

# BLM Issue Splits Commission

The newly seated Lincoln County Commission split down the middle over the Rio Bonito Exchange issue.

"This has been the most difficult issue dealt with in Lincoln County since I can remember," said newly elected commission chairman Monroy Montes during the county meeting Monday. "This board may or may not reflect the position of the last commission," he added.

And his words proved to be

true. During their first meeting as a five-member board of county commissioners, commission chairman Monroy Montes and Dist. 1 commissioner Stirling Spencer split their positive votes over continuing the law suits filed against the Bureau of Land Management with commissioners Wilton Howell and Ray Nunley who wanted to withdraw them. Commissioner Bill Schwettmann, claiming he did not have enough information to make an informed decision, abstained and thus

negated the action.

As a result, the lawsuits will continue as before. But political lines have been drawn among the new commissioners, at least over the Rio Bonito issue.

Howell requested the discussion about the lawsuits because he feared such litigation could prove too costly for the county. "I like to plead to you not to expose Lincoln County to such a test case," Howell said.

The lawsuits, filed in state and federal district courts last

month by Lincoln County, are asking the courts to decide whether the federal Bureau of Land Management should comply to the county's land use ordinance, especially concerning "land parity", in dealing with the Rio Bonito transfer. The former commission also hoped to stop any further exchanges of the private held lands along the Rio Bonito in the Lincoln area for any BLM lands outside the county, and ultimately, reverse the part of the exchange already transacted. The suits would test

the constitutionality of the BLM's actions.

Howell worried the county's Risk Management insurance carrier for such legal action would not pay for such a legal action, just "to see if our ordinances can tell the federal government what to do with land exchanges."

Howell said he had seen lots of letters supporting the county's suits from other parts of the state and country, but none included any checks. "It's not Wyoming or Montana, it's Lin-

coln County whose going to pay the bills," he added.

Howell's main worry about the long legal battle with the federal government stemmed from the county having passed the land use plan after the exchange had been proposed and brought before the county. He read from case law of similar suits where the federal government prevailed.

"I'm not necessarily for or

## New Commission May Change Meeting Place

The Lincoln County Commission made history Monday.

The five-member board was sworn in by District Judge Richard Parsons early Monday. After a reception hosted by the Lincoln County League of Women Voters, commissioners quickly got to the business of setting up shop before a crowded room of visitors.

Election of a chairman ended when commissioners L. Ray Nunley (Dist. 2), Wilton Howell (Dist. 3), Bill Schwettmann (Dist. 4) and Monroy Montes (Dist. 4) went along with Stirling Spencer's (Dist. 1) request to not be chairman. Instead, they elected Montes by acclamation to serve as chairman.

But a question of whether they could elect a vice-chairman ended in commissioners requesting a public hearing for an ordinance to do just that. Previously, the chairman was elected only by resolution, which by state law does not provide for a vice-chairman. Only when the chairman is absent does the commission select one of its members to serve as vice chair over that specific meeting.

Also, the chairmanship was normally for two years, also at the pleasure of the commission.

Only an ordinance would directly spell out the length of office and provide a vice-chairman. Commissioners authorized a public hearing for the ordinance be publicized.

While the Roberts Rules of Order has been loosely followed in the past, that method of conducting meeting was tossed aside on a general basis and the "Montes Rules of Order" adopted. The "Montes Rule of Order," as commissioners jokingly termed their method to conduct future meetings, will not involve any formal set of rules and regulations, unless an issue during a meeting reaches an uncontrolled state requiring some type of formal order. One reason to forego the Roberts' Rule was to allow the chairman to vote at all times, instead of voting to break ties among the remaining four commissioners.

## Capitan Head Start To Begin Next Week

Capitan area children four-years old may be eligible to get a head start on education with a special program which begins Monday, Jan. 11.

Today, (Thursday) Jan. 7, from 1-6 p.m. parents of Capitan area four-year old children are invited to come to Capitan school and participate in an open enrollment for the Capitan Head Start program. Pre-enrollment for the program will continue through Friday, however, no eligible student will be turned away unless the class is filled.

Parents will need to fill out an application for their four-year olds. To be eligible, the child's family must meet certain income guidelines, which are

similar to the Reduced and Free school lunch/breakfast program.

Head Start, which is federally funded, has been around nationally since 1965. It originated as a way to provide a child development program for children of low income families. The Head Start program encompasses four areas: education, designed to meet child's need; health, medical, dental, mental health and nutrition; parent involvement—in parent education, program planning, and operating activities; social services—to assess family needs and provide appropriate services.

Locally, this is the first year for the Head Start Program. In the works for more than a year, the program is administered

through the Region IX cooperative education center in Ruidoso. The Region IX Head Start is a part of the Child Development Associate Program from Texas Tech University which provides training programs for the instructional assistants.

Margaret Mascarenas is the certified special education instructor. She will coordinate and provide curriculum for both the Ruidoso and Capitan programs. She will be in the classroom at Nob Hill Elementary in Ruidoso with instructional assistants Janie York and Liz Montes.

Juanelle Wright will coordinate the social services and health aspect of the program. She will work with children to

## Transportation Is Subject For Ruidoso Town Meeting

Public transportation is viewed by some as a social responsibility. Public transportation systems save parking space, reduce pollution and traffic congestion.

Nationwide, automobiles generate 70 percent of the nation's smog. It is estimated that if each commuter car carried one more passenger the country would save 600,000 gallons of fuel and keep 12 million pounds of greenhouse gases out of the atmosphere every

day. Use of public transportation reduces the number of single occupant vehicles on the highways even further, providing an environmental benefit.

Public, or mass transportation, will be the subject of a Ruidoso Town Hall Meeting to be held at 7 p.m. Monday, Jan. 11, in Ruidoso Civic Events Center. The two-hour session will be moderated by Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Director Joan Bailey. During the meeting, the public will be able to voice its opinion on public transportation in Ruidoso.

There is no public transportation available in Ruidoso at this time.

Residents who cannot drive for whatever reason, failing eyesight or other problems, no driver's license or just cannot afford a vehicle and its associated costs, must either walk to rely upon someone else to transport them.

The village-subsidized senior citizens center operates a van, but it is strictly for senior citizens.

That leaves visitors and

younger folks left to sit at home, beg a ride or walk.

While walking is healthful generally, it can be a problem for visitors from lower altitudes when they visit Ruidoso at its 7,000 foot elevation. Also, Ruidoso is stretched out over some four miles, and has a considerable altitude drop from Upper Town to the Y. The walk down may be invigorating, but the walk will be a chore.

Private groups have tried to provide public transportation, but had to quit because population fluctuations from summer to winter would not provide a steady cash flow. An answer appeared to be some type of governmental subsidized system.

Two different administrations of the Ruidoso Village Council have considered some type of village-subsidized public transportation.

"There are records of the Lloyd Davis administration having approved the concept (of public transportation)," said Ruidoso mayor Victor Alonso in a telephone interview Tuesday.

The first vote in the Alonso administration for some type of village support of a public transportation system came when Rick Simpson with his SS Bus Lines, proposed the village back his application for funding a trolley-type bus system from the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Dept. "In March 1990 I split the vote in favor of the idea," Alonso said.

Simpson's proposal was turned down by the department

and the public transportation idea was shelved.

Soon after, the village began to look at an airline study to attract some public airline transportation into its Sierra Blanca Regional Airport. An airline attracted to the airport in the summer of 1991 failed, leaving Ruidoso with no air or ground public transportation.

"Then Dick Weber approached the Ruidoso council and asked it to form a transportation committee," Alonso said.

The mayor complied and appointed Weber, himself, councillor Barbara Duff, village manager Ron Wicker, Tom Rigaby, former councillor Patricia Espinosa and others. The committee was motivated to look at both air and ground public transportation.

"We've done a lot of work on the air transportation," Alonso continued.

The committee began to look at public ground transportation when it became aware that the proposed hotel near the new golf course and civic center would not be built. The committee, knowing the village council had two times approved of supporting the concept of public transportation got to work, Alonso said.

Retiree Ed Fleck joined the committee and began to work on a questionnaire to determine the need for, who would provide, fees and what type of public transportation the village wanted and needed.

The committee envisioned a small shuttle bus, mini-van or other, similar small vehicle to provide public transportation for the village. "One of the hopes (of the committee) was the bus would become a tourist attraction and could help sustain itself with advertising on it," Alonso said.

The committee agreed to ask the council to fund a ground transportation study to answer the questions. At budget time, the council approved \$13,000 be set aside this fiscal year for a ground transportation study. The fund was approved with the budget which started July 1, 1992.

Several months ago, Dick Weber, then chairman of the transportation committee, brought a proposal before the Ruidoso Village Council asking for financial support of the Transportation Committee's recommendation to conduct a business feasibility study of a public transportation system. A request for proposals was advertised locally and answered by General Business Consultants of Ruidoso.

Weber, in his appeal to the council, told of how the village can obtain federal funding to cover the cost of purchasing a vehicle and administration of a system.

The New Mexico Dept. of Transportation administers funds for local public transportation systems from the Federal Transit Administration. Each

year Congress sets a certain amount which is filtered down to the state transportation departments. David Madrid is the state Section 19 Program Manager and handles the Section 18 public transportation program. There are other classifications of transportation programs, such as Section 16 which provides transportation for elderly handicapped strictly.

This current federal fiscal year Section 18 provides 80 percent of the cost of the vehicle and operations (including the driver) and 50 percent of the administrative costs. The percentages may change from year to year, Madrid said, depending on Congressional budgeting.

The remaining 20 percent of the purchase and operating match must come from local funding. However, the subsequent second, third, and fourth years would only be for operations and not include the cost of the vehicle. After the fourth year, or when the vehicle reaches 100,000 miles, the municipality is given title to the vehicle to continue to use or sell as part of its future matching funds.

Every public system now operating with federal funds must provide at least one vehicle which is handicapped accessible. The cost of a wheelchair lift for instance will be covered in the 80 percent match, Madrid said.

The state Transportation Programs Division will also offer training sessions to any municipality opting for public transportation systems.

Municipalities as small as Ft. Sumner and Melrose are operating Section 18 funded rural transportation systems. Larger municipalities such as Carlsbad and Hobbs are also receiving federal funding for their public systems. The Ft. Sumner, Melrose and Hobbs systems utilize vans. The City of Carlsbad subsidizes a private taxi company by providing discount coupons worth up to 50 percent of the fare.

The Hobbs system operates a van and is getting its second. It is a demand response operation, or Dial-A-Ride, where the riders call 24 hours in advance to their ride and provide information about destination and so on. The system works well, Madrid said, and ridership is up

dramatically since it began.

The Ft. Sumner system is operated by the DeBaca County Senior Citizens program, but the van is funded with Section 18 money and is open to all the public, not just senior citizens.

Another Dial-A-Ride system is in the City of Boswell. Since 1986 the Retired Seniors Volunteer Program (RSVP) has operated a Section 18 system. It has grown from two 15-passenger vans to its current five, from 600 rides to more than 15,000 rides a year. Overbooked, for rides, the RSVP system requests its riders to call 48-72 hours in advance.

Myra Bass has been the system's administrator for five years.

"Public transportation does not have to be expensive," Bass said. Her program has spent less than \$100,000 on the 15,000 rides last year and runs the system very economically with the use of part time drivers and volunteer help. Rides cost \$1 one way and \$2 round trip.

The system provides many rides to Eastern New Mexico University of Roswell and also provides special transportation for persons with physical and mental disabilities.

The city has subcontracted with RSVP for three years to provide the service. However, the RSVP program will become strictly a system for handicapped, with riders having to be certified by a physician, once the city bus system becomes fully operative this month.

Until about three years ago, Bass had to seek financial help from civic and private groups to cover the percentage matches not covered by the Section 18 funding. She did a lot of publicity when she came in to increase ridership and as a result got good response.

She believes that public transportation provides a way to foster independence of the riders. "It's very devastating to be informed that you can no longer drive," she said. "There is a need of all communities to prevent the dependence on someone else."

It took Bass three years of approaching the city council to get it to subsidize the program. By then the system had been in existence for three years and had proven itself. That made it easier to get the city's support.

"It's important to get city support (to fund the match)," Bass said. "The city has now made a commitment to provide public transportation."

As for Ruidoso's proposed system, she said it is a problem to get support on something that is brand new. She encouraged a study or survey of a public transportation system to determine the size and need. In her opinion the demand or Dial-A-Ride system is less expensive than a fixed route system.

The study proposed by the Ruidoso Transportation Committee, which had money to set aside, was axed when the village council rescinded its approval because of too many questions.

"When we put aside the money we fully intended to answer the questions," Alonso said. By budgeting the money, Alonso said the council was under a mandate to make the feasibility study (for public rural transportation) happen.

After the council rescinded its action to okay the study, the transportation committee agreed to stop meeting.

Now it's the public's turn to say whether it wants the village to subsidize. Anyone interested in public transportation for Ruidoso is urged to attend the Town Hall meeting at 7 p.m. Monday at Ruidoso Civic Events Center. The meeting will focus only on public transportation and no other topic.

Bailey, moderator, hopes that the meeting will provide a forum for people who normally do not come to village council meetings.

assess their needs. Macarenas, Wright, York and Montes will be on hand at the Open Enrollment today to meet parents and answer questions.

The emphasis in the Head Start program will be a multi-cultural, to show children that there are a lot of different people out there, Macarenas said. The Head Start program also teaches the young children how to cope in a social area and will give a slight break from parents to foster independence.

The program also will prepare children for kindergarten the next year.

The Capitan Head Start classes will be a morning program from 8-11:30 a.m. The children will have a classroom separate from the rest of school, where play centers will be set up. Special educational play equipment will be provided, including an outdoor structure which needs some volunteers to erect it. The structure will be separate from the elementary playground.

The children will be fed both breakfast and lunch, in the classroom in a home-type setting rather than the cafeteria. The children will be phased into the cafeteria setting by the end of the program session in May.

Children will be transported to the school in separate buses. Special safety equipped busses for both Capitan and Ruidoso are now on order. Arrangements will be made to pick up children at their home door, deliver them to school and return them home at noon until the busses arrive. Lois Coons and John Fogelsong will be the drivers.

There are some 12 slots still open for the Capitan program. While guidelines for eligibility for the program require Head Start students' families to be low income, the school will allow two students from families above the income levels if there are slots still open.

To enroll, parents need to bring the child's immunization records, some proof of 1992 income, whether check stubs, their 1992 W-2 form or letter from an employer. Children with disabilities may still qualify, even if their parents have incomes higher than the guidelines.

Parents are welcome to come to the school and visit the Head Start classroom and talk to the instructional assistants anytime. Parents who cannot attend the open enrollment program today, may contact Capitan Elementary principal Jerry Newsom at the school for an application.

Newsom was excited about the program, since he has tried

to get some type of pre-school program set up in Capitan. "I wish we could do it for every child, with no income guidelines," he said.

Head Start enrollment will not be limited to students within the Capitan School District. Any families with four-year old children in the Hondo area may be eligible.



Your vote for the \$1.3 million bond issue on Tuesday, Feb. 2, will help Capitan Municipal Schools construct a needed facility for mid-school grades 6-8. Money from the bonds will be used to design and construct a 15,000 sq. ft. facility with seven classrooms and science and computer labs, administrative office space and bathrooms. The extra classrooms will provide enough space for the current student population, and the design will allow for expansion.

Capitan Schools ask voters to help preserve the schools' quality education by providing enough classroom space to maintain current student/teacher ratios shown by test scores to provide education above the state norms in most cases. Capitan's addition of the Head Start program for four year olds also creates a demand for space. Building a middle school will provide additional rooms for the

6-8 grades and will open up classrooms in both the elementary and high school. At present enrollment, there will be 63 sixth graders at Capitan School in the 1993-94 school year, 52 seventh graders and 40 eighth graders, or 155 students in grades 6-8. With that enrollment, the proposed middle school would have 22 students per classroom. Projections for the 1994-95 school year show 37 sixth graders, 63 seventh graders and 52 eighth graders.

Capitan Schools have grown 70 students in the last two years.

A positive vote for the bond issue will cost property owners 96 cents of taxes for each \$1,000 of taxable value of their property in 1994. Taxes will decrease in 1995 to 71 cents per \$1,000 value. In 1996, current outstanding bond debts from previous projects will retire. From 1996 through the retirement of the middle school bonds in 2002, taxes will go back to their 1992 level. That means someone with a \$60,000 home, assessed for taxable value at one-third that or \$20,000 assessed will result in about \$19.82 more in taxes in 1994.

### THE NEED

The Capitan Board of Education is dedicated to the appropriate instruction for all students and to the maintenance and repair of all school buildings in the District. In addition, the Board must continue to maintain and build classrooms in order to meet anticipated growth in enrollment.

The proceeds from a successful election will go towards the construction of a new middle school. The following questions will appear on the ballot for voter approval:

### GENERAL OBLIGATION BOND QUESTION

"Shall the Board of Education of the Capitan Municipal School District No. 28, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds of the District, in one series or more, in the aggregate principal amount of not exceeding \$1,300,000 for the purpose of erecting a middle school and erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings and purchasing or improving school grounds or any combination of these purposes, said bonds to be payable from general (ad valorem) taxes and to be issued and sold at such time or times upon such terms and conditions as the Board may determine?"

Now that he has more free time, we wonder if Hostetter would be interested in running for mayor of Ruidoso. It's a thought. He'd make a good one.


But, then, the village election is well over a year away, some 100 plus days. Would-be candidates have a long time to ponder plans. All of them!

# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—I've taken plenty of guff about a column a few weeks ago in which I criticized the government's appetite for buying private land and went after nonprofit land trusts for aiding the effort.

Lots of folks accused me of biased reporting and strongly suggested I should be presenting all sides of the issue.

Let's get a few things straight. I am biased. I'm not a reporter.

Inside the Capitol is a column that appears on the editorial page of every paper in New Mexico that carries it. Occasionally an editor will run the column on the front page or a page other than the editorial section if he or she feels it appropriate.

But 99 percent of the time this column appears on the editorial page because it is opinion and makes no pretense of being unbiased reporting.

Granted, the opinion columns of other writers by which I am most influenced are normally those that present all sides of an issue when taking a stand. I didn't do that in the column in question.

I have some pretty strong views about government ownership of land. For generations my family was mostly cowboys and farmers. Some of them are still in the business. As a matter of fact, my mother-in-law was the impetus for the offending article. (OK guys, get off my back. It was my mother-in-law's fault, see? Except that she's right.) I played a small part in the Sagebrush Rebellion of the '70s. And I'm mad at the federal government for taking the White Sands ranchers' land a half-century ago and stringing them along on a year-to-year basis. The feds still haven't properly compensated those folks for insensitively depriving them of their lifestyle while they waited a lifetime to get back to their ranches.

In most parts of the world "land reform" means getting property away from the government and into private hands. In this country land reform seems to mean taking it out of private ownership because we're too greedy or dumb to be trusted with the precious commodity.

But, OK. There's such a thing as going too far. Land swaps, for instance, usually are a good deal for all concerned. More acreage typically ends up in private hands because the government has acquired property of higher value. I didn't mean to infer opposition to land trades.

Complaints about my previous column on the subject came from Ruidoso and Roswell where some involved in the Rio Bonito land exchange felt the Lincoln County Commission went too far when it adopted a land-use plan that requires government agencies to maintain the existing ratio between private and public lands in the county.

The problem in Lincoln County is that the government

land that will go into the private sector is in Dona Ana, Valencia and Eddy counties. It matters not to Lincoln County that the Bureau of Land Management will give 30,000 acres in return for 1,400 acres.

If counties are allowed to block land swaps on the basis of what happens inside their boundaries, then any land exchanges will have to take place within a county. The Lincoln County Commission isn't willing to give the BLM credit for a previous land transfer so evidently it isn't possible to build up credits.

Lincoln County is currently suing everyone involved in the land trade in both state and federal court. If the county wins, do you think other counties will give the BLM credit for land

previously put in the public sector in their counties?

A reader in Las Cruces wrote to point out that losing private property from the tax rolls isn't a total loss because the federal government makes payments in lieu of taxes to county governments. He's right, although it is a constant battle to keep federal government payments to local government entities coming in.

The folks at the Nature Conservancy in Santa Fe and I have been playing telephone tag for a week without success. Once we get together, you'll probably see another column carrying some of its views since it was the main target of my carping about aiding the government in its land grabs.

## Free Market Saved Plymouth Colonists

Governor Clinton is getting loads of advice these days, much of it from leftists pushing socialist planning and ever more government controls. But the president-elect would do well to study the lessons of our very first community at Plymouth Bay more than 350 years ago.

At Hillsdale College in Michigan, the authors of a recent commentary in the institution's highly acclaimed publication, *Imprimis*, did some research on how the Plymouth settlement governed itself. Their conclusion sounded startling. "The Pilgrims," they discovered, "were communist. At least, they set out to be."

As related in *Imprimis*, "Plymouth Bay Colony was established as a commune according to the socialist dictum. From each according to his ability, to each according to his need. And so each Pilgrim contributed his harvest to a common storehouse from which everyone withdrew food as needed."

"However," the account continues, "the assurance that they would be fed from the common store, regardless of their contribution to it, had a peculiarly disabling effect on the colonists. Soon there were more needy consumers than able producers, and the Pilgrims very nearly starved to death."

"Desperate to avert tragedy," it went on, "Governor William Bradford proclaimed that each colonist would thereafter be free to do whatever he chose with the fruits of his labor. In other words, he established a free market. Governor Bradford recorded the outcome of his experiment in economic freedom in his diary, from which the following is adapted."

Quoting now, "The freedom had very good success. It made all hands very industrious, so that much more corn was planted than otherwise would

have been by means I, or any other, could use. It saved me a great deal of trouble and gave for better results."

Continuing from Governor Bradford's diary: "The women went willingly into the field and took little ones with them to set corn. Before, they would allege weakness and inability, and to have forced them to work would have been thought tyranny and oppression."

"By this time," said the leader of the first Plymouth Colony, "the harvest was come and, instead of famine, now God gave them plenty. And some of the abler and more industrious sort had food to spare to sell to others, so as any general want or famine has not been amongst them since to this day."

Concluded the *Imprimis* account: "Thus was born the miracle of America's abundance. And those who today propose central planning, common ownership, redistribution of wealth, and government handouts are advocating a system that Americans have already tried and abandoned more than 350 years ago!"

In our estimation, the experience of the Plymouth Pilgrims is a parable for all times—and all countries. Throughout the world, wherever people have thrown off the yoke of tyranny and turned to democracy and self-government, nation after nation has striven to develop a system of free markets. Even in the birthplace of the modern communist state—the former Soviet Union—reform leaders are desperately attempting, however slowly and painfully, to bring about economic freedom as well as political liberty.

Like the Plymouth settlers, they have tried the communist way and it didn't work. Indeed, there's never been a substitute for private initiative. It's a fact of life our own economic tinkers should heed before taking the socialist road to ruin.



## Graphic Designs At Mescalero Hatchery

LAS CRUCES—Visitors to the Mescalero National Fish Hatchery near Ruidoso get a clear picture of the hatchery's mission, thanks to graphic design work adorning the facility.

Louis Oceppek, graphic designer and art department head at New Mexico State University, designed and created informational panels depicting careers available in fisheries and New Mexico's endangered native fish — the Gila trout.

Oceppek began the project in 1987 with former art department head John Catterall. The two collaborated on the first series of panels, depicting fish culture and statistics. They also created a Plexiglas sculpture with trout mounted so that they appear to be swimming in a stream.

Guides use the informational murals at the beginning of tours. By the time visitors see the mechanics of the facility they are already informed viewers.

"It's had a very good response," Oceppek said of the project he finished in July. "It looks like a small gallery — bright colors, good energy."

And although Oceppek has enjoyed fishing for many years, he continues to learn from the hatchery project.

"The Gila trout is an endangered species," he said, "and can only be found in six or eight waters. They number in the hundreds. One of the hatchery's missions is to participate in the reestablishment of Gila trout in New Mexico waters."

The Mescalero National Fish Hatchery is open from 7:30 a.m. until 4 p.m. seven days a week. For more information, or to arrange tours, call (505) 671-4401.

### State Adjusts Withholding Tax Tables

CARRIZOZO MUNICIPAL SCHOOLS RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF SCHOOL BOARD ELECTION AND TWO MILL ELECTION

WHEREAS, 1-22-83 of the Election Code of the State of New Mexico, 1978 Compilation provides as follows: "A regular school district election shall be held in each school district on the first Tuesday in February of each odd-numbered year."

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7 (herein the "Board" and the "District," respectively), in the Counties of Lincoln and Socorro, has determined that a regular school district election be held on February 2, 1993, pursuant to Sections 1-22-1 through 1-22-19, NMSA 1978.

WHEREAS, the following question shall be presented to the qualified registered electors of the Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7:

"Shall the Board of Education of Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7, Counties of Lincoln and Socorro, New Mexico, be authorized to impose a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of the property allocated to such District under the Property Tax Code for the property tax years of 1993, 1994 and 1995 for the purpose of the following capital improvements in the District, i.e. erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings; improving school grounds; and maintenance of public school buildings and public school grounds exclusive of salary expenses of employees of the District and purchasing activity vehicles for transporting students to extracurricular activities?"

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CARRIZOZO MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 7 CONSTITUTING THE GOVERNING BOARD OF SAID DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTY OF LINCOLN AND SOCORRO AND STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. On the 2nd day of February, 1993, there will be held in the Carrizozo Municipal School District No. 7, Lincoln and Socorro Counties, New Mexico, a regular school district election for the purpose of electing three (3) members to the Board.

Section 2. Any resident of the Carrizozo Municipal School District who is a qualified elector of the State of New Mexico who desires to become a candidate for the office of member of the Carrizozo Municipal School Board shall file a declaration of candidacy substantially in the form required by Section 1-22-8 NMSA 1978 in the office of the Lincoln County Clerk, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico, on one day only, December 15, 1992, between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

Section 3. Any resident of the District who is a qualified elector of the State of New Mexico who desires to be a write-in candidate for the office of member of the Board shall file a declaration of intent to be a write-in candidate in the Office of the Lincoln County Clerk, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico before 5:00 p.m. on December 28, 1992.

Section 4. The Board positions and the length of terms for each position to be voted in this election are as follows:

Table with 3 columns: Board Position, Length of Term, and Term. Positions include Board No. 1 (4 year), Board No. 2 (4 year), and Board No. 3 (2 year).

Section 5. All precincts in the Carrizozo Municipal School District shall be consolidated for this election. The polling place for the single consolidated district shall be at the Office of the Superintendent, 800 D. Avenue, Carrizozo, New Mexico. In addition, there will be an Absentee Voter District established, as described in Section 9 herein.

Section 6. The polls for said election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day of the election. Section 7. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the date of the election and a resident of the District on the day of the election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerk of either Lincoln or Socorro Counties in accordance with law. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and wishes to vote at such regular election must register during regular office hours at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County at the County Courthouse in Carrizozo, New Mexico, or at the Office of the County Clerk of Socorro County at the Socorro County Courthouse, Socorro, New Mexico, depending upon the county in which such elector resides, or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerk of Lincoln and Socorro Counties (including the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Lincoln and Socorro Counties) prior to 5:00 p.m. on January 5, 1993.

Section 8. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner authorized by 1-6-1 NMSA 1978 et seq., provided that qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m., commencing on January 29, 1993, and ending on January 29, 1993, being the Friday immediately prior to the date of the election.

against the trade, I'm for practicing good business sense," Howell said.

He saw the county suing the federal government to force it to comply with local laws as "throwing mud clods at a charging elephant."

As of Monday, neither the BLM or the Lincoln Valley Land Company principals (who have proposed the exchange) have answered either suit. Until that happens, the county can easily withdraw the suits, but once the suits are answered the county cannot withdraw unless any of the named defendants or the presiding judge consent. "If they answer," Howell said, "they'll file a counter suit."

Spencer comments to Howell's fears were the county is just asking BLM to comply with its own regulations and the county wants to protect its revenue base through land parity, the paramount issue.

"Some days in a man's life he has to take a stand, we want to make the federal government do what it says it will do, rather than come in and tell the local governing body what to do," Spencer said.

Nunley supported Howell's stand, expressing compassion for those on both sides of the issue, even a little for BLM. He said the issue has gone from simple to complicated due to misunderstandings and possible lies on both sides.

"This has gotten completely out of proportion," Nunley said.

He also worried that a federal lawsuit could be very costly,

perhaps as much as a half million dollars, and become a long process taking three to four years. "I'm not willing to spend my constituents tax dollars on something we'll lose anyway," Nunley said.

He said the best remedy would be to "take our licks on this one and be prepared for the next round" by having a proper document (land use ordinance) in place.

Schwettmann had no comment, because the issue had too much emotional and pocket-book appeal, was too complicated and he was not an expert in law. It did concern him very much to spend "tons of money...and never win or get off the court docket."

County attorney Robert Beauvais admitted such a legal action was not covered by risk management, however, he said the suit only asks for declaratory judgment, or asking the state and federal courts to interpret state and federal laws on whether BLM followed the proper procedure in the exchange. There could only be two areas where counter suits can be filed—malicious prosecution and inverse condemnation (unconstitutional taking of land.) There are no grounds to counter sue on either, Beauvais said.

Beauvais also admitted that the county's chances of succeeding in the suits is relatively low, since the county is asking the courts to look at something never looked at before. But he did not think the legal costs for the suits were not comparable to such suits as wrongful death or compensation.

Beauvais said the crux of the issue was whether BLM's actions were done correctly. He said similar actions are being done all over the Western United States.

Beauvais said he was told by the Lincoln Valley Land Company lawyer that "BLM says this is the one where we draw the line in the sand over the seaway." He said the

ordinances."

"This is staging to be a very important case," Beauvais said. Howell and Spencer argued whether the BLM was willing to provide land parity as requested. Howell said BLM had agreed to parity in the future.

Both Spencer and Beauvais argued BLM has no legal authority to commit any land for exchange or sale until the Resource Management Plans are completed by 1994. The plans may identify as much as 25,000 acres of BLM within Lincoln County meeting the parameters for exchange, such as less than 40 acres and isolated. Arguments also included BLM's refusal to provide appraised values of the properties involved.

Audience comments came from Jeremy Jordan, Lincoln resident, in favor of the exchange who said, "enough's enough." He also worried legal expenses for the suit will impact property taxes and available county services.

Norbert MacIntyre, who owns land on the Rio Bonito said he and six landowners impacted by the exchange have retained Wyoming land use lawyer Karen Budd. "She's filing a suit in Albuquerque Wednesday on our behalf," he said. The suit will be based on continued violation of "takings" of private property and rights.

"She feels the chances of overturning the exchange are excellent," MacIntyre said. "I'd rather cut up the land in five acre tracts and sell them than let the federal government have it."

Bill Hays, resident of Ramon in northeast Lincoln County, asked the commission to represent all the people of Lincoln County and take a stand over the issue to make the federal government follow its own rules and regulations.

David Lee of Lincoln asked that the suits be withdrawn. "I'd hate to see the little valley

(of Lincoln) be held hostage to people with bigger issues in mind," he said. He asked how much the county has spent on the issue to date.

County manager Andy Wynham said in direct legal costs the county has spent \$2,300 including the filing fees.

Cleis Jordan, also of Lincoln and in favor of the exchange, said the properties in question only pay \$500 a year in property taxes, since it is classified as grazing land. Such an amount would be offset in income from tourists to the area. She was not willing to foot the bill for the lawsuits.

Ralph Dunlap, Lincoln resident against the exchange, worried BLM would not be willing to abide by the Lincoln Historic Preservation Ordinance if it was not willing to abide by the county land use plan.

Chris Zamora, Lincoln resident in favor of the exchange, said the monetary considerations were not a primary concern. Payments in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) provided by the federal government to local governments for public lands, pays 34 cents an acre, while taxes from grazing lands are only 3.7 cents an acre. He said it appears the advice given to the county commissioners to pursue the lawsuits was guided by interests outside the county and would be an ultimate expense for the county.

Montes closed the discussion when he said the commission has not committed the county to bankruptcy, rather it has committed to future growth and to its children.

At that point Howell made a motion for the commission to cease support of the suits in state and federal courts. Nunley seconded the motion. Both Howell and Nunley voted yes to withdraw the suits, Spencer and Montes voted no.

Schwettmann abstained because it was such an emotional issue, with the attorney saying the county can't win but it won't cost much and others saying the county could spend as much as \$500,000.

Montes struck his gavel and declared the motion dead.

After the motion, rancher LaMoyné Peters who served on the county Planning and Zoning Commission which initially voted to oppose the exchange said, "I'd rather my tax dollars be spent on fighting for my rights than just quitting."

Commissioner Schwettmann attempted to take his fellow commissioners back into closed session to further talk about the Rio Bonito exchange. "It seems rather gutless to sit here and not make a stand on the issue. Let's go back into executive session and hash it out for a vote," he said.

Wynham quickly replied, "If you go into executive session to decide a position, that is not proper. If you go in to discuss the lawsuit, that is proper."

Schwettmann withdrew his request.

"I don't like executive sessions in the first place," Howell replied.

Commissioners were unanimous in their vote to adjourn and they closed their first meeting at 2:47 p.m.

But if the commission chose to use Roberts Rules of Order, Beauvais said, the commission would have to have a Parliamentarian familiar with the rules or "end up with a mess."

What should have been routine business of setting meeting dates, times and place ended up in Schwettmann's request to strike wording that said commissioners "shall meet...in the Commissioners' meeting room of the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo." Schwettmann said the commission may not always meet in Carrizozo.

Beauvais said by law the commission must meet at least quarterly at the courthouse. County manager Andy Wynham said the resolution setting meeting dates and times just gives notices of when meetings will be held and could be modified at any time by commission vote in open meeting.
