County Begins Road Department Upgrade

Equipment in the Lincoln County Road Department is aging and has seen a lot of wear and tear.

In order to help the road department continue doing its job, Lincoln County Commissioners approved replacing a bulldozer and motor graders/blades.' During their regular meeting July 15 held in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, county commissioners heard a report on research by county commissioner Rick Simpson. He verge of needing excessive and said the road department crew has shown a lot of dedication to their jobs in the way they have upgraded equipment and vehicles with little but skill to work with. Simpson read a report summarizing the research he did on the road department equip-

Simpson found that six motor graders have between 5,000 and 6,000 hours of usage. They are all in fair to good condition, but are on the The engine runs hot and has

costly repairs. "These machines are in constant use and need to be dependable," Simpson said. He recommended turning them back to the company from which they were leased, and the county to lease new machines.

As for the D6H bulldozer, Simpson recommended also turning the bulldozer back to the company. The lease on the dozer is up in October and has more than 2,900 hours of use.

been repaired several times but the problem is recurring. A Caterpillar Loader with 6,877 hours of operation is in fair to good condition. The loader will need repairs on the steering, engine, cooling system and some welding on the bucket. However, Simpson recommended keeping the machine and making repairs as needed.

The John Deere 644G loader has 1,400 hours of operation and is in very good condition but needs new tires. Simpson recommended keeping it for several more years.

A Cat 446 backhoe has 4.600 hours of use and runs good. The backhoe need new buckets both front and rear, has some leakage in the control valves to the rear boom and the doors to the cab are sprung. However, Simpson recommended keeping the machine for now.


A Cat 416 backhoe has 4,900 hours of use, runs good but needs new buckets both front and rear. It also needs some work on the brakes. He recommended keeping the machine for now.

Ruidoso Adopts Variance Rules For Sewer Hookups

Ruidoso Village Council responded to an outcry by property owners with septic tanks who received letters from the Village of Ruidoso mandating they hook on to the village sewer system, and threatening them with fines and/or jail time.

During their regular meeting Tuesday, July 27, councilors approved a policy to allow variances to the sewer hookup mandated by a 1985 ordinance. Councilors discussed the policy for nearly two hours and took comments from residents affected by the mandate. The result was a set of guidelines to make it reasonable for property owners to comply with the ordinance.

Under the guidelines, a property owner can get a waiver to the hook-up requirement if he or she:

--Submits a statement from a licensed plumber or certified septic tank installer, that the septic tank and leach field is in good working order, with no current problems or future problems. If the tank is not in good working order, the property owner must hook onto the sewer. If the property owner has a financial hardship that will be considered for the time required to be hooked in.

--If the tank is in good condition, and it will cost the property owner more than \$2,500 to hook the residence into the village sewer line.

--If the septic is in good condition, and the property

If a waiver is granted, it does not carry over if the property title is transferred through sale or gift. Once the

The village will waive the cost of the permit fees of \$100 for road cut and hook up for all property owners who were forced to hook-on to the village sewer. New letters will be sent to all affected property owners advising them they have 30 days after seven days

Work Starts On Hwy. 380 Between C'zozo and Capitan

Carrizozo from the top of Indian Divide to the intersection with Highway 37 to Nogal and Ruidoso will get repaved this summer.

According to Scott Naylor at Armstrong Construction Company of Roswell, which has the contract to do the work, the project is an "insitu" repaving. The project involves grinding up the existing asphalt and using it in a new asphalt mix, then re-paving and finally re-stripping.

Naylor said the project is schedule for 120 days to com-

During the work, motorists along the highway can expect delays. Work will occur in one lane at a time, and motorists will be taken around the work area led by a pilot car.

A stretch of Highway 380 on Monday, warning motorists between Capitan and of stops and cautioning them to slow down. Armstrong Crews were testing the surface of the highway with a "profilograph" a machine that measures the bumps in the roadway. After the re-paving is completed, Naylor said, the profilograph will be run over the new surface and the computer readout compared to the old payement. The measurements are now required by the New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Department that sets certain "tolerances" for the roadway surface readouts. "If the (new) surface is especially good we could get a bonus," Naylor said. If the new surface does not meet the tolerances then the company may be penalized or have to redo the portions that do not meet the required tolerances.

Carrizozo School Gives All Employees A Raise

Carrizozo Board of Education approved a 4.25 percent salary increase for all staff. including teachers.

During their meeting July 20, school board members also approved an increase to the 1999-2000 school year budget of \$65,693, generated by the increase in state funding formula. Carrizozo Schools had to build its 1999-2000 budget on last year's funding amount, because the formula had not been determined when the district had to turn in its preliminary budget.

Carrizozo school district business manager Nenna Whittaker and school superintendent Glena Goodwin met with the district's State Department of Education (SDE) budget analyst the week of July 13, Goodwin reported at the meeting. "We were supposed to defend our budget, but of course they found nothing wrong," Goodwin said. Instead they brought home the additional \$65,693, which Goodwin recommended be put toward a 4.25 percent salary increase, and associated benefits, for all staff.

Goodwin said the SDE staff commented on the district's ability to give a raise this year, especially after last year's mandated nine percent raise for teachers.

The district also receives additional funding for training and experience of its teachers. However, the funding is based on the teachers who are employed at the time of the preliminary budget. Goodwin said next year the district should receive more funding because of the newly hired several teachers who have more experience and training.

One of those experienced teachers is Sarah Ball, who the board approved for hiring for high school English/Math. Goodwin said Ball has a BA degree plus 45 additional hours of training. She has 19 year teaching experience and last year she taught at Mescalero High School.

The board also accepted two resignations. High school Sugan Chigum submitted her resignation so she could be closer to her home in San Antonio, NM. Teacher/coach Juan Pino taught last year on a waiver because he lacketi nine hours credit, however Pine told counselor Rick Cogdill that he was unable to obtain those credits and thus would not be working this upcoming school year.

School bus drivers will get a five percent raise. Last year bus drivers got no raise. The raise will be covered by a \$13,543 increase on the funding formula for student transportation, said Whittaker. Along with the salary and associated benefits increase, the increase will give an additional five percent for operations and maintenance of buses and a five percent increase for fuel. Another \$200 will be put in sick leave, \$200 in other leave, \$1,478 in fixed costs, an additional \$2,915 for per capita feeder route payments, \$1,000 for other contractual services, \$1,000 to other charges, \$1,281 in general supplies and materials, \$250 for diver institute fees and \$207 for driver in-service.

The 1999-2000 school year student handbooks were approved with some changes. This fall all incoming freshmen will be required to take the School To Work class as one unit of elective. The class will include resume writing, interview skills, work ethics, employability skills, explora-tion of careers and other related topics.

Another change in the handbook is how the district's required third science is viewed. Cogdill said the state requires students to take only two science classes but the district requires three. As a

result, students end up taking an honors science class as their third science. "It's not fair to require students to take honors because the requirements are greater," Cogdill said. Instead he recommended removing chemistry from the honors class status. That leaves advanced math, calculus, environmental science, physics, anatomy/physiology and Spanish 3 as honors classes.

Also this fall, students who come into the district from elsewhere, or return to school after missing time, will have to meet certain guidelines based on the number of credits previously for determining what class they will be in."

Board members also discussed the open campus policy of having parents sign to allow their child to leave campus. Board member Eldon Offutt suggested having the student also sign, so the student could not say he or she was unaware what the parent

Highway Input Needed Now

Finding something to do in Lincoln County will be quite easy the next few weeks. The Santa Rita Flesta '99 will be this weekend, the Southwest Wine Competition in Ruidoso will be this weekend. the Carrizozo Centennial events begin with a parade Saturday morning and will continue through August, Old Lincoln Days will be August 6, 7 and 8 with a parade August 8, and the Lincoln County Fair will be held the week of August 9-14. You still have time to complete that special project you have been working on and enter it in the fair, but only a week. Inside entries will be accepted Monday from 4 p.m. to 7 p.m. and Tuesday from 9 a.m. to noon.

Or if you prefer, you can spend a few quiet days camping in the Lincoln National Forest. The recent rains have reduced the danger of fire and camping should be excellent, if not a little cool at night.

Rainy weather is helping to make pastures green, a pleasant sight when traveling. Rainy weather can also cause delays in some road construction projects, which can be unpleasant. But the most unpleasant report about road construction projects recently is that the State Highway 44 reconstruction project to make the highway 4 lanes from Bernalillo to Farmington is \$50 million to \$60 million over cost. Can you imagine anyone being off by \$50 million or \$60 million? If you were to buy a pencil and were told the cost would be 50 cents, you certainly wouldn't accept being charged \$5.00

The state officials responsible for accepting an oversight of \$50 million to \$60 million need to lean basic math. They need to go back to school, without vouchers, and learn how to read figures.

Usually when governmental projects are designed the engineer will give an estimate of costs and if the bids are much higher than the engineer's estimate the governmental entity will decide if the project should be re-bid and/or redesigned. Decisions must be made as to where to cut costs and how those cuts can be made. The best way to cut these outrageous costs is to eliminate the project. There are other highways in New Mexico with much more traffic than Highway 44 that need basic repairs, not widening to 4 lanes. It makes us wonder why Highway 44 needs to be 4 lanes wide. That highway has far less traffic than Highway 54 and is in much better shape. Even though Highway 44 is a state highway and Highway 54 is a U.S. Highway, the fact is that taxpayer money will be spent for improvements to both highways, and Highway 54 needs repairs.

Now you can have an opportunity to voice your opinions about what improvements need to be made to Highway 54 in Lincoln and Otero Counties between Carrizozo and Tularosa. A location study and environmental document is being conducted with the purpose of the location study to evaluate various alternate improvements that could possibly be constructed and to select the most feasible alternates. Input from the public is requested. Comments may be sent to Jerry B. Paz, P.E., Project Engineer, Molzen-Corbin and Associates, 880 S. Telshor, Suito 200, Las Cruces, NM 88011. Input requested is alternate improvements the public would like addressed in the study, input on pedestrian, bicycle and equestrian use, and input on safety, access and economic issues. Your input is important and necessary and will be included in the location study.

Even if you don't like to write letters, your comments could help make the road between Carrizozo and Tularosa safer. If the highway was wider and there were safe shoulders, it could help reduce the number of accidents on Highway 54. Construction could begin within a couple of years. Please send your comments now.

Public Can Be Placed On **County Meeting Agenda**

Members of the public can be added to the Lincoln County Commission meeting agendas through a commissioner or the county manager.

Lincoln County Commissioners, during their regular meeting July 15 in the Lincoin County Courthouse in Carrizozo, approved a commission meeting agenda policy that included the provision to allow members of the public to request submission of items on the next commission meeting agenda. All such items from the public must be submitted by the close of business the Wednesday (one week and a day) before the regular meeting.

In county manager Tom Stewart's memo regarding the meeting agendas, Stewart wrote that his goal is to have an agenda packet, that includes backup material, constructed and ready for distribution to commissioners by 1 p.m. the Friday prior to the

Thursday meeting. The deadline for routine submission of proposed agenda items by elected officials, department heads and boards/committee chairs is the close of business on the Wednesday in the week prior to the meeting. Officials with agenda business will be required to include with their request a draft summary sheet and any implementing document for the approval and signature of the commissioners. Summary sheets can atand alone, but if no backup materials is submitted, a more detailed description of purpose, discussion, recommendation, coordination and

Items of utmost importance or those in a developing situa-

cost to the county should be

agenda no later than 24 hours prior to the start of the meeting. To the extent possible, a summary sheet and any available backup material should be prepared or dictated by the submitting official. Telephonic notification to the local newspaper and radio (if necessary) will be completed by the manager's office. By the Open Meetings Act, any additions to the agenda must be done at least 24 hours prior to the meeting, and notification must be given to the public and/or the media 24 hours prior to the meeting.

Preparation for agendas for special meetings which must have three working days notice, and emergency meetings which require 24 hours notice. will be done in the regular meeting agenda procedures, minus the time constraints.

Stewart's policy also included an agenda item format form for officials to use to help develop the meeting agendas.

Any member of the public with a possible agenda subject should contact the county manager, or a commissioner.

County commissioners also heard a request from county commissioner Ray Nunley to authorize expenditure of Lodgers Tax funds for the Hispanic Culture Event at Glencoe Rural Events Center on the second Saturday in August Last year about 5,000 people attended the event held for the first time. No action was taken.







SANTA FE - Why not put seat belts in school buses? It seems like a no-brainer, doesn't it? The law requires them in cars and airplanes. So why not in school buses?

The explanations are murky. Buses are said to be safer than cars. There is some evidence that in head-on crashes that is true, but for any other crash or jolt, kids go flying around the bus. So why do only bus drivers wear belts? Other research shows most deaths occur outside school buses, Legal eagles worry that adding seat belts may nullify warranties on school buses.

And then there is the money argument. It would cost too much to install seat belts on all those buses. But it's hard to argue that the cost of factory installation would be high. And who wants to put a price on a child's life?

ment that keeps killing efforts to get school boards and legislatures to require seat belts. Following the Santa Fe bus crash in which two people were killed, legislative efforts to require seat belts on school buses intensified.

Bills were introduced in both houses. Although they both received multiple committee referrals, they sped through the panels assigned to look at the merits of seat belts. But when they reached their respective finance committees, they languished for weeks, finally dying on adjournment.

Joint memorials also were introduced in both houses. One passed, calling for a study of putting belts on new buses. There seems to be a problem with installing belts on buses made before 1997 because the seat frames also would have to be reinforced. The cost of retrofitting all school buses in New Mexico is estimated at nearly \$19 million. But if belts were added only to buses manufactured in 1997 or later, the cost drops to \$643,000. Even that proposal, however, could not pass the Legislature. So now the focus has turned

to local school boards. Santa Fe parents approached their tional \$110,000 that was put school board and were told toward the purchase of two

seat belts would be added o the district's buses if the money could be found. The parents promptly started a campaign and raised \$17,000 to retrofit three buses. Most of the money came from St. Vincent Hospital, which still had memories of treating dozens of children from the crash earlier this year. A campaign is now underway to raise \$400,000 to \$500,000 in private funds to quip all the district's buses with seat belts.

In Albuquerque, the school board has said it wants to wait until a lengthy review is completed by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, which is studying ways to strengthen school bus passenger crash protection requirements. But City Councilor Sam Bregman thinks it is time to quit studying seat belts and start taking some

state begin demanding action. There already is enough worry about school safety. Parents would like the peace of mind that at least their children will arrive at school safely.

USA Today recently uncovered information revealing the federal study is going to discover the obvious - that soat belts save lives. The National Transportation Safety Board will sooner or later mandate seat belts on school buses. New York and New Jersey already require sent belts. Florida joined the group in May



County EMS Service Revenue For 98-99 More Than Expected

Lincoln County Emergency Medical Service received more revenue in fiscal year 1998-99 than expected.

So reported Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMO) administrator Jim Gibson to the Lincoln County Commissioners at their regular meeting July 15. Gibson said the year to date revenues for the ambulance service, provided under the auspices of LCMC, was \$178,321, compared to the budget revenue of \$138,000. However, the service paid out \$133,407 on salaries and supplies during

As for capital projects with the EMS, the sale of two old ambulances brought an additional \$115,000 that was put

that same period.

new chassis and equipment that cost \$186,000 total. The new ambulance shed at the Hondo Fire Department cost \$17,682, Gibson said, and LCMC provided \$3,350 toward that project.

Altogether LCMC had expenses for the EMS of \$216,000. The county also had direct expenses of \$59,000 for a total of \$275,000. "That's \$47,000 less than was budgeted," Gibson said. "That raises the question of whether the service is able to operate without county support."

"I am doubtful the service will ever get away from the county funding capital equip-ment, due to the size of the county," Gibson said.

EMS director Jim Stover said overall the service had a real busy year. "We have caught up and are doing well considering the number of things we needed," Stover added He said volunteers were the biggest problem because of the limited number of people who have the fime to volunteer, making them hard to find. In Capitan and Carrisoso the ambulances are making more calls and during the daytime a lot of people

have to work to earn a living. Gibson said the service makes its money on transfers, however the service is not able to make many transfers

Three Ford tractors and Ford dump trucks have about 100,000 miles. All but one has engine computer problems but seem to be okay. The beds areshowing wear and need to be repaired. Overall the trucks are in good condition and. have been well maintained. Recommendation-plenty good for now.

Two belly dump trailers are badly worn. One is no longer in use and is being scavenged for parts to keep the other one going. Simpson recommended selling them both and getting one newer one with a single loading gate instead of the double doors.

A lowboy trailer is in fairly poor condition needing new brakes, wiring and lights; and new loading ramps. The trailer has structural cracks and once was deemed "unsafe" by the Department of Transportation (DOT). Simpson recommended replacement.

The Interstate 20 transport trailer is in good condition and he recommended keeping it. The gooseneck trailer also is in good condition and can **be used for adengations.** Birrain

Simpson also made recommendations on the pickup trucks. A one ton 1990 Ford service truck has a good cab and chassis, but the tool boxes are in need of repair. The 1999 Chevy flatbed is brand new. Both one ton 1990 Ford snow plow pickups are in poor condition and need to be replaced. Another one ten 1990 Ford pickup is in poor condition and needs to be replaced.

The 1995 Ford flatbed one ton is in good condition. The 1995, 1996, and 1998 Chevy pickups are in good condition, except for wear to the front ends where they have been towed behind the blades. All except one of the front bumpers have been replaced by heavy duty ones built in the road department shop. Simpson advised these trucks were good for several more years.

A Miller Bobcat welder was in good condition and Simpson did not inspect two chainsaws and a weed-eater.

Simpson recommended the county buy a portable rock

crusher to streamline operations. With such a crusher the department could use almost all of the materials instead of just the smaller gravels. A two man craw could be sent to a calione pit to crush and stockpile materials, then the other crew could come in and haul, spread and compact it, doing a better job in less time.

He also recommended two four yard salt spreaders for pickups so the county could purchase salt in bulk, thus saving considerable money and would be a one man job.

A new copy machine is needed badly in the road department office. More storage is also needed in the shop for tools, tire, parts and other

Fuel storage tanks, one for diesel and the other for gas are needed.

The shop needs an exhaust fan. Simpson said it was a. safety issue because it was not unusual to have several engines running in the shop. "This makes for dangerous conditions for anyone who needs to breathe, especially during cold weather when the doors are closed," Simpson said. Road department secretary Kim Roper said OSHA has noted the lack of an exhaust fan several times. Simpson said an exhaust fan is a fairly inexpensive item.

A water heater is needed in the shop bathroom that now ers voted yes for.

only has cold water. "With Y2K just around the corner, I think we should at least bring the shop up to twentieth century standards," Simpson said.

Simpson also recommended in the future, just ordering cab and chassis to pull behind the blades that could have flatbeds built on them. The flatbeds provide more room for fuel, and other equipment needs and can be unloaded from the sides and do not have flimey tailgates that get bent in the first week of operation.

Simpson said he forgot to add a wood chipper to the list. With a chipper, crews can chip up branches they trim from trees along county roads, eliminating the need to haul the brush to the incinerator that costs the county \$3 a cubic yard to use.

County commissioner Ray Nunley commended Simpson for his research and report. Simpson said he commended the road department for a job well done. County road supervisor Albert Hernandez spoke about the motor graders that were having problems and agreed with Simpson they need to be replaced.

With that Nunley made the motion to begin the process of replacing the blades and dozer. Simpson seconded the motion which all commission-

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


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erty owner has up to one year to install the plumbing for the hook-up. Briley said about a year ago

he found the sewer hook-up requirement while reviewing the water chapter in the village Utility Code (ordinance). The sewer hook-up requirement had been adopted by ordinance in 1985. The ordinance required properties that were within 200 feet of a village sewer line to be hooked into that line within 30 days. However, the code had never been enforced.

Briley said he instructed staff to identify how many properties applied to the ordinance. Over the last nine months, staff located about 318 properties that had sewer available (within 200 feet) and 318 certified letters were mailed to property owners, advising them they had 30 days to hook into the sewer or face fines and possible jail time.

Of the 318 property owners notified, 139 came into village hall and bought permits to hook into the sewer, 84 had already hooked on, 55 bought permits but had not done the work yet, 42 made no response at all and eight sent letters requesting waivers or variances to the ordinance. Two of those eight just needed more time than 30 days to hook onto the sewer, Briley added. One wanted to have his septic tank "grandfathered" because the septic had always been there and had no problems, three were concerned about the cost of hooking on (two had high costs due to the topography of their property and one was not sure the sewer line was within 200 feet). One letter have to pay the road cut and with no address wanted a hook-up permit fees of \$100 waiver because the letter meath. One resident said they thought the mandate was had been paying sewer bills unfair, and one could not book since they purchased the on totally due to cost.

Briley said staff also found about 100 property owners who were on village sewer, but had no accounts.

Problem septic tanks on some properties in Ruidoso had also gained the attention of the New Mexico Environment Department (NMED). However when councilor Ron-Anderson asked if the state required the property owners with septic tanks to hook into sewer, Briley said that was not the case. "All NMED wants us to enforce is on bad septics," Briley said. "They want us to cut off the water to those properties."

Briley said the NMED has also identified three subdivisions in the village considered at risk due to improper installation of septic tanks and leach fields, and the NMED highly recommends the village extend sewer to those subdivi-

Anderson said he did not see why the village should force property owners with good septic systems to hook into the sewer. But Councilor Linda Flack said one issue is the possible contamination of underground water, Donaldson said the Alto area has problems with septics contaminating underground water sources.

The terrain of the Ruidosc area makes it costly to install sewer lines, but septic systems over time treate problems for the groundwater, Donaldson added.

"But we need to have a heart because some (property owners) are not able to pay for hooking into the sewer," Donaldson said.

Anderson wanted to know what happens if a property owner cannot afford to hook on. Briley said the village *cites the property owner for failure to comply with the ordinance, then the municipal judge determines the extent of the fine. Village attorney John Underwood said the village

has the power to employ a contractor to install the lines, then the village pays the contractor and files & lien against the premises and can go to court and foreclose on the property to pay for the

"So the village forecloses on citizens," Donaldson said. "And a lien is in place, a lien that screws up the person's credit, even to buy a car."

Several residents on Cedar Place, who received the letters mandating them to hook onto sewer, were at the meeting and commented. They were concerned whether the existing four inch sewer lines would be able to handle additional homes, why they should since they purchased the property in 1975 because they were told they were on sewer. Then they find out they have a septic system.

Anna Molina then said the single most helpful person in the village during this process is Rudy Lugo in the waste water department. Lugo who was present at the meeting, advised residents that the sewer line in their neighborhood will be able to handle the additional homes.

Flack also said one of her business customers highly commended Lugo for his help.



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the work at their June meeting, but all bids, including Brown's, had come in more than the \$100,000 legislative appropriation for the project. County commissioners at the June meeting instructed county manager Tom Stewart and architect Wayne Andrews to negotiate with the company to lower the price.

Brown's original bid was \$109,280. Andrews and Stewart were able to lower the price by deleting the roll up doors, the standard toilet fixtures and a standard electrical fixtures package. However, once the gross receipt tax of \$6,144.18 and the architect fee of \$5.000 were added, the total came to \$114,624,13. Stewart said the price was as low as he could get for the project.

County commissioners accepted the bid, and authorized the additional \$14,624.13. Stewart said he budgeted the extra \$14,624.13 as a legislative match in the 1999-2000 fiscal year budget.

Another problem at the fairgrounds was taken care of by county commissioners who approved \$2.903 to cost the rusting roof over the fairgrounds arena bleachers. In Stewart's memo to commis-sioners he wrote that the architect and contractor, Vantage, blame the county for not approving the use of heavier galvanized roof material five years ago when the roof was installed. When the roof project was originally authorized in July 1994, county commis-sioners okayed the use of a shop painted structural roof deck. However, Andrews and Vantage suggested using a galvanized finish for an additional \$931. No response came from the then manager so Vantage, was directed to proceed with the cheaper roof deck.

As result the material is now rusting. On May 11, 1999 Andrews met with Frank Willis from Vantage, and fair board members. Everyone agreed to finding a material to spray on the existing roof

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to inhibit the rusting process. Research found a product to "encapsulate" the rust. Vantage then submitted a proposal to perform the remedial work for a total cost of \$2,908. including materials, labor and gross receipt taxes.

Stewart advised county commissioners he had added the roof coating project in the 1998-2000 budget under the facilities improvements.

County commissioners also awarded the bide for the annual radio maintenance service contract to Key Communication, awarded the bid for a 1999 Ford F-450 4x4 chassis C, 141 inch wheel base, or equivalent to Philpot Motors of Nacogdoches, TX for \$27,875. The truck will be used by the Lincoln Volunteer Fire Department which had \$75,481 in its budget for the truck and the additional brush truck additions. Commissioners awarded the low bid of \$21,368 to Artesia Fire for the brush truck addition to the ford chassis.

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

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
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
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LCSWA Budget Approved; No Rate Increases or Raises

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board approved its 1999-2000 fiscal year budget that does not include rate increases or a raise for employees,

At its meeting on July 20 at the LCSWA offices in Ruidosp Downs, the board approved the budget with only one change -- that the year indicated is 1999-2000 not 1998: 99 as shown on the paper. The authority did have the required one-twelfth percent of the general operating fund as an emergency reserve. The general operating fund, which includes revenues from collections in Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, Carrizozo, Corona and the county, totals \$897,684. The solid waste grant fund revenue is \$79,701, and the Environmental Gross Receipt Tax (EGRT) fund, (collected by all member entities including Ruidoso to make payments to the regional landfill) totals \$279,243 for a grant total revenue of \$1,256,628.

Expenditures for the 1999-2000 fiscal year are estimated at \$1,333,567. The shortfall between the revenues and the expenditures will be taken from the beginning cash balance of \$835,642 (as of July 1), leaving an ending cash balance of \$258,703. The renuired one-twelfth reserve is \$111,131.

Revenues from collections come from roll-off rentals (40-yard) containers) \$86,145, household collections from Ruidoso Downs \$66,616, county household collections \$242,763, Capitan household collections \$69,006, Carrizozo household collections \$49,171, Corona collections \$16,485, commercial accounts in Ruidoso Downs, the county, Capitan, Carrizozo and Corona total \$261,300 for a total of

collection fees \$791,466. Recycling revenue are estimated at \$19,200 in tipping fees, \$50,400 recycling fee (from Ruidoso), \$17,116 in aluminum sales, \$1,161 in copper sales, \$2,180 in ccrap metal sales, \$4,179 in cardboard sales, \$3,797 in newspaper sales, \$137 for recycled oil, \$300 for paper sales, \$300 in plastic sales for total revenues in recycling of \$98,770.

Miscellaneous revenues include collection fee reimbursement of \$777, interest on investments of \$4,654, miscellaneous of \$2,017 for total miscellaneous of \$7,448. Total estimated revenues for total collections" and recycling is \$897.684.

Revenues also include a transfer of \$200,000 from the EGRT fund."

Expenditures go toward personnel services in the collection services with a total of \$311,169 with salaries of \$204,331, overtime of \$33,976.

overflowing. It turned out thatabout a 1,000 people had attended a family reunion at US Forest Service Baca Campsite (about six miles up Salazar Canyon Road) which has a policy requiring campers to pack out their trash because it is a free camp ground. Wright said he instructed crews to pull the cans near Highway 380 on Salazar Canyon before last weekend because a church. group was at the campground: Wright said he visited with the forest service and asked them to advise any largety group reserving Baca Camp-site to provide their own trash! service. LCSWA chairman Joe Hayhurst requested Wright to stay on top of the situation.

Two employees had quit the previous week, Wright also reported. He said one had worked on the rear loader and that position had to be filled. As for the other, the position was in the warehouse and could go unfilled.
