

Ruidoso Agrees To Take Over DWI Program, With Conditions

Ruidoso Village Council Tuesday voted to take over the DWI program, with conditions.

"My biggest concern is do we have ultimate responsibility?" Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson asked.

"We need more than fiscal responsibility, we need total control of the DWI program," answered Ruidoso village manager Alan Briley after Magistrate Judge William Butts explained the situation

with the flailing DWI program. Briley said for the village to take over the DWI grant and program, the county will have to provide the 10 percent match to the grant, or about \$11,000. "Can we take on this grant?" Briley asked. "I think yes," he answered. "If we have the proper resolution with the county so they relinquish the power and responsibility totally to the village."

Briley said with the grant funds, the village can use the same employment practices

for the DWI program as for other village employees. "It will be done to our standards," Briley said.

Lincoln County was to receive a \$114,467 grant for the DWI program and provide a 10 percent match in cash or in kind service such as rent. The grant funding comes from gross receipt taxes collected on the sale of liquor and distributed in four payments, explained Rick Mandel, the DWI project representative with the Local Government

Division of the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA). Mandel said he thought Ruidoso has the technical competence to administer the DWI program for Lincoln County.

Lincoln County Commissioners terminated the DWI program by a split vote action at a special meeting on August 25. At that meeting Butts said he would not refer DWI offenders to the DWI program if it continued with the DWI director hired by the county. Hoping to salvage the


DWI program, commissioners Ray Nunley, Rex Wilson and Bill Schwettmann voted to terminate the county's role in the program. The wording of the motion did not include turning the program over to the village of Ruidoso, although that was what Butts recommended.

At the Ruidoso council meeting Tuesday, Briley summarized the 100 page DWI program document by saying it had eight basic components - prevention, enforcement, screening, Teen court, inten-

sive probation, outpatient care, planning and coordination, alternative sentencing. Briley said if the village took over the program it would be responsible for providing coverage for the entire county. However, the majority of DWI cases, and liquor sales, occur in the populated areas of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Alto. "So it would be a benefit to Ruidoso to administer the program," Briley said.

FOUR PEOPLE WERE INJURED when this extended cab pickup was hit by a bus at the intersection of Highways 54 and 380 in Carrizozo September 7. The pickup was traveling south on Hwy. 54 and the force of the impact spun the pickup around and between the front gas pumps and the two poles on the east side of the pumps before stopping. The ambulance on the left is parked in the area where the pickup passed through. Carrizozo Volunteer Firemen and other rescue workers used the Jaws of Life to open the driver's door on the pickup in an attempt to help remove an injured child who was trapped in the back seat for more than 30 minutes. The front seat also had to be removed. The injured were transported to Gerald Champion Memorial Hospital in Alamogordo by Carrizozo EMTs in the two Carrizozo ambulances. A backup ambulance came from Ruidoso to Carrizozo as standby until the Carrizozo ambulances returned. Carrizozo Chief of Police Angelo Vega said this is the most dangerous intersection in the state of New Mexico. He is working with highway department officials in Santa Fe to try and help make this a more safe intersection, not only for travelers but for local residents as well.

Lincoln County Commission Meets Tomorrow, September 11

Lincoln County Commissioners meet at 9 a.m. tomorrow, September 11, in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Commissioners have 38 items on their agenda, including three public hearings on proposed changes to ordinances at 1 p.m. and a public hearing at 3 p.m. to consider projects for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) application.

Items as listed on the agenda include (items may be switched in their order, or "floated" on a motion by commissioners at the beginning of the meeting):

--Approval of minutes from the special commission meeting of July 31, regular commission meeting of August 11, special commission meeting of August 11, special commission meeting of August 25, special

commission meeting of August 26.

--Consent agenda of payroll/accounts payable/budget report; treasurer's financial report for month ending July 31; Enhanced 911 grant agreement amendment #4; authorization to schedule public hearing to consider the Extraterritorial Zoning Ordinance.

--Discussion of Drug Task Force requested by commissioner Monroy Montes.

--Meeting with area judges requested by Division II District Judge Robert M. Dougherty III, discussed by commissioner chairman L. Ray Nunley.

--DWI grant, proposed resolution authorizing the transfer of the DWI grant to the Village of Ruidoso.

--Request for final plat approval of Los Chozas Subdivision, requested by Ron Green of Bonito Land Livestock, Inc.

--Approval to substitute the current capital outlay budgeted items with a Year 2000 Compliant Laboratory Management System requested by Valerie Miller, administrator of Lincoln County Medical Center.

LCSWA Gets Bad Report From Professional Team

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) needs to improve efficiency and safety and must get the rates established for use of the Gavilan Canyon Transfer station to determine its future.

Meeting Tuesday, the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board got the report from the Southwest Disposal, Inc. team that was commissioned to look at the authority operations and make recommendations. John Baffort from Southwest Disposal introduced Glen Zubia who reported that LCSWA has no routing sheets, which is basic to a solid waste collection operation. Without the sheets it is difficult to determine labor and manpower needs, how much waste is produced and collected in what areas, and how to determine efficiency of equipment. Zubia said without the routing sheets there is no way to teach a back up or new driver the routes.

"There are no routing

sheets to measure productivity," Zubia said. He recommended route audits be performed annually. Zubia said his observations were based on three to four days of driving trash routes and by talking to the trash truck drivers.

Zubia evaluated how LCSWA currently does its routes. He said that the authority's three side load trucks make about 830 pick ups a week. He said there are about 200 county pick ups, but he was unsure of this number because of how the trucks go from Ruidoso into the county. "You need accurate numbers on the county route," Zubia said.

Trucks start their routes about 3 a.m. because of a shortage of collection trucks and to avoid traffic because the trucks have to cross from one side of the road to the other, Zubia continued. However, the early hour generates complaints about the noise.

LCSWA county member Albert DuBois said he gets a lot of complaints from the motels and lodges in Upper

Canyon because the early trash collection wakes customers. "They don't pay us to wake them up," DuBois said. He asked that the hour of collection be considered in the reorganization.

Zubia recommended the collection trucks start later in the morning to benefit from daylight which is a safety factor. LCSWA manager Jerry Wright said that state "frowns on leaving any trash in the transfer station overnight" and the transfer trucks have to leave for the Orogrande landfill by 1 p.m. "That's why we start so early," Wright said.

Zubia then discussed the residential and commercial pick ups for Lincoln County. He said one side loader drives 800-1,000 miles a week to provide the service in the county. LCSWA trucks service dumpsters in Hondo and commercial dumpsters in Carrizozo at least twice a week and sometimes three times. Zubia said the old rear

Lincoln National Forest Firefighter Dies In Vehicle Accident In California

A Lincoln National Forest firefighter was killed and two other firefighters injured on September 4, as the result of a five-vehicle accident west of Williams, California.

According to a release from Lincoln National Forest, Juan Manuel Hernandez Jr., 21, of Alamogordo, was killed when a Ford pickup crossed the center line of the highway

into the lane of the first Lincoln National Forest fire vehicle, causing the driver to lose control and run off the side of the road and overturn. The pickup continued on the wrong side of the road and struck the second forest service vehicle in which Hernandez was riding, causing it also to run off the road and overturn. After hitting the forest service vehi-

cles, the Ford pickup continued and slammed head on into a Toyota pickup, killing the driver of the Ford pickup. The occupants in the Toyota pickup were injured and taken to local hospitals. A fifth vehicle was involved when the driver was unable to avoid the crash, the driver was not

Butts then made his presentation to the council. He told of the DWI program history and its former director Charle White, whom he blamed along with "county administrators" for the program's overspending and running out of money with two months left

before the end of the fiscal year. "Which left us judges high and dry," Butts added. Butts said that one of the commissioners explained that why he voted to terminate the program was because no one in the county was qualified to oversee the program. Butts

said he advised the county commissioners that the men hired for the DWI program, director Rick Kloepfel a former jockey agent at Ruidoso Downs race track who then hired landscaper Johnny Montes brother of commissioner Menroy Montes, "would not work for me."

As he told county commissioners, Butts said that his magistrate court in Ruidoso handles the majority of DWI offenders. "It's simple, this is where the DWIs are," he added.

Butts explained the screening element of the DWI program. All DWI offenders by state law must be screened, or evaluated by a counselor. The DWI program director is given the task of interviewing DWI offenders and making sure they comply with the screening.

"The county commission voted 3-2 to terminate the county's responsibility and give the DWI program to the village, as I recommended," Butts said. "They (the county) failed to oversee the program and blatantly failed to hire qualified people."

"To make Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and the whole county a safer place to live I urge you to take this program over and hire qualified people," Butts said. "We can't let this program fail, if Ruidoso does not take it over we have a good chance of losing the program. Probation is one of the most important things in this program."

The program is available to all judges in Lincoln County. Butts said he thought more judges will be willing to use the program if the village hired the right people and oversees the program.

Councilor Bill Chance asked Butts what would happen if

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the program is lost. Butts answered by listing the duties of the DWI program. Finally he said that before the program began his clerks had to keep up with the DWI offenders. "But with all the drug and other crimes, and civil cases it's impossible for my clerks to stay current with the DWIs," Butts said.

Butts also listed several things that could be done with the DWI grant money, in addition to hiring the program coordinator. He said prevention programs could be started in the schools and the police departments could purchase video cameras to place in police units. "When a defense attorney sees a client failing a sobriety test it is convincing evidence," Butts said. "The long term possibilities are endless for education, and DWI roadblocks."

Councilor Bob Sterchi said, "most of us appreciate the program." He then said that it appeared there was a "rather short list of people qualified to run the program." "Can you work with Alan Briley? Will the person become a city employee?" Sterchi asked.

Butts said that he thought the county's ad seeking a DWI coordinator "misled the public" because of the many mandatory requirements listed. "I think there were a lot of qualified people who did not apply," Butts said. He then said that Ruidoso police chief Lanny Maddox already had numerous applications and he also had people calling. "I think you would be surprised at the number of applicants," Butts said.

Butts spoke of his concern that the county did not use a grading or evaluation process in hiring its DWI director from four final applicants. He said that Maddox could tell them that a grading is needed to protect from lawsuits.

Briley said that the grant program would allow the village to put the program coordinator on payroll as a grant funded employee or as a contractual employee who is employed only as long as there is grant money. Butts said when the county commission terminated the DWI program Kloepfel's and Montes' jobs were also terminated.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said he met with Briley and Mandel for more than an hour to learn about the program. "I think it's a good program, and there are ways to work with the other municipalities," Donaldson said. He spoke about the DWI Oversight Committee and rejected a recommendation for 30 members and preferred a committee with about 11 members. He said he instructed Ruidoso village attorney John Underwood to meet with county attorney Alan Morel to make sure the wording in the county resolution to turn over the program to Ruidoso is correct.

Lincoln County Commissioners are to consider the resolution turning over the program to Ruidoso at their Friday, September 11 meeting in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Donaldson said that with the \$114,000 the village can do four of the eight components of the program—screening, probation, prevention and enforcement, and offer them on a county wide basis.

Councilor Linda Flack asked if the grant funding was fixed amount. Mandel said the amount is fixed for this fiscal year. "The amount

is projected, it could decrease, but we don't anticipate a decrease," Mandel said. "It could increase depending on estimations from DFA based on alcohol sales."

Sterchi then said the program was too important to drop and made the motion for the village to move forward in taking over the DWI program with the conditions that it have fiscal and total responsibility and the county provide the 10 percent match. Councilor Frank Cummins seconded the motion and all councilors voted yes. Councilor Ron Anderson was absent.

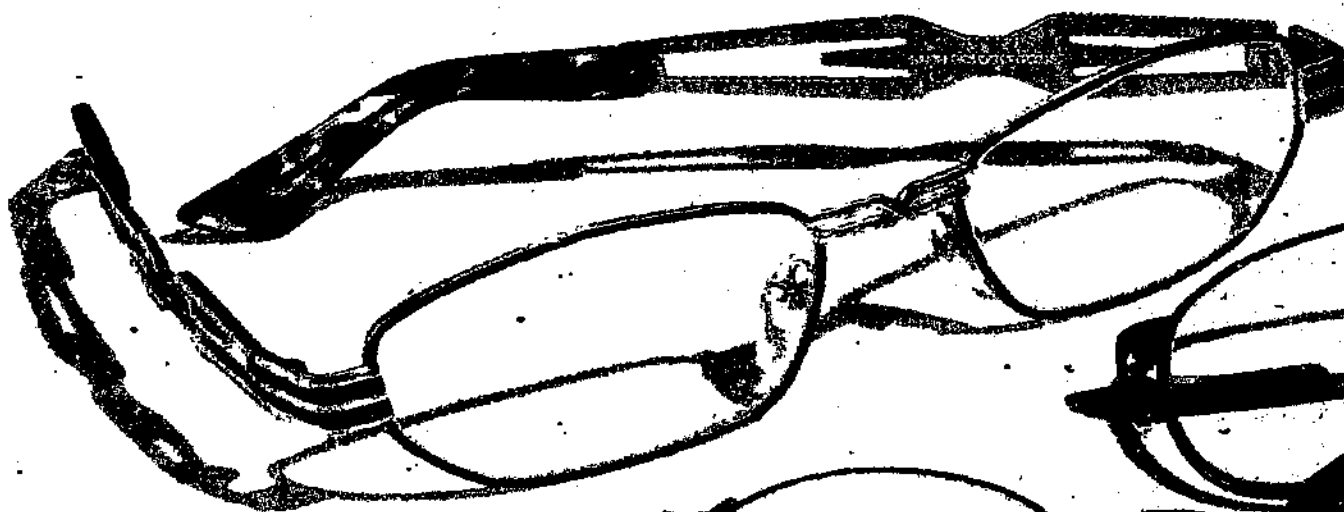

FROM THE EDITOR'S DESK

38 Agenda Items?

Tomorrow is the day the Lincoln County Commissioners meet. You may want to attend, even if there are 38 items on the agenda. It seems the county commissioners would realize that 38 agenda items are far too many for one meeting.

If the commissioners would schedule two regular meetings each month it would help eliminate the need for these additional special meetings. There have been three special meetings this past month, in addition to an emergency meeting to approve the budget last week. It seems the commissioners would prefer to schedule these meetings in advance. The public would certainly appreciate it.

Many of the agenda items are listed for discussion, which could mean lengthy discussions, if past discussions at meetings can be used as a guide. Routine agenda items should be handled quickly.

Each county commission is different. Years ago the county commission meetings were held every third Tuesday and they started at 10 a.m. and ended usually before noon. There were very few special meetings and they seldom held emergency meetings.

Tomorrow the Drug Task Force is on the agenda but the senior programs are not listed, as had been requested. And there will be the usual closed session for personnel, threatened and/or pending litigation and acquisition and/or disposal of real property. Wouldn't it be nice if they didn't schedule a closed session every meeting?

One important agenda item is the detention center, which is listed late on the agenda, but there is no indication if the report from the consultants as to recommended locations for a new county jail will be presented. Early in the day a presentation is to be made on financing for a new detention center. It seems the financing for a new jail should be presented after the cost is established, which should be in the consultant's report, along with suggested location.

Quite often the commissioners will switch items on the agenda when they approve the agenda early in the meeting. We won't know until Friday morning which agenda items will be listed where. They may decide to discuss the detention center at the same time as the presentation is made on financing for the new detention center or they may move it to after the closed session, late in the day.

Understanding the importance of establishing the cost before discussing financing might be reason enough for commissioners to move the detention center agenda item to just before the financing presentation. The public wants to know how much it will cost and how the county plans to pay for a new jail. Will the state provide financing or will there be a new tax imposed just for the new jail?

Important county business will be discussed tomorrow and there may be some decisions made that will affect the general public. Updates on projects, public hearings, the meeting with area judges, considering requests for money, approving contracts, the new jail, and consideration of bids and the rfp for lease or management of the Glencoe Rural Events Center are all on the agenda tomorrow.

The commissioners need to conduct county business efficiently and not waste time or lose their tempers. As elected public officials they have a responsibility to make decisions that will be the best for the residents of Lincoln County, not for a select few or for their own personal interests.

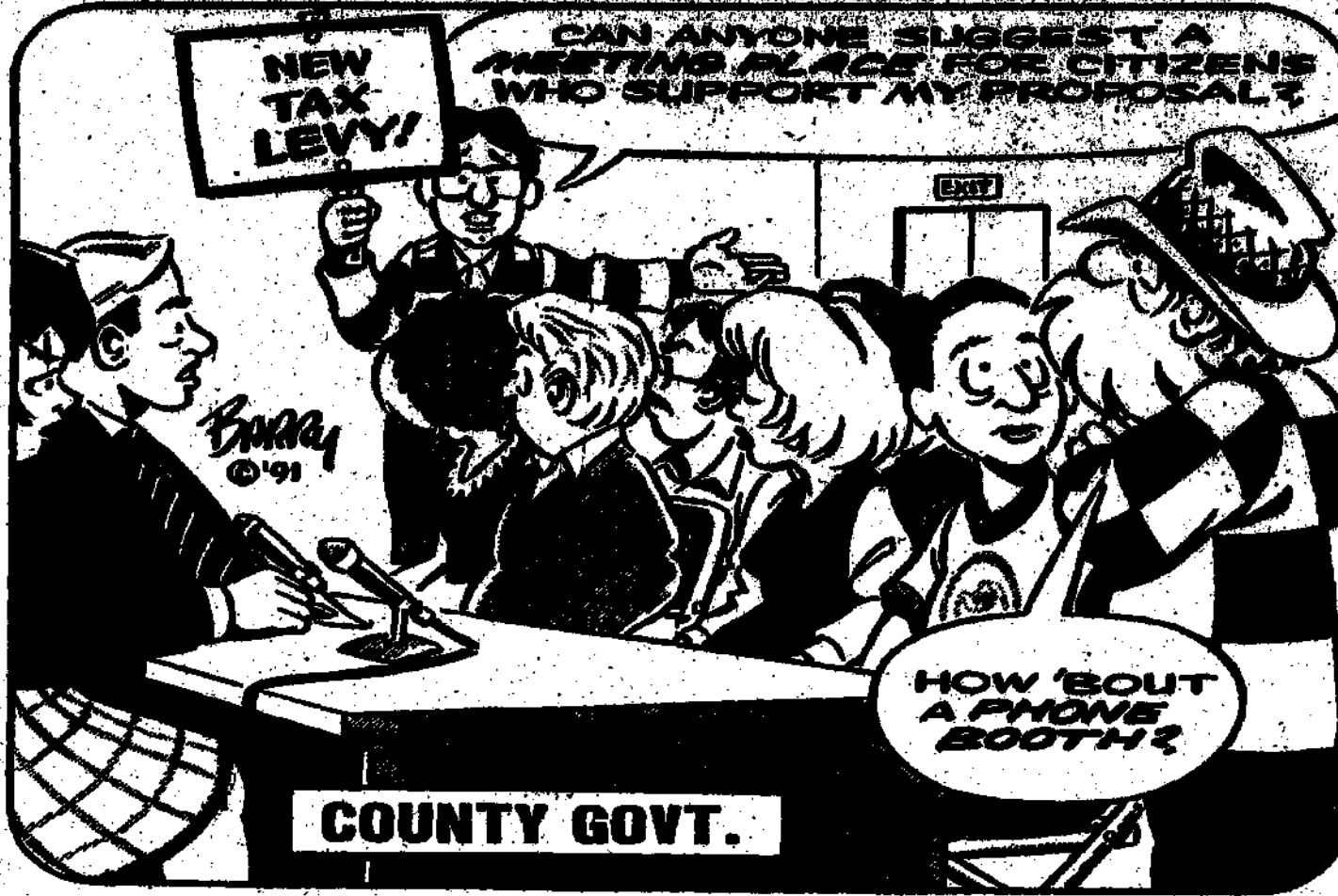

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE: The politics of gambling can sometimes be confusing.

When the question raised its head a decade ago, Democrats generally supported an expansion of gambling and Republicans opposed it. That seemed logical. The good-time, free-wheeling liberals wanted to add to their fun and be progressive, while the conservative, cautious, god-fearing Republicans didn't want to get any deeper into gambling than we already

were. A bill, introduced and supported by Democrats, passed the Legislature that allowed veterans' organizations to have slot machines. But Gov. Garrey Carruthers vetoed it. All seemed right with the world.

Then Democrat Bruce King became governor. Another gambling bill was introduced, but King vetoed it just like Carruthers had. Then some Indian tribes notified the state that they wanted to enter into gaming talks under provisions of the National Indian Gaming Regulatory Act. King assigned one of his cabinet secretaries to sit down with tribal representatives to hammer out an agreement. But King refused to sign it.

The tribes went to court, claiming the state didn't bargain in good faith. Before the cases were heard, the 1994 gubernatorial races rolled around and Gary Johnson, the Republican challenger to King said if he was elected, he would sign gaming compacts.

So what's happening here? We were having a paradigm shift, as over-priced consultants like to say. Well, we always knew old Bruce had a little Republican blood in him. Even the most avid GOP supporters had trouble calling him a liberal. But now we have a conservative Republican candidate who's all for gambling.

Money from the pueblos that wanted to open casinos began flowing into Johnson's campaign. That was a new one also. Except when Republican Tom Bolack was active in politics and receiving help from many Navajos, New Mexico's Indians had always been in the Democrat camp.

Johnson beat King and, true to his word, quickly negotiated Indian gaming compacts and signed them before Democrat legislative leaders knew what had happened. One of the Legislature's most conservative Republicans and one of the body's most liberal

Democrats joined in a suit against the compacts because Johnson hadn't involved the Legislature. An all-Democrat state Supreme Court ruled against the compacts.

After two years of trying to pass a law authorizing the compacts, a bill sponsored by a Republican finally passed by one vote. Indian casinos were happy it passed but unhappy with its 16 percent revenue-sharing provision. A coalition of anti-gambling Republicans and Democrats went back to court, claiming the revenue-sharing does not comply with federal law. The casinos agree but they don't want the law invalidated because they would be closed again.

It didn't matter anyway because the suit was filed against the state, so the Indians can't get into the action. The governor is representing the state, but gambling proponents worry that he is ambivalent because although he supports gambling, he thinks the state's revenue-sharing cut should be down around the five percent level he had in his original compact.

Meanwhile anti-gambling Republicans are mad at their state chairman because they think he had been quietly lobbying for the gaming law. Party Chairman John Dendahl says he hasn't lobbied because the GOP doesn't have a position.

So what should the GOP position be? Can an argument be made for Republican support of gambling? Sure it can. Republicans are against regulation and government interference. They believe in individual responsibility and they like the voluntary taxation aspect of gambling revenue. Democrats concerned with the social costs of gambling want the government to protect individuals by preventing them from doing something that might be harmful to them.

loader trash truck is used to clean up overflows of county dumpsters once or twice a week and for special trips. Without a route sheet this may be done because of

missed pick ups," Zubia said. He recommended obtaining an accurate count of sites in the county and evaluate the need for service twice or three times a week to the Hondo valley and Carrizozo.

Enforcement of trash ordinances would eliminate overflow of county containers, he also said. That would cut down the use of the other truck to make the special clean ups.

Other recommendations included better scheduling of extra pick ups, consideration of different services for the race track and Bonito Lake. He said any additional pick ups, such as the personalized services in Ruidoso, should have additional charges or higher rates.

In Ruidoso Downs, Capitan and Carrizozo residential collection is done with poly carts serviced by the rear loading trash truck. One driver and two helpers pick up about 480 carts for about three days. The other two days are used for clean ups in the county. However 30 to 40 percent of the carts are in poor condition, requiring the crews to physically drag carts to the truck and dump them into the truck. Zubia recommended an automated system or semi-automated side loading system that utilizes a one or two man crew. He also recommended LCSWA repair or replace carts because of the time lost and reduced efficiency in dealing with the damaged carts.

Corona's compactor system seems adequate based on the mileage from LCSWA offices to the site. Zubia recommended that system not be changed.

Recycling could benefit from use of one large compartmentalized roll off container, as opposed to the igloos and dumpsters currently used, the report recommended. This would allow a one man operation.

Safety was one of the major issues covered in the report. The team observed poor housekeeping at the Gavilan Canyon Transfer station and the recycling center in Ruidoso Downs evidenced by oil spills and parts scattered all over. Zubia said employees need to be made aware of what chemicals they are working with. There was no evidence of use of welding screens at the recycling center, and welding was being done in a room where paint and other chemicals were stored. By improving housekeeping LCSWA will provide a better public image and safer working environment, Zubia said.

Roger Bristow, special projects manager of Southwest Disposal, reported on the need to improve public perception of LCSWA. He said that county dumpsters in poor condition and dirty, poorly maintained trucks do little for public perception. He recommended route drivers complete maintenance reports on both dumpsters and trucks.

Bristow also said LCSWA is perceived as having "deep pockets" because it is a government entity. Without proper forms and reporting of accidents, LCSWA is at risk of liability should an accident occur. "With forms and proper maintenance, LCSWA stands a better chance," he added.

The report recommended LCSWA obtain a power washer to keep trucks cleaner for better public perception and to help locate problems on the truck; LCSWA stock major parts used often with a proper tracking system and to contract with a private outside welder. Currently the LCSWA mechanic makes road trips mainly to repair tires.

On October 1, Ruidoso will begin collecting its own trash and will take over ownership

and operation of the transfer station on Gavilan Canyon. Ruidoso mayor Robert Donaldson told THE NEWS on Tuesday night after the Ruidoso village council meeting, that the village has its equipment and manpower ready, but delayed starting its own collection until October 1 at the request of LCSWA manager Wright. The delay was to help with bookkeeping since the reorganization will require major adjustments to the LCSWA budget.

But the village has not established cost per ton for LCSWA to use the transfer station. Wright said to the LCSWA board he was to meet with Ruidoso village manager Alan Briley on Friday to discuss the rates.

George Wayne, CEO Southwest Disposal Inc., said the split with Ruidoso will affect the "economies of scale" that originally brought the entities together into LCSWA. If LCSWA intends to bypass the use of the transfer station and haul trash to the landfill with its current equipment, then LCSWA needs to make thorough Department of Transportation (DOT) inspections of all its vehicles, and fix them before they proceed.

The report made four recommendations on how LCSWA can best provide solid waste services: follow Ruidoso's lead and each entity provide its own solid waste service; continue LCSWA as now; continue with current employees but change how services are done; outsource or privatize all or part of operations and administration.

"All have political and or monetary consequences," Wayne said. However, Wayne said it was difficult to make a full evaluation because they had incomplete data from Ruidoso.

The report showed that LCSWA had strengths and weaknesses. In the strengths LCSWA as a public entity has ability to obtain governmental funds; has purchasing advantages and enforcement powers. Weaknesses or disadvantages include less focus on efficiency in equipment maintenance and customer incentives.

The report concluded with eight areas of concern: collection equipment in poor condition mostly due to starting with used equipment; lack of resolution on use of the transfer station; no time for maintenance because crews are utilized on collection routes and special clean ups; need for adequate and safe place to work with adequate supply of parts; poor employee morale, which Wayne said was natural considering employees now do not know if they will have a job; pay rates, the report considered LCSWA employees to be paid as well or better than their counterparts in private solid waste collection; stagnation or unwillingness to implement changes and recommendations; lack of solid waste experience and background as evidenced by the lack of routing sheets and choice of equipment; and financial implications to LCSWA and customers if LCSWA does not utilize the Gavilan Canyon transfer station.

The Southwest Disposal team recommended LCSWA get the rate information from Ruidoso on use of the transfer station because that will determine how much manpower will be needed and the cost of the operation without Ruidoso. They also recommended LCSWA do route and safety audits and staff training as soon as possible.

LCSWA attorney Don Dutton asked if LCSWA voted to go out for request for proposals (rfp) to privatize all or part of its operations, and Southwest Disposal, Inc. was the successful bidder, when the company could begin operations. Wayne said it would depend on what will happen with the transfer station, but

his company could be ready within four to six weeks. "That's why we're trying to push Ruidoso forward to understand it's the key to every body," Wayne said.
