

County Continues Contract With CSI

Despite Inmate Complaints

Lincoln County Commissioners approved a contract with Corrections Systems, Inc. (CSI) for operation of the county jail for another six months at a cost of \$6,500 a month.

But approval of the contract was not unanimous as county commissioners Wilton Howell and Monroy Montes questioned why the county should accept CSI since the company was going to cost more than the other bidding company, and because of complaints raised by the wife of an inmate in the county jail.

During a special meeting Tuesday at Ruidoso Village Hall, county commission chairman Ray Nunley said it would cost more than \$500 a month to change management

for six months. Also the company agreed to be a consultant on the new jail. Nunley said Rampar was not sincere in its offer to be consultant on the new jail since it might also bid on the design and construction.

Montes agreed CSI was justified in its higher rate because of the consulting which can dovetail with Rampar Corporation. "So we get more service than just jail administration."

But before commissioners voted to accept the contract

with CSI they heard from Hollyce Johnson, whose husband Ivan Johnson has been in jail since February because of a probation violation. Johnson said she had charges against the detention center and its CSI administrator, based on her husband's experiences in the jail. "I worry for my husband's health," Johnson said.

Johnson provided commissioners with copies of her multi-page written complaints and wanted to read them all. But Nunley referred to county

attorney Alan Morel. Morel said he had received copies of the complaints the week before which then provided to CSI. He said he was receiving answers to the complaints. Also Morel said Johnson had retained an attorney so the situation was threatened litigation and he was not comfortable discussing the situation in public.

But Montes wanted Johnson to address her concerns, so the commission would be aware. "I want an overview without slanderous or libelous

attacks to Mike Borrego (CSI employed jail administrator) and the detention center," Montes said.

Johnson said she had six documented incidents of medical neglect and practicing medicine without a license by staff; the jail is infested with cockroaches and bed bugs; there is little or no supervision of Borrego, staff or inmates which was evident with the discovery and confiscation of a hand made knife. She

Capitan Village \$1.2 Million Budget Includes More Staff

Capitan Village has budgeted for three additional employees to be hired in the new fiscal year which begins July 1.

Two of the three full time employees will be hired for the village street department. The other employee will be an additional office clerk who will help with the Motor Vehicle Department which will be open five days a week. The additional employees bring the number to 11 employed by the village in the upcoming fiscal year.

Salaries and benefits for the new employees are included in the 1998-99 preliminary budget that trustees approved on May 27. The New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) notified village clerk Deborah Cummins of the acceptance of the preliminary budget last week. The preliminary budget estimates the village to have \$1.2 million in revenues from all departments (including grants and street co-ops), and \$1.3 million in expenditures.

Revenues from the 1.5 percent gross receipt taxes collected for the village, from cigarette and gasoline taxes are up this year, Cummins told THE NEWS. With such the budget shows estimated revenues of \$365,025 and expenditures of \$461,629 and ending cash balance of \$5,921. However, after the preliminary budget was approved and sent to Santa Fe, trustees approved a \$40,000 transfer from the water department into the general fund to raise the ending cash balance for the general fund to \$45,921, Cummins said.

Estimated General Fund Revenues in the budget include \$10,255 from property taxes, \$12,844 from franchise taxes and \$85,938 from the 1.225 percent gross receipt taxes for a total of \$109,037 from taxes. Revenues from licenses include \$644 from dog licenses and pound fees and \$2,525 from the \$25 a year business licenses.

State shared tax revenues include \$30,990 from gasoline tax, \$1,706 from auto licenses 40 percent distribution, \$228 from auto license 60 percent distribution, \$2,421 from the two cent cigarette taxes, \$88,943 in the state share of

the 1.225 percent gross receipt taxes, and \$10,544 from the one cent gasoline tax for a total of \$134,832 from state shared taxes.

Other revenue includes charges for services of \$1,200 for sales of maps and publication, \$768 in printing and copying, \$7,281 in motor vehicle administration fees; \$16,000 in court fines, \$250 in crime lab fees and \$2,500 in traffic safety fees; \$3,818 from interest on investments, \$270 in rents and royalties, \$10,000 from sale of fixed assets and \$45,000 from Smokey Bear museum sales; grants of \$50,000 from the annual Small Cities Assistance, \$900 from Department of Tourism for cooperative advertising for Friends of Smokey and the village for a grand total of general fund revenues of \$365,025.

General Fund expenditures include: \$15,750 for the executive/legislative (mayor and trustees)--\$10,800 for salaries and benefits, \$4,700 for operating expenses and \$250 for equipment/furniture; \$7,205 for the judge--\$5,500 for salary and benefits, \$1,600 for operating expenses, \$105 for

Problems At LCSWA Discussed At Meetings

The future of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority got a little cloudier Tuesday.

During a special meeting held in Ruidoso Village Hall, Lincoln County Commissioners discussed the problems with county trash collection by Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA). They were concerned about the service for county residents from LCSWA once Ruidoso assumes it own collections in September. Commissioners discussed the potential for privatizing the

county trash collection and charging a franchise fee on the rate.

County commissioner Monroy Montes, who serves on the LCSWA board, asked his fellow commissioners for direction on the LCSWA situation once Ruidoso is out of the collections. With Ruidoso's move, Montes said the LCSWA staff will go down to 12 from its current 21. He was concerned if the 12 employee operation could take care of the trash from the county, and the other LCSWA member municipalities. "I'd like direction for the meeting,

and for our future in the authority," Montes said.

Nunley said in his opinion a private contractor could do a better job of trash collection than LCSWA and he wanted the commission to consider privatizing LCSWA.

Montes said the county could consider putting the county's trash collection operation under the county road department and county manager's office.

County commissioner Wilton Howell, who served as chairman for LCSWA, said the county needs a plan for when Ruidoso pulls out of

LCSWA. "We need an rfp (request for proposals), to see what's out there."

County commissioner Bill Schwettmann said that the commission should not give the impression that the county will pull out of LCSWA. "We should wait and see where we are when Ruidoso pulls out. The other entities are still looking to us for leadership. I don't think it's right to pull out," Schwettmann continued. "We should stay in (LCSWA) and make it work

When we said the county was paying \$60,000 we were asked if the restrooms would include a sauna and hot tub for the riders to use to help relieve their sore muscles. We were also asked if the restrooms would have a jacuzzi and an automatic butt wiper. One person insisted for \$60,000 there should be some luxuries other than the normal gold plated crappers.

Actually the \$60,000 will be well spent. The restrooms will be in compliance with ADA and there shouldn't be a need for anyone to be stationed in the restrooms with a plunger for overflows. There shouldn't be any flooding when the commodes are flushed. There shouldn't be a need to ever have to rent portable toilets because the new restrooms at the Sales Barn should be elaborate if not fancy.

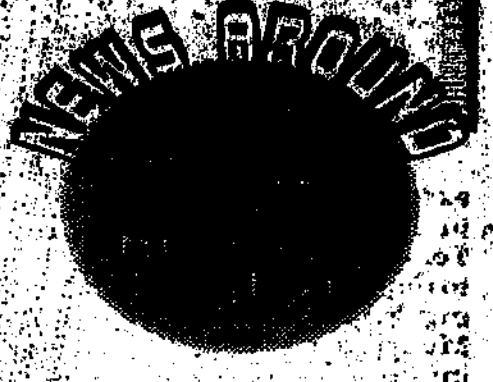
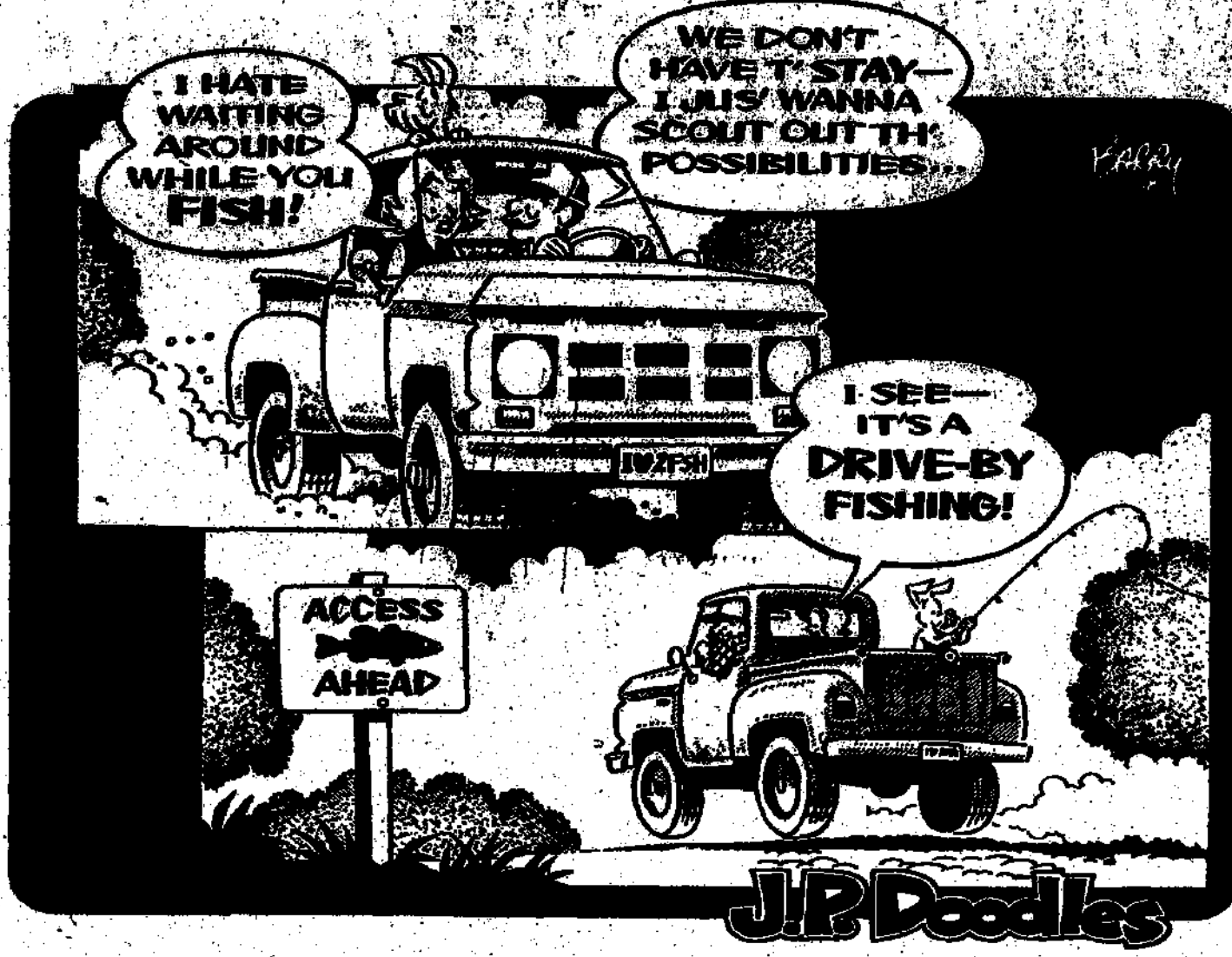
No mention was made as to whether the toilet tissue that will be in the restrooms at the Sales Barn will be color coordinated or will be generic white. The toilet tissue could be embossed colors on white but there has been no official announcement. The county may have to make a budget adjustment later in the year to have enough money to buy the correct colors, but we will have to wait.

Years ago people were content to use pages torn out of a catalog when using the old outhouse but now we need color coordination. Years ago people were content to have a one-holer but now we need several commodes. Years ago people were content with an outhouse that had a wood door with a moon cut in it as a design, which was also for air circulation, but now we need automatic air fresheners. Years ago people were content to have the outhouse within easy walking distance from the house, close enough but not too close, but now we need restrooms inside. Years ago people were content with a wooden floor, but now we need inlaid tile.

It is nice that \$60,000 is being spent for restrooms at a facility that is supposedly scheduled to be used 15 or 16 times this year.

The Lincoln County Fairgrounds has more than 50 events scheduled for this summer with more events scheduled throughout the year. We are glad the county commissioners agreed to spend \$2,400 for the plumbing repairs to the fairgrounds restrooms because thousands of people will be at the fairgrounds during the Smokey Bear Stampede in two weeks. We hope the restroom repairs at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds are completed by then. We aren't even asking for an automatic butt wiper to be installed.

SANTA FE: We've found some painless taxes. How about we start using them so we can discard some of the painful taxes.

During lottery mania a few weeks ago, New Mexicans rushed out and bought an extra million dollars of tickets twice a week until someone in the Midwest finally hit the Powerball jackpot for over \$100 million.

I've never been big on any state-sponsored gambling, but \$2 million extra a week ain't bad. Pretty soon that adds up to real money. And I guess it didn't hurt anyone too much. It's just a dollar a ticket. I realize some people bought multiple tickets, including the winners, but when the odds are 80 million-to-1, I don't figure having 400 of the possible combinations gives you much better odds than having just one.

I'll admit to buying a ticket myself. The daydreams were worth it. It was fun to think about how my life would change if I hit the big one. Some people say that winning big won't change their lives. It will change mine. I'll start complaining about inheritance taxes, which haven't lost me a bit of sleep up to now. I'll probably complain about the liberal media too. But I'll also have a whole lot of fun. I have fun already, so I know how to do that sort of thing. And practice makes perfect.

I had all sorts of clever things I was going to say at the news conference when I accepted my winnings. But now I understand it's not good to get that public about it. Those who have gone through the experience say to put your winning ticket in a safe deposit box and then contact your lawyer, accountant and financial advisor. And hire someone to take all the calls about donations and can't-lose investments.

Anyway I didn't hear a soul complaining about having to buy lottery tickets. Someone interviewed in the newspaper happily called it voluntary taxation. We need all the happy taxpayers we can get.

Then there's the whopping tobacco tax increase they're looking at in Washington — over a dollar a pack. I'm tired of hearing people on tele-

vision say if Congress thinks it can stop kids from smoking by raising the cost of cigarettes by an exorbitant amount, they're all a bunch of idiots.

Hey, that's great news to me. Here's another group of folks that don't mind paying taxes to get what they want — or crave, or worse. We know kids willingly pay huge amounts for their clothes, shoes and music. That money only goes to make fabulously wealthy athletic and entertainment stars even richer.

Why don't we put the money into cigarette taxes so I can pay less income tax next year? Maybe they don't mind their tax, but I sure complain about mine.

Here's another idea. New Mexico cut the sales tax on medicine this year for humanitarian reasons. If we're going to use our tax system for social purposes, let's take it another step and put a huge sales tax on Michael Jordan sneakers and all those brand-name things they buy.

We know how much disposable personal income there is floating around on our economy. Middle-Eastern oil exporting countries figured that out 25 years ago and tripled the cost of their product. Did that stop us. Heck no, we waited in line all day to buy just as much as they'd sell us.

Putting a tax on gasoline is more tricky. Most countries in the world have levied huge taxes on their gasoline, but we get fighting mad if we know a six-cent increase in the cost of gas is due to taxes. If it goes anywhere else, we just shrug our shoulders and pay it.

The difference may be that nearly all Americans are addicted to the convenience and freedom of being able to drive anywhere we want at any time. Since smokers and lottery players are smaller groups, we can discriminate against them.

It's too bad we can't grab that extra amount Americans are willing to spend on gas. Maybe we could hide it through an import tax on foreign oil.

Until then we'll have to satisfy ourselves with gambling, tobacco and other sin taxes.

positions. Again Howell said he would like to see all grant positions advertised and filled each year.

Nunley then called a special meeting for 5:30 p.m. Monday, June 29, in their chambers in the Lincoln County Court-house in Carrizozo to hire the DWI program staff.

Before the DWI program discussion, Dr. Blanka again presented his proposal for an intervention program. He said there are no licensed substance abuse programs in the county and an intervention program would provide an option to warehousing people with substance abuse problems.

Howell said there is no money now for any new programs, but the commission could possibly consider it later if revenues are higher than projected by the county treasurer who usually underestimates the revenues for the preliminary budget.

DWI coordinator Charlie White said money will be available after July 1 if the county amends its current DWI program allocation to include a substance abuse intervention program. And in October money will be available for domestic violence programs through the Safe Communities program.

Some commissioners were concerned a small grant would not cover the needed costs for an intervention program.

Dr. Birgit LaMothe, a counselor, said the Family Crisis Center would like to see an entity to deal with offenders, with no building required, just a "stop gap deal."

Dr. Blanka said his group is asking only for start-up costs because they believe the program will be self sufficient within 90 days.

But Montes made the mo-

tion for no action. Howell however wanted to see the commission pursue the program. "This is a serious subject," Howell said. But commissioner Wilson said they could do no more until they had more information about the proposed program. Montes said his problem was focusing on a program that doesn't exist when the DWI program which is in place has problems.

Last month, commissioners discovered the DWI program had run out of money and directed that the DWI coordinator and assistant pay back two months salary. At a later meeting, DWI coordinator Charlie White offered to work for no pay until the new program grant begins on July 1.

One of the results of substance abuse is probation violation. Commissioners questioned Adult Probation Officer Henry Davis about the county's ability to recover costs of keeping parole and probation violators in the county jail from the state. At the last meeting Otero County officials discussed how their county is reimbursed from the state for jailing parole violators. Howell wanted to know why the state only reimburses for parole violators and not probation violators. Davis said his department is budgeted for reimbursement for parole violators and he didn't know why not for probation violators.

Howell said that this could be a legislative issue for the New Mexico Association of Counties. Howell also was concerned about the dispute the county has with the state over an inmate with severe medical problems that the county finally moved to a state run facility. The state claims the county owes

\$75,000 for care of that prisoner.

Howell considered the problem of dealing with probation violators to be an "unfunded mandate" for counties because they broke state laws. But county attorney Alan Morel said state law requires counties to jail all persons who have not been to court, and those whose sentences are less than 365 days. But the laws do not specify who is responsible for the cost of the prisoners especially probation violators.

Montes asked Davis to research the issue and report back in 90 days. Commissioner Bill Schwetmann suggested a resolution be drafted to take to the commissioners' affiliate of the Association of Counties conference going on this week in Ruidoso.

crime lab fees; \$151,299 for financial/administration department—\$83,599 for salaries and benefits for the clerk and two assistants, \$40,200 in office operating expenses, \$2,500 for capital outlay and \$25,500 for tort liability insurance; public safety of \$110,942—\$91,142 for salaries and benefits for three full time officers, \$18,800 for operating expenses, \$1,000 furniture and equipment.

Other General Fund expenditures include: streets department total of \$110,805—\$74,605 for salaries and benefits for three full time employees, \$30,200 for operating expense, \$6,000 for equipment/furniture; \$900 for the Capitan Public Library; \$5,841 for animal control operating expense; \$1,400 for tourism/fair board with \$500 for fair board operating expense and \$900 for promotion (from department of tourism); \$61,799 for Smokey Bear Museum—\$30,799 for salaries and benefits for two full time and one half time employees, \$30,000 for operating expenses and \$1,000 for capital outlay for the museum; \$1,500 for a possible general obligation bond election for a grand total in general fund expenditures of \$467,441.

Special revenues funds include: Local government correction fund with revenues of \$5,576 and expenditures of \$1,423 from that fund; Law Enforcement Protection Fund grant revenues of \$17,300 and \$200 in interest on investments. Of that \$15,843 will be transferred to the General Fund to reimburse money used to pay for a police vehicle that arrived early before the next fiscal year, leaving \$1,857 for operating expenses for FY 1998-99; Fire Protection Fund revenues of \$53,071 with \$51,711 from state fire allotment and \$1,300 from interest on investments and expenditures of \$73,071 with \$12,071 in operating expenses, \$10,000 for insurance, \$1,000 for convention and school, \$10,000 for equipment, \$40,000 for lease purchase of a new pumper truck with possible ladder capabilities in

case the school district constructs a two story building.

Also under the special revenues funds is the Recreation fund with revenues of \$1,210 from cigarette tax of one cent per pack, \$34 from interest from investments for a total of \$1,244. Recreation expenditures are \$500 for the Fair (an additional \$500 for the fair comes from the general fund), and \$1,000 in Capital outlay for the Capitan Public Library.

The Cemetery Fund, which is under the special revenues fund, is budgeted at \$2,080 for the year with \$50 from deeds, \$130 from interest on investments, \$1,600 in lot sales (at \$203 a lot), \$300 in donations. A total of \$2,000 is budgeted as operating expenses.

Come July 1, the village will make its final \$75,000 payment on principal and \$2,907 in interest on the general obligation bond to pay it off.

Capital Improvement Project Fund include the CDBG Master Plan with \$25,000 from the state grant and \$1,500 from the village matching share from the general fund. All \$26,500 are budgeted to be spent on the master plan project.

The CDBG water Well project has revenues of \$268,000 from the grant and \$13,500 as the village match which will be taken from the water fund. The project is budgeted to spend all \$281,500.

Under the Utility Fund, the Water Fund is budgeted for revenues of \$352,700 which include sales or service, connection charges, penalty charges, other fees, sewer sales, interest on investments, water/water rights revenue, water conservation fees and \$33,886 from the lease of water rights and \$108,114 from the sale of real property (Eagle Creek water rights to Ruidoso).

A total of \$16,352 in transfers out of the water fund are budgeted. Expenditures for the water fund are budgeted a total of \$331,703 which includes salaries, operating expenses, \$6,000 for fuel and

power to the well, \$40,000 to purchase water rights, \$15,000 for insurance and \$5,000 for equipment.

Solid Waste fund has budgeted revenues of \$66,116, a transfer out of \$500 to the water fund and \$63,900 expenditure for operating expense for residential solid waste disposal (all goes to Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority which actually does the residential trash collection.)

Debt Service Fund includes a transfer of \$2,777 from water to the 1968 sewer bond and expenditures of \$2,777 for the \$1,915 principal payment and \$862 coupon due this fiscal year; transfer of \$1,075 from the water fund for the Revenue Bond which has expenditures of \$1,075 on interest and principal due this fiscal year.

While the 1986 bond for water will be paid off this year, two smaller bonds for sewer have some time to go. The 1968 sewer bond of \$76,800 has \$18,288 outstanding and a payment of \$1,915 with interest of \$962 due this year. The 1977 sewer bond of \$22,000 has \$10,900 outstanding with \$500 in principal and \$575 in interest also due this fiscal year.

In the Capital Improvements Project Fund, a total of \$20,000 is budgeted as revenue from a state highway co-op grant. However the actual amount will not be known

until August, said clerk Deborah Cummins. A budget adjustment will be approved to handle any discrepancy on the amount of the co-op funds. The village plans to expend all co-op fund obtained.

Smokey Bear Museum donations are estimated at \$500 with the amount applied to operating expense at the museum.

Infrastructure Improvement Project Funds have a grand total of \$14,441 in revenues derived from the 1/8th gross receipt tax of \$7,493, landfill sale payment of \$3,200 and \$612 from interest. Expenditures are \$20,400 for infrastructure with \$14,400 in operating expenses and \$6,000 for equipment.

Water Security Fund had revenues of \$7,958 from deposits and interest, a transfer out of \$500 and expenditures of \$5,000 for operating.

Environmental Gross receipts tax (EGRT) revenues are \$3,741 with all going to operating expense. The amount is transferred to the Lincoln and Otero Regional landfill which was constructed with funds from a bond issued based on the EGRT from all entity members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority.

The village will approve a final 1998-99 budget before July 31 that is based on actual ending cash balances from the current fiscal year which ends July 1.

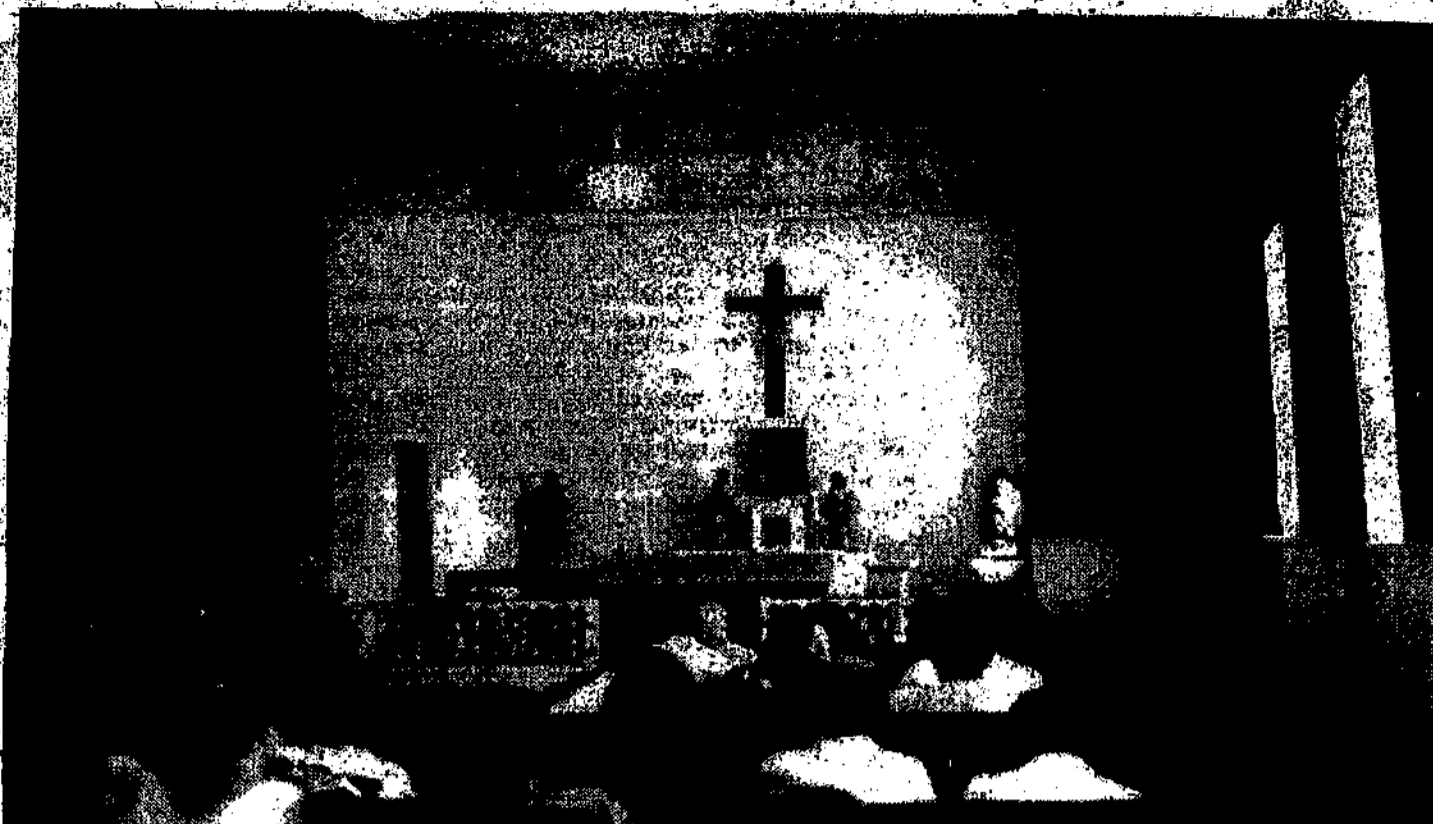

for all. I'm not prepared to say when Ruidoso goes out, we're out."

County resident E. J. Fouratt said that private enterprise was "just as bad" as LCSWA about allowing trash to accumulate around the dumpsters.

Howell said private enterprise was not the answer to cleaning around dumpsters. He suggested a county inmate work release program. "I tried four years ago when I was chairman of LCSWA to get help from the jail," Howell said. But the jail produced several excuses why they could not provide the inmates - no one to drive the van and supervisor work release inmates, no one to segregate the work release inmates when they return to the jail."

County commission chairman Ray Nunley said if the county went with a private enterprise for trash collection, the county could collect a franchise from the company and if the company did not fulfill the county's request to clean around dumpsters, the company could be replaced.

Montes suggested people from Capitan, Carrizozo, Ruidoso Downs and Corona go to the LCSWA board with a plan for what will happen after Ruidoso separates its collection operation. Ruidoso customers made up the largest revenue for LCSWA, but cost LCSWA the most to operate.

The county makes up the second highest revenue source for LCSWA. Ruidoso plans to remain a member of LCSWA, but will not be involved in the collection operations. No written plan about the reorganization of LCSWA after Ruidoso moves out has been presented

during a LCSWA board meeting.

"There is no plan," Montes said about the upcoming change in operations. "It sounds like county government a year ago. We should insist the (LCSWA) manager be more proactive."

Later that day at the LCSWA board meeting in Ruidoso Downs, Montes asked LCSWA manager Jerry Wright for a plan to consolidate the county dumpster sites into 50 locations with larger containers, instead of the 89 sites now. He also said the commission was concerned about how LCSWA will collect the county trash in the future.

"There are too many sites in the county," Montes said. "I think we need more larger containers, and less sites."

"The county commission says you get a plan, or we do our own," Montes continued.

The discussion about the larger containers came about when the LCSWA board talked about use of the large "roll off" containers for community clean-ups and a larger dumpster tried at the Cedar Creek site. All members agreed their communities wanted access to the roll off containers more often than once or twice a year for community clean-ups. Putting the larger container at Cedar Creek resulted in a cleaner area around the dumpsters, Wright said. But the larger container, big enough to accommodate a couch and other large items, also attracted builders needing to dispose of construction waste.

"It's better than picking it out of the arroyos," Montes said. Ruidoso member and mayor Robert Donaldson said, "The bigger issue is capacity, not the type of container."

Montes said the larger containers would be more "user friendly" and would accommodate a four foot long fluorescent bulb without breaking it and "risking going blind." Wright said the fluorescent bulbs are considered hazardous waste.

Another problem with the larger containers is LCSWA has no vehicle designed to dump the container. LCSWA has plans to purchase a new truck which is specifically designed for the 40-yard roll off containers. Now LCSWA has only one roll off truck that carries one container at a time and the truck can make only two trips a day to the Oregrande Regional Landfill. Wright said once the new truck arrives, LCSWA could consider placing a 40-yard container in each municipality once a month. He also said a roll off needs to be put at Hondo and at San Patricio.

"If there is a great need do it until the we relieve the situation," Donaldson said. He also said that the cleanliness and look of the rest of the county affects Ruidoso. Montes said if people know there is a regular schedule for the containers they will learn to use them more. Capitan member Debra Ingle suggested the roll offs be placed during the week, not just on weekends. But Donaldson said some areas, like Cedar Creek that has a lot of weekend visitors, need to be on weekends.

LCSWA chairman and Ruidoso Downs mayor Joe Hayhurst directed Wright to draft a roll off schedule. Then Montes discussed consolidating dumpster sites in the county by using larger containers and he asked for a plan to accomplish this. Wright then added that Corona received a \$10,000 grant to purchase a compactor and its own household containers for the village's 81 households and businesses.

But Donaldson summarized everyone's feelings when he said that there will be problems at Cedar Creek when Ruidoso begins its own collection. People in Cedar Creek think they're part of Ruidoso," Donaldson said. "Cedar Creek is in the county."

LCSWA members also discussed how to deal with illegal dumping, especially a site in Glencoe where a resident is burning yard waste he brought from Ruidoso. "There is no way to enforce the situation in Glencoe," said Montes, "because no one is willing to cite him."

Montes said LCSWA should take a strong stand and inform the sheriff and magistrate judges that something needs to be done about illegal dumping.

 Arrangements were under the direction of LaGrone Funeral Chapel of Ruidoso.

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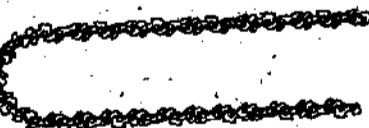
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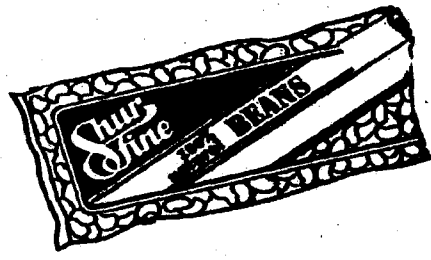


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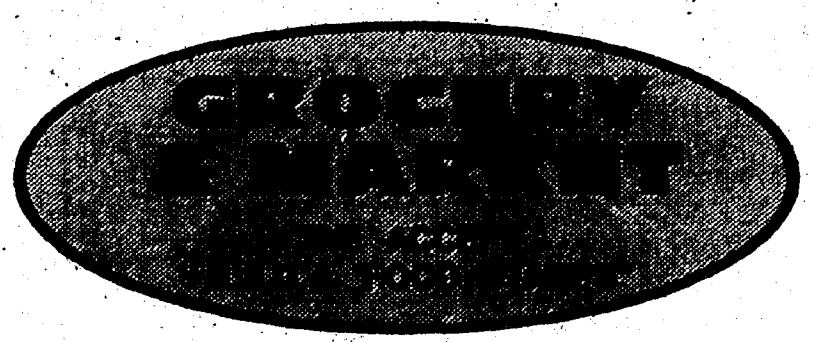
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
