

County Commissioners To Meet

Tomorrow In Carrizozo

Lincoln County Commissioners will canvas the votes of the June 2 Primary Election during their regular meeting set to begin at 9 a.m. Friday, June 5 in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. The canvas of the votes is

the 12th item on the 36 item agenda that includes three public hearings on proposed ordinances, and discussion about raises for county employees.

At 1 p.m. commissioners will hold public hearings to take input on proposed changes to the county subdivision ordinance and proposed revisions to several county ordinances that create boards and councils to make them more standardized. Hearings also will be held on a proposed ordinance that repeals and re-

enacts Lincoln County Solid Waste Ordinances and resolutions that deal with regulating refuse, solid waste and litter, providing for efficient and sanitary collection of solid waste in Lincoln County, restricting accumulation of refuse, solid waste and litter in Lincoln County, and setting procedure for establishing a system of fees.

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) appealed to the county commission to do something to help lessen the problem of illegal dump-

ing in the county. As a result commissioners are seeking to revise their solid waste ordinances to help with this problem. Also the ordinance which establishes LCSWA will be changed to reflect Ruidoso's move out of the collection service.

Copies of the proposed ordinances and revisions to ordinances are available for viewing at the county's manager's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo.

Other items on the agenda are:

--Presentation of proposal on a Lincoln County Intervention Center by Dr. D.R. Blanks, Genevieve Phelan and Dianne Cohen.

--Discussion about detention matters with Otero County Commissioner Richard Zierlein and Otero County Detention Center Administrator Vick Jenkins.

--Group health, dental, vision and term life insurance

renewal with Blue Cross/Blue Shield of New Mexico.

Primary Election Results

Lincoln County Democrats turned out in better percentages of registered voters than did the Republicans for the primary election on Tuesday. But Republicans upset eight-year incumbent county commissioner Monroy Montes.

According to unofficial results from the Lincoln County Clerk's Office, 27.2 percent of the registered Democrats in the county or 1,039 came to the polls and 25.6 percent of the registered Republicans or 1,506 voted.

In the Lincoln County races, two unopposed Republican incumbents received votes of confidence even though they will have no opposition in the general election in November. Lincoln County Clerk Martha McKnight Proctor got 1,231 votes, the second most votes cast for any single Republican candidate. Unopposed Republican incumbent Gerald Dean Jr. received 1,143 votes for his Magistrate Judge, Division 1, position.

In the races for county commissioners, Republicans had the most opposition. The Lincoln County Commissioner District 4 Republican candidacy race brought out the most voters--376--for a county commission race. Republican incumbent District 4 commissioner Bill Schwettmann won the Republican candidacy with 50.5 percent, 190 votes, in the three way race. His opponents Kenneth D. Huey

got 105 votes and Lee A. Walker, Jr. got 81. This fall Schwettmann runs against Democrat candidate for District 4 Robert O. Goddard, who got 170 votes.

In the county commission District 5 race, 280 Republican voters cast their ballots giving the Republican candidacy to former county commissioner Rick Simpson who got 171 votes. Incumbent Monroy Montes got 109 votes. In November Simpson will run against unopposed Democrat Jimmie McTeigue who received 96 votes.

In the county commission District 2 race, 187 Republicans voted giving the candidacy to incumbent L. Ray Nunley. His opposition Leo Martinez got 68 votes. Nunley had announced earlier this

spring that he would not seek re-election. According to a published report Nunley changed his mind and decided to stay in the race for commissioner only four days before the primary election. In November Nunley will face Democrat Charles Rennie who received 129 votes.

In the other county races Democrat candidate for Magistrate Judge, Division 2, Rejeana S. Fuqua got 664 votes. She will run against incumbent Republican Magistrate Judge William Butts who got 1,126 votes in his unopposed primary race.

Incumbent Republican county treasurer Joan Park got 1,142 votes and will run against Democratic candidate

Alcohol Involved In Two Fatal Wrecks

DWI is on the rise in Lincoln County, and police don't know why. To find out, New Mexico State Police are beginning a DWI Saturation Patrol with zero tolerance.

Lincoln County has state police baffled. They can't find a pattern to the DWI in Lincoln County in the 20 mile radius around Ruidoso. Lt. William Bower has been an officer in the Alamogordo District of the New Mexico State Police since 1991 and he has never seen a 12 percent DWI related accident rate in Lincoln County--until now. "This is something new, not just the seasonal changes in populations and visitors," Bowers said.

Sometime this month, New Mexico State police officers assigned specifically to DWI patrol will be out and about on Lincoln County highways. And sometime this month, state police will hold three sobriety roadblocks, Bower said. The district office received extra funding from state headquarters to conduct the patrol and checks, Bower said. "We are putting everything into Lincoln County."

DWI Saturation Patrols will be held for five to six hours beginning about 8 p.m. Officers will pick an area and patrol for potential drunken drivers.

Bowers said that beginning in February, they began see-

ing a major increase of DWI in Lincoln County, from the three to four percent of accidents to more than 12 percent. Two separate alcohol-related fatal wrecks last Friday put Lincoln County into the highest DWI rate in the southeast part of New Mexico. Lea County following close behind at 11 percent, Bower added.

On Saturday, state police arrested six individuals for DWI at a roadblock at the intersection of State Roads 37 and 48 in Bonito.

Bower said his officers look for certain signs to detect a drunken driver--weaving within the lane or inability to stay in the lane, driving with one tire either on the outside or middle line, erratic speeds. "If you think you see a possible drunken driver," Bower said. "Report it by going to the nearest phone and calling 911."

Bower also encouraged citizens to not let their drunken friends or family members drive. "We also hope the alcohol businesses watch who they serve," he added.

Officers also will be looking to see if motorists are wearing seat belts during their patrols and checks.

Very early Friday, state police responded to a fatal accident on County Road EO-28 about seven mile south of Highway 70 at Picacho. Mauro Lerma, 17, was killed

when the vehicle his brother Rene Lerma was driving overturned. Police said alcohol was a factor in the accident. Rene Lerma was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso where he was treated, then arrested.

The second fatality resulted from a two vehicle head-on wreck occurred at 5:28 p.m. at mile marker 287 on Highway 70 (near Glencoe). Yvette Marquez, 23, Deming was

a pickup. The driver of the pickup, 49 year old David Vega, was arrested by Carrizozo police for child abuse and failure to use child restraints.

According to Carrizozo Police Chief Angelo Vega, the seven year old is listed in stable condition at UNM Hospital in Albuquerque suffering from injuries he sustained when he fell from the back of

About 8 p.m. Sunday, May 31, Carrizozo police officer Duane Vinso responded to a report of an accident on 17th Street and E. Ave. According to Vinso's report, David Vega was driving his pickup truck on E. Ave. with the seven year old child sitting on a metal tool box in the back of the truck with his feet hanging outside the bed of the truck. When Vega turned left onto 17th Street the child fell off the box and onto the roadway.

Carrizozo ambulance transported the child to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso. The child was later flown to UNM hospital in Albuquerque because of the severity of his head injury.

Based on the investigation, officer Vinso turned the case in to Assistant District Attorney Viola Rhodes who approved the charges of child abuse and failure to use child restraint. David Vega was charged and arrested on a warrant signed by Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. and was booked into the Lincoln

Ruidoso Approves \$23 Million Budget

Village of Ruidoso is in good financial shape, despite predictions of big losses in gross receipt tax revenues.

Ruidoso village council on May 26 approved the 1998-99 preliminary budget with total expenditures of \$23,419,902 and revenues of \$21,833,109 for all funds.

Gross receipt taxes make up about 54.8 percent, the largest source of revenue. But gross receipt tax revenues are hard to project, said Ruidoso village manager Alan Briley during the preliminary budget public hearing on May 26. He said the village is estimating about \$6.3 million in gross receipts for the next fiscal year. About \$325,000 of the estimated gross receipt tax revenues are one time revenues from the highway and airport projects.

Other revenues come from property tax, intergovernmental revenues/grants, licenses and permits, sales and services, and a variety of other sources such as payment-in-lieu of property taxes, etc.

Briley said so far this fiscal year (that ends June 30), the village has collected \$6.4 million in gross receipts tax revenues. But the village financial office estimated revenues for the upcoming fiscal year lower than last year because of the loss of Wal Mart.

On the spending side, the police department uses 31.7 percent of the general fund budget. Streets come next using 22.5 percent, followed by the fire department at 12 percent, library 5.4 percent and others.

Total revenues for the restricted and unrestricted funds in the 1998-99 fiscal year preliminary budget are estimated to be \$23,419,902. Unrestricted Use Funds are the General Fund that includes Legislative, Contract Service Dept., Executive, Judicial, Finance, City Hall, Police, Police Grants, Fire, Civil Preparedness, Planning, Street, Senior Citizens, RSVP, Library; Utility Fund of Water billing, water, sewer; airport fund; recreation for swimming pool and parks; solid waste; merit and liability fund for employees; convention center. Estimated revenues for the unrestricted fund are \$11,203,209, estimated expenditures are \$12,401,563. To make up the difference between revenues and expenditures, the village will transfer \$709,553 from the restricted funds and about \$200,000 from the ending cash balance from the 1997-98 fiscal year. With the transfers, the estimated unrestricted funds ending cash balance is \$2,065,834.

Restricted funds include cemetery, 1/8th gross receipt for capital improvements, state fire funds, emergency medical service, law enforcement protection funds, traffic safety fees, special gas tax, correction fees, lodgers tax, scenic byways grant, Conven-

tion Visitors Bureau, lodgers tax funds, economic development, capital equipment replacement, taxes/payable fund, regional waste water treatment plant, regional waste water loan reserve, special library, water meter trust, special donations, crime laboratory trust, bail bond trust; Capital Improvements funds—1995 bond issue projects, Main Street, Airport improvements, Highway 48 project, Grindstone Treatment plant, Billy the Kid Loop grant, crosswinds runway at airport, relocate fire station; debt service funds—1/2 percent gross receipts fund, revenue bond and interest fund, supplement gross receipts, general obligation debt service fund, sewer assessment fund, bond required reserve fund. Restricted fund can only be spent for the specific purpose.

In the new fiscal year, police personnel will get compensated for the certification after one year on the force. Currently an officer must serve two years after certification before getting the additional compensation. Also the village is seeking to enter the Public Employee Retirement Act (PERA) Plan III under which the village pays 18.5 percent of the officer's salary to PERA and officers can retire after 20 years, instead of 25 years. Police personnel

will continue to pay only seven percent of their salaries into PERA. The plan will cost the village about \$43,000.

Briley said the new police plans are intended to help recruit and retain officers. "The longer we keep officers, the better served the community," Briley said. "And we have higher quality and happier officers."

"It's difficult to be a police officer for an extended time," Briley added.

To cover the cost of the new police plans, the village will not fill all the positions opened by the retirement of three officers this year. Instead the village will not replace one position, and will fill one position from personnel within the department, leaving a lower paid position

Jail Is On Agenda

The Lincoln County Commissioners have a full agenda for their meeting tomorrow with the county detention center being listed several different times. We heard the commissioners were going to try to relocate the county jail soon after the primary election but three days? One of the main agenda items is the proposed contract for consultant/professional services regarding proposed plans for a new detention center. We wonder if the decision has already been made by some of the commissioners as to where the new detention center will be located. It would be nice if these important county business items would be discussed in open session with the public in attendance instead of being decided between cronies in private.

The reason the commissioners are meeting on Friday is because the commission must canvas the votes within three days after the election. Maybe some of the commissioners are using the three day limit for the canvas as a guideline for other county business, but the jail issue does not have to be rushed through in three days. Could it be that some of the commissioners want to move the county jail before the end of the year? Could it be that someone might benefit if the location for a new jail is determined immediately? Could it be that the promises made by the commission are now forgotten?

Local people may want to attend the commission meeting tomorrow because there are several different items pertaining to the detention center. Otero County Commissioner Richard Zierlein and Otero County Detention center administrator Vick Jenkins will speak of detention matters. The next listed agenda item about the detention center is consideration of bids. The county received two proposals for operations and management of the county jail, one from Correctional Systems Inc. (CSI) and one from GRW Corporation. The next agenda item is Lincoln County Detention Center Administrator and includes job descriptions from Lincoln, Otero, San Juan, Sierra, and San Miguel counties as well as a generic job description from the New Mexico Association of Counties. There is no explanation as to why the job descriptions are attached. The last detention center agenda item is Wayland Hill.

The majority of the people want the Lincoln County Detention Center to remain in Carrizozo instead of being located in Ruidoso but some of the commissioners are ignoring what the people want. Some of the commissioners seem to forget they are supposed to be representing the people instead of private interests. Some of the commissioners seem to believe they have the right to do what they want individually instead of what is best for the county. Some of the commissioners seem to be trying to rush through building a new jail instead of holding public hearings as they promised to do.

Tomorrow could be interesting because some commissioners may push through actions that will be detrimental for the county. Tomorrow could be interesting because some commissioners may be more interested in helping boost private business instead of doing what county residents want. Tomorrow could be interesting because some commissioners may use their power not for the good of everyone but for a select few. Tomorrow could be interesting because some commissioners may ignore the job they should do.

The Lincoln County Detention Center is important not only to the commissioners but to every county resident and every taxpayer. The people will pay for the detention center and they deserve to be heard. Please listen to the people. The proposed plans for a new detention center don't have to be pushed through in three days.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE: Thirty years ago, the opening scene of "2001: A Space Odyssey," depicting passenger travel in space, seemed realistic.

In 1968, when the movie hit theaters, we were in the midst of an explosion in space exploration. In the seven years since Pres. Kennedy told the world we'd have a manned lunar landing by the end of the decade, we had moved rapidly through the Mercury and Gemini programs and were only a year away from Neil Armstrong's and Buzz Aldrin's first footprints on the moon. It wasn't hard to believe that in another 33 years, commercial space travel would be merely an extension of airline travel.

What would have been incomprehensible at the time was that we were only three years away from Jack Schmitt's and Gene Cernan's last footprints on the moon — for 25 years, at least. We passed that point last December and there's no telling how many more Decembers will pass before we set foot there again.

But some people do have plans for space tourism by 2001, and for same-day global package deliveries and for less expensive satellite launchings. A St. Louis foundation is offering a \$10 million prize to the first private team that successfully sends a spaceship with three adults on board to 62 miles in altitude and back two times in two weeks. It expects to have a winner in 2001.

Sixteen teams have entered the competition, 12 of them American. The Stanford Alumni Association already is selling tickets for a Dec. 1, 2001 flight. The aerospace industry has formed a Space Transportation Association of private research groups interested in reusable space vehicles. NASA plans to open an office of space travel and tourism later this year to help entrepreneurs.

And where does New Mexico fit into all this? Remember back when we thought we'd be the center of commercial space travel activity? Casey Luna was lieutenant governor at the time. He was aggressively pushing New Mexico into the space age when he decided to accelerate his gubernatorial timetable and ended his political career in the process.

Luna didn't get much help from Gov. Bruce King. There was hope when young, dynamic businessman Gary Johnson was elected governor that he would make New Mex-

ico the transportation hub for space travel. That year saw the biggest push we've had for a Southern New Mexico spaceport. Aerospace industry representatives came to the 1995 Legislature saying they were ready to start testing reusable launch vehicles and would do it in New Mexico if the state showed an interest in working with them to build a commercial facility.

Gov. Johnson listened. So did legislative leaders. The result was a big thud. The firms were told to build their space vehicles, have them work, and come back when they are ready to fly them out of New Mexico. We have advantages over any other state in location, altitude, flight trajectories, dry climate, sparse population nearby, and the technical support of three research universities, two national labs, and three federal research facilities.

But New Mexico doesn't have enough advantages to sit back and wait for aerospace firms to come to us when other

states are aggressively pursuing them. There has been little pursuit on our part, aggressive or not, and scant interest. Despite intense lobbying from Las Cruces area groups and hard work by Rep. Bill Porter and Sen. Lee Ravson, the 1998 Legislature appropriated less money for the spaceport effort than the paltry amount budgeted for this year. And it closed the Office of Space Commercialization.

The death knell for the spaceport hasn't been sounded yet, but it will take a near-miracle to save it. As long as the governor and top House and Senate leaders are all from Albuquerque, southern New Mexico can forget about help. All governor candidates are from the north. Even if Republicans win control of the House, all three of their current leaders are from Albuquerque.

Oh well, back to being a third-world nation and letting others decide our future.

Attn: Lincoln County Residents, Illegal Dumping Is A PROBLEM!

EDITOR: My name is Greg Good, and I live off Hwy. 70 in Glencoe (12 miles East of Ruidoso Downs). I have lived here for over two years now and work in the Ruidoso area doing odd jobs. Many people from the area ask me to remove pine needles, branches, etc. from their yards. These people that call me are frustrated with Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority and its practices. I agree with them! LCSWA has made it so expensive to discard anything other than what is under your kitchen sink, let's face it, there is other debris that needs to be discarded at a reasonable price.

I have been taking pine needles, branches, and lumber from my customers. I pile them in my front yard, safely, and burn the pile two to four times a month. There are guide lines that need to be followed for this to be legal. Everything in the pile must be burnable and non-hazardous for quality air standards, and the wind must be below five miles per hour and blowing away from the highway. The fire must be contained and monitored. Every time a person out in the country makes a burn the Sheriff must be contacted. I abided by those simple rules.

On April 27, 1998 I observed two men in a white Chevy 4x4 looking at my burn pile. I turned around and asked them if they wanted some lumber that I was going to burn later that day and the driver turned and rudely stated that I needed to take the pile to Sierra Contracting to dispose of it because I was in violation of a County ordinance. One person also informed me that the EPA was aware of my fires and was also going to be involved shortly. At this point I noticed the LCSWA patch on the passenger's shirt. I asked if it would be alright if I burned once more and he grinned and said no. The two people in the truck drove from my property towards Ruidoso. I followed them out that way. As I drove by I observed them pulling into Monroy Montes (county commissioner) fruit stand off Hwy. 70.

My wife and I drove into Ruidoso that day to pick up two loads of branches from a property that was clearing their land for a new home. I have a 16-foot trailer that I use to haul the branches to my property. I hauled the branches for \$75.00 a load (a very good price, Sierra Contracting wants \$6.00 per cubic yard to dump, then they BURN it), to my property. When I hauled the last load home I called the Sheriff's Department and asked them if it was legal to burn, they said go ahead, we have no problem and know of no ordinance against you burning.

As soon as I lit the fire the white Chevy pickup mysteriously appeared again. One man was driving the pickup,

taking pictures of my fire, walking on my property and taking pictures of some mattresses that I had also hauled off. My wife went out to the truck and asked what he was doing. He stated he was doing his job and that it was illegal to burn asbestos. He gave my wife his LCSWA business card at this point. I have no idea where he came up with this bunch. I passed a 40-hour Hazwoper training course and when I spoke with Bill Huber (EPA) the next day, he laughed, asbestos does not burn and there surely is no hazardous waste in branches, pine needles, or lumber.

The very next day I put my "FREE" sign on my trailer towards Hwy. 70 and it was amazing how fast the stuff (mattresses and chairs) disappeared. In other words they were trying to accuse me of burning non-burnable materials. I've got to tell you the truth about these characters, they were looking at my pile as though I had STOLE MONEY OUT OF THEIR POCKETS and they were not happy about it at all. As far as I am concerned the only thing that LCSWA is failing to do properly is wear masks.

Did any of you read the Lincoln County News May 21st issue? Now our 5th District County Commissioner wants to give LCSWA the right to issue citations to citizens who fail to comply with Ordinance No. 1985-3, 1985-9, and 1990-1 (31 pages), drive around Lincoln County and observe citizens accumulating waste on their property because it is too expensive to get rid of. Please read that article and understand the type of money that LCSWA will generate over the threat of a legally binding citation with fines. The Sheriff's Department doesn't want to become the "Waste Police", but LCSWA sure does.

Monroy Montes has asked for a public hearing on June 5th to consider a new consolidated solid waste ordinance to "BEEF UP THE ORDINANCES". It is already 31 pages long and simply adds to our County's waste problem and LCSWA's gain. These people involved want to make it impossible for branches, pine needles, lumber and other burnable materials to be disposed of in a resident manner. LCSWA views this as theirs and they intend to make it impossible for anyone else to get in on their racket. The County residents are the ones who pay in the long run, there are rational alternatives to this problem, but if they succeed in "BEEF UP THE ORDINANCES", LCSWA wins and you lose!

There is already an ordinance that needs to be changed, in the favor of the people not big business. We vote the people in and we can vote them out, take a stand at election time. I will.

Karen Morris who got 726 votes. Both were unopposed in the primary.

For 12th Judicial District Judge Division 1, attorney Patricia S. Ortiz won the Democratic candidacy by receiving a total of 2,145 votes to opponent Don Dutton's 1,669. The 12th Judicial District includes all of Lincoln and Otero Counties. In Lincoln County, Dutton got 497 votes and Ortiz got 364 which gave Dutton a moment of hope during election night before he got the final vote tallies from Otero County.

In November Ortiz will run against sitting Republican judge Karen Parsons who was appointed to the position by Governor Gary Johnson after her father, Richard Parsons, retired shortly after he was elected in 1996. Parsons received 1,170 votes in Lincoln County and 4,133 votes district wide.

In the race for the U.S. Congressional District 2 Democrat E. Shirley Baca received 75 percent or 613 votes to opponent Mary Jane Garcia's 25 percent or 204 votes. Baca won the candidacy district wide (17 counties) with 29,170 votes, according information from the secretary of state's office on Wednesday. Opponent Mary Jane Garcia got 16,255 votes district wide.

All state or district wide tallies from the secretary of state office are unofficial until June 23.

Baca will challenge 10-term incumbent Republican Joe Skeen who received 1,257 votes in Lincoln County and got 23,419 district wide. Baca ran against Skeen in 1996 and received 45 percent of that vote, the highest amount any Democratic candidate has earned against Skeen.

Lincoln County Democrats cast 940 votes in the governor's race, the most for any one race on the Democratic ticket. Democrats chose Martin Chavez as their candidate for governor with 42.6 percent or 400 votes. State wide Chavez got 80,725 votes.

Gary King got 41.3 percent or 388 votes in Lincoln County and 51,474 votes statewide. Jerry Apodaca got 90 votes in Lincoln County and 15,078 votes statewide. Ben Chavez got 10 votes in Lincoln County and 4,071 votes statewide, Reese P. Fullerton got 28 votes in Lincoln County and 5,666 statewide, Robert E. Vigil got 24 in the county and 10,279 statewide, and write-in Frances Salas got no votes in Lincoln County 29 votes statewide.

Chaves will face incumbent Republican governor Gary Johnson and Green candidate

George Smith in the November election. Johnson got 1,035 votes in Lincoln County and 64,186 votes statewide. Smith received no votes in Lincoln County and 40 votes statewide.

County Democrats chose Diane D. Denish as their Democratic Lt. Governor's candidate with 659 votes over Stephanie Gonzales who got 238 votes. Denish won the state-wide race with 82,027 votes to Gonzales' 77,458. Incumbent Republican Lt. Governor Walter Bradley had no opposition in the primary and got 1,074 votes in Lincoln County and 64,700 votes statewide. Green write-in candidates Alexandra Lorraine and Marcia Carter got no votes in Lincoln County and 40 and 70 votes respectively statewide.

County Democrats chose former secretary of state Rebecca Vigil-Giron as their candidate with 371 votes. Giron won statewide with 77,600 votes. Frances Porterfield got 336 votes in Lincoln County and 43,634 statewide, and Letitia L. Montoya got 137 votes in the county and 31,491 statewide. Republican secretary of state candidate Dianna Duran got 1,109 votes from Lincoln County and 63,384 votes statewide. Green candidate Steve E. Cabiedes got one vote in the county and 742 statewide.

For State Auditor, Lincoln County Democrats did not choose state-wide favorite Domingo P. Martinez. Instead, Lincoln County democrats gave Dirk E. Houtman 470 votes and Domingo P. Martinez 349 votes. Martinez however won the Democrat candidacy with 90,038 votes statewide. Houtman received 55,834 votes statewide.

There is no Republican candidate for state auditor, but Martinez will have to run against Green candidate Richard A. Haley Jr. who got one vote in Lincoln County and 755 votes statewide.

Democrat treasurer candidate Michael Montoya got 715 votes in Lincoln County and 126,089 votes statewide. There were no Republican or Green candidates in the race.

For Attorney General, Lincoln County democrats gave Patricia A. Madrid 284 votes, statewide she got 64,562 votes to win the democratic candidacy. Democratic candidates Patrick Apodaca got 158 votes in Lincoln County and 35,571 votes statewide, Stuart M. Bluestone got 236 votes in Lincoln County and 32,751 votes statewide, Marian Matthews got 194 in the county and 26,511 statewide. Ma-

drid will run against Republican David C. Iglesias who got 998 votes in Lincoln County and 60,410 statewide and Green John D. McCall who got one vote in Lincoln County and 757 votes statewide.

Democrats overwhelmingly endorsed incumbent commissioner of Public Lands Ray Powell Jr. who received 723 votes in Lincoln County and 127,942 votes statewide. Powell will run against Green Samuel Hitt who got one vote in Lincoln County and 711 statewide.

Lincoln County Democrats gave Justice of the Supreme Court candidate Dan A. McKinnon, III 492 votes to Petra J. Maes 317 votes. But state wide Maes got 87,238 votes to McKinnon's 61,292.

Maes will run against Republican candidate Robert Scott who received 1,056 votes in Lincoln County and 62,725 statewide.

In State Representative District 56, which includes all of Lincoln County, parts of Chaves and Otero Counties, democrats in Lincoln County gave Jeni F. Alexander 706 votes and she received 1,156 district wide. Republicans in Lincoln County gave incumbent Dub Williams 1,215 votes and he received 1,745 votes district wide.

For Public Regulation Commission District 5, Democrats in Lincoln County gave Steven Sage 499 votes and Jack L. Valencia 274 votes. District wide, Valencia received 15,254 votes and Sage received 13,987 votes. Republican Public Regulation Commission District 5 candidate Jerry Ritter Jr. received 958 votes in Lincoln County and 3,969 votes district wide.

For 12th Judicial District Judge Division I, unopposed Republican Jerry H. Ritter Jr. received 958 votes in Lincoln County and 4,133 votes in the judicial district (Lincoln and Otero Counties). There is no Democratic candidate for the position.

Lincoln County results are not official until the canvass of the primary vote is approved by the Lincoln County Commissioners during the regular meeting Friday.

LCSWA Approves \$2.3 Million Budget

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board approved its 1998-99 fiscal year budget at the regular May 19 meeting.

Next year LCSWA estimates total revenues of \$2,331,962 and total expenditures of \$2,380,165, with a required 1/12th reserve of \$181,758. The preliminary budget includes a five percent

salary increase for all LCSWA employees. It also includes revenues and expenditures for the Ruidoso collections. However, Ruidoso is planning to take over its own trash collections beginning September 1.

LCSWA manager Jerry Wright said the revenue and expenditures for the Ruidoso trash collections were left in the budget for now. "We had to go this route to (apply for a loan) from the Finance Authority," Wright told the board at its meeting in Ruidoso Downs. When Ruidoso begins its own collection, LCSWA will adjust the budget, Wright added.

An estimated \$1,569,788 in revenues in the general operating fund come from the trash collection fees: from Ruidoso residential - \$608,391, County of Lincoln residents - \$223,939, commercial accounts - \$430,008, rental of roll off containers - \$118,306, and collection fees from Captain residents - \$63,600, Ruidoso Downs residents - \$60,070, Carrizozo residents - \$48,928, Corona residents - \$14,748 and special pickup fees of \$1,899.

An estimated \$57,235 in revenues will come from recycling revenues from aluminum, copper, metal, cardboard, newspaper, paper and plastic sales. Wright said revenues from recycling are "not bad" and he wished that all the cardboard that went into the dumpsters and through the transfer station would go through the recycling center because cardboard has a high value. The budget provides expenditures of \$25,525 to purchase aluminum from citizens. Ruidoso LCSWA member Robert Donaldson said LCSWA should not lose money on the aluminum sales. LCSWA currently buys aluminum for 35 cents a pound and sells it for 42 cents a pound. The preliminary budget shows a \$15,000 increase in aluminum purchases. Wright said this is because the private aluminum buyer is being "squeezed out of his place" in Ruidoso Downs.

Other revenue comes from a grant of \$199,053 which all will be used for equipment and modifications.

Miscellaneous revenue of \$5,580 and a transfer of \$75,000 from the environmental gross receipt tax fund total revenues of \$1,706,603 for the General Fund.

LCSWA member from Captain Debra Ingle questioned why so much overtime was figured (\$84,504, an increase of \$21,000 from this current budget year). Wright said special bear patrols, clean-ups and taking on the race track make overtime hard to avoid. "Summer is a loaded time for overtime," Wright said.

LCSWA board members are budgeted \$3,000 for meeting expenses, up from \$1,433 this year and travel and schools went up to \$700 from \$434 this year.

The preliminary budget will be adjusted after the end of the current fiscal year, June 30, when the actual ending cash balance from the previous fiscal year are tallied.

In other business, LCSWA: -Accepted a grant to construct an expanded transfer/collection system and named LCSWA chairman Joe Hayhurst as official grantee representative and Jerry Wright was official grantee signatory authority.

-Authorized expenditure of \$6,476 of solid waste facility grant money for removal of old tires from the closed construction landfill near Captain by Southwest Tire Processors of Socorro, the only private enterprise that removes old tires.

-Heard Wright report on his meeting with the Lincoln

County Commission about enforcing solid waste ordinances in the county. Wright said sheriff Tom Sullivan also agreed to school his deputies on solid waste rules.

-Heard from citizen Fran Hayes who was concerned about the mess at the Gavilan Transfer station. Wright said the loose trash is the result of the new trailers that do not fit into the compactor. Donaldson said Ruidoso is in the process of getting the transfer station fenced to contain the trash. Ruidoso will take over the transfer station when it begins its own collections in September.

-Heard Carrizozo member Cynthia Morales report that the roll off container in Carrizozo is "looking bad" and citizens are finding the container closed even when the container isn't full. Wright said the roll off container should be open eight hours on Saturdays or until it is full. Morales said citizens have seen trucks and trailers dumping trash at the roll off site during the week when it is supposed to be closed. Wright said the locks need to be changed to the container site because Carrizozo school was given keys to the gate. But Morales said it wasn't the school using the site, rather someone was giving out the key. Wright said by law LCSWA must have someone at the site for dumping, but he said he was willing to work with the town to train a town employee to man the site.

-Heard Ingle say she has problems with LCSWA employees getting overtime "to be sitting somewhere else." "Are they allowed to take two hour lunch breaks?" Ingle asked. Wright said they are not, and he also showed a

brochure for a device that tracks via satellite, vehicles. The device costs \$1,400 for each vehicle. Ingle said LCSWA could save that much in overtime alone.

-Heard a complaint from an Upper Canyon resident that the bear locks on

dumpsters are "a mess" and people are not using the locks. Wright said two of the collection trucks damage the locks. "The bears are already a problem," Wright said. "The most bears in four years, and the largest bear I've ever seen in my years here."

open.

Funds were also included in the budget for a proposed employee compensation plan. In 1997, the village had a study done to compare the village work force with market comparables and regional comparables. Because the village is in the middle of negotiations on wages with the two union groups, salaries were not adjusted in the preliminary budget. If terms are agreed upon, money to cover raises will be available in the Merit and Liability fund under the general fund.

In the general fund, revenues exceed expenditures, with \$6,454,657 in revenues and \$5,109,610 in expenditures, leaving an ending cash balance of \$1,526,108. The ending cash balance meets the state required 1/12th reserve of \$425,801. Ruidoso also has a fiscal policy to set aside an additional reserve with enough funds needed for one month of operation without any incoming revenue. The budget also includes a reserve for the Main Street capital infrastructure project and a reserve for the Regional Waste Water Treatment Plant.

For both unrestricted and restricted funds, the village estimates an ending cash balance of \$7,854,769. "With this ending cash balance, the village is in good financial shape," Briley said. "The preliminary budget

revenues include a one percent increase in the lodgers taxes. The council is in the process of raising the lodgers tax to fund a special events facilitator. The budget also includes revenues from solid waste collection, figured at current trash rates. Briley said there have been discussions about raising the solid waste rates, but that was not figured into the budget.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said he and the council were very involved with the budget process. "I congratulate you on a good job," Donaldson told staff.

Councilor Bill Chance said the council conducted three workshops and spent time with staff to develop the budget. "My concern is only one or two from the public showed up (at the budget meetings)," Chance said. "That's the time to come up and say you don't like how we're spending the village's money. Since there is no one here to voice concern, it's up to us."

With that comment, councilor Leon Eggleston moved to adopt the preliminary budget. Citizen Ross Dingman complimented village staff for "an extraordinarily responsible fiscal budget."


