

Fairgrounds Improvement Bid Rejected

The Ruidoso Convention and Civic Events Center is the designated polling place for all precincts within the village.

Lincoln County Commissioners Monroy Montes, Wilton Howell and Ray Nunley approved a resolution during a special meeting early Wednesday that moved Precincts 8 and 9 from the

Ruidoso Public Library to the Ruidoso Civic Events Center. With the move, all four precincts in Ruidoso will vote at the civic center.

County clerk Martha Proctor said the move came about after she removed the old mechanical voting machines from the library. Because of a mis-communication, the librarian filled the public space where the voting took place with an expanded children's

library. Left with no where to place the voting machine, Proctor pursued the official change of poll.

Proctor said she contacted the secretary of state office about moving the poll and was advised that she would have to petition the district court judge for an order that will allow the poll to be placed out of its precinct. "Judge (Richard) Parsons approved the order just minutes ago,"

Proctor told commissioners.

County attorney Alan Morel had drafted the order which the judge had approved. Commissioners then had to approve a resolution which officially changed the polls to the civic center.

Proctor said she is legally obligated to announce the polls relocation in notices published in the county newspapers, however she also will notify each affected voter with

a letter about the change.

The resolution designates the polling places as Precinct 1 at Corona Village Hall, precinct 2 (A) at Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, precinct 2(B) Nogal Fire Station, precinct 3 at Lincoln County Fair Building in Capitan, precinct 4 at Otero County Electric Building in Alto, precinct 5 Bonito Fire Station, precincts 6, 7, 8, 9 at Ruidoso Convention and

Civic Events Center, precincts 10 and 11 at Ruidoso Downs Senior Center, precinct 12(A) at St Jude's Parish Hall San Patricio, precinct 12(B) Hondo School, precinct 12(c) old Capitan Village Hall, precinct 13 at Carrizozo School, and Absentee voters at Lincoln County Courthouse.

Last year, Domenici was successful in getting an amendment in the 1994 Agriculture Appropriations Bill to allow rural cooperatives to more quickly pay off loans they have with the REA by allowing cooperatives to refinance these debts. New Mexico's Plains Electric Generation and Transmission Cooperative has already refinanced \$50 million in REA debt, which will save Plains and its ratepayers \$3 million annually.

Another Police Officer To Be Hired In Capitan

The Village of Capitan is seeking a third police officer. The officer will have more duties than just patrol, the officer will be expected to do animal control.

During the regular village meeting Monday, the slim quorum of trustees Connie Hopper and Byron Carpenter authorized the hiring of a third officer.

The primary reason for the third officer was to reduce the amount of compensation time now given the other two officers. It takes 3.2 people to fill one full time police position, because of the nature of shifts. The village has sufficient funds for the additional officer.

But the action to hire the third officer came only after Hopper had her say about the current police situation and animal control.

"All I've heard is complaints about the animal control calls," Hopper said. She also had a few other concerns which she said she discussed with the mayor and chief of police. "What I got out of my concerns were excuses and 'I don't know.'"

Hopper indicated she had met several times with the mayor and police chief to resolve problems which have to do with things that are

"public record." Instead of resolutions, all she got were wants. "They (the police) want a new building, which they got, they want two new radars, but I think there have been no tickets written. I have a problem with this as far as wants go."

Cano said the radar was

approved by former mayor Frank Warth, and the equipment was purchased with Law Enforcement Funds.

Hopper said during the meetings it was thrown in her face that she wanted the chief's job. "I don't (want the job) I never have. I think he's

County Residents Should Be Aware Of Paving Scam

Lincoln County residents should beware of offers for cheap paving jobs.

According to Charley Engelking, Lincoln County Sheriff Deputy, a hot mix paving scam has been going on in the county. One person has been bilked out of \$10,600.00.

Other people have been approached by the scam artists and there may be additional victims. Engelking said it is important for every person who has been contacted about a cheap paving job to contact the Sheriff's Department at 648-2341.

Engelking said the main victims are elderly persons who do have some money and live alone in a rural area. The victims are approached early in the evening just before dark. Apparently the people

doing the scam know in advance that the intended victims have money.

The scam artists will say they have some hot mix left over from a job they just completed and will offer to dump the load of hot mix free, saying, "It won't cost you anything."

When the victim says ok, the load of hot mix will be dumped on the road and then a bill will be presented to the victim. When the victim says the hot mix was supposed to be free, the scam artist will say, "You misunderstood, the labor is free but you have to pay for the hot mix."

It is at this time the scam artist gets very threatening about payment and will demand a check be written for

Water Ordinance Goes Down The Drain At Town Meeting

The golf course, recreation center, and mobile homes dominated the Carrizozo town council meeting Tuesday.

The mobile home issue, listed as agenda item #8, action on town attorneys recommendation of illegal mobile home, erupted into a 21-minute discussion, not only about the mobile home but also about who has authority to contact the town attorney.

Trustee Ruth Armstrong asked if the matter could be postponed until "several people" would arrive at 6:30.

Trustee Harold Garcia proceeded to read from the April 12 meeting approved minutes which stated the matter would be tabled until an official complaint was received.

Armstrong responded, "We will have an official complaint by 7 p.m."

Garcia and Armstrong disagreed about how the situation should be handled. Garcia said Armstrong was putting the cart before the horse by contacting the town attorney before an official complaint had been received by the town.

Apparently the board of trustees had a six-page opinion about the mobile home. The opinion was written by town attorney David Stevens.

Stevens was present at the meeting and stated that even though the board agreed at the April 12 meeting to table the matter until an official complaint was received the board had also approved the agenda for the May 10 meeting listing item #8 as discussion.

Garcia said, "I hope we don't set precedence to re-do just because there are those who don't want to play by the rules."

Armstrong and Garcia disagreed several times before the matter was settled. Garcia made the motion to support the April 12 motion, Armstrong seconded Garcia's motion, and the motion was approved.

Armstrong said there will be a written complaint by the next meeting.

Apparently the mobile home in question is the one that is located behind Peter Aguilar's home at 501 E Avenue. Aguilar had received permission from the Carrizozo Board of Trustees at the Feb. 22, 1994 meeting to place the mobile on his property.

The discussion about the other mobile home lasted 25 minutes.

Margaret Archuleta's mobile

is located at 12th and C Ave. on the Willie Swift property. Swift has four lots, which allows for the mobile to be on "one lot of record" as required by the town zoning ordinance.

Swift said the mobile had been put in one place and he was told it had to be moved. Trees had to be cut and Swift's fence was damaged while moving the mobile to another spot on the property.

Trustees agreed to allow the mobile to remain on the property on the condition that Swift bring in a map to prove the mobile is on one lot of record.

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Disciplinary Action Recommended In Personnel Matter

The Carrizozo Board of Trustees met in special session May 9 to take action on a personnel matter that had been discussed during a closed session May 2.

Mayor Cecilia Kuhnel said she had conducted a meeting with the personnel board on April 27. When the board of trustees met in closed session May 2 Kuhnel made recommendations to the board that disciplinary action was in order due to facts presented at the personnel hearing.

Trustees Ruth Armstrong, Eileen Lovelace, and Willie Silva attended the special meeting May 9. They approved the motion for disciplinary action as recommended by the mayor and the personnel board.

Kuhnel then asked for a motion in order to advertise for the position that "has just been made vacant." Trustees Armstrong, Lovelace, and Silva approved the motion.

The News asked if the employee was being terminated or had resigned and was told there were a number of recommendations in the letter to the employee but the employee is not being terminated and has not resigned.

The News asked why there is a vacancy if the employee has not been terminated or resigned.

Kuhnel said, "Because of the sensitivity of this position."

When the News asked if the employee would be moved to another position, Kuhnel said, "If a position is available."

The name of the employee was not announced.

a very capable man," Hopper said about chief Tony Cano. Resident Mollie Mason said the officers have responded immediately or quickly to several of her animal control calls.

The village has an ordinance that provides for control of animals. Resident Leroy Montes asked if the village needs animal control why not hire an animal control officer at much lower salary.

Hopper said that the current officers were hired with the clear understanding that animal control was part of the job. Montes said that police officers should not be expected to be dog catchers.

Discussion then turned from the police being dog catchers to what to do with animals once they are picked up. The village cannot provide kennels that meet regulations and could be liable for improper handling of animals. Village attorney Robert Beauvais told of the situation in Carrizozo where the mayor was charged with cruelty to animals for an inadequate pound, which is nearly identical to Capitan's kennel.

Capitan Municipal Judge Jack Johnson and Mayor Renfro said that the village needs to work a deal with the Lincoln County Humane Society to take the animals. The Humane Society is currently expanding its facility to deal with unwanted animals in the

Voters will use the electronic machines. Sample ballots will be available at the county clerk's office and the municipal halls.

Lincoln County Fairgrounds improvements were stalled when commissioners rejected the only bid received in the amount of \$225,564 with an additive alternate walkway at \$18,909 from D&D Construction. The bid was \$100,000 more than the project funding. The New Mexico State Legislature appropriated \$100,000 for the improvements, which the county matched with \$25,000.

The Lincoln County Fair Association proposed improvements included a canopy for the rodeo arena stands, new concession stands and handicapped access bathrooms.

Commissioners unanimously voted to send the fairgrounds improvements proposal back to the Fair Association to scale the project down to the funding available.

Commissioners also authorized road manager Bill Cupit to provide emergency road work for San Patricio area residents who were affected by localized flooding Monday and Tuesday. Chairman Montes said the health, welfare and safety of county citizens is the commission's main responsibility. He said Cupit should call him and the vice chairman to authorize any other emergency work.

Cupit also reported that the county will receive \$81,000 funding from a state Senate Memorial. The \$81,000 represents a 90 percent portion which the county must match with \$9,000. Cupit offered three options for using the funding; chip seal, work on E007 (old state road 214) or 32 more cattle guards.

With more than a month to return the paperwork for the funding, Montes deferred any commitment to a specific project until all commissioners were given the information.

Commissioners will hold a special meeting at 9 a.m. Friday, May 27 in their chambers in the courthouse in Carrizozo, to open bids for a new water truck tank for the road department.

villages, trustees learned from humane society member Diane Stallings. She offered to present the situation to the humane society board, and work up some contract based on numbers estimated by the police chief.

Beauvais said patrol police officers can cite violators of the animal control ordinance and citizens also can file complaints about animals directly to the police. But, he said that most cops are cops, and prefer not to do animal control calls. He recommended that it be made very clear to the police applicants that the job's duties include animal control.

Finally, Hopper made the motion to authorize hiring another officer to cut down on the comp time.

The officer position has been advertised.

Trustees increased the 1993-94 fiscal year budget to provide funds for the new employee in the water/street departments. Because only two trustees were at the meeting, the mayor temporarily appointed Jonathan LaMay. Board action will be taken at the next meeting.

The trustee's attempt to vote on an annexation request by Phil Fifer for Tract 4 Block 3 of C Hill Subdivision was stopped by the village attorney because the annexation petition had not gone through the ordinance process. Annexation petitions by land owners must be done by ordinance, which requires the publication of notice of public hearing and the public hearing when comment is allowed. Trustees, on advice of the attorney, authorized the village clerk to publish notice of public hearing.

The successfully negotiated contract for the village, to purchase 16.5 acre feet of water rights has stalled for the lack of an offerer's signature, Beauvais reported. Once the signature is secured, the main offerer has all the paperwork ready with the State Engineer's Office to begin the transfer process. The process begins with publication of a notice of the proposed transfer. Any adjacent water rights holder who may be affected by the transfer will be given opportunity to make protest.

"If there is a protest, it could delay or prevent the transfer," Beauvais said. "On the Bonito adjudication it is possible to have a protest."

The village will not be obligated to buy the rights until the transfer is completed through the state engineer's office. The purchase contract put the burden of the transfer on the sellers.

A public hearing was held before the meeting for a proposed Water Advisory Board. The board will be established by ordinance and will have advisory powers similar to the Planning and Zoning commission. Plans are to allow any annexation petition to be reviewed and recommended by the water board first, then to Planning and Zoning for final recommendation to the trustees. The water board also will advise the trustees on water rights and issues.

Trustees authorized the drafting of an ordinance to establish the board which will be returned for review and setting of a public hearing.

During the public hearing on the village Capital Improvements Plan and the preliminary budget, Renfro said that water storage/improvements will be moved to the top priority. The following priorities suggested were sewer lines in the subdivisions, additional street lights and completing the wetlands with lab building and additional plantings.

Renfro said the village will pursue funding for additional water storage tanks from the state legislature. The previous wetlands sewer treatment and hydrants priorities have been

completed and thus removed from the plans. Street improvements funding is being pursued through a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

As for the budget, clerk Deborah Cummins said increases will be needed for the street employee and additional police officer. Other requests for funding include \$250 for grass seed from the Soil Conservation Service, \$500 in dues for Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District and a \$3,000 sewer machine.

The village will hold a special meeting at 6:30 p.m. May 19, to discuss the preliminary budget in full.

Trustees also:
 --Accepted Dorothy Smith's resignation, due to health and commitments at home, from the Cemetery Board and Planning and Zoning Commission.

--Approved the mayor's appointment of Van Shamblin to the Cemetery Board and Bobbie Shearer to P&Z. Anyone wishing to serve on any village board was invited to come to village hall and sign up.

--Approved the mayor's appointment of Netta Nolen as acting clerk.

--Okayed the resolution in support of the Regional Juvenile Service Task Force, on which chief Cano is a member.

the amount of the bill which is usually several thousands dollars. The scam artist will even go so far as to demand the victim's check book and will write the check out and then have the victim sign the check.

Engelking said the best advice he can give to people is to politely refuse the offer of the free hot mix and to call the sheriff's department as soon as possible. It is very important to not antagonize the scam artists. Engelking said he does not want anyone to get hurt.

The scam artists work with

new equipment; three dump trucks, a roller, spreader, equipment truck, and a van.

The same scam or a similar scam has been in Torrance County where the scam was pulled on a business.

Anyone with information, however small the information may seem, should contact the sheriff's department. All information will help the sheriff's department catch the scam artists and hopefully keep anyone else from being threatened into paying money for the scam.

Engelking said it will not be

necessary for any person with information to give their name. The caller may remain anonymous. Engelking also stressed that any person who has paid money should not be ashamed or embarrassed because the scam artists threaten the victims and often the victims will pay the money rather than take a chance on being hurt.

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

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More People Is Better Blues

It was a breezy dusty March afternoon in New Mexico. The wind was doing 45 m.p.h. sideways. A tourist got out of his car at a restaurant at the same time I did.

"My goodness," he said, trying to keep his hat on, "Does the wind always blow like this?"

"No," I answered, squinting at the dust storm. "Sometimes it comes from the other direction."

He gave me a look of horror as I added, "Oh, it's not so bad now, but soon the rattlesnakes will be out of their winter dens. The wind can pick them up along with scorpions. You spend so much time watching for them in the air that you don't see them on the ground."

After eating quickly he walked rapidly to his car scanning both sky and ground. I'll bet he went home and told his friends that New Mexico is a terrible place.

The impression of New Mexico I gave the tourist was very different from what he would get at the Chamber of Commerce. They will say with great enthusiasm, "Don't worry, dust storms are just a momentary inconvenience. New Mexico is a great place to live because it's not overcrowded. Go get hundreds of your friends and move here."

As a person born here, I find it odd that so many people move here to escape overcrowding back home and then spend all of their time trying to get more people to move to New Mexico. This "fouling the nest" behavior is shortsighted at best.

I know you can't eat clean air—people have to do something to make a living. Still, if New Mexico is a great place to get away from the crowds—with wide open spaces unbroken by the touch of mankind, then it is lunacy to try to get more people to move here.

It is short-term gains and long-term losses. At first more people means the economy can boom.

More people means more jobs, more buildings, more cars, more traffic lights, more noise, more and more people everywhere. It becomes obvious that more people do not make New Mexico better in the long-term.

We should not bar newcomers, rather, we don't have to work so hard to bring in more people. We all moved to New Mexico. Whether it was five hundred or five years ago, we all came from elsewhere.

What brought us or our ancestors to New Mexico is/was New Mexico's uncrowded condition. With that in mind, we must now recognize the effect of New Mexico's tourism and growth economics on crowding.

I suppose crowding is all a matter of degree. My grandfather felt that if you were close enough to hear the neighbor's dog bark, the neighbor was too close. About a mile between neighbors was the minimum for my grandfather's comfort level.

I have lived in crowded areas like Los Angeles, Tokyo, Denver and Albuquerque. In each community a chamber of commerce spent their time getting more and more people to come and stay. As the number of people in Los Angeles, Denver or Albuquerque reached a certain level, the quality of life for the citizens eroded.

I like what Oregon did about crowding. For many years their population soared with people leaving the overcrowded California cities. Finally Oregon recognized their quality of life would match California's unless they did something. They made a motto, "Come visit, but then leave." They now discourage people staying.

New Mexico should use the "visit but leave" motto before it's too late. More people is not better.

Here's to New Mexico's dirt-blown March days, scorpions and rattlesnakes—while they are only a momentary inconvenience, they can be used to keep too many people from moving here. MS


ENMU-Ruidoso Begins Summer Registration

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Some important legislation got lost in the hectic final hours of the 1994 session.

Most of the missing programs were quickly found in the trash heap of discarded items that didn't quite make it into the multi-million dollar grab bag of goodies funded from the huge surplus that suddenly appeared following the '93 Legislature.

But at least one lost program still hasn't been found.

Sen. Emilio Naranjo, the powerful boss of Rio Arriba County, introduced legislation to expand the Food and Nutrition Education Program of New Mexico State University's Cooperative Extension Service.

In the final days of the Legislature hundreds of pork barrel bills were chosen from among the 1,200 introduced. The chosen projects went into one of three omnibus packages funded from either the state's general obligation bond issue that will be voted on during the November elections.

Sen. Naranjo was assured by the Legislature's financial chiefs that the EFNEP was in there somewhere. That was about all the assurance any lawmaker received as the "Christmas Tree" bills arrived on the floor of the House and Senate within an hour of the Legislature's adjournment last Feb. 17.

There wasn't time to comb through hundreds of pages looking for all the pet projects in which one was interested. And there wasn't time to do anything about it if a project was discovered missing.

When NMSU officials looked through the long lists of programs, they thought they might have located the elusive EFNEP among the maze of ambiguously-worded entries. But it appears confusion among titles of various projects is going to mean that the EFNEP will not be found.

That's too bad. The Expanded Food and Nutrition Education Program once served 23 counties in New Mexico, instructing thousands of families a year about basic nutrition, economical shopping and safe food preparation. But federal matching funds have remained static the past several years as needs have increased.

As a result only three programs reaching four counties—Bernalillo, Dona Ana and San Miguel—Mora—are left. Naranjo's \$500,000 appropriation request would have allowed a rebuilding of the program to reach target groups in other counties, paying untold dividends in improved nutrition and health.

It is one of those "investment" designed to help move people from welfare to work.

You can be sure Sen. Naranjo will have lots of questions for the finance wizards who let the NMSU program slip through the cracks. And we can expect to see that request back next year.

NMSU was somewhat more fortunate in other special project requests. Sen. Tim Jennings' bill to enhance the Artesia Agricultural Experiment Station received partial funding.

The recent court-ordered delivery of Pecos River water to Texas is making it necessary to conserve more irrigation water and to obtain a greater economic return from the water used. One highly successful result of those efforts has been the addition of many dairies in the valley. Wool and mohair also are being considered as higher-value products.

But with the addition of large numbers of animals to the fertile valley there is a need for increased attention to

water quality, soil chemistry and pest management. A soil scientist and an etymologist have been added to the Artesia faculty. For now, a plant physiologist, with expertise in plant nutrition and high-value crops is on hold until more funding is received.

NMSU's biggest new project is construction of a Center for Sustainable Development of Arid Lands that will bring together scientists of varied disciplines for a look at the total agricultural picture in New Mexico and other arid lands of the world.

The center will allow current NMSU faculty and researchers to expand from cramped outdated facilities, to attract increased funding for research and it will allow students to work alongside the people who are developing the new knowledge.

The '94 Legislature appropriated funds for architectural design. The big decision will come next year when \$14 million will be needed, along with federal matching money, for the construction.

Today we are profiling Dr. Bernhard Reimann who was born in Germany and has a most interesting biography of his life before he found Capitan. I wish I had space to have the entire manuscript published for you. I know most of you would enjoy reading it and perhaps at a later time will submit it a few pages at a time. However, time and space will only allow me to profile him and his lovely wife... profiling means reading about why he and his wife decided to come to Capitan.

At the end of March 1967 we made the move from beautiful La Jolla, California, to dusty and hot El Paso, and during the first month of learning to live through all the briefings and administrative work which Army life brings along with it we had some time on weekends.

Thus, one afternoon when the wind was blowing and the Texas snow was heavy lying over the city we left for a weekend trip north on Highway 54. After having passed Alamogordo there was a turn-off east into the Sacramentos on Highway 82, and driving through a tunnel, a miracle happened. Green vegetation, trees, and tall timber up to Cloudercroft. What a change. Right here, we fell in love with New Mexico.

People always ask us, 'isn't that like...?' and then comes some place in Central Europe. No, it isn't. It's New Mexico, Land of Enchantment.

Over the years, my wife Beate (Beate) and I made many many trips through the state. Don't ask me where we have been, ask me where we haven't been. Carrizozo, White Oaks (nobody lived there then), Nogal, Bent, Lincoln (the Dunlaps were our first contact), Hondo, and yes, Capitan, became real conceptions, not just names on a map. We visited the ancient pueblo ruins in Chaco Canyon, in Aztec, in the Gila Mountains, and the Grand Quivira in the middle of nowhere and many others not only located in our state. We saw the little community of Hope dying for lack of water (it is now revived), camped near Cloudercroft and got excited due to the rattle of trash cans the bears were playing with, and traveled all over our state.

It was in May 1972 when the fellow who run the photo-

graphy laboratory at William Beaumont Army Medical Center told me that there was a piece of property, inexpensive, for sale in Capitan. Capitan, that would be a nice place for retirement. So, we went -- and were utterly disappointed. Nothing we were interested in. But there were signs all over telling of 'Land for Sale.' We dropped in on Lamoyne Carpenter's office. Lamoyne drove us around in Hideaway Hills section and there on Lobo Road (few folks knew then that there was a Lobo Road) there was the place we were looking for, a magnificent view of Sierra Blanca, trees all over-beautiful. We drove for the night to Ruidoso to think things over, and next day, May 20, 1972 we struck the deal. Since then there was hardly a month, summer or winter, that we were not, at least one weekend, at this place. Sometimes when the weather was too rough to camp in our little trailer we stayed at the Smokey Bear Motel. In 1987 when I retired we moved, bit by bit, our belongings to Capitan and on January 1, 1988 we registered to vote here and became permanent residents.

Needless to say, we love it here. We love our surroundings, the little village, and of course, the people. Participating in some of the activities in Capitan we grew roots here. Although some people know us, we do not know many, particularly by name. It's always difficult for the new guy to learn many faces and names, but it is easy for many to learn to know two faces and two names. So, be patient and kind to us.

Fraktur House Blessing
Heaven's Angels O'er this house preside, guard, keep safe all those inside. God bless these hands united, And bless these hearts made one. Bring light and love and laughter, and make this house a home.

A Haus Segren, House Blessing, represents a prayer, asking God to preserve the house from fires, storms, and all calamities. It is also a benediction upon the family who live in the house, and upon all who go in and come out. German settlers brought this charming custom to Pennsylvania in the 18th century.

Also today is the final chapter of the Johnnie Martin Ranch and I hope you have enjoyed reading it as much as I have had typing it.

After Johnny married Wilma Sowell, they lived on the ranch for awhile and along with his brother-in-laws helped work on the Sowell Ranch. In 1940 they had their only child, Patricia Gayle Martin, born at La Mesa, Texas. Although both my grandparents spent a lot of time between the Martin-Sowell ranches and were even offered the Graham Ranch by Wilma's grandparents, C.J. and Emma, they did not want to live in the dusty foothills, common to all three places. So in 1950 they found a place to their liking in the Tucson mountains, back in the canyon, about 10 miles from Capitan. (It was the old Fritz place.) Granddad named it the High Lonesome Ranch after his father's ranch. Here they drilled a well, built a new house and went to work on their retirement. All of the Martin clan as well as friends helped out over the years,

working cattle and making repairs. All the kids learned how to brand, doctor and pull calves, as well as ride and fix fence, a mundane chore for all.

As the years passed they slowly married and moved away, although not for good. My mother married Joe Cox in 1959 and they had four children, Johnny, Vicki, Lilly and Jay Cox. Even after the Martin kids married and moved further away, they continued to take time out to visit the ranch and bring along their kids to enjoy the mountains and learn about ranch work. Holidays and reunions were all causes for a big get together, as well as branding time. A lot of kids sat leather and threw calves down over the years on the Martin Ranch.

My mother was remarried later to Wes Hall of Albuquerque and they now live in Santa Fe. As for we four children, the two girls married and are now living in Albuquerque and Los Lunas. The children are Vicki and Tom Taylor, one son Junior and Lilly and Will Payne with two sons, Loren and David. Their families visit Granddad and the ranch whenever they can get time

off, all their kids already taking part in the work. As for the two boys, they both live on the ranch. Jay Cox works at Fort Stanton and has his place next to Granddad's house. As for myself, I live with my wife Germaine Cox and three children, Vanessa, Greg and Mitchell Cox; a little further back on the ranch. We all watch over Granddad and take care of the cattle and other chores. Our children will be the 7th generation in 110 years of ranching tradition in New Mexico.

Even though we take care of the place now, he still is the Head Honcho and calls the shots. His family ranch in Texas is now a cotton farm, and he still owns it. It will have been in the family 94 years this year.

Dried Beans And Peas Are Good Food Choice

The "perfect" food for health-conscious Americans may be dried beans and peas. That's if we want our food to be low in fat and sodium, have no cholesterol, be high in complex carbohydrates, a good source of protein, loaded with vitamins and minerals and high in dietary fiber. And, of course, we expect it to taste good and be cheap.

Dried beans and peas have for centuries been a mainstay in the diets of people all over the world. They are an excellent source of energy and an inexpensive source of plant protein. They're sometimes called the poor man's meat.

Health experts now call dried beans and peas "gourmet preventive medicine" and they are considered among the Top 10 food trends for the 1990s. They can have a positive benefit for those who have diabetes, cardiovascular disease, diverticular disease and colon cancer.

Dried beans and peas are listed with the meat group in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Guide Pyramid. They are an excellent source of complex carbohydrates. They are also a part of the vegetable food group, the base for a healthier diet.

Some people like beans but don't eat them because they cause digestive distress -- intestinal gas or flatulence, bloating and perhaps diarrhea -- but the problem can be solved for most people in the preparation of the beans.

Whether faithless or true--- Say, what is the "gospel" according to you?"

The reason for the intestinal gas is that our bodies don't produce the proper enzyme to digest one of the starches in legumes. It's a five-carbon sugar called raffinose. When it gets to the large intestine undigested, natural bacteria ferment the natural sugar, producing the gas.

Soak the beans or peas over night so that about 90 percent of the gas-producing starch is leached into the water. Pour off the water, add fresh water and cook.

A better way is to use the short-soak method. Cover the beans or peas with water, boil 2 minutes, take off the burner and let sit about an hour, then drain. You get even more of the gas producing starch leached into the water with the short boil. Cover with fresh water and cook, and you'll have a socially acceptable bean.

There is also a new product on the market called Beano which supplies the missing enzyme, alpha-galactosidase. You can put the liquid on the

first bite of food. Beano in tablet form has just become available so chewing and swallowing it makes it easier to use. A word of caution, however. The enzyme is made of mold, so if you're allergic to mold or to penicillin, it may not be suitable for you.

Beans and peas are members of the legume family. Legumes are vegetables that produce pods filled with seeds. About 22 different legumes are grown for human consumption.

The famous red beans served with rice are made from the red kidney bean. White beans, either navy beans or great northern beans, are used in Boston baked beans. Pinto beans are used in Mexican and South American dishes and for Texas-style barbecued beans. Refried beans and Charras beans are made from pintos. Chickpeas, better known as garbanzos, are widely used in Indian and African foods. They are the large, nutty-flavored beans found on salad bars and are the main ingredient in humus, a popular seasoned chickpea paste.

Southern field peas, such as black-eyed and purple hull peas, are special in the southern states.

The lentil is probably the oldest cultivated legume, dating back to 8000 B.C. A close relative of lentils are dried split peas, often used for delicious soups.

The soybean, through not widely used directly for human consumption, has perhaps the highest nutritional score. It has the highest amount of protein and dietary fiber. Soybeans contain the most fat, which is polyunsaturated, and new research indicates they contain many compounds thought to help prevent certain cancers. Tofu is a soy product more commonly consumed.

In case you're wondering, peanuts are legumes. However they are normally considered nuts and are high in fat, most of which is monounsaturated.

The quality of plant protein is not quite as good as that of animal proteins. Plant proteins are "incomplete proteins," meaning that they are missing the proper amount of one or more essential amino acids. But when you serve them with a small amount of milk, meat, rice, bread or grains, you get all the amino acids. Typical combinations

are rice with the red beans, or a peanut butter sandwich and a glass of milk.

If you don't want to start from scratch to soak and cook beans, you can purchase almost anything in a can. Also, some tasty, new bean dish mixes are available for red

beans and rice, soups, etc., that can be prepared in a short time.

Canned beans are higher in sodium, but rinsing can remove much of it. Be sure to read the label on the can because some products contain lard or other animal fats.



Two years ago Robert Vallejos responded to an advertisement for a lessee for the Rec Center and has operated the facility since then, apparently without a lease.

Town attorney David Stevens suggested the town get proposals from those interested in leasing the Rec Center.

"I think (the town) has an obligation to see who is interested. If (the town) has anything now it is a month to month tenancy," Stevens said.

More discussion included the question of whether Vallejos, as the person in the Rec Center, should have the right of first refusal.

The discussion ended when the board agreed to advertise for proposals for leasing the Rec Center. Proposals are to be accepted until 4:30 p.m. May 24.

Trustee Willie Silva had asked the town to consider renaming 14th Street in honor of S.M. "Sally" Ortiz, former municipal judge.

Silva said he would like to rename the old city hall in honor of Ortiz. The building is to be renovated into a police and municipal court complex.

No decisions were made. The matter will be placed on the agenda at a later meeting.




