

Governor Wants State To Unload Fort Stanton

Governor Gary Johnson wants the state to unload Fort Stanton.

Last Thursday, before members of the New Mexico Municipal League meeting for their annual conference in Ruidoso, Johnson said he is willing to consider a joint partnership between the state and Lincoln County to allow the county to assume stewardship for the historic fort.

Lincoln County commission-

er Wilton Howell questioned the governor about the possible partnership after Johnson had delivered a message during the Governor's Session of the league conference. Howell commended the governor for his decision to not place a prison work camp at Fort Stanton. "The only way to represent the people is to listen," Howell told Johnson. "I think you displayed that with Fort Stanton."

At a meeting held August 17 at Fort Stanton approxi-

mately 135 angry citizens let Cabinet Secretary Jennifer Salisbury know they did not want another prison in Lincoln County, especially at Fort Stanton. They also sent the message that they most preferred to see the fort turned into a living museum/conference center, either state or privately operated.

Howell also said his board had visited with the governor's staff about a possible transfer and he wanted to know from the governor if

there was any news.

Johnson provided little information about the possible transfer, except to say he wanted the state to unload the facility and he was willing to let the \$600,000 appropriation for the facility to go to whomever would assume stewardship.

Johnson then said the state has been unable to find a useful purpose for the facility.

"Since (the state) will spend \$600,000 anyway," Johnson said, "we'll let you put it to

use with a workable agreement and set into motion a joint partnership. If it works, it's better than having the facility sit there empty."

Fort Stanton was a state hospital from 1963, when the federal government transferred the ownership of the old former frontier fort turned merchant marine hospital to the state for use as a state hospital, until 1995 when it was closed by newly elected Governor Johnson. One provision of that transfer was the

state would use the fort as a public health facility for 20 years. But that expired in 1993.

The last client at Fort Stanton was moved out early

Eagle Creek Water Issue Now In Court

On October 11, the villages of Capitan and Ruidoso will go to court to decide if they should liquidate the assets of the Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Inc.

The village of Capitan filed a suit in the 12th judicial district court in Alamogordo against the Village of Ruidoso on August 27 seeking liquidation of the Eagle Creek assets and to seek an order to stop the use of water from exploratory wells drilled by the co-owned Eagle Creek Intercommunity Water Supply Association, Inc.

Capitan Trustees made the decision to file the suit during a special meeting held Monday, August 26. The meeting was held in session closed to the public to discuss water rights. At the end of the meeting, trustees came out of closed session and voted to proceed with the litigation against Ruidoso over the Eagle Creek water rights.

On August 27 Capitan village attorney Robert Beauvais, Eagle Creek attorney David Thomsen, and Village of Ruidoso attorney John Underwood met informally with Judge Frank Wilson in Alamogordo. Underwood told *THE NEWS* he agreed to have Ruidoso stipulate it would not pump the exploratory wells it drilled until the judge either heard the merits of the suit, or some further order came from the court.

Underwood said the village of Ruidoso has 30 days to respond to the suit.

According to the allegations in the suit, Eagle Creek association was incorporated on June 1, 1965 with a purpose to acquire and maintain a dependable source of water for use by Capitan and Ruidoso. Capitan and Ruidoso are owners and stockholders of 50 percent each of the assets, tangible and intangible of Eagle Creek. Since incorporation, Capitan and Ruidoso, acting through its representatives to the Eagle Creek association board, have acquired substantial property including water rights and a system to obtain, transmit, store and deliver water for municipal consumption. But around 1987 the supply of water to Capitan was stopped because of a deteriorating water line.

In September 1990 Capitan and Eagle Creek and the City of Alamogordo contractually

Ruidoso Nuisance Codes And Lodger's Tax May Be Changed

On Tuesday, September 10, Ruidoso Village Council will consider changes to its Lodgers Tax and Nuisance Codes.

Lodgers Tax code changes will reflect amendments made to the state lodgers' tax laws during the last state legislative session. The changes broaden the definitions for use of revenues derived from Lodgers Taxes, and redefines the membership on the lodgers tax board.

There are 15 key provisions to the proposed changes which allow the use of lodgers taxes for establishment and operation of tourist related facilities, attractions and transportation systems; tourist related transportation systems anywhere in the state not just ski areas; tax may be used to provide police and fire protection and sanitation service for tourist-related events, facilities and attractions; requires at least 25 percent of the tax collected over three percent must be used for advertising, publicizing and promoting tourist related attractions, facilities and events; all tax dedicated to promotion must be spent within two years of collection and not used for any other purpose; prior authorized uses of tax are grandfathered in raising from \$50,000 to \$250,000 of tax collected before requiring annual random audits; requires copies of reports and audits be provided to the advisory board; DFA will provide guidelines concerning

accounting for collection and administration of the tax; allows court action to enforce the act to be brought by the state attorney general, district attorney or vendor collecting the tax; allows local government to contract for management of programs and activities authorized by the act; clarifies that tax may be used for administrative expenses such as salaries, supplies, rent, travel and other costs; restructures the advisory board to provide for two members who are owners or operators of taxable property and two members who own or operate a tourist-related industry within the taxing jurisdiction and one resident who shall represent the public; requires the board to submit recommendations to the mayor and council for expenditures of funds authorized for advertising, publicizing and promoting tourist related attractions, facilities and events.

The changes to the code will not include an increase in the actual lodgers tax imposed at this time.

A public hearing will also be held on changes to the village nuisance code to clarify property owners responsibility to remove dead or hazard trees, and clean up language about removing weeds and vegetation nuisances. Proposed language would require removal of growth of weeds, vegetation or other nuisances which are likely to harbor flies, insects, rodents,

Governor's Goal Is To Improve Quality Of Life In New Mexico

Speaking before approximately 500 members of the New Mexico Municipal League, Governor Gary Johnson said his overriding goal as governor is to improve the quality of life in New Mexico.

"I think this should be the goal of all public officials," he said.

Johnson said he would accomplish his goal by improving economic development, government efficiency, reduced crime and improved education. He believes that all in New Mexico should have the same opportunities for jobs, education and health care.

He said the biggest surprise he got when he first took office was his erroneous thoughts that Republicans and Democrats worked together to come out ahead. "That's not necessarily the case," he said. "If all voted their conscience the system would work fine, regrettably they line up according to party."

Johnson said he plans to improve the economy by improving the state's highways, and building four lane roads between major economic centers.

He would also try to make New Mexico a better climate for business by reducing regulations and taxes without affecting the revenues which go to the municipalities.

His greatest concern is the state's crime rate, which is 7th in the nation. He plans to reduce crime by building two new prisons and demanding more personal responsibility by holding those who commit crimes accountable for their actions. He wants the new prisons to do away with early

release for good time.

Construction of the new prisons has been delayed because of politics and because of setbacks within the corrections department, where he replaced the cabinet secretary.

Still planning to go with a private company to construct and operate the prisons, Wackenhut, Johnson said some state corrections employees will lose their jobs, but the company has pledged to offer those them jobs with possible higher wages. However, the former state employees will lose their state benefits. "It won't be rosy for everybody," he said.

With the two new prisons in Hobbs and Santa Rosa there will be 2355 beds added to those within the system now for more than 4,000 beds for criminals.

In education, he said it was a myth that he had cut funding for education. Instead, his proposed education funding was higher than that proposed by the legislature. What he did cut was the "pork" funding for specific educational projects because he did not believe those projects were equitable. Instead he wants equal funding for all school districts, and he also wants every school child in every one of the 89 school districts to take the Iowa Test of Basic Skills (ITBS) every year to determine how well each school is doing in educating its students. He believes more power should be given to local districts.

On government efficiency, he said he does not want to micro-manage municipalities, and cited an example of workers comp, and cutting the growth of the size of govern-

ment from 10 percent, to six, to two and finally flat growth.

Health care reform will be in managed care for Medicaid, which goes to the poorest of the state's citizens. He said managed health care could save \$250 million and improve access, leaving money left for tax cuts.

As for welfare reform he believes that it is best to teach people how to do for themselves, rather than giving it to a person.

He said he is reality driven and cited the example of Indian gaming which had been going on for nine years without the state being able to


Nunley Will Make Fact-finding Trip To Fort Robinson

Nunley will leave Lincoln County Friday on his fact-finding mission and will return Sunday.

1995 and the old facility has sat empty with a tiny skeleton staff to do very minor upkeep. Despite a \$250,000 advertising campaign and lengthy request for proposals (rfp) process undertaken by the state General Services

Department which has control over the state-owned Fort Stanton facility and associated acreage, no suitable tenant was found.

Now a group of area citizens have been promoting the concept of turning Fort

Stanton into a "living fort" and possible conference center. The concept, lead by Ruidoso resident Sally Burkstaller, will be based on a living fort at Fort Robinson in western Nebraska. A similar fate awaited that old fort, which was rescued from demolition and was rebuilt as a state park. Now that living fort draws hundreds of thousands of visitors yearly, even though it is only open for nine months of the year.

Burkstaller presented her idea first to the county commission which accepted it, then she presented it to Salisbury at the August 17 meeting.

Lincoln County Commission chairman Monroy Montes told THE NEWS on August 29 that he had visited with the governor's chief of staff Lou

Gallegos who agreed to talk with the governor about starting the process to transfer stewardship of Fort Stanton and the \$600,000 appropriation for the old facility, to the county. "We'll let you put it to use," Johnson said to Howell during the municipal league conference meeting.

Opportunities for all?

First the governor's axe fell on Fort Stanton and now Los Lunas is facing the same future of closure and another group of state workers will be left without jobs. Yes, secretary of health Alex Valdez did tell the Los Lunas workers the state would try to help them get jobs in other governmental departments but if they actually believe what he is saying they must not have been listening to what happened here in Lincoln County at the Fort.

Long before Fort Stanton was closed parents and guardians of the clients at Los Lunas were confident it wouldn't happen there. We told them it would but they insisted the state would "keep Los Lunas open. The parent's and guardian's comments were, "Los Lunas won't close. We won't let it happen." The shame is that these parents and guardians actually believed it wouldn't.

When governor Johnson spoke at the New Mexico Municipal League annual conference last week he said his overriding goal is to improve the quality of life in New Mexico. His way to accomplish this is by improving economic development (here we go again with providing jobs for his contractor friends), and by improving government efficiency (oops a few more heads will roll), and by reducing crime (more jobs for his contractor friends by building new prisons), and by improving education (by testing more often instead of teaching? That's ridiculous.)

Improving quality of life in New Mexico should mean not just a select few but improving life for everyone. The former Fort Stanton workers left without jobs certainly didn't see an improvement in their quality of life and now Los Lunas workers will be in the same situation. Their quality of life will go down, down, down as they try to cope with losing their jobs and not having a regular paycheck for essentials such as food and rent.

Perhaps governor Johnson is sincere about improving quality of life in New Mexico but it is evident he doesn't mean for each and every person. The Los Lunas clients will be tossed out of their homes and that certainly won't improve their quality of life. Parents and guardians of the Los Lunas clients will have no choice as their loved ones are placed in less than desirable living situations and this won't improve their quality of life. The Los Lunas workers may eventually overcome the financial setbacks of not having a regular paycheck but until then they won't see an improvement to their quality of life. Seems as if the governor's goal excludes too many people to be practical.

Later in the governor's speech he said health care reform could save the state \$250 million and improve access, leaving money for tax cuts. The magic words here are "tax cuts." The majority of the people will follow blindly behind any politician when he mentions tax cuts but the reality is that portions of his managed health care plans will not improve access. The Los Lunas clients will not have improved access but will have less medical attention than they have been receiving at Los Lunas. While they are living at Los Lunas the clients have immediate medical care available. Living in the community will mean they will have to wait weeks or months for doctor appointments. It may not be important to governor Johnson for a handicapped person to have to wait for medications but it can be fatal for the clients and heartbreaking for their parents and guardians.

Improving the quality of life for all in New Mexico is very important but it is something we all need to work together on instead of one person spouting off about it in public speeches.

Health care reform is equally important but should be based on a plan that will benefit those needing it the most instead of being put in place by emotionalistic speeches about tax cuts.

And our governor should lead by example, the example of being compassionate instead of the example of being a dictator.

Public officials should have goal.



Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Reform is in the air. We have prison reform, welfare reform, Medicaid reform, insurance reform and, although it hasn't been phrased this way, gambling reform.

Except for insurance reform, Gov. Gary Johnson has been the prime mover. And except for welfare reform, legislative leaders think the governor is moving too fast.

Gary Johnson ran for office saying he was going to make changes in state government. We now know the governor we elected not only means what he said, he

doesn't have much patience about getting it done.

Before he even took office, Johnson had a designee negotiating Indian gaming agreements. No sooner had the Legislature convened than the governor had the agreements signed. When the court said he needed legislative approval, Johnson wanted an immediate legislative session to get an OK.

When the court later said all casino gambling is illegal, Johnson shut down charitable, fraternal and non-profit slot machines, the gaming over which he had control.

And now he wants an October summit to get tribes and legislative leaders together to negotiate new compacts to take to the Legislature for approval.

In his first legislative session, Johnson asked for and received authority to build prisons. He quickly signed an architectural contract to get things moving, then changed his mind and opted for privatized prisons, without shopping the idea around for support. When his corrections secretary wasn't moving down the path with him quickly enough, he booted him and continued at full speed.

Welfare reform was another Johnson target. He had his Human Services Department secretary get started immediately but the plan she developed had little support and the revisions she was sent back to develop didn't come quickly enough so the program was taken from her.

The governor's new team working on welfare changes soon found that reforming welfare is tricky because it involves so many federal restrictions, regulations and laws, which happened to be a moving target because of welfare reform legislation in Congress.

But now that it has been passed and signed, lawmakers fear New Mexico missed the boat by not getting waivers under the old law rather than having to comply with numerous additional requirements under the new law. And we're still waiting to see the new state plan.

Medicaid reform is another piece of the welfare reform package. Because of its complexities, it is being treated separately. Since 1993 lawmakers have discussed a managed care system for Medicaid. Gov. Johnson felt that gave him leave to put something together over on the administrative side of government. He hired a former private sector HMO official who put together a plan, and while he was at it, structured the plan to be run by pri-

agreed that Eagle Creek would be financially responsible for the cost to reconstruct the water line to Capitan. But Eagle Creek either refused or failed to acquire enough funds to construct the line to Capitan, although funds were available through state and federal assistance programs.

In July 1996 Capitan members of Eagle Creek asked again to secure funds to finance a water line to Capitan. But through manipulation of the vote, the Eagle Creek board declined to authorize the steps necessary to complete the water transmission line.

In early August, Capitan Mayor Norman Renfro asked Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw and Leon Eggleston as a member of Eagle Creek and a Ruidoso councillor, and Ruidoso village manager Gary Jackson to cease Ruidoso's plan to transfer Ruidoso's water rights to wells owned by Eagle Creek on Eagle Creek property until the dispute over the water line to Capitan was resolved. The

suit claims the Ruidoso representatives advised they would cease, rather have actively pursued their efforts to transfer water rights to the Eagle Creek wells. This forced Capitan to file protests to the proposed transfers of water rights. The suit also claims Ruidoso members of Eagle Creek took steps to hold an illegal meeting to authorize additional actions by Eagle Creek despite protests by the Capitan members. Because of this, the suit claims the Ruidoso members violated the state Open Meetings act.

The suit asks the court to order liquidation of the assets of the Eagle Creek corporation.

Last week, Capitan members of the Eagle Creek board deliberately did not show up at an advertised special meeting, because they did not want a quorum. That action was just an indication of the serious problems between the two owners of the Eagle Creek water rights.

vate HMOs. Health insurance reform wasn't a Johnson initiative, but his administration is affected by it anyway. This reform began at the federal level when Pres. Bill Clinton took office. You'll remember that Clinton wanted to move as fast as Gov. Johnson has on his reforms, and he was just as uncompromising as Johnson.

After two years, and a change of Congress, Clinton got the idea that he had another branch of government with which he had to work. The recently signed Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act was the result. One of its major proponents was Sen. Pete Domenici, although the senator didn't get the mental health insurance parity he was seeking. A separate bill will be considered by Congress in September.

That effort has had an impact on the Medicaid debate in New Mexico, with some of Domenici's own party members calling mental health costs money down the drain.

And over at the state Corporation Commission new HMO regulations have been prepared that commissioners want to see incorporated into the governor's Medicaid reform.

It's enough to make us want to call our Capitol a reformatory.

share revenues which was why he signed the compacts, and why he raised speed limit to 75.
