

Carrizozo Fire Dept. To Drain And Test Hydrants In Town

Carrizozo households may experience a drop in water pressure and possibly discoloration of water the next two Monday evenings. The Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department will be draining and checking the fire hydrants as required by the state.

Carrizozo Fire Chief LeeRoy Zamora said the firemen will conduct pressure tests and make sure the hydrants are

working properly.

Capitan Considers Bond Election

Looking for a way to finance needed projects in the village, Capitan trustees during their meeting November 10 heard a report on how to pursue a new bond. Mayor Norm Renfro said the purpose of the discussion was to see if the village could renew the expiring bond without increasing tax mills. He said all bond money would go to improving subdivision streets.

Bonds are like a loan, with the value of all properties within the municipalities acting as collateral. An election must be held to allow voters to say yes or no to the bonds being sold, and paid back by property taxes. If voters approve the bond issue, the village will go to a bonding company that would arrange for and make the actual sale of bonds. Private individuals, banking institutions, or the New Mexico Finance Authority will purchase the bonds. Once the bonds are sold, Capitan gets the money for earmarked projects and the construction process begins. Taxes imposed on all properties in Capitan will go toward paying off the bond debt.

Perry Baird, vice president of Rauscher Pierce Refsnes, Inc. of Albuquerque, presented information to the trustees that showed how much the village could bond based on new valuayear, properties within Capitan were valued at \$8.6 million, which is 23

percent higher than 1996 values. This was due to the obligation bond for the re-evaluation by the county Village of Capitan will assessor's office. Baird estimated the village's valuation will increase nine percent a year.

Based on the valuation, Baird said the village could have a bond election for \$550,000 with a 10 year pay back, or \$635,000 with a 12 year payback. Baird said current interest rates for the bonds, which are like a loan, are about 5.5 percent, with some bonds with as low as five percent. Baird said the taxes would be paying back the bonds plus the interest. "About \$733,000 would be paid back to get the \$550,000,' Baird said.

Baird also explained the limitations on municipal bonding. By state constitution, municipalities can only indebt themselves four percent of total valuation for general purpose projects. There is no limit on bond elections for water or sewer projects.

Because of the ongoing cost of issuing the bonds, Baird said that for communities the size of Capitan it is better to sell the bonds through the state Finance Authority. But the downside of that is local citizens could not purchase the tax exempt municipal bonds.

By state constitution, all general obligation bonds require voter approval. Baird said some communities are doing bond elections by mail. Rio Rancho had a successful mail-in bond election. But to minimize the cost of holding an elections. For the 1997 tax tion for the bond issue, municipalities routinely hold a bond issue election with the regular municipal

election for mayor, councilors and judge.

Neither proposed bond will will raise the current tax rate of 10.516 mills. Baird said the village could pursue a higher amount, if it increrases the mill levy on properties. Renfro and trustees did not favor any bond election that would raise the current property tax mills. "If we raise the mills we'll all get run out of town," Renfro said.

Trustees took no action to place a call for a bond issue election on the March ballot, but said they would consider it and make a decision before December 9. Trustees must approve a resolution calling for the

County Crime Stoppers Are Looking For Arsonist

Lincoln County CrimeStoppers are looking for an arsonist.

Police believe someone started the fire that destroyed the woodshop of Larry and Lorene Caywood in Capitan on November 3. Capitan Fire Chief David

Cummins, during the Capitan trustees meeting Nov. 10, said the arson fire was put on the CrimeStoppers notices.
Cummins also publicly. thanked all fire departments which responded and assisted with the fire--Bonito, Ruidoso Downs and, Fort Stanton.

The fire call came in about 9 p.m., Cummins said. In 13 minutes the first units arrived at the Caywood property on Main Road. Cummins said he called the other departments for assistance before he even left the fire station, because he wanted assurance there would be enough water. "We never ran out of water, Cummins said. There were two fire hydrants on the street, and a tanker from Bonito and the two Capitan pumpers shuttled water to the fire.

Cummins gave special the Ruidoso credit to

Downs Fire Department which "left when we did" and offered to cover the rest of the village during the fire.

Most of all Cummins complimented his department and the 16 of 20 volunteers who showed up to fight the fire in Larry. Caywood's furniture shop.

Cummins told THE NEWS that fire fighters were able to save about half of Caywood's shop. An investigator from the state fire marshall's office came from Santa Fe and pronounced the fire as arson started. Cummins said he contacted Ruidoso Police Chief Lanny Maddox, who is in charge of the Lincoln County CrimeStoppers program and had the incident placed on the CrimeStoppers list. Anyone with information about the fire can contact Lincoln County CrimeStoppers at 257-4545. All information provided to CrimeStoppers is confidential, and anyone reporting a crime that results in a conviction could earn a reward.

Already accepted by the Lincoln County Commission, Hopper is seeking approval of the plan from Capitan. Ruidoso Downs, Corona and Carrizozo.

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

At the meeting Pable unveiled the foundation's new tshirt which features



SANTA FE - Is New Mexico carrying the separation of powers too far? Gov. Gary Johnson and GOP state chairman John Dendahl think so.

The U.S. constitution and those of every state establish three branches of government. The legislative branch makes law; the executive branch implements it and the judicial branch interprets it. In the past two years, the judicial branch has ruled on three different issues that the executive branch was guilty of making law.

Johnson and Dendahl are impact that Attorney General Tom Udall, a member of the executive branch, did not defend the governor in these cases. Instead he sided with the judicial branch. Johnson and Dendahl think this is because Udall and the five members of the state Supreme Court are Democrats. Udall says it is because advice.

Besides having separation of powers among three branches of government, legislative power is split between two houses of the Legislature and executive power is split among seven elected officials plus two elective bodies.

Separation of power between two legislative bodies hasn't worked so badly. The idea of our nation's founders was to have one body elected by the people and one by the states. At the state level, the Senate originally was elected by counties, but equal representation arguments forced the courts to use a one-person, one-vote formula for electing the Senate as well as the House. But the sharing of power between two bodies helps curb the number of junk laws passed by legislatures and Congress. Members of the house where a bill is introduced can vote for their colleagues' bills, knowing that the other house will take a closer look.

But widespread sharing of power among many executive agencies has drawbacks, such as when two officials disagree. If Tom Udall worked for Gary Johnson, he would have defended him in court instead of Johnson hiring \$400,000 worth of private attorneys. The federal government has a single elected executive, who appoints the attorney general and all other department heads. But states wanted to spread the power eround, thereby making most . . ernors much weaker than the president.

Although partisanship plays a part, genuine disagreements are also a factor

in rifts between the governor and other elected officials in the executive branch. Gov. **Garrey Carrethers and Attor**ney General Hal Stratton, both Republicans, had many tussies. Relations weren't always the best between Gov. Jerry Apodaca and Attorney General Toney Anaya, both

The Legislature has always been happy with New Mexico's weak plural executive system. They've never been anxious to put constitutional amendments on the ballot that abolish elective offices. Twice they've eliminated elective offices but

Democrats.

created more in their place. The first was when the Legislature put an amendment on the ballot making the elected state superintendent of schools appointive — by 10 elected state Board of Education members, who previously had been appointed by the governor. Gov. Gary Johnson has tried to abolish the board and appoint the superintendent himself, but the Legisleture won't hear of it.

Last year the Legislature put an amendment on the ballog abolishing the elected, three-member Corporation Commission, but also abolishing the governor-appointed Public Utilities Commission and combining them into an elected, five-member Public Regulation Commission.

Voters have shown their appreciation of being allowed to increase the number of elected officials by approving both constitutional

amendments.

Separation of executive powers among many elected officials weakens the governor but appears to be what we want, maybe because it's another check and balance or maybe because if we were given the opportunity to elect every state official, we'd do it.

Governors don't like it, and unfortunately, every time Gary Johnson challenges the Legislature and loses, he establishes new case law further weakening the executive branch of government.

Domenici Asks Why Bugs Bunny & Frankenstein Get Stamp While Hispanic Heritage Is Overlooked

WASHINGTON — After questioning why Frankenstein and Bugs Bunny get more respect than 400 years of Hispanic history, Senator Pete Domenic gained a new pledge from the Postmaster General Nov. 3 to push for a commemorative stamp marking the

anniversary of Hispanic settlement in the Southwest.

Domenici expressed his umbrage with the rejection of his request for a commemorative postage stamp honoring the 400-year anniversary of the first, continuous European settlement in the United States. It was in 1598 that Juan de Chate established the first permanent European settlement at San Gabriel, just north of present-day Espandia.

Domenici brought the issue to the attention of Postmaster General Marvin Runyon during a hearing to review U.S. Postal Service operations. The U.S. Postal Service Citizens' Advisory Committee rebuffed the New Mexico commemorative stamp request when it met in October.

Bugs Bunny got a stamp. As one who represents a very large Hispanic community, I think they should be hopping mad when Bugs Bunny is recognized over their 400 years of

involvement in our culture and history," Domenici told Runyon.
"Dracula, the Mummy, the Phantom of the Opera, the Wolf Man and Frankenstein's monster are all honored with a stamp. But the 400th anniversary of Onate, the first permanent European settlement in the United States does not," Domenic said. "I think there are some misplaced, even monstrous, values here.

Runyon commended Domenici for his presentation on issuing a cuatrocentennial stamp and said he would pursue the matter.

In 1598, Juan de Onate was appointed governor of New Mexico and assigned to lead a colonizing expedition into the northern most lands claimed by Spain. That year, Onata with about 200 colonists founded San Gabriel.

However I just returned from the Memorial Service that our World War II veterans participated in. You see, my late husband was a Navy recruiter and he had some sadness to carry with him til he passed away. Namely that he had talked the son of his dearest friend into enlisting in the Navy and the boy was killed.

Many years later, his own son was a candidate for Annapolis in 1957. Not even thinking along those lines while in high school, taking examinations for mathematics courses that he had never taken proved his undoing and because of his disappointment he enlisted the Marines one memorable night with some of his buddies. I thought his father would have a heart attack, he was so angry.

Four long years later, Terrence Patrick returned a very much changed young man and he never quite recuperated. For 10 years none of us knew just what he had endured, what had made him so different, so cynical, so not giving a continental damn about anything or anybody. But he had been to war, real war, fighting in the jungles of Laos before we ever got involved in Vietnam. And before he could be released from the service, after turning down offers of much better things: officers candidate school, duty at the white house, to name one or two. when his reply was still, "No, all I want is OUT," he then had to sign a paper that for 10 years he would never ever tell another living soul that he had been outside of the continental limits of the United States because sir. they said, "You were never there!"

And as the old adage goes,

And so getting that off my chest perhaps you can understand the sadness that filled my heart this morning at the Memorial Services held here in Capitan.

And as even sadness has its pleasant aura, must admit that I certainly enjoyed the morning's program. 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
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
