

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Voters Nix Bond Issues In Capitan

A \$965,000 bond issue to finance construction of additional water tanks, purchase road equipment and expand and remodel the Capitan village hall failed.

Only 22 percent of the registered eligible voters in the village of Capitan cast their ballots in the special bond issue election Tuesday, a real low turnout said Capitan village clerk Deborah Cummins. There were 28 absentee ballots cast and only 213 of the 903 eligible to vote went to the polls.

In the first bond question, asking for \$515,000 for the water system, specifically to construct additional water storage tanks in the subdivision areas to improve water pressure and flow, 110 voted against the question and 104 voted for it.

In the second question, asking for \$220,000 in bonds for heavy equipment for the road department, 137 voted against and 74 for.

Murder Trial Is Being Held This Week In C'zozo

The murder trial of Terri Payseno began with impaneling of the jury on Monday in the 12th District Court in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Payseno, 40, Hondo, was arrested on September 25, 1997 and charged with an open charge of murder and tampering with evidence in connection with the death of Sonny Kirkwood, who was 57 at the time of her death.

According to police accounts last year, Kirkwood was fatally shot during an alleged struggle with Payseno. Police reported Payseno allegedly placed Kirkwood's body in a horse trailer on the property where it remained for two weeks, before police were called in to investigate. The women lived together at a ranch in Alamo Canyon about

Battle Continues Between Judges And Commission

What could have been a historic meeting between the Lincoln County Commission and most of the judges in Lincoln County and the 12th Judicial District ended in a total breakdown of communications between the judicial and legislative branches of government.

District Judges Robert Doughty II and Jerry Ritter, Lincoln County magistrate judges Gerald Dean Jr. and William Butts, municipal judges Mike Line of Ruidoso, Harold Mansell of Ruidoso Downs, and C.O. Rominger of Carrizozo, and district attorney Scot Key were invited to the regular Lincoln County Commission meeting held Friday in the courthouse in Carrizozo with an intent to find solutions to the overcrowding in the county jail. But communications never began and broke down completely after county commissioner Wilton Howell read a six page written comment about the high costs of the criminal justice system in the

Howell read in his statement that he was not there to criticize but to appeal to them to work together for the benefit of those "who we all in the end owe our offices to and thus are responsible to." He spoke of his concerns about

the spending of nearly 60 percent of the county's budget for law enforcement and the criminal justice system, particularly the jail, and of future costs that might exceed 80 percent of the county's budget. Because of this high cost he predicted other programs such as youth programs, senior citizens, health care, maintenance of roads and trash pick up will suffer.

"The counties of this state can no longer afford to pay the high cost of law enforcement and incarceration in the manner in which we are doing it today," Howell said. He advocated programs that

would punish offenders and rehabilitate them and require them to work to pay back society for their wrongs.

Howell went on to define the three categories of prisoners housed in the county jail now--people awaiting trial, those sentenced to less than one year, and those awaiting hearing on probation violation. He was most concerned about incarceration of probation violators which he believed the state should pay for because these individuals often are jailed for days and sometimes weeks before they

Options Are Considered For Financing New Jail

During the Lincoln County Commission meeting on Friday, September 11, commissioners discussed two different topics concerning the county jail--financing a new jail and inspection of the existing jail by the state fire marshal.

Jon Zaman, director of program outreach of the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA), made a presentation on financing the new jail. Zaman said he had been asked to prepare a \$3.5 million financing scenario for the new county jail, to show the county's debt service. He was invited by the county manager's office to make a presentation on possible financing of a new county jail.

NMFA was created in 1992 as the state's preferred mechanism for financing public facilities. Payment of any NMFA loan is with a governmental gross receipt tax. "Detention facilities fit the bill," Zaman said. "And Lincoln County qualifies."

County commissioner Wilton Howell asked if a NMFA loan could be paid back with

property taxes. Zaman said the key to using property taxes is passage of a referendum. County commissioner Monroy Montes said the county has discretionary mills left for property taxes. But county attorney Alan Morel said he wasn't sure if the county commission could dedicate a discretionary mill for 20 years, the time needed to pay for construction of a new jail.

Montes was also concerned that the commission did not have "real numbers" about the cost of a new jai! and did not want to consider any taxing mechanisms to pay off a loan until they had the real num-

We're not more than a few days away from getting the Rampar report," said county commission chairman Ray Nunley. "We're not prepared today, but we will be shortly."

Zaman said NMFA loans must be approved by the state legislature during its 60-day session in January, and the county will have to be on the

County Resolution Gives DWI Program To Ruidoso

Lincoln County Commissioners approved a resolution which allows the Village of Ruidoso to use the grant funds obtained by Lincoln County to manage the DWI program.

During their regular meeting Friday in Carrizozo, commissioners approved the resolution which the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) required. DFA required the resolution for the county to give the grant for the program to Ruidoso. Lincoln County had applied for and received the \$114,000 for the DWI program that assists DWI offenders in complying with court orders. Commissioners on a 3-2 vote dropped the DWI program Aug. 25, after Division II Magistrate Judge William Butts requested the program be moved over to Ruidoso. Much of the controversy stemmed from Butts'

concerns about the DWI coordinator hired by the county, whom Butts considered unqualified for the position. Ruidoso village council considered the DWI program at its September 8 meeting and voted unanimously to take it over with conditions, mainly if the county provided the 10 percent match for the grant, either in cash or in-kind services such as rent.

Friday, county attorney Alan Morel said he met with Ruidoso attorney John Underwood about the grant, and discussed the situation with DFA representative David Hannah. Hannah advised that the county had to approve the resolution in order to pass the grant over to Ruidoso for this fiscal year, because the grant was given to Lincoln County.

County commissioner Monroy Montes, who voted

Rampar Releases Report

The study compares two locations--a site below Grindstone Dam in Ruidoso and the Carrizozo Industrial Park. "The Grindstone site is eight incres that would allow for construction of the 100 bed facility and future expansion. The site is unimproved terrain requiring tree removal, an access road and pre-construction grading and-earthwork with consideration for rocky terrain. Natural gas, telephone and electricity exist at the site. "A careful site analysis would be required, including a survey, to determine the optimal portion of the site for the cost-effective construction of the facility."

Fort Stanton was rejected as a possible location because of uncertainties about the available work force, release programs, health care facilities, educational facilities, availability of utility infrastructures, and obtaining the real estate from the state or BLM.

The study's analysis of the costs for utilities and infrastructure shows the estimated cost of bringing water, sewer, gas, electric and telephone to the Carrizozo site is \$29,500. The estimated cost to bring water, sewer, gas, electric and telephone to the Ruidoso site is \$192,654. The Ruidoso estimates do not include the \$750.000 for the site access road and grading and drainage work and the \$8,000 to

purchase the property.

Also compared are the project annual operating costs for utilities. However, the analysis does not state whether the amounts are based on the same use of electricity, gas and telephone at both sites, nor does it state how the figures were derived or what basic rates they were based

utility costs for the Ruidoso site is \$228,626 (includes water, gas, electric and telephone) and for the Carrizozo site is \$284,972.80. In breaking out the projected costs for the Ruidoso site is water \$5.000, gas \$96,126, electric \$120,000 and telephone \$7,500. The projected costs for the Carrizozo site is nothing for the water and sewer, \$137,260 for gas, \$138,000 for electricity and \$9,712 for telephone.

Not included in the study are potential costs for removing snow from the access road to the Ruidoso site and other mountain location weather related expenses.

The study also analyzes the work force and states that Carrizozo provides an employment base of local residents adequately trained to operate a county detention facility. "If the decision is made to locate the new detention facility in Carrizozo it is recommended that a holding facility be maintained in the Ruidoso area. The study also recommended that transportation systems be improved in order to minimize the amount of holding cells needed in Ruidoso.

A facility in Ruidoso would face the challenge of relocating the employees that reside in Carrizozo." An option is to hire a new workforce from the Ruidoso area and train them by the New Mexico Corrections Training program that entails 280 hours of training. The study recommends that if a facility is built in Ruidoso. the holding cells for Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs be closed and operations consolidated with the new jail.

The study estimates the transportation costs to take inmates from Ruidoso to Carrizozo is \$24,910 a year. This is based on figures provided by the county, village of Ruidoso Downs and Ruidoso police department for vehicle maintenance and fuel, transportation and extradition, and manhours required for the escorted trips. However, in April Ruidoso police chief Lanny Maddox told THE NEWS that he did not have a separate line item fund for prisoner transport costs because the county does most of the transporting of prisoners to the county jail in Carrizozo. Editor's Note: Lincoln County budgets a total of \$9,000 a year for all prisoner transport costs.

The study states that information from Ruidoso shows it costs \$308,000 a year to operate its 10 holding cells. That includes staffing, utilities, food, laundry, employee benefits, expenses and all other costs. Ruidoso Downs did not provide information in detail, so the study makes assumptions based on the Ruidoso information. The study estimates the savings of consolidating the two village jails and renting from Lincoln County is about \$213,350 a

The study also states that the development team was requested to review the Public Safety Dispatch operations in the county and deliver recommendations. The study recommends consolidation of dispatch operations into one center. "The most obvious cost savings would be exemplified by the elimination of six dispatch employees resulting in \$156,000 in annual savings on employee wages," the study states. It also states that

"consolidation of dispatch services has proven successful in other states where privatization of dispatch services has been implemented."

Three different financia imp/construction options are outlined in the study, with the recommendation that the best source of capital for Lincoln County from which to make lease payments is gross receipt tax of 1/8 of one percent. This gross receipt tax is estimated to generate in excess of \$340,000 a year. However, gross receipt taxes are dependent on sales and do fluctu-

Property taxes are not suggested as an option.

In the first option, the study recommends the county as lessee to enter into a lease agreement (with option to purchase) with New Mexico Capital Markets Corporation, which is part of the development team that conducted the study. The terms listed in the study show 25 years with semi-annual payments, with the county owning the facility at the end of 25 years lease and interest rates at this time not to exceed 5.25 percent. Lincoln County will not have to pay any costs for county counsel, bond counsel and out of pocket expenses.

A second option a "True Lease Option" where the county enters into a long term lease agreement with the landlord (to be determined). The landlord will acquire, construct and equip the correctional facility on real property, then enter into a design/build contract with the county. Rent to lease the facility will be about \$100,000 a year per \$1,000,000 of the project cost. The county will agree to maintain and insure the facility during the 25 year lease. The county would have an option in the future to purchase the facility at fair market appraised value.

The third option is for construction and financing of a detention facility by a private team and rent beds to the county at a negotiated rate. The initial contract could not exceed three years and would be subject to the county having the revenue to pay for the beds. With this option the taxpayers would not have to pledge any gross receipt taxes or property taxes. But the county would have to renew its contract every three years. Under this option the owners would rent the unused bed to any other entity in order to pay off the facility.

At the first of the study the team recommends several alternatives to help reduce the number of inmates within the detention center. It suggests the county "take the innovative step of creating the position of Coordinator of Alternative Sentencing programs and hire a properly trained individual to fill this position" to help identify, establish, implement and monitor a broad range of programs that would result in making Lincoln County the model in meaningful, effective alternative to sentencing programs.

Alternative programs include release on own recognizance, low bonds for qualified individuals, electronic monitoring, work release, community service with individuals wearing bright orange jump suits, education, substance abuse treatment, expedited hearings for probation violators, other innovative programs developed by the Alternative Sentencing coordinator. The study estimates that hiring a coordinator could save the county at least \$56,000 in incarceration costs and thus \$16,000 over the \$40,000 annual cost of the individual's salary and bene-

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LCSWA Reduces Force; Three Are Unemployed

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority approved a reduction in force (RIF) at their regular meeting Tuesday in Ruidoso Downs.

- After a one hour executive session, closed to the public, Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) member from Capitan Debra Ingle made the motion to accept Option 3 for reorganization and county member Elbert DuBose seconded the motion. Ingle, DuBose, county member Monroy Montes, Ruidoso Downs member and LCSWA chairman Joe Hayhurst, Carrizozo member Cynthia Morales and Corona member Ernest Lucras through proxy voted unanimously to accept the option. No Ruidoso members voted on the reorganization motion as previously agreed.


The option included elimination of several positionsoperations manager, Ruidoso special clean up, one transport driver, one mechanic, one mechanic's helper, two

Ruidoso route drivers, and one receptionist. While seven positions were eliminated, only three employees were laid off as a result of the RIF--Calvin Griffin, Johnny Preciado and Paul Wordock. Montes requested the three be notified in writing the next day, and that all whose positions remained be notified that "they still have a job."

Montes then asked that general manager Jerry Wright be evaluated at the next LCSWA meeting of September

In order to remedy some of the major deficiencies of LCSWA as noted in the report from Southwest Disposal Inc. given at the September 8 meeting, Wright said the equipment and routing computer software was to arrive this week. The Global Positioning System equipment will assist with route mapping and monitor collection employees. "In one week we will have the new routing done," Wright said.




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Go directly to jail

The official report on recommendations for the Lincoln County jail was released Monday and we were told copies were delivered to the county commissioners Tuesday evening. It is intersting that statements in the report are similar, if not exact wording, of the comments made by a county commissioner at the regular meeting Friday. It is also interesting that bold letters are used in the report to emphasize the statement made by a local person about the major costs are not in building detention facilities, but in operating them.

Included in the report is the recommendation that the county's correctional and dispatch operations be integrated into one facility. That would mean dispatch would be in the jail, not in the sheriff's office. The next logical step would be to move the sheriff's office to the jail and of course the courthouse would be next. Does this sound familiar? These comments were made at the July 31 special fail hearing in Ruidoso. Refer to the articles in the News August 6 and 13 and the editorial in the August 20, 1998 issue of the News.

The report states that the detention facility "will" be a one-story building, and the project "will" be a single building to house everything, and site improvements "will" consist of landscaping, etc., and the exterior design "will" be customized. Does this mean the county won't have to hire an architect to design the new jail?

Further information in the report: Potential sites considered are the Grindstone Dam area in Ruidoso, as was listed in this column. and Carrizozo. The comments about Grindstone Dam are that the Mayor of Ruidoso verbally proposed to sell the land to the county. but there was no documentation. When Carrizozo offered free land and water to the county for the site for the new jail it was suggested the Carrizozo Mayor determine the number of years of free water and the county needed an appraisal of the property and utilities.

One main difference between the two locations is the cost for site preparation and to extend utilities to the sites. It would cost more than \$1 million at Grindstone Dam in Ruidoso compared to \$29,500 in Carrizozo. Analysis of utility and infrastructure costs state that gas would cost \$41,000 more per year in Carrizozo than in Ruidoso and electric would cost \$18,000 more per year. Cost for snow removal at the Grindstone Dam location was not included.

Recommendation is made to consolidate the dispatch operations within the county which would eliminate six dispatchers. Would this mean the dispatchers would also be jailers? Would this mean that if there was an emergency in the jail the dispatchers would be away from the dispatch area? Would this mean that someone in the county might die while waiting for a dispatcher to answer the phone in response to a call for an ambulance? Would this mean the sheriff's deputies would have to also double as jailers and dispatch?

The transportation costs listed in the report are interesting. Last year Lincoln County budgeted \$9,000 for transporting prisoners, which includes to and from Ruidoso as well as to prison facilities. The report lists \$24,910 transport costs from Ruidoso to Carrizozo.

Alternative sentencing programs, which would require judges and the county work together, are explained in seven pages of the 24 page report. Alternative sententencing was mentioned at the county meeting Friday, three days before the report was released.

The report is to be presented at a special county commission meeting tonight at 6:30 p.m. The public is invited to attend the meeting which will be held in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. Where will the new jail be built? Someone might know.

Montes asked if the county got on the NMFA project list, then found another source of financing, if it could get off the list without penalty. Zaman said there are inechanisms to remove the county's project from the list. If the county was to go with a NMFA loan, and it was one of the projects approved by the egislature, the funding would not be available until mid May and then is available on reimbursement situation.

Zaman said the county has at least two months to decide o make application for the NMFA loan and to be placed on the projects list. Applications must be made through fesolution approved by the **É**ounty commission.

Later in the Friday meeting, commissioners heard a eport from chairman Ray Stunley about the state fire marshal's inspection of the jounty jail in the courthouse nade that afternoon. George Chavez and three inspectors dured the jail with Nunley ind private jail administrator Mike Borrego. "We went through the jail with a notebook of things we were adrised to do," Nunley said. "All that we were asked to do had been done and the state fire marshal was pleased with our forts. He will allow our jail continue to function."

However, the jail will be fimited to 35 inmates, and if on the weekend the number faceeds 40, the county must bring in extra help. Nunley

said the jail administrator is exploring options for covering the weekends, like extending shifts from eight to 10 hours. Nunley said the county will send the state fire marshal a letter advising that the steps taken are temporary measures as the county is in the process of constructing a new detention facility. "But we need a target date for the new facility," Nunley said. 'The numbers we've talked are 16 to 18 months."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE - Who should control public school education in New Mexico? That question is getting more attention in this year's gubernatorial race than education issues normally receive.

Gov. Gary Johnson has lamented his lack of control over the state's schools. Ten elected members of the state Board Of Education, joined by five members appointed by the governor, have control of public school programs and finance.

Gary Johnson arrived in the Covernor's Office nearly four years ago assuming he would have the same decision-making power he had in the small business he left. At his Big J construction firm, Johnson held absolute power, Imagine his surprise to learn the governor shares power with 18_ other elected officials in the executive branch of government, 112 elected officials in the legislative branch and five elected Supreme Court justices, along with dozens of lower court judges.

Johnson has had his troubles with all three branches of government but one of the biggest rocks in his running shoe has been an independent board that controls nearly half the states general fund budget. Other governors have addressed the situation by working closely with the board and inviting the state superimendent of schools to be an informal member of their cabinet. And they have worked with the Legislature to change education. The education board also works with the Legislature, sometimes at cross-purposes with the governor. In such cases, the governor often wins because of his greater powers.

But Johnson isn't into team sports or team government. So he has asked the Legislature to help him abolish the education board and give hun the power to run schools. That requires a constitutional amendment, something lawmakers have twice placed on the ballot at the request of past governors. Both times voters rejected the idea soundly.

As might be expected, Johnson's style of treating the Legislature as an adversary has resulted in his requests for a constitutional amendment going unheeded. So Johnson has taken his crusade to. abolish the education board on the campaign trail, making it a cornerstone of his re-election effort.

Good arguments can be made for an executive branch of government run by a single person. It is the system our nation's founders: established for our federal government. It is streamlined, more efficient, and in the case of education, it makes sense for the governor to have charge of the state's most important responsibility, educating its children.

But that hasn't been Johnson's message. He's been saying that education is a mess and that he.

wishes he could do something about it. His Democrat opponent, Martin Chavez, has responded that if he becomes governor, we won't hear him claiming he isn't responsible for some of government's functions. He'll find ways to accomplish his goals.

An even stronger reaction has come from Van Witt, a Republican education board member from Roswell. Witt took on Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley who leveled numerous charges against the board at a Chaves County GOP raily.

Bradley said voters don't know what the board does, who is on it or how it spends all the money it receives from the Legislature. He said the board is too big and doesn't have high enough standards, citing his son who went to

college without taking algebra.

In a lengthy Roswell Daily Record open letter. Witt retorted that the state education system shouldn't be at the political whim of one governor and thus one political party and that power should come up from the people rather than down from one elected official. He said the state board is much like a local school board. The millions of dollars it receives is distributed by a formula devised by the legislature in which Bradley

As for Bradley's son getting out of high school without algebra, Witt says that was a choice on which Bradley had to sign off. He suggests Bradley learn to steer his own child's education before taking on the entire

Another deficiency was in safety, and Wright said he had a meeting with the private company, Safety Consultants, which resulted in a new safety program being set up for LCSWA.

Wright also reported he had met with Ruidoso village about the transfer station which will go back to Ruidoso when the transition occurs on October 1. Wright said he plans to meet with Ruidoso again about the transfer station. Wright did not mention what had transpired between himself and Ruidoso about LCSWA's use of the transfer station after the transition.

Joe Baffort from Southwest Disposal said he will continue to modify his company's report and asked what LCSWA and Ruidoso anticipate for the cost of LCSWA using the transfer station.

Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson said the village had given Wright some numbers for the use of the transfer station. However, he did not disclose those numbers. Donaldson said the village was "willing to contract with LCSWA" with those figures. At the Capitan Village Trustees meeting on Monday, Capitan Trustee Debra Ingle said she had learned that Ruidoso was talking about \$22 a ton to use the transfer station. Ingle said that figure would raise the cost of trash collection on a monthly basis to the people in Capitan.

Another issue Ingle raised at the Capitan village meet ing, she also raised at the LCSWA meeting, the final version of the resolution that created the joint powers agreement between all entities and Ruidoso to allow Ruidoso to move out of LCSWA for collection. Ingle said the county, LCSWA, and Ruidoso Downs needed to look at their copy of the and make sure it was the finalized version. If not the entities need to approve resolutions adopting the latest version of the joint powers agreement before October 1. Montes asked Wright to send the amended resolution to the county to be on the agenda of the special county meeting on Thursday, September 17 (today). Wright said he would instruct LCSWA attorney Don Dutton to do that, which caused Montes to ask why the attorney had to do that. Wright said the board had agreed that all such legal; information would go through the attorney. Donaldson then asked Montes to make sure the resolution would be on the agenda of the September 17 meeting.

Donaldson also asked that Wright discuss with the Ruidoso solid waste staff and village manager a possible contract for Ruidoso to pick up trash in the county "pockets" of Ruidoso and for adjacent areas such as Gavilan Canyon, Carrizo Canyon and possibly Cedar Creek. "Some of these areas will be easier for us to pick up on a regular basis," Donaldson said. Montes said any such discussion of a contract should be on the LCSWA agenda because it involves compensation to Ruidoso.

LCSWA meets again at 2 p.m. Tuesday, September 29 to finalize the joint powers agreements and to conduct any other business needed to complete the transition with Ruidoso before October 1.

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
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



For those serving misdemeanor sentences (sentences of 364 days or less in the county jail), who also have a job, Howell proposed work release programs where the offender pays for staying in the jail at nights. For those without a job, he proposed working for the county in picking up trash along the rivers, in the parks, county lands or municipalities.

, to be okay if released? Do we need to hire someone to assist you with that?"

At that point Judge Doughty (who presides over court in Alamogordo) said, "No I don't need your help Mr. Howell."

Howell continued his comments that the large number of pretrial incarcerations are not based on the judges' desires to punish the people without the benefit of a trial or "even more of a problem they are incarcerated because of the Judge's fear they may not be re-elected or retained if they do not set high bonds."

"I am told the New Mexico constitution provides the right to bail except in capitel murder cases," he continued. "Thus, I think you can see why I have a lot of questions and why I think we need to visit these issues and work together to resolve them."

Howell continued with his opinions about the need to consolidate certain services such as communications (dispatch) and one jail for the county and all municipalities. He concluded that his comments were not a threat. rather a "fact of life that the county is running out of mon-

But Howell's comments did not bring about communication or a willingness to cooperate to resolve the problems. Instead, Doughty asked, "Is that what you brought me here for? You invited me here and I stood up, and you took over. I came here as a peace maker to offer you a plan."

Earlier during a discussion about the drug task force, Howell spoke of pigs, and how they consume all they are given in reference to the justice system filling the jails. "I don't know now if I'm being called a pig or a hog," Doughty said. "At our last meeting it was 'overbearing' and I take responsibility for that. I doubt seriously if I am the one who will be able to sit down with Wilton Howell. I've known him for a long time. I thought I've been friends with him. I would never have done to him what I see him doing to his fellow human beings. Pick your forum Wilton."

Doughty continued that Howell was upset about Doughty's threat to fine Otero County for its juvenile detention center \$1,000 an hour until it took care of problems. "You don't ever have to worry about me fining Lincoln County if I ever hold them in contempt I'm going to look for a way to put you in jail," Doughty said.

"That's great judge," Howell began to respond. But commission chairman Ray Nunley interrupted Howell and said Doughty would continue uninterrupted.

"It would be counter productive for me to offer this commission what I came here for," Doughty concluded and sat down. Nunley then asked Doughty to accept his apology.

After the comments, Carrizozo municipal judge Rominger advised the commissioners that the municipalities pay the county for housing their prisoners. "We have no free ride and I hope no one is released without me being consulted first," Rominger said.

Butts got up and said his sentiments were the same as the honorable Judge

Doughty's. Howell responded that the chairman did not need to apologize for him and he would not apologize for any of his remarks. "It's unfortunate we cannot take constructive criticism. We all need to sit down and quit duplicating services and work together for the proper end to the situa-

Howell said he was appalled at Doughty's fine of Otero County, which he first thought to be \$1,000 a day and found out that was \$1,000

a hour. Judge you wouldn't be fining Lincoln County, you'd be fining the people in this audience and the people of the county," Howell said.

Doughty told the chairman he came with plans for work release and electronic monitoring programs, "if you can find me a county commissioner I can work with."

County commissioner Monroy Montes asked Doughty to work with the whole commission. "This is a historic moment," Montes said. "I have never seen the caretakers of the detention center, the county commission, the owners of the detention center the taxpayers and the judges who must use the facility get together and actually start talking about...'

But Montes was interrupted by Doughty who said, "And the way you treat those Mr. Montes they won't ever be back together again."

Montes said the commission took the initiative to "make this thing happen, to be adversarial..." But Doughty interrupted and said he wrote the letter and asked for permission to meet with the county commission. But the minute I got over here, he (Howell) took over."

Montes said he personally did not see Howell's comments as adversarial.

Nunley said he did not think it was appropriate or proper or neighborly for the commissioners to invite someone to their meeting and "beat up on them while they're here in the name of trying to get along." Then Nunley asked that all stop, "right now."

Montes said he had not finished and then asked the judge or judges not deal with one commissioner, rather with the county commission. "It doesn't change the facts, we

have to deal with the jail, we have to deal with the operation costs, it doesn't change the facts if we can't afford to operate it, it becomes a useless tool for all of us. We need your input as we do the citizens, as we need everybody. I can see today it's not going to happen. In 30-60-90 days something needs to happen."

Citizen Jerry Carroll said he saw no cooperation, especially from the judiciary. He said the judiciary in the county and in Carrizozo was excellent. But what was happening in the room was a lack of communication, lack of coop-

eration from eyerybody. "We need to get together, as a people, under the constitution. Then he asked the judges if the state constitution and supremacy clause and the U.S. constitution and both bills of rights were the law of the land?"

Nunley slammed his gavel and said they were not there to debate the law, rather were seeking cooperation.

Carroll started to comment. However, Nunley would not let Carroll continue and called a 10 minute break at which time all the judges, district attorney and attorney Gary Mitchell left the room.

against moving the DWI program to Ruidoso, said his concern was the comments made by Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson about the "conditions."

Morel said Underwood said the village wants the county to cover the 10 percent match, equal to about \$11,000 this year. Suggested was payment of the lease of the DWI office next to Butts' magistrate court in Ruidoso. Morel said the county already had leased the office space for the year. and was unsure what else the county could do for the match. County commission chairman Ray Nunley, who voted to move the DWI program to Ruidoso, asked if the rent and use of the DWI car would be enough for the match. Montes asked how the county was dealing with the 10 percent match. Lincoln County Treasurer Joan Park said the match would be covered in the first half of the fiscal year by the lease of the office and in the second half of the fiscal year by the administrativefees and office supplies pro-

vided by the county. A. . Morel said the resolution only stated the county would

pass on the grant funding. But Montes said the mayor clearly said the village would accept the program only on the condition the county provide the match.

County commissioner Wilton Howell who voted for the county to keep the DWI program, said the program was too important "whether it stays or goes." He wanted the county to provide the 10 percent match. "We don't need to lose sight of the program and its participants," Howell said.

"If we don't provide the 10 percent match it prolongs the problem and people won't be served." Montes added.

With that Howell made the motion to approve the resolution and commit \$11,000 to Ruidoso for administration of the program, or provide equal valued services as in the past. The motion passed unanimously.

After the vote, Carrizozo resident Barbara Ward said she was told the mayor of Carrizozo was interested in applying for the DWI grant. "It's up to them (Ruidoso and Carrizozo) to fight that one out," Nunley responded.

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

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
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
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
