

Fort Stanton Warden Suspended

Fort Stanton Women's Prison Warden Sandra McFadin was placed on administrative leave Monday while a private investigation is conducted on personnel and operational issues at the facility.

New Mexico Secretary of Corrections Ron Perry told THE NEWS on Monday that about two months ago he received information from

McFadin about problems at the women's prison. Perry disputed recent media reports about a "Sex scandal" at Fort Stanton. Instead he said that five employees were found to be engaged in "inappropriate staff-inmate behavior."

Because of the personnel and operational issues Perry said it became evident it was necessary to bring in an independent investigator. "To

avoid any claims of favoritism by headquarters," he added.

On Monday, Perry did not tell THE NEWS about McFadin's suspension. Wednesday, THE NEWS called Secretary Perry's office to verify a rumor that McFadin had been relieved of duty. While Secretary Perry was not available, corrections department public information officer Mike Toms said that

McFadin was placed on administrative suspension Monday while the investigation was underway.

On Monday Perry did tell THE NEWS that corrective action has been taken at Fort Stanton. All employees involved in inappropriate behavior were fired, and remaining employees are undergoing additional training.

Perry said he authorized

private investigation company Organization Administrative Resources Service, Ltd. of Albuquerque and Grants, to look into inappropriate actions and allegations by corrections employees at the small women's facility. Perry said the company is operated by former state police officers. Corrections was able to employ the investigation company at short notice without

going through the normal procurement process because the company is on state contract, Perry said. The cost of the investigation is estimated to be \$4,000 to \$5,000.

Inadequate training has been an issue with many security personnel, even be-

Payseno Bound Over To District Court On Open Murder Charges

Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. bound Terri Payseno, 40, Hondo, over to district court Monday on charges of open count of murder, possession of firearm by felon and tampering with evidence.

Lincoln County Sheriff's officers arrested Payseno late September 25 at a ranch about four miles south of Hondo in Alamo Canyon after they found the badly decomposed body of 57 year-old Sonny Kirkwood. According to Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan, Kirkwood allegedly was shot during an argument between the two women on September 13. Payseno then put Kirkwood's body into a horse trailer where it remained until officers arrived 12 days later.

Payseno remains in the Lincoln County Detention Center with no bond.

No date has been set for Payseno's first appearance in district court. Her attorney is Gary Mitchell of Ruidoso.

Spencers Christen Intimate Theater

Underneath a canopy of twinkling lights and tons of glass, 500 formally attired guests waited anxiously for their benefactor to arrive. Just as the sunset colored the sky over Sierra Blanca rosy and orange, Dr. H.N. and Mrs. Jackie Spencer arrived at their intimate "little gem of a theater", built to "enhance the cultural lives of the residents and visitors of southern New Mexico." The crowd breaks out in spontaneous applause that grows as the Spencers make their way to the podium set in front of the white Spanish stone wall holding artist Dale Chihuly's glass Indian Paintbrush flowers.

With the snip of gold-colored shears, Dr. and Jackie Spencer christened their \$20 million dream, the Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts, on Friday, October 3, after five years of planning and building. Not everything was finished, carpets had yet to be laid under the auditorium seats, the smell of glue lingered in the air from the newly laid carpets, heavy like the scent of exotic flowers. But no one seemed to notice the spots where the paint had yet to be applied or a broken pane of glass, for there was a magic in the air as a new era in cultural activities began in Lincoln County.

The ribbon cutting ceremony included comments from Jackie's son Hugh Bancroft, Ruidoso Mayor Jerry Shaw and Governor Gary Johnson. There were accolades to architect Antoine Predock, and most of all to Jackie and Dr. H. N. Spencer.

After the ceremony guests left the lobby of glass and massive steel pipes for seats in the auditorium. The main hall is lined with pale birch wood

paneling which softens the hard exterior of massive white stone, steel and glass. Guests took their plush seats, all close in to the massive stage, with no seat further than 57 feet away. Overhead, the ceiling

was sheathed with curtains, designed as baffles that are moved for each performance to obtain optimum acoustics.

As the house lights dimmed, guests quieted. Out stepped David Lockington, conductor for New Mexico Symphony Orchestra which struck up an overture to warm the house for the next guest performer, world renown violinist Nadja Salerno-Sonnenburg. Her rousing performance of Tchaikovsky's Violin Concerto in D Major brought the house to its feet.

Then came the star of the weekend, Dave Brubeck and his Dave Brubeck Quartet. Brubeck and his quartet brought the audience and the orchestra into the swing by the end of the evening's

mind giving Brubeck a rousing standing ovation at the end.

After the performances in the main hall were over, guests danced and partied to the music of the Harry James band in a pavilion on the grounds of the Spencer theater. At midnight, the firework display which had been rained out at July 4, was ignited, filling the late night sky with color, and noise.

Brubeck performed two more concerts last weekend before bidding farewell to the stunning edifice gracing the sweep of Fort Stanton Mesa. The Harry James Band also performed at a party on Saturday night.

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County Commission Meets October 17th

Lincoln County Commissioners meet at 9 a.m. Friday, October 17, in their chambers in the Lincoln County Court-house in Carrizozo.

The meeting was moved from their normal second Tuesday of the month to Friday, October 17 because of the Monday, Columbus Day holiday.

Commissioners will conduct two public hearings during the day. At 1 p.m. commissioners will conduct a public hearing to consider the proposed comprehensive land use plan ordinance and at 3 p.m. they will hold a hearing to receive public input on the 1998 New Mexico Small Cities Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). Afterward the CDBG hearing commissioners will select a CDBG project.

Other items on the tentative agenda include: Clarification of ending cash balance; report of Data Processing/Software by Triadic Enterprises; consideration of bid for police interceptor; road maintenance requests - Palo Verde subdivision, County Road E-024, agreement with Village of Ruidoso concerning Gavilan Canyon Road; request for approval of claim of exemption for continued use for farming; request for summary review plat approval; final road acceptance for lots in Deer Park Meadow Subdivision; preliminary approval of roads in Ranches de Sonterra Subdivision Unit 3 for the beginning of the two-year test wear period; re-plat of Ranches de Sonterra unit five into Tierra Encantada Subdivision as requested by Gary Lynch.

Candles flickered in front of the Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas Company in Capitan this week, placed there by friends and family members mourning the death of 19 year old Robert McCarty.

Wednesday afternoon, Capitan schools sent students home, and allowed the funeral service for Robert to be held in the gym. Many grieved for the well known teen who died in a motorcycle accident after dark Friday.

Capitan Police Chief Carroll Durbin said McCarty's death was a tragedy. "There was a strong possibility McCarty would have survived the accident if he had been wearing a helmet," Durbin said.

According to the police report, McCarty died of massive head injuries after he was thrown from his 1995

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Hepatitis B Immunizations To Be Mandatory For Students

The New Mexico Department of Health has issued new regulations requiring the mandatory Hepatitis B immunization of New Mexico school children.

By September 1, 1999, all children entering the 7th grade will be required to have completed the three dose Hepatitis B vaccine series in order to begin the school year. By September 1, 2000 all children 12 months or older in state-licensed day-care centers will be required to have completed the three dose Hepatitis B vaccine series. By September 1, 2002 all children entering kindergarten or

school for the first time will be required to have completed the three dose Hepatitis B vaccine series in order to begin the school year.

Free Hepatitis B vaccines are administered by the school nurse every Wednesday at Hondo Valley Schools; every Thursday at Corona Public Schools and every Friday at Carrizozo Schools.

Students can obtain parent consent forms from their school office. For more information, call Lura Springfels, school nurse for Hondo Valley, Carrizozo and Corona Public Schools, or the Department of Health.

Jackie Spencer's Dream Theater Is Now Reality

In 1995, heiress Jackie Spencer told architect Antoine Predock, "I'd like you to build me a little gem of a theater." On October 3, 1997, Jackie Spencer christened her little

gem with a grand gala opening, the culmination of a 16-year dream.

In the afternoon of the grand opening, Predock and glass artist Dale Chihuly answered questions and spoke about

their works. Predock, a graduate of UNM, said he was amazed to be sitting in one of his buildings in New Mexico and hearing the Dave Brubeck Quartet, a favorite from college days. Later for the ribbon cutting, Predock brought along an old Brubeck album, in its original cover, for Brubeck to autograph.

Predock said in working with the Spencers they were passionate and open. "Jackie had a vision," he continued. "She selected the property and dreamed of this for a long time. It was an inspired vision and could only happen with such inspiration."

Predock described the eight-story edifice, the tallest in Lincoln County, as a geode. "Inside is wood, very different than the exterior," Predock said. He also described the angular building as looking

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like a Stealth F17-1A jet fighter, which was an unexpected thing. "I love the F17-1As," Predock said.

Predock said the building's angles were inspired by Sierra Blanca. The building's exterior of white stone imported from Spain and cut at the Carrara quarries of Italy, fulfilled his concept of "Spanish for white mountain."

"The building is a surrogate mountain," Predock said. "Sierra Blanca in disguise."

A gem-like quality comes from the north facing glass atrium with 300 pieces of glass, like facets, glowing with 1,000 20-watt lights. On the east, water falls down steps of Spanish stone to a reflecting pool at the bottom. Guests in the lounge can see the fountain

with the grand backdrop of the Capitan Mountains.

The building evokes such thoughts as monolithic, solidity. Predock and the Spencers were very conscious of these feelings during the design. To do the actual building, the company of PCL of Canada was selected. PCL

fore guards were transferred from nearby Camp Sierra Blanca which the state closed as a minimum security facility for adult men in 1996. Perry said all corrections security personnel (guards) undergo eight weeks of basic academy training replete with proper security and procedures, including how to deal with such things as con games. To help with additional training, Perry said his department sent Marcella Armijo from the state corrections training academy, but Armijo ended up getting into a personnel dispute with the Fort Stanton administrative staff. "That complicated matters," Perry said. "Armijo has been an advocate (for staff) and anti-administration. She considers herself a whistle blower."

Perry said McFadin has filed a grievance against Armijo because McFadin's "credibility has been put in question."

THE NEWS contacted Armijo who said that she and Patrick Apodaca were sent as instructors from the corrections academy in Santa Fe to Fort Stanton on May 21 to provide training. Armijo, who has been with the state corrections department since 1976, said she provides advanced training to security officers on how to deal with female offenders and their "games and schemes." Apodaca provided training on

report writing.

Armijo said she was sent to Fort Stanton to do a job which was needed before the facility was converted to a women's prison. "Don't get me wrong, I don't defend the three guards who were fired for inappropriate behavior with the inmates," she said.

Who she does support are the employees fired for other reasons, such as the officer who was fired for allegedly falsifying a purchase order for

paintbrushes. "That was totally untrue," she said.

"They (the ones inappropriately fired) are the whistle blowers," Armijo said. "They asked me for help. If I see a case that needs to be fought, I will fight it all the way, even if I get blackballed."

Armijo said she and the officers made every attempt to talk with Secretary Perry about the situation with no luck. "What good is his Open Door policy? These officers need their story to be heard," she added. Armijo said the officers attempted to file grievances through the chain of command, and were denied in all areas. "Now they have to see an attorney," she added.

Face the Governor's Deed

Money before people?

Four years ago an Albuquerque businessman was the first candidate to publicly announce for governor. He was new to the political scene and his campaign slogan was, "People Before Politics". That slogan got a lot of publicity because it indicated he cared about people. Gary Johnson was elected but it wasn't long before "People Before Politics" was once again getting a lot of publicity because politics was being put before people.

One of the governor's first official acts, with the help of his newly appointed health secretary Alex Valdez, was to close Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School. Even though Valdez came to Fort Stanton a week later and promised the 200 workers they would have the opportunity to transfer to other locations, the truth was that only the professional people were given the chance to transfer. The regular workers were left without a job and Fort Stanton was the governor's start of downsizing of government.

As a candidate, Johnson also told the voters he would not run for re-election. He said he would be a "one-term" governor.

We all know that Johnson has changed his mind. He likes being governor and will be a candidate again, even though he has not officially announced his candidacy for re-election. He is sending letters to people asking for donations to help finance his bid for re-election, or as he says, "Your contribution of \$25, \$50 or \$100 to my reelection effort will help me continue to champion what I know is our shared vision for New Mexico."


Apparently Johnson's vision is different than the vision of many of the residents of New Mexico. His letter states that today, state government has 1,200 fewer employees than when he took office. We agree with that statement because 200 of those people had been state employees at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School. This means that one-sixth of all the former state employees had been former Lincoln County residents.

The letter also states, "With increased services to the citizens of New Mexico, there is a real case to be made that our state government is more efficient." Several people are asking what services have been increased. The people who had been living at Fort Stanton, both the people with developmental disabilities and the older geriatric patients who were in the process of being moved into Fort Stanton, have far fewer services than they ever had while they were living at Fort Stanton. One former Fort Stanton resident has had to wait more than three years to get an appointment to see the dentist. This is almost a total lack of services, not an increase in services. Efficient is supposed to mean successful in producing an effect or result. Any time a person is deprived of necessary medical and/or dental care it is not efficient, it is neglect. If the governor would be honest about the services available to the citizens of New Mexico he wouldn't have much of a reason to ask anyone for a campaign donation.

The governor's letter also states, "I believe that in less than three years we've changed the way our state government serves its citizens - for the better!" The changes Johnson has made may be better for him but the people now living on the streets would disagree. The changes Johnson has made may be better for him but the people now waiting for medical appointments would disagree. The changes Johnson has made may be better for him but the elderly people being deprived of minimum care would disagree. The changes Johnson has made may be better for him but they certainly haven't been better for Lincoln County.

Putting people before politics was a good campaign slogan that may have helped Johnson get elected the first time and probably will help him get elected once again. It is just sad that so many people have to suffer while a glib politician makes his flowery speeches. Does he care about people or being re-elected?

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Gov. Gary Johnson and Health Secretary Alex Valdez, once again, are setting out to save money and privatize state government regardless of the political consequences.

During Johnson's first year in office, they closed down the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School in Lincoln County, the biggest Republican stronghold in the state. For good measure, the governor also decided not to support Ruidoso Downs' request for casino gambling at racetracks, thereby angering residents of Lincoln County's largest community.

That was back when Johnson was a first-year governor and still saying he

would be a one-termer. Something during the intervening two years caused the governor to decide he wants to stick around, but that isn't keeping him from moving to shut down the New Mexico Rehabilitation Center in Roswell. Chaves County is one of the state's two other Republican counties.

The Rehabilitation Center is housed in aging buildings on the old Walker Air Force Base. It has become an expensive facility to operate and needs a good deal of renovation. The center employs a staff of 110 to provide physical rehabilitation for injuries, substance abuse rehabilitation and detoxification programs. It is the only inpatient rehabilitation center run by the state and it serves indigent patients that no privatized programs will want.

Roswell has some things going for it that Lincoln County didn't. For starters, Chaves County has a bigger and more powerful legislative delegation. While Lincoln County shares its senator with three other counties, the one Democrat in Chaves County's legislative delegation is Senate Majority Leader Tim Jennings. When Johnson closed Fort Stanton, Lincoln County had just ousted its Democrat House member John Underwood, who had wielded considerable influence. His replacement, Dub Williams, thought he had agreement from Gov. Johnson not to close the fort, but quickly found out about promises not being commitments.

Chaves County's House members also are new, with the exception of Rep. Dick Knowles, a former Republican floor leader and one of the most respected members of the Legislature. But Roswell won't have to depend solely on its own legislative delegation.

Rep. Max Coll, chairman of the interim Legislative Finance Committee and the House Appropriations Committee, both of which will have much to say about the fate of the Rehabilitation Center, is squarely in Roswell's corner. Though now a Santa Fe Democrat, Coll was a Roswell Republican back in 1968, when Walker Air Force Base

was closed down.

Community leaders immediately set about to repopulate the old base. One of its many successes was establishing the state's rehabilitation center in the old base hospital. Coll says it would be an "utter blunder" to close the center. He promises to schedule an LFC hearing this fall to educate his committee members about the issues and to make sure the people of the area have an opportunity to speak their minds. That's something Fort Stanton supporters didn't get a chance to do.

If past experience is an indication, Roswell will have plenty to say. The last time it faced a crisis that the state Legislature could fix was last January, when the Nova Bus Company was in danger of losing a juicy contract with New York City because of a state law giving preferential treatment to New Mexico companies. In an impressive display of political muscle, the New Mexico Legislature made New Yorkers into New Mexicans before most lawmakers had introduced their first bill.

Johnson and Valdez think the four private companies vying to buy Chaves County's Eastern New Mexico Medical Center would like to provide the rehab services currently handled by the state center. If not, Valdez says things are changing so fast in the health business that other private firms will be interested in providing the same quality services at much less cost, because they're not bound by so many state laws and regulations.

subcontracted with companies throughout the region. Actual work began January 1996. Predock praised PCL for its

"incredible" job. In its relationship to the earth and sky, the building has many different guises and a

chameleon quality of changeability. "It has many different personalities," Predock said.

Chihuly, whose studio is in Seattle, came late into the project. Brought to the Spencer's attention by El Paso interior designer Ron Morgan, Chihuly's brightly colored blown glass pieces reflect Jackie's desire for the color of wild flowers. Chihuly's blown glass plates grace the wall of the upper floor lobby, like wild flowers in bloom.

Chihuly said the theater is a challenge for a community this size, since most theaters never make a profit.

Theater director Rand Harmon said the Spencers were aware of this, but wanted to provide the area with quality entertainment. He said actual ticket sales will amount to only 10 percent of the revenue needed for performances. The theater seats only 514. About 20 percent will come from private and corporate sources. The rest will come from the Spencers.

After the press conference, media representatives were given tours of the eight story tall facility, including back stage. The massiveness of the stage is most evident behind the curtains and wooden baffles.

The acoustical curtain was designed by Rob McKay who also designed the interior of the Popejoy Hall in Albuquerque. The Dave Brubeck Quartet however, suffered some problems with the new hall. But the guests, which included 475 charter members, didn't seem to mind, as they cheered the performances with applause.

Most likely acoustical problems will be solved by the next performance--The Velvetton Rabbit by the San Francisco Dance Company on October 17 and 18.



EDITOR: The other day one of my friends told me that another of my friends would not talk with my friend any more, and, thus, I am sitting between two of my friends, like between the proverbial two chairs. How sad.

We are all humans, of the same species Homo sapiens, and I have always wondered about the attribute "sapiens". That is, I sometimes wonder whether it is not presumptuous that we call us that (sapiens = wise, i.e. intelligent, reasonable, sensible, judicious, etc.).

All of us think — at least that is what we should do. And, biologically, there are physical and mental variations in the way we are doing that, i.e. we think differently, have different ideas, express ourselves differently, come to different conclusions.

The language is one of the means, perhaps the most important one, to express ourselves. The brain-voice chord combination (the brain is always involved — at least it should be) brings forward what we are thinking. In Homo, this is a particularly fine developed tool. The brain-ear combination — most mammals do have that — is the receptor of the message, of the emitted thought. Thus, the message needs digesting, discriminating and most of all, first, separation from our own thoughts. After that, eventually we may evaluate it on the basis of what we think. This is the way we (should) communicate with one another.

This emission and reception of thoughts, this transmission called communication is very important. It requires some give and take. As the emitter, i.e. one of the communication partners, by analogy, upbringing, environment and experience, thinks differently from the receptor and may be on a different frequency it is up to the receptor to find out what was exactly meant. "This was not properly thought through, sir", may mean exactly what the words read but it can also mean "You idiot!"

If we fail to translate the message correctly and do not take into account what our partner really wanted to say that is the point where we quit being "sapiens".

That somebody thinks differently from the way I think is no reason not to listen, to try to understand (which is sometimes very difficult) or even to accept the thought when I previously disagreed with them. Someone who has ideas different from mine is still my friend. Someone who has beliefs which I do not share has still my respect and can be my friend.

But, of course, there are those few who's transmissions are turned off after a short time for some reason or another by my receptor — but those are usually not my friends.
