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From the new hospital administrator, to the district forest ranger, all spoke of great things in the future for Lincoln County and the communities in Lincoln County during the Community Update luncheon sponsored by The Ruidoso News on March

In addition to the luncheon, representatives from area municipalities, school districts and other service and governmental entities participated in round table forums held in an

informal setting to allow participants to hear presentations from each and to ask questions of the representatives.

Joan Zagone, a executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce was the moderator for the luncheon.

The Update was held in Ruidoso Convention Center.

Lincoln County Medical Center Leader For Quality Care

Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) new administrator Jim Gibson spoke about

his experience and his plans LCMC is also recognized as for the county owned facility. Gibson came to LCMC with 26 years experience of administration in mostly small "turn around" hospitals that needed tough changes. "This is the first hospital I won't have to do that," Gibson said. "I feel very fortunate to come to such a fine hospital (LCMC).

In 1998 about 93 percent of the patients in LCMC rated it as very satisfactory. Gibson said LCMC is a leader for quality care in the Presbyterian Health System (PHS).

one of the top 100 small hospitals in the United States. Gibson attributed much of quality to the support the hospital receives from the LCMC auxiliary. He praised the auxiliary for its donation of \$300,000 toward the new construction at LCMC and its promise of an additional **\$2**00,000.

"The toughest part of my job is how to continue the success of the past," Gibson continued.

This he said should be easy

because of the strong medical staff of 16 full time physicians of "great variety and quality." In Madisonville, Texas, where Gibson came from, the hospital had 45 beds with about 16 patients a day. At LCMC there is an average of eight patients a day with 16 doc-


"The strong leadership here has been fostered by the community," he said. "The future here looks good with a long affiliation with Presbyterian Health Systems."

Gibson also told of what he

saw as problems. First was his coming into a construction project already underway. The \$1.6 million project will add about 10,000 square feet to LCMC. He said he thought the project is well designed but the problem will be they will have to shut down some areas while the construction is underway. "The most difficult will be to shut down parts of the emergency room," he add-

Ruidoso Public Hearings Tuesday On Tossing Fine

Ruidoso relies on the surrounding forests to maintain its high profile as a resort community.

All it would take was one careless tossed lighted cigarette to start a fire that could destroy the forests that make Ruidoso what it is.

Knowing this, Ruidoso village council will hold a public hearing on April 13 on a proposed ordinance that would set a mandatory \$500 fine on

eigarette, eigar, match or other type of incendiary material from a vehicle. During their March 30 meeting, Ruidoso village council discussed the proposed ordinance proposed-by village chief of police Lanny Maddox The first proposed language would impose the mandatory fine for tossing out lighted materials only during times of high fire danger as declared by the U.S. Forest Service, during a

anyone caught throwing a lit period of high winds, as declared by the U.S. Weather Service.

Councilor Ron Anderson asked why have the prohibition only during times of high fire danger. He suggested making the ordinance effective at all times. The other councilors agreed and authorized staff to change the wording to make it an offense to throw out lighted materials at all times.

Solid Waste **Authority To Get New Truck**

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) is getting a new trash truck.

During a special meeting Tuesday, LCSWA members accepted a bid from Great Basin Southwest Trucks, Inc. of Albuquerque for a 33 yard Impac brand rear loading collection unit mounted on a Volvo truck chassis. The bid was \$133,652.

According to LCSWA manager Jerry Wright the truck chassis is identical to the Volvo on the new rear loader purchased earlier this year. The side load truck will be used on the county route that is about 850 to 1,000 miles a week, Wright said. The truck will go to Riverside on the east, serve the commercial accounts in the Carrizozo and Capitan areas, serve county residential containers, the containers at Salazar Canyon turn in Lincoln, and north to Pine Lodge, and the Corona compressor station.

LCSWA board members at their regular meeting in March had rejected the first round of bids for a side load truck, citing specifications were for too light of a truck. Also they desired to have a consistent fleet, with trucks of similar make and size.

Delivery on the new side load truck is 60 days. The truck will be financed with monthly payments that were budgeted.



TRINITY SITE SIGHTS. Visitors to the Trinity Site on White Sands Missile Range on Saturday, April 3 got a look at some of the items left behind from the world's first nuclear explosion on July 16, 1945. The 51,500 acre area of ground zero and the McDonald Ranch house where the plutonium core to the bomb was assembled was declared a national historic landmark in 1975. Adult and children visiting the site found the remains of Jumbo fun to explore. Jumbo was a 214 ton metal "bottle" built to contain the TNT explosion that scientists planned to preceed to nuclear blast. However, they decided not to first detonate the TNT so they put Jumbo under a steel tower about 800 yards from ground zero. The blast destroyed the tower, but Jumbo survived Intact. In 1946, the Army detonated eight 500-pound bombs inside jumbo causing the ends to blow off. Jumbo is now located at the entrance to ground zero. All that remains of ground zero is a pillar built of lava rock with a bronze plaque. Ground zero is double fenced. The explosion did not make much of a crater but the heat of the blast melted the sand into a glassy green substance called "Trinitite". The Army filled the depression left by the blast and the Nuclear Energy Commission took away most of the Trinitite.

future. Gibson said he is very familiar with hospital budgeting. He said the federal Reconciliation Act hit the hospital industry very hard by cutting back Medicare and Medicaid payments. He said LCMC was impacted \$637,929 in reduced reimbursements over three years. "That's a big chunk to absorb," he said.

But LCMC is well run, he continued, with reasonable prices so the federal cut backs are impacting the hospital less than in others. In response to a question, Gibson said most of the damage in the reimbursement cutbacks was to the home health industry. In Texas 400 home health services closed and more than 100 in New Mexico, "I think the federal lawmakers are beginning to realize they out too deep into the meat and bones," Gibson concluded.



Does the wind blow bere?

When you attend the Lincoln County Commissioners meeting next week, don't forget that this month they will be meeting in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. Don't know about you but it is difficult for us to keep track of when they meet where.

It is commendable that the county commissioners want people in all portions of the county to attend the meetings but what about the people in Corona? When the meeting locations were set there were no meetings set to be held in Corona. Maybe there should be.

Now that the county commission is meeting on Thursdays, we have only a tentative agenda the week before the meetings. There could be several things added. Be sure to contact the manager's office Wednesday for the complete agenda. There may be surprises.

Doing county business in different locations is confusing to the public. Several people complained about the last meeting being held in Ruldoso during the late spring blizzard-like conditions. The highway from Carrizozo to the Nogal turnoff was open but driving was hazardous that day because of blowing snow and white-outs. The people in Ruidoso didn't have that problem and they probably appreciated the meeting being held in Ruidoso during the storm.

Blowing snow caused problems last month and this month the dust is blowing. We don't know if the blustery weather is caused by politicians or not but there has to be some reason for the extra gusts we have been having. Windows on homes, business and vehicles were covered with brown dirt last week and again this week. We heard one person say she didn't do windows but she did use the hose to wash the accumulation of dirt off her windows because she couldn's see what her neighbors were doing. Another person had to scrape the dirt off the windshield of his vehicle before driving.

Listening to people complain about the wind makes us wonder how the pioneers survived. They didn't have the conveniences we have today. Can you imagine sleeping in a covered wagon while the wind is blowing as hard as it has been blowing recently? Can you imagine trying to hitch a team of mules to that covered wagon in this wind? The pioneers must have had a lot of grit, and we don't mean the kind that is blowing. Their stamina should be envied.

Ominous dust clouds weren't the only things those pioneers had to face when they made their trok across the United States. The hot, summer sun dried everything, even the few places they could get water. Today we have air conditioned vehicles. The pioneers were lucky if they could travel eight to 12 miles a day in their covered wagons. Today we can drive hundreds of miles in one day. Pioneers cooked their meals over a campfire in the wind or rain. Today we have modern kitchens complete with refrigerators, ranges and microwave ovens. Pioneers washed their clothes on a scrub boards in large iron kettles. Today we have automatic washing machines;

Washing dirt off windows today is simple compared to what the pioneers had to do. They had to feed their stock, cook their meals, and try to survive even when the wind was blowing. We think of the wind as a nuisance but the pioneers had to accept the wind until it stopped. We can try to stay inside when the wind is blowing but the pioneers were living outside where the wind was blowing.

Nuisances must be endured at times, whether it is the wind or the blowing snow or sudden rains. Other nuisances will be endured, such as not knowing where the county commissioners will meet when, but most Lincoln County residents will endure and some will be at the county commission meeting next Thursday in Carrizozo:

SANTA FE Gov. Gary Johnson's deadline for signing or vetoing bills arrives on

Most governors get all their bill signings done by noon on the 20th day following a legis-lative session since legislative days begin and end at noon, even though the law doesn't mention legislative days. There isn't much problem with a governor vetoing a bill after noon on April 9, because any bill not signed by the deadline is automatically vetoed anyway. The process is popularly known as a pocket veto.

Big Ed Mechem used the pocket veto frequently when he was governor in the 1950s. He figured a good amount of the legislation sent to him wasn't even worth reading. Gov. Johnson might use the pocket veto more often this year because of his irritation

year because of his irritation with not getting many bills until late. Reading clerks must check every bill carefully to be certain the official copy that goes to the governor has no mistakes.

The problem this time, however, was that House Speaker Raymond Sanchez, who must sign all bills was out of town for a few days and didn't stay current with his signing duties. This isn't the first time the presiding officer of the House or Senate has left towir House or Senate has left towing briefly following a legislative session, but Gov. Johnson may have wanted to get back at critics who faulted him in the past for going skiing instead of studying bills.

If the governor vetoes the General Appropriations Act as promised, a special session is a certainty. Otherwise government comes to a halt on July 1, the beginning of the state's new fiscal year. Johnson has threatened to do just that, although a look at how much trouble Congress got itself into for shutting down the federal government a few years ago should make anyone think seriously about such action.

Johnson's disdain for government might be consistent with a shutdown, but he would quickly find that his friends in business depend as much on government as any-one else. And then there is the one else. And then there is the problem about what we do without state cops and prison guards. One stopgap solution is a continuing resolution authorizing extended spending at the same level. Congress employs it often. Republican state legislative leaders suggested it but Democrat leaders. don't like the idea because the governor wouldn't have to come to terms on the budget.

Gov. Johnson has several problems with the budget. It severely underfunds some of his agencies and puts more in other areas than he wants. It doesn't say anything about his beloved private school vouchers. It doesn't have the right kind of tax cuts or enough of them. And it has language continuing public employee collective bargaining.

Hit hard by the legislature's budget proposal is the prison system. It is a message from lawmakers that they remember the governor's beasts that he could operate new private, prisons at half the cost of the run down state facilities. Now that those private prisons are operating. Democrat lawmakers note that Johnson is asking for even more money.

ing for even more money.
Also cut are the Human Services and Children, Youth and Pamilies departments.

Both run controversial programs the Legislature hasn't liked.

Lawmakers want to move the State Parks Division from the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Depart-ment to the Tourism Department because of dissatisfac-tion with fee increases and a general disinterest in the division by Secretary Jennifer Salisbury.

Of the other big issues,
Democrat legislative leaders
appear not willing to compromise an inch on visioliers.
They are quietly buoyed by
several-Republican lawmakers who can't get turned on by the issue. Johnson isn't going to give a bit on allowing collective bargaining to continue past its sunset date on July 1.

Tax cuts may be about the

only area where any compro-mise is possible, but that won't be enough to produce any meaningful dialogue. And until an agreement is forged, a special session does no good.

sponsored by Ruidoso News, Lincoln National Forest Rangor Jerry Hawks said Ruidoso is in the middle of a forest, and a wildfire could be devastating. "It would take 50 years for the area to bounce back from a fire," he said.

For the last few months the forest service has been working on a 18 mile, 600 foot wide fuel break around the village of Ruidoso. The intent of the fuel break is to keep any fire to the ground to prevent a crown fire which cannot be controlled. The forest service is also beginning a project to thin out excess trees. and ladder fuels in 7,000 acres of the forest lands close to Ruidoso. The small trees will be sold as poles because most of them are too small for lumber, Hawks said. "We want a forest with grass and trees that are spaced about 18 feet spart," Hawks said.
Locally, the area has excel-

lent fire protection from the Forest Service, local fire de-partments, and state forestry division. However, even these fire fighters cannot do much with a crown fire.

Hawks commended the local forest health coalition for its efforts in promoting fuel reduction on a citizen basis of taking care of their own lots.

Another concern in the forests is the deteriorating

water sheds of the west. "Water is so critical," Hawks said, We see it decreasing with the increase of trees that use a lot

With suppression of lightning caused fires, juniper and pinon trees have increased and most are less than 75 years old. At one time, fires started by lightning at the east and of the Capitan mountains burned almost to the Pecos River, Hawks said.

For information on watershed improvements, the forest service has two videos produced in conjunction with New Mexico State University about the Carrieo Demonstration area. The videos are available at the Forest Service Smokey Bear Ranger Station in Ruidoso. "It is amazing to see what happens when you thin trees."

On the National Forest Service agenda emphasis is on matural resources, recreation, roads, water shed and sustainable forests. He said locally, the forest service has rebuilt the Windy Point lookout on the ski run road and plans to begin work on Oak Grove camping area off ski run road, and at Bonito Lake.

A "fee demonstration area" is underway at South Fork Camp area near Bonito Lake where all fees collected go back to the district for local improvements.

Another issue is the 800 miles of roads in the Lincoln National Forest, Hawks said there is an effort to close roads the forest service can't maintain and to work more cooperatively with Lincoln County to maintain the oth-

Ruidoso Okays Inmate Work Thinning Forest

During the month of April, about 50 acres belonging to the Village of Ruidoso near Grindstone Lake will get some much needed thinning of excess trees.

Ruidoso village councilors during their March 30 meeting, approved a joint powers agreement with the New Mexico State Forestry Division to utilize a minimum sécurity inmate program to help with forestry related projects. Last year, the village requested assistance: from the state forestry division to utilize the inmate forestry program. This year, the Forestry Division of the New Mexico Energy Minerals and Natural Resources Department elected to do the Ruidoso Grindstone project. At no cost to the village, inmates will thin the 50 acres of forest surrounding the Grindstone grea.

During the March 30 council meeting, village manager Alan Briley said the work is expected to be done by the end of April.

located. At the March 80 Ruidoso village council meeting Miner was represented by his friend Bobby Johnson who has a contract to build storage units at the location. Johnson said in 1995 Miner requested permission to build storage units, which was granted.

While the storage units did comply with the current zoning at the location, Miner had suggested to the planning commission he wanted to allow the facility to be used for such enterprises as auto

body shop/metal work if the the entire lot zoned C-t. Vil-An appeal to allow the re- storage units were not suc-Miner also said people would be allowed to build things in the storage units which would be against the C-2 zoning.

Barrow said he thought it was very liberal to allow storage units at the location since they would be the first things people would see when they come into Ruidoso. "He wanted to turn the property into an Industrial Park," Barrow said.

Councilors agreed and they voted unanimously to deny Miner's appeal to allow him to change the zoning from C-2 to

Councilors did approve a zone map amendment for Lot 78, block B, Sleepy Hollow Subdivision requested by owner Charles Craig. The request was to change the zoning from R-1 to C-1 on the rear portion of the lot to make lage planning officer Cleatus Richards said there are no records indicating why the lot was given split zoning.
