

County To Advertise For Glencoe Center - Again

Lincoln County Commissioners rejected the single proposal to operate and manage the Glencoe Rural Events Center and voted 3-2 to make another request for proposals to lease and/or operate and manage the center.

During a meeting Friday, July 24, called for a public hearing to discuss location for the county jail, commissioners discussed and reconsidered the only proposal offered to run the Glencoe Rural Events

Center (GREC). Museum of the Horse proposed to operate and manage the GREC for \$147,000 in the first year, with a four year contract amounting to more than \$447,000. Commission chairman Ray Nunley and commissioner Monroy Montes met with Museum of the Horse to negotiate the contract. Nunley said that he is convinced Museum of the Horse could do an extremely good job and get the GREC off center and continue GREC

manager Linda Wallace's work. "But personally I am convinced that we may be able to find a better deal," Nunley added.

"There are a lot of demands on county money," Nunley said. "Fortunately we have a better ending balance than thought, but we may need that for the new detention center."

"For that reason, I think we should look a little further," said Nunley and made a motion to go out for re-bid on the

GREC. Commissioner Bill Schwettmann was concerned about the short return time for the proposals.

Nunley said there were a "lot of innuendos" about himself and Montes visiting with the Museum of the Horse representatives. "People are speaking from no knowledge of what happened, and it makes it sound like we sold out Capitan and the county," Nunley said. "I hope the person who passed that around would reconsider."

Capitan resident Dave

Cummins asked if the county would consider issuing a proposal to sell the GREC. "Otherwise we will buy it back twice," Cummins added.

Montes said the county cannot sell the GREC because it received a federal grant.

Capitan resident Lonnie Lippmann agreed with Nunley that the Museum of the Horse would be ideal to run the GREC, "but not at that price." He also asked if the proposal required the county to provide maintenance.

County attorney Alan Morel said the proposal requires the county to pay for any maintenance costing more than \$100,000. Also in response to Lippmann's questions, Nunley said the county carries liability insurance on GREC and all of its properties.

Montes said this year the county budgeted about \$48,000 plus a salary for a year for GREC. In the 1998-99 budget adjusted by the

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Montes Wants For County To Separate From LCSWA

Lincoln County Commissioner Monroy Montes wants the county to separate from the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and turn county trash collection over to the county road department.

After a closed session in the special meeting July 24, commissioners heard a report from Montes about the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA). He had attended the LCSWA meeting the Tuesday before and was concerned there still is no plan for LCSWA after Ruidoso pulls out in September.

"We have no clue what we will do after September 1," Montes said. "I ask the county commission to consider separating from the solid waste authority."

Montes said the county collections alone generate revenues of \$214,000 for residential and \$75,000 for commercial customers in the county. Montes said with three people, operating in the road department, the county could do the collection itself. Montes said the county would need about \$225,000 for equipment and two trucks. He proposed the county to bill once a year like property taxes, payable in two pay-

County Commission Next Jail Hearing In Ruidoso Tomorrow

At 6:30 p.m. Friday, July 31, in Ruidoso Convention Center, Lincoln County Commissioners will conduct a public hearing to take public input on the location for a new jail.

On July 24, commissioners held a hearing in Carrizozo. Residents and elected officials from Carrizozo and other communities attended the hearing and urged commissioners to build the new detention center on the land Carrizozo is offering at the Industrial Park. There were no comments about locating the jail in the Ruidoso area, or opposing Carrizozo as a location.

According to the agenda for the July 31 special meeting,

People At First Hearing Want Jail In Carrizozo

A standing room only crowd filled the Lincoln County Commission chambers Friday night, all wanting the jail to be located in Carrizozo.

"Seems like a no brainer," said Capitan resident Lonnie Lippmann about the offer of free land and utilities for a new jail made by the Town of Carrizozo. "Free land, free utilities, where else should we put it. Obviously they want it in Carrizozo."

Lippmann's comment elicited applause from the crowd.

commissioners are scheduled to discuss budget items after the public hearing. Specifically, commissioners will discuss the overtime line item in the law enforcement fund with Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan. They also will discuss the funding of the current detention center. Commissioners tabled acceptance of the final 1998-99 budget during their special July 24 meeting because of the concerns about the budget items.

Final item on the agenda is an executive session for personnel, threatened and/or pending litigation, acquisition and/or disposal of real property.

Citizens and elected officials from both Carrizozo and Capitan spoke in favor of Carrizozo as a location for the jail during the public hearing held on Friday night in the commissioners' chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Carrizozo Town attorney David Stevens opened the comments by reading The Detention Center Facility Proposal to the County of Lincoln from the Town of Carrizozo. The eight page proposal prefaced with a statement about the highest concern to taxpayers is the cost of a new jail and security of a new jail location. It went on to explain how the location in Carrizozo could ease the cost and provide excellent security.

The proposal offers adequate real property in the Carrizozo Industrial Park and additional property to provide housing for jail employees all without cost. The town also proposes to extend all utilities at no cost and to provide water and sewer at no cost for "a period of years." However that period was not defined, which caused commissioners to request that the period be a set length of time.

The proposal included a statement about the availability of natural gas, which competing gas company Zia claims is the primary consideration of a location for a new

detention center: Stevens read from the statement, "Contrary to the representations made by Zia Natural Gas in the June 12 letter to commissioner Rex Wilson, Zia can offer no effective advantage to relocating a facility outside of

Ruidoso Ends Fiscal Year In Good Financial Condition

The Village of Ruidoso ended its fiscal year in very good shape.

During the Ruidoso Village Council meeting Tuesday, village manager Alan Briley and financial officer Lorrie McKnight reported the village collected slightly more gross receipt taxes than were budgeted for the 1997-98 fiscal year that ended June 30. The village actually collected \$6,390,001 in gross receipt taxes and it had budgeted receiving \$6,386,634. Last year, the village was off by two percent.

While gross receipt taxes for the year were a bit higher than expected, tax collections for March and April were the lowest in three years. Briley said there was concern about the collections, especially since March was a very good month with spring break, good skiing and lots of people in the village. He said lodgers tax were up for that month. Briley said he called the State Taxation and Revenue Department to get some answers to about who was not reporting, but the department refused to release that information. "It's like top secret,"

Briley said. "To protect confidentiality."

"All we can figure is late reporting," Briley added. He said they figured some big businesses had filed late. McKnight said Tax and Rev always tells them not to look at individual months, rather the overall figures. Councilor Leon Eggleston said that some businesses elect to file quarterly. McKnight said businesses can file monthly, quarterly or annually.

Last year's total gross receipt collection was down 3.64 percent from a four year average. This was anticipated because of the move of the WalMart Store to Ruidoso Downs and the loss of its taxes. October's collections were down 12 percent over the four year average, November bounded up to nearly four percent more and the four year average. December's collection dropped 16 percent, then bounced up to 19 percent in January. In February collections were 14 percent higher than the four year average, but then dropped to 10 percent less for March and 18 percent less for April.

May's tax collected came back up to about \$500,000, Briley said, which was up from April with its \$376,904 in taxes. But the amount was still less than the average for May.

Briley said he has instructed department heads to wait two months to make capital purchases of equipment until the gross receipt tax collections are "smoothed out."

One other reason for the good year end budget balance was McKnight's analysis of transfers from the general fund to non-general fund departments such as parks and recreation, convention center. McKnight said she did not transfer funds if departments did not need the money to end the year, even if transfers had been budgeted. Because of this transfers were only 86 percent of the budget, which increased the overall general fund balance, McKnight said.

As examples, McKnight showed how Parks and Recreation revenues were 104 percent of what was budgeted with the pool revenues up slightly and parks about the

Carrizozo. Their motivation is very clear and very profit driven. When the county commission decides to locate the new detention facility within the Town of Carrizozo, Zia

Natural Gas will not be able to provide services because they do not own Carrizozo as a service area.

The proposal also states it would be cheaper to operate a jail in Carrizozo because of the milder climate and having Carrizozo-Capitan Natural Gas provide gas would have a greater local stimulus to Carrizozo and the county than with the Wyoming based and owned Zia Natural Gas Co.

Carrizozo would also be a more secure location because of its proximity to the lava flows and wide open spaces of the desert, also its closeness to the courts and sheriff's office in the Lincoln County Courthouse.

The proposal includes statements about the resolution passed by the Capitan Village council in support of Carrizozo as the location for the new jail, about the survival of the Town of Carrizozo which is a state and county government based economy, and questioned how locating the new jail in a community with a "tourist driven economy" would be received.

It also states that the town has been in communication with officials at the Village of Ruidoso to work on a joint proposal that will "meet the needs of the town of Carrizozo, the village of Ruidoso and all citizens of Lincoln County."

"The Town of Carrizozo welcomes this project with open arms and conveys to the

county its willingness to do all things within its power to locate the new Detention Facility within the confines of the Town of Carrizozo," Stevens concluded. Stevens also presented a petition with 700 names from residents of the county asking to build the new jail in Carrizozo.

Carrizozo Mayor Manuel Hernandez said if the county does not choose Carrizozo, the cost of acquiring land and utilities will make the jail cost more. He said the infrastructure at the Industrial Park is worth about \$800,000.

Carrizozo Trustees Eileen Lovelace and Willie Silva also spoke. Lovelace said that other communities have problems with water, but Carrizozo has plenty of water rights. She also suggested bringing judges and lawyers to the jail instead of moving the jail to Ruidoso or Fort Stanton due to the expense of transporting prisoners. Silva urged commissioners to choose the cheapest way for the taxpayer-Carrizozo. "Let's pay a fair price and not put the taxpayer in a burden," Silva said.

Capitan Mayor Norman Renfro said his trustees passed a resolution in favor of keeping the new detention center in Carrizozo. "The village of Capitan is behind Carrizozo 100 percent," Renfro said.

Carrizozo School Board president Steve Harkey said he was worried about the number of students enrolled in Carrizozo school. "We want to grow," Harkey said. "If you take the detention center out of Carrizozo I think we will lose kids from our school. We support the detention center in Carrizozo."

Former Carrizozo trustee Ruth Armstrong said she thought talking location was "premature, when we don't know what will be built." However, she supported the Carrizozo location, whether it be just for a new jail, or a jail/court complex.

Former Capitan mayor and fire chief David Cummins said he had heard rumors and read of a considered location on airport road. He said if the county buys property it will be taking property off the tax rolls. "The only sane place is Carrizozo," Cummins said. He also brought up a situation not yet considered. "You haven't planned far enough ahead. When you move the jail, what are you going to do with the old jail?"

"I hope the decision hasn't already been made," Cummins said which elicited a good applause from the crowd.

Kim Roper who lives near the Industrial Park said placing the new jail in Carrizozo was the most economical plan. She also thought it would be less costly to bring judges to the new jail and there would be less problems with run-aways.

Carrizozo resident Mike Abe said the community is positively pursuing programs of economic growth. "Be remembered for sharing," he told commissioners. "Carrizozo is your neighbor and remember the second commandment—love thy neighbor."

Physician's assistant Ernie Gonzales, and Carrizozo resident, said the county couldn't "ask for more" with offers of free land and free utilities.

Carrizozo resident Barbara Culler asked commissioners to

consider the people who want the jail in Carrizozo. Carrizozo resident Marjorie Lindsay asked commissioners to "please keep the detention center in Carrizozo for the survival of our little town. Many here depend on the detention center and the courthouse."

Lincoln resident John McGrath said in addition to the "wonderful things" Carrizozo is offering, commissioners need to consider what an "inhospitable place for prisoners to look out a cell and see miles and miles of nothing. In Ruidoso, you have places for an escape to hide."

Lincoln County Assessor Patsy Serna of Carrizozo said, "Carrizozo is the county seat of the County of Lincoln, for that one reason the detention center should remain right here."

Carrizozo resident Barbara Ward wanted to know about the financing for a new jail and what are the other suggested locations because people were hearing rumors.

Commission chairman Ray Nunley said the financing is part of the options in the package prepared by Rampar, the private jail corporation that is doing a study for the county. Nunley said as for financing the options include taxes and revenue bonds. Commissioner Wilton Howell said regardless of how it is financed, it is a tax. "The people of Lincoln County will pay regardless where it is built."

As for other locations, Nunley said several suggestions are being made by Rampar which was not available for report that meeting because they are not finished with their report.

"When you find the other locations, will you let us know?" Ward asked.

Capitan resident, and county commission candidate Robert Goddard said he favored Carrizozo as the new jail location. "I strongly reject the airport road area which is not a good location because it is in the vicinity of the Spencer Theater."

Fr. Dave Bergs, who serves parishes in Carrizozo, Corona, and Capitan, said the distances between communities is not as great now as it was 10 or 15 years ago. He said the only sane place for the new jail is the Industrial Park. "If they try to escape, we can see them," he added jokingly.

After Nunley closed the public hearing, commissioner Monroy Morales invited the crowd to the next public hearing on July 31, in Ruidoso. "I think at that public hearing you will hear other information, we won't pick a site then," Montes said.

Wilson told the crowd he appreciated their turn out and comments and the effort from Carrizozo and other communities. "This is the logical choice," Wilson said.

Nunley thanked the group for their professional and well prepared comments. Commissioner Bill Schwettmann said it was "enlightening and gratifying" and he had seen no opposition, which he expected to come out during the meeting.

Howell said he appreciated the crowd showing up and voicing their opinions. "We only make decisions through input," Howell said. He thanked the community for "putting its best foot forward". Then he added, "If there is another alternative, I hope you will be as considerate as tonight," he said.

Ruben Parra from Rampar, asked for clarification in the proposal from Carrizozo that will impact his study. "Our study is strictly cost driven," Parra said.

Nunley suggested the mayor and attorney determine the number of years the town will offer free water. And Montes said the county needs an appraisal of the worth of the property and offered water and sewer.

Nunley later made another comment about his opening statements that he wanted all to behave themselves. "I did not mean to infer that Carrizozo residents are rowdy or uncouth, I was trying to control redundancy. If I sounded rude, I apologize."

The next public hearing on the jail location is set for 6:30 p.m. Friday, July 31, in Ruidoso Civic Events Center.

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Carrizozo Accepts Bid For New Fire Substation

The regular meeting of the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees was held Tuesday, July 28. Mayor Manuel Hernandez and trustees James Silva, Wesley Lindsay, and Cynthia Morales were present.

Hernandez thanked all the citizens, including the trustees and Capitan Mayor, who turned out for the Lincoln County Detention Center public hearing which was held Friday, July 24, by the Lincoln County Commissioners. Lindsay said he felt that the public hearing was a very good meeting. Hernandez reminded all present that there will be another detention center public hearing on Friday, July 31, at the Ruidoso Convention Center, 111 Sierra Blanca Drive, in Ruidoso at 6:30 p.m. Hernandez said that everyone needs to attend this public hearing as well. Meet at Norwest Bank in Carrizozo at 5 p.m. to car pool to go to the meeting.

Final action was taken on the ordinance relating to unlawful riding. Trustees approved amending the section of the ordinance as follows: No person shall ride in the bed of truck, or in any other part of a truck which is not enclosed by a rigid top or vehicle body. No driver shall allow such a person or persons to ride in a part of a truck that is not enclosed by a rigid top or vehicle body; also amended the Uniform Traffic Code by inserting the following as a subsection: (1) Persons riding in trucks which are participating in a parade conducted by any person(s) or agency must first obtain a permit to be issued by the Town of Carrizozo Town Clerk and all vehicles participating in a parade shall first be inspected for current driver's license, insurance and registrations are current pursuant to by the Town of Carrizozo Chief of Police. This action will take effect five days after publication.

LeeRoy Zamora, Chief of the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department, presented the one bid received for construction of the new fire substation. The substation will be at Third and Fourteenth. All American Building and Excavation from Capitan was awarded the bid. Trustees approved the bid of \$47,680 which does not include gross receipt taxes.

Carrizozo Chief of Police Angelo Vega had several items approved by the trustees: (1) purchase of nine uniform shirts from Simmons at an approximate cost of \$351; (2) emergency equipment for 1997 Oldsmobile Cutlass Police Unit for \$741; (3) installation of emergency equipment for 1993 Chevy Caprice for around \$250; (4) to paint 1993 Chevy Caprice white - the paint to cost \$180; and (5) installation of rain gutter on the back and outside lights (back and front) of the police building.

Vega read a letter from Antonia Samora, of Alamogordo, concerning the code enforcement letter she was sent on her Carrizozo building. She stated she was on a limited budget and asked the town's assistance in demolishing the building on her property.

Town clerk Carol Schlarb said that she had spoken to town attorney David Stevens about the town demolishing the building. Schlarb said that Stevens said the town has to follow state law and he advised bring it before the trustees to approve a resolution allowing the town to demolish the building as a dangerous building.

Hernandez strongly suggested that the trustees pass a resolution as the building was a danger to any children playing around it. He thought perhaps the fire department could use it in their exercises. Hernandez thought to remove the debris would be approximately \$30 per load and probably no more than three loads.

The trustees asked Schlarb to present a resolution on this at the next meeting. The trustees decided the town helping will be a situation by situation occurrence. The resolution presented at the next meeting will only be for the Antonia Samora situation.

Vega and the Carrizozo Auction Company presented a list of items that the police department had that they wanted the trustees to declare as surplus and to be auctioned off. Trustees also were given a list by town foreman Faustino Gallegos of several items that the town had to also be declared surplus and auctioned. The trustees declared all the items surplus and that they could be auctioned.

The Carrizozo Auction Company will hold an auction of the items August 15. The auction company will receive a 20 percent commission. They gave the town a five percent discount as their usual commission is 25 percent.

Christina Full gave the trustees a brief report on the Carrizozo Recreation Center. She said the bowling season is almost here and there will be three leagues this year. She asked the trustees to consider having some repair work done on the lanes. She said it may be to late to get them resurfaced, but the trustees need to do something soon as the headers up in the front are beginning to crack. She has talked to Tom Brown, of Bowling & Billiards from El Paso, about possibly putting epoxy under the wood. Full said that she would check into several different options and have some figures for the trustees at the next meeting.

Full also told the trustees that in August they will be starting to install the frisbee golf course at the rec center. This game, that is played worldwide, has a frisbee taking the place of a golf ball and it is thrown into a hole, which is a basket about four feet high, within so many throws. The course they are setting up will start with three holes.

Two more requests were made by Full: (1) asked to have the light in the parking lot turned on for the bowlers, which would cost about \$10 per month; and (2) see about having a professional carpet cleaner clean the carpet. She said they rented a carpet cleaner; however, it need to be steam cleaned. The carpet in the rec center is only a couple of years old and Full said if it

is cleaned good every year should last a long time.

Hernandez asked the trustees for their approval of a memorandum to advise department heads of the town policy on overtime for town employees. From the date of the memorandum forward there will be no overtime for any department employee unless previously authorized by the board of trustees or there is a bona fide emergency. In the event of a bona fide emergency, the department head has the authority to instruct employees to work beyond the hours assigned to them pursuant to the town's personnel policy and procedures manual. This directive is being implemented to avoid paying unnecessary overtime to town employees. Department heads are instructed to

advise all employees of this directive.

The trustees made their selections for the 1999 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG). After the five public hearings that the trustees held on the CDBG grant, trustees decided that they will apply on the streets that didn't make the last CDBG grant and they would apply for the sewer plant on the Colonias.

Gary Stout, representing the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, received approval to use 12th Street for the 5th annual Street Fair to be held September 7. Trustees also approved closing 12th Street from 5th to 6th Street for the street fair.

The next meeting of the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees is 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, August 11.

Choosing a location

There was a standing room only crowd at the public hearing last Friday night and all want the jail to be located in Carrizozo. The Town of Carrizozo has offered free land in the Industrial Park and free water and sewer for a period of years for the new Lincoln County Detention Center, if a new jail is to be built. Apparently the people were impressed with the possibility of saving tax dollars and the offer of free land and utilities at no cost would definitely be a savings. The people of Lincoln County will pay for the new jail, whether it is through revenue bonds or increasing property taxes.

People in some portions of Lincoln County have complained that their property taxes are too high and these people have asked that a limit be put on any property tax increases. These people need to know that their property taxes will certainly increase drastically if the county commissioners choose this method of paying for the cost of building a new jail. The cost for building in one location versus the cost of building in another location could increase taxes. People need to ask for the final figures to be made public before the county commissioners make their decision as to location.

Spending county tax dollars wisely should be one of the most important factors when the county commissioners decide where to build the new jail. Private grudges against certain portions of the county should not be a factor when the decision is made. Our county commissioners were elected to represent Lincoln County and each county commissioner should make an effort to do what is best for the entire county, not vote against an issue as an attempt to "get even" with people in another district. Elected officials have an obligation to the voters to fulfill their duties honestly and openly.

Some of the issues pertaining to the proposed site for a new jail were discussed at the public hearing Friday night but we hear there may be more "surprise" announcements made at the second public hearing tomorrow night in Ruidoso at the Convention Center. The object of the public hearings was supposed to be to receive public input regarding proposed sites for a new jail, not keep pertinent information secret until the last public hearing. We were told the reason there would be two public hearings, one in Carrizozo in the Lincoln County Courthouse and another in Ruidoso, was to allow people from all areas to attend one or both of the public hearings. The majority of the people attending the first public hearing last Friday, and those planning to attend the second public hearing tomorrow night in Ruidoso, believe the county commissioners will listen. The majority of these people have genuine concerns about the cost of building a new jail and what it will cost the taxpayers.

We do hope the study will be made available for the public before the county commissioners make a decision as to the site for a new jail. We do hope the county commissioners will schedule more public hearings if construction costs will increase property taxes drastically. Property owners should have the opportunity to voice their opinions as to how their tax dollars should be spent. We do hope the county commissioners will consider all public input and base their decision on what will be best for the entire county. We do hope the decision will be based on facts. We do hope the decision as to location of a new jail has not been made in advance.

Friday night at 6:30 p.m. at the Ruidoso Convention Center the second public hearing will be held. If you have a preference as to where a new county jail will be built you should be there. If you are concerned about the cost, definitely attend the public hearing.

Spending tax \$\$\$ wisely?

LCSWA Does Have A Plan

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority has a plan.

After Labor Day, Ruidoso plans to take over collecting garbage from residences and businesses. Since 1991 Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) has collected Ruidoso's garbage. But complaints were many that LCSWA did not pick up yard wastes for free as Ruidoso had. Ruidosians complained how filthy their village was since LCSWA took over the services.

The idea of LCSWA originated with Lincoln County Commissioners Karon Petty, Bob Hemphill and Rick Simpson who at that time were faced with a state mandate to close the county dump located on Airport road on Fort Stanton Mesa. All the trash from the county and from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs was going into the Fort Stanton Mesa Dump. Captain had its own little dump, but also was faced with upgrading it to fit new environmental standards. Corona has its own little dump but was looking at the same problems as Captain. Fort Stanton Hospital has its own landfill and was not a factor.

Looking to build a landfill, LCSWA became an entity made up of elected officials from each municipality and the county. It soon became clear that Lincoln County could not afford its own landfill under the new regulations. LCSWA convinced Otero County to organize its own authority and go into partnership on financing a regional landfill. Constructed on public lands south of Orogrande, the landfill now pays for itself and the environmental gross

receipt taxes which each entity collects to pay off the landfill bond are being returned to each entity. The biggest problem with the Orogrande landfill is the great distance from Lincoln County.

One of LCSWA's major problems was its inability to raise rates. Instead, each governing body had to impose its own rates, then come back to LCSWA. This resulted in some low residential and commercial rates that did not meet operating costs.

Ruidoso Council refused to raise its rates on residential customers for LCSWA's services, even though the statistics showed the rates were substantially lower than similar sized communities, some with far less challenging terrain for trash trucks. With continued dissatisfaction with LCSWA's service, Ruidoso council decided to take over trash collection and move out of LCSWA. They set the transition date as the first of September.

Soon after the decision was made to move out of LCSWA, Ruidoso council held hearings on and approved an increase in trash rates for residential and commercial customers. Now residential customers are being billed for two months prior to actual collections to give the new solid waste fund some money so the village can hire a solid waste director.

Ruidoso has billed its residential customers for LCSWA. When it assumes collection, it will continue to bill residential customers, and will take over commercial billings from LCSWA.

On Tuesday, July 28, Ruidoso's manager Alan Briley told the Ruidoso Council that the village will fully

take over collections after Labor Day. Briley said the village will assist LCSWA with trash collections over that busy holiday weekend. This will ensure there is no break in service and will give the village trash crews opportunity to learn routes.

Currently LCSWA has about 35 employees. LCSWA manager Jerry Wright, who has been in charge of operations for the last two years, said after the transition, LCSWA will have about 13 employees. Wright told THE NEWS that he has a plan for the transition. "I think LCSWA is headed on the right track," Wright said. "In the last two years, the bills have been paid, we have four pieces of new equipment and we have a surplus over our required reserves."

Wright said if Ruidoso helps financially, LCSWA will keep recycling after the transition because the program is popular. Also there is a possibility the state could require more recycling in the future if a different governor is elected. "If we let it go, it will cost more to start recycling again," Wright added.

After Labor Day, Wright's plan calls for two employees to operate the two large side loader trash trucks for the county residential and commercial dumpsters. There are currently 83 residential collection sites in the county. One employee will operate the new rear loader trash truck to pick up Poly Karts in the municipalities. This truck would also do special pickups and cleanups in the county with three employees doing the Monday cleanups.

Two employees will be utilized on the large roll-off con-

tainer routes, with one employee spending half time on transport. LCSWA just approved purchase of eight more roll off containers which are good revenue generators.

At the LCSWA yard in Ruidoso Downs, two employees will work the recycling warehouse and yard. Three will be in the office, with at least one helping with special pickups. Wright said the billing clerk needs assistance with phone calls and customer service during billing time. One person has a dual role of customer service representative and special pickup.

In the plan Wright said that LCSWA should look at the lease/purchase of all new collection trucks after 1998. A new rear loader will be paid for with state Environment grant money.

Wright also advised the LCSWA board to dispose of all surplus equipment at the earliest opportunity.

Wright poses three options to transfer trash once collected: the X-frame transport trailer purchased with available grant money; direct haul to the regional landfill by collection and roll-off trucks; use of the Village of Ruidoso transfer station depending on the rate.

Roll-off containers will be used at various established locations at set times for clean ups in all the entity communities, Wright added.

Recently at least one county commissioner complained that LCSWA has no plan for the Ruidoso transition. Commissioner Monroy Montes advocated the county pulling out of LCSWA and using three road department employees to collect trash at 50 consolidated locations. Wright is concerned that reducing the number of dumpsters in the county will lead to customer complaints. Elected officials from other communities such as Captain are concerned what will happen to their trash services if the county leaves LCSWA.

Wright said he will provide the LCSWA board with financial figures at the next board meeting.

Wright said LCSWA has a plan—it will continue to pick up the trash in Ruidoso Downs, Captain, Carrizozo, Corona and the County after Labor Day.

Howell also wanted to know why there was such a difference on the ending cash balance. County treasurer Joan Park said the discrepancy is due to the way she is handling grants now upon suggestion from the auditor. Previously she had based revenues on a "fifth" quarter to reflect a positive ending balance. But the auditor suggested grants be reflected as revenue only when received, not projected as revenue. Park said a negative could be shown while the county waits for reimbursement on the grants.

Park said a budget is "a supposition of what will happen in the next fiscal year."

Citizen E. J. Fouratt said with governmental grants, the county "fronts the money to the state or federal government." "A real grant is money up front."

Commissioners voted 4-1 to table acceptance of the final budget. Nunley cast the lone no vote because he wanted the budget to get to Santa Fe before the deadline of July 30. Schlarb said she would write a letter to Santa Fe requesting an extension to approve and return the final budget after the deadline.

ments. "That would generate money quicker," Montes said. "This is something to consider. I'm concerned as there is no plan and we can't keep in it as it won't work."

Montes said collection is not what is important, rather the ownership of the regional landfill which he said should have been built in Lincoln County. Commissioner Wilton Howell suggested talking with Gene Simmons who had conducted a landfill study in the early 1990s to get accurate figures to serve the rural areas of Lincoln County. Howell said the county needs to protect its ownership and membership in the landfill.

Montes said he was concerned also that none of the representatives from the other entities were at the last LCSWA meeting, while Ruidoso continues to sit on the LCSWA board and vote on the future of LCSWA. "If Ruidoso separates they should be treated as a separate entity," Montes said.

Capitan Fire Chief David Cummins said he was concerned about Capitan and Corona. "Don't jump into this, when Ruidoso pulls out every entity may be scrambling," Cummins said.

Commission chairman Ray Nunley called for a recommendation. Montes suggested they put together a budget and "fire this up." "We've got 80 locations (dumpster) we need only 50, with bigger containers."

Capitan Trustee Debra Ingle was concerned there was no plan since LCSWA had known for months it was moving its collection out of LCSWA. "I'm working on a plan for LCSWA," Ingle said. "All us municipalities have to be looked at, why not work together on a plan for all of us."

"LCSWA has been looking after the best interest of LCSWA," Nunley said. "If the county road department is a good idea, then we should consider it."

Then Nunley adjourned the meeting.

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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE: Refusing to negotiate is a bipartisan condition.

Bill Richardson's confirmation hearings for his secretary of Energy nomination give evidence that there's not much difference between Santa Fe and Washington.

Confirmations of executive appointments at the state and federal level are the sole responsibility of the Senate. In New Mexico, the Senate Rules Committee conducts all confirmation hearings and then makes a recommendation to the full Senate. In Washington, the committee that deals most closely with the executive department conducts the hearings and recommends to the full Senate.

Thus Bill Richardson appeared before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee for confirmation as ambassador and before the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee for confirmation as secretary of the Energy Department.

At both levels appointees are welcomed politely and then asked hard-ball questions. The questioning is partisan, it sometimes continues for days, and often it sounds like political speeches —

although the U.S. Senate has no one like Manny Aragon.

But the complaints we hear from Aragon are strikingly similar to those heard at the U.S. Senate hearing on Richardson's confirmation. Aragon complains that Gov. Gary Johnson won't talk to legislative leaders, he won't negotiate, and he won't give his lieutenants authority to negotiate for him.

The complaints of the Senate energy panel were almost identical. Pres. Clinton has refused to talk to committee members about nuclear waste storage. After a year of forthright talks with Hazel O'Leary, Clinton's first energy secretary, O'Leary had to tell them she could no longer discuss nuclear waste. Three years later, at Frederico Pena's confirmation hearings for energy secretary, Pena told the committee he would reopen talks, but he was muzzled also.

Energy committee members were obviously frustrated. A law passed by Congress and signed by the president several years ago told nuclear power plants that the federal government would provide for their spent power rods by January 1998. So far, the Department of Energy has done nothing to honor that commitment. As a result Pres. Clinton has been taken to court three times by power companies and already has lost twice.

Does any of this sound familiar? Panel members asked for Richardson to show up at the hearing bearing a letter from Pres. Clinton giving Richardson authority to negotiate with the committee on how to comply with the law as soon as possible. Richardson didn't bring

the letter. He told the committee that he wouldn't have taken the job unless he knew he would have the power to carry out his duties.

Panelists said they no longer could accept such assurances and threatened to hold Richardson hostage until the president gives a signal that he's willing to deal.

Many nice things were said about Richardson during the first hearing. He was called the most qualified energy secretary this country has had because of his background working with New Mexico's national labs and with the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant.

"We're sorry to do this to you, Bill, they said. Don't take it personally but you're the only bargaining chip we have. It sounded amazingly like state Senate hearings for secretaries of corrections and human services.

Richardson countered that there can be no discussions until he is on the job. He thanked the committee chairman for quickly scheduling his hearing and urged a speedy confirmation so he could move ahead.

Whether that happens may depend on what happens behind the scenes to assure the committee that Richardson will have more authority than his predecessors. Richardson was as good as good as a nominee gets at playing the committee to perfection. He knew when to sit and take abuse. He knew when to respond in utter seriousness. And he knew when he could flash that winning smile.

But charm won't make it happen this time. Bill needs some help from that other Bill in the White House.

same compared to the 1996-97 year when revenues were only 91 percent budgeted. The Utility Fund was 99 percent of budgeted, compared to 92 percent the year before and needed no transfer from the special gross receipt tax fund. Water revenues were 96 percent of budget, sewer revenues were 104 percent of budget. The Airport Fund was 98 percent of budget compared to 76 percent in 1996-97.

Lodgers Tax revenues exceeded budget expectations with collections at 122 percent. Revenues were up about \$56,000 for lodgers tax collections in 1997-98 compared to 1996-97. The Convention Center showed a revenue increase of about \$2,000 more or 122 percent of budgeted figures. All utility funds in the general fund were within their budgeted amounts. Utility Fund expenditures were about 70 percent of the budget compared to 76 percent in 1996-97, or about \$500,000 less.

Airport expenditures were 87 percent of budget compared to 82 percent in 1996-97, or about \$42,000 more this year. The Recreation Fund expenditures were 75 percent of the budget compared to 69 percent in 1996-97 with actual expenses about \$20,000 higher. Convention Center expenditures were about \$82,000 less this year, mostly due to decreased capital outlay. Operations reflected a slight increase in expenditures.

Councilors approved a resolution making the final adjustments to close out the 1997-98 fiscal year budget that included transfers in Lodgers Tax, Crime Lab Trust

Fund, CIP: Airport Improvements, CIP: Highway 48 project (water line relocation); CIP Billy the Kid Loop Grant; CIP Airport Crosswind runway.

Councilors also approved the 1998-99 fiscal year budget that included encumbrances and carryovers from 1997-98, actual ending cash balances and adjustments to expenditures and revenues for the 1998-99 operating year. Revenues were adjusted to account for increase in water rates and decreased water tap fees. A new department, solid waste, was also adjusted up to account for additional revenue for increase in commercial rates, yard waste and recycling fees. Lodgers tax was reduced by one percent and

grant money was added.

With all adjustments, budgeted revenues for the general fund are \$6,495,040 with expenditures budgeted at \$5,570,122. Total revenues budgeted for next year are \$22,606,057, with total expenditures at \$24,896,829. Briley said the figures make it seem the village is spending more than it will get in revenues. He said most of this is due to use of bond project money generated over the last two years. "We are not digging \$2 million into the reserves," Briley said.

Briley also pointed out the new solid waste fund that is budgeted \$1,373,909 in revenues that includes a \$200,000 one time grant. Expenditures are budgeted at \$1,305,593. "These are all estimates,"

Briley said. "We have no history for the solid waste. This is just a guess, we may ask for transfers." Briley said he is trying to hire a solid waste director soon. Councilor Bob Sterchi asked if Briley anticipates problems getting the solid waste department staff on board. Briley said, "It is going to happen." In September equipment is scheduled to arrive.

Briley said the village may ask Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority to continue collections in the village until after the busy Labor Day weekend so there is no break in services. Then after Labor Day the village will physically take over trash collections in Ruidoso.

County 1998-99 Budget Is Not Accepted; Questions Asked

Lincoln County's 1998-99 budget is on hold.

During a special meeting in Carrizozo on Friday, July 24, Lincoln County Commissioners tabled acceptance of the final 1998-99 budget because they had questions about several major changes in different funds. "There are a lot of changes," said county commissioner Rex Wilson. "It's different from our submitted budget. There were also concerns about the drastic reduction in overtime for the sheriff's office."

County finance officer Punkin Schlarb said some changes were in the way grants are listed in the budget and also how the \$1.2 million for the hospital was handled. Schlarb said an \$800,000 warrant was issued for the hospital in June, during the last fiscal year, but it was not receipted in June and so carried on to the new fiscal year. "The auditor thought it better not to include the \$800,000 as revenue in this fiscal year, instead put it in the beginning cash balance," Schlarb said.

As for the sheriff's office, commission chairman Ray Nunley said the commission went through several processes and did cut overtime for the sheriff's office. "But we gave him two part-time officers and a Fast Cop and \$42,000 as a hold over," Nunley said. Nunley said he asked staff to research the tape recordings of the budget hearings to make sure there was action taken to reduce the overtime. Schlarb said her assistant Anita Sambrano went for the tape but the sheriff's administrative secretary Janice Silva had it.

County commissioner Wilton Howell said that this was an example of why they needed good minutes of budget discussions.

Silva said she had one tape, but there were several tapes in reference to the Fast Cops grant discussion. Nunley said he remembered discussion on cutting sheriff's office overtime "a lot" but remembered no specific amount. "We need time to research the tapes and be real clear," Nunley said. "If we need to fix it then we'll fix it."

Commissioner Monroy Montes said the commission had asked the sheriff to apply for a Fast Cops grant for one officer, then the sheriff applied for two. "I applaud that but there had to be a reduction in funds accordingly," Montes added.

Nunley then called for a transcript of discussions about the Fast Cops grant. County clerk Martha McKnight Proctor said she didn't recall the amount of reduction of overtime discussed. Nunley said he thought the amount was said.

Howell said as he remembered if the sheriff got two new employees it would affect

overtime, sending it down from the requested \$30,000. (SEE PAGE 4)

state Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) the only listing on salary for the GREC is \$3,260 for benefits, and operational expenses are \$70,659 for a total of \$73,919. The salary was deleted because the position was to be deleted after August 1.

In the May 8 preliminary budget, the GREC budget was listed as \$28,900 for salary and benefits for one full time person plus overtime and funding for one temporary person. In addition to the salary, operating was budgeted about \$48,000 for a total of about \$76,000 for GREC.

"They won't come down," Montes said about the Museum of the Horse. Nunley said the county does not have the money in its budget, and he said commissioner Rex Wilson also spoke with the museum and got the same answer.

Commissioner Wilton Howell suggested going out for a new proposal.

Wilson said they should open options to a different approach, such as leasing. Moral said when the county got the federal grant for the GREC there was a provision in the agreement that restricted the county from selling the property for five years. "But there is nothing to say they won't allow us to lease it," Schwettmann responded.

Wilson made an amendment to include lease to the original motion to go out for rfp again for the GREC. In the vote on the amendment and on the motion to go out for lease or management of the GREC, Montes and Howell voted no, Nunley, Wilson and Schwettmann voted yes.

Commissioners also held a closed session to discuss pending litigation into which attorney Gary Mitchell was invited. Commissioners took no action on discussions in closed session.
