

# County Commission To Dole Out Money

Lincoln County Commissioners played Santa this week doling out \$100,000 to the county's municipalities for recreation facilities.

At their regular December meeting Tuesday, held in the Ruidoso Convention Center, commissioners reconsidered the action they took in November to establish the fund by recalling the motion. In November they approved setting up a line item of \$150,000 of general fund mon-

ey for recreation and vocational education to be distributed to the municipalities and the county. Because they did not determine how to distribute the funds, commissioners brought the motion back to the table on Tuesday, and debated and finally agreed how to spend the \$150,000.

Originally, the promoters of the recreation/vocational education fund wanted the money divided according to an estimated value of each community and the unincorporated

areas of the county. Under their concept, Ruidoso would get 47 percent of the total amount, the unincorporated areas 44 percent, Ruidoso Downs 4.9 percent, Capitan 2.1 percent, Carrizozo 1.3 percent and Corona .30 percent. The promoters said the county could distribute its share for the unincorporated areas to communities that could show they had need for additional funds.

According to the newest assessed values, the unincor-

porated areas of the county have the greatest value with 46.56 percent of the total valuation of the county. Ruidoso's value is 45.31 percent, Corona's value is .32 percent, Carrizozo 1.11 percent, Capitan 2.16 percent and Ruidoso Downs 4.55 percent. Taking \$150,000 and dividing it by the percentages, the county would get \$69,834.06, Ruidoso \$67,965.09, Ruidoso Downs \$6,824.95, Capitan \$3,238.68, Carrizozo \$1,659.43 and Coro-

na \$477.79.

After considerable discussion, commissioners voted down a motion 2-3 made by Rex Wilson to distribute the funds with each entity getting a flat \$10,000 plus its valuation percentage of the remaining \$90,000. They did accept, on a 4-1 vote with commissioner Bill Schwettmann voting no, a motion to give Ruidoso its \$67,965.09 share, set aside \$50,000 of the county's share for seed money for a county-wide vocational

program and evenly divide the remaining \$19,834 from the county's portion to be added to the valuation share for Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona. Funds will be provided in January.

When the final motion, the one reconsidered from the November meeting to establish the recreation/vocational fund, came to

## County Declares An Emergency Situation At Jail

Lincoln County Detention Center is in an emergency situation.


With jail administrator Wayland Hill still recovering from a stroke, two detention officers placed on administrative leave, and a notice of a pending lawsuit against the jail from a former inmate, Lincoln County Commissioners made the declaration during their meeting in Ruidoso on Tuesday.

Before making the declaration, commissioners met in a closed to public session with District Attorney Scot Key and Lincoln County Under-sheriff Rick Virden. After about 30 minutes, commissioners returned to open session and announced they were declaring the jail an emergency situation and voted to authorize personnel changes. The three existing part time detention officers are to be moved to full time positions and the one part time secretary is to be moved to full time. The county will hire one additional full time detention officer and one part time detention officer.

Commissioners authorized county manager Frank Potter to negotiate with Corrections System, Inc. for a temporary administrator position, and to advertise for request for proposals for detention operators.

Potter's office also requested and received an additional \$81,854.43 to cover the addi-

## County 911 Addressing Ordinance Is Approved

Lincoln County's future is numbered.

For five years Lincoln County has been attempting to undertake rural addressing to make a 911 system more effective and to help emergency services personnel find rural locations. Several street signs have been installed on county roads, but no numbers were ever assigned and not all road have names, frustrating county planning staff in charge of the project.

Lincoln County Commissioners, in their more than eight hour meeting Tuesday in Ruidoso Convention Center, adopted an ordinance which sets the 911 rural addressing process into motion. County manager Frank Potter said the ordinance is the first step to rural addressing. The ordinance also gives the county a chance at \$200,000 from the state for rural addressing. Potter said the county now has a grid system in place on its base mapping computer program and all that was needed was the ordinance that set the actual project in motion.

The Lincoln County 911 Numbering/Rural Addressing Ordinance provides a physical address, consisting of a number and road name, in pre-

dominately rural areas, so all commercial and residential structures and platted vacant lots can be quickly found and identified by law enforcement and emergency services personnel and utility providers. The ordinance defines how structures and properties will be numbered according to their distance from the beginning of the road upon which the building is located. Once addresses have been assigned, the numbers must be placed in a conspicuous place, visible from the primary access to the property.

Commissioners made changes to the proposed ordinance to require a number for each "property", and to establish a committee of seven people—one from each commission district and two at large—to hear and act on all road name change requests, and assignment of addresses and road names for subdivisions of two or more lots. The committee will meet at least quarterly or when needed.

During the public hearing, commissioners discussed their concerns about wording in the proposed ordinance. Monroy Montes was concerned with the proposal to number every building on a property. Rex

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## Clinic Building Going To Hondo; Voting Machines Are Homeless

A portable building used for years as the dental office of the Carrizozo Health Clinic is headed for Hondo. But as the building goes, so does the storage for the county's \$5,000 a piece electronic voting machines.

During their regular meeting held in Ruidoso Convention Center on Tuesday, Lincoln County Commissioners took action to give \$20,000 and the former dental office to Hondo School District to be used as a school/community health clinic. The \$20,000 will come from a fund set up to finance construction of a new shed for the Hondo ambulance.

The concept of a health clinic for the Hondo area has been looked at over the years. At two Health and Wellness Committee town meetings held in Hondo this year, 116 of the 126 citizens who attended supported a health clinic in their community. County commissioner Monroy Montes said he spoke with the Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) administrator about a clinic in Hondo, and she suggested offering the district the old Carrizozo dental office building. Montes said they found the building is Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) compliant and had plumbing.

The portable office was moved from the Carrizozo Health Clinic location to a lot next to the courthouse after the new Carrizozo Health Clinic building was completed. Plans were to use the portable building to store the county's current 32 voting machines and the 13 new ones arriving before next year's primary election.

Hondo School District superintendent Barbara Casey presented a copy of a resolution approved by the Hondo Board of Education recognizing the need for accessible health care. Casey said 90 percent of the students in the school are Medicaid eligible, and the school nurse is the health provider for the valley as well as the children at the school.

Casey also wanted to get the project underway because the school has a grant from the state highway department to construct a paved parking lot in the old playground area next to Highway 70. She said the building would be placed

at the east end of the parking lot. She also said the district is doing new plumbing and water lines which would have to be extended to the clinic building. Casey suggested an agreement between the county and the school district to "work out liability issues."

Commissioners discussed at length whether the county should be involved and how the clinic could be staffed. Commissioners agreed the county shouldn't be involved beyond providing the building and money to move and set it up. Montes said he wanted the clinic to be community based for now, then once established it could be taken in under the Department of Health or LCMC, or private provider.

Wanda Guielow De Figueroa with the Health and Wellness Committee, said they were uncertain if a private provider could offer sliding scale fees or indigent care. Figueroa said the Department of Health has tentatively said it might provide a doctor on a weekly basis at the Hondo clinic.

Lincoln County Commissioner Rex Wilson favored the concept of the clinic, but did not support the school system being in "the health care business." He favored the Department of Health or LCMC as workable.

Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor, who graduated from Hondo High School, said she applauded the efforts of the community to provide health services. "But what do I do with 32 voting machines, and 13 new ones coming this spring?" she asked.

Someone suggested putting up a metal building, but Proctor said the machines must be kept in a climate controlled

building. She also said it would be best if the machines were stored in Carrizozo because they must be plugged in once a month.

LCMC spokesperson Julie Sterchi said LCMC concurs there is a great need for a health clinic in Hondo. However she could not say if LCMC could provide a nurse or physician's assistant because the LCMC board of directors do not meet until January. She suggested rural health care grants to help with staffing. "You are halfway there if you have the space," Sterchi said.

Casey said the Hondo School District is willing to take responsibility for the clinic, and she is willing to write grants for funding the clinic. Montes, who also is a graduate of Hondo High School, said Hondo was not there "for a hand out, we're not the poor relative. We just ask the county to put the building at Hondo, and we'll find a way."

Ruidoso citizen Jim Stoddard commented, "you



## Capitan School Board To Work On Goals At January Meeting

Capitan Board of Education believes public education is the number one priority in the state of New Mexico.

To further support that

belief, Capitan school board members during their regular meeting December 11, approved a resolution encouraging the New Mexico State Legislature to appropriate funds and encouraging the

governor to sign the legislation that is needed to properly educate the public school students in the state. The resolution is to be sent to the state legislature.

Board members also approved changing the date of the January meeting to January 15, the third Thursday of the month. The board usually meets the second Thursday, but decided to allow the extra week because New Year's day is the first Thursday.

At that January meeting, the board will again consider and possibly take action to adopt the Capitan School Strategic Plan. The plan outlines several goals for curriculum, staff, learning environment and community involvement. The plan requires strategies, time lines and assessments for curriculum on technology, writing and communication skills, reading skills, math skills, vocational skills, fine arts skills, advanced placement courses, school to careers, long-distance learning and extra-curricular activities. Under staff goals, the schools will strive to retain quality teachers and support staff and improve staff capabilities. Board members will consider their objectives for salaries/increments and benefits for staff; professional development; additional staffing and morale.

Board members will also add their goals for improving the learning environment with school facilities; classroom supplies; student discipline; character counts/student mediation; and class size. Community involvement goals include advisory committee; community service; board meeting; media and business partnerships.

Board members are to bring their suggestions and wishes for each goal to the January meeting for further discussion. The public is invited to attend the meeting.

vote it again barely passed 3-2. Schwettmann and Wilson voted against the fund. Before the vote was taken Wilson said the county cannot afford the recreation fund because of the county's basic and future needs. "The most effective way to control taxes is to control the budget," Wilson said. "This is not controlling our budget. We can anticipate an increase in taxes. We've been saying no to our jail forever."

Commissioner Wilton Howell assured Wilson there was money in the county's budget to address the jail. "I don't think our youth should suffer," Howell said at the first of the meeting discussed his proposed state legislation to freeze valuations on all residential properties at purchase value. He also said that the only way to control taxes was to control the county's spending.

After the 3-2 vote commission chairman L. Ray Nunley commented that county funds are limited. "This is going to barely work, and I'm not sure the money will be there next year and then on," Nunley said. He then called on the communities to match the funds the county provides.

Ruidoso citizen Al Junge then asked how much the county has in excess, because he said he could not get any figures from the county, unlike the village of Ruidoso which he said can figure "to the penny." Potter said after the \$150,000 is taken from the county's general fund, the county will have about \$10,000 above its state required reserves.

County treasurer Joan Park said the ending cash balance for the county is in the budget, "which is our plan for the entire year, not actual dol-

lars." She said it is a "mismomer to call it actual money."

Junge unsatisfied with his answer, again asked why Ruidoso could give its ending cash balance down to the penny. But Nunley called for lunch and recessed the meeting.

During discussion on the distribution formula, county manager Frank Potter presented some figures giving options to the original proposal, including value based on school districts, and value plus a flat \$10,000 additional to each entity.

County commissioner Monroy Montes said the only real need for the county was the \$50,000 committed to a vocational program. He suggested giving Ruidoso its \$67,965, then for the county's share set aside \$50,000 for a vocational program in the county, and split the remaining \$19,834.06 among the smaller municipalities evenly, giving each an additional \$4958.

Montes said he did not think Lincoln County has any business in starting a recreational program.

Nunley said the funding could be "a one shot deal" and he suggested it be called revenue sharing and given to the community to use for any need. But Howell and several of the promoters objected. "That's contrary to the original motion," Howell said. "I'd rather use it for recreation as the intent."

Nunley said he was asked by Carrizozo Mayor Cecilia Kuhnle and Corona Mayor Ernest Lueras to suggest the revenue sharing. Howell said that the county should give the money and ask the entities to come back with a "report card" to determine if the funding should be continued. "Not look over their shoulder to tell them how to spend it," Howell said.

Kuhnle then spoke about her town's recreational needs at the swimming pool, golf course and little league field which totalled more than \$5,000. She said that any money available for recreation could easily be used by the town.

Capitan School Superintendent Diana Billingsley said she totally supported a vocational program at Eastern New Mexico learning center in

Ruidoso. However, she discouraged distributing the recreation money to the school districts, because it could be a problem who would cover liability for any recreational facility, since schools cannot spend any general operating funds for such. She said Capitan Schools were willing to lease any land to the village for a recreational facility. She said her school board also supports the proposal for recreational funding.

Potter said it was never intended to distribute the money to the school districts, rather he presented a distribution formula based on value of each school district. That would then create a fund for the Hondo area, which has no incorporated municipality.

tional personnel in the jail, and \$7,712.50 for the electronic monitoring ankle bracelet set up fees and \$100,000 for contractual incarceration (out of county).

The two jailers were placed on administrative leave the first week of December pending the outcome of the sheriff's office investigation into allegations of inappropriate sexual contact between the male and female jailers and a female inmate. No charges have been filed on the jailers by press time, and DA Key did not return the calls from THE NEWS about the situation.

## Carrizozo Municipal Judge Meeks Resigns

Carrizozo Municipal Judge William Meeks will resign effective December 31. He sent a letter to the mayor and trustees and to the citizens of the Town of Carrizozo on December 17.

Meeks stated in his letter: "I submit this letter of resignation to be effective 31 December 1997. However, other responsibilities will not permit me to spend the time and energy necessary to continue doing a good job for the wonderful people of the Town of Carrizozo. A major consideration in resigning now is to

open the position for the upcoming elections in March. I understand that candidates must register by 8 January 98. In any event, I stand ready to assist the new Judge in any way to make his/her job easier during the "break-in" process. It has been a pleasure to work with the Town Council, and in particular with Chief Vinson and his staff. He does a difficult job with professionalism and integrity that honors the Town. His officers have always done their job in court with respect, dignity and

dedication, and his secretary has always been pleasant, helpful, knowledgeable and cooperative.

**Editor's Note:** The election resolution for March 3, 1998 for the Town of Carrizozo approved during the regular town council meeting November 25 states: "At the regular municipal election, persons shall be elected to fill the following elective offices: one mayor for a four year term and two trustees for a four year term."

The position of municipal judge was not included in the resolution and will not be included in the March 3 election. The mayor may appoint a person to fill the municipal

judge position with concurrence of the town council. Meeks was also appointed as Carrizozo Municipal Judge to fill a vacancy and was elected to the position in 1992.

Wilson requested the wording be changed to "property" and not specify buildings. Citizen Jerry Carroll was concerned the county will "back numbers on his private property" without permission, or be fined. County attorney Alan Morel said the wording can be changed to say every "property" will be assigned a number. And he said Carroll will be assigned a number, "but I'm not going on his property to make him put it up."

Commissioner Wilton Howell said the county has been trying for five years to get rural addressing. "Frank Potter is the first one to stay this is the first step," Howell said in reference to the ordinance. "Rural addressing is most crucial for emergency services."

Capitan Volunteer Fire Department Chief David Cummins who was at the meeting for another matter, urged commissioners to adopt the ordinance. He said that currently whenever there is an emergency in the rural areas, the 911 works only because the sheriff's office dispatchers know directions to many locations. "Rural addressing will make it easier for emergency volunteers to do their job," Cummins said.

Potter said it would not matter if one individual refused to post the address numbers, because neighbors will have numbers. "And we can still find you," he said.

Citizen E. J. Fouratt said the citizens have been paying 50 cents on their phone bills for 911 for a number of years. "It's time to get some of that money back, pass the ordinance," Fouratt said.

Along with addressing, the ordinance provides for a way to rename streets which have duplicate names, and for property owners who live along a street or road to request a name change. It also requires developers to have a rural addressing plan for all future subdivisions, before the subdivision can be accepted by the county.

Commissioners also did away with the penalty section of the ordinance, concerned they would have to enforce such penalties.

# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE:** Will Gov. Gary Johnson's political career be helped or hurt by being the first New Mexico chief executive to be held in contempt of court?

Opinions are split almost exactly along party lines. More information on the subject was forthcoming yesterday when the governor and three lawmakers squared off in front of the state Supreme Court for the third time in a little over three months.

Three legislators and sev-

eral welfare recipients filed a lawsuit last summer claiming the Johnson administration violated the constitution by vetoing a welfare reform bill last spring and implementing a plan of its own. On Sept. 10, the Supreme Court agreed and ordered the administration to cease implementation of its plan and return to the old law.

But that's not what state officials did, according to those who brought the suit, so they went back to court seeking to have the governor and Human Services Department secretary in contempt. That's what the court did on Dec. 10, giving the administration one week to demonstrate how it is complying. Johnson's lawyers say they may appeal to a federal court.

This is a replay of the casino gambling situation two years ago, in which the state Supreme Court said compacts signed by the governor and Indian tribes were invalid because the state constitution required the Legislature be involved. The decision was appealed, resulting in three federal district courts and the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals backing the state Supreme Court. The U.S. Supreme Court declined to review the lower court action.

The issue in both cases was procedural. The decision was that Gov. Johnson proceeded without approval of the Legislature, as required by the state constitution. The rhetoric around the casino decision involved discrimination against Native Americans. The rhetoric around this one is that the state Supreme Court doesn't want welfare recipients to work.

In terms of public opinion, Gov. Johnson has staked out the popular side in both cases. Public opinion polls show that New Mexicans like to gamble. Johnson stayed out of the discrimination discussion, saying only that he was fulfilling a campaign pledge. No one needs a poll to know that have better benefits was a no-brainer. Taking drivers' licenses from deadbeat parents and making welfare recipients work also are wildly popular.

No matter that a Democrat Legislature and governor already had approved new prisons before Johnson came on the scene. No matter that parents who don't pay child support aren't going to worry much about driving without a license. And not matter that the welfare reform bill John-

son vetoed also required people nearly all working people think welfare recipients should find a job.

Native Americans haven't been as successful at selling their argument as Johnson has been at selling his. But then Gary Johnson knows Mr. & Ms. New Mexico's hot buttons. Building more prisons and repealing the six-cent gasoline tax increase were the issues that got him elected. Managing Medicaid just like private health care so that those who get it free don't pile on welfare to work. Johnson has staked out these issues for himself and he's doing a mighty good job of convincing people that he's their savior on everything that is important.

Gov. Johnson's one great accomplishment as far as I'm concerned is controlling Medicaid expenses that had become a yearly budget buster. Most of the rest is demagoguery. But Johnson has the same likeable personality that Bill Clinton used to convince Americans that Republicans will take away their Social Security and Medicare unless he is in office to protect them.

The feeling in Santa Fe is that Johnson should be held accountable for ignoring the other two branches of government. But so what if he is in contempt of court? A recent survey shows New Mexicans also have a lot of contempt for the courts — and the Legislature. He's just representing his constituents.

## Citrus Fruits Are Good For Holidays And Fruit Baskets

Planning, shopping, baking and a variety of other activities traditionally accompany the onset of holiday season. Now also is the time when citrus crops arrive in the market to help make the holiday rush a little easier. Choosing different varieties of fresh citrus is a wonderful way of getting the two servings of fruits needed each day. Citrus fruits include getting the two servings of fruits needed each day. Citrus fruits include oranges, lemons, grapefruits, tangerines and tangelos. Navel oranges are a delicious, nutritious addition to snacks and meals, whether it's a gift basket of oranges, a pretty bowl of punch garnished with orange slices or just an orange added to a typical breakfast, snack or lunch. They're full of vitamin C and are a good source of

fiber. For less than 100 calories, one orange provides all the vitamin C needed for the day. Vitamin C forms collagen, which holds cells together. It is also important for healthy teeth, gums, and blood vessels and aids in healing wounds and resisting infection. Vitamin C also may help to prevent certain types of cancer. Citrus fruits also provide potassium and folic acid. They are practically fat- and sodium-free and are low in calories. In addition to navel oranges, consider bright yellow lemons to add color and flavor to any many holiday meals. Add a squeeze of lemon over fresh fruits and vegetables, over poultry or in salads to enhance the taste without adding many calories. Give gift baskets filled with fruits of the season. Any decorative basket can be used. Fill the selected basket with a variety of citrus - oranges, lemons, grapefruit, sweet tangerines and other popular fruits such as pears, apples and pineapples. Add a few miniature pine cones and tie on a big bow. In no time, you've created a gift that will be warmly received. For a special touch, include the following recipe for Tangerine Fruit Salsa. This colorful fresh fruit salsa is an excellent accompaniment for holiday baked ham, turkey or other poultry dishes. Tangerine Fruit Salsa  
 4 to 6 medium to large tangerines, peeled, segmented, seeds removed and diced (about 2 cups)  
 1 cup diced fresh pineapple  
 1 small red-skinned pear or apple, unpeeled, cored and diced  
 2 tablespoons honey  
 1 small jalapeno pepper, finely minced (optional)  
 1 to 2 tablespoons thinly sliced fresh mint leaves  
 In bowl, combine all ingredients except mint. Cover and chill. Stir in mint before serving. Serve as an accompaniment for baked ham, turkey or other poultry dishes, if desired. Makes about 3 cups. Variation: Substitute 2 to 3 oranges, peeled and diced (about 2 cups), for tangerines. Each one-ounce serving provides: 22 calories, 5.6 grams of carbohydrates, 0 grams of fat and 8 milligrams of vitamin C.

## Guide Children To Make Healthy Food Selections

As the holiday season approaches, some parents become concerned with helping their overweight children eat healthfully.

Eating patterns often differ for children and adults over weekends and holidays. Holiday meals, party foods and traditional favorites may lead to overeating.

Calorie-restricted diets may hinder growth and create eating problems for children. To help children eat healthfully, guide them to make nutritious food selections.

Body weight reflects a delicate balance between food and drink consumed and energy used. Children need energy or calories for growth and activity. Many factors affect body weight including heredity, body type and lifestyle habits.

Studies show that overweight children usually do not consume more calories than their slim counterparts, but they are less active. Less activity means more energy will be stored as fat.

Physical activity generally declines as age increases, which contributes to an increased risk of obesity. The decrease in activity is much greater for girls than boys.

Following are some tips to help guide overweight children through the holidays:

- Increase physical activity by encouraging your child to walk, bike, play outdoors, assist with yardwork or exercise with you.
- Serve regular meals and snacks to discourage overeat-

ing higher fat, higher calorie choices. Don't skip meals, especially breakfast.

- Plan meals and snacks using the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Food Guide Pyramid. Serve plenty of whole grain breads, cereals, rice, pasta, vegetables, and fruit. Include skim or low-fat milk, dairy products, lean meats, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs and nuts.

- Encourage moderation in high fat, high calorie snacks.

Offer alternative snacks such as nonfat or low-fat yogurt, fruit, raw vegetables, crackers or breadsticks, soup and skim or low-fat milk.
