Capitan Budget May Include Pay Increase

Growth in the Capitan area. is expected to increase revenues for the village, which may result in a five percent salary increase for employees for the next fiscal year.

Village trustees met in a budget workshop last week and considered a preliminary. proposed 1997-98 budget. Clerk/treasurer Deborah Cummins based the preliminary projected general fund revenues of \$275,903 on last year's revenue of \$269,403, with a modest \$6,000 added for growth.

However, Cummins told THE NEWS that she expects the actual general fund revenues (which include gross receipt taxes collected from village businesses) to be higher than she projected for the workshop, because village businesses appear busy and the village has installed many new water taps and has collected more money for trash services. Cummins said she will have more up-to-date figures by the next hudget

workshop. During the workshop, trustees agreed they would like to provide a salary increase, looking favorably at the five percent. Using the five percent salary increases, Cummins calculated the projected general fund expenditures to be \$346,599. The five percent increase in base salaries is for all employees, plus funding for benefits, vacation and compensation leave accrued for each. Cummins said those first preliminary figures

will change as trustees continue to work on the budget, which is due to the Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) by May 31.

Otherwise the budget is much the same as last year, with funding for as many employees as last year including three police officers, Cummins said.

The preliminary budget shows an increase in the enterprise funds--water and solid waste collection. Cummins increased the water fund revenue because of the 44 new water taps since July 1, 1996, and she made a \$10,000 increase in the solid waste fund because of an increase in the number of households.

Cummins also expects her preliminary figures for the cigarette tax also to be higher. All cigarette tax goes to the juvenile recreation fund. After a request from the Capitan Library board for funding to help pay for utilities, trustees agree to provide \$500 from the juvenile recreation fund. Trustees also agreed to continue the \$1,000 for the Lincoln County Fair.

With the five percent raise, Cummins has budgeted \$68,824 for administration salaries, benefits, vacation and comp time accrued for two full time employees and one half of the Motor Vehicle Department employee's salary. Law enforcement budget

Capitan To Hold Hearings


The curb cut ordinance will

The downtown pave and curbing projects did not provide enough driveways to vacant lots, which have since sold and are being developed. The ordinance provides guidelines for cutting the curbing, including requirement of permit.

Ordinances for the proposed personnel policies provide more specific information regarding guidelines on drug use and sexual harassment for village employees. These affect only village employees.

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

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

Potholes or drag races?

Using public money for the good of the people has been the opic discussed most frequently around Lincoln County recently. More people are concerned that they have no say as to how their tax money is being spent and they may assume the best thing to do is not attend any of the meetings that include budget talks. This could be a major mistake because quite often the elected boards use the dread of hearing more budget talk to help keep people from attending their meetings which will give them the opportunity to make major decisions in other matters without any public comment. Then when people object to the actions taken the boards can easily respond that the public didn't care enough to be at the meetings when the decisions were made.

More people should go to county commissions meetings, town council meetings, village council meetings and school board meetings and be willing to voice their opinions about actions being taken and decisions being made by these elected officials.

Decisions being made by the Carrizozo Town Council during their meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday could affect future growth in the town and may determine if the street improvement project will continue or drop off into a pothole. The street improvement projects have been funded by Community Development Block Grants, commonly known as CDBG, but the town has to pay a portion of the costs. The town pays its share from the revenues More people are concerned that they have no say as to how their

portion of the costs. The town pays its share from the revenues it gets from gross receipts tax. The most sensible thing to do then would be for the town to make every effort to increase gross receipts tax which would help pay for paving more streets.

If the Carrizozo Town Council were to take any type of action that would decrease the amount of gross receipts tax it receives it could affect future street improvement projects and this could result in the loss of possible businesses coming to Carrizozo.

and paved streets are much cleaner than the former dirt streets. Carrizozo has had the advantage of having out of town people help pay for paving the streets because the drag racers and the people who come to Carrizozo to watch the drag races once a month pay gross receipts taxes every time they spend money in Carrizozo. If the Town Council were to discontinue the drag

races the town wouldn't be getting those gross receipts taxes.

Apparently the Town Council is considering not renewing the contract with The Drag Club next year. The reasons have not been announced at a public meeting but could be announced Tuesday during their meeting. If this decision is made we can only hope the elected officials will explain their reasons and if it is because the town MIGHT qualify for a grant at the airport we hope the elected officials will announce what type of grant MIGHT, be available from which agency and the names of the people in charge of an agency that has money to give away now that federal budget cuts are eliminating many grant programs.

The decision will be made by the Town Council but public

comment is important and people need to attend the meeting and voice their opinions. People need to tell the elected officials if they want streets paved or if they want to wait for a possible grant that may or may not be available. People need to tell the elected officials if they want the drag races to continue or if

they prefer to go back to potholes and dusty, unpaved streets.

Drag racing is not the issue, improving the town is the issue and the only way the elected officials will know what people want is if the people will tell them. You may not choose to go to the drag races and many of us don't go to the drag races, but we do appreciate the gross receipts taxes being paid to the town by the people attending the drag races because these gross receipts have helped pay the town's share of the street improvements. Grant money may not be available.

According to the letter the \$21,320,000.00 will be transferred into your account with you receiving 20 percent, the officials to receive 10 percent, and 10 percent to be used in settling taxation and foreign expenses.

If someone offered you 20 in Air Mail envelopes with no sercent of more than \$21 return address and are addressed to The President/CEO of businesses listing physical addresses, the name of the town, state and Zip code and at the bottom U.S.A. The letter contains no return address but does have a telephone number and Fax number and asks that the information be sent within seven (7) banking days.

> These letters are a scam trying to get the bank account numbers of businesses and are not legitimate.

Carrizozo Chief of Police Duane Vinson cautions every person to not give their bank account number to anyone for any reason. If someone knows your bank account number they could have access to your account and possibly steal your money.

Vinson has asked that every person receiving one of these letters please contact local law enforcement officials.

includes the raise with \$68,824 for salaries for three biffices, benefits, vacation and comp time. Salaries and benefits for two street employees is budgeted at \$47,423.

: Cummins budgeted \$6,000 for the four trustees who receive \$20 for each meeting, regular, special or emergency. It also provides \$200 a month for the mayor. The municipal judge receives \$4,000 a year plus benefits.

Another area where revegues may increase is in the correction fees fund. Cummins said this is due to an increase in citations processed through the municipal court.

"By the next workshop I will have better figures," Cummins said.

The next budget workshop has yet to be scheduled, as trustees have until May 31 to approve the preliminary budget for DFA. Cummins hopes to have another workshop shortly after the regular May 12 meeting. Notice of the workshop will be posted at village hall, the post office and other locations.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Dead bronzes are something you won't see often in the New Mexico state Capitol.

Most capitol buildings are replete with bronze busts of famous dead people, says Cynthia Sanchez, curator of the New Mexico Capitol's extensive art exhibit. Our Capitol is alive with magnificent pieces by famous New Mexico artists.

So instead of dead politicians being on display at New Mexico's Capitol, we have museum-quality works by lively local artists. I could find only two bronze busts in the Capitol, both of them politicians who met untimely deaths at the turn of the century (last century, that is) compared with over 150 other works of art.

This extraordinary display, valued at over \$3 million, is made possible by the "one percent for the arts' allotment from the 1991 Capitol renovation budget. That \$300,000 has grown ten-fold over the intervening years as the result of generous artists, a hard working Capitol Art Foundation Board, and the puchasers of two series of miniature sculptures donated by artists Glenna Goodacre and Alan Houser.

Two months ago the Capitol Art Foundation hosted a reception honoring the Capitol Art Collection's artists. donors and patrons. Some artists have given their works to the foundation, some have loaned pieces and some have sold them for nominal amounts.

Not just anyone can give a piece of art to the collection. It has to be judged by a committee as being worthy of exhibit in or around state government's most important building. No works are stored. They all are on display. The curator and board are looking for pieces to fill some gaps in the collection. Those include contemporary sculpture and Native American pottery.

The 30 members of the board hail from throughout New Mexico. All have backgrounds in visual arts as museum officials, gallery owners, artists or art patrons. They are constantly on the lookout for work that will fit into the collection and they form the screening committee for what will be purchased for the collection.

All work as volunteers except Sanchez who is paid a part time salary to serve as director, curator, tour guide, and secretary while she finishes work on a doctor of fine arts at New York University.


A Plain Ole' Cowboy

(Part Four)

It is extremely doubtful, at the onset, that Sam or Minda or their attorneys knew that Brickley had been given permission to sell the entire ranch as a whole. Court papers indicate Brickley requested permission to sell the ranch on May 13, 1921, and was given permission to do so by Court Order on May 20th, 1921. In previous instances, Mechem had given Sam up to thirty days to answer legal motions that were filed. One week was definitely not enough time for communication with Sam in California. In ensuing court documents filed by Sam during late May and early June, Sam does not indicate he had any knowledge that Brickley had permission to sell the entire ranch. It is emphatically thought that Sam would have fought hard to prevent that order.

Although a total of \$60,000 was derived from the sales, Brickley did not allocate any remuneration to the Exchange Bank, his arch rival located just down the street. Reports filed by Brickley show he paid all of his legal expenses incurred to answer Sam's Objections, from the Fambrough estate account. But even after a court order was filed ordering that Minda's attorney should be paid, there is no record that Brickley authorized payment for Sam or Minda's attorneys. Judge Mechem did, however, reserve the seven-room house, the original homestead plot, and a few head of the children's cattle for Minda and the children.



The First National Bank of Carrizozo, New Mexico is shown in this picture which was taken around 1915. E.M. Brickley, who was appointed receiver of the Fambrough holdings, was a cashier at The First National Bank of Carrizozo which was the Fambrough's main creditor. Brickley was also a member of the State Legislature and absent from the area a good part of the time. Brickley hired Joe Finley, the son of O.Z. Finley, a large sheepman in the area and also a director of the First National Bank of Carrizozo, to manage the ranch and the sale of cattle. Sam filed court papers claiming mismanagement and that questionable actions were executed by the three in the disposal of the Fambrough holdings.

Edwin Mechem later became governor of the State of New Mexico. But the \$50,000 in cash that Sam had borrowed, as well as other assets Sam had in his possession, landed elsewhere.

It is reported that Sam and Varoma lived in California for sometime, but no one is sure where. It is believed they were still together in October, 1922 when Ms. Knowles tried to obtain ownership of the rock home Sam had built for her on the North Place. At that time, Varoma Lee Knowles filed a petition with the court in Lincoln County, asking the court to award her ownership of the home. As verification of her claim, she said she had paid Sam \$1,000.00 for the home, and she had a cancelled check for that amount, which was endorsed and cashed by Sam, to prove it. Varoma also claimed she left furnishings in the house valued at \$300. At the same time, Sam filed an Affidavit with the court verifying her claim. However, the court evidently did not grant her request as the home and property had already been sold to the Wilson brothers in August of the previous year.

How much longer they lived together is not known. But sometime after that, Sam returned home one day to find that Varoma's needs had expanded again. She, along with all the assets, had disappeared. She, nor the money ever re-surfaced. Sam must have experienced devastation at that time. If he felt sympathy for his family in New Mexico, he didn't choose to attempt a reconciliation. Perhaps he was too ashamed. Being estranged from the family, no one knows how Sam felt. Whether his actions in the previous several years were precipitated by naivete, gullibility, stupidity, or underhandedness, Sam was left alone and penniless. He did not recuperate, financially, or emotionally from the travesty. He died in 1952, after living alone the remainder of his life.

The Wilson Brothers, John E., Alfred R., and Edgar N., bought the Fambrough ranch from the bank on August 26, 1921, for \$32,283, and subsequently lost it during the drought of the mid 1920's. Evidently, the bank then enticed Barney Wilson, son of John E. to take over and he was successful in saving the ranch. Two banks, one being the Exhange Bank, went out of business at the same time, but the First National survived.

After Sam's departure from Ancho, Alex and the two older brothers assumed the care of the ailing and broken-hearted mother, two younger brothers, and the responsibilities of the homestead in 1920. Alex was fourteen. Having no other resource for sustenance, the boys corralled some wild cows, began milking them and shipped the cream for income. When the drought of 1921 and 1922 hit the area, and there was no other forage for the livestock, the boys cut cactus, burned the thorns off, and fed the cows. The cows did well on the cactus, but later, not realizing the difference, the cows tried to eat wild cactus with the thorns intact. The thorns punctured the mouths of the cows and prevented further eating. Some perished.

Alex Fambrough

The boys put their shoulders to the wheel and diligently made sure their mother always had food, medicine, and the best care they could provide. A new complication, epilepsy, set in to further incapacitate the frail body of Minda in 1926. In the end, Alex, who was the primary care giver, carried his mother around the house to accommodate every need. In the middle of those responsibilities, he would run, being as he rarely walked, with slop buckets balanced on each arm to feed the pigs, or milk buckets jangling from his belt with which to milk the cows. A cousin and good friend, John Dale, came to help at the ranch when Minda grew deathly ill in 1931. Other good friends, the Joe Drake family, and Elva Wilson, came to sit up with Minda at the last. When Sam left for the last time in 1922, he never returned to inquire about Minda. Neither did Minda see Anna again after the 1916 elopement. Finally, Minda was laid to rest on May 6, 1932, in the Ancho Cemetery with only her boys present to say goodbye.

Burying his mother left a scar in Alex's heart that did not heal for decades. But, as a relatively young man of twenty-six, he tried to get on with his

Alex, in the 1930's, was known to be as "strong as a bull." A self-professed plain old cowboy, he stood 5'10" tall, and weighed around 210 pounds. While breaking wild broncs and working cows at an early age, he developed unusually large muscles and almost superhuman strength and stamina. Yet, Alex was not known as a bully. He respected everyone until a person proved he deserved otherwise. Some noticed, however, that those who "deserved otherwise" usually encountered Alex in the local bar where Alex's tolerance and patience sometimes grew "mighty thin after a few drinks." Despite some raucous escapades in his life, he was widely respected within his circle of

He made friends with everyone. He had a jovial personality that greeted others with laughter or a trendy joke. A missing finger on his right hand, stolen by an errant calf-rope, did not lessen the firm and sometimes painful handshake he extended. His philosophy of life was evident in the sparkle of his hazel eyes - things are good, or they are getting better - you just wait and see. Possibly, as an adult, he concentrated on the future and walked with levity in an attempt to buffer the pain of earlier years. Although, his education ended in the fourth grade when he began working full time on the family ranch, he followed in his mother and father's footsteps and did not shy away from work. He inherited his father's creativity, frugality, and business sense. At times in his life, he carried an impressive financial statement. He married in 1934, two years after the death of his mother, and fathered two children.

Alex worked had to take care of his family in the early years, and his children carried on that legacy. With the inherited traits of creativity, propensity toward hard work, and good business sense, his children have attained financial security. One of them has achieved outstanding prosperity, and even flies his own jet plane, and between them, they boast nine children and twenty-seven grandchildren.

It is challenging to take a look at the past without intending to loiter, and then move on to make new history. And adopting one of the aspects of Alex's philosophy can't hurt. If we believe that things are good, and are getting better, perhaps we will live to see the next generation accomplish

A poem written by Les Crowe of Lovington, New Mexico, speaks of our plain old cowboy:

"Ode to a Cowboy" He sits and remembers when he was young and strong Riding steers and breaking broncs and dancing all night long. He will say, right out front, his life was bittersweet, But sadness, loss, or angry bulls couldn't bring him to defeat.

Now you see crippled legs and a back that's bowed, But as a boy, and yet today, he carries his own load. Whenever neighbors wander in, he'll visit for awhile, Listen closely as he speaks, he'll leave you with a smile.

His name is Alex Fambrough,

and he's getting on in years, I'm proud that I know him, and I'm glad that he's still here. When his life is over, I know he will enjoy, When they write the final worls: Here Lies a Real Cowboy.

Alex Fambrough, our plain old cowboy turned 91 on April 9, 1997. One of his favorite pasttimes now is flying with his son, in Jerry's jet plane. Alex says the world looks very different when one looks down from the sky. And he has seen a lot of this world, and he flies in that plane every chance he gets. So I guess we would have to say, he ought to know.

Alex now lives in Lovington, New Mexico with his wife, Ida.
