The hearing is the second held for a proposed ordinance which officials may adopt.

commission during a public hearing held on October 14 in the commissioners chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, At. that first hearing LCARAC chairman Joel Bonnell presented the proposed plan that was developed from citizen input given at several town meetings and compiled with volun-

teer help from members of the Ag committee. Bonnell said the volunteers have been working on the plan-since the early 1990s. The final document considered by commissioners was compiled and drafted by Dr. Alex Thal, a professor at Western New Mexico University in Silver City.

The plan is directly from the people of Lincoln County to assist private, state and federal decision makers," Bonnell said,

The CLUP addresses protection of private property rights, enhancement of custom and culture, preservation of the economic and tax base. The plan is intended to assure that government agencies include local individuals and communities in any planning process. "Individuals and communities provide the proper voice on the local planning process," Bonnell said.


Citizen Jerry Carroll who has attended most of the hearings and meetings held

by LCARAC said the plan started as a temporary eightpage plan to protect private property rights. Now the plan has grown to more than 100 pages. Carroll said since the start he has requested a "pri-vate property bill of rights" be added to the plan which hasn't been done. He also questioned when the commission made the decision to call for an ordinance to adopt the CLUP. He said if the plan is adopted as an ordinance, which is creating a law, he

could not burn noxious weeds (tumbleweeds) without a special permit. Carroll called the document as it was presented that day a "constructive fraud."

"This is a very destructive, contradictory document," Carroll said: He suggested commissioners further study the document and hold more public hearings and define

# L.C. Detention Officers Placed On Administrative Leave With Pay

Two unidentified detention officers in the Lincoln County Detention Center were placed on administrative leave with pay last week pending investigation of allegations of misconduct toward inmates in the county jail.

Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan said he brought in an investigator from another sheriff's office in the 12th judicial district to conduct the investigation on the allegations of physical contact between staff and inmates. On Thursday and Friday of last week the employees were placed on administrative leave.

Sullivan said they are investigating several instances of alleged misconduct which occurred over the year involving staff and inmates, which happened inside the jail.

Lincoln County manager Frank Potter confirmed to THE NEWS on Wednesday that two detention center employees were placed on administrative leave. Aside from that, Potter refused to disclose any further information about the situation, because it deals with personnel.

Potter did say that the detention center is under the manager's office control. Once controlled by the \sheriff's office, former sheriff James McSwane turned over the jail to the commissioners in 1992, claiming he no lenger could operate it because commissioners would not provide sufficient staff.

Sullivan said he is cooperating with the manager's office to provide additional manpower to the jail, particularly for transporting prisoners. The jail is shorthanded with the two employees on administrative leave and the absence of jail administrator Wayland Hill who is recovering from a stroke and is in rehabilitation.

Sullivan said he advised District Attorney Scot Key of the situation and is working with the DA on the investigation. Sullivan said he expects to wrap up the investigation by the end of next week. Key was in court and was unavailable for comment.

# **Highway Construction** In Ruidoso May Start Jan. 8th

Highway construction around the Ruidoso area is expected to last at least three years. To provide the public with information about the projects and to answer questions, Ruidoso village council is considering appointing a between the highway department and the citizens.

Although January 8 is the contract starting date for the Mechem Drive reconstruction project, state highway department officials expect the project to be delayed because of the winter weather, Virginia Lorenz, District 2 Construction engineer with the state highway department told Ruidoso Village Councilors during their meeting Tuesday.

Lorenz suggested the village appoint a committee to act as a task force for the highway construction projects. She said the committee would act as liaison between citizens and property and business owners along the affected routes and would provide information to the public about the highway construction projects.


Mayor Jerry Shaw asked if such committees are routinely appointed in other communities with highway construction. Lorenz said the department requested such committees with the Roswell MainStreet project and a project in Gallup. In both communities high density business districts were affect-

Councilor Robert Donaldson said that the elected officials were the ones who need to 'take the heat" from the public about the project. He suggested the committee consist of councilors and perhaps village staff such as deputy village manager Alan Briley who is tracking the projects.

Lorenz said the construction contractor has some concern about doing the work during peak seasons. But Donaldson said there will be no 'best way" to do the construction. "It will impact a number of summers and winters, there is no way to miss a busy season," Donaldson said.

## Two Carrizozo Police Officers Commended

Carrizozo Police officer Willie Kerin gave the trustees an update on the police department sponsored Toys For Tots Drive. Kerin said that there has been good response and that the toys are coming in. Ten toy collection boxes have been set out and four more will be put out. December 20 will be the deadline for putting toys in the boxes. He said the community is really supporting the project, both in helping with the program and in contributing toys.

Trustee Eileen Lovelace also told the trustees that on December 13, at the Carrizozo Fire Department volunteers will be getting the luminarias ready. There will be 10,000 luminarias this year. Lovelace says that they will be needing all the help they can get. The bags need to be folded, filled with sand, the candle put in, and the filled bags placed on the trailers. They will be starting at 9:00 a.m. and the fire department will be serving lunch to all who help. On December 24, at 9:30 a.m.,

Carrizozo Police Chief Duane Vinson, during his police general report to the trustees, read a letter from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office (LCSO) commending Carrizozo Police officers Willie Kerin and Milton Herrington for the help they gave the LCSO during a recent narcotics arrest. Vinson also read an accompanying letter that he had written commending the officers for their work as well. Copies of these letters were given to both officers and the trustees.

## **Xmas Bonus** For Capitan **Employees**

Capitan village trustees gave each long-time employee a \$500 "one time merit increase" during their meeting Monday.

Employees who have been with the village less than a year will receive \$300 and the two women at the Smokey Bear Museum will get \$50 since they have been in village employment less than two months. Village clerk Deborah Cummins said there is sufficient funds in the village budget for the increases.

Village hall hosts its annual Holiday Open House from 12:30-3:30 p.m. Friday, December 12. Residents and visitors are invited to come in for refreshments with village

Next year village staff will get three days off for Christmas. Trustees approved the 1998 village holiday calendar which gives staff Columbus Day on December 23 and Martin Luther King Jr. birthday on December 24. Lincoln's Birthday will be given on the day after Thanksgiving. All other holidays will be observed on the days designated by the state and federal governments.


Trustees also adopted their 1998 Open Meetings Act Resolution which sets the guidelines for meetings. The resolution has some changes from previous years due to recent state legislation that allows telephone conference meetings as long as the public is provided access. Also the resolution allows the village to hold a regular meeting with only three days notice, a special meeting with 24 hour notice and an emergency meeting with only two hour notice to the public. Previously the village had to give five days notice for regular meetings, three days notice for special and 24 hours for emergency meetings.

Trustees also adopted a resolution that outlines the legal steps the village can take to clean up an abandoned property that is becoming a nuisance. Capitan Mayor Norman Renfro said municipal judge Jack Johnson had sent the property owner a registered letter requesting she clean up the property located at 694 Mt. Capitan.

world the CLUP because it would allow a community to "zone" itself, like the Lincoln Historic District.

Commissioner Monroy Montes, who was still commission chairman at the October 14 meeting, said the CLUP is not a zoning document. Montes turned to Dr. Thal who was at the meeting and requested that he answer Carroll's onestions and make comments. Thal said he "reworked" the document 12 times and he could not recall any section about noxious weeds. He said the plan includes information about watershed problems in the upper Pecos River drainage, and the risks due to wildfire. He suggested a separate ordinance to deal with noxious weeds and wildfire which sets parameters and enforcement to deal with mismanagement.

As for Carroll's "Bill of Private Property Rights" Thal said the proposed CLUP does not specify private property rights because under the currents laws the citizen has sovereignty and final decision regarding private property rights. The CLUP does specify three points-the government cannot physically take away property or enter property without permission without a warrant; government actions cannot wipe a person out of private property; and governments must allow due process and equal treatment. "Government cannot ask someone to absorb disproportionate harm or cost," Thal further explained.

Montes said the document needed more specifics about private property rights, for address Mr. Carrolfs concerns." Thal said there are ways to protect private property rights that suffice. But Carroll said it was an insufficient answer. He cited information in an appendix to Thal's document. Thal said the appendix was to provide the commission an overview of the police powers in environmental or land use planning. But county commissioner Rex Wilson said the appendices were not to be included in the ordinance

County attorney Alan Morel said there were legal ramifications if the CLUP is imposed. The state attorney general has rendered two or three opinions that Interim Land Use Plans are not legally binding," Morel said. "And other counties (with land use plans) have enforcement problems.

"An ordinance is a law, if the appendices are included in the ordinance they become law and they can be enforced," Morel said.

Morel said if the CLUP is adopted by ordinance it will need a statement that requires the Sheriff's Office to enforce the document.

That sparked a debate between commissioners whether the CLUP should be accepted by resolution or ordinance Wilson said the CLUP should be adopted by ordinance in order for the county to take a stampe" on issues costom and culture and the county economy. "If not (by ordinance) it weakens can standing." Wilsom said

Wilson reminded that the Interim Land Use Plan was edepted by ordinance. County commissioner Ray Number was concerned how the county would enforce a CLUP ordimarroe. That said he had not pelled other counties with CLUPs about their enforce-

ment problems The gain said the CLUP was a process, and regulations could be developed and adapted But the CLUP's main purpose was to require size and federal agencies to consolt and coordinate with com-

ties and municipalities in land use decisions. We didn't want to create a bureaucracy." Thal said. "It (CLUP) doesn't require money, it requires citizen input"

Carroll said there was an implication the federal government mandates the county have a CLUP. But Wilson said there is no mandate. "It's just a way to defend ourastves.

Thal said that under federal acts, the forest service and BLM are required to protect the county's "custom and culture. "If you don't have a plan, they'll hire an archaeologist to look at some Indian bones, rather than what's important in your culture," Thal said.

Carroll asked if the plan had to be adopted by ordinance. "Isn't most of this to protect big ranchers and private interests in RLM lands?" Carroll asked.

Thal said the CLUP's focus is on the users, which include fuel wood cutters, mom and pop timber, mining livestock.
"I hope it protects the large rancher," That said. "The CLUP underscores the private property rights of people who make their living off public lands both small and big operations."

Morel said that "a resolution is like a desire, and an ordinance is law." Morel had specific concern about the number of "shalls" including one that the county shall insure no taking of private property as a result of the Endangered Species Act. "The shalls cause me concern because of the money liability, Morel said.

Nunley said he didn't mind a CLUP ordinance, but the county needed to insure it. could be enforced.

Wilson gave a specific exsmale of how the CLUP would he used. He said under the CLUP the U.S. Forest Service would be required to come to the county to work with them on their next 10 year plan.

hearings on the CLUP a total of about 75 people attended, with only 50 asking questions and commenting Commissioner Wilton Howell recommend-ad someone develop a summa-ry of the plan and distribute it publicly. To make it easy for people to get involved in the process," he said. "It needs to be simpler."

Wilson egreed it would be good to get more input, "But when you go out there and still doesn't happen, it falls on those involved to come forward." Wilson said. (EIS), Skaggs said that would not have to be done as there would be no handling of any material that would fall under that requirement. If there is any dust discharged into the atmosphere it will be filtered He said he would be getting a permit for temporary storage as some of the recycled carbon will be stored on site as the process of recycling will take between two weeks and one month. Some virgin carbon will also be stored at the site. This virgin carbon would be added to the recycled carbon to cover the small amount lest in the recycling process. He is not sure how much would be stored at the site.

When asked how much and what type of water would be used in the process, he answered that tested well water could be used and the facility would use about 10 million gallons per year. Skaggs said that up to 50 percent of the water would be recycled.

The trustees approved motion to publish on the agenda of the first meeting in January for final consideration of compensation to the mayor and trustees. This compensation will affect only the newly elected mayor and newly elected trustees.

## Ruidoso Applies For \$1 Million Grant For New Trash System

Ruidoso Village Council approved a resolution which endorsed a grant application to the New Mexico Environment Department for solid transfer equipment during the regular meeting Tuesday.

The grant asks for \$1 million to purchase equipment and install a new transfer system that is estimated to reduce the cost of hauling trash to the regional landfill by 35 percent. Village manager Gary Jackson told the council that the new system was recommended by solid waste consultant Len Stokes, who is a subcontractor for the village's contract engineering firm Molzen Corbin. Jackson said the savings would pay for the system over a humber of

Currently Ruidoso śtill owns the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon Road that is used by the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) to compact the trash that is hauled to the Lincoln-Otero Counties Regional Landfill near Orogrande off Highway 54. LCSWA has a 15 year lease-purchase agreement with Ruidoso to acquire the transfer station. But in the grant summary, it describes the compacting equipment at the current transfer station as "reaching the end of its useful life, ...no longer in production, parts are very hard to obtain and the system has some inherent deficiencies.'

The compactor compacts the trash into the hauling trailer, which has resulted in continuing citations and warnings from the state Department of Transportation because the trailers are overloaded on their axles. Jackson said the new system would spread the trash more evenly in the trailer allowing more trash to be hauled per time, thus reducing the number of trips need-

To update the current system, Jackson said the cost is about \$1 million which includes \$770,000 for equipment, and the rest for design fees. Equipment includes new trucks, trailers, front end loader for spreading, pedestal crane, trailer tipper and scales at the landfill.

Jackson said that LCSWA is in transition and there is a possibility that Ruidoso may

begin its own trash collection. Jackson also said the village may take over the transfer system, "and quote a price to LCSWA to haul the trash for the other entities."

Greer Construction company of Carlsbad has until February 1 to complete the new Ruidoso public library. Councilors approved a change order that gives the company until February 1 to complete the library, and requires the village hall addition to be completed by December 23. Green Construction requested the time extension because there were 33 days of wet and snowy weather at the beginning of the project in March arii April.

Deputy village manager Alan Briley said the contract with the construction company expired on November 22. While he did not endorse any course of action, Briley said councilors need to keep in mind the objective of getting the project done with a high level of craftsmanship.

Councilor Robert Donaldson was concerned about the craftsmanship on some of the work in the city hall addition. Ray Lopez of International Consulting Associates, contract project consultant, said the Greer Construction supervisor assured there will be "substantial completion" of the library by January 15. However, some things such as the landscaping, and perhaps the exterior stucco and cultured rock finish, would be delayed until warmer weather. As for the city hall addition, Lopez said any defects can be corrected after the project is subjected to the "punch list."

Jackson said the time extension was only to be for the new library construction, and not the village hall portion.

Lopez suggested councilors approve the change order with the time extension for the library. Councilor Joe Gomez was in favor of giving more time. "What do we gain if they rush and it needs to be redone?" Gomez asked. But mayor Jerry Shaw said she did not want to give too much

"You want to let the contractor know the village is not pushover," Lopez said. Donaldson said the village won't be a pushover if it makes the contractor redo the tile floor in the village hall addition.

Also at the meeting, councilors approved spending up to \$10,000 on an economic feasibility study for a resort hotel to be located next to the Ruidoso Convention center.

Ruidoso received no response to the last request for proposals (rfp) for a grant lease for a convention hotel to be built next to the Ruidoso Convention Center. The rfp was issued on September 16 and the

deadline was October 31. No proposals were received. Jack-son said he was told by potential proposers they were concerned whether Ruidoso has a viable year-round market for an upscale resort caliber hotel. Comments he received from potential proposers included lack of information on the economic feasibility of a resort hotel and the rfp was

Next Tuesday the Lincoln County Commissioners will meet in Ruidoso for the last regular meeting of the year. The agendaris long, long, long. If you plan to attend the meeting you might want to take along a sleeping bag because you may be too tired to drive home after an all day and possibly all night meeting. There is really no need for these all day meetings. The agendar packets are delivered to the county commissioners several they before the meeting. The packets have the necessary information about each agenda item. This gives the commissioners time to review the agenda items and if additional information is needed the commissioners can request it before the meeting and them be thoroughly prepared to discuss agenda items at the meeting.

Too often at recent meetings one or two commissioners have known in advance about items that were not on the agenda and proceeded to discuss at length matters that were not publicized before the meeting. The public has a right to know when things that will affect them will be discussed. Apparently this was the intent of the commissioners involved, but it deprives the public from being involved in the process of county government.

The commissioners were elected to represent the people, not bypass the people, when making any decisions that will affect Lincoln County. Even though there were no decisions made, mainly beause it would be a violation of the open meetings act. the fact that certain matters were discussed and opinions were formed without informing the public gave the impression that certain commissioners were either trying to "Grandstand" or

were trying to hide something from the people who elected them.
Surprise birthday parties can be fun but surprises at county commission meetings should be eliminated. The commissioners responsible for the surprise announcements should read their copy of the Open Meetings Act. The commissioners responsible for the surprise announcements should take their job as county commissioner seriously. The commissioners responsible for the surprise announcements should realize they are elected afficials and make every effort to fulfill the obligations of their office.

Years ago the county commission meetings started at 10 a.m. and the meetings were usually completed by noon. There were only three commissioners then, which could made a difference, but the main thing was that the commissioners studied their packets in advance. Any time a new subject was introduced that was controversial the commissioners would ask for additional information to be provided and the item to be placed on the agenda at the next meeting. Those commissioners knew that it was better to wait and be informed than to argue over and over

about something that might be easily settled at a later meeting. Some people thrive on being able to argue, accuse, blame, and condemn without knowing all the facts. It may give them a sense of power but it does nothing for the general public, and the general public is what is important. Every action taken by the county commissioners should be for the good of the people, not for the good of one select group or one distinct area. Every action taken by the county commissioners should be made only after careful consideration. Every action taken by the county commissioners is important to the residents of Lincoln County.

It would be nice if the county commission meetings were not all day affairs that tire everyone. It would be nice if certain county commissioners would be more open with their reasons for some of the actions they take. It would be nice if the county commissioners would agree to not argue about issues that need more information before any kind of decision can be made. It would be nice to know that the county commission meeting would end early in the day, but don't expect it on Tuesday. Conduct business quickly, please,

# Inside The Capitol Ev Jav Miller

SANTA FE: It appears that New Mexico is spending money attracting the wrong kind of business. How else do you explain the curious situation of employment growing at about the same rate that personal income is falling?

From 1993 to 1996 median household income (adjusted for inflation) in New Mexico fell 14 percent. That's the sharpest decline of any state in the nation. And all the time, we're adding jobs. Go

Four years ago, statewide numbers looked great, fueled mainly by Intel's huge expansion in Rio Rancho. Construction and manufacturing jobs pay well, so the additional jobs being created were also moving us ahead in personal income rankings. But as that boom played out, the New Mexico Legislature decided to go after telemarketers and call centers. Now we have Citicorp, America Online, Gateway 2000 and Victoria's Secret with facilities in Albuquerque and Rio Rancho, all providing many jobs but at \$7 to \$8 an hour.

Is it smart to offer industrial revenue bonds, tax breaks and other incentives to attract employers that will only cower the state's average wage? The Legislature hasn't had that discussion but it would be an excellent item for its 1998 agenda.

Obviously \$7 an hour is better than no jobs at all. Perhaps we have to start somewhere. But if we're going to take money out of taxpayer pockets to woo business to New Mexico, perhaps we should be looking for more manufacturing and high-tech manufacturing companies to supplement low-paying jobs in the tourist industry on which our state is so dependent.

Southeast New Mexico has been doing a good job by attracting, first the dairy industry, and now cheesemanufacturing. Loss of the Levi Strauss plants in Roswell and Albuquerque will hurt, however. Some small manufacturing operations have popped up along the Mexican border near Santa Teresa, but otherwise, economic growth in Las Cruces and Dona Ana County has been pretty flat, especially with cutbacks in military spending.

What's the outlook? Although forecasters predict a rosy future for New Mexico and other Rocky Mountain states, the near-term still looks fairly ho-hum. One bright spot is the construction projects we'll likely see around the state next year.

The Legislature's big pork bill that Senate Democrat leaders let die last March during the closing-day filibuster, can be expected to be twice as porky next year.

More than \$140 million is available in bonding funds and additional money is sitting in the state's surplus as a result of greater revenue collections than were projected by state economists. Gov. Gary Johnson would like to give some of that money back to us, but don't hold your breath. One nice thing about pork barrel construction projects is that they are spread throughout the state, with more going to depressed

Lea and Guadalupe counties should do well on the construction front with the new prisons they are building. Unfortunately the contractor is from out of state, but presumably the sub-contractors

will be mostly New Mexican. Another possible source of additional state income is the revenue-sharing payments by tribal casinos that are flowing into state cofers, but which won't be figured into the budget until legal challenges are exhausted. Judging by the quarterly payments seven casinos have sent the state, this fiscal year's income could add up as high as another \$50 million.

Nothing appears to be clouding the national ecomomic picture. Unemployment is at its lowest in almost a quarter of a century, inflation is running a very modest 1.5 percent and the economy is chugging along at a 3.3 percent growth rate.

It's time for New Mexico to start getting its share of the nation's robust economy but we may need to be a bit more selective about the business we try to attract.

But the letter was returned unopened.

Johnson said he got the property owner's address from the Lincoln County Assessor's Office. Cummins said she got the address from the treasurer's office but the reg-istered letter came back unac-cepted. Cummins said the property owner is delinquent on the property taxes also.

Johnson said the house is unsecured and kids bave been going in and out. 🕄

A copy of the resolution will be sent to the property owner. The resolution gives the property owner 10 days to respond to the resolution, either by cleaning up the property, or by making a written objection asking for a hearing before the governing body. The owner may also appeal the gov-erning body's determination to the district court by giving notice of the appeal to the governing body within five days, by filing a petition in district court within 20 days of the bearing.

Cummins said the village will give the property owner 10 days to respond to the resolution. If there is no response, the village will give the property owner another 10 days. If the property owner does not respond the village will do the cleanup, or hire someone to do the cleanup. then file a lien against the property to pay for the serv vice. The resolution also als lows the municipality to pay for the cost of removal of any condemned building, struct ture, wreckage, rubbish or debris by granting to the person removing such materia als, the legal title to all salvageable materials in lieu of all other compensation;




council and the Ruidoso Board of Education.


it is...It's going to be major construction."

"We need to be attentive to the needs of business owners (along the route)," Donaldson said. "We must keep (the public) totally in touch so they can feel as comfortable as they can. It's going to be painful growing pains."

Briley said he plans to provide information to the newspapers about the construction projects. Shaw suggested the radio and television also receive information.

Lorenz also asked if the village has property for the state to place a portable office for the highway construction projects. "The department will be here in the area for the next five years," Lorenz said. The village has no property with easy access to the Mechem and Highway 70 projects except its parks, which Briley said were probably not the best place for the trailer. Lorenz said the trailer. may be placed on the highway right of way on Highway 70 on the west side of Ruidoso.

Highway construction proiects include the reconstruction of Mechem Drive (Highway 48) from its intersection with Sudderth Drive to White Mountain Drive in the first phase, to the Ski Run Road in the second phase and to Highway 37 in Angus as the final phase. The highway department also plans to reconstruct Highway 70 to four lanes from the Inn of the Mountain Gods intersection on the Mescalero Reservation into Ruidoso, and through Ruidoso Downs.






