

Republicans Win Big In Tuesday Election

Republican incumbents, from the governor's office, to the Lincoln County Courthouse, retained their positions Tuesday, November 3.

More than 50 percent of the eligible voters in Lincoln County either went to the polls on Tuesday, early voted, or cast absentee ballots.

Absentee votes tipped the balance for the closest race in the county—between incumbent District 2 Lincoln County Commissioner L. Ray Nunley

and opponent Charles (Chay) Rennick. The first returns from precincts in that district showed Nunley ahead only one vote.

During the night, Nunley and his wife Mary Lee anxiously watched the returns on the computer screens in the county treasurer's office. Nunley occasionally joked about his hair getting whiter as numbers showed margins too close for his comfort.

When the absentee vote totals finally came into the

clerk's office after 8:30 p.m. Nunley's margin over Rennick widened to 23 votes. After all votes were counted, Nunley had 575 and Rennick 550.

This election marked the largest number of absentee ballots ever cast in Lincoln County. Of the 1,347 absentee ballots sent to persons requesting them, 1,246 were returned and counted. 794 people cast early votes.

Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor said this year's absentees were the most ever

for Lincoln County. She also was pleased with the early voting turn out. Proctor said the absentee poll workers did a fantastic job and she was impressed with their professionalism. "If Bernalillo County had this board, they would not have the problems they do with the absentee ballots," Proctor said.

Proctor commended all precinct workers and the Lincoln County sheriff's posse members who volunteered their time and vehicles to

deliver the returns from each precinct to the Lincoln County clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo.

Proctor said there were seven in lieu of absentee paper ballots completed by persons who applied for absentee ballots, but who did not receive them before the election. Those sealed ballots will be opened, counted and their votes added to the totals during the canvass of the election results at the county commission meeting Friday.


There were so few in lieu of absentee ballots that the votes will not affect the Nunley-Rennick race, Proctor said.

New Post Office Construction In Ruidoso Causes Concerns

Many Ruidoso residents are concerned about the appearance of the new Ruidoso Post Office.

The post office, under construction on Mechem Drive near the convention center and the proposed high class hotel, is not required to follow the village landscaping rules and regulations. During the Ruidoso village council meeting Tuesday, October 27, mayor Robert Donaldson said he and village planning officer Cleatus Richards were to meet with the post office project manager to discuss landscaping at the new post office. "It was unfortunate we couldn't stop them before they did what they did," Donaldson said. All trees were removed from the post office site, contrary to the village regulations that require trees of certain size be left on the construction site.

During the Ruidoso Planning Commission meeting Tuesday, November 3, members discussed the post office situation. Richards said that the postal service is constructing the office on Mechem Drive, unlike the Alto post office that a private contractor

is building. "The postal service does not have to get permits from the village," Richards said.

The village also does not have power to require the postal service to get permits, submit a site or construction plan, or follow village regulations regarding landscaping and drainage. Richards said one time in the past he tried to "red tag" a re-roofing project on the post office on Sudderth Drive, and he was advised federal marshals would arrest him if he did not

remove it. "The (new post office) contractor has acquiesced to submitting general plans of the project," Richards continued. "But they flat have the right to totally ignore the village regulations."

Richards said he has worked with the post office architect for the last two to three months to get copies of the plans. He said he suggested to the architect if the village cannot get the copies,

Capitan School Plans Bond Issue Election

Citing the need for more classrooms and to create a safe campus environment in an orderly planned fashion, Capitan Board of Education voted to pursue a \$5,760,000 bond issue election on February 2, 1999.

During a special meeting Monday morning, school board members Tom Trost, Jack King, Freda McSwane and James Hobbs took the action after discussing the final version of the district 10-year Master Plan. The plan creates a safe campus by closing off the interior to vehicular traffic.

One reason the board decided to go with the \$5.7 million bond election now is it will put the district at 86 percent of its bonding capacity and thus eligible for additional funding from the state's critical capital outlay program. Also, the funding will provide enough to construct new classrooms, remodel and expand the cafeteria and kitchen, expand Cummins Gym and bring building up to code for the Americans With Disabilities Act (ADA). With bond funds, the district can also develop the campus site for safer access and student play areas, as shown in the Master Plan drafted by architect Greg Hicks. Hicks developed the Master Plan with input from a community/school task force,

community members, staff, students, parents and the school board.

If passed, the bond issue will provide funding for new parking south of the football field, two middle school additions, an elementary addition with six classrooms that will connect the existing elementary building to the current

administration building. Administration offices will be moved from the current building to allow it to be used for an elementary library and classrooms. A new administration building will be constructed east of the parking area at the VoAg building.



then the developer can create its own police and fire departments. Despite requests for them, the developer also has not advised the village whether it will submit site development posters (showing the site development plan).

The site of the new post office is at the intersection with the convention center drive and Mechem Drive. Because the site is lower than Mechem Drive, the developer is building it up 17 feet. However, the developer has not provided the village a drainage plan and indications. Richards said just because it is a federal project does not absolve the developer from liability if drainage from the site damages adjoining property.

Most complaints called into village hall about the project concern the cutting of all the trees from the site. Village regulations require some trees to be left on commercially developed lots. Richards said he and the mayor met with the contractor last week about the landscaping plan. Richards said contractor indicated a willingness to cooperate on the landscaping, but did not commit to anything. Richards said the contractor claimed all trees were cut and no landscaping is planned because of security reasons.

The developer plans to construct a 25 foot wall on the east side of the facility, next to the jogging path around the golf course. A planning commission member suggested planting ivy on the wall to soften its appearance.

A planning commission member said the problem is the public tends to blame the planning commission for the trees being cut down. She also said that the wall will probably end up with graffiti.

Another planning commission member asked how the village could allow the new facility to hook into the water and sewer without inspection. Richards said he was not sure the village has the option to deny service to the facility.

Village attorney John Underwood said a reason the plans for the new facility are not being made public is security.

Underwood suggested that if the post office construction becomes a problem, the village

should contact its U.S. congressman and senators. Discussion of the post office project is on the agenda of the next planning commission meeting on November 17.

Broken promise?

Are you happy with the results of the election? If not, you will have to wait another two years before another general election and some of the candidates on the ballot this time won't be there next time because some were elected for four years. Gov. Johnson was re-elected for another four year term, even after he promised four years ago that he would be a one term governor. When he won his first election four years ago he was only in office 11 days when he dropped the whammy on Lincoln County. Wonder what he will do for us January 11, 1999. It will be interesting waiting to find out.

Lincoln County retained most of the same officials. We do have one new county commissioner, but we knew that back in June when the incumbent lost the primary. The county commissioners will meet tomorrow for their regular meeting as well as to canvass the votes from Tuesday's election. The most interesting thing about the meeting tomorrow is that the agenda has 26 items, barely more than half the 45 agenda items for their last regular meeting. If the new county manager is responsible for the shorter agenda, we want to congratulate him. There is no need for meetings to last 10 hours.

Listed as an agenda is setting the meeting dates and locations for next year and for setting the holiday calendar. We would prefer the commissioners schedule two regular meetings a month instead of one a month and later holding a special meeting every week. The October 16 meeting lasted until after 7 p.m. We believe two meetings a month would be better because the meetings would not last all day and far into the evening. Long meetings are tiring and late in the day very little is accomplished other than disagreements.

Discussing county business and explaining to the public why certain actions are being taken is acceptable but there is no need for debates at county commission meetings about issues that will be decided at the state or federal level. Expressing an opinion as to how state legislators and congress should vote is quite different than some of the two or three hour speeches that have been made at the county commission meetings about state and federal matters.

Only the county commission can change the way the meetings have been conducted and we certainly hope the ones responsible will make the effort to do their duty as county commissioners and stop grandstanding. The majority of the agenda items for tomorrow can be handled quickly and efficiently and should be. Maybe the county commissioners could set time limits for personal orations and not let one person talk for hours about nothing important. It would help if all the commissioners would be prepared before the meeting by reading their packets and conduct county business that is listed on the agenda, not digress to petty bickering and griping.

Now that the elections are over there will be no need for the long campaign speeches and surprise announcements some people were making during the county commission meetings. Surprises are nice for birthdays but surprise announcements at meetings are out of place and should be eliminated. We hope the best surprise at the meeting tomorrow will be that everyone is agreeable and that the meeting doesn't last far into the evening. We'll keep you informed.

Even though our election predictions about two winners was 100 percent correct, the News sports editor doesn't have the same stats. His season record is now 78-42. Maybe this week his picks will be 100 percent and improve his season record. Picking winners of football games is different than predicting election winners because football is a fun game and politics can be very serious.

SANTA FE - How can our government remain strong if candidates run against it?

It was depressing the last several months to listen to not only challengers, but incumbents, talk about how bad government and politicians are. This is being written before we know the results of Tuesday's election, but it appears an anti-government stance is popular with voters.

Gov. Gary Johnson dislikes government so much he claims not to be a politician even after four years in office. In fact, Johnson is a great politician, but a different kind. If his claims of being an outsider, are correct. But he's a superb politician who plays the outsider role to perfection to show the average voter he's one of them.

Public service is no longer seen by the public as a noble calling. Sure, there are public servants who aren't noble, but politics and government can't be dirty words in a democracy, because democracies depend on public support and participation. Candidates are becoming harder to find and voter turnout decreases every year.

Rep. Bill Redmond has been the worst politician basher. Even in his first ad, in which he talked about campaign promises he had kept, he prefaced his remarks with: "Unlike most politicians..." His last ad ended with: "There already are enough liars in Washington." As a former preacher, Redmond should know the value of uplifting discourse. As a former counselor, he should know the harm done by negative images.

Redmond called his opponent Tom Udall a politician who will run for anything, citing two previous congressional efforts by Udall. Perhaps Redmond should have thought first about his U.S. House colleague, Rep. Joe Skeen, who ran for lieutenant governor once and governor twice before being elected to Congress. Skeen has been known to cheer up unsuccessful Republicans by telling them to keep at it and recounting the number of times he has lost in his political career. It is more than three times.

Calling their incumbent opponents "career politicians" or "professional politicians" was a favorite of several Republican challengers this year, including Johnson, Redmond and Sally Mayer, House Speaker Raymond Sanchez's challenger. Rep. Joe Skeen's challenger, Democrat E. Shirley Baca, burned up my fax with news releases the past four months, but I never saw one accusing Skeen of being a career politician even

though he has held public office much longer than Chavez, Udall or Sanchez.

These folks evidently classify Skeen, who served in the state Senate for many years before moving to Congress, and Pete Domenici, who was on the old Albuquerque City Commission before going to the U.S. Senate, in the category of dedicated public servants. That's true, but the category isn't just for Republicans.

Democrats don't help their perception as professional politicians when they stay in office too long. The lengthy reigns of legislative leaders Raymond Sanchez and Mannv Aragon hurt the candidacy of Martin Chavez this year. He was identified too closely with Sanchez and Aragon for the comfort of many voters.

Sanchez wanted to run for governor this year, as he has for a long time. But his polling never indicated he had a shot. He won't have a chance as long as he is House speaker. Sanchez must separate himself from the Legislature and his identification with the much more liberal Aragon.

The two aren't close but that doesn't matter because they are perceived that way.

Aragon never will leave the Senate to run for higher office. His brand of politics is right for the district he serves, but it won't get him elected statewide. The only way he will leave is for a job offer he can't refuse.

Sanchez is the longest-serving House speaker in the history of the state. Aragon will hold the record for Senate presidents pro tem at the of his term in 2000. Until Aragon became pro tem the most person in the Senate was the majority leader, and they seldom stayed long.

Board president Trost said the main concerns were additional classrooms and safety. McSwane said the district "never dreamed" of such tremendous growth 10 years ago and she wanted to look to the future. "I don't want to continually ask for bond issues," she said. "We should ask once and do what we need to do for the future."

Board members agreed that interest rates now are the best in years, and the cost of construction will only go up in the future. McSwane said just the classroom additions are estimated to cost \$4.1 million.

King asked how they as board members can justify to the public that the district needs more classroom space when the buildings are not full now. "How are we going to sell this to the people?" he asked. School superintendent Diana Billingsley said that many high school age children in the Alto area go to Ruidoso High School because it offers more programs. If Capitan High School has more room it also could offer more programs and variety of classes, she said.

As for the elementary, Billingsley said many families bring their younger children to Capitan because of the small class sizes. But the elementary school is out of space and cannot continue to offer the small classes unless additional classrooms are built. McSwane said during her time on the board she has been committed to keeping the smaller classes in the elementary grades and she plans to continue to support that. Hobbs said that studies show that students learn better in a small classroom environment.

The main safety issue is the vehicular traffic on campus.

To eliminate the traffic, Hicks designed a bus drop off area for middle and high school students south of the middle school accessed by a loop drive coming from Yard Road. A parent drop off area is designed in the high school parking lot, west of the middle school. High school student traffic will have access to the paved parking lot from Yard Road that is to be widened and paved from Highway 380 to Highway 48. Staff parking will be located at the west end of the high school and accessed from Highway 380.

Additional elementary parking will be constructed along Forest Street east of the elementary building and football field. A ticket booth will be installed on the east side of the football field. Buses will drop off elementary students in front of the building on Forest Street.

During discussion, board members and some in the audience discussed how the district can successfully present the bond issue to the public. It was suggested the district obtain three-dimensional models or posters of the planned projects and information boards, then show them at civic organization meetings.

The information could also be shown to parents during half time of ball games or any other gathering. It was also suggested 3-D renderings of the proposed projects be placed at Alto Country Club or the new Alto Post Office when completed for property owners to see.

King said that to pursue the \$5.7 million bond issue to complete the site development and additions as shown on the Master Plan is a smart business move because of the low interest rates. "Financially this is the best time," King said. "But we have to show the need."

Billingsley was to contact Al Clemmons, bonding agent, who will prepare and present a resolution for the bond issue election at the Thursday, November 5, board meeting. The board must formally approve the bond issue election resolution for it to be included on the ballot of the February 2 election for three board members.

Billingsley said Clemmons also will prepare information on the cost of the bond election to property owners. King requested the information include the tax cost for properties in a wide range of value.

A committee of Capitan school board members and a representative of the teachers association selected Ervin Aldaz as their recommendation to fill the vacancy on the school board.

After the special Capitan Board of Education meeting on Monday, board members Tom Trost and James Hobbs and Capitan Association of Classroom Teachers (CACT) member Cindy Jackson met as the selection committee to review and select the best of the applications received from persons interested in being on the board.

Six applicants were John T. McGrath III, Edward L. Vinson, Ervin Aldaz, Gary R. Tregembo, David M. Stevens and Debra L. Inglis. Stevens was disqualified because his residence is outside the district.

After reviewing the applications, all of which were considered excellent, two of the three of the committee selected Aldaz as their first choice. Aldaz served on the school board previously. Now he participates in school activities and substitute teaches.

Aldaz was administrator of Fort Stanton Training school and Hospital while it was in transition to a long term geriatric care facility and during its final days as a hospital after Gov. Gary Johnson or-

dered it closed in 1995. After the hospital was closed, Aldaz transferred within the department of Health to another position where he worked until he retired earlier this year.

At 6 p.m. tonight, (Thursday) November 5, the school board will consider the recommendation to appoint Aldaz to fill the vacancy on the board. The vacancy was created by the resignation of former board president Beverly Callaway.
