

IRS Demands \$42,000 From Lincoln County

The IRS has attached a lien on to Lincoln County, demanding another \$16,000 which IRS claims the county collected for employee pay withholding and FICA last year, and did not forward. But before the county will pay, it will conduct an internal audit to find where the problem lies.

During a special meeting in Ruidoso on Monday, Lincoln

County Commissioners questioned who is responsible for the more than \$42,000 in withholding and FICA taxes the IRS claims the county collected and did not forward. But there were no clear answers. County manager Frank Potter, new to the job in February when IRS sent its first \$26,000 demand, said he hoped it wasn't him. "I authorized the payment of \$26,000 to the IRS to stop the bleeding," Potter said. "I did it

without commission approval because IRS said I was responsible."

But the bleeding didn't stop. Last week the county received another \$16,000 bill from IRS.

Potter said the county finance department claimed to have made all payments on a timely basis. Even the county's auditor found that all the payroll taxes were made according to tax deposits and none were late. In 1994 however, a county computer pro-

gram overpaid the taxes by \$3,000 in the first quarter. But in September 1995, the computer program stated the county had underpaid \$10,000.

The auditor also thought the county's accounting system may have kicked out the first and third quarters.

All the events occurred under a previous county manager, and Potter conjectured, "they set on this, feeling something was wrong with

the computer program."

"But it doesn't matter," Potter went on to say. The \$10,000 bill soon doubled with penalties to \$20,000. By the time IRS notified the county, the bill had increased to \$26,593.86. Then last week, the county got the next \$16,000 bill.

Potter said he still is not sure what has happened with the IRS, except that the county deals with the IRS Office in Roswell, and the notification

of lack of payment comes from the IRS office in Austin. "The Roswell collection guy came and we paid the money," Potter said.

Drought Management Seminar To Be Held In Carrizozo Wednesday

Ranchers are invited to attend a drought management seminar in Carrizozo May 29 at the Otero County Electric Cooperative building at 10 a.m. The seminar is sponsored by the New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service.

Topics to be covered include supplemental feeding programs, rangelands management, reproductive efficiency, taxes, market outlook, and emergency disaster programs. Additional topics covering the sheep industry will be presented.

The seminar will help ranchers evaluate alternatives for dealing with the drought. Precipitation in New Mexico was 60 to 80 percent below normal for the first four months this year. This follows two to three years of severe drought in the state.

In addition, cattle growers are facing approximately a 30 percent decrease in fed cattle prices and increasing feed prices.

The seminar is open to the public. For more information call the local extension office.

Ruidoso Will Fine Fire Violators \$500

No warnings will be given to violators of the Ruidoso fire emergency.

Anyone caught with outside fires (camp fires, gas grills, charcoal grills, lanterns, candles, etc.), burning of any flammable surface and outdoor smoking on public property will be given a \$100 fine for the first offense and a \$500 fine for the second and subsequent offenses. The citations will be heard in Ruidoso Municipal Court.

The fines were imposed by order of Ruidoso Village Council because of the extreme fire emergency brought on by the prolonged drought.

While smoking outdoors is unlawful on public property such as the public streets, sidewalks, parks, Grindstone Lake and other locations, the village is asking for voluntary compliance to the no-outdoor smoking on private property also. Smoking is allowed only inside a vehicle equipped with an ashtray and within buildings.

County Approves Unit III For Ranches de Sonterra

With the county gripped in the fourth year of a drought that has brought many streams to a trickle, or nothing, and which has left at least one reservoir totally dry, developers who seek to divide large parcels of land into hundreds of smaller lots will have a more difficult time in obtaining approval from the Lincoln County Commission.

The best example of what a developer may have to go through in Lincoln County is the Ranches de Sonterra being developed by Properties of the Southwest.

In 1994 Properties of the Southwest first approached the Lincoln County Planning Committee seeking endorsement for its 650 lot, three-unit phased subdivision of the

4,000+ acre former Barham Ranch on the Rio Bonito west of the BLM lands at Fort Stanton.

While the Lincoln County Commission had approved the first two units, it delayed approval of the third unit until a special meeting on Monday, May 20. The delay was due mostly to questions concerning the water availability report, and because of conflicting information from the State Engineer's Office (SEO) received by the county that made it appear that developers of such subdivisions would have to make water available to the buyers of the properties.

At the county commission meeting held in Ruidoso attorney John Underwood on behalf of Ranches de Sonterra clarified that only Donald T.

Lopez, assistant, State Engineer's Office (SEO) was authorized to send approval of statements of water availability, and that all memos and other information forwarded by several individuals in that office had no bearing affect and was a misunderstanding.

Underwood said he visited the SEO in Santa Fe, and discovered that an Attorney General's opinion about subdividers furnishing water or providing proof of availability of water for a Type II subdivision, was taken out of context of a 1984 opinion given by then Attorney General Paul Bardacke on the entire state subdivision act. Also, Underwood found that the memo issued about that opinion was not by an attorney.

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Tons Of Pine Needles And Tree Waste Buries LCSWA

The extreme fire danger situation in the Ruidoso area has created a massive clean up campaign that has overwhelmed the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) with tons of pine needles and other tree waste.

Residents and visitors have been raking tons of pine needles off the ground and cleaning off gutters and roofs in Ruidoso, hoping to create a fire defensible space around their homes in the pines. And next week, Ruidoso Village Council will consider an ordinance which will change its current codes to allow the

thinning of wooded areas in order to create defensible space.

With the June 1 total closure of the Capitan Landfill, which has been used for the dumping of yard wastes and other debris, LCSWA will have to haul the additional tree waste to the regional landfill south of Alamogordo.

In order to get the private sector involved with the disposal of the pine needles, tree branches, brush, yard waste and other "clean fill" LCSWA approved advertising for proposals at its last meeting. Five proposals were returned by the deadline.

The early absentee voting poll in Ruidoso is open from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Monday through Friday except on May 27, when it will be closed for Memorial Day. The poll will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, June 1.

Early absentee votes can also be cast at the Lincoln County Clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, except Monday, May 27, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, June 1. All ballots must be returned by mail or person to the Lincoln County Clerk's office by 7 p.m. on election day, June 4.

Any voter who is registered in one of the major parties, Democrat, Republican or

Green, may vote early absentee, or absentee. To obtain an absentee ballot a registered voter must request an Application.

Tuesday, during the regular LCSWA board meeting in Ruidoso Downs, new member Robert Donaldson (representing Ruidoso), Monroy Montes (representing the county) and acting manager Jerry Wright were named to a selection committee to review the proposals and bring a recommendation to a special meeting at 5 p.m. Wednesday, May 29.

"Disposal is so critical now," Donaldson said. "We need to meet this week. It's that bad." Wright said there was some question what would happen when the Capitan landfill was closed on May 18. "We found out," he said. "We've got to move with expediency (on the disposal proposals)."

Wright said the fire danger in the Ruidoso area has created a massive clean up campaign. Last Saturday, an 80-yard container was filled in three hours. "And it's just beginning," Donaldson said.

Donaldson and Ruidoso member Gary Jackson said LCSWA will be getting even more pine needles, and logs and other tree wastes, after changes are made to the forest protection ordinance at the May 28 Ruidoso council meeting. Jackson suggested LCSWA put out a roll-off container specifically for the pine needles and other tree wastes. Wright said that he might have to pull out some roll offs from commercial accounts, because LCSWA does not have enough of the large containers to handle the expected rush of pine debris.

LCSWA has received a \$200,000 grant from the state to help with the Capitan Landfill closure. Part of the funds were to be spent on additional roll off containers, and an additional large transport trailer. However, the state has informed LCSWA not to spend the funds until they are received.

To help cope with the impending rush of pine waste, Wright said that he plans to hire two part-time seasonal employees earlier this year for special pickups, and to operate the chipper for limbs. He also said LCSWA will begin charging 50 cents a bag of pine needles if individuals call for a special pickup.

"We're going to have streets lined with bags of pine needles," Donaldson replied. "People won't call. We need some regular pickups."

Donaldson said Ruidoso needs to solve the special pickup situation, even it requires an additional charge to the current collection fees. But Ruidoso member and mayor, Jerry Shaw said LCSWA needs to work on the problem as a board.

For now LCSWA is taking the pine needles to the Capitan landfill, which is still open to commercial trash haulers with existing accounts. LCSWA plans to close the Capitan landfill for all dumping on June 1. "I hope we have enough area to go to June 1," Wright said. "I've been told it will take \$60,000

worth of dirt to cover the pile that's there now."

Once the Capitan landfill is completely closed, the Otero-Lincoln County Regional Landfill south of Alamogordo will accept trash from LCSWA and only licensed contractors, Wright said.

"We've had a constant parade," Wright said about people coming to the LCSWA yard in Ruidoso Downs to dump trash that would have gone to the Capitan Landfill.

Illegal dumping at LCSWA dumpsters is expected to increase as the pine needle

clean-up continues. As a way to prevent such illegal dumping, Wright said dumpsters in problem areas such as those on Highway 48 in the Alta area, will be spread out in the area neighborhoods. He said that recently two individuals were caught dumping illegally, and one opted to pay a business charge rather than a fine.

Wright also reported that starting this Saturday, a driver and truck will pick up trash during the weekends, especially at the race track and containers on Highway 48.

During the fire emergency, Grindstone Lake will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Fishing will not be allowed on the south side of the lake, because fire fighting vehicles have no access to that area.

As always, the possession, transporting, selling or discharging of fireworks within the village of Ruidoso is prohibited by ordinance.

Potter said they have had a preliminary meeting with the IRS, but the collection man in the Roswell office is on vacation and will not be back until next week. County finance officer Punkin Schlarb is planning to go to the Roswell office and find out what happened, Potter said.

"If we don't pay, they'll come get me," Potter said.

Commission chairman Monroy Montes was concerned about that lack of access with

the IRS.

Commissioner Stirling Spencer asked if the county's auditor found that the county paid properly. Potter said the auditor stated the county made all the deposits on a timely basis, but the auditor did not look at the amount. "They don't know?" Spencer asked.

Potter said the audit is done randomly, and all deposits looked at were paid on time and were correct. "I think it's the responsibility of the auditors to find out," Spencer said.

Spencer then demanded the county do its own internal audit, "quickly."

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley said, "There's negligence somewhere. This has been going on for two years, and to attach our property. We had to be notified before now."

Schlarb said that when the county received the notice, they in the finance office started looking through figures. But Nunley asked if they manually calculated the figures. "That's what we're doing now," Schlarb said.

"It's a little late," Nunley replied. "The cows already got out."

Commissioner Bill Schwettmann asked if Potter paid the \$26,000 under protest. "You can file as such, then the money is put in escrow which we can get back if the problem is resolved."

But Potter, concerned about federal guidelines in dealing with employee's money, said the employees can go after the funds.

Schwettmann also wanted Potter to contact our Congressmen for help.

County treasurer Joan Park was concerned about the computer program which underpaid \$10,000. "Where is it?" she asked.

Schlarb said the computer generates the employee checks and then totals the withholding after all quarters.

Potter also thought the problem could be with the county's computer programming company Triadic. But Triadic representative Mike Hofacket said the system has its own checks and balances and has never had a problem. He also said the computer does not generate the IRS form 941 for withholding reporting, it only supplies the information. He said the county also selects the dates for the 941 forms, and the program could have been run with incorrect dates.

While commissioners Nunley and Wilton Howell tried to make motions to pay the \$16,000, under protest, both motions failed. Finally, commissioners unanimously approved a motion to conduct an internal audit, then call a special meeting to authorize payment if necessary.

Also at the meeting, commissioners approved the proposal from Terry L. Jones CPA in Ruidoso to conduct the audit on the 1995-96 fiscal year. The cost of the audit is \$12,000.

Trial Date Set For Charges Against Sheriff's Deputy

A trial date has been set the week of July 15 for Lincoln County Sheriff's Deputy Angelo Vega who was indicted by a Lincoln County grand jury.

District Judge Sandra Grisham will preside over the

trial which will be held in the District Courtroom in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. A week has been scheduled for the trial.

The grand jury indicted Vega on two counts of extortion and two counts of intimidation of a witness on January 31.

The crime of extortion is a third degree felony and the crime of intimidation of a witness is a fourth degree felony.

Vega pleaded not guilty to the charges at a hearing on February 9 before District Judge Richard Parsons, who later recused himself from hearing the case.

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

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Did the Army close down Victorio Peak because the treasure hunters got too close to their goal?

Or did the treasure hunters decide to announce a major breakthrough when they knew they'd soon be shut down over a billing controversy?

It's hard to tell, but here's what appears to be the status of the fascinating saga at this point.

For the past four years, the Ova Noss Family Partnership has been tunneling through a hill a few miles inside the White Sands Missile Range near Hatch to determine whether Ova's husband "Doc" Noss discovered a trove of gold, jewels, coins and artifacts nearly 60 years ago.

Ever since Noss claimed the find in 1937, the story of Victorio Peak has taken more twists than the most complex of mystery novels. Doc, who wasn't a doctor, had a reputation as a hustler, which made it difficult to secure the financial assistance he needed to retrieve his supposed treasure from deep beneath the entrance at the top of the peak.

Complicating Doc's problems further was the federal law making possession of gold illegal. Then there was the matter of a part of the route to the treasure cavern being too cory to allow a person carrying gold bars to pass without great difficulty. So Doc set off a dynamite charge that collapsed a chunk of the mountain into his tunnel and prevented him from ever getting back to his claimed treasure again.

Not that he didn't try. But making believers out of potential investors became even more difficult when all he could show was a few items he claimed to have brought from the depths of the blocked cavern.

Eventually Doc was killed by a disgruntled investor. Ova, his wife at the time, continued the effort but when the Army decided to create a permanent White Sands Missile Range, she and her crew were chased away.

During the decades since, rumors have circulated that the government took all or part of the treasure. In order to settle the matter and put an end to the questions, Rep. Joe Skeen succeeded in passing a law through Congress allowing the Noss heirs to reopen the search to determine whether Doc's story was true and, if so, whether previous

unauthorized explorations had been conducted.

No one imagined the current dig would take four years, but the treasure hunters were hampered by unexpected blasting and backfilling that closed all known passages. At first the Army denied any government explorations of the peak. But as the Noss heirs uncovered more and more evidence, the military acknowledged two of at least three incursions during its watch.

The current Army brass at White Sands Missile Range may have been unaware of previous military maneuvers at Victorio, but the stonewalling that has occurred follows the same pattern as the Air Force's lame excuses for the excitement surrounding mysterious happenings at Roswell in July 1947.

It appears WSMR officials have impeded the Noss group with overly stringent requirements and grossly inflated charges for security, scheduling and environmental and

archaeological monitoring. It is this issue over which work at the site has been halted, at least temporarily. The Army wants an escrow payment of \$140,000 that would bring to nearly \$1 million the amount the partnership has had to "reimburse" WSMR.

The Noss family wants an accounting of that money. WSMR officials ask why the request for a breakdown of expenses now when the partnership never requested one in the past.

But I have just received documentation indicating the amount of the reimbursements and their breakdown have been in dispute ever since the project began. There is also in evidence the project's congressional authorization may require even more accountability from WSMR than it provides other groups working on base land.

We'll bring you much more on this soon. And you may be seeing it in the national media.

National EMS Week Observed May 19-25

President Ford signed the first official proclamation in 1973 for National Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Week.

Each year EMS Week is celebrated to recognize the accomplishments of the men and women who dedicate their lives to saving the lives of others and to educate the public about how and when to call for help.

EMS Week is May 19-25 and is the ideal time to highlight how EMS makes a difference everyday in the lives of Americans and to raise the support vital to the future of EMS. National activities for EMS week this year will focus on showcasing the accomplishments of the past 30 years and on outlining the problems confronting EMS in the future.

It's Up to You is the theme for the 1988 National EMS Week and celebrates the contributions of EMS providers nationwide and stresses the importance of strong public support for the EMS system.

EMS is a vital public service like fire or police but few Americans understand how EMS works or what role they play.

EMS is a system of care for victims of sudden and serious illness and injury. The EMS system depends on the avail-

ability and coordination of many different elements, ranging from an informed public capable of recognizing medical emergencies to a network of trauma centers capable of providing highly specialized care to the most seriously ill or injured.

The 911 emergency number, search and rescue teams, and pre-hospital and emergency department personnel are some of the other elements necessary for the EMS system to work.

Learning the following things could help save a person's life: know how to spot an emergency situation; know how to contact the local emergency service; learn CPR and choking rescue procedures; learn the basics of first aid; make certain all immunizations are current; remember what to do in an accident; understand what to do if a person or child is poisoned; learn what to do if a person has a serious fall; know how to treat burns; be prepared in any type of emergency.

More Fire Restrictions Go Into Effect Monday

Federal agencies have responded to the explosive fire danger by closing timbered areas of the Lincoln National Forest and imposing fire restrictions on BLM lands.

Beginning Monday, BLM banned the building or using of a fire, campfire, charcoal broiler, grill or any stove producing an open flame using propane and petroleum fuels or coal or wood stoves, or maintaining any lighting device using propane or petroleum fuels on all lands managed by BLM.

Underwriter's Laboratories approved stoves and lanterns may be used at the Valley of Fires Recreation Area on the Malpais lava flow west of Carrizozo, because it is the only developed campground where there is a host and/or attendant present within the Roswell BLM District.

Anyone caught violating the fire restriction order on BLM lands is punishable by a fine of not more than \$1,000 and/or imprisonment of not more than 12 months.

The forested areas of the Lincoln National Forest which surround the villages of Ruidoso and Cloudcroft and the Guadalupe District of the Lincoln National Forest are also closed to human access because of the explosive fire danger.

All campgrounds in the Lincoln National Forest are closed.

Law Enforcement Annual Torch Run Set For Next Week

Next week, May 28 through May 31, several branches of New Mexico Law Enforcement will join together to raise both public awareness and money for the state's Special Olympics athletes.

Hundreds of runners representing law enforcement will carry the Special Olympics torch in a series of relays through communities in the state during the tenth annual New Mexico Law Enforcement Torch Run.

The Torch Run will end in Albuquerque Friday, May 31 at 8 p.m. with the final leg taking place at the New Mexico Special Olympics summer games opening ceremonies.

New Mexico Special Olympics is committed to providing year round sports training and competition to more than 2,000 mentally retarded children and adults statewide.

EDITOR: I attended the May 14 meeting concerning Fort Stanton held by the Lincoln County Commissioners. I'm personally against the use of Fort Stanton as a prison because:

First, there won't be that many outside jobs available, if any. When Manuel Romero, Director of Adult Probations Program and Toby Martinez, Director of Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources were asked three different times how many jobs would be created by using Fort Stanton as a prison site, the question was avoided and never answered.

Second, tourism would drop to zero at the historic Fort and that's what Lincoln County thrives on. I don't believe anyone would want to visit a prison while on vacation. I know it wouldn't be No. 1 on my list of things to do.

Third, we would not be getting our much needed tax break as these prisoners would want to be paid and, of course, we (the tax payer) would be paying for the prisoners and staff, as well. Mr. Romero seems to think Lincoln County residents are gullible enough to believe that by paying these prisoners 25¢ to 85¢ per hour, it would help deter the prisoners from thinking about escaping. If I had been a dope dealer, pimp, etc. on the outside making thousands of dollars, I hardly think missing out on my 85¢ per hour would keep me from escaping if that's what I wanted to do.

We brushed aside too quickly the murder only last year of Mr. Pfingsten, a long-time resident of Lincoln, by an escapee from Sierra Blanca prison. The victim could have been anyone of us or our children. We would be putting ourselves at a higher risk by installing prisoners at Fort Stanton.

Anyone can dream up the idea of a prison. Let the Lincoln County Commissioners find a suitable private sector tenant for the Fort. That's what we elected the commissioners to do. Fort Stanton and Lincoln County residents deserve this.

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
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CAPITAN NOTES

25-Pound Lake Trout Is New State Record

The state record for lake trout was broken in April. Current record lake trout is 25 lbs, 9 oz., taken by Diana Rios of Las Cruces at Heron Lake April 14. The trout was 38 inches long and 22 1/2 inches in girth.

The previous record was a 22 lb, 2 oz. trout taken at Heron Lake. It was 35 inches long and 23 inches around.

The lake trout was introduced in 1977 and 1988 into Heron Lake and in 1988 into East Nest and Abiquiu lakes. The fish is slow growing and may live as long as 20 years. It is reported to be the largest North American freshwater salmonid. The species prefers deep cold lakes where it usually remains on or near the bottom, depending on temperature. It feeds on minnows, mayflies and other salmonids.

ney, rather by a worker in the SEO who had heard about the opinion.

Underwood said the only letter from the SEO that was binding, was the May 3 letter signed by Donald T. Lopez stating the subdivision has demonstrated that it is in conformance to county subdivision regulations. Underwood said that the developers in submitting the water availability reports/plan for individual wells in the subdivision did conform to the county and state requirements.

Statements about water availability are required to be included in the development disclosure statements for potential buyers. Properties of the Southwest had included the water availability statements, which were based on studies conducted by geo-hydrologist Jack Atkins of Roswell.

But commissioner Wilton Howell continued to question the accuracy of the water report, mainly because Atkins at the May 7 county commission meeting had said the report was adjusted to reflect the worst case scenario of water availability with a well that was abandoned because it was not drilled to recommended depths. "I have concerns of accuracy and problems with the geo hydrologists reports not being very consistent," Howell said at the Monday meeting.

Ed Libby, Properties of Southwest representative, said they adjusted the subdivision disclosure statement, "but not the finding of fact. The disclosure statement is just a guide for the consumer," Libby said.

Libby went on to say that with the actual drilling of wells, they had real figures to base the water availability on in the disclosure statement, rather than estimates as done in the first phase. "I have all the confidence in the report," Libby said. "The state engineer's office had reviewed it three times, and all have confidence in the report."

But it also took local well driller Kenneth "Stubby" Huey giving a report on the wells in the area to convince some of the commissioners. Huey, a driller for 36 years,

said he has drilled seven wells in Sonterra Units 1 and 2. The wells range from a depth of 700 feet to 150 feet with flows about 20-25 gallons per minute on average. He said the well which was abandoned he did not drill, and he had heard that it was not cased properly because of gravel.

Commissioner chairman Monroy Montes asked about whether any of the Ranches de Sonterra wells have impacted neighboring wells, or if any have gone dry in the area. Huey said that he had heard of none, except one well west of the area which in his opinion was never drilled deep enough in the first place.

"It happens in our business all the time," Huey said. "The driller sells more water than what's there."

That prompted Howell to say, "that's kind of common practice in this county, and not necessarily with just drillers."

Commissioner Ray Nunley made the motion to accept Unit 3 of Ranches de Sonterra, which Howell seconded. Howell said he felt more comfortable with Huey's report than the geo-hydrology report, and because the AG opinion issue was clarified by Underwood.

Even county attorney Alan Morel acknowledged the "misinterpretation" of the state rules about community water systems.

When the vote was taken all commissioners said yes, except Bill Schwettmann who abstained because he did engineering consulting for the developers.

"I think this will impact future developers," commissioner Stirling Spencer said. "It'll get a lot tougher," chimed Nunley and Howell.

Tougher scrutiny is what the developers of Ranches de Sonterra have been experiencing in the last few months. When the developers approached the Lincoln County

Planning Committee in April, asking for a recommendation for approval of the third phase of the development the committee balked because of conflicting information received from the state engineer's office, and because of problems with some area wells due to the dry weather.

Instead the committee sent the request directly to the commissioners with no recommendation, other than to request the county have an independent water availability study made for the expanding Rio Bonito/Airport Road area.

Despite the written report submitted by the Properties of the Southwest to the state engineer stating the area has at least 40 years of ground water supply to sufficiently service all the proposed lots, planning members were concerned about recent reports of wells going dry in the Eagle Creek area.

Atkins who conducted the Ranches de Sonterra water study, and almost all other water studies conducted in Lincoln County, said some wells, depending on where they are drilled, will go dry.

But during the planning committee's meeting in April discussion of the Sonterra wells drifted into the issue of water for the villages of Ruidoso and Capitan from the Eagle Creek area.

"Eagle Creek does not affect Ranches de Sonterra," Atkins said.

Atkins went on to say that Ranches de Sonterra is not on the Eagle Creek water shed,

and all the hydrological data for the Ranches de Sonterra area was collected by himself. He said he measured water levels in three old wells in the Ranches de Sonterra area, some which were drilled as long ago as 1952.

Jim Powell, Properties of the Southwest, said he was concerned that Atkins "the most prestigious hydrologist in the area" is being attacked by linking Atkins to problems at Eagle Creek.

"Jack was retained by the village of Ruidoso, but his recommendations were not adhered to, and problems are the result," Powell said. "His credibility is impeccable."
