incoln County Sheriff's Office is following up on information on the homicide which was committed in Capitan last week. But as yet police have no suspects.

Thursday, March 24, Capitan police found Herman "Lew" Hulen, 80, clubbed to death in his home at 440 4th Street in Capitan. Police went to the home to do a welfare check of the elderly resident after Hulen's daughter in

California was unable to contact him by telephone. Police also found Hulen's home badly ransacked.

At 2:39 p.m. March 24 Capitan police chief Tony Cano requested a medical investigator come to the home. OMI Dave Vermillion responded, and ordered Hulen's body be sent to the Office of the Medical Investigator in Albuquerque for autopsy.

Cano called in the Lincoln

investigate the homicide on Friday morning. According to sheriff James McSwane he declared the incident a homicide after an investigation. McSwane and deputy Angelo and on Monday the district Vega went to Albuquerque to view the body on Saturday.

that Hulen was killed by area caused by a blunt object. Hulen's skull was crushed and

County Sheriff's Office to his collar bone broken. Autopsy also showed Hulen was dead no longer than 36 hours before his body was found.

McSwane assigned three deputies full time to the case, attorney was notified and assigned an investigator to Autopsy reports confirmed assist the sheriff's office.

The state crime lab team trauma to the head and chest from the New Mexico Department of Public Safety came from Santa Fe Monday and investigated the scene. The team and investigating deputies gathered evidence from the crime scene.


McSwane said the crime has caused the small community of 1,000 to realize there are potential dangers out there. "We're not excluded from crimes that hit other areas in the U.S.," McSwane said Tuesday. "It's always shocking and upsetting that a crime like this could happen."



MainStreet Changes Accomodate Parking

MainStreet Project continues, but not strictly by the original

Ruidoso Village Council, during its meeting Tuesday, authorized several changes to upcoming phases of the MainStreet Redevelopment project. The changes were a result of a three-hour public workshop on March 22 when about 20 business owners and other interested individuals voiced their concerns. The council authorized staff to pursue the use of state severance tax funds previously approved for the River Walk project for construction of public rest rooms.

The remaining changes will accommodate parking. Center Street up to Wingfield will become one-way, which will provide space to build a wider sidewalk to the municipal parking lot on Wingfield across from the police station. The wider sidewalk will comply to ADA handicapped access standards. Parking on the west side of Center will remain.

But a change in the original designs for parking spaces created the most controversy. New councilor Robert Donaldson, a former Planning and Zoning Commission chairman, wanted to continue with the original design plans and not try to create more parking spaces. The designs **eliminated** nearly 70 percent of the parking downtown by

The Ruidoso Mid Town creating wider sidewalk areas which allow pedestrians to pass, or pause. The designs also include planters for landscaping. Donaldson said he was not against saving spaces, but he did not want to ruin the design with long sections of four-foot sidewalks, · such as those being constructed in the second phase.

"I think the second phase looks horrible," Donaldson

Donaldson also was concerned about the handicapped accessibility four-foot sidewalks on the south side of the street. But business owners at the meeting urged the council to allow more parking to be carved out of the MainStreet design.

The building site was raised during the dirt work phase because a late summer rainstorm flooded the nearby high

school and the building site. Strain explained the \$15,000 contingency fund in the construction price was there just for those types of changes. "I don't think it was an absolute must," Strain said about the change. He said the original plans did have positive drainage for the building.

Any balance of the contingency fund would have reverted to the district at the end of the project.

Board president Tom Trost said he was real happy with contractor T.E. Arrington, whose company has been paid

\$501,000 on the project so far. Also Arrington donated the bronze letters of Capitan to add to the Mid School lettering on the building. Payne concluded the tour and report by asking for a meeting with





vidual was inside at Hulen's request, or the assailant entered without permission. There were no signs of forced entry but the door could have easily been forced, McSwane said.

Hulen's 24 cats were picked up by the county animal control officer.

Hulen's body was sent to California for burial in Forest Lawn Hollywood Hills in Los

Angeles on March 30. He had moved to Capitan in 1978 from Santa Monica, CA.

McSwane said Hulen lived alone and kept mostly to himself. However on occasion Hulen would visit a local liquor establishment.

Residents living nearby were shaken by the news. "I'm going to keep my doors locked," said a neighbor.



the original plans and not allow addition of undesigned parking died with a vote of four nays and two ayes.

Councilors will address parking by developing parking lots. They met in a closed session to discuss acquisition of property for a public parking lot. Lease agreement negotiations also are underway with owners of other private areas with parking lot potential.

Some sidewalk widening will be done without taking spaces. In certain areas of Mid Town Sudderth Drive is wider. Donaldson's motion to keep Sudderth Street lanes to 12 feet, and allow wider sidewalks in the areas where the street is wider was unanimously approved.

Councilors approved a landscaping committee of councilor Frank Potter, Donaldson, Margaret Lahey, Mike Radziewicz and Don Miller which will decide on the details of landscaping such as the types of trees and size of planters.

Donaldson differed from the group over a motion to allow construction of a five-foot chain link fence with a 20 foot gate on a property on El Paso Street, for security purposes. The property will be opened for parking during the day. Donaldson and the Planning and Zoning Commission were concerned for public safety, because the fence could interfere with fire department response abilities.

Shaw was also concerned about approving the fence, because it could lead to a "mismatch of fences" on El Paso Street. P&Z is in the process of drafting an ordinance regulating fences in Ruidoso.

A fence requested by another Mid Town property owner gots unanimous approval provided the owner meet conditions that a parking area be laid out, surfaced, spaces delineated and the razor wire be removed from existing fencing. The low single rail pipe fence will enclose the private parking area, accessed by a gate.

A year old village dispute the Rio Ruidoso about a bridge over the river continued Tuesday. Councilors instructed Underwood to meet with owner Susan Merrill's attorney Dan Bryant within 14 days to put in motion a plan to reconstruct the Short Street bridge or some other type of water crossing that complies with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) plans. The village cited the owner for the bridge which was in dire need of repair last year. The owner did improvements to the bridge this year, but was cited for not having a building permit to do so.

Bryant said he was working with the Army Corps of Engineers to develop a plan for a bridge that would meet flood standards. The bridge is the only access to the Merrill property that was landlocked when an alternative side street was washed away by a major flood in 1978.

The Chamber of Commerce building by Two Rivers Park on Sudderth Drive has become one of five designated locations where banners will be allowed in the village. Chamber executive director Joan Bailey requested the location be included because it is a natural spot to promote events sponsored by civic and non-profit groups. Councilors approved the location be added to the four others in the sign policy.

Councilors unanimously approved a 50 year lease with the Humane Society of Lincoln County for use of village property on Gavilan Road for an animal shelter. The village council approved a 50 year lease in June last year, but the society never received a

written agreement.

Councilors denied a request from Dave Anderson to operate a cance rental at Grindstone Lake. Recommendation to deny the request came from the Parks and Recreation Committee which found the applicant not qualifying for the contract instructor program and thus being eligible to be covered by village insurance. A Life With Consequences

The woman looked pitiful as she was being interviewed on the network news, "I just can't quit cigarettes, it's all the extra nicotine they put in them." She brushed back a tear as she testified that she would quit smoking but it wasn't possible. Those cigarette companies did this to me," she said.

I found it amazing that the news person presented the woman's statement without comment or rebuttal, appearing to

accept her assertion.

People in prison have a saying, "If you can't stand the time, don't do the crime." They are addressing the people who want to avoid any notion of consequence for their actions. This woman was making a case for it being someone else's fault she didn't

Most likely, she smoked for many years because she wanted to and because she thought she could avoid the consequences of smoking. We Americans like to think we can all live our lives without consequences.

If they were truthful, 99 percent of smokers would admit they knew before they started smoking that it was not a healthy thing to do. They knew it was a hard habit to break because nicotine is addictive. They have their reasons for why they started and why they continue. But what really matters are the ultimate consequences.

Each of us makes a conscious choice to smoke or not--just as each of us makes a choice to cat healthy foods or drive our cars safely. Look at our public schools.

When parents complain their kids don't get a good education they miss the cause and effect of the situation. While the schools could always do better, research into student achievement shows that the harder the students work, the more success they have.

An odd fact was shown when Vietnamese refugees were put in inner city schools. Everyone knew that those schools were bad. Yet children of refugees got a good education while their fellow students did not. What happened? The Vietnamese parents expected and insisted their children apply themselves while the parents of mainstream children allowed them to fail.

Every time students skip school or do not do their homework there is a consequence. It is much like smoking. Early on the consequences are rarely severe.

At some point, though, the person pays heavy penalties for smoking or not applying themselves in school.

Complaining about the schools reminds me of the woman complaining about the cigarette companies. When all is said and done the student and the woman will pay the consequence for their choice of actions.

The other day someone passed me as I was going the speed limit. They passed over a double yellow line and narrowly missed an oncoming car. They may be able to make that kind of risky maneuver many times before they are killed or kill someone else, but it will happen if they continue to drive like that.

Whether it's driving or sex or drugs, the thing about our consequences is that while they are not applied every time, sooner or later they always come to bear. We do not have a life without consequences--we only have

consequences which are not applied every time. Granted bad things sometimes happen without the victim doing anything. Still, most calamities which befall us are of our own doing. They are simply the consequences of our actions. Whether the woman blames the cigarette company or not,

she still pays the consequences for her smoking.

Each of us has the choice of our actions from which we will reap the benefits or pay the consequences. MS

Trinity Site Will Be Open April 2nd

Trinity Site, where the world's first atomic bomb was exploded in 1945, will be open to the public on Saturday, April 2. The National Historic Landmark is open twice a year, on the first Saturday in April and October.

Trinity is located on the northern end of the 3,200square mile White Sands Missile Range, between the towns of Carrizozo and Socorro. For the upcoming Trinity Site tour there will be two ways of entering the restricted missile range.

Visitors can enter through the range's Stallion Range Center which is five miles south of Highway 380. The turnoff is 12 miles east of San Antonio, N.M. and 53 miles west of Carrizozo. The Stallion gate will be open from 8 a.m .to 2 p.m.

Visitors arriving at the gate between those hours will receive handouts and will be allowed to drive unescorted the 17 miles to Trinity Site. The road is paved and marked.

The second way of entering the missile range is by travelling with a caravan sponsored by the Alamogordo Chamber of Commerce. The caravan forms at the Otero County Fairgrounds in Alamogordo

WHITE SANDS MISSILE and leaves at 8 a.m./ Visitors RANGE, N.M., March 23-- entering this way will travel an escorted group with military police to and from Trinity Site. The drive is 170 miles roundtrip and there are no service station facilities on the missile range. The caravan is scheduled to leave Trinity Site at 1 p.m. for the return to Alamogordo.


> Cameras are allowed at Trinity Site but their use is strictly prohibited anywhere else on White Sands Missile Range.

Trinity Site consists of ground zero where the atomic bomb was placed on a 100-foot steel tower and exploded on July 16, 1945, and the Mc-Donald ranch house where the world's first plutonium core for a bomb was assembled. The crater resulting from the explosion has been filled in and a small monument now marks the spot. The missile range provides historical photos and a Fat Man bomb casing for display at ground zero.

There are no ceremonies or speakers.

Limited food and drink items will be on sale at the site as well as a variety of mementos.

SANTA FE-The Democrat and Republican state conventions each were treated to a gubernatorial speech from candidates that aren't running for governor--yet.

House Speaker Raymond Sanchez, a Democrat, and Land Commission candidate Stirling Spencer, a Republican, delivered speeches that may have caused many delegates to wish they could vote them into the governor's office immediately.

Sanchez's speech to the Democrats was a keynote address, filled with the fire and passion delegates had become accustomed to hearing from Mr. Speaker. They knew they were hearing from a future governor candidate. The only question was when.

Spencer's speech was a much shorter one, scattered amid comments from candidates who didn't have conven- ' tion opposition, but who were given a few minutes to familiarize themselves to delegates.

But the cowboy in the white hat didn't confine himself to land issue. He ranged far into the ills of society and proposed solutions. His speech was short but his words were well chosen and delivered with an energy that brought delegates to their feet as he finished.

Sanchez's good performance was expected; Spencer's was a pleasant surprise to most delegates. Sanchez often has talked publicly of his gubernatorial plans. Spencer hasn't. but he must have thought about it. Perhaps the two will face off for the post some day. Our state could do worse.

The speeches weren't all nuggets. Most sounded like what comes out when you or I open our mouths.

GOP delegates' favorite governor candidate this year. Dick Cheney, spent much of his allotted time speaking out against crime--and then announced that he has five convictions. That brought some amused glances at the press table until Cheney listed his most closely held beliefs.

The major portion of a Bruce King speech usually consists of recognizing familiar faces in the audience and asking the crowd to give them a hand. But looking out at a sea of 1,600 noisy convention delegates, King knew he'd have to try something else.

So he launched into comments about what a fine party Democrats have. When he mentioned the name of Harry Truman and heard some cheers, King was on a roll. The next moments were peppered with names of other former Democrat presidents... "And let's hear it for Woodrow Wilson."

Republican lieutenant governor candidate Joe Carraro opened his speech by saying a delegate had just asked him to drop out of the race and stay in the Senate where he could continue delivering his eloquent remarks. Carraro promised to continue speaking out on the issues from his post as president of the Senate. That guy's gonna have more trouble with parliamentary procedure than Casey

Speaking of Luna, the lieutenant governor, now challenging for the top post, evidently wanted to come across as strong and forceful. But the result was an assault on delegates' eardrums that only some of the younger generation, already deafened by the noise level of rock bands, could endure.

Patsy Reinhard, a Democrat candidate in Congressional District 2, listed distinguished professors of economics and public policy under whom she has studied. Instead of cheers or knowing head nods, delegate reaction seemed to be that 'she'd win the debates, "but isn't she too smart to be in Congress?'


Gloria Baca-Griego, a secre-

Mrs. Tyree served chips and dips, vegetables and ice tea while the tears and laughter continued.

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



COUNTY OF LINCOLN ORDINANCE NO. 1994-8

> RIFKIN CABLE INCOME PARTNERS, L.P., D/B/A LINCOLN CABLEVISION. FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

A FRANCHISE ORDI-NANCE, GRANTING A PRANCHISE TO RIPKIN CABLE INCOME PART-NERS, L.P., LINCOLN CABLEVISION, TO OPERATE AND MAIN-TAIN ITS SYSTEM FOR THE PURPOSE OF PRO-VIDING, FURNISHING, DISTRIBUTING, AND SELLING CABLE TELE-VISION SERVICES TO THE INHABITANTS OF LINCOLN COUNTY: SETTING FORTH CON-**DITIONS ACCOMPANY-**ING THE GRANT OF THIS FRANCHISE: PRO-VIDING FOR COUNTY REGULATIONS: AND PRESCRIBING PENAL-TIES FOR THE VIOLA-ITS OF PROVISIONS.

WHERBAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Lincoln have the lawful authority to enact ordinances for the health, safety, and welfare of the citizons of Lincoln County: and

WHEREAS, it has become necessary to enact a new Ordinance relating to the grant of a Franchise to Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision, to use the public right-of-ways of Lincoln County for the installation and maintenance of its utility system; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lincoln has been notified of the pending sale of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision, from Rifkin Cable Income Partners. L.P., a Delaware limited partnership, to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., a Georgia corporation, d/b/a CVI Cablevision Industries; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lincoln heroby expressly authorizes the transfer of this Franchise to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., after passage, if the pending sale is consummated and Alert Cable T.V., Inc., becomes the owner of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/ a/ Lincoln Cablevision;

NOW, THERE-FORE, BE ITORDAINED the Board of County Commissioners in and for the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, as follows:

SECTION 1 - REPEAL: Franchise Ordinance 16 passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County on May 7, 1970, and filed for record in the Lincoln County Clerk's Office on May 11, 1970, in Book 34 of Miscellaneous Records at Pages 26 through 28, inclusive, and all amendments, revisions, and addends therete are hereby repealed in their antirety. SECTION 2 - SHORT

TITLE: This Franchise Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "RIFK-IN CABLE INCOME PARTNERS, L.P., D/B/A LINCOLN CABLEVISION FRANCHISE." SECTION

DEFINITIONS: For the purposes of the Franchise Ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivatives shall have the meaning given herein. When not inconsistent with the context, words used in the present tenso include the future; words in the plural number include the singular number; and words in the singular number shall include the plural number. The word "shall" is always mandatory and not merely directory. The captions for each paragraph herein are for convenience only, and such captions shall have no force of law, are not to be a part of the paragraphs set forth, and are not to be considered in constraing the language of the paragraph.

(a) "Company" is the grantee of rights under this permit. Company name: Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/s Lincoln Cablevision.

(b) "Commission" is the Board of Commissioners of Lincoln County, State of Now Mexico.

(c) "Persons" is any person, firm, partnership, asso-

ciation, corporation, company, organization, or individual of any kind.

(d) "System" shall mean the utility systems necessary to and incidental to the providing, distributing and selling of cable television service to the inhabitants of Lincoln County, and access to Grantoe's system by its customers outside of Lincoln County.

(e) "Grantor" is Lincoln County, State of New Mordeo.

(f) "Grantee" is Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision.

(g) "Franchise Area" -The grant authorized by this Ordinance is inclusive of the geographic area bounded by the political subdivision of Lincoln County excluding the corpor rate boundaries of the vari ous municipalities located within the County.

(h) "Public Right-of-Way" The real property interest owned or claimed by the County by deed, dedication, or other recorded instrumont, or unrecorded prescriptive easement. SECTION 4 -- GRANT OF AUTHORITY:

A. There is hereby granted by Grantor to the Grantee the right and privilege to use the public right-of-ways for their utility systems, as applicable, as necessary and incidental to the use of the same for the inhabitants of Lincoln County or other customers of Grantee beyond the boundaries of the County.

B. Without limiting the

generality of the foregoing, this Franchise grant shall and does hereby include the right to utilize the public right-of-ways in the County; to install, crect, operate. and to acquire the use of, by leasing or liconsing, any and all utility systems necessary to and incidental to the delivery of cable television service, and the right to repair, replace, and extend said utility systems. SECTION 5 — COM-PLIANCE WITH APPL-ICABLE LAWS AND ORDINANCES:

The Grantee shall, at all times during the life of this Franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power of the County. as codified by statute, ordinance, case law or the common law of New Mexico. Grantee further agrees to be bound by such reasonable regulations as the County suant to its police powers authorized by common law.

Additionally, Grantee shall, at all times during the life of this Franchise, comply with and abide by all of the laws of the State of New Mexico and the laws of the United States of America, to the extent such laws and regulations are applicable to Granteo's operations. SECTION 6 - LIABILI-TY, INDEMNIFICA-TION, AND **INSURANCE:**

A. now active cub caused Ray to transfer the bear to his own home in Santa Fe. His cocker spaniel and little daughter Judy tried to play with the bear to help him forget his hurts. Both the pup and Judy soon learned that the cub was still a wild animal and played quite roughly. Like a child, the bear was cross and cranky when he was hungry. He didn't make a gentle pet but he did like to sleep in Mrs. Bell's lap.

Harold Walters took several pictures of Smokey that have been shown all over the Nation. Elliott Barker, Chief of the Game Department in 1950 and Kay Flock of the Forest Service contacted the Forest Service in Washington, D.C. to see if the government might be interested in using a live bear in their fire prevention campaign. The Advertising Council agreed that the national poster featuring a live Smokey would benefit in keeping down the number of man-caused fires, but they had no idea how great a success the little bear from New Mexico would be in awakening the world to fire prevention.

With all the red-tape necessary to be handled before Washington agreed to bring Smokey to the National Zoo in our Capital, it was late June before plans were completed to give Smokey a home in our National Capital.


