will expire in 2003. Without the additional funds to finance the bond issue, or to provide funds for infrastructure improvements, the alternative to pay for these needed improvements to the water system is for the village to increase water rates.

The gross receipt tax shifts some of the burden on paying


the current one percent tax for the water system improvements to visitors to Ruidoso, without placing extra burden on property owners or increasing water rates.

> To further emphasize the need for the supplemental gross receipt tax, Ruidoso Village Councilors were given a preliminary report on the Ruidoso Water Master Plan during their meeting Tuesday,

May 11. Engineer Dennis Brand, from Wilson and Company which is doing the master plan, provided an executive summary of the master plan. Brand said the official master plan should be adopted by ordinance after conducting many public hearings. The plan projects water needs until the year 2019, based on past trends and current us-

Ruidoso's year-round population now is estimated to be 7.000. However that swells to 14,000 in the summer and up to 35,000 on long summer weekends. To supply enough water for this population the village has a complex system of wells, surface water reservoirs, storage tanks, water lines and pressure zones, with capacity to provide enough water for a city with the pop-



Ruidoso Council Approves Townhouse Development

Despite opposition by adjoining property owners. Ruidoso Village Council approved a re-plat of a residential lot to allow for a turnaround driveway and several variances to village regulations for an eight unit town house development in the White Mountain Estates area at its April 13 meeting.

Twenty seven surrounding property owners opposed the re-plat, which splits Lot 57 zoned for R-1 single family dwelling and located on L.L.

Davis Drive. The re-plat, and variances for a proposed townhouse development, was requested by HBH Investments a company partly owned by R.D. Hubbard. The new lower lot would be used as a turn-around for the gated, private street for the eight proposed townhouses in Pepper Tree Place Phase 2 that would be renamed Rancho Vista Casitas. The remainder of Lot 57 would stay R-1 and would be about 1.047 acres.

Village planning and zoning

commission (P&Z) recommended approval of the replat and variances with several conditions. Originally the developer wanted to make a driveway through Lot 57 from the townhouse development to L.L. Davis Drive. Because it is illegal to make an R-1 lot into a driveway for an R-3 development P&Z denied the original intent. As a result the development was redesigned to make a turn-around on a 40 foot strip of Lot 57, requiring

Nearly 21 percent of registered voters in the Capitan School district turned out and passed a special bond issue

Of the 572 total votes, 365 were for the \$2 million bond issue that will be used to construct an addition of six elementary classrooms, a new bus drop-off loop, student parking, and to remove all interior driveways for safety. 207 voted against the bond.

School superintendent Diana Billingsley thanked all meeting. those who voted for the bond

issue, and invited all those who voted against the bond and who have questions to come by the school. "We're excited to get started so we election held Tuesday, May can have a safer school by next fall," Billingsley said.

passage of the bond issue to individuals who called voters on Monday to remind them to vote, and to others who drove voters to the polls and other reminders by e-mail and person solicitation by board members who passed out bond issue information in Capitan on Saturday morning.

Voters turned down a \$5.7 million bond issue election held in February. Because of the need for additional elementary space and the new bus loop and other safety issues the board opted to hold the May 11 bond issue for the \$2 million amount.

Carrizozo Water Operator Resigns, Effective Friday

The Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees met on Tuesday, May 11, at City Hall. Mayor Manuel Hernandez and trustees James Silva, Eileen Lovelace, and Cynthia Morales were present. Town clerk Carol Schlarb and town attorney David Stevens also were pres-

The trustees adopted amendments to the personnel polices and procedures relating to the Carrizozo Police Department. The provisions that are affected are chapter III, section 3.4(A); chapter X, section 10.4; chapter XI, section 11.3; chapter XI, section 11.5; and chapter XI, section 11.6. The above sections concern the minimum annual work required, defines on duty, compensatory time. compensation, and leave.

Carrizozo Police Chief Angelo Vega received approval to attend several meeting in May and June. The meetings are the New Mexico Police Chief's Association in May, the 1999 Traffic Safety Forum in June, and the new Mexico Gang Task force third regional anti-gang conference opening ceremony and executive training session in June.

Vega also received approval to send police officer James Steck to the key operator class in June. There is no charge to the town for this course. With this class Steck will have full certification on the DWI machine which is provided by the sheriff's department. At this time, none of Carrizozo's police officers are certified to operate the DWI machine and they are required to call to get someone to do the test for them. Vega would like to have his officers take the operators course so that they can calibrate the machine and help the sheriff's office with the machine as it is utilized by state, county, and town police.

Code enforcement was also discussed by Vega and the trustees. Vega said that he will be citing to court persons who have received second notices by certified mail on code violations and not replied. He said that there are some people he has made three visits to and called and feels that now should they

should be charged. Stevens the trustees to not open the read to the trustees what the code enforcement says about when the municipal police officer could file a complaint charging violation. Vega said he knows it is a hardship on some people but other people, upon whom it was a hardship, have complied and he said it should be fair to everybody. He said he has tried to work something out with those not complying and he is not getting much cooperation. Vega said that he feels it is time to start filing criminal summons and have them appear before the judge. Hernandez and Lovelace said that they agreed with him and that he should turn them over to the judge.

Trustees gave their approval of the contract for 'Recreation Center management operation between the town and Christina Full on the provision that a copy of the insurance be delivered to the town clerk and that monthly reports are regularly made. Full said that the insurance contract is just waiting for trustee approval of the management contract and that she would deliver a copy of the insurance to the town clerk on Thursday. Stevens advised

recreation center until the town clerk receives the copy of the insurance.

Several items in the contract that were mentioned were: that the recreation center would be open six days a week, with the operator selecting one day of the week to be closed; compensation to the town will be the same as last year; the town will continue to provide parts for the bowling alley and parts and materials necessary for the maintenance of the alley; the town is committed to find funding for resurfacing of the bowling lanes, which has been worked into the next budget; and reports are to be provided to the town by the 10th of every month. A new fire system in the cafe was not addressed in the contract. The trustees want more information on the fire system.

Hernandez read a letter to the trustees informing them of a meeting of the New Mexico Community Development Council and Alesca to be held May 19 in Albuquerque This meeting is to act on rural planning and economic devel-

Carrizozo Residents Need To Clean Their Lots Or Be Fined

Carrizozo property owners are on notice to clean up their lots or face the possibility of a

Carrizozo Chief of Police told THE NEWS that the State Fire Marshal has been in contact with his office to request the town enforce its ordinance concerning weeds and debris, especially on vacant lots. So beginning this week, Vega said he and his officer Rocky Sanchez will issue notices to property owners who are in violation of Town Ordinance 87-133.

Property owners with violations will be notified twice. If a property owner fails to respond to the notice, or take steps to remedy the problem, the town attorney has authorized the police department to issue criminal summons to the property owner.

On the notice, property

owners will be advised to take appropriate action to remedy the situation. Included in the steps to be taken are: weeds need to be cut; trash and debris need to be cleaned because they are habitats for skunks, rodents and snakes, dangerous structures need to be stabilized, and outdoor vehicle storage (junk vehicles need to be removed).

If a property owner receives a notice, he or she has 10 days to correct the violation. or to contact the police department to make some type of arrangement.

If a property owner does not act after receiving a second notice, he or she will receive a criminal summons into court. The fine for violation of Ordinance 87-133 is \$300 and/or 90 days in jail.

ulation of 25,000. "Ruidoso's water system is the most complex in the state," Brand said.

Some 80 percent of the village water supply now comes from Rio Ruidoso and Eagle Creek, stored in reservoirs at Grindstone Lake and Alto Lake. Currently two plants treat the water from these reservoirs to produce drinking water acceptable to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The Alto Crest plant was constructed in 1979 and produces about 2 million gallons of treated water a day. However it will need improvements to meet future EPA water requirements and to meet additional demand for water. The Grindstone treatment plant was built in 1995-97 and



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The rest of the water comes from wells in Eagle Creek, plus the Hollywood and Cherokee wells in the eastern part of the village. The village has 17.5 million gallons in total storage in tanks placed throughout the village.

To deliver water to the customers, the village has 272 miles of water line, plus 59 miles of two inch water lines. Some of these pipes are nearly 50 years old and most are more than 20 years old. In addition some of the six inch water lines are galvanized iron which deteriorates over

While the village has sufficient water rights, especially in the Eagle Creek field, only about one fourth of those rights are being pumped. Population growth is projected at about 2.5 percent. In 1998 the village average use in the summer was 2.73 million gallons a day with a peak use of 6.2 million gallons a day. The report projects that in the year 2003 the village will use an average of 3.13 million gallons a day in the summer with a peak use of 7.1 million gallons a day. The report projects that in the year 2018, the village will need 3.45 million gallons a day with a peak of 8 million gailons a

day to meet population needs.

A major problem with the existing water system is the amount of leakage. Estimates are the village loses up to 30 percent of its water through leaks, including leaks in the Grindstone dam itself. National standards for leakage is about 15 percent. This is due to the aging water lines and the many pressure zones.

The report shows that challenges to the village water system in the next 20 years include an inadequate well capacity to provide enough water in case of a prolonged drought that would drain the reservoirs, a disparity between the number of water rights and actual water supply, higher EPA standards on drinking water resulting in the need for more testing and treatment, and leakage due to deteriorating water lines.

Recommended solutions to these challenges include rehabilitation of North Fork wells. obtain return flow credits for the North Fork wells, combine the North Fork and Eagle Creek surface and ground water rights, request a banking system and combination of water rights from the state engineer, acquire additional water rights, especially on the Rio Ruidoso, and construction of additional storage tanks.

The biggest issue for the village is the cost to make all the needed improvements. Acquisition of additional water rights is estimated to cost \$200.000. Rehabilitation of both treatment plants is estimated to cost \$3.9 million, increased storage will cost about \$2.3 million, water line replacement estimated at \$300,000 for a total of about \$16 million needed over the next 20 years.

Also included in the report are recommendations on how the village can pay for these needed improvements. Currently, the village has a bond that provides about \$1.6 million a year. Of that \$1 million goes to pay for bonds that were issued to finance various water projects, leaving about \$600,000 to be used for capital improvements. The bond money and remaining funds have been used to improve storage, upgrade the Grindstone treatment plant and finance about half of the cost of the water lines that have been replaced so far.

Brand said the village needs to continue the supplemental gross receipt tax for the water system. The biggest advantage of the gross receipt tax is it requires visitors to share in the cost of improving the water system without impacting property taxes or raising water rates. However, if voters turn down the gross receipt tax, and the village is forced to comply to more stringent EPA regulations, the village will have no choice but to rate its water rates," Brand added.

"In the long run once we have a healthy system we will have costs built in so we won't need the gross receipt tax," said mayor Robert Donaldson at the end of the report. "But we don't have that ability now."

the re-plat of Lot 57, which P&Z approved.

During the April 13 meeting, HBH was represented by attorney Lee Griffin who said the townhouses will cost from \$300,000 to \$500,000 each. Griffin said this was a "very reasonable development proposal based on reasonable standards.'

Gary and Karen Thompson who own Lot 56 opposed the development. In a letter to P&Z Thompson stated 27 other neighbors in the area also opposed the re-plat and variances to village regulations. Thompson stated the new development could have been scaled back in size to allow for a turn-around within the original Pepper Tree Place Phase II tract.

The Thompsons were represented by attorney Alan Morel who said his clients wanted HBH to abide by village laws on re-zoning, because they found the re-plat to be a rezoning. "This is re-zoning without going through the zoning process," Morel said. Also Morel was concerned about the recommended approval to the requested variances. He said he has represented several property owners who requested variances, and was always "put to the test on the necessities for the variance."

Mayor Robert Donaldson, who served on P&Z for about seven years before he was appointed to the council, said he was aware of the restrictions to re-platting. Donaldson said in defense of P&Z he was sure the group and staff looked at the overall development of the land. "It scares me to think how this can be so black and white that there is no gray area for common sense in development," he

Councilor Bob Starchi said the only problem was the Nora of Lincoln. turnaround on Lot 57 A. He letters from adjacent property

owners in support and opposition to the development.

Councilor Bill Chance said he was concerned that the point of contention was the legality. "If it was my situation I would rather have the eight or nine townhouses than the 22 condo units (that were originally) approved for there." Chance said.

Other adjoining property owners also spoke at the meeting. John Hall said he thought the development was over ambitious for what could be done in the space available and was being allowed because of the Hubbards, Another lot owner. Don Matthews was concerned about the variances for the development and was concerned that in the future a driveway may be built on Lot 57 to L.L. Davis Drive.

Sterchi made the motion to approve the re-plat and variances with the developer meeting the conditions listed by P&Z. Chance seconded the motion and all councilors voted yes.

During the meeting, it was stated that the only remedy for those who opposed the development was to take the issue to district court.



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
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

Last week he arranged for national voucher experts to be in Santa Fe during the special session. Our question is, what benefit will these experts get from vouchers in New Mexico? Could it be that they operate private schools and might eventually get some of the state money if New Mexico should ever start using vouchers?

One report said that the governor was unhappy because some of the Republicans voted against the vouchers. The main thing is that the majority of the state legislature, both the senate and the house, voted against the vouchers, regardless of party affiliation. We are glad that the majority of the legislature is more concerned with what is best for the children than with party lines. Being Democrat or Republican should make no difference when it comes to voting. for children. The needs of the children is the most important thing.

Our children are our hope for a successful future. What they learn and how they learn will affect our lives in later years because today's children will be the adults and leaders of tomorrow. As one young adult said recently about being a parent and being faced with the reality of making correct decisions, "It's as if it was some kind of test." Too often young people assume their testing days are over when they get out of school, but getting out of school is just the beginning of an entire new adventure called life. And it is the basic learning experiences these young people have had that helps them

endure the "tests" that they will face every day their adult life.

Basic learning experiences begin at home and continue through the years in school and from friends. These learning experiences begin as infants when they first roll over, say their first word and take their first steps. Later they will learn to say words we might prefer they not know, stumble when the run instead of walking, and roll into circumstances that could be dangerous. All these things are learning experiences. When children get older they will attend school to learn academics and have the opportunity to interact socially with other children. The school children attend should be the best possible school, not an institution of failure as public schools are depicted by the governor. If there is a problem with the public schools, the state has a responsibility to correct the problem.

Apparently the majority of our state legislators are accepting their responsibility and prefer to improve public schools instead of spending state money for private schools for our children. Our thanks to these elected officials for doing their duty as is stated in the state constitution. New Mexico became a state only after years of improving public schools and New Mexico should continue to improve education, not cast it aside as easily as tossing out trash. New Mexico state elected officials took an oath to uphold the state constitution and even if the governor doesn't take his oath of office seriously, the majority of our state legislators do. Thank goodness.

Deciding what improvements need to be made will be difficult but making the correct choices will benefit the children and their future. There will be more debates, more national experts offering their opinions, more tirades from the governor, and more budget line item vetoes before the voucher situation is settled. Next year the general election ballot may contain a question about amending the state consitution to allow state money to be spent for vouchers. Right now we need to do what is best for children in New Mexico.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE - Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth a new state, conceived in liberty and dedi-

cated to the proposition that all men are created equal. Now we are engaged in a great debate, testing whether certain principles upon which our state was founded can long endure. We meet on the battle-field of school vouchers to determine whether church/state separation and anti-donation clauses might

It is altogether fitting and proper that we should reexamine principles that guided the framers of our statehood document to determine whether we properly honor their memory by challenging certain of the ideals that allowed us to attain statehood.

New Mexicans will little note nor long remember what was said in this special session, but if church/state boundaries are crossed or if donations of public money are made to private persons, we will be reversing two sacred principles for which

our founders fought.
It is for all of us to be dedicated to examining those principles to determine whether it is time they be altered to pos-sibly improve our children's education, and if public schools, of the people, by the people and for the people be required to face competition.

My apologies to Abraham Lincoln and to any of you who might think it inappropriate that one of our country's most revered speeches be para-phrased for another purpose. But the parallels were too

great to pass up.

When New Mexico finally gained statehood 87 years ago, it was in no small part because members of our constitutional convention included strong language that no public funds be appropriated for the support of any sectarian, de-nominational or private school, college or university and that no public funds be appropriated to private per-

Numerous attempts at statehood had been denied by Congress over a period of 66 years, but each time influential congressmen would take the floor to note that New Mexico did not have a public school system and to rant.

about the political shenani-gans in which public officials, their friends and relatives got rich. In the absence of New Mexico public schools; the Catholic church and other denominations filled the vacuum. But this bothered Congress, not only on constitu-tional grounds but also be-cause of some anti-Hispanic and anti-Catholic feelings.

So those two new sections to New Mexico's proposed consti-tution went a long way toward gaining congressional accep-tance as a state. By 1912 New Mexicans were proud of their public schools and proud of how far they had come in

cleaning up their government. Instead of asking the public to decide whether those provisions should be repealed, Gov. Johnson has asked his legal advisors to devise methods whereby he can avoid the constitutional restrictions. It may work.

Many were surprised when the U.S. Supreme Court re-cently upheld a Wisconsin voucher case. Because of the history mentioned above, New Mexico's constitution may be

the most restrictive in the nation. New Mexico's compact with the United States that enabled our state to in the Union even mentions that our schools must be free from sectarian control.

Possibly technicalities could win any lawsuits against a new statute one is enacted, but the spirit of the law would. be violated in my opinion. I'm not a lawyer, but my love for the state's history causes me to want a vote of the people before the noble intent of New Mexicans who voted for our current constitution is disregarded.

The debate concerning the constitutionality of vouchers has a touch of irony. The pro-visions mentioned above, along with the entire constitution, were considered quite conservative.

They were passed by a heavily-Republican constitutional convention in order to satisfy the demands of a Republican president and a Republican Congress. And now a Republican governor is trying undo them.



Sounty Makes No Decision On Federal Flood Insurance

QueSome properties in riverside Offees of Lincoln County would Walify for federal flood insur-Parice. However, the county would have to enter into an agreement with the Federal Memorgency Management Agency (FEMA) and adopt Wild enforce a flood plain manexement ordinance to qualify.

During the April 15 Lincoln Dunty Commission meeting Held in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, County commissioners heard a Spresentation from Don? flood plain coordinator, for the State of New Mexico on flood insurance. Armstrong said the ofederal flood insurance pro-Wides lower cost flood insurlance to owners whose proper-Ties are in an area with a one percent chance of flooding a year, However, to qualify the ifounty has to pass and enforce a flood plain management ordinance that would set rigulations on how structures . euld be installed or built in Hood plain areas. Existing Structures would not be revigured to be altered unless they are damaged or remod-

During discussion, county commissioners asked what the cost would be to the county to get into the program. While Armstrong said there would be no cost, county attorney Alan Morel said in his experience in helping clients who live in Ruidoso, which participates in the flood plain program, there would be cost to the county because it is very taff intensive to enforce the flood management ordinance. Also property owners have gdditional costs to comply with the flood plain regula-

Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs insurance program.

County commissioners also asked if having the federal flood insurance would make the private flood insurance ites lower for property owners. Armstrong said it might, but citizen Jerry Carroll challenged that by asking if auto Insurance had lowered in cost, wen though it is mandatory to drive a vehicle on the high-Ways. Carroll also said he was opposed to having any federal Surisdiction imposed on pri-Vate property.

Munley said he was interested in looking at a flood plan management ordinance.

- County planning officer Ratsy Sanchez said the county has problems in flood plain areas. She told of two exambles, one below Bonito Lake Where what was originally to be a gazebo over Bonito River turned into a two story cabin and another of a person who wanted to put a bridge over the Hondo River by using an old flat bad railroad car. "We had no control over these," Sanchez said. "Maybe the only way is with FEMA."

County commissioner Wilion Howell said his opinion is people take their own risk to fulld in flood plains and they can buy flood insurance if they chose.

County commissioners made o commitment to a flood management ordinance during

-Awarded the bid to resurface Eagle Creek Road to Ruidoso Paving for \$51,628 even though it was over the budget of \$48,399 in state school bus route project funds. Commissioners also awarded the bid to resurface roads in Rancho Ruidoso Valley Estates to Ruidoso Paving for .\$58,090, which was over the budgeted amount of \$52,800 from state highway CAP project funds. In both bids Ruidoso Paving was the only bidder of three that met all requirements. County commissioner Bill Schwettmann said they should find the extra money, or scale the projects back to meet the budget, because it was unethical to reject all bids and not award because the bid prices had been disclosed.

--Approved the applications for all seven county volunteer fire departments to participate in the 1999 fire protection fund distribution.

-Tabled a request to conduct an election among county employees to increase the coverage for the Public Employees Retirement Association (PERA) until a review of the budget indicates if the county can afford to increase the match it provides to employees' plans.

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Proposed Trailer Park In Capitan Still On Hold

proposed trailer park located on the south side of Capitan is still on hold.

During a lengthy meeting. Monday, May 10, concerned Capitan residents packed the small meeting space in village hall to again voice their protest to the proposed trailer park. Most were concerned about the impact the park will have on water pressure and availability in the subdivision area on the south part of the village.

Trailer park developer Gary Caughron, accompanied by his attorney Lee Griffin, said after discussions with the

Department (NMED) personnel about installing septic systems for trailers, the park has been downsized to 25 units with each unit on an 80 by 170 foot lot. Again Caughron said the park will use water from a 3,000 gallon storage tank during peak demand times, 3 to 11 p.m. Each unit will be charged the minimum water bill fee and trash fee the same as any residence.

Griffin said by village ordinance the trustees cannot deny the tract a water meter. By ordinance the only thing the trustees can act upon is

commercial water meter and the size which is subject to an approval by the utility supervisor. Griffin said only the NMED has control over the

offered a list of suggestions including issuing the developer a three quarter inch residential water meter because the village water ordinance concerning commercial meters: is vague and will have to be interpreted in court, Although litigation was mentioned several times during the discussion, village attorney Dave Thomsen cautioned trustees to not "raise the specter of litiga-

Lippmann also suggested trustees take no action on Caughron's request for a commercial water tap until an inventory and analysis of water resources is made, a moratorium on issuing commercial water taps until growth ordinances are in place that will define what areas of Capitan will be set aside for commercial development, NMED completes percolation tests for the septic tanks, and Caughron supply an engineering study to show the proposed water storage tank will provide enough water to ease the impact to pressure and water availability to existing users.

Unless something is done by the village, Lippmann said, there will be more demand to make more trailer parks on undeveloped land within the village. "This is merely the tip of the iceberg," Lippmann said. "(Capitan) is a ripe plum for unbridled and unwanted

Lippmann also asked if any trustee has a financial or personal interest in the projest that the trustee declare a vote on the project. No trustees made such a declaration, even though they were advised of such by their attor-

In response to some of Lippmann's concerns village maintenance supervisor Terry Cox said he researched how the park. According to information provided by the Water Utility Corporation, the park could use an average of 7,812 gallons of water a day if each household had 2.5 persons. A two inch water meter can deliver a maximum of 160 gallons a minute or 230,400 gallons of water a day at full

if a two inch meter would impact the subdivision properties above the proposed park. Cox said they will be affected because there are currently pressure problems. The area is supplied by two 200,000 gallon tanks.

Trustee Benny Coker said he thought the water is available and believes the park's proposed storage tank will address the pressure issue. Trustee Leroy Montes said he is bothered the village could set a precedent for future trailer parks on large lots by giving a two inch water tap to the tract, which is described legally by meets and bounds. "What would keep them from getting a two inch meter to put in a trailer park, yet in the past we've denied water for extra trailers on lots and only given an extra tap under hardship situations that are good only until the person dies or moves out?" Montes

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
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
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

Faced with a future of uncontrolled growth because of the lack of a zoning ordinance, Capitan village trustees in-structed the village planning commission to begin work on proposed subdivision, en-croachment and growth management ordinances.

According to a press release, a Judge Doughty was sworn in as District Judge on February 23, 1979, at age 31, 'I consid-er myself as extremely fortunate to have served with one of my earliest mentors, the Hon. George L. Zimmerman. then presiding Judge for the 12th Judicial District," Judge Doughty wrote in the release.

Doughty became the chief judge upon Judge Zimmerman's retirement on December 31, 1985 and served as chief judge until July 1, 1998. In his capacity as chief judge of the 12th Judicial District, Doughty served on the chief judge's counsel, made up of the chief judge of

Twelfth Judicial District each judicial district, the chief and in the jails to the judiciajudge of the Court of Appeals ry by many county commisand the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court.

"I have been involved in the growth of this judicial district from a two judge district with no resident judge in Lincoln County to a four judge judicial district with the Hon, Karen L. Parsons' position being established for Lincoln County," Doughty said.

"I" have been fortunate to have presided in a judicial district where the legislative delegations have been truly representative in considering the needs of the judiciary,"

Doughty continued.
Doughty stated he has been involved in tremendous changes in the allocation of resources in the courthouses

sion administrations. "They too have truly been interested in our needs and a strong judiciary," he continued.

In addition Doughty said he was "fortunate to serve with a strong local bar who have clothed the judiciary with the utmost in respect."

Doughty has served on the New Mexico Judicial Standards Commission, by Supreme Court appointment, since December 4, 1991. The Judicial Standards Commission is New Mexico's ethics commission charged with enforcement of the "Code of Judicial Conduct,", which judges the judges.

"I am confident that the state of the judiciary in the

Twelfth Judicial District is the best it has ever been," Doughty stated. "I will be leaving the Court in the capable hands of Chief Judge Frank K. Wilson and Judges Jerry H. Ritter and Karen L. Parsons. We have been a solid and successful team."

With Doughty's retirement, the Division II judgeship will be declared vacant on August 1, 1999, Robert Desiderio, Dean of the UNM School of Law, will chair a District Judge's Nomination Committee. The committee will take applications, interview applicants and submit the names of qualified applicants to Governor Gary Johnson for appointment.

On August 2, Doughty will open a law office in Alamogordo for private practice of law, arbitrations, civil and family mediation.

The Chair of the Twelfth Judicial District Court Nominating Commission solicits nominations and applications for this position from lawyers who meet the statutory qualifications in Article VI. Section 14, New Mexico. Statutes Annotated 1978.

Portable Carports Are Prohibited In Ruidoso

by Doris Cherry

No new portable carports are allowed in the village of Ruidoso.

In addition to banning on portable carports, Ruidoso Village Council approved changes to the village architectural design standards that prohibit certain types of metal sidings on residences and accessory buildings.

Councilors approved an ordinance in March that made the architectural design changes. The ordinance became effective in April.

Temporary or portable carports are defined as "those which are designed to be portable, are prefabricated off site for assembly and/or installation on site, having exterior finish of fabric, fiberglass, plastic, thin metal or like materials, whether or not the carport is set on permanent foundation."

As for metal siding, the new ordinance allows the use of metal siding in residential districts on mobile or manufactured homes permitted by the code. It prohibits the use of raised rib metal, v-rib metal. R-panel siding and similar siding on residences and accessory buildings. Prefabricated storage buildings are allowed, if they are not more than 120 square feet in size or

10 percent of the principal building, which is larger. Such accessory buildings must have a protective coating that reduces glare and is consistent with the architectural style of the principal building.

The objectives of architectural design standards, according to the ordinance, are to protect property, maintain the high character of community development and protect real estate from impairment or destruction of value.





Lincoln County Detention Center Gets Excellent Fire Drill Rating

Lincoln County Detention Center got an excellent rating on its response to a fire drill conducted on April 22.

According to Lincoln County Detention Center (LODC) administration representative Donna Bentley, the fire drill was conducted to test the response of detention officers. shoriff's office dispatch, Carrizozo fire department and police department and EMS/ambulance under a simulated situation. Paul Linville, Fire Protection Specialist with the State Fire Marshal's office in Santa Fo. was on hand to evaluate the drill. He received assistance in evaluating the exercise from Lincoln County Emergency Coordinator Connie Hopper and LCDC administrator Mike Borrego. Linville gave everyone involved in the drill an gverall excellent rating.

Staff and emergency responders were unaware of the date or time of the drill which began at 9 a.m. April 22. The drill involved a scenario where there was an open flame in the detention center that started with an explosion, with lots of smoke. As soon as the fire alarm sounded, one officer called 911 alerting the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office dispatch of the omergency. Then detention officers went back to the cells and began opening thom according to the fire evacuation

During the exercise there was one "injury"--administration staff member Donna Bentley who was "injured" when she was "overcome with smoke, passed out and hit her head causing profuse bleeding." Bentley said the detention officers responded to her

situation very well and pulled her out of the "smoke filled" area to a safe place where fire department personnel gave

her oxygen.
It took the detention center staff five minutes to get everyone out to the recreation yard and out the front door so the fire crows. By 9:10 a.m. all colls were "evacuated." Only inmate trustees were allowed out of their cells during the exercise. However detention officers did unlock all sells to determine the time needed to do that task.

By 9:11 a.m. Carrizozo-Capitan Natural Gas Company responded and turned off the gas supply to the detention center. At 9:12 a.m. Carrizozo police arrived, at 9:18 a.m. there was an accounting of all staff and inmates. At 9:16 a.m. the fire department arrived, having taken only hine minutes from the time they were paged by dispatch. At 9:20 a.m. Carrizozo ambulanco with Physician's Assistant-Certified Brnie Gonzales, Kelly Lovelage and Hayden Smith who assessed the "patient" for "transport" to Lincoln County Medical Center. The drill was completed by 9:28 a.m.

Linville gave the exercise an excellent rating, but noted some things that need work, such as all staff needed to stay out of the facility once they have evacuated. Also floor plans of the detention center will be posted in all fire department vehicles. He also gave Carrizozo Fire Department an excellent rating for its response.

Another drill is planned for sometime in mid-summer, and another at night to test the responsiveness of the night detention staff.
