### County Will Consider Naming New Facility Skeen Arena July 8

The arena being built at the Lincoln County Rural Events Center at Glencoe will soon have a name.

Lincoln County Commissioners are scheduled to consider a resolution to name the Rural Events Center arena after Congressman Joe Skeen during their regular meeting at 9 a.m. Tuesday, July 8, in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Skeen was largely instrumental for the U.S. Department of Agriculture Rural Economic Development grant which will fund construction of the arena.

Presbyterian Health Services representatives will be on hand to discuss the renewal of

the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) lease agreement. The lease expires in January, but last month LCMC administrator Valerie Miller and another representative from Presbyterian Health Services (which leases LCMC), asked commissioners to begin discussions about a renewal. A citizen, Dr. Ray Seidel, asked commissioners to reconsider renewing the lease.

### Fireworks Display July 4 In C'zozo & Spencer Theater

Independence Day will go out with a bang with public fireworks displays in Carrizozo and at The Spencer Theater on Fort Stanton Mesa. The displays will begin at dusk on Friday, July 4.

Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department sponsors and puts on the display at the Carrizozo Golf Course park. Carrizozo Fire Chief LeeRoy Zamora encourages people to bring their own private fireworks and shoot them off at the park. He stressed, "NO BOTTLE ROCKETS," will be allowed.

The fire department works throughout the day preparing the site for the fireworks display by using water from the Carrizozo Lake to hose down the area, making it safe for the fireworks display.

### Cimarron Superfund Hearing Monday

An open meeting will be held Monday, July 7 at 6 p.m. at Carrizozo City Hall to discuss upcoming activities that will be taken at the Cimarron Mining Superfund Site.

Based on the results of the latest assessment of the site, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the New Mexico Environment Department have determined that additional work is necessary to complete the cleanup of the Sierra Blanca portion of the Cimarron Mining Superfund Site. A small area of surface soil on the site has lead con-

### Air Force Public Hearing Will Be Held In Carrizozo

The United States Air Force plans to locate 30 additional German Air Force aircraft at Holloman Air Force Base. Public hearings will be held in connection with a newly released Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the Expansion of German Air Force Operations at Holloman. A public hearing will be held in the Lincoln County Courthouse, commissioner's meeting room, Friday, July 11 from 6 p.m. to 10 p.m.

The DEIS analyzes the potential environmental impacts of establishing the German Air Force Replacement Training Unit (RTU) at Holloman. The proposed action would include the beddown of 30 German Air Force Tornado aircraft and location of 640 additional personnel at Holloman and the construction of associated support facilities.

The three options being considered to meet the air-ground training requirements include (1) establishing a new tactical target complex on the west edge of Otero Mesa within the McGregor Range in southern New Mexico; (2) establishing a new tactical target complex within the Tularosa Basin portion of McGregor Range, or (3) using only existing target ranges. Aircraft would access either of the proposed ranges or existing ranges using existing military training routes.

The Air Force invites everyone to participate in the public hearings to provide comments on the environmental issues addressed in the Draft EIS. Comments at the public hearings will be considered and responded to in the Final EIS, scheduled for completion in November 1997. The environmental issues analyzed in the EIS will be used in the decision-making process. Comments received at the public

hearings or at any time throughout the environmental impact analysis process will be considered to the extent possible in the preparation of the EIS. A Record of Decision on the proposed action is projected for December 1997.

Anyone wishing to submit verbal or written comments may present them at the public hearings. Written comments may also be mailed to the attention of Ms. Sheryl Parker, Air Combat Command Environmental Analysis Branch, HQ ACC/CEVA, Langley Air Force Base, Virginia 23665-2769. ## Carrizozo To Get New Water Filtration Plant

On Wednesday, June 18, a special meeting of the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees was held.

The trustees heard Eddie Livingston, of Livingston Associates, on the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Water Filtration Project. Livingston showed the trustees the plans for the filtration plant and answered questions from the trustees.

Livingston said that the scope of the plan is to replace the filtration system that is currently in place with a new system. The plan includes a new block building, filtration unit, keeping the existing building for storage, and acquiring use of extra land to discharge treated backwash water on.

Livingston told the trustees the amount of additional land required would be 50' x 100' in the area where water is being discharged now. Trustee Eileen Lovelace told him the land belonged to Gary Joe Lovelace and Gary Lovelace. The trustees gave Livingston and town attorney David Stevens permission to talk to the Lovelaces about use of the land. Stevens said there were several alternatives possibly available besides purchase of the land.

August 1 is scheduled to put the project for bid and after the bid is awarded it would be about 120 days to completion.

Municipal Judge Bill Meeks again discussed with the trustees the procedure for the court receiving clerical help until a new municipal court clerk is hired.

Meeks told the trustees that he had spoken to the Municipal League lawyer, and was told that since the judicial branch is not mentioned in the town personnel ordinance it is not covered under the ordinance. The Municipal Court Judge can hire and fire. Meeks told the trustees that he told town clerk Carol Schlarb to go ahead and place an ad for a part-time municipal court clerk. Schlarb said that she did that and since Meeks did not give her a deadline, she put deadline for application "until position is filled".

Meeks said that due to no fault of his own he was out of help. Meeks asked for assistance until he can get a replacement.

Lovelace asked Meeks if he could handle on an emergency basis what needs to be done. Meeks said he would not personally handle because of conflict of interest and not his interest to do so. He would like to get help from Schlarb's department to log in payments at least.

Mayor Cecilia Kuhnel said she spoke to Municipal League lawyer Randall Van Bleck and that he said the Board of Trustees does not have to accept the resignation of Mickie Griego only the Municipal Judge needs to. The policy in the past has been for the board to accept all resignations. Kuhnel said the judge needs to accept the resignation and have a letter written, an agreement, between Meeks and Griego spelling out very clearly her work would be on a part time basis. Meeks said the letter was written.

Lovelace asked Kuhnel if she had asked the Municipal League lawyer about the judge handling money. Kuhnel said she had not. Lovelace asked Meeks if on an emergency basis couldn't he handle the money just for a week or so. Meeks said he could for a week. He said he really didn't want to work full time at this job. If he was doing both the clerks job and his job he will be doing more than he has to spend.

Meeks told the trustees that the bottom line is: "If I can't get assistance from you folks, I think will just give up the job and let you worry about it." Meeks also stated, "The frustration of dealing with the city administration is ah - the judges office is wonderful, I like that. The frustration of dealing with the city administration it is above and beyond the job description. It is above and beyond the call of duty. Its just causing more stress than what it is worth to tell you the truth."

Meeks said at the end of the discussion: "I will continue the job until we can get this crisis resolved at least and perhaps a little more. Maybe I will feel differently later."

The Carrizozo Lodgers Tax Advisory Board (CLTAB) presented the final version of the new brochure for the town of Carrizozo.

Also approved by the trustees was having Tuesday and Thursday evenings for adult swimming. The hours are to be from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The age limit on these evenings will be 18 years old and up.

H.N. and Jackie Spencer. There is no admission. The theater is located on Sierra Blanca Airport road.

The public is encouraged to watch the two public fireworks displays; Fireworks are illegal in the Lincoln National Forest, village of Ruidoso and town of Carrizozo, and are discouraged in the villages of Capitan and Corona and in Lincoln County.

Fire departments urge everyone to use caution with fireworks. All fireworks should be used with adult supervision.

Recent high temperatures and dry winds have caused the U.S. Forest Service Smokey Bear work station crew to post "Very High" on their fire conditions sign for Capitan and surrounding areas. Because of the conditions, visitors and residents need to be very careful with fire, including cigarettes and outdoor cooking. Campfires are still allowed in designated camping areas, but anyone making a campfire should remember Smokey Bear's fire prevention message to never leave a campfire alone, and to always make sure it's dead out when leaving.

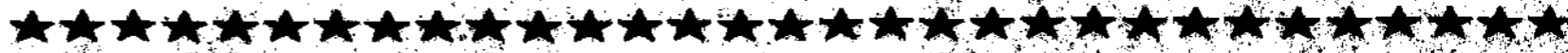

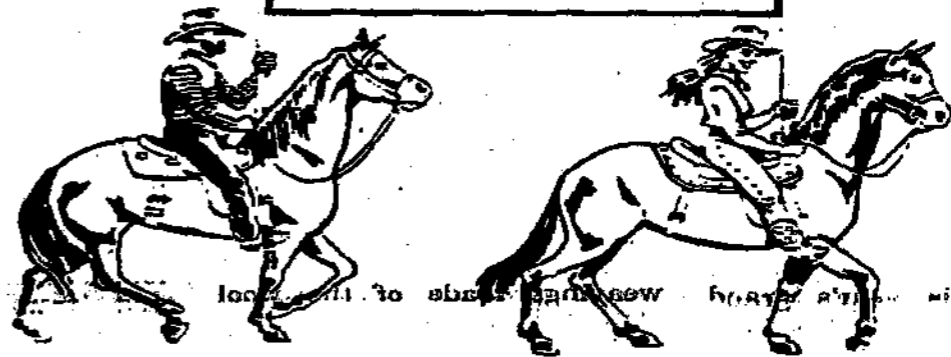

### Smokey Stampede Parade Grand Lady Is Bessie Jones

Many visitors to the New Mexico State Fair have seen a demonstration called "sheep to shawl" which shows the public how sheep are sheared, their wool cleaned, carded spun and woven.

One of the originators of that demonstration is a remarkable lady-Bessie Jones. Bessie is this year's grand lady of the 42nd Smokey Bear Parade in Capitan.

She was chosen grand lady of the parade because of her support of the community, and she says jokingly, because of her support of the Capitan Chamber of Commerce bingo over the years. Involvement in

the community is one of her hallmarks, having been a member of nearly every organization in the village in the 47 years she has lived in Capitan. Last year she won the gold medal for her pool playing in the State Senior Olympics. Nearly every year she wins blue ribbons at the Lincoln County Fair for her weaving made of the wool she has sheared, cleaned carded and spun.

Working with wool, and the animals it comes from, has been a major part of Bessie's life. Now 84, Bessie no longer goes home to the ranch which she and her husband Milton Jones homesteaded in 1934.

She leases the ranch to her granddaughter Audrey and her husband Eddy Davis, who are carrying on the ranching tradition, and Bessie lives in town.

Bessie lives full time in Capitan. In the 47 years in Capitan, one of the biggest changes for the village is the new Farmer's Country Market, which she very much likes.

"Capitan's grown a lot," she told THE NEWS during a recent interview. "I wonder if it's for the good or worse."

Every Tuesday morning Bessie can be found busy quilting away in the basement of the Capitan Methodist church. She and several other ladies, who call themselves the Handmaidens, spend their Tuesday mornings raising funds for community needs by quilting.

Sometimes she can be found at the senior center, maybe practicing her favorite pool shot, or having lunch.

Bessie has lived in Capitan since 1951, when she moved to town and rented a house from then village clerk Mary Lerner so her girls Christine and Betty Lou could attend Capitan High School. They lived five days in town, then went home weekends to help with the chores at the ranch.

Bessie came to Lincoln County in 1932 with her mother and father Stella and Jasper Morrow from Seminole, Texas. Bessie had graduated from Seminole High School in 1930, then attended business school. But after their home in Seminole burned, the family decided to pull up roots and come to Lincoln County to homestead. When they first arrived in Lincoln County, her daddy leased a ranch for one year

while they went through the "homesteading business."

At that time, anyone could homestead a 640-acre parcel, a section of grazing land by living on the property and making improvements for seven months out of three years.

Bessie said she would have homesteaded her own section then, but women had to be 21 years old and she was just 18.

The Morrows decided on homesteading land 35 miles north of Capitan. Milt, Bessie's then-future husband, and Bessie's brother-in-law helped drive 150 cows from Seminole to New Mexico. It took 30 days.

Bessie had known Milt for several years. They got married on January 3, 1934 in Carrizozo, in the Baptist preacher's office.

"I can't remember his name now," she said.

Once Milt and Bessie were on their homesteaded ranch, they raised sheep for a living. They also raised a few head of cattle and horses and some chickens.

It was the height of the Depression then and no one had money. "I learned to do everything with sheep," Bessie said. "I raised doggie lambs, washed, spun and weaved wool."

"I didn't think I would live this long," Bessie said. "I've been very healthy. I guess it was because I was out in the sunshine and I did a lot of walking."

Walking was a part of life in the 1930s. Neighbors were three miles apart, but were always willing to lend a helping hand.

During World War II, Milt and Bessie worked their small ranch and Milt also worked

the Capitan Chamber of Commerce, Beck has been involved with the chamber for more than 10 years. During those years he served as president for five years.

Beck was born and raised in the Amarillo area, and attended West Texas State University at Canyon. There he met and married Emmaline in 1949. He came to Capitan in 1970, retiring from a career as a traveling sales rep for an electronics company.

During his 16 years as sales rep in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma, Beck was able to visit several locations. While still living in Amarillo, they bought a cabin at Pine Lodge on the northeast end of the Capitan Mountains. From there Dick and Emmaline explored Lincoln County and

got to know Capitan. So when the couple finally got their two girls through college, they moved to Capitan for good.

It wasn't long before Dick wanted something to do, so he opened his "Big Bear" Shop in 1976, selling Indian jewelry and other collectibles. He still operates the shop located on Smokey Bear Blvd.

During his years with the Chamber of Commerce, Beck not only served as president, he helped organize and run the Bingo program which is the chamber's main fund raising activity. Beck continues to be a chamber member and helps with the annual Smokey Bear Parade.

Dick will be riding with parade grand lady Bessie Jones at the start of the 42nd Smokey Bear Parade. The parade begins at 10:30 a.m. at the west end of Smokey Bear Blvd. (Highway 380).

for Jimmy Hall, Janice Gnatkowiak's father. After the war, in 1947, Milt even went over to the neighboring Foster ranch to see the purported crashed UFO.

Life wasn't much easier after the war. Roads were still just ruts. Capitan was still small with no paved streets, but had a high school. Ruidoso was just getting started as a village, having incorporated in 1947.

One of the most dramatic things that happened while

Bessie was at the ranch was the natural gas pipeline explosion. She remembered the waves of flame and smoke.

Bessie's daughters were born at the hospital in Carrizozo, and they attended school at Ancho. But when the Ancho school was closed to consolidate with Carrizozo Schools, Bessie decided to move into Capitan, so her girls could attend school there.

As the girls grew up they were in 4-H, and they showed sheep, and entered baked goods in the Lincoln County Fair. The fair was organized in 1955 by Eleanor and Charlie Jones who contributed lots of time and money to getting it started at its current location on the southeast corner of Capitan. Milt and Bessie, who had no money, put in a lot of time instead.

Around Capitan, Bessie is known for her hand spun and woven garments. Although she had been around sheep for more than 30 years, she did not know how to spin or weave wool. Her ranching neighbors Janice and Gnat Gnatkowiak in 1968 convinced her to try her hand at spinning wool. Bessie said she was skeptical. To that Gnat told her that anybody with enough faith had to try, so she did. From that first encounter with the spinning wheel, Bessie and Janice began the "Sheep to Shawl" demonstration. "I really enjoyed doing that," Bessie said.

Milt died in 1976, they had been married for 42 years.

Even after Bessie and Janice stopped doing the "Sheep to Shawl" demonstration, Bessie continued to spin and weave. In August you may be able to see some of her weavings in the county fair.

But on July 4, you will find her at the head of the 42nd Smokey Bear parade!

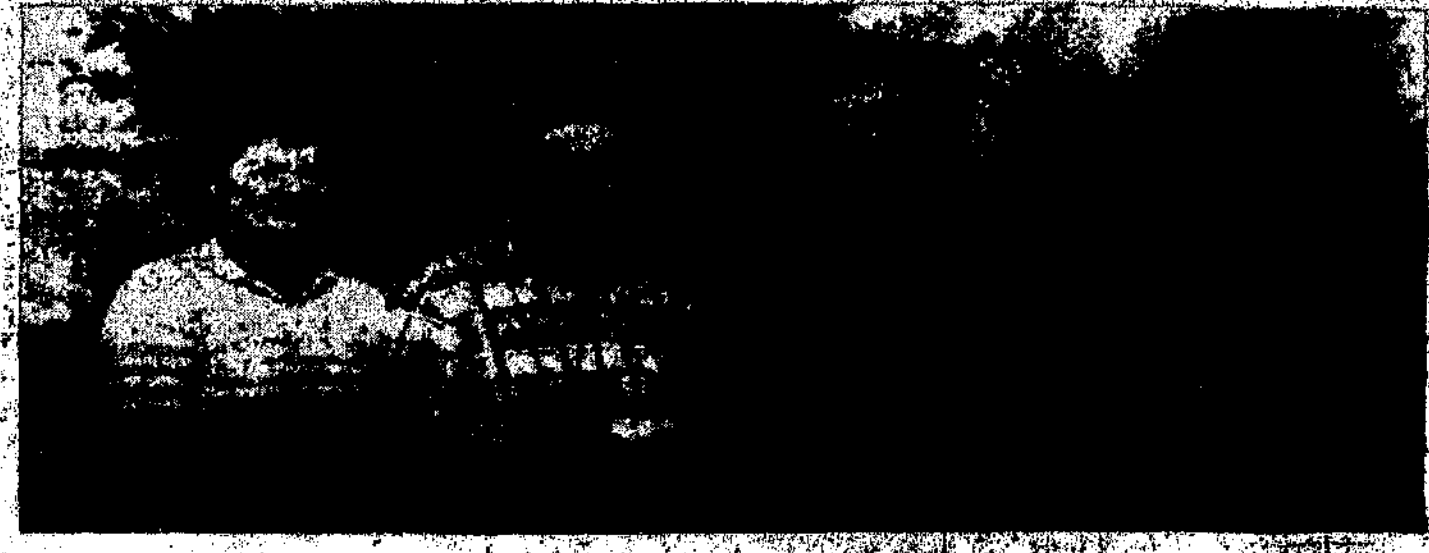

Were you invited to the Grand Opening? Did you even know there was a Grand Opening? Are you aware that your tax money is being spent to cover private parties for select people? Have you considered that it is a better way to spend tax dollars? Do you have any idea what this is all about? And do you care?

Apparently there was a Grand Opening of sorts June 30 at Lincoln County's largest waste of money, known as the Glencoe Rural Events Center. We were told invitations were sent but it appears only select individuals received invitations and a small group of people attended the affair Monday at 11 a.m. which was not open to the public. Apparently the people in charge decided profit was not good enough, and why not when the money to fund the rural events center seems to be bottomless pit. We haven't heard if anyone took home the left-overs or if we, the taxpayers, got to pay for the food that was left when few people attended.

The invitation we saw, which was pulled out of the trash with a trail of stinking gum stuck to the back of it, stated: Help us celebrate the construction phase of Lincoln County's New Arena at the Glencoe Rural Events Center Reception to Showcase Construction of the new arena, June 30th, at Glencoe Rural Events Center - Highway 70, Glencoe, NM, 11:00 a.m. Refreshments will be served. The invitation also said Congressman Joe Skeen will be present but we were told he wasn't there. At the bottom of the invitation was a logo that has "Glencoe Rural Events Center, Glencoe, New Mexico, A Place For All Reasons" on it but there is not one mention on the logo about Lincoln County.

Maybe you don't object to hundreds of thousands of dollars being spent for this former sales barn but we believe that this money could be put to much better use. And those hundreds of thousands of dollars are county tax money in addition to the hundreds of dollars the federal government is paying for this play-area for select individuals to use for their private profits.

It is amazing that our county commissioners aren't asking why the logo doesn't mention "Lincoln County" and it is even more amazing that our county commissioners are willing to spend county tax money to advertise for a private individual, all in the name of helping promote the facility. These advertising dollars are NOT coming from the county ledger's tax fund but are budgeted in with the continuous budget for the sales barn.

One person said the sales barn will be good for the county but our question is, WHEN? The county won't get any gross receipts tax from any of the sales made in connection with the sales barn. The county will get very little ledger's tax money because the majority of the lodging establishments are in Rosillos and Redwood Downs. The county lost the property tax revenues when the sales barn was decided to the county. The county road crews are spending more time working on the new arena than they are working on roads. The county continues to pay our tax dollars while ignoring other areas that desperately need county help. If that is good for the county, please share your wisdom with us.

It is interesting that Glencoe gets top billing when it is the county tax money paying and paying and paying. Maybe we haven't supposed to know that within a few years, when the county has paid and paid and paid to build this fabulous facility, it will then be sold for a minimum amount. Maybe we aren't supposed to know the name of the person who will purchase the facility. Maybe the people in charge believe we won't remember but you can clip this column to show them when the sale is completed.

We were not only NOT invited to the Grand Opening but we were NOT informed there would be a Grand Opening. If you were invited, and if you attended, maybe you ate some of the food. If not, maybe we should deduct it from our tax bill.

SANTA FE — Casinos and slot machines aren't the only forms of gambling New Mexicans have reason to worry about. The state lottery also is looking squirrely.

First it was lower-than-expected revenues. Then it was higher-than-expected expenditures by board members. Then it was a mad dash to expand the lottery into something close to a casino operation. And most recently it has been the resignation of the lottery director who changed two of his board members with meddling in day-to-day operations of the lottery.

Faced with fewer ticket buyers than projected, the lottery board looked for solutions by creating new themes for the scratch-and-sniff, instant-win games. We now have a game based on Roswell UFOs, along with other New Mexico themes, which evidently are more popular with lottery players. A Zozobra theme was dropped when the Santa Fe Kiwanis Club, holder of copyright privileges, nixed the use of the Santa Fe Fiesta symbol.

The lottery hasn't been especially popular in the state's wealthier counties so the board has been looking for ways to entice Santa Fe, Albuquerque and Los Alamos players. The latest gimmick has been to increase the size of Powerball jackpots, while decreasing chances of winning beyond the current 55 million-to-1 odds.

There has been talk of increasing the state's share of lottery revenues in order to bring in more money. But those in the know say the problem with too few players is due to the low amount paid out in prizes. With a 52 percent payout, New Mexico ranks last in the nation. All our surrounding states have a much better payout, with Colorado being the best at 65 percent.

The only other way to increase the state's take is to reduce administrative expenses and the Legislature's interim finance committee is taking a good look at that.

Another revenue-increasing measure was the proposal of kenogames which would have allowed players to bet almost constantly. That idea was killed quickly by reactions saying the lottery had gone far beyond its original intent.

The big shock was when Ralph Decker, the respected ex-FBI agent abruptly resigned as director of the lottery, charging two board members with micromanaging his operation.

Decker's biggest beef was a secret session held by board Chairman Bruce Wiggins and member Fred Ragadale with officials of GTECH, the prime contractor for the lottery. Decker and a legislative oversight committee have alleged that the meeting which GTECH was asked not to reveal to Decker, made the relationship between the board and the company look too cozy. GTECH was the sole bidder for the seven-year contract.

After retiring from the FBI, Decker worked for the Missouri, Kansas, Arizona and Colorado lotteries before taking on the task of starting up the New Mexico lottery two years ago. He came with a reputation for being competent and easy to work with. His resignation leaves both supporters and opponents of the lottery with major questions about its future.

Wiggins and Ragadale both have declined to resign. Governor's aide Lou Gallegos blew off Decker's charges, saying the governor wasn't about to listen to a disgruntled ex-employee. Wiggins, an Albuquerque attorney, has been involved with representing the gambling industry in the past. Ragadale is the attorney who negotiated the original illegal compact with New Mexico Indian tribes for casino gambling. He is known for being overbearing and recently called legislative Lottery Oversight Committee member Shannon Robinson "crazy."

One of the biggest worries New Mexico now faces is that state lotteries are a small industry around the nation. Everyone knows each other and they talk. When a respected member of their fraternity resigns and says a couple board resignations are needed to stop the undermining of executive authority, top prospects for the job will be watching to see what happens.

Appointments are based on the candidate's high school record, performance on either the SAT I or ACT, and leadership potential as demonstrated by participation in high school activities, community service and part-time employment. Most successful candidates rank in the top quarter of their high school class and have demonstrated proficiency in both mathematical and applied science. Candidates must be unmarried at the time of the

appointment, have no legal obligations, and must have reached the age of 17 but not 23 by July 1, 1998. Candidates must be assured of high school graduation by June 30, 1998.

Coast Guard cadets obtain an excellent undergraduate education at no personal expense. In addition, they receive pay and allowances for living expenses. The Academy curriculum emphasizes engineering and science.
