


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

RC & D Celebrates 25th Anniversary

South Central RC&D celebrated its 25th anniversary on Sept. 27.

Tuesday, Sept. 29, RC&D members gathered in Lincoln Woods Annex in Lincoln to honor its own, elect new officers and hear reports on sponsored projects.

RC&D was organized to act as citizen advisory groups to the various federal Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Throughout the years, RC&D has sponsored numerous projects, including a water system, Providencia Ditch Association all in Lincoln.

Long time member, the late Tony Genta of Alamogordo was memorialized with an award for outstanding contributions to South Central RC&D. His widow, Nan Genta of Alamogordo was honored with a personal plaque and her name the first of

many to be on a larger plaque.

Soil and Water District coordinator Howard Shanks announced a \$25,000 grant for the Bonito Lake erosion project. Since some 1,600 tons of soil per acre are estimated erode from the lake side. The project, financed by the Soil and Water Commission, will construct a parking lot with a handicapped access to the lakeshore. Now there are some 300 trails on 1.2 miles of lakeshore.

The grant came from the State Soil and Water Commission.

The village of Capitan and the Town of Carrizozo were granted funds for tree plantings. The Capitan projects are partially completed, with trees planted at the county road yard, senior citizens and the east portal of the village.

The Carrizozo project involves the planting of ponderosa pines, green ash, blue spruce and globe willows at the Fire Department Building and Fred Chavez Park and installation of a drip irrigation system. Shanks worked with Mayor Cecilia Kuhn on writing the grant from SBA Small Business Program.

Shanks considers the community beautification projects an economic development.

More than \$85,000 in funds were generated by RC&D and sponsor grant writing efforts, including those above. Other grants funded this year include the Pecos River Historic Study and James Cayon Stabilization Project in Otero County.

The Pecos River study involves a compilation of interviews, historical photos and documents to show how recent vegetation has affected the waterflow in the river and its tributaries.

Other projects introduced this year: assisting Brenna Gross' small business in Weed, Otero County Economic Study, assisting two small subdivisions near Ruidoso Downs with a community water system.

Progress reports were made on several measures sponsored by SCRC&D. Barbara Luna, regional forester for the New Mexico State Forestry, told of plans being made for Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary.

While Capitan historically is the birth and actual burial place for Smokey Bear, the village may not be a national event place for the celebration in 1994.

Ruidoso To Comment On Highway Options

Grindstone Lake boating project was still afloat and two reasonable highway improvement designs were some of the many items discussed at the marathon Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday.

Councillors instructed staff to proceed with a proposed policy to govern the use of Grindstone Lake for windsurfing and non-motorized boats. The lake will be open to the boating from Memorial Day to Labor Day, only during daylight hours. Users will be required to purchase a seasonal boating permit of \$25 and a weekend use permit of \$10. The weekend fee was recommended by councillor Ron Andrews.

Seasonal village employees will be hired to enforce the regulations and oversee operations of the lake, the village will purchase a liability policy from the New Mexico Self-insurer's Fund. The village also will advertise for and provide a boat concessionaire for rentals, with a percentage of the gross receipts to the village.

As for parking, the village has no control over that at the present since it does not own the surrounding properties. Grindstone subdivision, now in foreclosure with FDIC, surrounds the village-owned Grindstone Dam and Reservoir. The council went into closed session at the end of the meeting to discuss the acquisition of real property. The subject was referred to closed session when councillors came to the agenda topic about discussion of Grindstone Subdivision.

Ed Zindel, executive director of the New Mexico Self-insurer's Fund, which insures the village, discussed the fund and how it can cover such activities as the boating. The council will request a one-third discount in insurance rates, since the lake will only be used for boating for three months a year.

Residents will have another opportunity to tell the New Mexico State Highway Dept. (NMSHD) what it thinks about two new proposed options for upgrading Highway 48 (Mechem Drive) at a public meeting at 6:30 p.m. Monday, Nov. 2, in the Ruidoso Civic Center. An open house informational session will begin at 5 p.m.

NMSHD proposed to upgrade Mechem within village limits about 18 months ago. But original designs to build a five-lane street were loudly rejected by Ruidoso residents and business people. Those objections and new traffic counts on the street were used in the redesign of several new options for the stretch of highway. Project development engineer Alan Whitesel showed the full Ruidoso Council the two designs most considered for upgrading Highway 48.

The first involved a three-lane street, with center turn lane, which goes to five-lane in the most congested stretch between Buckner and Warrior Drive (the Sierra Mall area). The speed limit will be 40 miles per hour and it will take two years to construct the roadway which is estimated to prevent traffic congestion for 20 years. This option also will require the village to move water/sewer lines, at a cost of some \$1 million to the village.

The other option, estimated to take a year to complete, involves rehabilitating the existing roadway and retaining two lanes, except for a turn lane from Innsbrook to Warrior Drive. No utility lines will need to be moved, speed limit will be 35 miles per hour, only 3-5 driveways and no cross streets will be made too steep with the design. This option is estimated to provide congestion free traffic for five years.

The council approved the date for the public hearing.

Councillors approved a resolution to reassign the special environmental gross receipts tax dedicated as collateral on acquisition of assets from the village to Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA). The taxes collected will be used as LCSWA's share in a regional two-county landfill with Otero County Solid Waste Authority. Ruidoso Downs approved a similar resolution and Capitan and the county will also be asked. LCSWA operations revenues are expected to cover any purchase payments to the villages and county.

Councillor J.D. James questioned whether the LCSWA employees are still under a village insurance plan. The employees are currently under the village health and hospitalization, awaiting a policy from LCSWA.

Councillor Ron Andrews left the board to act as a private citizen, declaring a conflict of interest, in the public hearing on the ordinance relating to annexation of the Nelson Tract, just off Gavilan Road. Andrews and his wife purchased the property and propose to make tracts smaller than the one-acre ones stipulated in the original annexation agreement. A protest from developer Bill McCarty led to negotiations with Andrews and finally mutually agreed restrictive covenants which will allow up to five, one-half acre lots.

The council approved the ordinance unanimously.

In other business, councillors:

—Commended Ingrid Schmitt as Village Employee of the Month of September. She

Voter Registration Books Close Oct. 6

November 4 is election day. Any resident wishing to vote, and who is not registered, has until 5 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 6 to do so.

To register to vote, a person can contact the Lincoln County Clerk's office in Carrizozo or contact a voter registrar at most banks and municipal halls.

Voters who cannot go to the polls on election day may vote by absentee ballot. To receive a ballot a voter must request an absentee ballot application, fill it out and return it to the Lin-

coln County Clerk. Sam Chavez, election clerk, will mail the voter an absentee ballot upon verification of the application. The ballot must be completed and returned to the clerk's office before 5 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 31. Absentee ballots mailed too late to be received by the clerk's office on Oct. 31 will not be counted. The office will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Oct. 31 to accept absentee ballots.

Chavez said he has mailed out 118 absentee ballot so far.

loves her job at the village library, especially working with children.

—Approved a policy which requires no deposits for live animal traps used for skunks. The village police do not deal with skunks, unless there is an extreme emergency.

—Waived a \$250 fee to the Chamber of Commerce for use of the civic center, since it had to rent tables and chairs for its event.

—Heard councillor Bill Karn express how good it is to be back and report the Mescalero MRS Citizens Advisory group will meet from 6-9 p.m. Oct. 8 in Alamogordo.

—Heard Mayor Victor Alonso and councillor Andrews talk about the successful Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally this year and thanked the Ruidoso Police and other law enforcement which helped out during the event. Andrews reported some 9,000 people went through the trade show in the civic center and an estimated \$1.7 million spent in the village businesses. Several civic groups had concessions in the center. Andrews' Golden Aspen Rally Association provided the \$1 million liability insurance policy for the event. He was concerned about requiring small groups to provide a similar policy to use the civic center. A committee was formed to look into alternative insurance for small groups.

—Heard the mayor discuss Karn's absenteeism, which is not a legal reason to oust a councillor. Karn said he was absent because he was working on an earthquake damaged house in California with his father. Alonso also worried about councillor Jerry Shaw not attending the work studies prior to the regular meeting. Since the majority of the council approved the work studies, Alonso thought Shaw should also attend and not boycott. Alonso challenged Shaw to either attend or the council should do away with the sessions.

—Noted the Chamber of Commerce beautification award presented to the village for the civic center.

—Paid \$147,002.40 to Bradley Construction Co. for work on the civic center. After discussion about problems with outside and kitchen wiring not meeting code, the council approved the village-contracted electrician inspect all outside and kitchen wiring at the civic center. Bradley's \$99,000 retainer bond will not be released until all items are completed and subcontractors and suppliers paid.

—Heard village manager Ron Wicker report the village water lines are being thoroughly flushed now and will be done every six months to prevent "dirty water."

—Gave kudos to the Lincoln County-Ruidoso CrimeStoppers for winning three of nine national awards.

—Directed staff to make plans for a formal dedication of the civic center, with a report at the Oct. 27 meeting.

—Heard the village MRS committee report on attendance at the New Mexico Conference on the Environment, where an anti-MRS resolution was defeated by the 1,000 registered guests, because of tribal sovereignty. Bob Walters, MRS committee, said the issue of sovereignty is being exploited by the federal government. He encouraged all against the MRS to get politically organized to protest the proposed nuclear waste storage on the Mescalero Reservation.

—Heard Wicker report on the greatly improved water loss situation. Due to diligent work

by staff and training on use of special equipment, water loss was reduced from 15 million gallons last year to 5.5 million this year.

—Heard former councillor Al Jungo ask for shortened meetings. He said long meetings discourage the public from attending.

—Approved a promotional plan from the Chamber of Commerce.

—Approved the annual salt agreement with the New Mexico State Highway Dept.

—Recessed to closed session at 11:12 p.m. to discuss threatend/pending litigation.

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New Bonding Requirements

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) plans to publish bonding regulations that affect mining operations before the end of the year, but not until Congress has completed action on the pending fiscal 1993 Interior appropriations bill.

The rulemaking on new bonding requirements is intended to ensure proper operation on all mining operations on public lands.

Draft Statement For SMES-ETM Published

Mobile, Ala. — The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Mobile District, has published the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the Superconducting Magnetic Energy Storage - Engineering Test Model (SMES-ETM). The Mobile District, with assistance from the Albuquerque and Seattle Districts, prepared this

DEIS for the Defense Nuclear Agency (DNA).

Copies of the DEIS are available upon request from the Corps by calling 1-800-421-SMES, or writing to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Mobile District, ATTN: PD-EI (Eubanks), P.O. Box 2288, Mobile, Ala., 36628-000. Comments on the DEIS should

be provided to the Mobile District, at the above address, by Nov. 6, 1992.

The DNA, in cooperation with the Department of Energy (DOE), is engaged in a Congressionally mandated program which may lead to a decision to build, test and operate a SMES-ETM. Five candidate sites are addressed in the DEIS: Monahan, near Odessa, Texas; White Sands Missile Range, N.M.; Orogrande, N.M.; the DOE Hanford Site, near Richland, Wash.; and Badger Army Ammunition Plant near Baraboo, Wis.

Public meetings are scheduled for late October 1992 at the five candidate sites to receive comments on the DEIS.

A goodly number of Ruidoso area residents were in Las Animas, Colorado, Sunday evening for the installation service for the Rev. Dan Link. He is the former pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Ruidoso and is now pastor in Las Animas. The Rev. Jim Carroll of Alto, retired Presbyterian minister, participated in the installation service. Watching husband and father being installed were Barbara Link and little Hannah.

Vic and Margaret Sweet of Ruidoso, Barbara's parents, made a real trip out of it, traveling up through beautiful central Colorado and then back down to Las Animas in southeastern Colorado for the installation service. Jerry and Bonnie Mattox of the Great Southwest on Sudderth sort of made a vacation trip out of the journey to Las Animas, also. After a busy and good summer, they indicated a few days off were warranted.

We found on a trip to Durango, Silverton, Ouray and Telluride in Colorado that the Aspen trees in that state aren't any prettier than those in the Lincoln National Forest. There are just more of them, about 18 billion more. We didn't detect any valley as pretty as the Hondo Valley when the poplars and other trees are turning. We hope we convinced a magazine writer that the Golden Aspen Motorcycle Rally has many supporters. Maynard Sarvas had a booth at the Civic Center during the rally. He is president of and writes for "Road Rider" which features motorcycle consumer news.

Sarvas said that after talking with some other Ruidoso news people he was convinced and would say that "Ruidoso doesn't want you ... don't come to Ruidoso." He said he would advise anyone to stay away from Ruidoso because of the negative attitude he said he detected while here.

He commented that the new Civic Center is a real plus for Ruidoso, that he knows of a number of communities that would dearly welcome being host to the motorcycle rally (and the revenue it generates) for their towns.

We advised him that he had received a distorted view of how Ruidoso feels about the rally, that it does have many supporters, that Ruidoso tries to live up to its motto: Playground of the Southwest.

Some 2,882 bikers registered for the entire five-day rally. They probably spent \$800,000 while here.

A biker from Canada travelled the most miles.

It's true, some residents don't like the traffic and crowded supermarkets and such. But that's what keeps Ruidoso going — traffic and tourists. Rally sponsors Ron and Jill Andrews had high praise for the staff of the Civic Center, particularly director Kathleen Michelena.

Special events this month should keep Lincoln County's economy healthy. With the Aspenfest activities this weekend, Cowboy Symposium the week following and Octoberfest the weekend after that, wow! The Aspenfest Parade set for Saturday at 10 a.m. along Sudderth always is a crowd pleaser. People from a wide area flock to Ruidoso for that. We hope the Shriners have their little Model-T replicas and, heaven forbid, motorcycles, in the parade. Usually Roswell and El Paso Shriners both, have motorcycle units doing fancy maneuvers down Sudderth during that parade.

Bring an umbrella, not for rain but for Ruidoso's magnificent sunshine. And don't miss the car show at School House Park. It, too, is a crowd pleaser.

We're glad to see Wanda Griffice's smiling face at the Chamber of Commerce every day. She used to fill in weekends only, but now that the staff has been enlarged (thanks to Ruidoso Downs) she's there every working day. She's an asset.

PEROT CONTEMPLATES JUMPING BACK INTO THE RACE...

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—By the time you read this, Ross Perot may have reentered the presidential race—which he never joined in the first place, but from which he withdrew during the Democratic National Convention last July.

My word came from Vivian Doak of Albuquerque, the one Perot delegate to the Democrat convention in New York. Doak felt a little tormented during the convention. She courageously waved Perot banners in the New Mexico delegation amid pleas from fellow delegates not to be an embarrassment.

Tennessee delegates, sitting immediately behind New Mexico, were a bit more direct in their criticism of Doak, since the angle of national TV cameras made it appear she was in the Volunteer State's delegation that was proudly supporting its homestate vice-presidential candidate Albert Gore.

But Doak's feelings of torment didn't come from convention delegates. They came from her own candidate, whose presidential resolve began weakening on opening night of the convention. Doak stayed in frequent telephone communication with the Dallas Perot headquarters and was assured she still had a candidate to support.

Then, three days into the convention, Perot announced he really wasn't a candidate. Doak was heartbroken. She went on national TV to announce her new support for Democratic nominee Bill Clinton. The Perot buttons, with which she had decorated herself the first three days, were replaced with Clinton buttons the last night.

During the following weeks Doak supported the Clinton campaign, checking in frequently with New Mexico Democratic Party Chairman Ray Powell. But last Wednesday she called Powell saying she had just spoken by telephone directly with Perot who told her he definitely will be a candidate.

Doak is pledging her loyalty to Perot.

As this column is being written, Perot is saying publicly that, although his decision is imminent, he will delay any announcement several days in order to let supporters decide whether he should mount an active campaign. He says he will schedule a meeting in Dallas with his state coordinators in the next few days to get their assessment of the situation.

When Perot bowed out last July, he said it was because he couldn't win. At this point, national polls indicate the situation hasn't changed. Perot says he wants to influence the debate on reducing the nation's deficit and debt, but Republicans and Democrats alike are looking for other motives.

Does Perot want to be a spoiler?

If that's the case, the question is what does he spoil and for whom?

Perot's effect on races differs by state.

Republicans fear his intent is to mess things up for Pres. Bush in states like Florida and Texas. But in other states, such as New Mexico, Perot's entry may hurt Gov. Clinton more.

The most recently announced state polling results show Clinton with an 11 point lead over Bush in New Mexico. Unofficial word on that poll also indicates that somewhere around 11 percent of Bush supporters and 20 percent of Clinton supporters say they either would switch or might switch to Perot if the Texas billionaire

gets into the race.

Perot's entry into the presidential sweepstakes will affect more than just the deficit debate. When he appeared to be a serious candidate last spring, the national spotlight quickly switched from Clinton's draft record and personal life to questions about Perot and his fabulous accumulation of wealth. Might that happen again?

And what about the presidential debates? Perot is bound to want a piece of that action. And if Perot and Clinton show up for the debates, can Bush refuse any longer to participate?

Luna said the National Smokey Bear Committee in Washington, D.C. Dept. of Interior, Forest Service Office, chose not to make Capitan one of 12 national event places. Rather, it chose the Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta, since it is a very photographed event and a Smokey Bear hot air balloon may be launched.

Luna, members of Friends of Smokey and Merle Glenn, Public Affairs director for Lincoln National Forest, got together and redrafted the proposal to have Capitan considered a national event place. Such a designation will entitle the village to certain funding. More emphasis was placed on how the village delivers the fire prevention message with its parks and museum.

At this point, the National Smokey Bear Committee has agreed to consider the new proposal.

"No matter what national does, we're going to do it," said Gordon Ross, Friend of Smokey charter member.

The 20 RC&D members present re-elected the officers for another year; chairman Bob Bishop of La Luz; vice-chairman Barbara Luna of Lincoln; secretary Janet Dukes of Alamogordo; treasurer Sue Stearns of Nogal. Officers of Friends of Smokey also were noted.

The bridge over the arroyo near the old school house in White Oaks will be replaced and the road upgraded by the county. The bridge was a concern of RC&D.

Bob Bollinger, from Lincoln County Historical Society, requested RC&D help the society obtain a larger building to expand its library and provide an area for research. The volumes of Lincoln and Billy the Kid materials and interviews of old timers are crowded in the Dr. Woods Annex in Lincoln. The RC&D executive committee was to consider the request.

Ann Buffington of Lincoln gave members an oral tour of the community as an opening of the meeting. Afterwards, members toured the Dr. Woods Annex with moderator Betty Schreengost.

Shanks outlined RC&D goals for the next fiscal year: increase tourism 10 percent with Smokey Bear activities; increase ranch income through fee fishing and hunting; utilize timber resources more effectively in Otero County; continued tree plantings; White Oaks fire department; Angel Mesa, Apple Blossom Subdivisions water system below Ruidoso Downs; Pecos River basin study; Tularosa Creek and Ditch engineering studies; public relations and education; increase minority, primarily Hispanic, membership representation on RC&D council; and participation in the NMSU ag internship.

Members also toured the traveling historic Masonic Lodge exhibit in the courthouse then lunched at Wortley Restaurant.

The next RC&D meeting will be Nov. 24, with location to be announced later.

In case you didn't understand from my discussion last week why Prissy will be the toughest dog in the block, you should remember that Spike doesn't have to be tough because he sounds that way. This is an example of the "Boy Named Sue" syndrome. But can you imagine the handicap the French Poodle lived under who was named "Phydeaux"?

We survived the weekend when the motorcycle crowd was here but it took a considerable show of force and intimidation to keep things under control. There were enough law enforcement officers around to film Smokey and the Bandit XII.

I am sitting here trying to think how to say what I feel about this situation. We encourage and support gatherings of various groups in Ruidoso who have common interests, but we don't necessarily treat all of them the same. We hosted the New Mexico State Bar Convention at the Inn of the Mountain Gods this past weekend, but I didn't see an extraordinary number of policemen on the street. I know the justification may be that lawyers, although dangerous to your purse, are not prone to breaches of the peace, as bikers are, but bikers are human beings and are entitled to the same respect as others.

Our reaction seems to be more of our own doing than what is justified by the facts. In other words, our image of the monster is greater than the beast. Except for our expectations, attending an evening outing with the bikers really isn't much different from some rodeo dances I've been to. We danced, drank, caroused, proclaimed our manhood, beat our chests, had fist fights in the parking lot, chased unattached women, and generally horrified the country club set. How is that different from what happens when a bunch of bikers, or oil field workers, or soldiers, or longshoremen, or numerous other like-minded groups get together for a night on the town?


One distinction might be that they get together primarily for entertainment, rather than just to meet their friends and discuss occupational or technological subjects. Another distinction could be that the bikers are generally a younger group than the lawyers. A third, and probably more important difference probably is the reputation bikers have for violent behavior, which not only affects our response to them, but gives some of them a goal to achieve. Since most people behave about like we expect them to, I would bet on our response being one of the primary reasons for their misbehavior.

At any rate, I think our response was a bit overdone, but maybe next year, if they come back, we can hide our paranoia a bit better.

Somebody the other day commented that I sounded like a Democrat. How in the world could he think that? I certainly don't intentionally try to espouse the philosophy of the Democratic Party, any more than I did the Republican version. I have always tried to be equally critical of both. My basic philosophy of government is "less is better" which is not Democratic, but that the individual is important, which is not Republican. Republicans believe the purpose of government is to create a healthy economic climate in which the business interest can prosper, and Democrats believe the government must intervene to provide people with the basic necessities of life.

I don't buy either one. I think more of the individual than the Republicans do, but I also believe the surest way to lose individuality is to allow governmental intervention in your affairs, however well-intentioned, which gets me crossways with the Democrats.





ACT SCORES—A report recently released on ACT assessment compared test scores for 1991-92 graduates of Carrizozo High against graduates from New Mexico and the rest of the nation. The average composite score for CHS students who were enrolled in core or college preparatory classes was 24, while the New Mexico average was 21.6 and the national average was 22. CHS students who were enrolled in the regular curriculum had an average composite score of 20.4; the New Mexico average was 18.5 and the national average was 19.1. The average for each of the five subject areas tested, for all students who took the test, showed CHS students scoring 23.4 in English, 21.3 in Math, 22.1 in Reading, and 23.2 in Science. The ACT scores reflect those higher order thinking skills, so they are generally considered a good indicator of the skills required to do successful work during the freshman year of college. Carrizozo students who registered and paid the \$15 fee will take the ACT test at Carrizozo on October 22.

SUPERCOMPUTING—Scot Brown, Chad Patterson, Renee Roper, James Smith and Bryan Turnbow will participate in the New Mexico High School Supercomputing Challenge seminar on Oct. 25-27 at Glorieta. The Challenge is a competition for teams of 1-5 students (9-12). They will learn about and experience the power

of supercomputers at Los Alamos and Sandia National Laboratories. The students will be provided with training, technical coaching, equipment loans, on-going support and a chance to win savings bonds, scholarships, and computer equipment for Carrizozo Schools. Teachers Terri Flores and Mariann Patterson are the sponsors.

CERTIFICATE OF AWARD—Carrizozo Schools was presented a certificate of award signed by Alan Morgan, state superintendent and Sam P. Hancock, fair manager. The New Mexico State Fair and the New Mexico Department of Education recognized Carrizozo Schools for their participation in the annual school art education display. This year the art work of 53 Carrizozo students was displayed. Students whose work was displayed at the fair will each receive an exhibitor ribbon.

The Grizzlies had 56 carries for a total of 136 yards, most of which belonged to Barela. His 30 carries plus Carrizozo 123 of their yards, plus his seven tackles allowed him to also lead the defensive team. Nathan Portillo and Herrera also had five tackles each. Defensive Coach Ken Butts had this to say: "They played great defense against a team who is known for their 'run and shoot' offense."

The Grizzlies will attempt to end their losing streak this Friday when they play Animas for their second home game of the season. Kickoff time is 7:30 and we hope to see the home bleachers filled. Good Luck Grizzlies!

The Lady Grizzlies play the Lady Tigers in Capitan today (Thursday) Oct. 1, beginning at 4:30 with a JV match.

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


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
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
