

County Commission Declares Fire Danger

Adopts Ordinance Regulating Fire and Fireworks

Lincoln County is now under an extreme fire danger due to drought and as such the use of certain fireworks and fire are banned or regulated. Also citizens must now, under penalty of law, notify the Lincoln County Sheriff's office whenever they plan to do a controlled burn on their private property.

Because of the dry winter and spring Lincoln County Commissioners adopted the ordinance regulating the use

of fire and fireworks during their regular meeting May 20 held in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. The ordinance prohibits the improper handling of fire, provides a procedure to declare an extreme fire emergency, establishes guidelines for the sale, possession or discharge of fireworks, and regulates and/or prohibits the use of aerial and ground audible

devices (fireworks) during extreme drought conditions. The ordinance also sets a fine of \$1,000 and/or imprisonment of up to one year for violations of the ordinance.

The New Mexico State Legislature passed a measure that now allows county commissions and municipal governing bodies to adopt ordinances that will regulate and/or ban the sale of fire-

works provided the governing body passes a resolution declaring an extreme fire emergency at least 20 days prior to the season when fireworks are regularly sold. Previously, governing bodies could not legally ban the sale, possession and use of fireworks under state law.

The ordinance does allow the commission to rescind the fire emergency and subse-

quent fireworks ban immediately if, as county commissioner Ray Nunley said, "we get a wealth of rain." Also the fire emergency will expire within 30 days, unless commissioners reinstate it.

During the meeting county commissioners received comments about the proposed ordinance from Lincoln National Forest Smokey Bear district fire management

officer Matthew Reidy, New Mexico State Forestry district ranger Barbara Luna, and Bonito Volunteer Fire Department chief Chris Denne. Reidy said fire restrictions were going into effect in the Lincoln National Forest and Bureau of Land Management areas on May 21 because of the dry conditions. Luna said the state forestry department and the village of Ruidoso were putting fire restrictions

Capitan Rejects Request For Trash Rate Increase

Capitan village trustees rejected a request from Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) to increase trash rates in Capitan by \$1 a month for residential service and \$5 a month for commercial service.

During a special meeting Monday, May 24, Capitan trustees heard a report from mayor Norman Renfro who attended the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority meeting on May 21 on behalf of

LCSWA member and trustee Debra Ingle who was unable to attend. "There's trouble in River City," Renfro said about LCSWA. Ingle first reported on the problems with the 40-yard roll-off container that LCSWA had pulled from Capitan. Ingle said she had to argue with LCSWA management to get it back last Saturday. LCSWA had complained that Capitan was not using the container except on free days and threatened to have it available only once a month, on the third Saturday.

Ingle had made an appeal for residents to use the container every weekend and as a result last Saturday the container brought in \$78.

Even with that revenue Ingle said the roll-off will only be in Capitan the first and third Saturdays of the month. This concerned her because a roll-off is left in Carrizozo every weekend, although it has only brought in \$16 per weekend. "We need to voice our opinion to make sure the roll-off stays here (every Saturday)," Ingle said.

Ingle also reported on the rate increase LCSWA was requesting. "I recommend not accepting this increase," she said. Ingle was concerned that LCSWA management had presented a preliminary budget that was in deficit, while hiring four additional employees. Ingle said she thought the LCSWA board had to approve all hiring, but LCSWA management had not brought any request for additional employees to the board.

Renfro said he was upset LCSWA management had put the rate increase into the preliminary budget without approval from the member entities. Ingle said even with the rate increase included, the budget had a deficit of \$38,969. "I recommend the village not agree to the rate increase and send a letter to LCSWA to get its 1999-2000

Ruidoso Council Denies Adult Day Care's Appeal

An adult day care center housed in a residential area of Ruidoso will have to move out.

During their regular meeting Tuesday, Ruidoso village councilors upheld the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission denial of a conditional use permit for Casa Alegre an adult day care center for developmentally disabled adults on the grounds that 77 percent of the neighbors within a 200 foot area objected to a commercial enterprise in their residential neighborhood. Casa Alegre had appealed the denial to the village council basing its argument that the conditional use permit was denied because neighbors alleged property values were diminished due to the nature of the center and its clients served.

Casa Alegre opened the day habilitation center in September 1998. However, its administrator Vicky Warwick did not apply for a conditional use permit to operate the for profit center in the R-1 residential dwelling zone. Also she did not apply for a business license at the 114 Skyvue location.

The center provides a day-time location for disabled adults to gather for socialization and living skills instruction at a location away from their primary group residences. Warwick, who operates Casa Alegre is paid by the state on a DD Medicaid waiver.

The village became aware of the day habilitation center through complaints from adjoining property owners. Problems between the village and the day center began when the village sent its code enforcement officer to verify the use of the property but he was

denied entry and refused information by the attendants at the house. As a result the village attorney intervened to prompt Casa Alegre to file an application for a conditional use permit. Due to lack of required information or plans the application was tabled by the village Planning Zoning Commission (P&Z) at its meeting January 19 and rescheduled for February 2. Meanwhile the center continued to operation.

During the appeal with the village council Casa Alegre

Ruidoso Is Under Fire Restrictions


The Village of Ruidoso is now under fire restrictions which began on May 21, following the lead of the U.S. Forest Service.

Under the fire restriction all open flames are prohibited. This includes campfires, outdoor stoves and charcoal grills on public and private property within village limits. Smoking is allowed only inside an enclosed vehicle or building. Gas grills and stoves are allowed if they are UL approved. Fireworks are banned both in Ruidoso and national forest lands.

Ruidoso village manager Alan Briley told about the fire restrictions during the manager's report portion of the village council meeting May 25. He said the village is enforcing the restrictions with a warning first, then a citation on the second warning.

Ruidoso is still in Phase 1 of the water conservation

into effect in their controlled County and the surrounding areas on May 21 also. County are at near normal. Reidy said now Lincoln moderate drought which



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means it is two to three inches of precipitation below normal. However the long range weather forecast from the National Weather Service showed temperatures well in excess of normal and precipitation well below normal for June. Reidy said his office gets the weather information off the Internet on a daily basis.

Although fireworks are already banned on the national forests, Reidy said the county ordinance would assist the forest service because it would reduce the threat of using fireworks on private lands within forested areas.

Luna suggested changes to the language concerning "Improper Handling of Fire" to allow citizens as well as the federal and state forestry agencies to set backfires and create "black lines" to stop the advance of a wildfire. She commended the wording in the paragraphs defining unlawful use of fire that included setting fire to trash and refuse.

But Luna's main recommendation for the ordinance was to add an entire section requiring property owners to notify the sheriff's office when they plan a controlled burn, regardless of whether there

are fire restrictions in place. She said citizens can do controlled burns during fire restrictions if they get permission from the state forestry office. Lincoln County undersheriff Rick Virden said controlled burns get out of control frequently. "If they would just call and let us know when they plan to burn and the location," Virden said.

Denne suggested the sheriff's office dispatchers have weather information on hand to advise citizens who want to do a controlled burn on whether the weather conditions are reasonable. Luna said the dispatchers do not have time to do that function instead she suggested the dispatchers just refer the information to her office.

Denne was most concerned about the regulation of fireworks displays, especially private displays such as done by the Spencers. The ordinance requires that organizers of such displays must have a written permit from the county.

Denne, who thanked the commissioners for the ordinance, also asked how the ordinance will be enforced on public lands, for instance will the sheriff's office enforce it on BLM lands. Virden said the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office has a joint enforcement agreement with the Forest Service.

During the public comment portion of the hearing, citizen Jerry Carroll was concerned that the ordinance will allow federal officers to operate in the county without permission from the sheriff. County attorney Alan Morel said the language in the ordinance was taken directly from the state statute.

Luna said that federal law enforcement officers have cross commissions and can cite. Carroll asked if that included FBI, ATF or IRS officers and if they were certified by the state or federal agencies. Luna said state forestry certified officers but they must go through training on state forestry laws.

Also, Luna said under the new ordinance when fire restrictions are in place, citizens will need permission from the state forestry office and Lincoln County to do a burn.

Village of Ruidoso fire inspector asked if land owners notify the sheriff's office dispatchers who would notify the community fire agency affected, such as Ruidoso. Nunley then said the sheriff's dispatch will need procedures to notify the proper agencies in such cases. Virden said, "They do anyway."

When discussing who citizens should call to advise of a controlled burn, county commissioner Rick Simpson suggested citizens need call only one number, the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office.

All agreed that the notification of controlled burn was needed at all times regardless of fire danger.

County commissioners unanimously approved the

ordinance and the resolution declaring the county to be under an extreme fire emergency. The ordinance and resolution took effect immediately upon passage. Copies of the ordinance are available at the Lincoln County manager's office and the New Mexico State Forestry Department in Capitan.

Terms of Ordinance 1999-05:
Section One, Improper Handling of Fire:

-Makes it unlawful for any person to set fire or cause a fire to be set to any trash, refuse, flammable vegetation or forest materials or any other flammable substance on the land of another person without permission of that person.

-Unlawful to allow fire to escape from control without using reasonable and proper precaution which includes fire breaks, check on weather, checked with district state forestry office.

-Unlawful to set fire or cause fire without using proper and reasonable precaution at all time to prevent the escape of the fire.

-Unlawful to leave an unattended burning campfire on a person's own land or another's land.

-Unlawful to cause a fire on a person's own land or land of another's by means of any lighted and discarded cigar, cigarette, match or other manner and leave the fire unquenched.

-Improper use of fire does not include a backfire or black line set to stop a fire already burning.

Section Two, Fireworks

-Includes 29 definitions of fireworks and those who deal with fireworks and locations that are affected, such as "wildlands."

-Unlawful for any person to sell, offer to sell, possess, transport or discharge any fireworks within the county unless the item is permissible.

-Unlawful to sell fireworks without a permit from the county.

-Allows the county to prohibit the sale or use of aerial or ground audible devices during extreme drought conditions as declared in the resolution of fire emergency. Fireworks permitted during fire restrictions, on county lands only, are ground and hand-held sparklers and smoke devices include cone fountains, crackling devices, cylindrical fountains, flitter sparklers, ground spinners, illuminating torches, toy smoke devices and wheels. Stick-type rockets with a tube less than one-quarter inch diameter are not allowed.

Lincoln County will issue permits for public or private fireworks displays that will be good for one year beginning February 1.

The ordinance ends with the section allowing the county to prohibit and/or restrict fireworks during extreme drought conditions. Under this section the use of permissible fireworks is restricted to paved or barren areas with a readily available source of water; all fireworks are banned in wildlands and display fireworks are banned or restricted.



County \$10.6 Million Budget Is Approved

In fiscal year 1999-2000 Lincoln County estimates spending \$10.6 million for all of its funds.

Lincoln County Commissioners approved, on a four to one vote with commissioner Wilton Howell casting the no

vote, the 1999-2000 fiscal year preliminary budget during their meeting May 20 in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. The preliminary budget includes \$8.58 million in revenues for all funds, an unaudited beginning cash balance from the 1998-99

fiscal year of \$3.7 million and an estimated ending cash balance for the 1999-2000 fiscal year of \$1.78 million, and remaining discretionary funds of \$158,789.

The total budget includes all departments including general fund, road, all fire departments, mill levy funds for capital outlay, volunteer fire department insurance, agreements, legislative appro-

riations, special gas tax, predatory animal control (a tax self-imposed by livestock producers), Lodgers Tax fund, corrections (detention center), drug enforcement grant, sheriff's seizure, reappraisal fund, Emergency Management services (ambulance), Carrizozo Health Center, and Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) both mill levy

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
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
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

Memorial Day Monday

Summer is unofficially here with the Memorial Day weekend. Governmental offices and the post office and banks will be closed as will many businesses. Maybe you plan a picnic to celebrate the holiday, but remember the fire restrictions are in effect. The recent rains helped drop the fire danger but it will be hot and dry and fire restrictions are still in effect for all of Lincoln County and for most of the state. Long range weather forecasts indicate temperatures will be above normal and precipitation will be below normal. The risk of wildfire is very high and will probably continue for months.

As you make your plans for the long weekend, please consider attending the 10th annual War Veterans Memorial Service Saturday, May 29 at 10:30 a.m. at the New Mexico Merchant Marine and Military Memorial Cemetery at Fort Stanton. This is the centennial year of this cemetery which was established in May 1899. This annual Memorial Service is held to honor War Veterans who helped preserve our way of life here in the United States, particularly those who lost their lives and the families who lost their loved ones. It is a beautiful drive to the Fort Stanton Cemetery from anywhere in Lincoln County and would be an enjoyable outing as well as the perfect way to show respect for those who sacrificed their lives for us. The view is exceptional, from Sierra Blanca to the Captains to the Fort Stanton mesa, and the view is even more spectacular with the flags blowing in the gentle breeze against a blue clouded sky.

Lincoln County has much to offer and the Fort Stanton area is quiet and peaceful. During the Memorial Service the 21 gun salute will echo through the mesa, as will the Scottish Bagpipes playing Amazing Grace and the Highland Cathedral and When The Battle Is Over. The program lasts about an hour and will end with the playing of Taps. After the Memorial Service you will have time to enjoy driving through more of Lincoln County and reflect on the special ceremony and the tributes made in appreciation of Veterans.

Usually you would expect an American Merchant Marine Memorial Monument to be near the ocean, but the 25 foot tall white monument dedicated to the American Merchant Marines is inland-locked Lincoln County. The nearest port is Corpus Christi, Texas and the Gulf of Mexico 633 miles away. The port in San Diego is 700 miles away. Fort Stanton was established as a public health hospital for merchant seamen with tuberculosis (TB) in 1899 because the high, dry climate was the best therapy for TB patients.

Through the 53 years Fort Stanton was a public health service hospital for TB patients and later when it was a state TB hospital many Veterans were buried at the Merchant Marine and Military Memorial Cemetery. It is the final resting place for 1,612 American Veterans from 20 states and Veterans from eight foreign countries. The cemetery is located on State Highway 220 south off Highway 380 between Capitan and Lincoln. State Highway 220 is paved.

Everyone is invited to attend the Memorial Service. And you might want to read the names of the Lincoln County Veterans who lost their lives during wars. The list is published in this issue of The NEWS. The list is not complete. If you find an error or can add any information, please contact Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor. Our thanks to the many people who worked to compile this list. It was a joint effort that will be an ongoing project and we appreciate having the list of names to publish for this Memorial Day edition. Please have a safe weekend, be careful with fire, and take time to reflect on the liberty we have here in the United States of America.

Salute to the Veterans

County Continues Contract For Detention Center Management

Lincoln County Commissioners extended the contract with Correctional Systems, Inc. for management of the Lincoln County Detention Center for six months, with option to renew for an additional six months.

During their meeting May 20 in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, county commissioners reconsidered and approved the renewal of the contract with Correctional Systems, Inc. (CSI). In April CSI had presented a renewal asking for much more money than previously offered by the county. Because of the increase, county manager Tom Stewart had placed an ad to hire a county employed administrator at cost of \$30,000 a year less than CSI's proposed management fee. Stewart said eight people responded to the ad for administrator of whom seven were very qualified. Stewart said while CSI wanted \$85,572 a year to manage the detention center, he had placed \$57,709 in the budget for a county hired administrator.

CSI president John Forren said his company wants a long term commitment with Lincoln County. He then gave four reasons why the county should retain CSI to administer the detention center. The first reason was to provide a continuity of control in the detention center while the county builds its new 100 bed facility. The second was CSI could provide consulting services on the construction of the new detention center. The fourth reason was CSI could provide a transition plan from the old to new detention center. "If you don't have a solid plan it could be dangerous,"

Forren said. The fourth reason was the experience of the company's employees. "Don't switch in mid-stream," Forren said.

During discussion, Forren was asked what would happen to the county detention center employees if CSI was to be awarded a long term contract to manage the new detention center. Forren said employees could transfer their current retirement funds in PERA to a CSI 401K retirement plan and also employees are given stocks in the publicly traded company.

County commissioner Ray Nunley said CSI has a good track record in Lincoln County. He reminded commissioners of the problems with the current detention center and the improvements made since CSI took over management on an emergency basis. Nunley wanted to continue with CSI until a new detention center was completed. "I think it is dangerous to change now," Nunley said. "We need to finish the project."

As for CSI employee Mike Borrego who is now the Lincoln County Detention Center administrator, Forren said he has obligated to stay with the position for the next six months. County commissioner Wilton Howell said he would like for CSI to be responsible and liable for Borrego if any civil rights cases arise. Forren said CSI's insurance company is willing to provide insurance for Borrego. Forren also said that CSI will have to begin paying workers comp and other required taxes on Borrego who has been in the position more than six months. Previously Borrego was considered a consultant on a temporary basis, which

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE - Gov. Gary Johnson's latest round of vetoes left many New Mexicans scratching their heads trying to make sense of the governor's action on bills at the completion of a very unusual special legislative session.

Johnson called the session after vetoing two budget bills at the end of the regular session of the 1999 Legislature. Democrat leaders contended the governor could have gotten by with the second budget sent him by vetoing money from agency appropriations he thought were too high and by requesting supplemental appropriations next January for those agencies he feels are underfunded.

The real reason Gov. Johnson wanted a special session, many Democrats contended, was to showcase his school voucher plan. He even threatened to keep calling lawmakers back into special sessions until he got his vouchers. And even though he did get his wish to present a parade of national experts, Johnson could still call more special sessions to vote on vouchers.

But barring unexpected developments, the governor isn't likely to try again this year. With his voucher proposal going down by 2.5-to-1 margins in both houses of the Legislature, there is much work left to do before returning to the battlefield. Johnson vows to continue traveling the state to educate New Mexicans about the positive aspects of vouchers. He may decide to concentrate on those areas where he didn't get the support he expected, especially from Republicans.

Gov. Johnson chose not to accept the interim task force on improving schools that the Legislature offered him, even when lawmakers decided they would fund it out of surpluses in the Legislature's budget. It would have provided Johnson a free forum for promoting vouchers, but the Legislature wanted to talk other solutions too and the governor doesn't like compromise, collaboration or any other process that involves working together.

Johnson's vetoes also followed the all-or-nothing philosophy. He axed funding for

early-childhood literacy programs and a voucher-like program for dropouts, even though the money could have gone to private schools. And he vetoed a 10-percent pay differential for the 87 New Mexico teachers certified by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

But the governor wasn't a total Scrooge. He signed a \$500,000 appropriation for treatment of drug addicts in Rio Arriba County. He vetoed a similar bill following the regular session, but sponsor Ben Lujan made a few changes and tried again. U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, who has obtained federal money for the program, also leaned on Johnson to sign the legislation.

Domenici's support may have helped the bill's chances, but another measure Domenici has backed for much longer, requiring health insurance plans to provide comparable coverage for mental health treatment, Johnson vetoed again, saying he felt it would scare insurance companies out of the market.

The governor wasn't enthusiastic about signing the drug treatment bill. He has quietly maintained that the war on drugs hasn't worked much

better over the years than Prohibition did in the 1920s. That fits his libertarian philosophy of limited government and expanded personal freedoms, but that is a handwagon he is not going to jump on as he has with the parade for school vouchers.

Another controversial special session item was the attempt by many lawmakers to move the state parks system from the Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department to the Tourism Department. The parks agency has come under criticism for ramping fees, increasing park closings and unresponsiveness to complaints.

In a rare bit of compromise, Johnson signed a bill appropriating nine months of money for the parks division, so the Legislature and governor can reconsider the reorganization during next year's legislative session. Ideally something will be worked out during the interim, but realistically, it is unlikely anything will be different when the Legislature adjourns next February.

Nothing was really resolved during the special legislative session. It's another case of both sides merely pausing to reload.

attorney Steven Granberg said Casa Alegre meets all requirements under the state Medicaid waiver program. During the P&Z meeting Granberg and Warwick argued the center did not need a business license because Warwick had a license for her central office located elsewhere in the village.

Granberg also argued that village ordinances do not provide for adult day-care centers in any zone. He likened the situation with Casa Alegre to a Montessori day school/center that had located in a R-1 zone. The village however approved a conditional use permit for the Montessori school. Granberg said the Center's owner just wanted a

consistent approach to allowing condition uses in residential areas.

Mayor Robert Donaldson said the village was forced after the fact to enforce all the rules and regulations. "It doesn't work that way," Donaldson said. "That's why I'm so upset. I don't like to be forced to choose sides. You were the ones that failed to get proper inspections and permits."

Village planning attorney Ohay Rennick said in the case of the Montessori school only 12 percent of adjoining property owners who responded were opposed to the conditional use and six percent were in favor of the school. Also the school was within a block of a commercial zone. With Casa Alegre day habilitation center, none of the adjoining neighbors approved of the commercial operation. He also said that the disability status of the persons served by the day care center was not at issue.

Granberg argued there are commercial businesses on Skyvue--an office to a self storage unit and a construction company office. Rennick had said both businesses had predated the village zoning ordinance.

Other village concerns about the center included its refusal to allow code enforcement into the facility and an issue about the standards used in an inspection by the village fire department inspector and another inspection by the state fire marshal's representative. Neighborhood concerns were for the additional traffic, the house not being adapted to handicapped individuals, and the lack of proper parking and vehicle driveways.

Concerned property owners were represented by attorney David Stevens. He said opposition from the neighbors was due to the commercial enterprise in the strictly residential zone, fire safety issues, no business licenses, failure of the center to comply with the village regulations, and no day care standards as outlined by the Department of Health. "Don't fall into the trap that this is a pro-versus anti-disabled issue," Stevens said. "No one is arguing these people (the clients at Casa Alegre) need and deserve special attention. But these people (property owners) put their life savings in their homes and their rights should not be violated due to a commercial enterprise."

Stevens also cautioned the council not to be intimidated by threats of civil rights violation if they upheld denial of the conditional use permit. "If you permit this, you permit it all and you might as well take your zoning ordinance and throw it away," Stevens said.

Property owners on Skyvue had written letters about their concerns and objections to the center which Stevens had presented during the P&Z review in February. While in most of the letters property owners objected to the commercial enterprise and its associated traffic and people, some objected to the very nature of the center. One couple who lives next door to Casa Alegre wrote that the "invasion of this business into our neighborhood...robbed us of our serenity." They claim they have to run into their home quickly to not have to look over and deal with the tragic situation next to their home. "What used to be our heaven now feels like our hell. The stress that this business has caused...is a detriment to our health, safety and welfare. I can't imagine anyone wanting to buy into this situation which means our property values have just completely plummeted." The couple suggested Casa Alegre should have found a location with no restrictive covenants or zoning restrictions. They also feared that if the village gave a conditional use permit for the R-1 neighborhood no residential neighborhood would be protected in the future.

Granberg responded to Stevens saying no studies

budget in line before we send it to Santa Fe with a deficit," Ingle said.

A resident suggested Ingle request an audit of LCSWA to determine why there is a deficit.

"I hope Corona and Carrizozo will back us on not increasing the rates," Ingle said. Trustees authorized a letter be sent to those municipalities about the concerns on the requested rate increase.

Trustees also heard a status report on the proposed trailer park. Village attorney Dave Thomsen said he received a FAX from developer Gary Caughron's attorney advising they were withdrawing their request for a one-inch water meter and are requesting a three-quarter inch meter to serve no more than 10 mobile homes. Thomsen said the village cannot deny Caughron a three-quarter inch meter according to village ordinances that allow several dwellings on one meter.

Thomsen also discussed two other areas of concern--

backflow prevention and peak water use. He said New Mexico Environment Department (NMED) has advised the department has jurisdiction over the backflow issue and will review the design of trailer park storage tank to assure the integrity of the village water system. The tank must be maintained properly to prevent growth of contaminants that could backflow into the village water system.

On peak water use, Thomsen said village maintenance supervisor Terry Cox said the three quarter inch meter will not adversely affect water pressure. "So we have no grounds to turn down this meter," Thomsen said. "And they don't even have to go before the board."

This led to discussion of why residents were denied ability to hook additional dwellings into their three quarter inch water meters in the past. Village planning commission member Bobbie Shearer said it was because those were residential meters.

But trustee Leroy Montes asked who was to say what was commercial.

After some more discussion and a long comment from resident Lonnie Lippmann, Renfro said the report was just informational since trustees could do nothing about the water meter now. "We will keep you aware of what is going on," Renfro said.

Also at the special meeting, trustees:

--Approved hiring Jim Knowles and Kenny Crowe as police officers at \$1,600 a month base salary for each. Knowles has four years experience as a Hidalgo County sheriff's deputy and is certified in New Mexico. Crowe has been an officer for eight years and is certified in Texas. Knowles will come on duty after he gives two weeks notice. Crowe must attend a three week training to recertify in New Mexico.

--Approved donating the used water truck as is with no warranty to Lincoln County for sole use at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds. Fair association president Shorty Sanders asked if the association could lease the truck or the village donate it. However, the village could not give the truck to the private association, but it could give it to the county for sole use at the fairgrounds. Agreeing the all volunteer fair board does a "tremendous job" in bringing people to the village, trustees unanimously approved of the donation.

--Okayed loan of the used fire truck to the Arabela Volunteer Fire Department.

--Authorized application for a federal Rural Utility Grant/Loan of which the village must pay 55 percent for construction of two water storage tanks in the subdivisions, and application of a 100 percent paid grant for water systems improvements.

--Authorized application for a New Mexico Tourism grant to fund a Capitan sign to be placed west of the intersection of Highway 380 and state road 37.

--Approved advertising for request for proposals (RFP) from an engineering firm for the water tank and system improvements.

--Renewed the contract with attorney Dave Thomsen to continue as village attorney for another year. Trustee John Whitaker voted no.
