

Ruidoso Has No Money For MainStreet Office

Allhub Inc. submitted the sole response to a request for hotel proposal solicited by the Village of Ruidoso.

Ruidoso Village Manager Gary Jackson revealed the name of the sole proposer near the end of the regular village council meeting Tuesday. He said a selection committee consisting of mayor

Jerry Shaw, mayor pro tem J.D. James and village purchasing agent Terri Ward declared the bid responsive to the request for proposals (RFPs). Negotiations are now underway to finalize the proposed lease of village property between the convention center and The Links of Sierra Blanca golf course for construction of a convention hotel. Allhub, Inc. was the former lease holder.

MainStreet Ruidoso Inc. will no longer get direct funds from the village. MainStreet Ruidoso Inc. president Don Dutton requested the village fund \$26,173 for the MainStreet office and paid director in the next fiscal year. Dutton said that a paid director acts as coordinator and "ombudsman between the village and the private sector." Dutton was uncertain whether a volunteer would be

able to have that type of responsibility.

But despite further discussion from state MainStreet director Julie Johncox about how MainStreet Ruidoso is in the forefront in the state, and how the each dollar put into the program locally has been matched by \$8 in state, federal and private funds, councilors maintained their position that the village cannot afford to finance the actual

MainStreet office.

Mayor pro tem J.D. James (mayor Jerry Shaw was absent due to the death of her husband Dick) said that he has been supportive of the MainStreet program but the village had to "scrape to reach a balanced budget." James requested Dutton return to the council in six months, during the mid-year budget review.


Councilor Frank Potter said

the village is very supportive of the MainStreet program, and is still committed to providing the \$40,000 for the mid-town public restrooms. "I don't want people to think that village has no money in the project," Potter said.

Councilor Robert Donaldson also supported the MainStreet program. "No other project in

Commissioners Want To Set Format For Hiring Manager

Recent flooding in the Hondo valley from Ruidoso Downs to east of Picacho and in the Arabella area prompted Lincoln County Commissioners to seek help from the

Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

At a special called meeting Friday, May 27, commissioners officially declared the area a disaster. That declaration will be sent on to the state emergency management coordinator who will send inspectors to review the damages and give their opinions.

Estimated cost of damage to county roads, acequias (community owned ditches), agriculture and private sector (vehicles, farm buildings and houses) in the Hondo Valley was listed at \$615,299 by Lincoln County Emergency Management Coordinator

Maggi Bohks.

If approved, FEMA will reimburse the county 80 percent of the cost to restore public property to its prior condition. FEMA will not provide funds to repair damage to privately owned property. "Lincoln County is not trying to recoup 80 percent of the \$600,000," said commission chairman Monroy Montes. Rather it will seek reimbursement just for roads and ditches.

Commissioner Wilton Howell asked what the county should do about damages to private property that threatens the health, safety and

welfare of the citizens. "This concerns me, there must be something to address assistance for these people,"

Howell said. "In our recent budget we gave some money to assist ranchers to kill coyotes, to the tune of \$25,000. It bothers me we can do things like that when we can't take care of keeping water out of somebody's house. I'd like to see us help the homeowners."

Montes said the road manager can use discretion in an emergency situation to take care of citizens affected by storms. However, road manager

Illegal Dumping Is Out Of Control

Last week an entire exhaust system from a vehicle was dumped into a container next to the Smokey Bear Vista parking area south of Capitan, which offers a fantastic view of Sierra Blanca. At Gavilan Canyon, there were old water heaters and furniture covered with yard waste. At Grindstone, pine needles, old furniture and other large bulky trash were discarded. And at the gateway to Ruidoso Downs on Highway 70 east, continuous piles of bulky trash piled beside the dumpsters welcome visitors with an unpleasant sight.

Dumping yard waste, old appliances and furniture in or next to a Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) dumpster is illegal.

LCSWA provides large roll off containers for such trash at the recycling center in Ruidoso Downs and at the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon in Ruidoso. Such

trash also can be dumped at the Capitan Landfill 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday. In Ruidoso residents can call LCSWA to arrange a special pick up of such items.

Anyone who dumps the large trash next to a dumpster is subject to a maximum \$500 fine. But even with the decals warning of the \$500 fine for using the containers illegally, trash contin-

ues to accumulate next to dumpsters, especially those in isolated locations.

"It seems where ever there is a dumpster it becomes an illegal dump site," said LCSWA manager Joe

Lewandowski at a special meeting of LCSWA on Tuesday, May 31.

Lewandowski said the problem is mostly in the county and the outskirts of the villages. Illegal dumping is going on during the day, with violators apparently knowing the hours of LCSWA collections.

Special pick ups of illegally dumped trash has cost LCSWA some \$50,000 this year alone. Lewandowski said if illegal dumping continues garbage rates may have to be raised to pay for the increased special pick ups.

So great is the problem of illegal dumping that LCSWA is seeking the help of Ruidoso/Lincoln County CrimeStoppers and the realty community. LCSWA has no power to issue citations to violators directly, but it can file complaints as a private citizen.

Ruidoso LCSWA member Gary Jackson said that

dumpsters in unoccupied areas are "almost like attractive nuisances." He suggested removing those with the worst violations such as at Grindstone. Jackson had invited Sgt. Lanny Maddox and code en-

forcement officer Thomas Chavez from the village of Ruidoso. Maddox, who is actively involved with the crimestoppers program, recommended the CrimeStoppers approach to reduce the illegal dumping. With CrimeStopper the public can help stop the dumping by reporting it, and it can also learn what constitutes illegal dumping. Then judges can enforce the education by imposing maximum sentences and fines, and by making examples of violators, Maddox said.

CrimeStoppers program also enables citizens to file complaints about illegal dumping while staying anonymous. However, if a citizens will testify in court, Maddox recommended a higher reward.

County LCSWA representative Bill Schwettmann suggested publishing the names of persons convicted of illegal dumping in the local newspapers.

Glen Crane president of the realtor association offered the help of the realty community to do a public relations campaign. "We really see a need," Crane said. "Welcome to Ruidoso, with overflowing dumpsters."

Stephanie Chastain, originator of the "Respect Ruidoso" campaign, was concerned that removing dumpsters from isolated areas would leave the residential and grocery store containers open to trash dumping by the many visitors to the area. She volunteered to help in any way to get a "handle on the problem."

As for police enforcement, LCSWA has no direct power to issue citations. LCSWA chairman Wilton Howell suggested the LCSWA members go back to their government entities, such as the villages of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan, to seek authority to enforce the illegal dumping. Other members suggested increased sheriff's patrol.

Ruidoso, however, does not have the biggest illegal dumping problem. Residents there can call LCSWA to arrange free pick ups of such items as pine needles, yard waste, brush, old appliances and furniture.

Some of the illegal dumpers are businesses and construction companies which do not use the roll offs at the recycling center or the transfer station, and they don't haul their trash to the Class C Landfill in Capitan. Instead, trash is dumped at the isolated dumpsters.

Some businesses are using the LCSWA provided roll off containers, or the Capitan landfill. These businesses have been listed in a LCSWA advertisement. Lewandowski said these are doing it right and are "paying the big bill for those doing it for free."

But even the US Forest Service is guilty of dumping trash in the LCSWA containers. The forest service has an account with LCSWA for three dumpsters in the locked Cedar Creek picnic area. But Lewandowski said someone saw a forest service truck dumping trash into some other LCSWA dumpsters. Lewandowski said he called the forest service about paying for more dumpsters and he was told the forest service had no money.

Howell asked that the forest service be contacted and be invited to attend the next meeting about the matter.

Lewandowski said the illegal dumping problem was a low priority while LCSWA was pursuing a landfill. Now that LCSWA is half owner in the regional landfill, he said that solving the illegal dumping problem will become his

priority goal.

A problem at the regional landfill continues to nag its owners. The state land office has mandated that Otero/Lincoln County Solid Waste Authorities complete the mineral rights acquisition for the landfill property. The City of Alamogordo manager Bob Stockwell at the last regular LCSWA meeting said the city would handle the mineral rights problem. But since, LCSWA attorney Robert Beauvais has received notice that the state land office wants the mineral rights problem settled soon, or it could "take action to enjoin the further use of the landfill."

Howell and other LCSWA members agreed a strong letter be sent to the City of Alamogordo, which is subcontractor to O/LCSWAs about resolving the mineral rights issue. Copies of all correspondence will also be sent to OCSWA.

LCSWA members also unanimously accepted the proposal for the 1993-94 fiscal year audit from Ronnie Hemphill of Ruidoso.

LCSWA members officially sent their condolences to member Ruidoso mayor Jerry Shaw's whose husband Dick had recently died.


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

FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

On Elections And Racing

Elections and racing may not seem to be related subjects but here in New Mexico both topics have been cussed and discussed during the past few weeks and will continue to be uppermost in many people's minds for a long while.

Important Days In New Mexico

Forest Service Will Issue New Proposed Law Enforcement Rule

WASHINGTON, D.C. — USDA Forest Service Chief Jack Ward Thomas announced that the agency will revise and issue a new proposed law enforcement rule. Chief Thomas said his decision responds to thousands of comments received from citizens who objected to several provisions of the first proposal.

Chief Thomas said, "The American people and their public resources deserve the best protection possible. Many people were confused and upset about the intent of our proposed rule, and I'm sorry that happened. We want to work with the public to update our law enforcement regulations in order to meet our responsibilities for public safety and resource protection. I want to assure the public that the Forest Service has no intention of hampering legitimate public recreation and use of the national forests and grasslands."

"We heard people express specific concerns about the use of firearms, recreational rockhounding, and other aspects of the proposed rule. We will respond with a new version for people to review," he added. A date has not been set for the issuance of the revised proposal.

With over 290 million visitors enjoying recreational opportunities on 191 million acres of national forests and grasslands, public safety concerns have grown dramatically in the past few years. Illegal activities such as gang violence, marijuana cultivation, and drug use, and theft of public resources including trees and archeological treasures, are increasing law enforcement challenges for Forest Service managers.

The proposed law enforcement rule is intended to im-

prove protection of the public and the resources by consolidating regulations and reflecting recent changes in laws enacted by Congress. Under the Administrative Procedures Act, federal agencies publish proposed rules in the Federal Register and invite written comments from interested people. Those comments are then considered as the agency drafts the final version of a rule. The Forest Service published the Proposed Rule on February 18 in the Federal Register. Thousands of comments were received in an extended comment period of 90 days, which ended May 18. Chief Thomas has decided not to proceed to a final rule. Instead a new proposal will be developed which will be made available again for public review and comment.

"The American people deserve clear rules about how they may use their National Forest System lands. I pledge that we will do a better job of working with concerned citizens and interested groups as part of our revision effort," Thomas said. "We will make every effort to inform people when the new proposed rules are available for review and comment. We will strive to inform them about the rule clearly and concisely. We cannot let our present out-of-date rules continue, but we want people to be sure of our intentions before we proceed."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—The Deming Luna Mimbres Museum is almost a victim of too much success.

The 1994 Legislature appropriated \$150,000 for the purchase of the old Customs House across the street from the museum. The building was intended for expansion but with a large addition completed just a few years ago, another being built for military exhibits, and property donated nearby for a large transportation exhibit, getting around to developing the Customs House may take awhile.

So why not just add more staff? Well, because there isn't any staff. The museum is operated by a very large corps of volunteers. Even director Ruth Brown receives no pay. Recently, however, the job of keeping 25,000 square feet of exhibit space dust free became too big for the volunteers, so two custodians became the first employees on the museum's payroll. Maybe an increasingly large staff will follow, but that's not in the plans.

The success of Deming's museum has been a result of contagious enthusiasm. In the early '70s Jack Hall and some friends organized the Deming Historical Society and began collecting treasures in a small building. A few years later Hubert Reubush brought in an electric washing machine he said was undoubtedly the first in Luna County. When he was told there wasn't any room, Reubush decided something had to be done.

Word was out that Deming's original National Guard Armory, built just before World War I, was about to be sold or demolished. Reubush and Thelma Inmon went to Santa Fe in 1977 to bargain for the building. They returned with a \$12,000 price tag on the armory. Reubush volunteered to put up half the amount if the community would match it. It didn't take long to raise \$6,000.

Reubush also organized a foundation and donated stock for an endowment to fund daily expenses of the museum. With lower interest rates eating into the endowment's yield, an increasingly successful museum/shop is taking up the slack.

Reubush wasn't the only generous benefactor. When Ted Southerland and his wife moved to town, they soon donated a very large collection of dolls. And like Reubush, he had to fix up a room and build his own display cases to house

the exhibit.

Although he was a recent addition to the community, Southerland's generosity and enthusiasm gave the citizens of Deming a confidence in their museum that led to many more donations of time and money.

What may be the world's largest collection of liquor decanters—1,200 of them featuring famous people, fictional characters, cars, birds and animals—were all donated by one benefactor.

And recently the biggest gift yet has been promised. John and Mary Alice King will donate their collection of Indian artifacts and pottery reportedly valued at several hundred thousand dollars. Space is being prepared, at cost, and the Kings may soon be ready to make the transfer.

When last we visited Deming, Van Jacobsen had just discovered a box full of glass negatives at his country store in Lewis Flats near

Deming. The negatives, developed by Patrick Jonsson of the Deming Headlight staff, were of World War I era soldiers, probably stationed at Camp Cody, then west of town.

The Deming area's rich military history also includes Fort Cummings, the Deming Army Air Base, and a large number of participants in the Bataan Death March. All these will be honored in the new military exhibit. And maybe those Jacobsen photographs will eventually find their way into the display.

When you're in the area, stop by. It's well worth your time. The exhibits are displayed as pleasingly as if they were arranged by paid professionals. There is no admission charge but contributions are expected and appreciated.

And maybe you'll catch some of the enthusiasm that has helped make the Deming Luna Mimbres Museum one of the top small town museums in the nation.

Low-Income Households May Be Eligible For Weatherization Assistance Program

Governor Bruce King has announced that 13 homes of residents in Lincoln County will be weatherized this year due to the addition of state funds to the Weatherization Assistance Program.

King said that 1994 is the first year that New Mexico has provided money directly to the program, which has been funded by the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) since 1977. "I was pleased to be able to work with the Legislature to authorize these additional funds to weatherize

homes for low income, elderly and handicapped residents," he said.

Lincoln County will receive a total of \$26,447 for weatherization of 13 homes in the county, which includes homes funded by both state and DOE funds. Last year, 5 homes were weatherized in Lincoln County. Allocations are based on a funding formula which considers low-income households in an area.

Secretary of the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department, said that the Weatherization Assistance Program is designed to assist low income persons, especially the elderly and handicapped, with energy conservation repairs to their homes. "Persons who are over sixty years of age, or handicapped, receive priority in the delivery of services," she said. "Other considerations include age of children in the household,

household income, fuel type used, and the condition of the home."

Secretary Lockwood indicated that an average of \$110 dollars can be saved on energy bills each year after weatherization takes place. "Chaves County Community Action Program, Roswell is our contractor for these services, and we encourage low income people to contact them to determine if they are eligible for the program."



Hotline Set Up To Answer Questions About Asbestos

The New Mexico Environment Department has set up a telephone hotline to answer questions about asbestos for anyone planning a renovation or demolition. The toll-free number is 1-800-224-7009.

Federal regulations require that certain safety procedures and work methods be used when removing asbestos-containing material. Failure to abide by the regulations can result in penalties of \$15,000 per day per violation. The regulations require written notification to be sent to the State before work commences in most buildings. The regulations do not apply to private family dwellings.

Asbestos is a known carcinogen. It has been linked to lung cancer, to mesothelioma (a cancer of the chest lining), and to asbestosis (a scarring of the lung by asbestos fibers.)

Asbestos was used in the manufacture of more than 3-thousand different products, including vinyl floor tiles, linoleum, pipe insulation, textured paints, and joint compound for sheet rock. It can also be found in stoves, freezers, dryers and fireplaces. Generally, visual inspection of these products is not sufficient for determining the presence of asbestos.

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
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

Bill Cupit asked that the commission support him in the emergency assistance, to avoid the legal problems other counties faced in similar situations. Cupit also asked that the state make inspection of all county bridges on the Rios Bonito and Honda.

The Lincoln County Fairgrounds improvement project is back on track. Tony Elias, executive director of the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) which is administering the improvement project, said he had talked with Wayne Andrews architect of the project.

Andrews recommended re-advertising for proposals for the project in lots. Elias said re-bidding in the lot format would cost no more in architect fees.

Commissioners approved Andrews' recommendation to re-advertise request for proposals on the fairgrounds improvements to be done in four lots: canopy, concession, storeroom and connecting walkway. With separate prices for each lot, the project architect can determine which of lots can be completed with the \$114,000 funding available.

The previous bid included all four lots in one lump sum. Commissioners rejected the bid because it was more than \$100,000 over the funding available.

Another bid to be re-advertised was for the road department water truck tank. No bids were received, mainly because of the 10-day delivery required, Cupit said. Commissioners authorized the request for bids on the water tank be re-advertised in the Albuquerque Journal with the provision that the time limit be left to the bidder. Credit will be given to bidders with a shorter delivery time.

The invitations to bid on both items were advertised in the Lincoln County News and The Ruidoso News. Schwetmann requested advertisement in the larger newspaper in hopes of attracting a responsive company.

Elias said that according to the state procurement codes, if the county receives no bids the second time around on both the water tank and the fairgrounds improvements, the county may go out and find qualified companies with the best price to do the projects. Also Elias said that according to the procurement code invitations to bid, or request for proposals, need only be advertised in regional newspapers and require only 10 days for response time.

Lincoln County Senior Olympics will officially become a county committee. Olympics spokesperson Barbara Ward requested the county assume sponsorship in order to bring the Olympics under the county insurance umbrella. This year, the Village of Ruidoso, will provide the liability insurance for the senior events.

Commissioners authorized acting county manager Martha Guevara to begin the process of making the Senior Olympics a county committee, and work with Ward to formulate the composition of the committee. Currently the organizing committee includes Sandee Dutchover, Bart Young, S.M. McDougal, Glen Ellison, Virginia Danielson and Wayne Mason. As a county sanctioned

organization, the nominations to the committee will have to be invited by legal advertisement and only written nominations will be considered as appointees to the committee. All other rules affecting county committees will apply, being a registered voter and no more than three missed meetings allowed.

Commissioner Ray Nunley proposed the county create the committee with no per diem or travel funding unless okayed by the commission. He suggested the committee be comprised of a senior from every center in the county, plus two at large.

County insurance agent Al Berryman recommended an addendum to the insurance request for proposals now being solicited to include liability coverage of the Senior Olympics organization. Berryman thought that the liability insurance would cost the county nothing extra.

Commissioners approved a contract for a maximum of \$1,100 for professional services with SNMEDD to administer the Corona Senior Citizens center remodeling project. The state legislature appropriated funding to remodel the building which was given to the village of Corona by El Paso Natural Gas Co. The county asked that the project architect be appraised of a person who is willing to remove the exterior asbestos shingles on the building, and that if any such removal is undertaken that the county is indemnified of any liability.

County clerk Martha Proctor requested permission to proceed with the microfilming contract with Dataplex. Commissioners had given her prior permission to

negotiate the contract and then have a purchase order issued to begin the process. However, commissioners did not recall having taken that action. Proctor played the tape recording of the meeting when the action was taken, which affirmed that she was given permission to proceed with a purchase order after successful negotiation.

Commissioners also heard a presentation from Mary Cronin who operates The Profile Aspect, a company which provides "Prevue Assessment" an evaluation tool for potential employees. The Otero County Commission utilized the assessment tool in hiring its manager and attorney. Otero County Commission chairman Bob Bishop suggested Cronin contact the Lincoln County Commission about making a presentation. The evaluation costs \$135 per person, but Cronin said that would be little cost if only done for position finalists.

Commissioners requested time to study Cronin's proposal.

Cronin's presentation led to a discussion about hiring a county manager. Montes said he did not want to have the discussion about hiring the county manager in the newspaper as what happened about the hiring of the manager of the Rural Events Center (former Super Select Sales Barn). Apparently the hiring of the center manager was done by Montes without the presence of the other commissioners.

In order to prevent a similar situation, Montes suggested commissioners discuss the format they will take to select a new county manager. The deadline for

applications for the county manager's job is June 3. Montes suggested commissioners not rush the selection, rather at the June 10 meeting commissioners will receive packets consisting of all applications, which they can take home and review. Montes then suggested the commission set a meeting as a personnel board to narrow the applicants to a few that will be interviewed.

"Whatever we do, someone call Stirling (Spencer) so he can get in on it," Howell said. Spencer apparently complained that he was left out of the Rural Events Center (Sales Barn) manager selection process because he did not know about it.

Nunley suggested that there at least be a quorum of the commission present at the hiring of the county manager. "Don't get in a big rush," he also said.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer was not present at the May 27 meeting, as he had commitments out of town.

Nunley requested that Martha Guevara be declared official acting county manager at the June 10 meeting.

The Magistrate Court has many purposes other than determining the guilt or innocence of someone accused of breaking the law. Almost anyone can read and apply the correct statute to a given situation, but not everyone has the experience and knowledge of the lives of our local population to apply the law in a way that will correct the problem rather than simply punish the offender. And that is what the court should do - correct the problem. Therefore, it is extremely important that the candidate you vote for is one who has more interest in helping people than compiling large numbers of cases handled. A large case load for a court, like a large patient load for a doctor, is indicative of less time being spent on each case than might be necessary or desirable.

It should be known that I cannot tolerate two things - I detest the intemperate use of alcohol, especially when mixed with vehicles or firearms, and the neglect or abuse of children. I would be firm and unyielding in dealing with either.

I have always worked with the youth of this county, and intend to continue doing so. It is my belief that the time to exert a positive influence on our youngsters is before they get into trouble, rather than after. The personal involvement of our parents and elected officials is crucial in keeping kids headed in the right direction. Regardless of schedule or docket, my time will never be too valuable to keep me from that involvement.

**Help Available
For Medicare
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People who have Medicare and who cannot afford a Medigap (supplemental health insurance) policy may be eligible for one of three government assistance programs.

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***Specified Low-Income Medicare Beneficiaries (SLMB)**. This program is for people with limited assets and incomes slightly above the federal poverty level. SLMB pays your Part B premiums. This year, SLMB could save you up to \$493.20. To qualify for SLMB, your income cannot be more than \$695 a month for one person or \$922 a month for a couple.

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

No Money For MainStreet Office

the last 10 years has been so beneficial, I see a need to finish," Donaldson said. He added that he would support the second and third phases in the future to see the MainStreet boundaries expanded.

Donaldson welcomed the MainStreet board to look through the budget to find any excess dollars.

There are some 61 dues paying members of MainStreet Ruidoso, Inc. a not for profit organization. Mayor Jerry Shaw indicated at a previous meeting that the village would be willing to become a dues paying member.

MainStreet Ruidoso re-development project designers Bohannon-Huston, Inc. also

got turned down. The firm requested the village release \$6,644 as the retainage that was withheld in conjunction with the design. But the village MainStreet project manager and village deputy manager Alan Briley said that the village has paid Bohannon-Huston \$61,888.59 out of a \$66,440 contract, leaving \$4,551.41.

Jackson said that typically, retainage is kept until a satisfactory completion of the project. Because of several questions about inconsistencies and errors in the plans, he recommended the council not pay the retainage.

Village attorney John Underwood said Bohannon-Huston was hired to be professional engineers for the village and he believed that the village accepting the designs did not relieve Bohannon-Huston's responsibility for professional designs. He recommended the council not send the retainage, rather he recommended a letter be sent to Bohannon-Huston about the many problems created by the plans and put the firm on notice of such.

Design flaws and problems with the designs have resulted in time and cost overruns in the actual work portion of the project.

On the actual project, concrete was scheduled to be

poured Wednesday and some areas are on hold waiting on delivery of drainage units. Briley said Phase 1 should be completed in about two weeks, but the entire project is behind schedule.

A .9 mile of unpaved road near Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will get paved as part of a road swap deal negotiated by the Lincoln County Commission and the New Mexico State Highway Department. Underwood said the agreement has been re-negotiated to include paving of the village's .9 mile. Lincoln County agrees to assume ownership of State Road 214 (Devil's Canyon Road) from the turn off to the airport to Highway 70 in exchange for the highway department assuming ownership of Airport Scenic Drive from Highway 48 in Alto north to where it connects to State Road 214. The state highway department also will retain ownership of State Road 214 through Fort Stanton to Highway 380.

Sierra Blanca Regional Airport will soon have aircraft mechanic services. The council unanimously accepted the independent contractor aircraft mechanic agreement from Ronald Schrock. Beginning July 1 he will provide at least 1200 hours of unscheduled services for aircraft at the airport and will be available on a two hour notice. Schrock will be provided one airplane space in the gang hanger at the airport and will have opportunity to rent additional space. The village will pay Schrock \$18,000 a year for his services, and the village will bill customers at \$30 an hour for aircraft work and will pass on \$15 per hour to Schrock. Schrock in turn is required to maintain full coverage insurance and failure to do so will terminate the agreement immediately.

The agreement was reviewed by an airport selection committee consisting of the airport manager and was also recommended by the Airport Committee which was appointed by the mayor.

As of July 1, developers and contractors will have to pay higher fees for permits and zoning change applications in the village. Councilors approved Ordinance 94-11 which amends the building and zoning codes to increase the permit and application fees. The increased fees for permits and zoning change applications are listed in the ordinance and are available by calling the village administration center.

Other ordinances approved by the council included a zone map amendment from R-4 high density residential to R-1 low density residential for sites 1-29 in White Mountain Subdivision, Unit 1; an ordinance establishing mandatory automation court fees and giving the municipal judge the same benefits as given to councilors; and Ordinance 94-10 which amends the municipal code to allow liquor dispenser license owners to have a special dispensers permit (picnic license) on their premises, with approval of the village council. The amendment puts the issuance of the picnic license on a case by case basis as was done previously.

With the approval of the zoning amendment, councilors paved the way for White

Mountain Development Co. Inc. to re-subdivide its White Mountain Meadows Subdivision, Unit 1. Councilors approved the re-subdivision with four contingencies, including allowance of a \$30,000 certificate of deposit as surety that all roads and other improvements be done.

Councilors also:

—Accepted bids for: annual plumbing, heating and air conditioning maintenance from Lincoln Mechanical, Inc. of Ruidoso, the sole bidder; electrical maintenance from W R C Electric Co. of Ruidoso; a compact tractor from Air Cooled Engine of Las Cruces for a Kubota 4WD.

—Heard a complaint from David Bonnell of Bonnell Gravel and Sand that the village discriminated against his company, and other small businesses. He said his bids were lower than the others submitted and questioned why it was not considered. After discussion how the bids needed further evaluation, councilors postponed action on the gravel bid until all factors are tabulated.

—Rejected a request from the Counseling Center to amend its contract with the village, so the village will provide a guaranteed \$6500 minimum. The request died for a lack of a motion, and the counseling services will be provided through the police department budget on an "as needed basis" at \$65 an hour. Last year the center provided some 140 hours of counseling.

—Approved the mayor's appointment of Bill Herschfeld and Bill Chance to the Lodgers Tax Committee

and Bill Chance, Joan Line-man, Frankie Jarrell, Bill Herschfeld and Giddings Brown to the Convention and Visitors Bureau Ad Hoc Committee.

—Tabled appointment of a labor representative on the village labor relations board until the June 14 meeting. A village employee requested consideration of Donald Ralton as the labor representative on the Labor Relations Board. The village's collective bargaining ordinance will be reviewed by the state labor relations board on June 13. If approval is given, the village may then appoint its local labor relations board.

—Heard Underwood say that he has significant concerns about the wording in an agreement with the state for re-allocation of \$150,000 in severance tax funds originally intended for the design of Phases 2 and 3 in the MainStreet redevelopment project. Underwood worked to get the funding re-allocated to be used to resolve the public parking and public restrooms problems, however, the new agreement does not include wording for the new projects. Underwood said he would continue to work to get the wording rectified to get the project going to purchase property for parking and proceed with the bathrooms.

—Approved consent agenda which included a special dispensers permit for use at Ruidoso Convention Civic Events Center on July 20 for the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau annual conference.

Restricting Lactose Can Help Allviate Problems

For some people, drinking milk or eating milk products can be the prelude to misery. They are among those who have lactose intolerance. Lactose is the primary carbohydrate in dairy products. Most people are able to digest it because they have a specific enzyme, lactase, that breaks down lactose. However, many people have low levels—or none—of this enzyme. Approximately 70 percent of children worldwide between three and five years of age lose their ability to digest lactose because of lactase deficiency. This is especially true among adults of African, Asian and Mediterranean heritage. Some population groups, such as Caucasians, maintain their ability to digest lactose throughout life. Although not consuming milk products will help you avoid the discomfort of bloating, cramping and gas that are symptoms of lactose intolerance, doing so can result in a diet deficient in calcium. Dairy products are the most important sources of calcium in our diet. It helps build strong bones and teeth and plays other vital roles in the body as well. (SEE PAGE 8B)

Restricting Lactose

Treatment requires that lactose be restricted to a level that does not produce symptoms. This does not mean that you should totally eliminate lactose from your diet if you are lactose intolerant.

Aged cheddar cheese or Swiss cheese, cottage cheese, ice cream and "activate culture" yogurt have less lactose than most other dairy products. Lactose intolerant people can usually eat these products without incident.

Whole or chocolate milk usually doesn't cause discomfort because the increased fat and sugar slows digestion. Foods made with milk, such as soups and milkshakes usually do not produce symptoms for most people with lactose intolerance.

Another way to alleviate the problem associated with lactose intolerance is to take enzyme replacement tablets before meals, or use drops that can be added to food.

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
