to Oct. 31 and from the time of the bid to April 30 will be the construction. In the spring the plants needed to make the natural wetlands work properly will be planted.

The wetlands will consist of four "cells" which are long, narrow and shallow and planted with various aquatic plants. The length of each cell will be determined by average temperature and the amount of waste water to be treated. Waste water will be pumped from the sewer lines to the series of connected cells through a lift station which also will serve as a

lab to test the effluent.

The wetlands will have no odor, quite unlike the existing evaporation lagoons. The Duck Weed in two cells and reeds, bullrushes and cattails in two others will clean the waste water and create additional oxygen. During cold months an aerator will keep the waste water stirred for the needed aerobic action.

Once the waste water flows through the wetlands it will be clean enough to pipe to a two acre lake, which can serve as a waterfowl habitat. Interest for such has been indicated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. Andrews is designing the wetlands large enough to treat 85,000 gallons daily. Because of this the wastewater will not

## Capitan Hires VoAg Teacher

Capitan Board of Education closed its old VoAg chapter and opened a new one at its July meeting, Thursday.

After a more than two hour closed session to discuss personnel, board members Tom Trost, Ron Roybal, Jack King and Ervin Aldaz rescinded Joel Edwards' May 6 discharge and accepted the former VoAg teacher's resignation dated May 6. The action ended a series of hearings and special meetings with Edwards because of problems in his VoAg program, which ended in an arbitrated settlement.

Capitan opened a new chapter in its VoAg history when members unanimously hired Randy Pritchard. He graduated from Clint High School in 1982, then earned a BA in VoAg from NMSU in 1986 and his MA in 1987.

Pritchard did his student VoAg teaching at Carrizozo High School under the guidance of then VoAg teacher Mike Gaines.

After earning his MA at NMSU he worked three years as the 4-H agent in Curry County (Clavis).

He comes to Capitan from his computer analyst job with El Paso Electric. Pritchard is married and they have a one year old child.

Board member Preston Stone was absent.

The board also accepted the resignation of elementary special education teacher Mary Lee Daniel and third grade teacher Pat Holland.

Then the members hired Bobbe Fowler as elementary teacher, re-hired Jo Beth Vinson and Janie York as elementary special education instructional assistants.

Jerri Wilson was hired as custodian, Bonnie Rogers and Wanda Strickland for cafeteria.

Capitan parents and community have indicated they approve of how the school is educating their children, according to the results of returned Quality of Education Surveys distributed this spring to all students.

About 36 percent of parents responded, and of that group 131 agreed, Capitan needs a middle school, 32 disagreed and 23 did not know.

Generally, the returned surveys were favorable, said Capitan superintendent David Lock. Most respondents agreed with the 20 questions concerning the school's educational programs.

Interestingly, while most parents tended to agree with the questions, 93 disagreed with the statement that the New Mexico legislature pro-

## Trustees Award Contract For Street Engineering

Carrizozo Trustees awarded the contract for professional engineering service for the next phase of the street project to Dennis Engineering of Socorro. The award was made during the July 14 regular meeting of the board of trustees.

Curtis Schraeder of Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SENMEDD) said the project is on schedule. Raymond Dennis of Dennis Engineering said he hopes to have a survey crew here this next week.

Preliminary plans will be brought to the trustees at the July 28 meeting and advertising for contractors will follow. Actual construction may begin as soon as the end of August and be completed by the first part of December.

In other business trustees adopted Ordinance 163 for an increase of water rates, adopted Ordinance 164 for an increase in sewer rates, and approved the final budget for 1992-93.

Schraeder told the board about a new program being started by the state Department of Finance and Administration (DFA).

DFA wants each entity in New Mexico to compile a five-year infrastructure Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) listing priorities for planned improvements.

The CIP will be used as scor-

ing criteria for future funding and will be used for additional points in Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) applications.

SENMEDD will assist the town in filling out forms for the CIP. Each department will be listed in a separate section of the CIP for ease in updating the CIP each year as required. The CIP will include planned purchases of equipment, street and water improvements, and major planned expenditures.

DFA would like to have the CIP by the end of October. Schraeder said it will help minimize "pork barrel" and "Christmas tree" projects being funded by the state.

Airport manager Hal Marx reported there were 49 operations at the airport in June, all federal signs have been installed, and the fly-in is scheduled for July 25.

Trustees and town attorney Bob Beauvais discussed a bill the town has received for a half-load of airport fuel that is supposed to have been delivered in 1988. The town has no record of the fuel being delivered.

The town will ask for original invoices or other proof that the fuel was actually delivered.

Trustees also discussed the vehicle that Sterling Spencer had donated to the town a few years ago. The town never received the title or paperwork

on the car and it was recently sold. Beauvais said technically it never belonged to the town because the town did not take title.

Police department head Charlie White presented a copy

# Carrizozo Chamber Chatter

Carrizozo Health Clinic relies upon the property tax mills collected every year for Lincoln County Medical Center and clinics. On Sept. 15, voters will determine the fate of the clinics by voting for or against the mill levy.

Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce members were encouraged to approve the collection of the 4.25 mills for the next eight

years for the maintenance and operation of the Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso and the Carrizozo, Corona and Hondo Clinics. A yes vote will not raise taxes, since the 4.25 mills are already collected for the hospital and clinics.

Meeting at the Carrizozo Airport, with lunch catered by airport manager Hal Marx, the chamber heard from Sue

Stearns, a member of the LCMC and Carrizozo Clinic advisory board.

Stearns told about the many services such as special screening clinics and numerous doctors in specialty fields available at LCMC and the addition of the Hondo Clinic. Also LCMC rates are lower than average for a facility its size in the region.

With remodeling, and

upgrading of staff and equipment, Stearns said the hospital had made a 500 percent turn around in the 11 years she has served on the board.

Without the mill levy, the Carrizozo, Corona and Hondo Clinics could close within a year, leaving those communities without health care providers.

Stearns encouraged anyone with complaints or questions about LCMC or the clinics to contact any board member or LCMC administrator Valerie Miller.

Glen Ellison encouraged all chamber members to attend the Santa Rita Fiesta July 25 and 26, as well as the Carrizozo Airport Fly-in July 25. He called the two days of activities a "hootenanny" for July.

The Santa Rita Fiesta will be held in Fred Chavez Park, the first major all-community function to be held in the south-side of Carrizozo neighborhood.

Ellison advocates an intensive "selling" of the town and surrounding area in order to attract more visitors and to tell the public what Carrizozo has to offer.

The "Our Town" presentation by the Carrizozo Little Theater Group recently was deemed a great success by those members who saw the show.

Dorothy Forsythe and Patsy Serna volunteered to call members as a part of a phone committee, rather than mailing post card notices. Anyone wishing to volunteer to call members can contact chamber president Ruth Hammond.

The chamber will meet at noon Aug. 11, at Carrizozo Airport. The lunch will be catered.

ing campaign to FDIC and Congressmen to help the village obtain access to the lake.

Wind currents near the dam will require some type of barrier, with location determined by professional advice. Cost of improving roads, drainage and parking, specific planning, additional personnel needed to control the access of boaters to the lake and traffic and additional insurance must also be considered.

When the topic of Grindstone's purpose as a water supply was discussed, David Anderson, a LWMA member and assistant coordinator for the village Parks and Recreation, reported the New Mexico Environment Dept. and State Engineer's office staff have said there is no problem having non-motorized boats on a reservoir which is primarily for a municipal water supply. The council asked that those offices be contacted for written acknowledgement.

The concept will be coordinated between Parks and Recreation Commission and director Kathleen Michelena, the village attorney and LWMA to come up with plans and to address concerns by the Aug. 11 meeting. At least one Parks and Rec. commission member Smokey Stover, backs the idea, and considered the boating an economic development.

Councilor Jerry Shaw also made a motion to direct the attorney to work on the access problem with FDIC. The attorney said FDIC will sell the property to the village for \$480-620,000.

Declaring a conflict of interest, councilor Ron Andrews left his seat at the council and sat with his wife in the audience when the agenda came to considering Andrews' petition to remove annexation conditions on the 5.05 acres Nelson Tract. Andrews owns the property located east of White Mountain Meadows on Gavilan Canyon Road and proposes to change the annexation conditions of lots of no less than one acre to allow the R-1 conditions of 10,000 square foot lots.

Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) at its July 6 meeting, recommended the council further amend the annexation ordinance to eliminate the one acre condition.

After discussion about whether Andrews' petition receive special treatment by staff and P&Z and the reading of certain parts of a letter of protest from Bill McCarty who owns White Mountain Meadows, councilors approved Aug. 11 as a date for a public hearing on an ordinance to amend the annexation ordinance. McCarty's letter stated the

annexation amendment was rushed through without consideration of legalities. Alonso asked village planning administrator Cleatus Richards if Andrews had been given special consideration since he was a councilor.

"No," Richards said. "It was the same as for anyone else."

The Aug. 11 public hearing will provide time for the public and adjoining property owners to voice their concerns and complaints and legal questions to be answered.

The village's 1992-93 budget, with adjustments by the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration, was finalized with councilors' approval Tuesday night. Included in the budget was an unexpected \$225,170 cash balance, determined after all actual expenditures were tallied from the 1991-92 fiscal year. With an estimated \$8,170,508 in revenues, expenditures for the village of Ruidoso for the next fiscal year are estimated at \$7,908,246.

The expenditures included \$7,500 for overtime in the law enforcement budget, and \$2,000 for extra services for state police per diem to help with the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally this fall.

Bradley Construction Inc. will be paid \$329,298.22 for its work on the Ruidoso Civic Events Center, but the company is now in a "liquidated status" because it has taken too long. As of June 28, the project was 78 percent complete, with 98 percent of the contract time elapsed. By July 2, the company had elapsed all of its contract time and was subject to a \$500 a day penalty.

Bradley has been paid \$1,461,832.85 with \$76,938.57 retained. Also \$19,599.31 was withheld to guarantee payment of subcontractors and materials suppliers. Several conflicts with subcontractors and material suppliers have been resolved.

Aug. 3 is the date set for substantial completion of the center. Arrangements for events booked in the center in early August have been made for other locations in case the center is not ready. The facility will be completely furnished in about 60-90 days because of a delay in funding from the state.

Comments about the center range from exciting to pretty. In other business councilors:

—Heard a positive update from MainStreet Project manager Mary Maul that the project has more than \$1 million to refurbish sidewalks, replace street lights and plant trees in Ruidoso's midtown area.

—Approved a commercial

site development to allow St. Eleanor's Catholic Church to renovate a building, but not allow parking on the shoulders of Church Drive from Thomas to Junction.

—Okayed a replat of Lot 7, block 4, Country Club Heights for Clark Carpenter with no requirements on the applicant.

—Approved commercial site development plans for renovation and reopening of the old KOR campground, with provisions the owner (Ruidoso State Bank) install a fire hydrant at the Glade Drive entrance to the RV park.

—Okayed two consent items: agreement with Economic Development Corporation to provide \$54,000 for services in seeking a hotel operator, and authorization for a 10 a.m. July 27 workshop with Southeastern

New Mexico Economic Development District director Tony Alias to review and finalize the village's Capital Improvement Plan.

—Authorized a license be issued to Mark Nowlen to conduct a 90-liquidation sale at the old Griffins Western Wear store for a \$200 fee. Councilors also passed a resolution requesting the New Mexico Municipal League and state legislature give a local enforcement option to the state law requiring council approval and license for such liquidation sales.

—Heard a report of complaints about declining solid waste collection services. Councilor Andrews advised citizens to contact the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority office in Ruidoso Downs to lodge complaints.



## The Other Side

I replied, "Discovering facts concerning what I am talking about tends to limit the scope of discussion, and besides that, if I had read it, I wouldn't have been able to set up this story I am about to tell, and furthermore, I refuse to accept the easy answer as being the appropriate approach to problem solving."

At first glance, this project had all of the appearances of a

manicive boondoggle. The first question that came to mind was how much taxpayer money was being spent to set up this operation, but I was assured that it was a totally private venture, designed to alleviate the pressure created in our 50th state from an oversupply of substandard housing.

My second question was what would we do with them when they got here. Our indigenous supply of substandard housing is more than the market will stand, but I guess 'recycling' means we're going to make something else out of them. But, what can you do with a worn-out igloo? I know we need more water, but wouldn't it be a better idea to do the recycling up there and transport the finished product down here? Is someone planning on skiing on the Fourth of July? Do we need more rocks for our toddlers? Has anyone considered the effect on the tourist industry in Lincoln County if the ambient temperature is lowered as much as five degrees, or how to dispose of the waste products created by the recycling process? (Maybe the furor over the nuclear waste storage facility was just a distraction so we wouldn't object to the dumping of igloo recycling by-products in the area.)

The supporters of the project are vehement in their denials that any waste products that are harmful will be generated by the recycling process, but I'm not convinced. Who wants to live in an area that is infested with polarized bed bugs, Huskie fleas, salmon bones, blubber cracklin's, old shoe laces, fur-lined pantyhose, and mugluks? Talk about low-level waste! (You see, son, during the summer, igloos tend to incorporate their surroundings.)

Aside from that, what I really couldn't understand is why Ruidoso would be selected as the site for the recycling plant because it is so remote from the source of supply. I have been assured, however, that, except for a few bugs (sic) yet to be worked out, all the problems associated with transportation of the igloos have been resolved.

I was told by an unimpeached source that the igloos were being shipped from a factory located some 25 miles east of Nome, Alaska to El Paso by rail, and then loaded onto flat-bed trucks for transportation to Ruidoso. The first load experienced some structural deformation about five miles out of El Paso, but they were coming along fine until they got to the INS road block north of Oro Grande. The agents apparently thought there had to be something suspicious about a truckload of ice cubes in the desert, and after their dogs had circled the truck a few times and had discovered nothing except the yellow streak left by the dog ahead of him, and they had spent a couple of hours combing the merchandise for foreign vegetable matter, the load slipped off into the sand and disappeared. However, I was informed that the transit company agreed to rebate five percent of the freight charge because they didn't have to travel the rest of the way to Ruidoso, and that later shipments did manage to reach their destination. I was also told that not a single agent thought to ask who owned the trucks.

WASHINGTON, DC—The Washington Senators' American League baseball team moved from our nation's capital long ago to become the Minnesota Twins. Washington, a sports-crazy town as evidenced by their support of the Redskins, has not had a major league baseball team since.

Baltimore, Maryland, 30 miles to the north, has recently taken full advantage of the situation by building a new baseball stadium on the Washington side of town and directly adjacent to the commuter train track that runs into Union Station, four blocks from the Capitol.

Last Monday night my wife Jeanette and I joined Bruce Donisthorpe, legislative assistant to Rep. Joe Skeen, and Mike Cook, press secretary for Rep. Stove Schiff, for a trip up to Oriole Park at Camden Yards to watch a ball game.

The new stadium worked

wonders. The Orioles have gone from the worst team in baseball two years ago to an American League East contender and the new stadium has had 17 sell-outs in a row. Tickets for the rest of the season are almost totally unavailable except for a few week nights.

Bruce and Mike are sports nuts. Jeanette will tolerate a game here and there in return for my sitting through a couple operas every year with her. But Monday night I noticed her interest waning sometime between the 12th and 13th innings. After stranding a team-record number of runners on base, the home team finally pulled it out in the bottom of the 14th and long after midnight.

Unlike Los Angeles Dodger games at which there is no one in the stands after the seventh-inning stretch, the Orioles have found a foolproof way to keep a large chunk of their fans around for the end of the game—even

past the 14th-inning stretch.

Their secret—the train back to Washington doesn't leave until 20 minutes after the last out and everyone already has a roundtrip ticket. The only other choice is a \$45 cab ride.

Actually there are two trains taking fans back toward Washington. The second one turns before reaching Union Station and winds through Washington's Maryland suburbs. Both trains experienced delays along the tracks that night because rail employees weren't expecting to see action in their vicinity so late. Our Washington train took three times as long as it should have to make the half-hour trip. But at least we made it.

Shortly after making its turn into the suburbs, the crew of the second train reached a point at which it had been on duty over 12 hours. Evidently there is some sort of federal



safety law requiring train crews to work no more than 12 hours. When the deadline arrived, the train came to an abrupt stop, the crew got off at an isolated switching station, and left its trainfull of passengers as stranded as the Orioles had been doing with baserunners the night before.

If a crew had left its train with no warning somewhere along the 60-mile stretch between Deming and Las Cruces, state Sen. John Smith, state Rep. G.X. McSherry, and U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen would have been hopping mad. They immediately would have contacted federal officials to investigate the matter and a team of bureaucrats would have arrived within the year—or two.

But when it happens in Congress' back yard, it's a federal case. The following day it was front-page news in the Washington Post. Everyone is immediately investigating this incident.

It may hurt Baltimore's chance at getting one of the two expansion National Football League franchises on the auction block. That stadium would be built at the Camden Rail yard adjacent to Oriole Stadium.

The incident also could snag negotiations between Washington Redskins manager Jack Kent Cooke and Virginia Gov. Douglas Wilder to move the NFL team across the river to Potomac Yard, another railroad station outside Washington.

flow from the wetlands into the lake right away.

The existing lagoons will be emptied, dried and the sludge removed to a treatment facility. Once the sludge is removed, the lagoons will be inspected for integrity then put into service for emergency backup. If any part of the wetlands develop trouble the wastewater can go directly to the lagoons. Fish and Wildlife would like to use the old lagoons for areas to growing feed for migratory water fowl.

Tatum has been treating wastewater with its constructed wetlands. A tour of that Tatum facility was what convinced Mrs. Nellie Fuchs to sell her east side property to the village for a constructed wetlands. The wetlands projects had been delayed because the village was unable to acquire property next to the existing sewer lagoons, which was the original intent.

Mosquitoes will be no problem with the constructed wetlands if a program of "mosquito" fish and bacterial control is used. Andrews appeared to balk at the idea of using a poisonous fog, as suggested by a member of the audience. Rather he advocates natural treatment systems.

Andrews estimated the cost of the entire project as shown in the preliminary designs will be some \$320,000. The proposed parking lot, trails around the lake and bridges could be cut out and phased as later projects in order to save about \$50,000.

Trustees L.C. Cozzens, Gordon Ross and Gilbert Montoya unanimously approved Andrews proceed with the plans.

Any future plans for major village improvements must be included in a state mandated three-year Capital Improvements Plan.

Tony Alias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD), told of how the Local Government Division of the New Mexico Dept. of Finance and Administration (DFA) is now requiring the three year plan from municipalities under 1,000 population.

Because of a shortage in grant and other funding, municipalities must put their needed projects in a priority list. Without this list, or three year plan, the municipality will stand little chance for funding.

SNMEDD, of which the village is a member, is working with its members on the plans. SNMEDD staff will sit with its member municipality staffs, identify and prioritize projects, then fill out the proper forms in order to be ready for DFA by mid-September.

"It's a way for DFA to keep control," Alias said.

Oct. 1 will be the deadline for municipalities to have their plans submitted. Alias said his staff will come to the village to

work on its plan within the next month.

Valerie Miller, Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) administrator, asked voters to support the hospital mill levy up for election Sept. 15. Voters will be asked to authorize the collection of 4.25 mills for the maintenance and operation of LCMC in Ruidoso and clinics in Carrizozo, Corona and Hondo. The mill question will be good for eight years.

Property owners will experience no tax increase with the passage of the mill levy. Already, 4.25 mills are collected for LCMC and the clinics. However, the upcoming mill levy will not be just a renewal, since wording was changed on the mill levy resolution approved by the county commissioners.

A special election was called because of the "confusing ballot" in the November 3 general election which has nine tax issues and four constitutional amendments. Privately donated funds will cover the costs of the special election.


Trustees also heard from new Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Jim Service, who encourages all residents to become involved in the planning process by attending the P&Z meetings every second and fourth Wednesday, at 6:30 p.m. in the old city hall. At the July 22 meeting P&Z will start determining zones, and will continue working on a planning document that is acceptable to the public.

Mayor Frank Warth gave a solid waste update. Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) is now collecting trash in the village.

The biggest trash news was the June 25 vote by the Alamogordo City Commission to join LCSWA with or without Otero County on a regional landfill. Tularosa, Alamogordo and Cloudcroft are working on a joint powers agreement to establish an authority similar to LCSWA in order to get an Otero-Lincoln Counties landfill, the first in the state.

Pat Huey, Capitan Fire Dept. chief, requested the village give up the meeting room in the old city hall to allow expansion of the fire truck bays to accommodate the big fire truck. Warth and the trustees, however, want to keep the room as it is for meetings and storage of village documents, plans and maps.

Warth said the item will go on next month's meeting agenda and his staff would come up with some alternative proposals. Trustees agreed to purchase diesel fuel from both Richard Phillips and Brewer Oil (Shell Station).

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

RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF HOSPITAL MILL LEVY SPECIAL ELECTION

RESOLUTION NO. 80-07

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Medical Center, the Carrizozo Health Center, the Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic are integral to the health care and economic development of Lincoln County; and

WHEREAS, the New Mexico Hospital Funding Act provides a mechanism whereby a mill levy can be approved by the public for the continued maintenance and operation of the hospital and clinics; and

WHEREAS, there expires in 1992, the existing mill levy, which was approved "to maintain the Lincoln County Hospital... with the Lincoln County Medical Center receiving three (3) and twenty-five (25) hundredths and the Carrizozo Health Center receiving one (1), for eight years"; and

WHEREAS, Presbyterian Healthcare Services has done an excellent job of utilizing the existing authorization at the enumerated facilities to the benefit of the citizens of Lincoln County; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary to place into effect a new mill levy to make funds available for purposes in addition to those approved by the 1984 levy, as follows: "to operate and maintain the Lincoln County hospital and clinics... with the Lincoln County Medical Center receiving three (3) and twenty-five (25) hundredths mills and the Carrizozo Health Center, Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic, in the aggregate, receiving one (1) mill, for eight years";

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County, New Mexico as follows:

SECTION 1. On the 15th day of September, 1992, there will be held in the County of Lincoln a special election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the County the question of whether or not a property tax should be imposed for the purpose of operating and maintaining the Lincoln County Medical Center, the Carrizozo Health Center, the Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic.

SECTION 2. The Precincts in the County in which the election is to be held and the location of each polling place in the precincts shall be as follows:

- Precinct 1.....Corona at the Village Hall
Precinct 2A, 13.....Carrizozo-County Courthouse
Precinct 2B.....Nogal at the Nogal Fire Station
Precinct 3.....Capitan at the Fair Building
Precinct 4, 5.....Alto at Bonito Fire Station
Precinct 6, 7.....Ruidoso at the County Sub Office
Precinct 8, 9.....Ruidoso at the Public Library
Precinct 10, 11.....Ruidoso Downs Sr. Citizens Center
Precinct 12A.....San Patricio-St. Judes Parish Hall
Precinct 12B.....Hondo at the Hondo School
Precinct 12C.....Capitan at the Old City Hall

In addition there will be an Absentee Voter District established as described in Section 7 herein.

SECTION 3. The polls for said election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7 p.m. on the day of the election.

SECTION 4. At such election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified registered electors of the District:

LINCOLN COUNTY MEDICAL CENTER, CARRIZOZO HEALTH CENTER, CORONA HEALTH CENTER AND HONDO CLINIC MILL LEVY QUESTION

Shall the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County be authorized to impose a levy of four (4) and twenty-five (25) hundredths mills as provided in the hospital funding act to operate and maintain the Lincoln County Hospital and Clinics? The funds from said levy will be divided with the Lincoln County Medical Center, Corona Health Center and the Hondo Clinic, in the aggregate, receiving one (1) mill, for eight (8) years.

SECTION 5. The tax contemplated by the hospital mill levy question is authorized by the Hospital Funding Act, Sections 4-48B-1 to 4-48B-27, N.M.S.A. 1978 as amended and supplemented.

SECTION 6. A person is a qualified elector of the County if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least eighteen (18) years of age on the day of the election and a resident of the County on the day of the election.

In order to vote, qualified electors of the County must be registered with the County Clerk of Lincoln County in accordance with law. Any otherwise qualified elector who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such Election must register prior to 5:00 p.m. on August 18, 1992, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election, at the Office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, Lincoln County Courthouse, or through any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerk of Lincoln County.

SECTION 7. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by Section 1-6-1 et seq., N.M.S.A. 1978. Qualified electors may procure an absentee ballot or vote absentee in person at the Office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., from August 11, 1992, being the thirty-fifth day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m., September 11, 1992, being the Saturday immediately prior to the day of the Election.

SECTION 8. This proclamation shall be filed with the Lincoln County Clerk after adoption by the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County. Thereafter, but not less than fifty days before the date of the Election, the Lincoln County Clerk shall publish the proclamation once each week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation within the boundaries of Lincoln County. The proclamation shall conform to the requirements of the federal Voting Rights Act of 1965, as amended. PASSED, APPROVED AND ADOPTED this 5th day of June, 1992.



## Sheriff's report

**Don't feed the bears.** Alto area residents were warned last week to not throw out scraps or leave any kind of food out because bears are coming out of the woods during this dry time. Lincoln County Sheriff's Dispatch referred numerous bear calls to Game and Fish officers.

Deputies also arrested an El Paso man for trafficking cocaine, burglary of a residence and possession of paraphernalia. Chris Ferguson, 44, El Paso, was arrested July 6, after deputies found him near the Rancho Ruidoso residence of Danny L. Stevens. Last week Stevens died of accidental self-inflicted gunshots. Ferguson allegedly was in possession of several items from the Stevens' residence. White Mountain Task Force is investigating the burglary.

Ferguson was released from the Lincoln County Jail after a bondsman posted his \$50,000 bond.

Lightning caused a fire on Carrizo Peak and several grass fires also were reported. With the high, dry winds during the last two weeks, fires and bear sightings are on the rise.

being made on a middle school design by the school's contracted architectural firm, Architecture Plus of Roswell. The firm was recently at the school to survey the existing physical plant for areas of high student use, energy efficiency and staff input. Using a "Computer Assisted Design (CAD)" the firm will develop a middle school design which will be presented to the board in September.

To finance a middle school project the board will take a bond question to voters in March 1993.

A three-year asbestos inspection recently found the school with no asbestos problems. There is no danger students will be exposed to asbestos. The board authorized the testing of 11 samples the inspector took from textured ceilings in the elementary building and library, some

flooring in the library and pipe joint compound in the boiler room of the old gym.

The board also approved an asbestos test as part of its asbestos management plan. By doing so, the test will show if the school needs special dealings of materials if it has any future modeling.

The board authorized Lock to pursue development of practice baseball and soccer fields on its property north of Highway 380, across from the high school. Lock will approach the village to seek help with excavating the property and other volunteer help.

Board policy was modified with a resolution acknowledging collective bargaining with employees and directing the administration to arrange for training and education for board members and staff in anticipation of the Act which begins April 1, 1993. The Act was passed by the New Mexico State Legislature this January.

Several electives were added to the high school curriculum and the graduation requirements were expanded by two credits for a total of 16 required credits. Students wishing to graduate beginning this year must complete one credit each of keyboarding and foreign language in addition to the required four credits English, three math, two science, three social studies and one P.E. and nine elective credits from a choice of 29.

Woodworking and Ag mechanics were added to the VoAg program where animal and wildlife science and associated meat lab were combined.

Other electives added were Current Political Events, Advanced Computers, Latin II, Entrepreneurship. Availability of the elective classes during a specific school year will depend on student interest.

The board will conduct a worksession prior to its regular

meeting in August to discuss various items on the agenda, including a Americans with Disabilities Act compliance policy. Also at the August meeting, the board will begin a review of its policy. District goals also will be revised to show how the school plans to improve test scores. The previous policy referred to the Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CTBS). The school recently went to the Illinois Test of Basic Skills (ITBS), encouraged by the State Dept. of Education. ITBS scores have consistently been lower than CTBS, because of the way the scores are compared to students on state and national levels.

The activity bus contract for 1992-93 was approved and activity bus drivers Lois Coons, Brady Park and Brandy Flanagan okayed. Regular route bus drivers Cindy Fogelson, Gwenda McDaniel, Debbie Bird, John Fogelson, Betty Hobbs, Frank Silva, Kathy Chapman, Janet Tate and Billy Mowell also were approved. James McDaniel, Steve Chapman, Brenda Nelson, Jeanette

Smoot and Pat Montez were approved as substitute drivers.

Lock conducted a board inservice where members were able to discuss their and the superintendent's functions in the budget process and the physical plant.

The board congratulated the FHA/HERO members who excelled at the National FHA Conference in Chicago. The students won several gold medals there.

The 1992-93 budget was adjusted according to State Dept. recommendations to indicate the actual cash balance from the 1991-92 year. The balance was some \$33,000 lower than estimated when the budget was submitted to Santa Fe in May. The budget was adjusted by decreasing teachers budget by \$3,300, equipment decreased by \$23,617 and emergency fund decreased by \$10,000.

The 1992-93 high school handbook and elementary discipline policy were approved.

The next board meeting will begin at 6:30 p.m. for a worksession and 7:30 p.m. for the regular meeting on Thursday, Aug. 13.
