

Ruidoso Survey Indicates Needs

According to the respondents of a survey issued by the Village of Ruidoso, quality of life in Ruidoso is good, but could be enhanced if the village has stricter zoning, revises its hillside and forest protection regulations and do forest health management such as thinning to reduce the risk of wildfire.

As part of the village's efforts to update its Comprehensive Master Plan completed in 1987, Ruidoso village council authorized the survey be done early in 2000. In March, the council finalized a contract with the company BRW, Inc. that offered the best proposal for completing the survey. In May 2000 The village mailed out 6,815 "Ruidoso Community and Visitor

Surveys of which 1,561 were completed and returned. The questionnaire was sent to every household with a village utility billing address.

Ruidoso Village Councilors during their meeting January 30 got the results of the survey during a presentation from BRW representative Nancy Ryan. The survey was developed by BRW staff in collaboration

with village staff. The survey had 15 questions in five categories -- Land Use/Recreation/Arts, Parks/Recreation/Culture, Public Facilities/Infrastructure, Public Services/Administrative Services and Economic Development.


Ryan said the 29 percent response rate was exceptional and represented a good cross section of the

population in Ruidoso. Of the respondents, 60 percent were men and 40 percent women. Also 60 percent of the respondents were in the 25-64 year old age group. The remaining 40 percent of respondents were in the 65 years old or older age group. Only one person in the age group of 18 to 24 responded. The survey also questioned whether the

respondent lived in Ruidoso more than six months a year and length of time with a residence in Ruidoso. Answers were ranked on strongly agree, agree, undecided, disagree or strongly disagree. Some questions in the survey offered a range of numbers for ranking.

Capitan School Board Rehires Principals

Capitan Board of Education rehired all three principals for the 2001-02 school year.

During their meeting on February 8, school board members Ervin Aldaz, Gary Tregembo and Grant Dean approved the rehiring of elementary principal Dick Clevenger, middle school principal Dale Jackson and high school principal Darrel Stuerwalt. School board members Tom Trost and James Hobbs were absent.

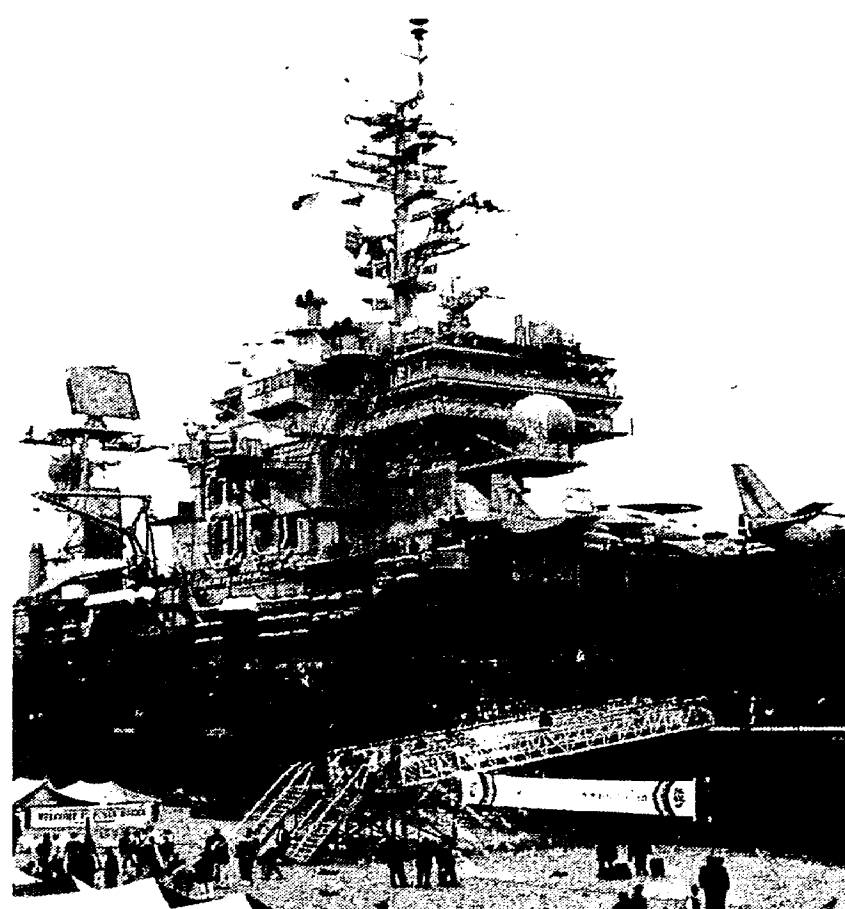
The school board also unanimously approved the canvass of the February 6 school board election. The

canvass showed the vote count for each candidate on each of the four voting machines at the consolidated Capitan School District voting poll at the Lincoln County Fairgrounds in Capitan, plus the number of absentee votes for each candidate. The total votes for position one candidates were 147 for Thomas R. Trost and 200 for David A. Cox. For the position 2, Gary R. Tregembo, unopposed, had 250 total votes. Newly elected members Cox and Tregembo will be sworn in by Lincoln County Clerk Martha Proctor at the March 8 school board meeting. The actual canvass of the votes was conducted by Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. with Proctor and Capitan School Superintendent Diana Billingsley as witnesses earlier on February 8.

Parents should soon be receiving a notification of a change in board policy which affects their rights under the Family Education and Rights to Privacy Act (FERPA), and a permission form that when signed allows the school to honor student work within the school. The board approved the second reading of board policy 6.24 concerning student records. The new policy was adopted in response to a successful lawsuit filed by a parent against a school district in another state because the parent's child was embarrassed to have his grades read out loud in class. In response to the suit, some districts were doing away with honor rolls and other means of honoring student achievement.

The notification of rights under FERPA sent to parents will list their rights to inspect and review their child's education records within 45 days of a written request; right to make written request for amendment to records the parent believes to be inaccurate or misleading; right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information in student education records. The notification of rights also defines the student directory and provides a way for parents to object to this information being included in the directory. The letter will include a waiver and consent form to be

New Police Officer Is Hired In Capitan

Capitan Village Trustees at their meeting Tuesday, February 13, approved hiring Chuck George as new police officer.

George comes from Austin, TX where he was a certified police officer. George was not introduced at the meeting because he was at the law enforcement academy obtaining a New Mexico certification.

Volunteer firefighters will have two years to meet new training requirements, said Capitan Fire Chief David Cox to trustees. Under new state rules issued by the state fire marshal's office, volunteer fire fighters who were previously classified as Firefighter I will have no such classification. Fire fighters will be able to do most of their training in-house, Cox said, then attend the fire academy for two days to challenge the written test and participate in a live burn. "Volunteers have two years to do this, if not, we have to knock people off," he added.

Cox said the department has implemented a training program and he thinks the 22 volunteers will be fully trained within the two year period.

Many citizens at the vil-

Carrizozo Council Hears About Bank

Aubrey Dunn, president of First Federal Savings Bank of New Mexico, and Tom Rigsby, manager of the Ruidoso branch office, addressed the Carrizozo town council at their meeting Tuesday evening, bringing trustees up to date on the status of the soon to be opened First Federal Carrizozo branch.

Rigsby explained some facts about the merger of State National and Ruidoso State Bank. One of the conditions for approval of the merger was Ruidoso had to sell off or divest some of their assets due to the regulators believing their (State National and Ruidoso State) size would be too big or would constitute a monopoly. In meeting this requirement Ruidoso State Bank offered to sell the Capitan and Carrizozo branches, and that is where First Federal came into the picture, bidding for these locations to open branch offices. The plan is to move in and become a part of the community.

First Federal Savings Bank of New Mexico, originally called Chaves County Savings & Loan, has been in business for 82 years. Currently there are branches in Ruidoso, Alamogordo, Las Cruces, El Paso and Albuquerque, with the home office branch located in Roswell. First Federal has been in Lincoln County for 25 years.

Rigsby stated, "We like small towns, like to make home loans, ranch loans, and we have the products and services that all the banks have now. We have internet banking and we want to come down here and become a presence in the community." Rigsby went on to say, "I will be overseeing not only the Ruidoso branch but the Capitan and Carrizozo (branches). I'm going to try and come down here at least once a week while we are getting started and we are going to try and build a business. And see what we can do to help with your banking services in this community."

Rigsby went on to tell a little about himself, stating he has lived in Ruidoso

so for 11 years, and with First Federal for six years. Rigsby then introduced Aubrey Dunn, president of First Federal.

Dunn presented the mayor with a t-shirt, cup and hat all with the First Federal logo. Dunn said he was raised in Alamogordo, and now lives in Roswell.

Dunn said that at the beginning of the transition period the bank would "re-issue checks to all customers at no cost." The checks would have the same account numbers, but with changes on the checks showing the correct routing.

The first numbers on a check are the routing numbers, showing which bank service and branch,

the mouse population down. He said this is especially important since the mice in the Capitan area do carry the Hanta virus.

Another resident asked why the village does not enforce the ordinance on horses, cows, chickens, goats, rabbits and other animals being raised within the village.

Mayor Norman Renfro said because the village has no zoning it cannot control what animals are kept on subdivision properties, only subdivision covenants can now do this. "It's up to neighbors to take action," Renfro said. "The village can't without a zoning or planning ordinance."

The village planning commission has begun work on a village comprehensive master plan.

Renfro also said ordinances can be repealed. He then told of a 1927 village ordinance which staff found

that allows the village marshal to shoot dogs. "That was their animal control those days," Renfro said.

Trustees also: --Heard citizens ask for improvements to village roads. Renfro explained the village is seeking legislative funding to chip seal certain roads and is seeking state highway cooperative funds to improve other roads.

--Heard trustee Debra Ingle, who is chair of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, say LCSWA has decided to place the 40-yard roll off containers in each of the LCSWA entities on a full time basis and customers will pay a fee at village hall to dump in the container. Resident Alex Trujillo suggested a monthly fee of one or two dollars be placed on every water bill in Capitan which would pay for the village residents' roll off use. Ingle said the idea will be considered.

--Heard citizens complain of the Charter Cable Company notification of increase in fees. Citizens asked the village to check into its franchise agreement with the company to update it or make demands that the company manager hold public hearings on any proposed rate increases.

Federal Judge Dismisses Case Against LCMC

U.S. Circuit Judge, Paul J. Kelly Jr. on February 2 in Albuquerque dismissed all claims against Lincoln County Medical Center in an anti-trust lawsuit filed by Frontier Medical (home care) citing insufficiency evidence.

According to a press release from Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC), Judge Kelly's decision stated in part, "In this case, the record contains no evidence suggesting the referral practices at issue have had any actual anti-competitive effects."

The lawsuit alleged LCMC had conspired with Home Health Services of Lincoln County to steer most discharged hospital patients

Capitan Man Goes To Court For Graffiti

A 29 year old Capitan man has pleaded not guilty to misdemeanor charges of unauthorized graffiti on personal or real property and assault.

Charges were filed January 23 on Jude Michael Vega, 30, of Capitan by Lincoln County Sheriff's Office Deputy Robert Shepherd. Vega made his first appearance at Magistrate Judge Bill Butts' court on January 25, where he pleaded not guilty to both charges. According to a spokesperson at magistrate court, Vega was originally scheduled for first appearance on February 8, but came in on January 25 on his own, after he learned of the charges being filed against him.

The charges stemmed from an incident at Capitan Village Hall where someone had defaced a picture of a village employee's child with devil horns and tail and a Swastika. The picture was taped to a file cabinet in a place semi-accessible to the public.

Capitan Mayor Norman Renfro and village clerk Kathryn Griffin conducted interviews of all village employees. Deputy Shepherd also interviewed all village employees. Renfro said Griffin in her interviews found out who had defaced the picture.

Griffin told THE NEWS she came in at 8 a.m. on Monday, January 22 and saw the defaced picture right away. However before she had an opportunity to deal with the incident in-house she had to take her son to the doctor. While she was out of the office, the employee came to work, found the picture and became very upset.

"I knew it was not a village employee (who defaced the picture)," Griffin said. "But we had to start by talking to all employees."

"I had hoped to handle the situation differently," she added. Griffin said none of the employees saw anyone deface the picture. But in fur-

ther questioning, Griffin said, a friend of a village employee admitted to defacing the picture.

Griffin said the incident was not village related and was a really bad prank. "It was a really stupid thing, and it was never a hate crime," Griffin said. "It's really sad it happened at village hall."

The lack of privacy for employees in village hall

has long been an issue for village hall employees. Last year the village received state funds to expand village hall, but the project is still in design form. Griffin said she is anxious for the expansion because it will give the clerks more privacy and may prevent any future incidents. "No one ever thought something like this could happen in city hall," she concluded.

Capitan Trustees Place Deputy Clerk On Leave

Following a two hour long closed session for personnel at their meeting Tuesday, February 13, Capitan Village Trustees unanimously approved placing deputy clerk Kateri Hicks on ad-

ministrative leave with pay until the board's next regular meeting.

After their vote, a concerned citizen asked why Hicks was put on administrative leave. Village attorney Don Dutton said they could not discuss the situation in open meeting unless the employee makes a request for a personnel hearing in public.

THE NEWS stayed at village hall while village officials were in closed session. At one point during the closed session, all employees present at the meeting went in with trustees, Renfro and village attorney Don Dutton. Clerk Kathryn Griffin also went into the session separately. Late in their session, Dutton came out seeking a state law book.

When trustees came back to open session they attested they had only discussed limited personnel during closed session. Then they adjourned.

After adjournment Hicks said she was unable to comment about the situation at this time.

followed by the individual's account number. The routing numbers need to be changed to assure proper service. Dunn said this would be the most complicated part of the transition.

Police chief Angelo Vega informed trustees of the status of police officer Will Reese following the accidental discharge of his weapon causing injury to himself. Reese is recovering well, and has an appointment with his doctor this Friday, to assess how long Reese will be off from work to recuperate.

Vega went on to update trustees on the repairs to the police station following the accidental weapon discharge. The town has a \$250 deductible for repairs, and when Vega informed the insurance company of the incident the insurance adjuster recommended replacing the blood stained carpet and repainting the station walls. Work was done as "In Kind" to balance out the deductible.

Vega requested and received approval to hire William Rodney Green as a probationary police officer. Green was introduced to trustees and he told a little about himself. Green who prefers to be called Rodney, is a 20 years veteran of the Air Force, where he was a member of the Air Police. Green has a wife, Ulrike, and three daughters, Karen 14, Kristen 10, and Rebecca 6, all who are excited about moving to Carrizozo. Green said the moving company would be packing him up and moving into his house in Carrizozo on February 20.

Diane Chavez requested the town extend a water line to her property, stating she is tired of well water. Trustees denied her request stating her residence is outside town limits, citing a moratorium against supplying town water outside town limits.

New Mexico State Library To Receive Federal Money

New Mexico State Library will receive \$1.173 million to support library efforts such as the rural bookmobile and the online access to full text/full image periodical database, according to a press release from U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen.

Funding will come from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, an independent federal agency that supports the nation's museums and libraries. The New Mexico State Library uses funding from this agency to provide public library services through four regional bookmobiles and a mail order book delivery service. In 1999, the book delivery service mailed 3,879 catalogs and circulated 107,595 items.

Additional funding goes toward the statewide license for Bell & Howell Research/Discovery Database. Statewide licensing allows the library to provide online access to a complete periodical database. The statewide license saves about 90 percent of the cost if each library were to obtain an individual license.

recommended both applicants divide their lots and register them with the assessors office to meet zoning ordinances about more than one dwelling per lot. Town officials discovered they were not allowed to require the lots be split.

Both Morris and Ortiz have large enough lots to meet all other setback requirements.

The discussion about placing a locked box at town hall for gas bill payments was met with approval, after town clerk Leann Wehbrecht voiced concern that the office employees not be held responsible. Soon people will be able to drop off gas bill payments at town hall, where they will be picked up by a Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas employee, and taken to the gas company office in Capitan. This request was made because of the increased time for mail delivery since the Carrizozo Post Office is no longer a sorting center. People expressed concern of being charged late fees for payments arriving late due to slow mail service.

Randy Merten received permission to place mobile homes on three properties in Mountain View Subdivision if he signs a contract saying he will set the units in place and skirt them. During the discussion trustee Eileen Lovelace said that Merten had promised to perform the same duties on several units he had placed in the past, but had not met the agreements as he had stated.

Trustees approved the motion to start proceedings to change the zoning for the Belco Building from C-1 to M-1 in hopes Kirk Noel's proposed rock cutting business would occupy the site.

Trustees discussed the status of the town's backhoe. The backhoe needs tires, and some serious maintenance. It was suggested the town purchase

a new backhoe, and three different options were offered. One of the options was the possible purchase of the used backhoe from Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas. The average use of the town's backhoe amounted to about 50 hours a year. It would not be cost effective to purchase a new backhoe for upwards of \$76,000 for this small amount of work time. Further investigation into

available options are being looked into.

The mayor said that during the next regularly scheduled town council meeting he would be attending class school for his job. The meeting for March was moved from the 13th to the 20th.

After a comment that the two and a half hour meeting was the longest meeting in quite awhile the meeting was adjourned and everyone left.

State Discriminates Against Us

Perhaps you didn't know that the state is discriminating against Lincoln County. Perhaps you didn't know that state officials are more interested in what they will get, or maybe what they already received, instead of preserving history. Perhaps you didn't know that certain people will benefit while generations to come will suffer from the tragedy of selling Fort Stanton and the water rights at Fort Stanton.

Registering historic places, identifying, evaluating, registering and protecting New Mexico's unique historic and prehistoric buildings and archaeological sites is the mission of the New Mexico Historic Preservation Division. Fort Stanton has been listed as historic but for unknown reasons Fort Stanton is not being protected by the state.

Evidently the state officials responsible for making the deal to sell Fort Stanton have been successful in keeping Fort Stanton away from cultural affairs. How and why did this happen? Would the state sell the Palace of Governors or Fort Seldon? Of course not because both are protected by the New Mexico Historic Preservation Division. But the state is planning to sell Fort Stanton. Utterly motives?

Justice is being circumvented and future generations will question why someone didn't prevent this situation from happening. Future generations may be consoled that the state continues to pay for upkeep of Fort Seldon, even if it is only walls, not complete buildings. Future generations may also be consoled that the state has made certain the Palace of Governors is protected by cultural affairs instead of being under the supervision of state general services.

Dedication to their duties should be a priority of the New Mexico Historic Preservation Division. That priority should include providing funds for preservation projects that benefit New Mexicans, providing funds for surveys, preservation plans and studies, and providing funds for public awareness projects. Do you suppose educating state officials would qualify as a public awareness project?

Instead of considering selling Fort Stanton the state should provide technical assistance and education. If you agree Fort Stanton should be included in the New Mexico Historic Preservation Division, please call state legislators and express your concern. If you agree the state Historic Preservation Division should fulfill their duties by helping protect Fort Stanton, please call 505-827-6320. If you agree that state property should never be used as a pawn by individuals, please call state legislators and officials.

Cultural properties and culturally significant properties in New Mexico should be maintained by the State Register of Cultural Properties. The state register is supposed to emphasize state and local significance. If you want to know why Fort Stanton is not included, call 505-827-6320.

Emphasis should be on doing what is right, not on doing what will benefit the rich baron or the winner of an election or the prominent entertainment person. Emphasis should be on doing the ethical thing, not on flaunting corrupt activity. Emphasis should be on historical significance, not on promoting discrimination against historic Fort Stanton.

INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE - Are we headed for another Big Mac nightmare? We're not talking about when you have one too many at McDonalds and then stay up all night with a stomach that feels the size of the Goodyear blimp.

We're talking about the big tax cut of 20 years ago that was followed by a crash in the energy market. The result was a budget that was 10 percent in the hole. In today's terms, that would be like trying to scrape together \$350 million to make ends meet.

Much has been written comparing Gov. Gary Johnson's proposed \$75 million income tax cut with the Big Mac cuts of 1981. But much also hasn't been said, mainly because most observers and analysts either have bad memories or weren't around back then.

Here's the story as I recall it. By 1981, New Mexico had experienced a seven-year energy boom. It wasn't just skyrocketing oil and gas prices as it is now; it also was uranium and coal and other extractive industries.

New Mexico, compared to its impoverished past, was floating in money. Early in that period, Gov. Bruce King and the Legislature established a joint committee to correct the huge inequity in school district financing. Courts throughout the nation were just beginning to rule that states must provide all students with equal opportunities. The education panel's recommendation to bring our poorest districts up to the level of the wealthiest never could have been implemented were it not for our big new batch of money.

That effort took a few years to phase in. When much of the energy money was freed up again, the governor and Legislature decided to create a second state piggybank, the Severance Tax Permanent Fund, in which to stash the extra loot. During those years, the Legislature rebated some money back to taxpayers through the income tax.

By 1981, it appeared our energy boom would continue for awhile and that permanent tax cuts were in order. Rep. Colin McMillan of Roswell put together a package of income, property and gross receipts cuts that totaled over \$150 million. The Republican-controlled House passed the measure. It made it through the Senate and was signed by Gov. King.

A year later, in 1982, revenues still looked good early in the year when the Legislature met. But late in the year, about the time Toney was being elected governor, the bottom fell out. The 1983 Legislature had to put together a \$118 million package of budget slashes, tax increases and accelerated cash flow procedures just to get through the end of the fiscal year in June.

That is where most stories end. But the repercussions extended other 11 years, through the rest of the Anaya administration, plus the term of Gov. Gary Carruthers and another of Bruce King's. Some sort of tax increase was necessary nearly every year.

The biggest of those increases came in 1986, when Republicans controlled both houses of the Legislature. The following year, Democrats were back in control.

Colin McMillan, the

namesake of Big Mac, didn't fare any better. He ran for governor in 1986 and finished third in the Republican primary. In 1994, he ran unsuccessfully for the U.S. Senate against Democrat Jeff Bingaman.

So, is all that damage likely to take place if Johnson's tax cut is passed. Not hardly. His proposed cut is half of Big Mac's in a budget three times larger. An equivalent cut today would be in the neighborhood of \$450 million.

We are looking at that much surplus this year, but if oil and gas venues return to their previous lows, we'll be in the hole next year. Democrats are saying there likely will be a tax cut, but maybe not like the governor's. Johnson is saying, let's not spend it all on pork.

Part of the solution is to use much of the surplus on equalization of school construction needs before the court tells us how to do it.

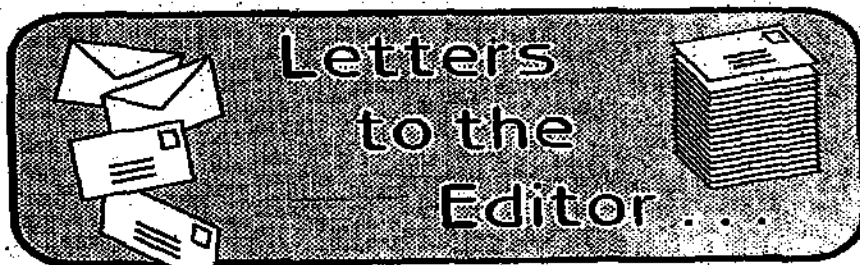

Editor: Fort Stanton stands in the shadow of Sierra Blanca like an old soldier at attention, slightly slumped, tattered at the edges but ready to fulfill his duty with simple dignity. It has never occurred to this soldier that his job is finished. It has never occurred to this old soldier that his time is past.

There are those of us who feel this same way and wish to call your attention to our cause.

Located 15 miles northeast of Ruidoso, Fort Stanton was built in 1855, one in a chain of frontier forts. It is a little known jewel in the New Mexico crown. Fort Stanton is the only standing fort in our state. Unlike the rest, it was not built of adobe to melt into oblivion. It was built to stand! Made from river rock and wood, it is a constant reminder of our history and heritage. It has seen duty with Kit Carson. It has seen duty with "Black Jack" Pershing. It has seen the Mescalero camped at its doorstep and aided in the settlement of the reservation. It was a willing participant in the final days of the Lincoln County War. It is an intricate part of the history of the great state of New Mexico.

And it needs our help! A consortium has been formed between the Mescalero Apache, the Bureau of Land Management, the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce and a non-profit group of preservationists called Fort Stanton, Inc. This group will be opening a museum/visitor's center on the grounds this spring. It is their desire to transfer the fort to BLM and make it into a living history museum.

The General Services Department is planning on introducing a bill to the state legislature for the sale of this fine old fort. Instead of valuing this treasure for its aesthetic worth, they are interested only in its monetary value. The value could be great. The fort is worth its weight in water rights. But it is worth its weight, heart and soul in its value to our place in history. It is worth everything we can do or provide to maintain, protect and establish this part of our state's essence.

signed by parents and students to allow the district to disclose information about them.

Copies of the new board policy can be viewed at the office of the school superintendent during regular business hours.

This spring students will be bringing home copies of the Quality of Education Surveys for parents to fill out and return. While 10 questions are set by the state board of education, the local board is allowed to include five questions. Board members discussed the five questions asked last year. Aldaz asked that the word "curriculum" be changed to read course or class, because some of the parents do not seem to understand what the word "curriculum" means. Aldaz said he wanted to make the questions more parent and public friendly. But an audience member thought it was necessary to keep the word curriculum in order to educate people, but maybe add "course."

Aldaz had similar thoughts about the question that asks if parents are aware of and understand the district "mission statement". He said no one remembers or seems to care what the district "mission statement" is. He suggested the words be changed to state "Strategic Plan." Three surveys will be prepared, one for the elementary, one for middle school, and one for the high school.

Questions from the elementary school survey ask about whether the Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) meetings represent a positive communication process; if the elementary school provides and supports positive punishment program; if parents and/or guardians feel comfortable visiting the school and classroom; if parents and/or guardians are aware of child's educational process throughout the year; if the school communicates with parents so they are aware of their child's academic progress as well as ongoing activities.

The five questions for the middle school ask if the child is given every opportunity to be a success by teachers and staff; if the child is receiving quality education in all core classes; if Spanish or other foreign language should be offered in middle school; if

teaching student responsibility should be a goal of middle school teachers; and if there is an adequate amount of homework expected of my middle school student.

In the high school, questions are whether Capitan high school students need four years of math, science, social studies and English before graduating; if high school should implement a four day school week and schedule all extracurricular activities on Friday and Saturday only; if high school needs to expand Advanced Placement Classes (that cost the student) and honors courses; if high school must develop and increase class offerings in the vocational department, Vo-Ag, Family Consumer Science (home ec.) and School to Career. High school principal Stierwalt said some of the vocational programs have had decreased enrollment. He said he plans to do a survey of students to determine what the high school needs for vocational classes, such as building trades and tourism/services.

The last question for the high school portion of the survey asks if the high school needs class offerings in dance, music, drama and visual arts. "We focus so hard on the core areas we don't always allow our children to have fun while they're in high school," Stierwalt said.

Aldaz said he knows of parents who have taken their children elsewhere because they were unable to get any fine art classes in the high school. He thought more students would come to Capitan if these fine art classes were offered.

As for the four day school week, Stierwalt said there is a bill in the state legislature to allow all schools the option to go to a four day week, regardless the size of the school. The question was on the survey last year and got mixed response. When posed to the Parent Advisory Committee, the members were undecided, Stierwalt added.

In other business, the board:

-Heard a report from Stierwalt about the new "Virtual Classroom". At the time of the meeting, 24 students were enrolled, many doing remedial make up classes. Parent Harold Dickerson was concerned

that so many were using the program for remedial work instead of enhancement. Stierwalt said the intent of the Virtual Classroom offered through the state department of education at no cost, is for enhancement. The program started with only 826 slots for students statewide. Stierwalt said some students have dropped from the classes because they found them harder than expected.

-Approved the 2000-01 Special Capital Outlay Tax Compliance Certificate, which will enable the district to obtain the \$25,000 state appropriation that was used to purchase the new Suburban.

-Started discussions about the upcoming budget process. Billingsley said one of the biggest changes was the huge increase in natural gas. Although they had budgeted in an increase for the fuel, no one had expected the huge increase, she said. Billingsley invited any staff, parent or community member to make comments on what the district needs for the next budget cycle. Salaries now take about 85 percent of the total budget and Billingsley said they could not develop the budget until the state legislature makes a decision about its school funding amounts.

Once that is done, about mid March the school must prepare and approve a preliminary budget to be submitted to the state department of education in Santa Fe by April 13.

-Approved the rehiring of George Holman as special services director for the 2001-02 school year and the hiring of John Duncan as a substitute teacher.

-Was updated on the superintendent search that 21 applications were mailed out and two have been returned. Applicants have until March 31 to apply.

-Heard that enrollment on the 100th day of class was down to 610. School funding is based on an average of enrollment numbers taken on the 40th, 80th and 120th days of school. Enrollment was 624 on the 80th day which was prior to the winter break. The 120th day count of all enrolled students will be taken on February 21.

-Approved rescheduling the May meeting to Wednesday, May 9, to allow Billingsley to attend the graduation of her daughters from college.

New Mexico Mounted Patrol Provides Needed Services

New Mexico Mounted Patrol is a law enforcement agency established by state statute, that is a separate entity from the New Mexico State Police.

According to John Tate 2nd Lt. of Troop 5 of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol, New Mexico Mounted Patrol (NMMP) members must attend a very specific law enforcement program at the law enforcement academy. Upon completion of the academy program, NMMP members become certified officers.

"Several characteristics make us unique," said Tate. The NMMP is an unfunded state agency. All members are volunteers who work without pay and supply all their own equipment as they cover their own expense, Tate said. "We are not reserves of any other agency," he added. "Out-stationary duty is to respond to requests for law enforcement assistance from any

state, sheriffs, or municipal law enforcement officer."

When NMMP members answer a call from a law enforcement agency for assistance they operate under the agency's police power, being vested with whatever police powers the agency has to delegate and chooses to delegate.

"Our legal status, when on duty, as full-time salaried law enforcement officers is established by statute 26-6-5 NMSA," Tate continued.

NMMP was established in 1941. It now has 26 Troops located throughout the state. Troop 5, of which Tate is the deputy commander, is headquartered in Ruidoso. In addition to general patrols with area law enforcement agencies, Troop 5 members have responded to several local emergencies, guarded crime scenes of plane crashes at Sierra Blanca Regional and Carrizozo Airports, guarded the arson crime scene at the

origin of the Cree Forest Fire, guarded the arson crime scene of the burned car in Mesalero, and man area weather-related road blocks.

State wide Troop 5 has responded to many emergency and routine calls for assistance. "For example, we provide added security at the State Fair and we assisted in crime scene processing at the Elephant Butte sex crime case," Tate added.

New Mexico Mounted Patrol celebrates its 60th anniversary this year. Troop 5 will host a celebration in Ruidoso during its annual state convention to be held at Swiss Chalet Inn in Ruidoso.

Several local dignitaries have been Mounted Patrol troopers. They include U.S. Rep. Joe Skeen and Carrizozo Municipal Judge C.O. Rominger.

terrain vehicles. We provide law enforcement for the soldiers and their families at Camp Hialeah. I also provide security for army units traveling throughout the country."

The experience U.S. troops gained during Foa Eagle is good practice should the uneasy peace between North and South Korea ever erode. The exercise also gave troops practice for real-world crises.

"In preparation for real-world emergencies, we undergo numerous training and performance evaluations throughout the year," said Minter.

With the Foa Eagle exercises completed, Minter returned to his usual job. "I enjoyed working hand and hand with the South Korean soldiers," Minter added. "This allowed us to help improve the United States' relationship with our South Korean allies."

Minter's loftiest professional goals may not include negotiating a peace agreement. But he did his part in keeping the peace by joining thousands of U.S. soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines while U.S. dignitaries help negotiate a new beginning in "The Land of the Morning Calm"—Korea.

PUSAN, Republic of Korea—The son of a Ruidoso-Downs couple plays an important role in international politics. While government officials negotiate an end to a cold war between North Korea and its southern neighbor South Korea, this soldier was doing his part to promote peace in a starkly different fashion.

Army Staff Sgt. James W. 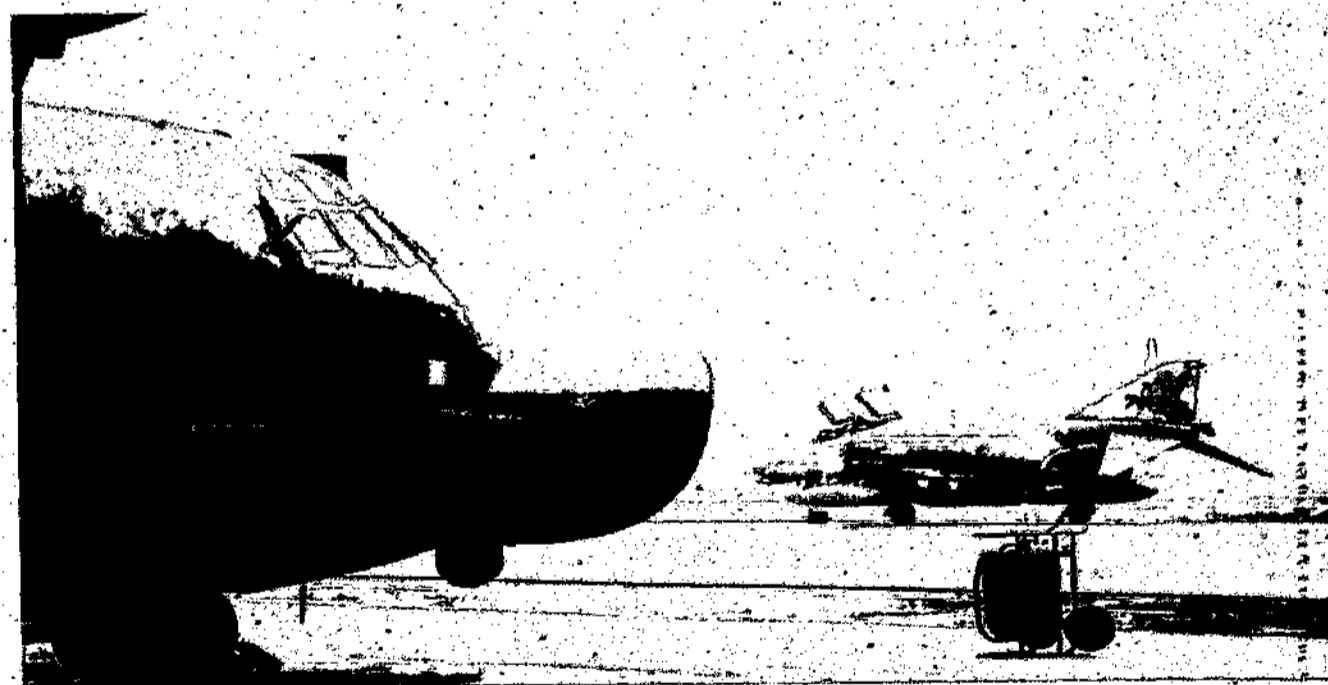
Held at military sites throughout South Korea in October and November, the exercise tested the ability of allied forces to provide ground and air protection, launch and recover aircraft and evacuate civilians from an embattled Korean Peninsula.

"I'm a squad leader at the Camp Hialeah police station," Minter said. "I'm responsible for the welfare of 10 soldiers and three all-

**State Conservation
Seedling Program
Is Now Taking Orders**

The New Mexico State Forestry Division is again doing its conservation seedling program.

To qualify for the program, a person must own at least one acre of land in New Mexico and plant the trees obtained from the division for conservation purposes.

Forestry Division recommends, property owners choose trees that grow and survive best in their area.

Several varieties do best in the lower elevations of southern New Mexico. Those species include Arizona sycamore, desert willow, Rio Grande cottonwood, Afghanistan pine and Arizona cypress.

Minimum order for the bare root trees is 50. Property owners may split the order in bundles of 25 of a single species. The maximum order is 2,400 trees. Trees are also available in containers. The minimum order for trees in a 10 cubic inch pot is 49 of a single species, maximum order is 2,400. Minimum order for trees in a 40 cubic inch container (two-season trees) is 20 of a single species and maximum order is 1,000.

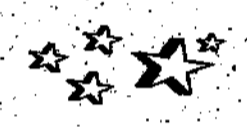

Ryan reviewed the survey results by category. Overall the survey had the most response to questions dealing with quality of life.

In the Land Use/Environment category, there were clear indicators of support for particular land use actions by the village, Ryan said. The question that got the most response, 87 percent agreeing or strongly agreeing, was whether the village should preserve and/or acquire hillsides and forests to protect scenic views. Some 85 percent of response agreed or highly agreed with the need for forest management practices such as thinning to reduce fire danger.

As for zoning, 64 percent of the respondents agreed the village should consider revising its development regulations to adopt stricter zoning, while 71 percent agreed the village should revise its sign codes. Only 58 percent agreed the village needs to establish architectural design standards.

Respondents also showed they did not support reduction of zoning regulations, changing of zones to allow more businesses in neighborhoods, in-fill development (within already established areas), and expansion of village boundaries.

Under Parks and Recreation, Arts, Culture, 81 percent of respondents agreed the village needs to increase marketing of local fine arts, 79 percent of respondents agreed the village should encourage more entertainment activities, such as casinos and special events, and 78 percent agreed the village should support a Village museum

or historic preservation group. There was also strong response for the village to develop a system of walking and hiking trails. There was moderate support of more activity recreation areas. Respondents were split on their support for and against retaining major recreation facilities.

Public Facilities and Infrastructure question responses showed that 56 percent agreed or highly agreed that the quality of public facilities in Ruidoso is good. Some 88 percent of the respondents thought the village should plan and construct new facilities such as new fire stations, and sewer collection lines to serve all areas. 84 percent wanted more maintenance and paving and 71 percent agreed the village should widen and straighten major streets for drainage and turn lanes. Some 77 percent of the respondents agreed the village should increase its water supply by adding wells, treatment plants and reservoirs and upgrading the capacity of existing water lines.

As for village public services, responses showed the village needs to concentrate on the quality of village services, improving the village responsiveness to public comments and provide information to keep citizens informed about public services. Some 64 percent favored privatizing public services if cost effective and will not decrease the quality of service. Neighborhood crime was not seen as a highly perceived problem as only 23 percent of respondents rated it as highly important. Questions receiving the lowest rating

asked if responders wanted expansion of the variety of public services available and improving accessibility to officials.

Under the Economic Development/Business and Tourism categories, 74 percent of the respondents wanted to enhance the mid-town as a pedestrian-oriented tourism attraction with a variety of shops and art activities.

As a means of increasing tourism and the local economy, 64 percent of the respondents strongly supported a regular air service to attract and serve residents and visitors. Some 58 percent support promoting leisure use of Rio Ruidoso.

Responses also showed the three highest ranking economic strategies for Ruidoso were to promote a diversified economy and reduce dependence on tourism related industries and businesses; increase business retention efforts to assist the preservation and expansion of local business; and to market and promote trade shows and convention businesses.

In the long term, the survey respondents showed they wanted to maintain the high quality of life by not growing too fast and limiting density. They want future developments to be high quality and they want to save open spaces along the Rio Ruidoso and un-subdivided hillsides. Respondents also wanted to find ways to diversify the economy with an emphasis on the arts, history and entertainment values of Ruidoso.

Solutions to long term community needs should be addressed in the village

comprehensive plan, Ryan said. Among long term needs expressed by respondents were improvement of pedestrian areas in mid-town by creating a traffic bypass; keeping the river and undeveloped hillsides available for recreation or to be acquired by the village; adopt and enforce regulations that reduce fire danger, retain the architectural character of Ruidoso and clean up sign clutter; build roads, water facilities and parks needed for the community.

After Ryan's presentation, mayor Robert Donaldson said the village is already doing some of the things suggested by the survey respondents. "We'll incorporate the results and long term conclusions in our Master Plan," Donaldson said. He said the process to update the Master Plan will begin with public hearings with the village planning and zoning commission and will take from six months to a year. "We will then use the Master Plan to redo the municipal code," Donaldson added.

On the issue of architectural guidelines, Donaldson said he had asked Joan Zagone, director of the chamber of commerce, to serve on a task force to look into such guidelines for the commercial areas. "Once we get support for architectural guidelines," Donaldson continued, "we can move forward. It is critical to begin with those who will be most affected. We need to get the community to buy into this, which is very much needed as commercial areas develop and redevelop."

Councilor Bill Chance said it was interesting that responses from the 24-65 year old age group reached similar conclusions. "The survey also said that if you are under 25 you can't (afford to) live here."

Police Sting More Stores In County For Underage Serving

Five establishments that sell alcohol in the Ruidoso-Alto area were cited for serving alcohol to an underage person.

Walgreen's, Circle K in Ruidoso Downs, Johnson's Village Store in Alto, and Allsup's at Sudderth and Mechem in Ruidoso and Allsup's on Highway 70 in Ruidoso Downs were cited for selling alcohol to an 18 year old.

On Friday, January 26, state police special investigations division agent Todd Griffin and state police officer Chris Mirabal conducted an underage alcohol sting operation that netted five establishments whose clerks/servers sold alcohol to an 18 year old during an undercover alcohol sting operation.

The minor, working in an undercover capacity, carried her valid New Mexico drivers license that clearly displayed her date of birth of 09/12/1982 and the caution statement "Under 21 Until 09/21/2003" in bold red print. The minor was instructed to show ID when asked and to tell the truth if asked questions concerning her age. The minor attempted to purchase alcohol in 12 licensed liquor establishments in the Ruidoso-Alto area.

The clerks/servers in Walgreen's and Circle K failed to check the ID of the 18 year old. The clerks/servers caught selling to the minor were issued criminal citations, a misdemeanor which

carries a maximum penalty of \$1000 and/or up to 60 hours community service, and possible suspension or revocation of the sellers' alcohol server permits.

Administrative citations were also issued to the establishments caught in the operation. Administrative citations will be forwarded to the New Mexico Regulation and Licensing Department's Alcohol and Gaming Division, which may assess administrative penalties includes fines of \$1,000 to \$10,000 and/or suspension of an establishment's liquor sales.

The clerks/servers at both Allsup's were arrested on outstanding warrants along with being cited. Also at one store a customer received a citation for having open containers of alcohol in a motor vehicle.

Seven other establishments were also visited by the 18 year old. The clerk/servers at these establishments checked the minor's ID and properly refused the sale of alcohol. Those were Billy the Kid Casino, Wal-Mart, Pizza Hut on Sudderth Drive, Furr's Supermarket, Farley's Pub, Club Gas on Mechem Drive, and Allsup's on Mechem Drive.
