Candidates for county offices filed their names in the county clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo on Tuesday.

Candidates for county commission positions are:

District 2--incumbent democrat Lonnie Ray Nunley; no Republican candidate.

District 4--Democrat Preston L. Stone; Republican incumbent William Schwettmann.

District 5--incumbent Republican Monroy A. Montes; no Democrat candidate.

County Clerk: Incumbent Republican Martha McKnight Proctor unopposed.

Incumbent Republican Gerald Dean Jr. unopposed.

## Picacho Hereford Places Fifth In Weight Testing

A Hereford bull from the Marrs/Smith Herefords of Picacho was fifth place in the 1993-94 Tucumcari Bull Test sponsored by New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service.

The bull placed by gaining an average of 4.87 pounds per day during the 112 days of the test that ended March 1.

The test identified bulls with superior genetic ability for growth and feed efficiency. The highest gaining bull was a Charolais belonging to the Grau Charolais Ranch of Grady which averaged a daily gain of 5.59 pounds. Test sponsors attributed the high gains to good weather and good bulls.



**RUIDOSO SUPER SELECT SALES BARN** may soon become the Lincoln County Rural Events Center in Glencoe. Governor Bruce King signed two legislative bills that will provide \$290,000 in state severance taxes for purchase and operations of the facility. Lincoln County Commissioners on a 3-2 vote approved an agreement to purchase the building and property with the state funds. The agreement was sent to the Ruidoso Super Select Sales Inc. board of directors for consideration. It is now up to the board to approve the sale. The board, whose president is Grady Stowe of Vernon, Texas, includes George Middleton secretary, Richard Thompson registered agent, David Gibson vice-president, directors Gerald Blue, Alton Goodrich, Joan Hubbard, Cary Pogue, Art Shahan and H.C. Werner. Proposed uses of the facility include the annual Cowboy Symposium, Arabian horse shows and leasing to a group for a museum. Commission chairman Monroy Montes has promised that county taxpayers will not be burdened with operational costs for the facility.

## Capitan Buys Water Rights

Faced with a deficit of water rights, Capitan Village trustees unanimously approved the purchase of 12.1 acres of water rights.

Last year the village pumped more water from its well than it has water rights for. To avoid penalties from the state water engineer, trustees accepted the negotiated price of \$6,200 per acre of water rights for the 12.1 acres. The water rights are agricultural rights and each acre equals 3.25 acre feet of water.

In 1992, the village was nine acre feet short, and 18

short in 1993. The village used 155 acre feet of water in 1993, but has rights for only 140 acre feet.

Mayor Norm Renfro opted to discuss the purchase of the rights in open session. Attorney Robert Beauvais advised trustees they had to take some action on the water rights offered now, or re-solicit bids. The offer was the only response to an advertised bid, solicited by the former board and mayor. Trustees and former mayor Frank Warth authorized Beauvais to negotiate to get a lower price than the \$6,500 first offered. Beauvais said the \$6,200 per water right, for a total price of \$75,020 for the 12.1 acres, was the lowest price the sellers would accept.

Beauvais recommended the village purchase the rights to bring it even on its water deficit and give it time to study future water needs. "Capitan is becoming very popular, there is no rental property," he said.

The 12.1 acres of water rights are underground rights and are not subject to flow, as are the Eagle Creek rights.

The village has funds budgeted to purchase the water rights, but it will not be obligated to pay for them until the seller take all legal steps with the state engineer to transfer the rights. The sellers also have the burden to prove the transfer of the rights will not adversely affect adjacent water rights owners and to pay all related costs. Also to help deal with water

issues Mayor Renfro recommended his recently appointed water advisory committee be elevated to the status of a board, with scheduled meetings open to public input. Trustees accepted his recommendation and Beauvais will begin the process of codifying the board with an ordinance.

Dr. Bernie Reimann appointed as village water advisor will also be a member of the water advisory board. He said he made a new study of

## Carrizozo Board To Review Superintendent Applications

Tuesday, March 22, the Carrizozo Board of Education will hold a special meeting at 6 p.m. to review the applications submitted for the position of superintendent of schools.

At the regular board meeting Tuesday, March 15, president Jan Barham announced that 18 applications for superintendent had been received, with the possibility of getting more. She said the board will accept mailed-in applications as long as they were post-marked by March 15, the deadline for applications.

Barham said that the March 22 special meeting will be open to the public, but the names of the applicants will not be revealed until a final group is selected and informed.

Also at the March 22 meeting, board members will decide whether to interview all applicants, or screen the applications and narrow the selection to a group of finalists, then interview those. Barham and Leroy Zamora wanted to interview all applicants.

Students who ride the Greer and Hefker buses will have to buckle up. The board approved an addition to their policy, and to the student handbook, which will require students on the two small buses to wear appropriately adjusted seat belts. The board approved a recommendation to begin the policy, since the

small buses have seat belts installed. The small buses are considered less safe than the large buses which have built in protection. Barham requested letters be sent to all parents of the students who ride the buses informing them of the new seat belt policy, and that students who do not wear the seat belts will be subject to discipline.

Polly Chavez was hired as the DDS Instructional Assistant. Michael Gaines was approved as a substitute bus driver.

Superintendent Jim Bayless reported on a memorandum from Alan Morgan state public school superintendent about outcomes of the 1993 legislative session. Lawmakers appropriated an additional

\$95,167 million for the operation of public schools statewide. The state will provide \$2,015.70 per unit (student) for the schools 1994-95 tentative budgets. Last year schools received \$1,934.51 per student unit.

The increased funding is estimated to provide Carrizozo Schools with 2.13 percent more money than last year, however that depends on the actual student population. Bayless said as the 1994-95 budget is developed by the budget committee they will look at staff raises.

Sharon Baker reported on the changes being made to the Chapter I math program. Students will not longer be taken from the classrooms for

the program, rather they will receive the one on one help within their regular classroom settings. Baker hopes this will help improve students' math scores.

Carrizozo People for Kids (PFK) is working with the school and student body in a project to replace the curtains on the stage of the old gym. Fabric samples and price estimates will be considered at the next PFK meeting.

the occupancy of the village and found 1,274 sites to which the village is obligated to provide water. Of those 590 are in the original part of town and 684 in the subdivisions. There are 592 water accounts now, 344 in the old townsite and 258 in the subdivisions. Those figures indicate the village is only serving about 40 percent of its potential water customers.

Reimann said the water advisory board will do a study to establish how much more water the village will need in the future. He recommended the village work more with Eagle Creek Water Association to find out how many water rights and how much water the village can get from that source.

A Farm Home loan is in the works to construct a new water line from Eagle Creek to Capitan. Reimann said that all Eagle Creek water due to the village should be stored. He said the water advisory board will look into various ways to obtain funds to construct storage, with grants leading the list, followed by low interest loans, bonds, user fees and taxes. He said he wanted to avoid the bonds, user fees and taxes. Once the pipeline is completed, within a year, the water and associated water rights from that source will help alleviate the water rights deficit for the village.

Trustees also approved a payment of a bill for \$3,600 to Eagle Creek Water Association for use of water rights from January 1992 to December 1993. The water rights were leased and transferred to the well to avoid the penalties for taking more water than the village has legal rights to.

Lincoln County Fair Association made a written request for a \$1,500 donation from the village. The association, which recently reorganized as a nonprofit group, requested the funds because the village uses the fairgrounds facility as a polling place.

Fair association secretary

Jean Cunningham said the group sought the donation because the fairgrounds are also used as a community center, with events that attract many people to town. She said the funds would be used to buy trophies, buckles and prizes, or to purchase display tables.

Renfro said the village does want to get involved with helping the fair, but he was concerned about violating the anti-donation clause. Beauvais said the village cannot by law make an outright donation and he cited a specific attorney general opinion that donations of prizes and trophies are a violation. During discussion it was indicated the village could appropriate \$1,000 to the fair association.

Beauvais said some agreement could be reached to provide funds from the village to the fair association, but not for the use of the facility as a poll. Beauvais said he understood that the fair association must create a user fee structure for the facility. "A \$1,000 a year user fee is a little stiff for an election," he said.

Beauvais suggested the fair association earmark the village money for promotion and advertising events at the fairgrounds. Then the fair association would use its own funds to buy prizes and display tables. That type of appropriation would not violate the anti-donation clause because the village has no lodgers' tax.

The village will need a contract from the fair association showing the funds will be earmarked for promotion and advertising and that the association will provide quarterly reports to the village on how the funds are spent. The situation will be similar to the agreement between the village and the Economic Development Corporation of Lincoln County (EDCLC).

"We have to show a tangible benefit to the town to keep from violating the anti-donation clause," Beauvais said.

Trustee Connie Hopper told Cunningham to go back to the group and decide how to spend the \$1,000, then come back to the board. Association member Jody Roberts agreed his group will need funds to promote and advertise their events, especially with the Smokey Bear 50th anniversary celebrations this summer.

Renfro made more appointments which trustees unanimously approved. Dr. Reimann was appointed to the Environmental Wetlands Advisory Board, Renfro appointed himself to the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District board, Gordon Ross to the EDCLC, all members of the Cemetery Board were reappointed and Jim Russell, Gilbert Montoya and Van Shamblin added to the Planning and Zoning Commission. Leroy Montes, Renfro and Dr. David Rouleau were appointed to the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Association board. Hopper was appointed Public Safety Advisor, L.C. Cozzens Personnel Director and Byron Carpenter Street Advisor.

John Whitaker was appointed alternate municipal judge. Court will be held from 2-4 p.m. each Wednesday in village hall.

Clerk Deborah Cummins reported she completed a survey for the Community Development Block Grant and found the village has 53 percent of low to moderate income families. The grant requires a community have at least 51 percent low to moderate income families to qualify.

In audience comments, Dorothy Smith a member of the Planning and Zoning Commission asked that since there is now a water advisory board that group consider water requests, instead of P&Z.

## 1 + 505 Dialing Required By June 19th

ENMR Telephone Cooperative has announced that on June 19, 1994 all 1+ in-state long distance telephone calls will have to be dialed 1 + 505 + the 7 digit phone number. Exceptional growth in New Mexico and the increasing popularity and use of fax machines, computer modems, and cellular phone is rapidly using up the pool of available telephone numbers. The new dialing program will create a larger amount of available telephone numbers for the future.

Telephone customers who have preprogrammed speed dialing numbers, fax machines, computer modems or any other automatic dialing equipment, are asked to go ahead and reprogram all in-state long distance numbers to 1 + 505. Reprogramming must be completed by June 19.

Also, operated assisted calls, such as person to person calls, credit card calls, or collect calls, will need to be dialed with the 505 inserted between the 0 and 7 digit phone number. This also includes Directory Assistance calls. Phone calls to 911, local calls, and long distance calls to other area codes will not be affected by the new dialing program.

At present, in-state long distance phone calls will be completed with or without dialing 1 + 505. But, after June 19th, in-state long distance phone calls dialed without the 1 + 505 will be connected to a recorded message directing the caller to re-dial.

All telephone customers are encouraged to get in the habit of dialing 1 + 505 before June 19. By doing so now, they will have plenty of time to get used to including the 505 on all their calls within the 505 area code.

# Carrizozo Golf Course Contract Not Renewed

The proposed lease of the old ice plant was the topic of discussion, both in open session and behind closed doors, at the Carrizozo Town Council meeting March 8.

Newly elected trustees Ruth Armstrong and James "Willie" Silva were present for the meeting as were trustees Harold Garcia and Eileen Lovelace and re-elected mayor Cecilia Kuhnel.

Carol Schlarb was sworn in as town clerk-treasurer and Charlie White was sworn in as chief of police. All town employees were re-hired.

The 19-minute closed session to discuss contractual agreement resulted in no action being taken by the board.

After the closed session the proposed lease of the old ice plant was discussed. Michael Cane told the board he wanted a ten year lease on the building for the \$20,000 he is willing to pay for improvements on the building instead of paying rent for the ten-year period.

The last lease offer presented to Cane was for Cane to pay no rent for seven and a half years in exchange for the \$20,000 in improvements. Cane said he could not do it for seven and a half years.

Cane said he has spent \$5,000 repairing the roof which still leaks, new doors on the back of the building, cleaning of the property, and electrical work.

Trustees told Cane the lease agreement would be in place by the March 22 meeting.

Mr. Tony Elias of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District conducted the public hearing for input for the 1994 Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) project.

The maximum amount per project will be \$400,000 and the majority of the people being served by a CDBG grant must be low to moderate income. Senior citizens qualify.

Suggested CDBG projects are for more street improvements and low income housing. A decision will be made at the March 22 meeting.

Town foreman Faustino Gallegos presented photos of streets that are deteriorating because there is no curb and guttering.

The town is conducting a survey to determine if people living on the streets will qualify for the CDBG requirements.

No action was taken on the agenda item for discussion of mobile home in restricted areas. Armstrong wanted the matter sent to the town attorney for review because of technical things, ordinance, and protective covenants.

BLM employee Bill Murry reported more than 94,000 people visited Valley of Fires

last year. A bookstore at Valley of Fires should be open by April 1.

Murry said BLM has applied for a grant for money to make Valley of Fires handicap accessible with a handicap trail on the lava bed. It will be the only handicap accessible trail in a lava flow in the United States. He asked the town to write a letter in favor of the project.

When it was announced a man was interested in the golf course the *News* asked about the situation. Mayor Kuhnel said that the present caretaker (at the golf course) would leave March 10. The *News* asked when an announcement was made that Mr. Ted Turnbow would be leaving the golf course.

Apparently Turnbow had not had a valid contract since last May and had been operating on a month to month agreement.

Kuhnel said at no time did the board deny Mr. Turnbow to renew his contract and that he (Turnbow) did not renew the contract.

The town received a \$500 check from Vista Grande Telecommunications for around-the-clock lighting for the veteran's memorial in the park across the street from City Hall.

Trustees approved a hangar

site lease agreement with Jim Crouse.

Chamber president Mary Lou Webster spoke to the board about the Art in the Park program planned for June 11 and 12. She said insurance for the two-day event would cost about \$500 a day and asked the town to waive the insurance requirement.

Webster also said the circus

which will be sponsored by the chamber will be in Carrizozo May 11.

Police chief Charlie White said Operation Alliance plan to demolish the red brick apartments has been cancelled because required studies would cost more than \$18,500.

The 1994 District VI meeting of the New Mexico Municipal League will be held in Cloudercroft March 24.

## One World Problems

It was a defining moment for me. I was standing at a train station in Tokyo when a man said, "Oh, I see that you're from America—do you know Harvey McClelland?" No, I didn't know him. He thanked me and walked away. I wondered what he would have done had I known a Harvey McClelland in America. He might have instructed me to "Tell him François is hi." Maybe hand me a twenty and tell me the next time I saw Harvey to pay it back. Or relate a story about Harvey and him during World War Deux.

I was put off by the man's notion that because I was from America I'd automatically know someone, unless it was Elvis—I could have said I didn't know Elvis, but I had seen him once. Harvey McClelland was just an ordinary name and, after all, we are a big country.

We feel isolated by our bigness here in America. You can literally spend days driving across Texas—even weeks if your truck runs like my truck.

Our land is so immense that when things happen in other parts of the world we do not feel as if it has any bearing on us here in America. The wars in far off lands are just something to watch on television while we wait for Wheel of Fortune to begin.

While guns are firing and people are dying our momentary interest and attention turns to Sarajevo, Afghanistan or Mogadishu. Americans like to watch the news, if nothing else, to see the pyrotechnics, most of which were manufactured in the good old U.S. of A.

When the cameras move on, our interest also moves. But when the echoes of gunfire end, the real damage to that area of the world is just beginning.

In Afghanistan, the fighting stopped several years ago yet the education system has not restarted. With the education system gone, it is obvious that Afghanistan will have a whole generation of citizens with no formal education.

Here is the point. It should matter to people living in the heartland of America that people on the other side of the world are sinking back into the dark ages.

And it should not be the way we feel when we see a dead dog on the road. It should be the way we feel when a close relative suddenly dies, it is a personal loss when part of our world is injured.

When a whole region of the world sinks back into the dark ages, the collective ability of the entire world is degraded. The danger is that a whole region of the world will begin thinking with brains educated in the dark ages.

Saddam, the "Mother" of all dark ages thinkers also got a lot of innocent people killed.

America should not try to export our educational system to these areas of the world any more than we should be supplying the weapons for these conflicts. Rather, America must help these regions of the world by sending them teams of educational facilitators to assist them in restarting their educational system.

As the news cameras pan across the refugees, we should consider that some of the people, whose faces are seen so briefly as they flash across our television, may someday become the leaders of their countries. Some may be the ones who will promote peace in the region, while others may help find a cure for cancer.

Harvey, wherever he is in America and François, who is somewhere in France, may someday benefit from their actions. That's assuming these people get an education. MS

### Bald Eagle Survey


Department of Game and Fish biologists surveying for bald eagles in January counted 478 birds, slightly under the count of 487 in 1993. The

1994 total represents about a 120 percent increase over averages for the early 1980s and about a 60 percent increase over averages for the late 1980s. The highest count was in 1990 when 512 bald eagles were counted.

The count is not a complete count of all bald eagles in the state but is a sample of seven areas that include most of the state's major eagle wintering areas.

## Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE**--Rep. Joe Skeen's legislative assistant Bruce Donisthorpe was the first to respond to a recent column about the continuing frustration of ranchers "temporarily" kicked out of the White Sands area a half century ago to make room for a World War II bombing range.

Lee Onrud of Carrizozo reported getting beautiful letters but no action from Skeen and many others he contacted about the plight of the 14 surviving ranchers.

Donisthorpe says congressional efforts to address the situation now have become a waiting game. After the failure of legislation to solve the problem, he says, "it's obvious we're not going to get a free-standing bill through the House or the Senate."

The problem is with opposition from powerful congressmen and every president, secretary of Defense and secretary of the Interior that we've dealt with, says Donisthorpe.

What we'll have to do, he says, is attach an amendment to a bill providing reparations for past injustices to another group and do it in a way that it still will pass and the president won't veto it.

And that will be tricky. Donisthorpe says the last 10 reparation measures introduced in Congress have died in one house or the other or were vetoed--no matter what the subject.

The major impediment is with an old court decision saying that since minor reparations were made by the federal government many years ago, further relief is not required. Congress does not like to overturn court decisions and it doesn't want to establish a pattern of giving money to groups that say they were unfairly treated in the past.

But Donisthorpe says his office hasn't given up hope of finding the right "vehicle" for his amendment. Who knows, maybe it will be Hazel O'Leary's promise to seek compensation for victims of the plutonium experimentation that was occurring in New Mexico at the same time and for the same national defense reasons.

Donisthorpe also responded to a couple other items from my last Southern New Mexico column. He says there isn't much need for concern about the falling out between Gov. Bruce King and Lt. Gov. Casey Luna affecting work toward a spaceport in New Mexico.

Of prime importance was the \$300,000 appropriation by the '94 Legislature for moving along the state's effort. After that, Donisthorpe says, the ball carrying is mainly done by the congressional delegation, especially Rep. Skeen and Sens. Pete Domenici and Jeff Bingaman, who all sit on finance committees dealing with space.

In fact Skeen's committee has an important hearing this week concerning the space program. The big issue now, according to Donisthorpe is what sort of vehicle does the country need for its commercial and defense programs. He says the Delta Clipper being developed at White Sands by McDonnell Douglas is perfect for both needs.

The small, single-stage, reusable features of the DCX make it perfect for the downsizing required by the military and the economy and efficiency required by the private sector, Donisthorpe notes.

On a different space travel subject, Donisthorpe explains that Rep. Steve Schiff's office has taken over the lead from Skeen on the Roswell UFO crash investigation. The reason, once again, has to do with which New Mexico congressman sits on the right committee to handle the situation.

Because of Schiff's appointment to the House Government Operations Committee, the Albuquerque congressman is in the best position to determine why a 47-year continuing coverup of a downed weather balloon is so important. Many New Mexicans feel the coverup is evidence it wasn't a weather balloon that crashed.

Schiff has taken some political ribbing about why a congressman from a neighboring district would be getting involved in a Southern New Mexico matter. But then if it had been Bill Richardson hounding in, no one would have asked why.

"I know this seems to be opposed to all you have been taught about social relationships and community obligations, but keep in mind, all of those things were invented by individuals who distrust their fellow man because they expect him to act as they would in similar circumstances."

"The first necessity of life is survival." "Those who do not survive only fit into the equation to instruct us in what not to do in order to survive." "If you will think about it, all social constraints are directly related to survival." "We use our political and social powers to prevent others from encroaching on our personal abilities to survive, but in the process, the principle of sacrifice is built in because there seldom are enough resources for all to maintain the same level of existence." "The evils of society are mostly related to imposing sacrifices on others in order to distribute more benefits to those who think they are being deprived of their just deserts." "As you can see, nearly all moral concepts that we ordinarily discuss are related to economic issues and are enforced by the power of the masses."

"Are there moral issues which are not related to the survival of the organism?" "I'm glad you asked that, because, yes, there are." "The distinction between survival morality and personal morality is between those constraints which are necessary for the distribution of wealth on the one hand, (i.e., food, shelter, etc.) and those which contribute to the development of personality." "Most of what you find will relate to the first class because although everyone is concerned about the second, nobody does or says much about it." "I guess the reason is that they don't understand what it is, although the two concepts are interrelated."

"How do you know if something is right or wrong if it is strictly for your own benefit in the development of your personality?" "The answer is found in the concept of 'positive versus negative.'" "Positive influences or actions are those which advance the integration of your personality, and conversely, negative influences or actions retard its growth." "I know you are thinking that this statement is self-evident and not very hopeful, but hold on until I

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
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



## The Legend of Smokey Bear by Dorothy Guck Chapter VI

Most of us have never been close to the raging fury of a forest fire. We have seen the smoke billowing up in a giant cloud - in the distance. We have watched the brilliant yet eerie lights of the flames at night - in the distance. But the fire fighters sweat, and dig line, working until totally exhausted at the very edge of the fire, trying to harness the power of the burning flames.

The second Monday of May, the violent winds forced the fire in the Capitan Mountains to race wildly in its path of destruction. The exhausted men could only back off from the untamed flames for their own safety. In camp, there was a general air of despair.

The crews had seen the carcasses of several animals caught by the fire. They even sighted a small cub bear on a stump in the smoldering area.

"Leave him be," the crew boss warned. "His mother may be close."

The next day, Tuesday, May 9, 1950, the wind subsided to a slow drive of the mountain fire. Crews set out with great hope of their efforts being more successful in building lines that might control the blaze.

Boss Simmons examined the ground around the tree. "No sign of the mother's tracks," he said. "That little fellow is too young to exist without a mother. Who wants to bring him down?"

The crewman who had first sighted the bear climbed the tree. He secured the cub in one arm, who seemed to welcome the help getting him down to the ground.

"Golly," the soldier exclaimed. "Look at his burns! Poor little 'hot-foot-teddy!'"

The cub whimpered like a human baby, licking the sore pads of his feet.

In camp, weary men grinned to see that one tiny creature had been rescued from the blazing inferno.

Ray Taylor, one of the camp cooks, fashioned a bottle to give the cub milk. The bear's

tiny tail wiggled like that of a lamb as he drank, and made him purr like a kitten. The soldiers fed him candy. Salve was smeared on his burns, then he was placed in a cardboard box to quickly fall asleep.

As the daylight began to dim, Ross Flatley, who had been on the fireline, was preparing to return to his ranch home close by. He agreed to take the cub home with him for the night.

When his wife, Pat, saw the bear in the box, she said, "Good Heavens he is sick! He has spit all over himself, and he smells awful. I don't think he'll live until morning. Put the box out in the storage room where it is cool and

quiet."

It was the candy that made

the bear sick, after being days without food. It was the burns

that smelled so badly. Poor little 'hot-foot-teddy!'"
