

# Speakers At Community Update Speak Highly of County's Future

From the new hospital administrator, to the district forest ranger, all spoke of great things in the future for Lincoln County and the communities in Lincoln County during the Community Update luncheon sponsored by The Ruidoso News on March 25.

In addition to the luncheon, representatives from area municipalities, school districts and other service and governmental entities participated in round table forums held in an

informal setting to allow participants to hear presentations from each and to ask questions of the representatives.

Joan Zagone, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce was the moderator for the luncheon.

The Update was held in Ruidoso Convention Center.

Lincoln County Medical Center  
**Leader For Quality Care**

Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) new administrator Jim Gibson spoke about

his experience and his plans for the county owned facility. Gibson came to LCMC with 26 years experience of administration in mostly small "turn around" hospitals that needed tough changes. "This is the first hospital I won't have to do that," Gibson said. "I feel very fortunate to come to such a fine hospital (LCMC).

In 1998 about 93 percent of the patients in LCMC rated it as very satisfactory. Gibson said LCMC is a leader for quality care in the Presbyterian Health System (PHS).

LCMC is also recognized as one of the top 100 small hospitals in the United States. Gibson attributed much of quality to the support the hospital receives from the LCMC auxiliary. He praised the auxiliary for its donation of \$300,000 toward the new construction at LCMC and its promise of an additional \$200,000.

"The toughest part of my job is how to continue the success of the past," Gibson continued.

This he said should be easy

because of the strong medical staff of 16 full time physicians of "great variety and quality." In Madisonville, Texas, where Gibson came from, the hospital had 45 beds with about 16 patients a day. At LCMC there is an average of eight patients a day with 16 doctors.

"The strong leadership here has been fostered by the community," he said. "The future here looks good with a long affiliation with Presbyterian Health Systems."

Gibson also told of what he

saw as problems. First was his coming into a construction project already underway. The \$1.6 million project will add about 10,000 square feet to LCMC. He said he thought the project is well designed but the problem will be they will have to shut down some areas while the construction is underway. "The most difficult will be to shut down parts of the emergency room," he added.

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**SILENT SENTINEL.** The wooden windmill tower stands as a silent monument to the efforts of the Manhattan scientists who assembled the first nuclear bomb at the McDonald House at Trinity Site on White Sands Missile Range. Located 30 miles due west from Carrizozo, and sheltered on the east by the cliffs of the Oscura Mountains, the ranch windmill once pumped water into two concrete tanks that soldiers and scientists swam in during the hot July days of 1945 when the bomb was assembled and finally tested on July 16. Visitors can look at the tanks, which are now empty, but are restricted from going into the outbuildings and barns at the McDonald ranch site. Tours to Trinity Site and the McDonald Ranch are held every first Saturday of April and October.

## Ruidoso Public Hearings Tuesday On Tossing Fine

Ruidoso relies on the surrounding forests to maintain its high profile as a resort community.

All it would take was one careless tossed lighted cigarette to start a fire that could destroy the forests that make Ruidoso what it is.

Knowing this, Ruidoso village council will hold a public hearing on April 13 on a proposed ordinance that would set a mandatory \$500 fine on

anyone caught throwing a lit cigarette, cigar, match or other type of incendiary material from a vehicle. During their March 30 meeting, Ruidoso village council discussed the proposed ordinance proposed by village chief of police Lanny Maddox. The first proposed language would impose the mandatory fine for tossing out lighted materials only during times of high fire danger as declared by the U.S. Forest Service, during a

period of high winds, as declared by the U.S. Weather Service.

Councilor Ron Anderson asked why have the prohibition only during times of high fire danger. He suggested making the ordinance effective at all times. The other councilors agreed and authorized staff to change the wording to make it an offense to throw out lighted materials at all times.

## County Public Hearing For Tax To Fund Indigent Care

On April 15, federal tax day, Lincoln County Commissioners will hold a public hearing on a proposed one eighth of one percent gross receipt tax to raise revenue for an indigent health care fund.

The hearing is set at 1 p.m. during the commissioners regular April meeting in the commissioners chambers in

the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Need for an indigent care fund was established by testimony given during two previous public hearings, both held in Ruidoso. The state legislature gave the counties options to raise money for indigent health care fund, including a one-eighth percent gross receipt tax imposed county wide that can be passed by ordi-

nance and is not subject to a referendum, positive or negative. However, all money raised by this tax must be dedicated to an indigent health care fund.

Also set for public hearing at 1 p.m. are proposed amendments to the county subdivision regulations. Among those proposed changes is the intent to allow property owners to use up to three acre feet a year from domestic wells, as allowed by the state constitution.

Another proposed ordinance at public hearing is one that establishes a new Glencoe Rural Events Advisory Board that will work with the Board of Education of Hondo Valley Public Schools.

Changes to the county personnel policy will get aired during the hearing on a proposed ordinance that will amend or repeal Ordinance 98-04. The major changes are to allow chief deputies of elected officials to make more than 87 percent of what their elected official receives in salary. This was prompted by the repeal of an increase of elected officials salaries that was found to be unconstitutional.

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## Arson Suspected In Early Morning Fire In Carrizozo

Arson is suspected to be the cause of an early morning fire in Carrizozo that caused thousands of dollars of damage.

The Lincoln County Sheriff's Office dispatch received the first of several 911 calls at 3:30 a.m. yesterday, Wednesday, April 7 about the fire at 102 Lava Loop. Carrizozo Fire Department and Carrizozo EMS were dispatched to the scene.

The fire was in a wooded structure, a 24 foot by 24 foot garage that contained nearly new furniture, washer, dryer, refrigerator, stove, bedroom

furniture, clothing and hundreds of dollars worth of mechanical tools. The building burned to the ground and all the contents were destroyed. Also burned were two Eldorado Cadillacs.

Carrizozo Chief of Police Angelo Vega was called to the scene. Vega met with fire chief Lee Rby Zamora and property owner Paul Samora, and based on statements and surrounding circumstances it was determined to be a possible crime scene.



**TRINITY SITE SIGHTS.** Visitors to the Trinity Site on White Sands Missile Range on Saturday, April 3 got a look at some of the items left behind from the world's first nuclear explosion on July 16, 1945. The 51,500 acre area of ground zero and the McDonald Ranch house where the plutonium core to the bomb was assembled was declared a national historic landmark in 1975. Adult and children visiting the site found the remains of Jumbo fun to explore. Jumbo was a 214 ton metal "bottle" built to contain the TNT explosion that scientists planned to precede to nuclear blast. However, they decided not to first detonate the TNT so they put Jumbo under a steel tower about 800 yards from ground zero. The blast destroyed the tower, but Jumbo survived intact. In 1946, the Army detonated eight 500-pound bombs inside Jumbo causing the ends to blow off. Jumbo is now located at the entrance to ground zero. All that remains of ground zero is a pillar built of lava rock with a bronze plaque. Ground zero is double fenced. The explosion did not make much of a crater but the heat of the blast melted the sand into a glassy green substance called "Trinitite." The Army filled the depression left by the blast and the Nuclear Energy Commission took away most of the Trinitite.

## Solid Waste Authority To Get New Truck

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) is getting a new trash truck.

During a special meeting Tuesday, LCSWA members accepted a bid from Great Basin Southwest Trucks, Inc. of Albuquerque for a 33 yard Impac brand rear loading collection unit mounted on a Volvo truck chassis. The bid was \$133,652.

According to LCSWA manager Jerry Wright the truck chassis is identical to the Volvo on the new rear loader purchased earlier this year. The side load truck will be used on the county route that is about 850 to 1,000 miles a week, Wright said. The truck will go to Riverside on the east, serve the commercial accounts in the Carrizozo and Capitan areas, serve county residential containers, the containers at Salazar Canyon turn in Lincoln, and north to Pine Lodge, and the Corona compressor station.

LCSWA board members at their regular meeting in March had rejected the first round of bids for a side load truck, citing specifications were for too light of a truck. Also they desired to have a consistent fleet, with trucks of similar make and size.

Delivery on the new side load truck is 60 days. The truck will be financed with monthly payments that were budgeted

gets about 800 patients a month and needs additional space. However the project will put some of the ER out of action for several months. But once finished the new ER will add four or five beds in the ER.

Y2K and its associated computer problems is a major concern for LCMC. Gibson said when he came to LCMC he asked for a briefing about the situation from PHS. "I am very pleased to say that PHS is ahead of the camp, with the only area of concern being the labs." PHS plans to check all lab equipment and computers and change any software that is not compliant. "We have all kinds of contingency plans for back-up for power, water and telephones," he said. However a major issue is documentation.

Gibson said he heard the whole community is getting involved with the Y2K situation which he found to be positive.

As for LCMC's financial

future, Gibson said he is very familiar with hospital budgeting. He said the federal Reconciliation Act hit the hospital industry very hard by cutting back Medicare and Medicaid payments. He said LCMC was impacted \$637,929 in reduced reimbursements over three years. "That's a big chunk to absorb," he said.

But LCMC is well run, he continued, with reasonable prices so the federal cut backs are impacting the hospital less than in others. In response to a question, Gibson said most of the damage in the reimbursement outbacks was to the home health industry. In Texas 400 home health services closed and more than 100 in New Mexico. "I think the federal lawmakers are beginning to realize they cut too deep into the meat and bones," Gibson concluded.

## Ruidoso Downs Race Track To Open Billy The Kid Casino This Summer

Ruidoso Downs Race Track will be opening its new casino this summer.

At the Community Update Luncheon held on March 25 in Ruidoso Convention Center, and sponsored by Ruidoso News, Bruce Hubbar, the new president of Hubbard Enterprises of New Mexico told of the plans at the track. Rimbo said he had 30 years experience with the horse racing industry and 15 years with the Hubbard family.

"Ruidoso Downs makes Lincoln County an official resort destination," Rimbo said. "It has brought big money and has allowed the county to develop. He said he was 'pleasantly surprised' at the changes in the area since 1974 when he first visited. "It is no longer a series of cowboy bars and Chaparral Hotels."

"This is an exciting time to be part of the business community in Ruidoso Downs, Ruidoso and the whole Lincoln County area, Billy the Kid country," Rimbo said.

This summer Ruidoso Downs race track will be opening its Billy the Kid casino, a 16,000 square foot facility that will be a themed resort with 300 slots and off track betting, simulcasting and buffet. The themed facility will "relive Lincoln County and its infamous Lincoln County Wars" with a two story replica of the old courthouse. It will have a Tunstall Store gift shop and an interpretive staff, including two Billy the Kids who will recreate shoot-outs. "It will be a fun and exciting thing," Rimbo said. In the store will be a hole for Billy to hide in, as the old stories go. "We realized we needed to attract more events to the race track after its season is over," Rimbo continued. As a result the Lincoln County Cowboy Symposium has been moved to the track and will be held in October, and a professional bull riding event will be held



McDONALD RANCH HOUSE was used by scientists as a work area to assemble the two hemispheres of plutonium that were the core of the bomb on July 12, 1945. The 1,780 square foot adobe ranch house was built by Franz Schmidt, a German immigrant, in 1913. Later the McDonald family constructed the north side in the 1930s. The McDonald family was forced to leave the ranch in 1942 when the Alamogordo Bombing and Gunnery Range took over the land to use in training World War II bombing crews. The nuclear blast during the early hours of July 16, two miles away, blew out most of the windows, but the main structure was intact. The house stood empty until 1992 when the Army stabilized it. In 1994 the Army provided funds for the National Park Service to restore the house. A time capsule was buried in 1994 with information about the restoration. The capsule is slated to be dug up and opened during ceremonies in 2006. Visitors can go in the house to view a display about the Schmidt family.

the last weekend in September. "We have many things planned for the fall through spring, especially April and May and September and October, the shoulder months," Rimbo said.

One big change at the track is the new food and beverage director who plans to upgrade the food services at the facilities. There will be free parking and admission to the track and after the casino is finished, plans are to upgrade the race track facilities. Rimbo agreed the community needs the first class hotel next to the golf course. "Our first goal is to get people to Ruidoso," Rimbo said. "Once they are here, we want to attract them to our facility."

Rimbo said all the attractions in the area should play off each other. He said attention will be given to the area with the new Museum of the American West in old Lincoln, and the Billy the Kid National Scenic Byways. He said there are problems here mainly in finding enough work force and having enough infrastructure to handle visitors. He read from a book that identified three upcoming resort towns in the West. Ruidoso was listed as one of the three most affordable and described as "brave, artistic and eclectic."

## Museum Of The American West Takes Over Lincoln Heritage Trust To Bring New Life To The Old Town

Scott Wells, the new director of the Hubbard Museum of the American West in Lincoln, gave a presentation at the Community Update luncheon March 25 by starting with a cowboy poem dedicated to the horse. He then told of how the Museum of the Horse became involved with the Lincoln properties formerly held by the Lincoln Heritage Trust. The Trust approached the Museum of the Horse in December, which Wells said came as a surprise. He said there are millions of history

lovers with more than 25,000 Internet Websites that refer to Billy the Kid. "We are about to tap into the Mother Lode," he said. Plans are not to visually change the Town of Lincoln, but attract more people to it, Fort Stanton and Capitan, (all on the Billy the Kid Scenic Byways loop.) "We have an astounding collection of attractions," Wells said. "And with the highway improvements people will be able to get to them."

In 1998 more than 75,000 people visited the Museum of

the Horse, breaking records from 1995 when the outdoor horse sculpture was unveiled. Admission to the Museum has been adjusted to make it free to children under 18. Last year as an outreach program of the Museum Wells spoke in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, El Paso and Arizona. He said the museum has heightened the quality of life for the community. The museum is also updating the displays in Lincoln and the Billy the Kid visitor's center.

"In the 1980s this was a group of separate communities with no care for their neighbors," Wells said. "That has changed now, but we have need for more change."

## Spencer Theater For The Performing Arts Brings Quality Entertainment

Spencer Theater for the Performing Arts was represented by Brad Cooper, marketing director, at the Community Update luncheon March 25 sponsored by Ruidoso News. He told of the incredible opportunities available to adults and youth of Lincoln County at the theater. Cooper attributed much of the positive development in Lincoln County to two families--the Hubbards and Dr. A.N. and Mrs. Jackie Spencer.

Spencer Theater will feature 30 performance dates this year. The summer program tickets will be released April 5 with ticket sales to begin April 12. This summer plans are to open the back stage for three outside performances. Also plans are to have two children's programs. One is a two week theater workshop with the Missoula Theater group. Tours are given of the theater every Thursday at 10 a.m. and 2 p.m.

Cooper spoke of the people who come to Spencer theater, with two thirds of them getting their information from newspapers and the majority over 55 years old. The majority 87 percent of contributors to the theater are from New Mexico.

While now the theater is sponsored by a foundation, there will come a time when the theater will need funds for operations.

Distinct in its design, Spencer Theater last year received a top prize as being the best building in New Mexico.

Vega contacted state fire marshal inspector Dan Wright who responded from Santa Fe. Wright arrived in Carrizozo and viewed the scene and agreed it was a possible arson case. Wright and Vega were also assisted by Carrizozo Fire Marshal John Tate.

Vega said he has interviewed witnesses and will continue to interview witnesses. The investigation will continue with the assistance of Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan and his office.

Vega asked that anyone with information about the fire to please contact Carrizozo Police at 648-2851 or the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office at 648-2341.

Vega said he appreciated the work by fire chief Lee Roy Zamora and his crew. Vega praised the fire department for their efficiency. Vega also expressed his appreciation to Tate and Wright for their effort. The fire was mopped up about 6 a.m. Wednesday morning.

Vega is also investigating another fire that happened March 31 in an abandoned building on 8th Street in Carrizozo.

## Ruidoso Budget Schedule Is Set

Ruidoso Village Council approved the 1999-2000 fiscal year budget schedule during its March 30 meeting.

The budget schedule began on February 1 with management and finance office projecting revenue and allocating expenditures to department directors. On March 12 the Capital Equipment Replacement Plans and Capital Improvement Plans were to be distributed to department directors.

On March 22, the directors were to return the plans to the finance department. On April 2, finance department was to distribute personnel and operating sections of the budget to department directors who then were to prepare operating sections of the budget and meeting the management.

April 18 department directors must return personnel

and operating sections of the budget with April 19 set aside as a time for the finance department to work the papers into one document and prepare a proposed preliminary budget.

Beginning May 3, the proposed preliminary budget is to be distributed to the mayor and council. Councilors approved holding three budget workshops at 6 p.m. on May 4, 6 and 10. Mayor Robert Donaldson said the workshops is invited to all the workshops to listen. "I encourage more involvement with the \$28 million budget," Donaldson said.

The preliminary budget is scheduled for public hearing and approval on May 25. The budget must be submitted to the New Mexico Department of Finance Authority by June 30.

**Does the wind blow here?**

When you attend the Lincoln County Commissioners meeting next week, don't forget that this month they will be meeting in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. Don't know about you but it is difficult for us to keep track of when they meet where.

It is commendable that the county commissioners want people in all portions of the county to attend the meetings but what about the people in Corona? When the meeting locations were set there were no meetings set to be held in Corona. Maybe there should be.

Now that the county commission is meeting on Thursdays, we have only a tentative agenda the week before the meetings. There could be several things added. Be sure to contact the manager's office Wednesday for the complete agenda. There may be surprises.

Doing county business in different locations is confusing to the public. Several people complained about the last meeting being held in Ruidoso during the late spring blizzard-like conditions. The highway from Carrizozo to the Nogal turnoff was open but driving was hazardous that day because of blowing snow and white-outs. The people in Ruidoso didn't have that problem and they probably appreciated the meeting being held in Ruidoso during the storm.

Blowing snow caused problems last month and this month the dust is blowing. We don't know if the blustery weather is caused by politicians or not but there has to be some reason for the extra gusts we have been having. Windows on homes, business and vehicles were covered with brown dirt last week and again this week. We heard one person say she didn't do windows but she did use the hose to wash the accumulation of dirt off her windows because she couldn't see what her neighbors were doing. Another person had to scrape the dirt off the windshield of his vehicle before driving.

Listening to people complain about the wind makes us wonder how the pioneers survived. They didn't have the conveniences we have today. Can you imagine sleeping in a covered wagon while the wind is blowing as hard as it has been blowing recently? Can you imagine trying to hitch a team of mules to that covered wagon in this wind? The pioneers must have had a lot of grit, and we don't mean the kind that is blowing. Their stamina should be envied.

Ominous dust clouds weren't the only things those pioneers had to face when they made their trek across the United States. The hot, summer sun dried everything, even the few places they could get water. Today we have air conditioned vehicles. The pioneers were lucky if they could travel eight to 12 miles a day in their covered wagons. Today we can drive hundreds of miles in one day. Pioneers cooked their meals over a campfire in the wind or rain. Today we have modern kitchens complete with refrigerators, ranges and microwave ovens. Pioneers washed their clothes on a scrub boards in large iron kettles. Today we have automatic washing machines.

Washing dirt off windows today is simple compared to what the pioneers had to do. They had to feed their stock, cook their meals, and try to survive even when the wind was blowing. We think of the wind as a nuisance but the pioneers had to accept the wind until it stopped. We can try to stay inside when the wind is blowing but the pioneers were living outside where the wind was blowing.

Nuisances must be endured at times, whether it is the wind or the blowing snow or sudden rains. Other nuisances will be endured, such as not knowing where the county commissioners will meet when, but most Lincoln County residents will endure and some will be at the county commission meeting next Thursday in Carrizozo.

**Inside The Capitol**

**SANTA FE** - Gov. Gary Johnson's deadline for signing or vetoing bills arrives on April 9. Most governors get all their bill signings done by noon on the 20th day following a legislative session since legislative days begin and end at noon, even though the law doesn't mention legislative days. There isn't much problem with a governor vetoing a bill after noon on April 9, because any bill not signed by the deadline is automatically vetoed anyway. The process is popularly known as a pocket veto.

Big Ed Mechem used the pocket veto frequently when he was governor in the 1950s. He figured a good amount of the legislation sent to him wasn't even worth reading. Gov. Johnson might use the pocket veto more often this year because of his irritation with not getting many bills until late. Reading clerks must check every bill carefully to be certain the official copy that goes to the governor has no mistakes. The problem this time, however, was that House Speaker Raymond Sanchez, who must sign all bills was out of town for a few days and didn't stay current with his signing duties. This isn't the first time the presiding officer of the House or Senate has left town briefly following a legislative session, but Gov. Johnson may have wanted to get back at critics who faulted him in the past for going skiing instead of studying bills.

Both run controversial programs the Legislature hasn't liked. Lawmakers want to move the State Parks Division from the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department because of dissatisfaction with fee increases and a general disinterest in the division by Secretary Jennifer Salisbury. Of the other big issues, Democrat legislative leaders appear not willing to compromise an inch on vouchers. They are quietly buoyed by several Republican lawmakers who can't get turned on by the issue. Johnson isn't going to give a bit of allowing collective bargaining to continue past its sunset date on July 1. Tax cuts may be about the only area where any compromise is possible, but that won't be enough to produce any meaningful dialogue. And until an agreement is forged, a special session does no good.

**Ruidoso Denies Zoning Appeal**

An appeal to allow the rezoning a tract of land at the Camelot Castle on Highway 70 in Ruidoso was denied by the Ruidoso Village Council during its March 30 meeting.

Property owner Don Miner had requested he be allowed to rezone the 1.92 acres with frontage on Camelot Drive improved with the Camelot "castle" theater structure from C-2 community business to C-4 heavy commercial. However, the village planning and zoning commission had denied his request because the property has no frontage on an arterial street or commercial collector street. Also the commission considered the adjoining uses of a high density residential apartment complex and the Master Plan that does not provide for high density commercial use at that location.

During the planning commission meeting on February 2, Miner had argued that there is a lack of C-4 zoned areas in Ruidoso and the property would have easy access to Highway 70. This would allow businesses at the location to be served by semi trucks and other freight sources without having to go into residential areas where most storage warehouses are located.

At the March 30 Ruidoso village council meeting Miner was represented by his friend Bobby Johnson who has a contract to build storage units at the location. Johnson said in 1995 Miner requested permission to build storage units, which was granted.

While the storage units did comply with the current zoning at the location, Miner had suggested to the planning commission he wanted to allow the facility to be used for such enterprises as auto

body shop/metal work if the storage units were not successful. Planning commission member Glen Barrow said Miner also said people would be allowed to build things in the storage units which would be against the C-2 zoning.

Barrow said he thought it was very liberal to allow storage units at the location since they would be the first things people would see when they come into Ruidoso. "He wanted to turn the property into an Industrial Park," Barrow said.

Councilors agreed and they voted unanimously to deny Miner's appeal to allow him to change the zoning from C-2 to C-4.

Councilors did approve a zone map amendment for Lot 78, block B, Sleepy Hollow Subdivision requested by owner Charles Craig. The request was to change the zoning from R-1 to C-1 on the rear portion of the lot to make

the entire lot zoned C-2. Village planning officer Cleatus Richards said there are no records indicating why the lot was given split zoning. Also based on the application and research, Richards said staff found that the requested rezoning complies with the village ordinances and Master Plan and supported the planning commission recommendation to approve the rezoning.

Craig who was at the March 30 meeting said the neighborhood has small retail rental businesses and cabin rentals.

Also approved by councilors was a zone map amendment for Phase II Peppertree Place Lot 9 and part of Lot 8, Block 6 of White Mountain Estates, Unit 4 to change the zoning from R-4 high density residential to R-3 multiple family residential. Plans are for single family dwellings and duplexes. The area is located at the old Racquetball club.

sponsored by Ruidoso News, Lincoln National Forest Ranger Jerry Hawks said Ruidoso is in the middle of a forest, and a wildfire could be devastating. "It would take 50 years for the area to bounce back from a fire," he said.

For the last few months the forest service has been working on a 13 mile, 600 foot wide fuel break around the village of Ruidoso. The intent of the fuel break is to keep any fire to the ground to prevent a crown fire which cannot be controlled. The forest service is also beginning a project to thin out excess trees and ladder fuels in 7,000 acres of the forest lands close to Ruidoso. The small trees will be sold as poles because most of them are too small for lumber, Hawks said. "We want a forest with grass and trees that are spaced about 18 feet apart," Hawks said.

Locally, the area has excellent fire protection from the Forest Service, local fire departments, and state forestry division. However, even these fire fighters cannot do much with a crown fire.

Hawks commended the local forest health coalition for its efforts in promoting fuel reduction on a citizen basis of taking care of their own lots. Another concern in the forests is the deteriorating

water sheds of the west. "Water is so critical," Hawks said. "We see it decreasing with the increase of trees that use a lot of water."

With suppression of lightning caused fires, juniper and pinon trees have increased and most are less than 75 years old. At one time, fires started by lightning at the east end of the Capitan mountains burned almost to the Pecos River, Hawks said.

For information on watershed improvements, the forest service has two videos produced in conjunction with New Mexico State University about the Carrizo Demonstration area. The videos are available at the Forest Service Smokey Bear Ranger Station in Ruidoso. "It is amazing to see what happens when you thin trees."

On the National Forest Service agenda emphasis is on natural resources, recreation, roads, water shed and sustainable forests. He said locally, the forest service has rebuilt the Windy Point lookout on the ski run road and plans to begin work on Oak Grove camping area off ski run road, and at Bonito Lake.

A "fee demonstration area" is underway at South Fork Camp area near Bonito Lake where all fees collected go back to the district for local improvements.

Another issue is the 800 miles of roads in the Lincoln National Forest. Hawks said there is an effort to close roads the forest service can't maintain and to work more cooperatively with Lincoln County to maintain the others.

**Ruidoso Okays Inmate Work Thinning Forest**

During the month of April, about 50 acres belonging to the Village of Ruidoso near Grindstone Lake will get some much needed thinning of excess trees.

Ruidoso village councilors during their March 30 meeting, approved a joint powers agreement with the New Mexico State Forestry Division to utilize a minimum security inmate program to help with forestry related projects. Last year, the village requested assistance from the state forestry division to utilize the inmate forestry program. This year, the Forestry Division of the New Mexico Energy Minerals and Natural Resources Department elected to do the Ruidoso Grindstone project. At no cost to the village, inmates will thin the 50 acres of forest surrounding the Grindstone area.

During the March 30 council meeting, village manager Alan Briley said the work is expected to be done by the end of April.

**Ruidoso Creates New DWI Fund, Appoints DWI Council**

Ruidoso Village Council during its March 30 meeting approved a budget resolution that creates a special new fund for the DWI program.

The budget for the DWI program is \$58,243 in the form of a grant from the state to operate the DWI coordinator program on a county-wide basis.

During the meeting village manager Alan Briley introduced new DWI coordinator Barbara Reyes.

Also mayor Robert Donaldson appointed and the council approved, councillor Bill Chance, Briley, Ruidoso chief of police Lanny Maddox, Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. and Lincoln County manager Tom Stewart to the DWI Planning Council. Part of the duties of the council is to also adopt the budget for the DWI program.

The DWI coordinator program will work with all municipal, magistrate and district judges to keep track of persons convicted of DWI.

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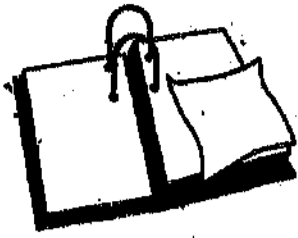
**Stock Car Racing Begins Friday**
