

# County Recycling Is Model Program

Lincoln County Commissioner Wilton Howell was elected chairman of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

Meeting Monday in Ruidoso Downs, members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) elected Howell to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of

former chairman Frank Warth. Warth resigned after losing his bid for re-election as mayor of Capitan. LCSWA consists of elected officials and appointed members from each municipality and the county.

Curbside recycling will begin the first week of April for residents of Ruidoso Downs. LCSWA manager Joe Lewandowski and recycling coordinator Kerry Krumseik

presented the plan to the Ruidoso Downs Village Trustees. Residents must call the LCSWA office at 378-4697 to sign up for the curbside recycling program. LCSWA will provide blue bags in which participating residents can place #1 and #2 plastics, aluminum cans and newspapers. Cardboard will be accepted if flattened. The bags and cardboard will be picked up every

week on the same day as trash pick up.

There will be no charge for the curbside recycling program in Ruidoso Downs, but residents must sign up to participate. The program will be financed with a grant from the New Mexico Energy Minerals and Natural Resources Department.

Krumseik reported participation in the county-wide

recycling program is on the rise, with an average of 30 tons of recyclables being processed at the center each month. The new bailer has increased the efficiency of the program.

Krumseik said he visited Alamogordo recently and encouraged that city to begin a recycling program. A load of newspapers were delivered from Alamogordo to the

LCSWA recycling plant recently. Krumseik said the empty transfer trash trucks returning from the regional landfill south of Alamogordo could pick up recyclables and return them to the LCSWA plant, as long as the materials were donated.

The LCSWA recycling program is considered a model

## Magistrate Candidates All Qualify

All candidates for the Lincoln County Magistrate Judge Divisions I and II qualified for their race.

According to Sam Chavez, election deputy in the Lincoln County Clerk's office, the signatures on the petitions for all magistrate candidates were confirmed, and the candidates have received letters officially stating their paperwork is in order.

Republican incumbent Gerald Dean Jr. is unopposed for the Division I position. For Division II are Democrat candidates Danny Garcia and William Butts, and Republican candidates Trinidad Zepeda, Paul Wersich and Ken Nosker. The party candidates will square off in the June primary. The winner of each party will be on the ballot in November.

Candidates who filed with the secretary of state on March 15 for the State Representative District 56 position are incumbent Democrat John Underwood of Ruidoso, and Republicans Dub Williams of Ruidoso Downs and Caren Cowan Bremer of Ruidoso.

District 56 includes all of Lincoln County, parts of Otero County including Mescalero Apache Reservation and Tularosa, and a small portion of Chaves County.

## CCCI To Meet Next Monday

Carrizozo Citizens for Community Improvement will meet at 3 p.m. Monday, March 28, at United New Mexico Bank.

The group organized last year under the direction of the South Central Mountain RC&D Council, Inc. In July 1993 the South Central Mountain RC&D Council, Inc. and the State Economic Development Department sponsored two community meetings in Carrizozo to determine the priorities of local businesses in terms of economic development. Participants indicated two main areas of concern were town appearance and assistance to small businesses.

As a result of the meetings, the Carrizozo Citizens for Community Development

## Sen. Campos Committed To Helping Small Communities

New Mexico Senator Pete Campos attended the Carrizozo Town Council meeting Tuesday. Campos was instrumental in getting money appropriations for the town during the recent state legislative session.

Campos helped bring \$1,760,000 in state money to Lincoln County this year. He works closely with State Representative John Underwood in trying to meet the needs and requests of the people in this district.

Campos said his district includes many small communities and he wants to help retain the quality of life in small communities.

Carrizozo Trustee James "Willie" Silva said the town is "going to take a semi load of wants and wishes up to

Campos front door and will use the semi to bring the money back."

Campos said an eight to ten mile stretch of Highway 54 will be improved soon and he wants to help improve the community. He spoke of the commitment the people of Carrizozo have made and said it takes initiative and a rejuvenated approach.

Campos attended the town council meeting at the request of Silva. Campos father and former state legislator Al Romero attended the meeting with Campos.

In other business, trustees agreed to apply for CDBG (community Development Block Grant) money to continue street improvements. Town foreman Faustino Gallegos and town clerk Carol Schlarb recently conducted a survey of the streets proposed for im-

provements and confirmed the majority of the residents living on the streets are low income which is a requirement for qualifying for CDBG money. Senior citizens automatically qualify as low income.

The CDBG application is to be in Santa Fe April 1. Mr. Tony Elias, director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) in Roswell said the applications from this district will be hand-carried to Santa Fe to make certain they are there on time.

Elias also assisted with evaluating the proposals the town received for engineering services for the current street improvement project which is scheduled to begin this summer. Dennis Engineering was selected. The town will begin

## Carrizozo Bids Farewell to "Sally"

A memorial mass was held at 10 a.m. today (Thursday), March 24, at Santa Rita Catholic Church in Carrizozo for the Honorable Judge Salvador M. "Sally" Ortiz, 80, who died March 20 following a short illness.

Judge Ortiz is survived by his wife of 58 years Cecilia Vidaurri Ortiz; children and their spouses, Gilbert and Sallye Ortiz of Abilene, TX; Mike and Betty Ortiz of Pueblo, CO; Robert and Beverly Ortiz, Tom and Linda Ortiz, Gloria and Mike Prickett all of Albuquerque. Also surviving is his brother Joaquin "Kino" Ortiz of Alamogordo and many grandchildren.

Judge Ortiz was preceded in

death by his parents Joaquin and Juanita Ortiz and brothers Manuel of Carrizozo and Leo of Tularosa.

Born in Miami, Arizona in 1914, Judge Ortiz's family moved to Carrizozo in 1919. The family moved back to Arizona then returned to Carrizozo when Ortiz was in the 10th grade. He finished high school in Carrizozo and married soon after.

Judge Ortiz died doing what he liked the most—law enforcement and public service. He had only recently been re-elected as Carrizozo municipal judge, a position he held since he was appointed by mayor Johnson Stearns in 1968. At that same time he

was elected to fill the magistrate judge position vacated by Bill Payne.

## Mandatory Kindergarten Registration Dates Set

All children who will be five years old by Sept. 1, 1994 are required to participate in a mandatory registration for kindergarten.

Region IX Education Cooperative and the local school districts have scheduled this year's kindergarten registration and preschool screening clinics. A free developmental screening for all children ages birth to five years will be available at the same locations as the registration. Children will be screened in the areas of height and weight, vision, hearing, speech and language, motor development and dental.

Preschool children who demonstrate a need for early intervention will be referred to the proper services.

The public health nurse will also be at the registration programs to give immunizations. Parents should bring children's shot records if

immunizations are to be updated.

Carrizozo have continuously re-elected Ortiz as their town judge.

Judge Ortiz was honored with a Gold Award plaque for 30 years of public service from the New Mexico Municipal Judges Association last summer.

Judge Ortiz told THE NEWS, in an interview in August 1993, that he began his career in law enforcement in 1948, when then sheriff Nick Vega asked him to be deputy. Soon after the county Democratic party chairman asked Ortiz to run for sheriff, which he did successfully. Ortiz proved so successful as sheriff he was re-elected and served through 1954. During

those years Ortiz said he closed down gambling in Ruidoso and successfully investigated a murder of a well known Corona rancher which ended in a conviction and was featured in the October 1950 issue of "Unsolved Detective" magazine.

Judge Ortiz was also elected as state representative for Lincoln County and served one term in Santa Fe. After two years in Santa Fe, Ortiz returned to Lincoln County to be elected as magistrate judge, sheriff, then magistrate judge again.

In 1959 sheriff Ortiz made the national news when he

program with one of the best processing centers in the state.

LCSWA members also reviewed a draft handout which describes LCSWA services; recycling, trash pickups and new drop off sites for construction trash, yard wastes and large items such as appliances and furniture. The handout will include information about illegal dumping, and the regulations concerning the use of LCSWA dumpsters.

Residents in Hondo Valley can drop off construction debris, yard waste, appliances and large items the first Saturday of each month from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Commercial haulers of such trash will be charged \$6 a cubic yard. Residents can also take construction, yard and large item trash to the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Monday through Friday for no charge. No commercial trash will be taken.

The recycling center in

Ruidoso Downs will handle limited amounts of commercial/construction trash for \$6 a yard.

Capitan Landfill is open Monday through Saturday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. for construction, yard and appliance/large item trash, at \$6 a cubic yard. The landfill is also a new recycling drop off site.

Lewandowski also presented his recommended policy for special pickups. LCSWA will make special pick ups of brush, limbs, pine needles, construction debris, appliances and so on. The special pickup services for limited amount of trash are provided at no charge for residents in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. Special pickups will be provided for residents in Capitan and the county for a charge. Contact LCSWA in Ruidoso Downs at 378-4697 for an estimate. Payment must be made before the service is performed.

LCSWA will provide special pick ups in Carrizozo and Corona, if solid waste contractor Southwest Disposal Corp. does not provide such a service. If such a service is not available from Southwest, special pickups will be made with the same terms as for Capitan and county residents.

The handout will include information concerning illegal dumping.

Lewandowski reported illegal dumping has decreased dramatically after several violators were cited by Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies. Some construction waste haulers were also cited for unsecured loads.

One of the first items of business new chairman Howell conducted was to call a closed session for discussion of personnel. When the board returned to open session about 45 minutes later county member Bill Schwettmann

called for a termination notice to be sent to employee Cathy Eisen and that she be placed on administrative leave with pay as of March 16 because her LCSWA supervisor did not follow LCSWA rules and regulations when he terminated her March 16. Eisen was to be on the administrative leave until she was given a notice of termination Monday afternoon. She was invited to attend a preliminary grievance hearing Wednesday, March 23.

Members also reviewed the LCSWA financial statement which shows a budget with overall operation at 63.6 percent expended and 63 percent revenue collected. Lewandowski said he will begin the 1994-95 budget process next month with figures that reflect actual expenses and revenues for the operation in its first full year of service. The current year's budget was based on many unknowns and includes accounts for maintenance, major purchases and other expenses that will not recur next year.

Members continued to question the overtime paid to LCSWA employees. Lewandowski said he has authorized no overtime to regular employees but the nature of the route supervisor's job results in 5-10 hours overtime each week.

On Feb. 28, Lewandowski turned over 26 county residential billings to the LCSWA attorney. The billings totaled \$2,556.06. The 26 billings did not respond to the two certified letters sent to them informing them of LCSWA's legal ability to conduct foreclosure proceedings in order to collect the bills. Certified letters were mailed to more than 300 delinquent customers all of whom but 26 responded. Some of the customers had inaccurate property descriptions or had sold the property. Lewandowski said county residents must contact the county assessor's office to clarify their property descriptions before LCSWA will adjust the billings.

Lewandowski also said the foreclosure action is mostly to get the attention of the delinquent customers. So far three of those facing foreclosure action have attempted to pay their past due bills. LCSWA member J.D. James questioned how much it will cost LCSWA in legal fees for attorney Bob Beauvais to process the foreclosure actions.

A separate fund will be set up in the accounting for the foreclosures.

"We just can't continue to ignore those bills," Lewandowski said.

Howell requested a report on the legal costs at the next meeting.

County services collections continue to lag behind with some \$21,010.50 overdue as of March 14. County residents have paid \$21,365 on the current billings.

Lewandowski also reported on LCSWA's payment of the Environmental Gross Receipt Taxes toward the financing of the Otero/Lincoln Counties Regional Landfill. LCSWA has paid \$37,665.32 to Alamosordo. Alamosordo has returned \$4,985.92 to LCSWA, because revenues are now coming in from the landfill. Lewandowski said he expects the total amount LCSWA has paid to be reimbursed from landfill revenues.

Upon a recommendation by new Capitan representative Dr. Bernie Reimann LCSWA will present former chairman Frank Warth a plaque of appreciation.

The next regular meeting of LCSWA will be at 9 a.m. April 18.

negotiations for a contract with Dennis Engineering, the firm that provided engineering services on the last street improvement project.

Trustee Eileen Lovelace was appointed mayor pro tem.

Trustees were in a closed session for 55 minutes to discuss contractual agreements. After the closed session the council agreed to offer a 10-year lease to Michael Cane in exchange for \$20,000 in improvements to the building, the old ice plant located behind Four Winds Restaurant near the overpass.

Two weeks ago Cane refused the town offer of a seven and a half year lease for the \$20,000 in improvements.

Town attorney David Stevens will re-write the contract.

Steve Uslan, president of the New Mexico Pilot's Association, spoke about the Carrizozo Municipal Airport.

He said the airport is unique because it is almost in the center of the state and is a good place to stop. He mentioned the scenic area and wanted activities expanded at the airport.

When asked about the cost of insurance for Fly-Ins at the airport, Uslan, a private insurance agent, said the town insurance should provide coverage for Fly-Ins.

Schlarb explained the town insurance covers everything at the airport except Fly-Ins.

Uslan did say most people insure their planes and the town's policy would be the last to "come in play," and said the town insurance should cover everything at the airport, including Fly-Ins, revivals or arts and crafts fairs.

The 16-minute discussion about mobile homes in restricted areas resulted in the matter being tabled again for the town attorney to make a ruling.

Newly elected trustee Ruth Armstrong wanted to know which has precedence, restricted covenants or zoning law.

Town Attorney David Stevens said he had not seen the restrictive covenants and needed to see the restrictive covenants before making any decisions.

Stevens said a restrictive covenant can be more strict than an ordinance and he would be glad to give an answer if he had all the information.

Stevens said he would not sign his name on anything until he sees the documents.

Armstrong wanted to table the matter until the lawyer could look at it. Trustee Willie Silva wanted to know, "What are we after?"

Stevens said, "Something tells me this centers around a specific situation," and mentioned a lot of litigation concerning restrictive covenants, etc.

Apparently, the property in question is in the McDonald edition.

Bids received for the airport roof came in much higher than the previous estimate of \$3,500.

Allen Roofing Co. of Roswell submitted a bid of \$11,500.56, Wind Walker Construction of Capitan submitted a bid of \$8,000, Ned's Plumbing and Remodeling of Carrizozo submitted a bid of \$5,958.12, and Lone Mountain Contracting of Bosque Farms submitted a bid of \$5,500 plus tax.

Schlarb explained the town only has \$3,500 with 50 percent of that to be paid by a grant from the department of aviation.

Trustees agreed to accept the bid from Ned's Plumbing and Remodeling contingent on the town adjusting their half

Trustees accepted the bid presented by Ned's Plumbing and Remodeling contingent on approval by the county. The town will also have to provide \$1,377.58.

Anyone interested in leasing the golf course should contact the town in writing. Public comment will be taken at the April 12 meeting.

Trustees agreed to transfer \$1,000 from the general fund to be used for equipment at the golf course. Armstrong

cast a nay vote.

Mary Lou Webster, president of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, asked the town to waive the insurance requirement for the Art in the Park event planned for June 11 and 12 in McDonald Park.

After a lengthy discussion, trustees agreed to allow the chamber to hold the event without insurance. Trustee Harold Garcia abstained from voting.

Public concern about the possibility of having a juvenile detention center built in Carrizozo was discussed.

Garcia said, "We need to find out if the public wants it or not," and added, "we need to consider a public referendum."

Other items discussed were the need for street signs, enforcing the weed ordinance this summer, and possibly changing the name of Carrizozo Recreation Center to a Civic Center.



The Environmental Assessment is available at Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.



**Inside The Capitol**

**SANTA FE**—We may be hearing some exciting news soon out of Victorio Peak.

That's the hill, straddling the Dona Ana-Sierra county line just inside White Sands Missile Range, where a treasure hunt has been underway on and off for over 50 years.

It's the hill that geologists say couldn't contain large, deep caverns.

Nevertheless, Terry Delonas and a group of true believers, called the Ova Noss Family Partnership, have been on a quest the past seven years to prove that Doc didn't invent the wild story as a money-making scheme.

They've found the shafts and tunnels that Doc described. Ground radar has located the deep chambers that shouldn't exist. The problem has been in getting to those chambers. All the passages have been backfilled during the 40 years since the area was closed off by the military.

Various drills have been brought in to tunnel to the caverns. The newest will drill at any angle. Delonas is currently in California getting expert analysis of the latest radar data. When he gets back, he expects his team of geologists and engineers finally will have a great shot at drilling into one of those chambers.

Will the caverns contain anything of significance? Even Delonas isn't sure. He's always believed the caverns were there, but many people may have been in and out since Doc was killed in 1949 and since the military closed the area in the early '50s.

There are as many stories about who has taken the treasure out as there are about who hid the treasure there in the first place. Apache chief Victorio was only the last of many fabled to have stashed their bounty there. Before him it was a fleeing Mexican Emperor Maximilian, Catholic priests, miners, conquistadors, and unrecorded expeditions from Europe and North Africa dating back before Christ.

Rumored to have been involved with removing the treasure are people who had business dealings with Noss, military personnel up to the rank of generals, and politicians all the way up to presidents.

Current military authorities at White Sands and in the Pentagon have been much more helpful to Delonas and his family than in earlier years. Former Secretary of Defense Les Aspin has been interested in the search dating back to his days as chairman of the House Armed

Services Committee.

Sen. David Clinton of Arkansas, Pres. Bill Clinton's closest congressional ally, also has been helpful. As a result the Noss group already has received a year's extension for its search. U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen's office says an additional extension is likely, if it is needed.

As to the possibility of military personnel, or anyone else having taken gold, coins, or artifacts from the peak, Skeen's office says it is told by White Sands officials, that modern identification techniques can trace any valuable items back to the caverns.

And why should the military be so interested in tracing such valuables? If anything is found in the caverns beneath Victorio Peak, or if anything is found to have been in the caverns at one time, a lengthy court battle will determine how the treasure is split. The federal government is sure to be a claimant, as will the state, the Noss family, and all others with stories about their connection to the booty.

Maybe Delonas will discover nothing more exciting than the 7UP bottle Geraldo Rivera found in Al Capone's vault. But even if no treasure is located, it appears the two-year search inside the peak already has revealed much of historical interest.

The shafts that have been dug out and sucked out by a huge vacuum machine disclose strong evidence that Victorio Peak and a nearby spring have hosted many peoples over many years, whether to rest, to hide or to stash treasure.

And if all is right with the

world, Terry Delonas, his mother, his aunt, and the rest of his family and friends will realize some good from what has been a lifelong quest for many of them—to finish the search Grandmother Ova had to give up upon her death in 1979.



## Tony Sanchez Visits Pilot Son Aboard Aircraft Carrier

When it came time for Navy Lt. J.G. Adrien Sanchez to come into port after a six-month Mediterranean Sea and Indian Ocean deployment he thought it a good idea for his father, Tony Sanchez of Carrizozo, to have a chance to take a three day ride aboard the huge aircraft carrier U.S.S. America.

Sanchez contacted his father about the Tiger Cruise, which is a type of lottery where 300 male relatives of seamen aboard the aircraft carrier are chosen to be aboard the ship for three days and come into port at Virginia Beach. Tony told Adrien to put his name in for the lottery.

Adrien called and told his dad that he had been chosen for the cruise. Tony flew to Virginia Beach where he boarded a Navy chartered airplane to Bermuda. From Bermuda he and the 299 other visitors were helicoptered aboard the USS America which was returning from its six month deployment. Sanchez's squadron, Attack Squadron, 85, as well as the other squadrons of Carrier Airwing One as part of the USS America Joint Task Group, served in the Sharp Guard until the end of October. These operations helped enforce the United Nations' sanctions in the former Yugoslavia. Later they

traveled to the Indian Ocean to support the U.N. operations in Somalia, where Carrier Airwing One flew more than 900 missions in five weeks. The wing also flew missions into southern Iraq from the Red Sea in support of Operation Southern Watch.

Staffed by 70 officers and 260 enlisted men, Sanchez's squadron flies the A-6E Intruder, a carrier-based attack bomber developed for conventional ground attack in all weather conditions day and night and just one of the seven different squadrons aboard the USS America.

During the deployment, Sanchez made port visits to Trieste, Italy; Corfu, Greece; Haifa, Israel; Marseilles, France and Malaga, Spain.

When the carrier came into Bermuda, it took on the 300 visitors of the Tiger Cruise. While aboard the aircraft carrier, which is one of the last conventionally powered ships with the longest flight deck in the Navy, Adrien showed his Dad his A-6E Intruder on which he is a bombardier navigator.

For the three days aboard ship Tony had to stay with Adrien his host, but he had run of the carrier. Tony stayed in Adrien's berth which was directly below the 4.5 acre flight deck, ate in the galley, saw the hangars where the planes are stored, sat in the captain's chair, went on top to the flight deck. With a

5,200 man capacity, the carrier is so large Tony had to make notes of the location code for Adrien's berth and other areas, so he wouldn't get lost.

"I liked the ready room. There I got to watch the planes land on a TV with cross hairs. The planes had to line up or they couldn't land," Tony said.

But sleeping in the cramped berth with six other navy airmen directly underneath the metal flight deck where planes took off day and night proved hard for Tony, accustomed to the quiet of Carrizozo. Adrien showed his Dad how to overcome the noise and get some sleep—earplugs.

RIFKIN CABLE INCOME PARTNERS, L.P., D/B/A LINCOLN CABLEVISION, FRANCHISE AGREEMENT

A FRANCHISE ORDINANCE, GRANTING A FRANCHISE TO RIFKIN CABLE INCOME PARTNERS, L.P., LINCOLN CABLEVISION, TO OPERATE AND MAINTAIN ITS SYSTEM FOR THE PURPOSE OF PROVIDING, FURNISHING, DISTRIBUTING, AND SELLING CABLE TELEVISION SERVICES TO THE INHABITANTS OF LINCOLN COUNTY...

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the County of Lincoln have the lawful authority to enact ordinances for the health, safety, and welfare of the citizens of Lincoln County; and

WHEREAS, it has become necessary to enact a new Ordinance relating to the grant of a Franchise to Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision, to use the public right-of-way of Lincoln County for the installation and maintenance of its utility system; and

WHEREAS, the County of Lincoln has been notified of the pending sale of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision, from Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., a Delaware limited partnership, to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., a Georgia corporation, d/b/a CVI Cablevision Industries, and

WHEREAS, the County of Lincoln hereby expressly authorizes the transfer of this Franchise to Alert Cable T.V., Inc., after passage, if the pending sale is consummated and Alert Cable T.V., Inc., becomes the owner of Rifkin Cable Income Partners, L.P., d/b/a Lincoln Cablevision;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of County Commissioners in and for the County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, as follows:

SECTION 1 - REPEAL. Franchise Ordinance 16 passed by the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County on May 7, 1970, and filed for record in the Lincoln County Clerk's Office on May 11, 1970, in Book 34 of Miscellaneous Records at Pages 26 through 28, inclusive, and all amendments, revisions, and addenda thereto are hereby repealed in their entirety.

SECTION 2 - SHORT TITLE. This Franchise Ordinance shall be known and may be cited as the "RIFKIN CABLE INCOME PARTNERS, L.P., D/B/A LINCOLN CABLEVISION FRANCHISE."

SECTION 3 - DEFINITIONS. For the purposes of the Franchise Ordinance, the following terms, phrases, words and their derivatives shall have the meaning given herein.

(1) \$600,000.00 for bodily injury or death to any one person;

(2) \$250,000.00 for property damage resulting from any one occurrence;

(3) Within the limit of \$1,000,000.00 for bodily injury or death and property damage from any one occurrence.

B. The Grantor further warrants and represents that it shall maintain, throughout the term of this Franchise, insurances at least equal to the amount of the above-stated limits for all liabilities assumed herein.

C. The Grantor shall notify the Grantee within thirty (30) days after the presentation of any claim

evidenced by the filing of a complaint in appropriate state or federal court, or demand, whether by suit or otherwise, made against the Grantor on account of any alleged act or conduct on the part of the Grantee arising from activities carried out under authority of this Franchise.

D. The Grantee hereby agrees to indemnify and otherwise release the Grantor from all claims by third parties arising from the construction, installation, repair, operation, or maintenance of the Grantee's utility system, if caused by the negligent act(s) and/or omission(s) of the Grantee and/or Grantee's officer(s), employee(s), and/or agent(s).

SECTION 7 - COMPLAINT PROCEDURE. The Grantee will maintain a business office for the purpose of receiving inquiries and complaints from its subscribers and/or customers.

The Grantee will establish a procedure for resolution of complaints consistent with the regulating requirements of the Public Service Commission or the State Corporation Commission, as appropriate.

SECTION 8 - OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE OF SYSTEM. Grantee agrees to operate its system in compliance with all applicable rules and regulations of the State Corporation Commission, Public Service Commission, the U.S. Department of Transportation and other appropriate body(ies) governing said operational services.

SECTION 9 - LIABILITY, INDEMNIFICATION, AND INSURANCE. A. The Grantee hereby warrants and represents that Grantee has in place a program of insurance such as to enable Grantee to pay any liabilities arising from the construction, installation, repair, operation or maintenance of the Grantee's system, if caused by the negligent act(s) and/or omission(s) of the Grantee and/or Grantee's officer(s), employee(s), or agent(s) as follows:

(a) The Grantee shall, at all times during the life of this Franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power of the County, as codified by statute, ordinance, case law or the common law of New Mexico.

(b) Without limiting the generality of the foregoing, this Franchise grant shall and does hereby include the right to utilize the public right-of-way in the County; to install, erect, operate, and to acquire the use of, by leasing or licensing, any and all utility systems necessary to and incidental to the delivery of cable television service, and the right to repair, replace, and extend said utility systems.

(c) The Grantee shall, at all times during the life of this Franchise, comply with and abide by all of the laws of the State of New Mexico and the laws of the United States of America, to the extent such laws and regulations are applicable to Grantee's operations.

(d) All systems erected by the Grantee within the public right-of-way shall be located, to the extent reasonable, so as to cause minimum interference with adjacent property owners' maintenance and access.

(e) Grantor reserves the right of reasonable regulation within the lawful exercise of its police power, of the construction and installation of any system within a public right-of-way, to the extent not preempted by state and/or federal regulatory authority and to reasonably designate where the same are to be placed upon the public right-of-way.

(f) In case of any disturbance by Grantee of pavements, or other surfacing in any portion of the public right-of-way, the Grantee shall, at its own cost and expense and in a manner approved by Grantor, replace and repair all paving and other surfaces to as good a condition as before the work involving such disturbance was done; or at the option of the Grantee, and by agreement of the parties, pay to the Grantor the reasonable cost for the County to make such repairs, as evidenced by an itemized bill submitted by the Grantor.

(g) If at any time during the term of this Franchise Ordinance, the Grantor shall lawfully elect to alter or change any public right-of-way requiring the relocation of the facilities of the Grantee located in such public right-of-way, upon prior reasonable notice by the Grantor, Grantee shall remove and/or relocate the same at its own expense.

(h) In the event of a dispute involving the terms and conditions of this Franchise, or in the event the parties cannot agree on the necessary remedial action pursuant to Section 11 above; then the Grantee may request a public hearing before the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners for the purpose of a hearing on the conflict, alleged breach or remedial action recommended. Grantee reserves the right to appeal the decision of the Board of County Commissioners within thirty (30) days after receipt of the written decision to the appropriate agency or court of competent jurisdiction. Such appeal shall be a trial de novo of the entire matter. Any and all further action concerning the termination of the Franchise shall be stayed in the event of such appeal.

## Eating Properly Maintains Health

March is National Nutrition  
Month. According to the new  
Food Guide Pyramid, to main-  
tain good health we should  
eat daily 6-11 servings of  
bread, cereal, rice and pasta  
group, 3-5 servings of the  
vegetable group, 2-4 servings  
from the fruit group, 2-3  
servings from the milk, yogurt  
and cheese group, 2-3 servings  
from the meat, poultry, fish,  
dry beans, eggs and nuts  
group. The very tip of the  
pyramid group is the fats, oils  
and sweets group. Use these  
foods sparingly.

A good source of vitamins  
and minerals is in vegetables.  
All vegetables provide dietary  
fiber, some provide starch or  
protein, and they are also  
sources of many vitamins and  
minerals. But different types  
of vegetables vary in the  
kinds and amounts of nutri-  
ents they provide.

Dark-green vegetables -  
vitamins A and C, riboflavin,  
folic acid, iron, calcium, mag-  
nesium, potassium.

Deep Yellow vegetables -  
vitamin A.

Dry beans and peas -  
thiamin, folic acid, iron mag-  
nesium, phosphorus, zinc,  
potassium, protein, starch.

Starchy vegetables -  
starch and varying amounts  
of certain vitamins and miner-  
als, such as niacin, vitamin B-  
6, zinc, and potassium.

Other vegetables - vary-  
ing amounts of vitamins and  
minerals, such as vitamin C,  
vitamin A, and potassium.

There are over 50 kinds of  
vegetables; you can find more  
in your supermarket. How  
many have you tried? How  
many do you serve regularly?  
If you stick to the few vegeta-  
bles you know you like, you  
may be missing out on new  
tastes and new ways of get-  
ting nutrients.

# "The Story Of Smokey Bear"



## Editor's Note:

The true story of Smokey Bear is being told in the Lincoln County News. The seventh chapter is featured this week. We suggest our readers and school classes clip each portion of Smokey Bear's story to save in an album.

Before we continue with Smokey's story, I'm sure that some of you are wondering, "What about the fire? How long did it burn? How did it finally stop?"

The worst days of the 1950

fire were from the start on May 4th to May 9th, when the wind and heat kept the fire out of control as some 500 men battled the flames. It would be impossible to name all the workers in camp who cooked the meals and doctored the minor injuries, or those on the fire lines, Lincoln County people would head the list of volunteers, while regular Forest Service personnel, and Army troops, Mescalero Apache Red Hats, completed the roll.

The morning of Thursday, May 11th, the wind died. Clouds hung low and a steady drizzle of rain ensued. Nature took a hand in stemming the power of the conflagration, and bringing it to a smoldering control.

By Friday, May 12th, the fire lines diminished to 250

men. The Capitan High School placed their shower rooms at the disposal of the fire fighters, and the camp continued to be the basis for all scaled-down activities.

The camp had been connected by phone with Block Lookout to report and receive orders through the dispatcher at the Capitan Ranger Station. Six bulldozers had been used to build line where possible. The roughest areas depended on men on foot with korticks and pulaskis. The day the first clouds appeared, a low-flying plane seeded the clouds with dry ice, producing a slight sprinkle of rain.

Men saw turkeys roosting in the very tops of the tallest pines; deer running from the flames, seeing the men, then in

fright running back into the fire; two more bear cubs were sighted, seemingly without burns, that scampered away from the crews.

After May 12th, men were slowly released and only a small crew left to keep on mopping up straggling smokes. On May 18, a high wind and mounting heat produced a flare-up that consumed 60 more acres before it was controlled.

It was estimated that 17,000 acres were scorched on the north side of East Capitan Mountain, destroying almost 10 million feet of timber. Habitat for forest life was also destroyed, along with unlucky wildlife. All this destruction was caused by man's carelessness.

When I visited the burned area a few weeks after the fire

was dead, I couldn't believe the quietness of the forest. No birds sang or squirrels chattered. The only noise was an occasional crackle of a dry charred tree limb. No needles covered the turf, only ashes that blackened my shoes.

Then I found a tiny green-leaved yellow flower. It was a

symbol of hope that the land in the forest would heal, and once again be a happy home for wild-life friends of Smokey.

Next week, we'll leave the forest where Smokey was rescued and follow the exciting chapters of his life, as he became a fighter himself to warn people to prevent fires.

Ideas for Serving Vegetables:

\* Many vegetables taste good raw. Try the lowfat cucumber dip with raw cauliflower, broccoli, carrot, green pepper, turnip, and rutabaga sticks or pieces. You can use green beans, red peppers, zucchini, or snow peas as dippers, too.

\* Green up your salads by adding spinach, watercress, romaine, or other dark greens. They get an A+ in nutrients as well as in flavor. Don't stop there—add more color and flavor with other raw or cooked vegetables. Try cold cooked peas, corn, chickpeas, or beets. Be moderate in your use of oily salad dressings and mayonnaise because they may add more fats and calories than you want.

\* Ever tried steaming vegetables? Use a metal steamer basket that fits into a saucepan. Put the vegetables in the

basket with water in the bottom of the pan, cover the pan with a tight-fitting lid, and steam vegetables until just tender and crisp.

\* Strifrying is a cooking technique adopted from the Orient. And use your imagination—many vegetables other than those listed are good when stirfried.

\* Dry beans and peas are legumes. They have been shown in USDA food guides as alternates for meat, poultry, and fish for decades; but they can be used as vegetables also. Dry beans and peas are available not only in the dry form but also cooked and canned. Dry beans and peas can be cooked ahead and stored in the refrigerator for a day or two or they can be frozen for later use. Beans are good in salads, soups, as a side dish, and, for a "different" snack, as a bean dip.
