

Arabella Must Wait For New Fire Dept.

Formation of an independent fire department in the isolated community of Arabella is still on hold, because of questions about a station built on private land.

During the regular Lincoln County Commission meeting January 12 in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, Don Katowski made a formal request for approval of the formation of the Arabella Volunteer Fire Department. Katowski said in 1998 residents of the commu-

nity met and decided it was in their best interest to have their own independent fire department. In August 1998, the group formally broke away from the Hondo Fire Department. The Arabella substation had been part of the Hondo Fire Department, and the county financed the construction of a substation on privately owned land in Arabella. Katowski said there are 58 buildings and 200 people in the Arabella area. He also said there was never a lease signed for the land on

which the substation was constructed by the county.

The land on which the station is located belongs to Fernando Montoya who was elected fire chief. Katowski is assistant chief.

Katowski said Arabella needs its own fire department because it is at least 30 minutes response time for the Hondo Fire Department. Hondo Fire Department has a station in Tinnie, which is 17 miles south of Arabella. He said in September 1998 a group of 20 volunteers signed

up to form the Arabella fire department, most of whom are ranchers or people who retired to the community.

County commissioner Ray Nunley said he did not need to be persuaded Arabella needs its own fire department, but he asked if the group had any equipment. Katowski said equipment is available, but cannot be donated unless Arabella is a recognized fire department.

County attorney Alan Morel said there are a number of legal issues involved with the

situation with the ownership of the land on which the substation sits. Katowski could not speak for the land owner because he was not authorized. Morel also had questions about the lease agreement proposed by the Arabella group since it requires the county to pay for utilities and other issues. Morel said all other fire departments are self supporting. Morel also said he proposed two or three possible lease agreements with the Montoyas who did not accept

any. After discussion, Morel suggested new county commissioner Rick Simpson, whose district includes the Arabella area, to meet with the Montoyas and the others involved with the proposed Arabella fire department. Simpson agreed to take on the project and talk with all parties involved and report to the commission at a later date.

At the first of the meeting

Absentee Balloting Is Now Underway For School Elections

All five school districts in Lincoln County are holding school board elections on February 2.

Registered voters who are unable to go to the polls, or who wish to cast their ballots earlier or by mail, can vote absentee ballot now until 5 p.m. January 29.

To obtain an absentee ballot, registered voters must fill out an absentee ballot application available from the Lincoln County Clerk's office in the courthouse in Carrizozo. This can be obtained by either calling the office at 648-2394 or going into the office in person. Once the application is completed and returned to the clerk's office, the voter will receive an absentee ballot which can be filled out at the clerk's office and returned at that time. Or the voter can take the ballot, complete it at home, and mail it back to the clerk's office according to the directions on the ballot. Because there are only 10 working days until the February 2 election, the clerk's office recommends that requests for the absentee ballot application be made in person or by phone.

Absentee balloting is open to all registered voters.

Carrizozo May Charge Fire Dept. For Water

Mayor Manuel Hernandez and trustees James Silva, Eileen Lovelace, Wesley Lindsay, and Cynthia Morales were all present for the Town of Carrizozo Board of Trustees Regular Meeting held Tuesday, January 12. Among the items presented, discussed, or approved were the following: a presentation by Anthony Scaggs on Alesca, the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) project 98 street improvements phase I report, and consideration to issue request for proposals for Carrizozo Recreation Center operator.

Anthony Scaggs, of Alesca, updated the trustees on the recycling plant that Alesca would like to build in Carrizozo. Scaggs said that he has a bank in Utah which has agreed to fund the project. The bank has two contingencies that Alesca needs to see the state and town participate in the project, which requirement will be met by the CDBG grant that the town is helping Alesca apply for and the Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund Program (EDRLF) that the town will apply for; and, 2. to have an independent consultant evaluate the project.

Scaggs said he had two consultants come in. One of the consultants has worked on the project for more than six months and reviewed everything that he has done, and found independent studies on this exact market that Scaggs was not aware of. These reports confirmed that what Scaggs had said about the project was correct. The two consultants came to Carrizozo and met with Lovelace and Silva. Scaggs said the consultants were impressed with the people that they met in Carrizozo, including town clerk Carol Schlarb. Scaggs said that one of the consultants said as he left that "he was hard pressed to see how this project could fail." Scaggs said that the consultant said it was an excellent project.

The CDBG grant was discussed by Scaggs. Alesca's application for this grant has been completed and sent in. The funds from the CDBG can

be in the form of a grant, according to Scaggs, as long as the funds are applied toward town owned property. Scaggs said that he thought the EDRLF was the same and he found out that it was not.

Schlarb said that the EDRLF form has not been completed yet as the council was not aware that it requires that Carrizozo set aside 1/8th

LCSWA Board Has No Quorum At Jan. 19th Meeting

Despite a regularly scheduled meeting to deal with election of officers, status of membership and proxy votes, and revision of the 1998-99 budget, the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board had no quorum.

LCSWA members Cynthia Morales from Carrizozo and Debra Ingle from Capitan, and non-voting member Frank Cummins from Ruidoso were the only members of the board to show up at the 2 p.m. LCSWA meeting on Tuesday, January 19. LCSWA manager Jerry Wright said LCSWA chairman Joe Hayhurst, Ruidoso Downs mayor and county commissioner Rick Simpson weren't coming to the meeting because they were in Santa Fe for the opening of the New Mexico State legislative session.

Wright told the members present, and several visitors, including several from a private solid waste company and two members of the media, that he would call all members next week to make sure they could come to a special called meeting next Tuesday.

Other items on the business agenda included request for proposals for pickups, update on illegal dumping, update on the solid waste facility grants, update on the legislative package, manager's report and an executive session on limited personnel matters.

of 1 percent of the gross receipt taxes. This required set aside is placed in a special fund so that the town of Carrizozo has the ability to repay in case Alesca were to default. Scaggs asked the trustees to evaluate what can be done or if there are other avenues that can be taken.

Schlarb, using the 1998 tax base which was the highest in the last 3 years, estimated the yearly generated revenue from the 1/8th of 1 percent of the gross receipt taxes as \$9,830.00. If the set aside is approved by the trustees, Schlarb said it may have to go through a referendum, she is not sure. If it goes through a referendum, the trustees will have to pass a resolution for a special election. Lovelace asked Carol if the town could budget \$10,000 of the budget each year into a special fund to be set aside in case of default. If that was done, there would not have to be a refer-

endum, Lovelace said, "what I'm hearing from the public from speaking to people I have talked to about your business (Alesca) they all want it. I haven't heard anybody say no." Schlarb will get the trustees information on this.

Scaggs also told the trustees that another community has come forward expressing an interest in Alesca's project. Scaggs says "I'm not changing anything. I don't care who comes up, until they come up with something more, it has to be more than Carrizozo, I have already told them. I said whatever Carrizozo is offering me has nothing to do with you (the other community). I said, I'm moving ahead with Carrizozo. I've got too much invested in it. First of all I like it here, but I just have too much invested and we are just going to move ahead and if anything changes I will let you (the trustees) know. That

is the way I have always been with you, I have told you everything that I know right up front."

Discussed also was the 40 acres that Alesca is interested in at McBride Well. This area was an Environmental Protection Agency Superfund Project. Scaggs told the trustees that the land has been released and Lovelace said that the town needs to get the release in writing. The trustees discussed leasing the land to Alesca for \$1.00 per year. No decision was made as to the lease amount or the time the lease was to run.

Hernandez said, "I know for a fact that this is not a bad risk. I'm 100 percent behind him. It does not matter if we have to stick our neck out, and I'm talking about the town itself, I wouldn't go any other way, but I say do it."

At the end of the discussion Scaggs said, "The town and town council have been incredibly responsive and this is one of the reasons I feel very comfortable telling another group 'do what you want to do. Carrizozo is in the first position and my first choice. I will entertain whatever you have to say. Carrizozo is still my first choice.'"

Isaac Camacho, from The Land Group, gave the trustees an update on CDBG project 98 street improvements phase 1 report.

Camacho said that the project has been advertised in The Lincoln County News, Albuquerque Journal, Alamogordo Daily News, and the Las Cruces News Sun. There will be a mandatory pre-bid meeting at the Carrizozo City Hall on January 22 at 10 a.m. The bid opening will take place on January 29 at 2:00 p.m. at the Carrizozo City Hall. On February 9, The Land Group will recommend approval of the lowest bidder.

The deadline for use of the CDBG funds is February 28. Camacho said they will be asking for an extension. Schlarb said the asked for extension will probably be to June 30, 1999.

Lovelace asked Camacho if he would check out the contractor's background before The Land Group makes their recommendation on February 9. Camacho said that they would.

Camacho said that the contract should be ready to start in mid-March and the weather should be warm enough for the paving to be done. He said that after the mayor issues the notice to proceed it should take about 90 working days for the CDBG part of the project and about 30 working days for the Highway Cooperative part of the project.

The trustees approved publishing a request for proposals for an operator for the Carrizozo Recreation Center. Lovelace said that Christina Full, the current operator, did not renew her contract and that the center has been operating on a month to month basis. Full's contract with the town was for one year in which the operator is granted the option to renew the lease in additional increments except in the rental part. Lovelace said that the town needed to get back on a con-

tract and that to do that legally they need to re-advertise. It is to be published two times in The Lincoln County News, Alamogordo Daily News, and in the Roswell and El Paso papers. The deadline will be February 2, at 4:30 p.m.

Tommy Vargas gave the water operators general report. Lovelace complimented him on his written report. Vargas said that he would like to meter several places. One would be the fire department. They are not paying water rates and Vargas figured the loss of revenue to the town per year is \$126.12. He said that collecting this money would help out the water department. He said that the fire department gets state funds, they could be metered and have them pay for the water. Schlarb said that all city hall departments should be metered and pay their water. He said that the wells should also be metered.

Vargas said that he and Jim Payne, town foreman, inspected the waste water treatment plant. He gave the trustees a special report on this. Vargas said there are many things wrong with the waste water treatment that are against New Mexico regulations at this time. Carrizozo is out of compliance at this time. He said that with town employees' help it can come within compliance. Some of the problems at the plant are: 1) where the debris and raw sewage are being piled; 2) sludge blanket occupying significant volumes in the Imhoff Clarifier; 3) sludge drying beds have not been used for desiccation of sludge; 4) polishing ponds are not equipped with proper lining; 5) settle-able solids have accumulated in the polishing ponds; 6) polishing ponds have no source of aeration; and 7) ponding area has been altered.

Vargas said that a brand new treatment plant would be the way to go. The one Carrizozo has now is obsolete. Hernandez said that it is outdated, about 40 years behind times. The council is working on getting some funds to maybe refine the lagoon and do it by phases. Lovelace asked Vargas what he thought it would take to bring it up to par. Payne told her that they already have started on it.

Trustees approved Vargas attending the New Mexico Wastewater annual short school in Las Cruces on March 3. The cost for the

school is \$165.00.

Alfred Medina was approved by the trustees for Animal Control Office/Maintenance. He has been doing this job on a temporary basis and now will be a part time employee (a 30-hour position).

The resolution for budgetary adjustments was approved. This resolution moves \$400 from the municipal court travel and expense and puts it in the municipal court software maintenance. The upgrade for the court's computer sleuth program will be paid out of the increased software maintenance fund. The cost for the update is \$796.41.

Trustees took final action and adopted amendments to the municipal code concerning time for redemption of animals, all impounded animals shall be redeemed within seven days after impoundment. Any animal not redeemed within the required period shall become property of the animal shelter and may be placed for adoption upon payment of the license fee, the impoundment fee of seven dollars per day, care and feeding charges of \$25 and veterinary charges or the animal may be released to the humane society or humanely destroyed.

On 1999 CDBG priorities/wastewater treatment plant and street drainage improvements, the mayor requested that the trustees

give him some direction in case at any of the CDBG meetings he attends he is asked which project should have priority if Carrizozo should only receive funds for one of them. The trustees told Hernandez that the wastewater treatment plant is first in priority.

The mayor and town clerk were given approval by the trustees to attend the 1999 CDBG allocations on Friday, January 15. Per diem and mileage was also approved.

Morales received approval from the trustees for reimbursement for mileage for attendance to the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) meeting.

Lovelace said in her report that the United States Post Office wants to move the sectional center from Carrizozo to Alamogordo. She asked the trustees to think about what the town can do to help keep the sectional center in Carrizozo.

County To Change Subdivision Regulations

In the last five years Lincoln County Commissioners conducted months of hearings to change the county subdivision regulations to make water well use stricter than state law. But now they want to change the regulations to allow private wells to use more water.

During development of Ranches de Sonterra, Lincoln County Commissioners passed strict rules on the use of water from wells, limiting annual use to one-half acre foot. Current state law allows individual household wells to draw up to three acre feet a year. But commissioners were concerned that the large development did not have enough water, and allowing wells to draw three acre feet each would negatively impact the water table downstream. So through a series of public hearings they changed the subdivision rules so they allow less water use than state law.

Since they passed the strict rules, commissioners have allowed at least two developments which had language in their disclosure statements that individual wells were allowed up to three acre feet a year. These statements and developments were forwarded to the state engineer's office which approved them with the three acre feet allowance. Until now.

During the regular county commission meeting on Tuesday, January 12, in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, Brady Baxter made his final request for approval of the plat of the Hondo Trust Company's "The Preserve" Subdivision in the upper Gavilan Canyon area. The development was to have private roads and large lots, and individual wells to provide water. The development disclosure statement included language that each private well could draw up to three acre feet a year.

The plat and disclosure statement were sent to the state engineer's office for its okay. But the state engineer's office sent it back with a letter stating the disclosure statement violated county rules regarding water use. Planner Tim Collins said the state engineer was interpreting the county's subdivision regulations, article 18.2 as allowing a maximum of a half acre foot of water use annually. Collins argued that the half acre was dependent on water availability. As for The Preserve, water was very available.

County attorney Alan Morel said he thought the intent of the county subdivision regulation was that the developer had to show there was a minimum of a half acre feet available for the property. "But I can't recall," Morel added. A half acre foot a year is about 400 gallons a day.

Another problem with the restrictive water use is enforcement, Morel said the only way to enforce that was to meter each well in the development. But who would monitor those wells? No one knew.

County commissioner Ray Nunley asked if a water well was a constitutional right. Morel said state law says every tract of land is entitled to obtain a permit for a private well. But Nunley could not remember whether they wanted the half acre foot to be maximum or minimum use. Newly elected commission chairman Rex Wilson said the rules need to be clarified. "I can't judge on what we can't remember," Wilson said. "But it appears we do need to adjust the rules."

County commissioner Wilton Howell said they didn't need to change the subdivision ordinance to accommodate just one subdivision, but

rather to change the rules that are unreasonable.

Morel said he thought commissioners could approve the subdivision and allow the three acre feet if they intended to change their subdivision ordinance to reflect that. But Wilson questioned how they could approve it with language different than their own ordinance. "If we approve this and the ordinance says something different, then we break our own ordinance," Wilson said.

Then Collins asked if the developer could request a variance to the ordinance. Morel said it was possible, especially since commissioners intended to modify their subdivision ordinance to reflect the three acre feet.

"I don't think this subdivision should set precedents," Wilson said. "But if the ordinance is not right we should change it."

Changing the ordinance takes at the least 45 days to publish notice of intent to change and hold hearings.

Morel said commissioners could approve the subdivision without state engineer's approval. But the district attorney and the state attorney general then would have the power to enforce the county's ordinance. "Then we'll really have problems if we're on the wrong side of the law," Nunley responded.

After more discussion commissioners finally voted to table the request for approval until the next meeting. They suggested the developer apply for a variance in the meantime, and they directed the county manager to make notice of public hearing on the water well issue and on whether the county will require performance bonds for private roads in developments.

Because The Preserve is within the one-mile Ruidoso-

Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zone, the development had to go before the ETZ commission for approval and before the Ruidoso Village Council. Both ETZ and Ruidoso council approved the development with language about three acre feet.

The ETZ has come under scrutiny by the village of Ruidoso which wants to take over the enforcement of the ETZ rules. Ruidoso also wants the county to revise the ETZ ordinance to be more like Ruidoso's zoning ordinance.

At the January 5 ETZ commission meeting, its members

voted in support of revising the ordinance as outlined in a letter from Ruidoso Mayor Robert Donaldson sent to the county commissioners. The ETZ attorney drafted 17 pages of proposed changes to the ETZ ordinances that would address problems of enforcement, licensing procedures and the overlap of responsibility between the ETZ commission and the ETZ authority.

County manager Tom Stewart at the regular county commission meeting on January 12 said the commissioners

Buy gold rocks now

No matter how you try to ignore it, the year 2000 problems will continue to be topics of conversation for several months. Y2K, as it is known, could cause all sorts of computer malfunctions around the world and we are told that the sound of computers crashing could be deafening. Actually the terminology is that the computers will "shut down" because they won't know how to process the date.

Once upon a time Chicken Little said the sky was falling because an apple fell on his head. Y2K is a similar situation. The difference is that no apple has fallen, but there is the possibility that it might. The Y2K terror mongers are being the "Chicken Little" in this new scenario, even before the apple falls. These terror mongers are saying that businesses won't be able to order supplies because the computers will shut down. These terror mongers are also saying that we won't be able to buy food or fuel, and are urging people to stock up water, food, money, candles, and things they might need.



SANTA FE - The first Friday of the session is usually the New Mexico Legislature's one day off each year - as far as weekdays are concerned. Lawmakers take no other holidays. If you get off for Presidents' Day and would like to visit the Legislature, they will be there. If it snows so hard that all businesses and government agencies shut down, lawmakers and the media will still be working. And beginning about the middle of the session, they start meeting on Saturdays, and eventually on Sunday afternoons.

But the first Friday of each session is usually a day off. Last year it wasn't because of a scuffle with Gov. Gary Johnson over the "feed bill" that funds legislative operations. Rookies reporters sometimes criticize lawmakers for wasting the public's money, but there are good reasons for the short break. Bills are introduced in great numbers the first three days of a session. The brief pause allows bills to be printed and mailed throughout the state. Each county courthouse receives a set. So do libraries and certain other public agencies. Lawmakers can name a few people back home to receive free copies also. If you are merely curious about what all those bills look like, don't ask for a set unless you have several yards of shelf space to file them. And then there is the daily stack of amendments that need to be filed with each bill.

The bill distribution process is designed to give New Mexicans a chance to read in their newspaper and elsewhere about the bills that have been introduced and then contact their legislators about their concerns. Most lawmakers return home that first weekend. For those who live long distances from Santa Fe, it is sometimes their last trip home - and your last chance to get their ear before they leave town for two months. Rep. Cisco McSorely, an Albuquerque Democrat, says the extra day is too brief to do much good and proposes a longer break. The Louisiana Legislature introduces bills for 15 days and then recesses for a week before going back to debate the measures. Presently New Mexico allows 30 days of bill introductions. McSorely proposes a 20 day break at that time to gather reactions from constituents. It probably won't happen. Legislators, lobbyists and others connected with the

session have become accustomed to New Mexico's 30-day/60-day schedule of sessions in alternate years. They can find as many reasons for not changing the length or timing of legislative sessions as they can find reasons for not holding an early presidential primary election. It isn't as though nothing will be happening at the Legislature tomorrow. The staff of the Legislative Council Service will work all weekend keeping track of the bills that have been introduced and drafting additional bills that have been requested by legislators. The finance committees of both the House and Senate will meet tomorrow and likely throughout the weekend, conducting hearings and preparing the General Appropriations Act that funds every state agency, the courts, public schools, and colleges and universities. Many lawmakers also like the long weekend because they bring their families to Santa Fe for the Tuesday gala opening of the Legislature. Families get to sit with legislators in the House and Senate chambers. In general, it is a big family reunion. Several receptions, held Tuesday and Wednesday evenings, provide a chance for additional socializing. By this afternoon, most families go home for the duration of the session. A few spouses remain in Santa Fe for the entire 60 days. Sometimes that includes pre-school children. And in a few cases, lawmakers from the far reaches of the state will enroll their school-age children in Santa Fe schools. So don't think your lawmakers are goofing off tomorrow. They work hard for their expenses checks, and in nearly all cases merit your respect. In contrast, members of Congress convene the first Tuesday of January and normally adjourn immediately for two weeks.

Howell did say county planner Patsy Sanchez needs help and the ordinance needs to be changed to address the industrial areas next to residential areas and needs a mechanism for variances that is more lenient than Ruidoso's. He then recommended a public hearing on proposed changes to the ETZ ordinance at the next meeting. However, no motion was made or action take to set a hearing.


Greetings from my old house by the side of the road to your house!

Fort Stanton Guard Placed On Administrative Leave

State Police Investigate Sex Allegations Between A Guard And Inmates

A guard at Fort Stanton Women's Correctional Facility was placed on administrative leave this week pending the outcome of a state police investigation on allegations that he had sex with two inmates.

According to New Mexico Corrections Department public information officer Mike Toms on Wednesday, no charges have been filed on the guard who allegedly had consensual sex with two inmates at the women's prison. The guard was placed on administrative leave Monday.

Toms said the allegations of the sexual relations between the guard and the two women inmates were made by another woman inmate last Saturday. State police from the Alamogordo regional office were called in to investigate the allegations of consensual sex between the guard and inmates.

If the investigation finds probable cause on the allegations, the guard will be charged with criminal sexual penetration because the women are state correctional inmates. Sex between an inmate

a guard is handled as a crime, even though the sex may have been consensual.

Toms would not release the name of the guard, or the inmates involved in the allegations.

Since Fort Stanton became a women's correctional facility a number of other guards have been dismissed and charged with felonies for having sex with inmates.

Capitan School Superintendent Is Rehired For One More Year

Capitan Board of Education members unanimously rehired school superintendent Diana Billingsley for another year.

At the end of their short regular meeting Thursday, January 14, school board members Tom Trost, Freda McSwane, James Hobbs and Ervin Aldaz (Jack King was absent) offered Billingsley a one year contract as superintendent of Capitan Schools. The board commended Billingsley for her past work for the district and on the upcoming bond issue election.

Billingsley presented the board with a packet of information about the bond issue election that has been provided to students and the public. A series of letters sent to parents posed possible questions and offered answers about the need for the bond issue and additional classrooms, who can vote, absentee voting, why the school needs additional parking lots, obtaining lottery money, enrollment growth, community use of school facilities and the paving of Yard Road. She also included a list of what she and other staff and volunteers have done to promote the bond issue. In addition to school staff, Lincoln County Commissioner Bill Schwettmann, from the Capitan area, is scheduled to speak to the Alto Property Owners and Ladies Club.

In the elementary, principal Dick Clevenger was to hold meetings with parents from each grade on January 18, 19, 21, 25, 26, and 28 to end with an Open House and Community meeting on January 29. Board member Aldaz and volunteer Barbara Luna planned to go door to door in Lincoln, Louise Padilla volunteered to speak to the American Legion, Angie Provine volunteered to speak to the senior citizens, and various people offered to present the information at their churches and civic groups. Newsletters were to be sent out with January billings for Otero County Electric Cooperative, Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas, Capitan water bills and Ruidoso State Bank statements.

Information is also available on a Website at www.capitan.k12.nm.us and on Billingsley's e-mail address www.billingd@Capitan.k12.nm.us. Posters and flyers were made by the high school art class and placed in various areas throughout the district, laminated site drawings and flyers were placed in post offices in Alto, Capitan, Lincoln, and Fort Stanton, at Capitan village hall, 3 Bar D Hardware, Farmers Country Market, Ruidoso State Bank, Lincoln County Fair buildings, Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas company office, all schools, Smokey Bear Restaurant.

A telephone committee consisting of elementary parents will be calling on January 29 encouraging people to vote. Volunteers have offered to write letters to the editor in support of the bond issue, newspaper articles have appeared, a Community Forum will be held on the bond issue at 6:30 p.m. January 21 with a walk through of the campus earlier that day at 4:30 p.m.

Along with the bond issue election, another task Billingsley took on this winter was updating many of the board policies. Last fall, Billingsley's computer suffered a major crash and all electronic records of the school board policies were lost. The policies had been copied on paper however. Deciding to make the most of a bad situation, Billingsley, with the

approval of this board, decided to update all the policies to include new state and local board language.

At the board meeting Thursday, the board approved five sections of board policy six. Two of the six inserted language referring to updated New Mexico State Board of Education regulation numbers and where they were revised by that board. The only major change to the board policy was the definition of "weapon" as set by state statute. In the new policy definition a weapon is any firearm that is designed to, may readily be converted to, or will expel a projectile by the action of an explosion; and any destructive device that is an explosive or incendiary device, bomb, grenade, rocket having a propel-

lant charge of more than four ounces, missile having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than one-quarter ounce, mine or similar device.

The next change involves the choosing of valedictorian and salutatorian when there is a tie in the grade point average of two persons. The GPA will be taken from core subjects, which were modified to be only English, social studies, science and mathematics. Previously the policy included P.E., foreign language and typing/keyboarding.

Other language changes were updating the term for the NM Health and Environment Department to NM Department of Health, in the

RESOLUTION NO. 1998-15 OPEN MEETINGS ACT

WHEREAS, the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners meeting in regular session at Carrizozo, New Mexico, on the 12th day of January, 1999, at 9:00 A.M. as required by law; and

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1(B) of the Open Meetings Act (Sections 10-15-1 through 10-15-4 N.M.S.A. 1978) states that, except as may be otherwise provided in the Constitution or the provisions of the Open Meetings Act, all meetings of a quorum of members of any board, commission or other policy making body of any state agency held for the purpose of formulating public policy, discussing public business or for the purpose of taking any action within the authority of or the delegated authority of such board, commission or other policy making body, are declared to be public meetings open to the public at all times; and

WHEREAS, any meeting subject to the Open Meetings Act at which the discussion or adoption of any proposed resolution, rule, regulation or formal action occurs shall be held only after reasonable notice to the public; and

WHEREAS, Section 10-15-1(D) of the Open Meetings Act requires the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners to determine annually what constitutes reasonable notice of its public meetings.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners that:

1. Regular meetings of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners shall ordinarily be held each month at a time and place designated in the notice. 5. For the purposes of special meetings and emergency meetings described in paragraphs 2 and 3 of this resolution, notice requirements shall be met by posting notices in the offices of the Lincoln County Clerk and the Lincoln County Manager. The Lincoln County Manager's Office shall provide telephonic notice to those broadcast stations licensed by the Federal Communications Commission and newspapers of general circulation that have made a written request of the Lincoln County Board of Commissioners for notice of public meetings.

6. Every effort shall be made to follow the Robert's Rules of Order. The Robert's Rules of Order shall be specifically modified to allow the Chairman to vote in all instances.

7. If you are an individual with a disability who is in need of a reader, amplifier, qualified sign language interpreter, or any other form of auxiliary aid for service to attend or participate in the hearing or meeting, please contact the County Manager's Office at 505/648-2386 at least one week prior to the meeting or as soon as possible. NOTICE OF PROPERTY TAX REPORTING REQUIREMENTS

Property which was valued in 1998 in this county by the county assessor is not required to be reported or rendered for 1999 or subsequent years, EXCEPT FOR:

- 1. mobile homes
2. livestock, and
3. land used for agricultural purposes

If, for any reason, your property was not valued last year and it is subject to valuation this year, you are required by law to report it to the county assessor on forms provided either by mail or at the assessor's office.

All nongovernmental entities (property owners) which claim to be exempt from the property tax must report their property and claim their exemption for 1999 if the exemption was not claimed in 1998.

Reports for mobile homes, livestock, land use for agricultural purposes, property not valued last year and claims for exemptions by nongovernmental entities must be completed and mailed or delivered to the county assessor not later than the last day of February.

If you made improvements to your real property and:

- 1. the improvements cost more than \$1,000 and
2. a building permit for the improvements was not issued;

you must report the nature of the improvements and their cost to the county assessor not later than the last day of February. These reports must be on forms provided by the county assessor.

3. states the amount you contend the value has decreased.

If the head-of-family exemption was claimed and allowed in 1998 no new claim for that exemption is required to be filed. Beginning in the 1999 tax year, taxpayers are responsible for declaring their property classification to the assessor, as residential or nonresidential. When the declaration is accepted by the assessor, it shall remain in effect until the next time the assessor revalues the property unless the classification changes. If a taxpayer has not declared their property to be residential in 1998 and desires that classification for 1999 they must complete a declaration of residential classification and return the signed declaration to the county assessor's office by the last day of February, 1999.

Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division of the State of New Mexico in Santa Fe.
