

Commissioners Cut Sheriff's Budget

Sales Barn Gets Increase

Lincoln County Commissioners slashed their proposed 1998-99 budget during the budget preliminary hearing on Tuesday trying to whittle the requested expenditures enough to leave money to meet the mandated cash reserve.

Recommendations from the Tuesday meeting will be com-

plied into the next draft of the proposed 1998-99 budget which commissioners will review at another hearing at 9 a.m. Friday, May 8, in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

During the preliminary budget hearing at the courthouse in Carrizozo on Tuesday, commissioners began the day by patiently listening to requests from the Lincoln County Fair Association, Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, White Oaks Fire Department, Hondo Fire Department, Humane Society of

Lincoln county, EMS, RC&D, Claunch Soil and Water Conservation District, Extension Service, Capitan Library, and others. It was the third meeting to discuss the proposed budget. Last week, commissioners met on Wednesday and Thursday, hearing requests from all department heads and coming up with a very preliminary budget of \$3.1 million in requested expenditures and about \$3.4 million in estimated revenues for the county's general operating fund.

(Editor's Note: The beginning cash balance for the

1997-98 fiscal year budget was \$1.5 million for the general fund as of July 23, 1997. The estimated beginning cash balance for the proposed 1998-99 fiscal year budget is \$820,733. Among the unexpected money requests, which came from the cash balance, was the \$150,000 appropriated for vocational school and recreation, \$1,300 for the Capitan Library, and other programs funded throughout the 1997-98 fiscal year which ends on June 30, 1998.)

By the end of the long day Tuesday, without even a break for lunch, commission-

ers came back out of a closed session for personnel and pending litigation and said they had to cut about \$522,000 from their first draft budget in order to have the required 3/12ths cash reserve, estimated to be about \$770,000. The 3/12 cash reserve is required by the state.

With that task in mind, commissioners slashed all requested new employees, agreed to cut all part time employees back to 20 hours a week, refused to allow the county clerk to put a part time position to full time, refused to allow the Capitan

Senior Center manager position to go to full time and cut out all purchases of capital equipment including requests for three deputy vehicles and two assessor's vehicles. The reason to limit part time employees to 20 hours is to avoid having to provide benefits for part time employees who work more than 24 hours a week, as required by the federal Fair Labor Standards Act.

"No new employees and no benefits to part time employ-

Carrizozo To Enforce Property Ordinance

The Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees meet Tuesday, April 28. Mayor Manuel Hernandez and all four trustees, James "Willie" Silva, Eileen Lovelace, Wesley Lindsay, and Cynthia Morales were present.

Hernandez bought several items to the attention of the trustees and audience during audience participation time at the beginning of the meeting.

Hernandez asked that at the next meeting the trustees approve a Clean Up Month Proclamation. The Clean Up would probably run from May 15 through June. He asked that the citizens be loaned the city dump truck and front-end loader to use if they needed them to move items like old refrigerators, couches, heavy stuff that they would like to get rid of. Town employees would pick the items up. He asked that there be no cost for the use of the equipment. Morales said the idea of use of the city vehicles for clean up was a good idea as there are a lot of people who do not have access to a vehicle to use to move items. During this month it will be checked to see if we can get another rolloff in Carrizozo.

Hernandez said that on riding around Carrizozo he found some buildings in pretty dilapidated condition. These buildings are not only eyesores to the community, but they are skunk habitat, health hazards, and dangerous to children who may be playing around them due to walls ready to fall down. The owners of the buildings live out of state. Hernandez said he is having Carrizozo Chief of Police Angelo Vega locate the owners of these buildings and send them a copy of the ordinance and to have them respond within 30 days. Hernandez says they already have had one response.

Town clerk Carol Schlarb said there is a form at her office that includes the ordinance and has a place for the legal description of the property. This form has been used for people needing to clean up

Ray Nunley Withdraws From Race

Lincoln County Commission Chairman Ray Nunley announced he was withdrawing as candidate for the Commission District II position. He made the announcement during the county preliminary budget hearing Tuesday.

Meeting in their chambers in the courthouse in Carrizozo, Nunley said he received notice that the Wal-Mart Corporation is putting him in charge of establishing a mountain states regional medical/pharmaceutical education program for seniors and indigent patients. The program will educate seniors about free medications available. Nunley said he will continue as manager of the Wal-Mart pharmacy but will be out of town often.

"As a result I am withdrawing from the county commission race," Nunley said. "If I run I won't have time to do a good job as county commissioner and I won't have time for the issue I love dearly--the seniors."

Nunley will remain on the county commission until this term expires in December and said he would be honored to remain as chairman until that time.

"It's necessary for me not to run, I'm too old to turn down promotions," he said. "It is vitally important to me to represent Wal-Mart and senior interests."

According to Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor it is too late to remove Nunley's name from the June 2 primary election ballot. But his name can be withdrawn from the November general election ballot.

Carrizozo VoAg Teacher Not Rehired

Despite an emotion plea from a student to keep VoAg teacher Tonny Hamby, Carrizozo Board of Education at its regular meeting April 21, did not renew Hamby's contract for the 1998-99 school year.

About 20 people attended the meeting, only to be told by board president Steve Harkey that "every item before the board is never taken lightly, and is always well thought out. In the best interest of all kids in Carrizozo schools," Harkey said. "We are unable to respond to all personnel items under law."

Senior student Jordan Dixon said, "I believe in Mr. Hamby. The Ag department has turned around because Mr. Hamby remedied it. He built a curriculum...and his classes were well taught. The judging teams have taken enormous strides with Carrizozo schools well represented."

Dixon apologized for a letter from the ag students in support of Hamby. "The way I went about it was undiplomatic and unprofessional," Dixon said. "I hope you look on Mr. Hamby for the good he's done, not the mistakes he's made."

Harkey said he appreciated what Dixon had said and his concerns were "well taken."

A parent then said that there were concerns that the ag teacher teach everyone, not just a select few who have home support and an agriculture background. The parent said that many students will not go to college or vocational school and need to be taught some skills in the high school vocational class, including carpentry, welding and electrical. "It is important that the program reaches everyone," the parent said.

Also at the meeting, the board approved Amanda "Mandy" Baca as the Class of 1998 valedictorian and Jordan Dixon as salutatorian. Ben Baum, senior center for the UNM men's basketball team, was approved as graduation speaker. Principal Robert Chavez made the arrangements for Baum.

The board approved a resolution authorizing the sale of \$300,000 bonds on May 1. Earlier on April 21, bids were opened for the bond with the best coming from Kias and Company of Albuquerque at a 5.07 percent interest rate. All bond funds must be spent within three years.

Among the first projects to be done with the bond money is a library remodel and construction of a vestibule at the cafeteria. Plans for the library are to replace the ceiling, install three rows of new

florescent lighting with dimmer switches, replace the panel heaters, repaint, and new carpet. The vestibule "air lock" will have Lexan windows with institutional wire glass, a new floor and lighting fixtures. Jim Rowland, from Project Management Consultants, showed plans for the projects and said the intent is to begin construction by May 15 and be done by fall. School ends May 29.

The 1998-99 school calendar was approved. School begins for students on August 13 with half day classes for August 13 and 14. Holidays include Labor Day Sept. 7, (SEE PAGE 4)

ees," county commissioner Monroy Montes said. "We cannot expend a penny from capital outlay or facilities fund."

Commission chairman Ray Nunley said he had no problem agreeing on cutting the budget. But he had a problem with no new employees for the sheriff's office because that office needs another deputy in order to cut overtime and part time which Nunley considered "a waste of money."

"We can look at the deputy position at mid-year after we see where the revenues are," Nunley said.

Commissioner Wilton Howell thought Montes was "exactly right" in his recommendations.

Commissioners began a process of looking at each department to find overtime and other areas to cut. When they came to the proposed Law Enforcement budget, Howell said to cut the additional deputy position, (which commissioners had previously said they would fund), and cut back the sheriff's office overtime to \$30,000 the same as this fiscal year. They held to their promise to make the animal control officer a full time position however.

The biggest discussion about the sheriff's office concerned two part time transport officers, who usually work more than 20 hours a week. Suggestions were to make one a 20-hour part time employee who would not receive benefits and the other employee would be a part time employee who would be able to receive benefits. Commissioner Rex Wilson suggested making one full time but not working the person a full 40 hours a week. Howell finally said they needed an opinion from an attorney about the transport officers positions.

Unable to solve the transport officer dilemma, commissioners turned to cutting other places in the sheriff's budget. Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan had already cut several areas from his original request hoping to keep the additional deputy. But overall commissioners cut about \$84,000 from the sheriff's original request for his department.

"We're going to cannibalize his whole operation!" commissioner Bill Schwettmann cried.

"We're not taking anything away," Howell responded.

Sullivan, who was not present in the room when commissioners were discussing cutting his department request, had returned to the meeting and asked if they were cutting his additional deputy position. Nunley said he was committed to another deputy and he wanted to re-address the position at the mid-year budget review.

"But we have to make up a \$600,000 shortfall," said Montes.

"Now you've cut my three vehicles!" Sullivan said.

In all, commissioners deleted the purchase of five vehicles, two of which were for the assessor's office. "I've already cut back my budget request," Sullivan said.

Nunley said he would be willing to look at cars as they "work our way through the budget on May 12." Commissioners may approve the pre-vehicle fuel and the telephone fund, because the planning office is under the manager's office. They reduced the \$2,000 for vehicle fuel to \$500.

Commissioners also questioned the emergency coordinator's position which is partly funded with grant money and wondered if they could combine it with the 911 grant program.

When they got to the seniors program, they refused to

allow the half time manager at Capitan Center be moved to a full time position. Instead they wanted to hold the position to 20 hours. Currently the county pays benefits for that part time manager.

"That's not fair!" Schwettmann cried. "Capitan is one of the most viable centers in the program." (Capitan is the only senior center in the county without a full time employee.)

Nunley said they "would fight that battle another day and we'll get it taken care of."

Commissioners even cut their favorite project--the Glencoe Rural Events Center (GREC). They did not approve an additional part time employee as requested by the center manager, they deleted \$4,500 requested by the GREC manager for professional services, and the \$14,000 new fund for advertising and publicity established last week was reduced to \$10,000. However they left \$1,000 in printing and publishing, giving the center a total of \$5,000 more than last year for publishing and advertising. Overall, the Glencoe Rural Events Center budget is about \$78,000 for the next year.

Commissioners reviewed the liminary budget at their May 12 meeting.

When commissioners came to the clerk's office budget, again they said no part time employee could work more than 20 hours. Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor had budgeted \$18,000 for a part time clerk in her office, an increase from last year. Instead, commissioners cut the position to \$8,800.

"How will that affect the operation of her office?" commissioner Bill Schwettmann asked.

Department by department commissioners reviewed and cut out overtime and considered how they could cut costs in such areas as data processing. They cut the overtime for the county planning department questioning how many night meetings the county planning officer had to attend. They questioned the \$2,500 budgeted for the Public Lands Use Advisory Council. They also questioned the \$14,000

left from the road sign project. "We have poles, but no signs," Howell said. "We need signs."

Earlier in the day planning officer Patsy Sanchez discussed a \$214,000 grant from the state \$911 to implement the E-911 emergency system. Sanchez said she had applied for the grant, as authorized by the county commission by resolution in January, and had planned to use the \$12,000 from the rural addressing money as the county's match toward the grant. But commissioners questioned how that \$12,000 which they believed to be committed to buying new signs could be used for the match. Commissioners also questioned the \$2,000 for contractual agreements and agreed to put the Humane Society agreement with the Extension Service, Lincoln County Fair Association, Mental Health Services, and Little Rascals Club (after school program in Ruidoso which is federally funded by Region IX Cooperative Education Cen-

ter). Humane Society requested \$22,000 for the next year based on the number of animals housed at the society facility.

Commissioners made no cuts in the road department or departments that requested the same budget amounts as last year, such as the treasurer's and assessor's offices.

When they came to the special programs (bookmobile, Coalition of Counties dues, 4-H summer program, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Capitan Head Start, \$31,000 to Ruidoso Public Library and \$2,000 to the Claunch RC&D, White Mountain Search and Rescue, and dues to New Mexico Association of Counties, South Central Mountain RC&D, Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD), Zia Therapy, totalling nearly \$78,000) commissioners ended their discussions, and decided to hold another hearing on the proposed preliminary budget. The hearing is set for 9 a.m. Friday, May 8.

their lots. The form is mailed by certified mail.

Silva asked that if the town tears the buildings down can they bill the owners. Hernandez says that the town can do that.

Morales said there were citizens who have come to her expressing concern about the old buildings.

Hernandez says this is being done not to make people angry, but the town has an ordinance and the trustees and the mayor were elected by the community to do the best for the community. Hernandez said he stated when he was running for office that he was going to try and clean up the community.

The intersection at Highway 54 and Highway 380 was brought up for discussion by Hernandez. He told the trustees that they definitely are going to have to promote getting a traffic light at that intersection. There have been too many accidents there. He said that since the overpass has been extended there is plenty of time to notice a traffic light and stop.

Vega said he has contacted the Department of Public Safety, Traffic Safety, in Santa Fe. They are going to schedule a time to come and do some studies with Vega at the intersection. Vega is going to a meeting in Las Cruces and he has put this intersection on the agenda to be discussed. He said due to the design of the intersection he does not know if a regular traffic signal (red, yellow, green) can be used, but said they could probably get yellow caution lights for traffic.

Public hearings were held on the issuance of new licenses to Barb's East Coast Subs Plus and 4 Winds Restaurant & Motel Inc. There were no comments on either of the applications so the issuance of license to Barb's East Coast Subs Plus and the issuance of license to 4 Winds Restaurant & Motel Inc. were approved.

Louise Brooks told the trustees, during the Carrizozo Recreation Center report, that she received the cost of the monthly service for the dedicated telephone line to the recreation center for the Grant Center would be \$40.47. The town has been asked to pay this service fee for the Grant Center until they can afford to pay it themselves. The Carrizozo Action Team is paying the installation charge for the line. This was for the information as nothing could be passed on this as it was not on the agenda. Lovelace asked that the trustees wait to act on this until after the budget hearings next week so it can be included in the budget if they decide to pay the fee.

The resolution for the Lincoln County Detention Center was approved. The resolution states that the governing body of Carrizozo realizes that the Lincoln County Detention Center is a vital division that impacts the economy within Carrizozo, strongly supports the detention center remaining in Carrizozo, and encourages the Lincoln County Commissioners to retain the detention center in the Town of Carrizozo. It also states that the governing body of the Town of Carrizozo will continue to further their attempt to undertake the steps to support that the detention center remain in Carrizozo.

The Veteran's Plaquemine for the week of May 22 - 30 was approved. This year marks the 53rd year since the end of World War II and the loss of 50 million lives. A combined Merchant Marines and Military Memorial service will be held Saturday, May 23, at 10:30 a.m. at the Fort Stanton Memorial Cemetery. Swimming pool personnel

were hired. Applicants for the positions were interviewed by Lovelace, Morales, and Vega. Wini Wilmore will be the cashier/maintenance and the two lifeguards will be Rodney Zamora and Amber Vallejos.

Increasing the wages for the cashier/maintenance employee at the swimming pool was discussed. The current wage is \$5.15. A motion was made to increase this to \$5.75. It was approved with a vote of 3-1. Morales voted against the motion. It was also discussed approving an increase in the wages of the lifeguards. Their wage now is \$5.50. This will be put on the agenda of the next meeting.

Forest Hansell told the trustees that on Sunday, May 17, the United Way will be holding a golf tournament at the Carrizozo Golf Course. Last spring the United Way had a tournament at the golf course and Hansell said it was very well received. She said that all the money raised at the last tournament came back to Carrizozo for the Salvation Army Fund. This time the target is a scholarship fund for the Girl Scouts and then, depending on how much received, the rest will be set aside as seed fund for Girl Scouts in Carrizozo and Cor-

ona according to Hansell.

Hansell asked the trustees to consider waiving the fees for this United Way golf tournament like was done last year. The regular fees are \$5,

\$7, and \$8. Trustees passed a motion to drop the fee to \$2.50 for the United Way golf tournament this year.

People or Horses?

Once again we have to wonder about the intentions of "some" of the Lincoln County Commissioners. Are they more interested in people or horses? Do they care about the safety of county residents or not? Is a human life as important as a pile of horse manure? We might know by May 12 when the final budget may be approved. If you have concerns about where commissioners are planning to spend taxpayers money you might want to attend the next proposed preliminary budget hearing Friday, May 8 at 9 a.m. in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. There will probably be more cuts made in important areas such as law enforcement and probably more money will be given to the Sales Barn for horse catering.

Don't be surprised at "some" of the commissioner's shepherds when it comes to the Sales Barn. Last year the county budget didn't have any money budgeted for temporary salaries at the Sales Barn but the preliminary budget has \$4,550 budgeted for the next year for temporary salaries. The preliminary budget for the Sales Barn also has a \$500 increase in office supplies, an increase of \$2,058 for electric budgeted to be \$15,000 for the year, and an increase of \$2,442 for mileage and per diem. Dues/conference/registration is to be \$2,000 which is \$500 more than last year. Janitorial supplies are budgeted to be \$2,500, an increase of \$1,084. Aren't you glad more of your tax money is being budgeted for horses instead of people?

Total revenues at the Sales Barn are estimated to be \$40,000 for the next fiscal year. Expenditures of \$86,980 means taxpayers are subsidizing the Sales Barn this year \$46,980 if commissioners approve the preliminary budget as presented Tuesday. There is one savings in the Sales Barn budget. Professional services decreased from \$4,575 to \$4,500. That \$75 saved could be used for many things that would benefit Lincoln County residents. We will have to wait until the next preliminary budget hearing and the final budget hearing May 12 before we will know where that \$75 will be spent.

That \$75 could be used for the safety of the residents of Lincoln County but it is far less than the \$84,000 commissioners plan to cut from Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan's original requests for his department. Maybe you believe that \$86,980 should be spent for a glorified horse facility instead of spending an additional \$84,000 for the safety of Lincoln County residents but we don't!

The purchase of three new vehicles for the sheriff's office and two new vehicles for the assessor's office might help make up the county's \$600,000 shortfall but it seems "some" commissioners need to look at why there is a shortfall. Last year the beginning cash balance for the county was \$1,520,032. The beginning cash balance this year is estimated to be \$820,733. Does that mean "some" commissioners spent \$699,299 more than was budgeted?

If "some" commissioners would admit it, they would know they were responsible for spending money during the year that was not in the budget last year. If "some" commissioners would admit it, their spending was not for the good of the entire county but certain voting districts did benefit. If "some" commissioners would admit it, they were irresponsible with Lincoln County taxpayers' money.

Lincoln County residents should be assured their safety is more important than a horse show but it appears "some" of our county commissioners don't agree. Cutting the sheriff's budget may help the shortfall but that won't help when you have an emergency and the sheriff's office can't respond because commissioners cut their budget. Shoveling horse manure is more important than people.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE: The Legislature was scheduled to go into special session yesterday — barring any last-minute blowups.

The pageantry of regular session openings is eliminated for special sessions and everyone gets down to business, although this session is shaping up to be a bit different. Gov. Gary Johnson and legislative leaders may get back to fighting instead of getting down to business.

Johnson called the session "to fix numerous but easily

identifiable problems." On this, legislative leaders agree. It's just that they've identified different problems. The governor wants items the Legislature didn't pass during the regular session. Democrat legislators want items the governor vetoed.

The differences could be worked out with a little give and take. Since Gov. Johnson doesn't like to give, the result may be that lawmakers won't pass much of what he wants and he will veto much of what the Legislature wants.

A meeting between the governor and Democrat legislative leaders to discuss the agenda for a special session went poorly. Sen. Manny Aragon wanted the meeting opened to the media, arguing it was the only way to ensure all parties keep their word. Johnson refused, saying meetings are conducted differently with reporters present. "I mean, you can't cuss," Johnson said.

Legislative leaders want to override some vetoes from last session. It is unclear whether the law allows overrides at any time other than during a regular 30-day session. The question is sure to end up in court should there be a successful override. So far Republican legislators always have closed ranks to prevent overrides of their governor's vetoes, even if it is an attempt to override a bill sponsored by a Republican legislator. If that happens again, there will be no need for a court test.

Sen. Aragon has made an interesting proposal that Indian gambling be repealed since Gov. Johnson is not willing to count revenues from the 16 percent state revenue sharing, because tribes are making their payments under protest or not paying them at all. Unlike a veto override, Aragon might be able to pick up Republican votes on a gambling repeal even though Gov. Johnson supports gambling. Many Republicans who oppose gambling likely feel

more strongly about that than about party loyalty. In addition there are both Republicans and Democrats who voted for Indian gaming only because of the heavy state take.

The problem with a gambling repeal is that compacts already have been signed. A repeal probably wouldn't invalidate them. It would just make a murky situation even worse. When Interior Secretary Bruce Babbitt chose not to act on approval of the compacts, they went into effect subject to provisions of the federal Indian Gaming Regulatory Act, which may not allow the state to take as much as 16 percent of slot machine revenues. That may have to be litigated too.

Meanwhile Isleta Pueblo has asked Gov. Johnson to negotiate, as provided by the compacts, on lowering the 16 percent. Johnson answered that he couldn't because the Legislature had to be involved. A bill to establish negotiation procedures died during the 1998 Legislature. Passing that in the special session might solve some problems.

Another solution could be to use some of the 16 percent state revenues for projects on Indian land which the tribes say they can't afford because of the high revenue-sharing payments. There are ways to work things out, if only the governor and legislators will talk. If the Indian casino payments question can be settled, the budget questions will start to fall into place since they hinge on whether to use the revenue-sharing payments to finance state government.

There also is an arbitration clause in the compacts, which the Mescalero Apaches have invoked. That is another solution. An outside arbitrator can decide what the tribes will pay. That's not as good as our own folks working things out themselves, but at least an arbitrator will make a decision.

EDITOR: There is some question about how many people mined for gold in White Oaks. One source states that 5,000 people once mined for gold there, another source places the figure at 2,500. In the new book, "Ghosttown of White Oaks", by Bill Rakocy, the population varies between 2,000 and 3,000.

One wonders where they come up with these wild-eyed figures. One thing is clear. All of these figures can't be right but they can be and are wrong.

In the interests of historical accuracy and to counter the incredible amount of misinformation out there, let me give you the facts.

White Oaks reached a peak population of 1,500 around 1896 and experienced a decline thereafter (until recently). How do I know? My family came to White Oaks in the 1880's and many of the men in my family, including my father, grandfather and several uncles and cousins were involved in mining there over long periods of time extending from 1886 to 1951.

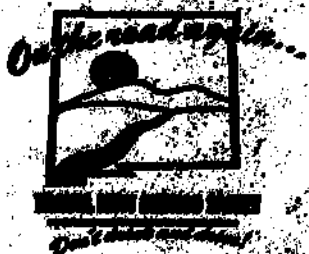
How many of you are aware that we have a census every 10 years in this country and have since 1790? It is required by the Constitution of the United States to appoint representation in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Almost a half century ago, while still a boy, I obtained the population figures for White Oaks and other towns in Lincoln County from 1900-1950, as recorded by the U.S. Census Bureau. In 1900, a few years after reaching its peak, White Oaks had a population of 804. I do not have the figures for 1890, but according to the White Oaks Eagle, there were 900 people in the town proper and 300 in the environs for a total of 1,200.

My grand-aunt and uncle, Nettie and Ray Lemon, who, during their long lives, lived both in White Oaks and Carrizozo when those towns were in their prime, told me unequivocally that White Oaks was never any larger than Carrizozo, which reached its peak in 1900, with a population of 1,548.

In the future, I suggest that those people who write on matters of history regarding White Oaks, do their homework, or contact someone who has.

Approval to accept police department scholarship funds into agency trust capacity was given by the trustees. All donations for any town agency go into this special fund. The police department scholarship funds of \$1,200 will be distributed at graduation in two scholarships of \$550 each. The police department will develop a committee to review the applications and select the two who will receive the scholarships.

The agreement between the Town of Carrizozo and Land Group, from Las Cruces, for engineer services for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) project was approved.

Several items were discussed during the trustee reports. Morales said that several citizens had complained to her about the smoke in the city hall. Morales asked if there was any way to designate an area for smoking in the building. Hernandez said he has designated his area as a smoking area for the employees. He was asked if the windows in his office open and he said they did not and he could smell the smoke in his office. Some of the suggestions during the discussion were: during summer maybe opening the doors and windows, installing a circulating fan, thank you for not smoking sign or no smoking except in designated areas, exhaust fans, and fans that can blow in or out (sucking the smoke smell out). Forest Hansell has offered to lend city hall a fan to try and see if that would help. No decision was made.

Hernandez told the trustees he has been negotiating with the Village of Capitan and the mayor pro tem on a pickup truck and blade (which Capitan just repaired for \$10,000, which replaced the undercarriage). Capitan is buying a larger blade. Hernandez said that if

Carrizozo has \$8,000 in the maintenance budget before the end of the fiscal year he thinks a deal of some type can be made between Carrizozo and Capitan on these items. Lovelace asked what was wrong with our blade. Hernandez said the turntable on Carrizozo's blade is worn out. This affects the tilting and downward movement of the blade. Hernandez said it would take \$10,000 or more to get Carrizozo's blade back to working condition the way it should be. He said that is one of the reasons some of the streets in town are not up to par is because of the tilting of the turntable on the blade. Hernandez bought it up to the trustees so that they would be aware that Carrizozo Town Foreman Faustino Gallegos talked to Hernandez about it and he is asking if it is a good idea and should Gallegos go check it out. It was agreed to have Gallegos check it out.

Morales asked what could be done about the vine that is growing around the swimming pool. Last year some of the children using the pool would take the berries off and throw them at other children and get the berries in the pool.

Lovelace said that she thought the vine was used as a protection for the pool. Hansell said she thought possibly as a wind break to keep debris out of the pool.

It was decided to see if it could be kept trimmed all summer so that the berries would not have a chance to grow.

Hernandez told the trustees that he would like to propose an addendum to the town personnel policy for drug screening of new employees. Lovelace asked that this be put on the next meeting agenda.

The next regular meeting of the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees will be Tuesday, May 12, at 6:00 p.m.

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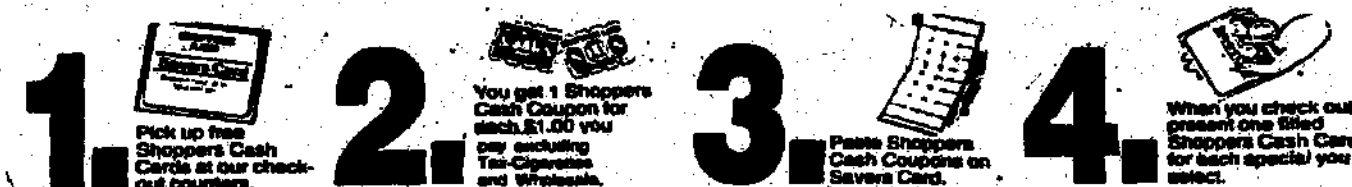

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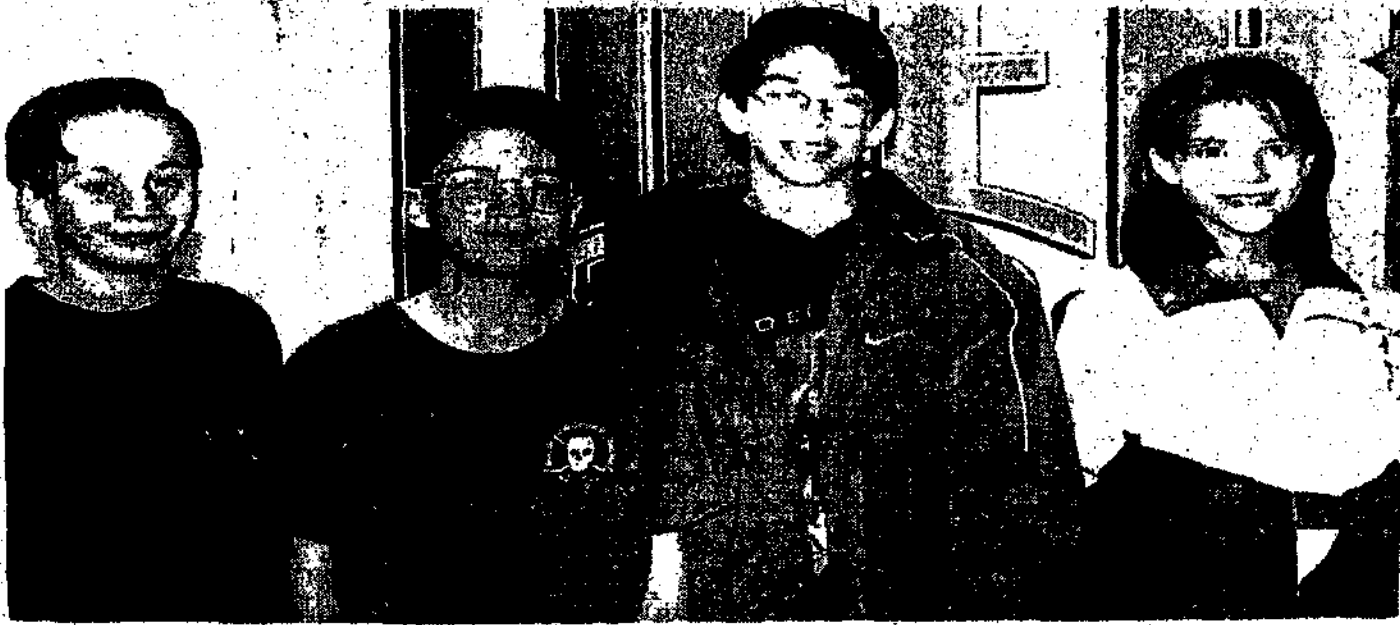
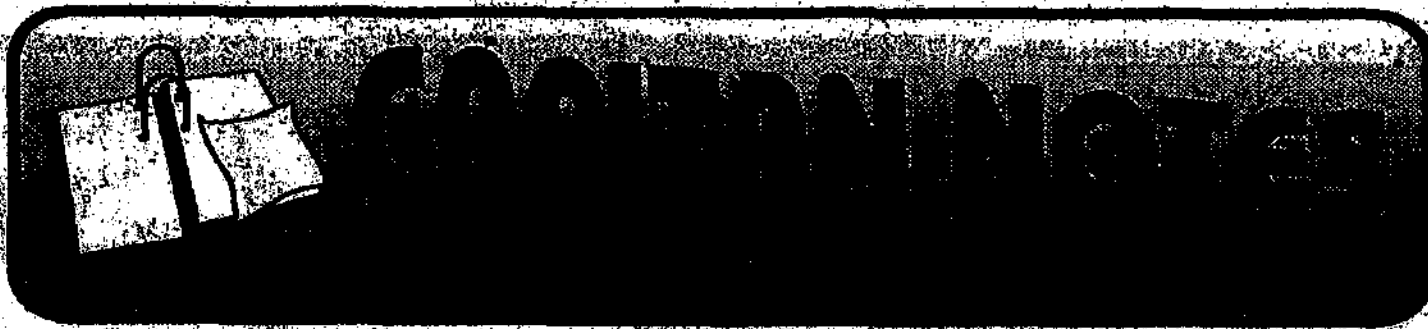

RESOLUTION AND PROCLAMATION OF PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX ELECTION

WHEREAS, the Board of Education of the Corona Municipal School District No. 13 (herein the "Board" and the "District", respectively), in the Counties of Lincoln, Socorro and Torrance and State of New Mexico, has determined that a Special Capital Improvements Tax Election, (herein, the "Election") be held on June 23, 1998, pursuant to Sections 1-22-1 through 1-22-19, NMSA 1978; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 22-25-3, NMSA 1978, the Board has determined, and does hereby determine, that there should be submitted to the electorate at said Election, the question of whether or not a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of property allocated to the District under the Property Tax Code should be imposed for the property tax years of 1998, 1999, and 2000, for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION OF THE CORONA MUNICIPAL SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 13 CONSTITUTING THE GOVERNING BODY OF SAID DISTRICT, IN THE COUNTIES OF LINCOLN, SOCORRO AND TORRANCE AND STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

Section 1. On the 23rd day of June, 1998, there will be held in the Corona Municipal School District No. 13, Lincoln, Socorro and Torrance Counties, New Mexico, a special school district election for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of the District the question of whether or not a property tax should be imposed for the purpose of capital improvements in the District.

Table with 3 columns: Voting District, Election Precinct, Polling Place. District 1 includes precincts 1, 2A, 3 and polling place Corona Senior Center. District 2 includes precincts 8, 11, 12 and polling place Lincoln County Clerk's Office.

In addition, the information regarding Absentee Voter District is described in Section 7 herein.

Section 3. The polls for said Election will be open between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. on the day of the election.

Section 4. At such Election, the following question shall be submitted to such qualified registered electors of the District:

PUBLIC SCHOOL CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS TAX QUESTION

"Shall the Board of Education of the Corona Municipal School District No. 13, Counties of Lincoln, Socorro and Torrance, State of New Mexico, be authorized to impose a property tax of \$2.00 per each \$1,000.00 of net taxable value of the property allocated to such District under the Property Tax Code for the property tax years of 1998, 1999 and 2000 for the purpose of the following capital improvements in the District, i.e. erecting, remodeling, making additions to, providing equipment for and furnishing school buildings, purchasing or improving school grounds and purchasing computer software and hardware for student use in public school classrooms; maintenance of public school buildings and public school grounds exclusive of salary expenses of employees of the District; and purchasing activity vehicles for transporting students to extracurricular school activities?"

Section 5. The tax contemplated by the capital improvements tax question shall be in addition to any tax imposed to pay debt service on the bonds or for any other purpose. Such capital improvements tax shall be authorized pursuant to the Public School Capital Improvements Act, i.e., Sections 22-25-1 through 22-25-10 NMSA 1978 (being Chapter 5, Laws of the New Mexico, 1975, Special Session as amended and supplemented).

Section 6. A person is a qualified elector of the District if he or she is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age on the day of the Election and a resident of the District on the day of the Election. In order to vote, qualified electors of the District must have previously registered with the County Clerks of Lincoln, Socorro and Torrance Counties in accordance with law. Any qualified elector of the District who is not now registered and who wishes to vote at such Election should register during regular office hours prior to 5:00 p.m. on May 25, 1998, being the twenty-eighth day immediately preceding the Election, at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, Lincoln County Courthouse, Carrizozo, New Mexico, at the office of the County Clerk of Socorro County, Socorro County Courthouse, Socorro, New Mexico, at the office of the County Clerk of Torrance County, Torrance County Courthouse, Estancia, New Mexico, or at the office of any deputy registration officer appointed by the County Clerks of Lincoln, Socorro and Torrance Counties (which may include the municipal clerks of all municipalities in Lincoln, Socorro and Torrance Counties) or a motor vehicle deputy registration officer as provided in Section 1-4-47 NMSA 1978.

Section 7. Absentee voting will be permitted in the manner, authorized by 1-6-1 et seq., NMSA 1978 and 1-6A-1 et seq., NMSA; provided, however, that pursuant to Section 1-22-19, NMSA 1978, qualified electors may also vote absentee in person at the office of the County Clerk of Lincoln County, during the regular hours and days of business from 8:00 a.m., May 28, 1998, being the twenty-fifth day preceding the Election, until 5:00 p.m., June 19, 1998, being the Friday immediately prior to the Election.

Section 8. Voting, including absentee voting, shall be by paper ballot.
