

# County Considers Housing Federal Prisoners

Lincoln County is considering a contract with the U.S. Marshall's service to begin housing federal inmates in the Lincoln County Detention Center (LCDC) within the next 10 days.

On Wednesday morning, at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan, Carrizozo Police Chief Angelo Vega,

State Police Captain John Sena, Lincoln County Detention Center administrator John Buffington and Lincoln County manager Tom Stewart met to develop a response plan for any incident that might occur at the LCDC.

Sullivan told *THE NEWS* his main concern for having federal prisoners at LCDC is security. He said the LCDC with its dormitory style big rooms, cannot be

"locked down" with prisoners in their own cells.

Sullivan also said he is concerned about what type of federal inmates will be sent to LCDC. He said sometimes other correction facilities will send out their "less than desirable" inmates to smaller, less experienced, correction facilities such as the county detention center. He said there have been other cases at

correctional facilities in New Mexico, such as at CCA in Estancia and Wackenhut in Santa Rosa, where federal inmates have caused lots of problems. "We discussed this during the meeting, which I thought was very productive," Sullivan said.

Also, Sullivan said he did not think his officers are trained well enough to deal with federal prisoners. He said he hopes the federal inmates come with correc-

tional histories so local law enforcement have an idea of what they are dealing with. Sullivan said in case of any problems at the LCDC it will be the sheriff's office, Carrizozo Police and state police that respond.

Carrizozo Police Chief Angelo Vega said local law enforcement agencies need to strengthen their response teams in case of

misconduct of federal prisoners at LCDC. Vega said officer Eddy O'Brien has experience with federal prisoners and officer W.R. Green had riot training as a military police officer. "If we work together as a team we will be more prepared to reduce any potential for violence," Vega said. But he admitted he had some con-

An executive session for limited personnel matters and personally identifiable student information is set for the conclusion of the meeting.

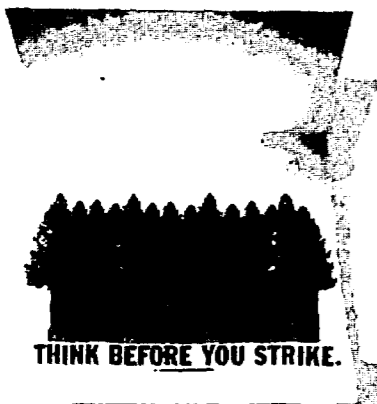
## Blood Drive In Ruidoso July 13

## Capitan Hires Temp For Smokey Bear Museum

Capitan Village Trustees, in a short meeting Tuesday, July 10, hired Sherry Holmes as a part time employee for the Smokey Bear Museum and Gift Shop.

With the hiring of Holmes, the museum has one full time employee and two part time employees. Capitan mayor Norm Renfro said the museum is doing very well this summer with gift sales "out of sight."

Trustee Leroy Montes said the additional part time employee will mostly work on weekends and be substitute for the others when they are sick or must take time off.

Trustees also approved the 2001-02 fiscal year operating budget as reviewed and adjusted by the state Department of Finance and Administration (DFA). They

also approved a resolution for the final clean up of the budget for the 2000-01 fiscal year that ended June 30. Renfro said village clerk Kathryn Griffin work "real hard" on the clean up budget that balances all funds and carries over cash or funds from the 2000-01 budget into the current fiscal year budget that began July 1.

Trustees also approved the annual agreement with Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) Council of Governments for 2001-02. In the agreement Capitan will pay annual dues of \$550 to the organization that provides technical assistance with Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) and lobbying efforts with the state legislature on projects to benefit communi-

ties within the seven counties of the SNMEDD.

One of the functions of the SNMEDD is presenting information and taking public input on the CDBG process. At a public hearing held prior to the regular meeting, Dora Batista with the SNMEDD, presented information about the upcoming round of CDBGs. She also told of an upcoming meeting of the Economic Development Council whose members are seeking input on possible changes and revisions to the CDBG process. One of the proposed changes is increasing the grant limit from the current \$400,000 to \$450,000 and allowing projects to be completed with one phase, instead of providing smaller than requested grants that will

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## Carrizozo Health Clinic Is On County Agenda

Commission Meeting Starts At 8 am July 19

Lincoln County Commissioners, who meet only once a month, decided to start earlier in the day.

Beginning Thursday, July 19, county commissioners will start their regular meetings at 8 a.m. in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. County manager Tom Stewart said commissioners, at a recent meeting, discussed starting their regular sessions earlier especially in the summer. "So I decided to try the 8 a.m. and see how it works," Stewart told *THE NEWS*.

During the July 19 meeting, commissioners will take formal action on a resolution that sets the meeting starting time at 8 a.m.

Stewart said even with the

8 a.m. start time, public hearings will continue to be held at 10 a.m.

The tentative agenda for the July 19 meeting already has 40 business items, including two public hearings at 10 a.m., another public hearing at 10:45 a.m. and a final budget hearing at 2 p.m. The first hearing at 10 a.m. is for input on possible projects to be funded with the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) and the second to discuss and adopt an ordinance prohibiting noise caused by the use of a "jake brake" or retarder to slow a motor vehicle's rate of speed.

At 10:45 a.m. the commissioners will review and adopt the final changes to the county subdivision ordinance.

Scheduled on the agenda after the 10 and 10:45 a.m.

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## Paving Work To Begin On 'E' Ave. In Carrizozo

Work will finally begin on the paving projects in Carrizozo, beginning with E Avenue being a priority. The Carrizozo town council approved to accept the bid from Khani Construction of Albuquerque. The bid of \$392,246.95 was more than \$15,000 lower than the next higher bidder. There were a total of seven bidders for the project.

Khani Construction representative Dennis Jackson addressed the town council saying that he understands that work is to begin within two weeks of award of contract. Jackson also said "...hoped to be in and out of your way within 60 days. The goal is to finish in 45 to 60 days." Khani Construction has 120 days to complete the project.

E Ave. from 8th Street to Drexel is to be paved but the streets on the other side of town will only receive a double penetration of oil on gravel. No reason was given for the change from the original plans to pave all the streets.

After a standard employment probationary period trustees approved hiring Cathie Eisen as the water treatment technician.

Eisen is in charge of the day to day operations of the water treatment plant. Eisen, a certified Water Treatment Technician II, is studying to become a certified Water Technician III, a goal she hopes to reach within the next 18 months. Eisen has worked as the water treatment plant technician in the Carrizozo plant for the last six months. She has made presentations to the town council about the quality of the water she is responsible for maintaining. Eisen also keeps the town council updated on research she is doing for government grants to upgrade the existing water treatment plant, as well as the waste water treatment plant the town is in the process of finalizing plans for building. Eisen recently purchased a home here in Carrizozo, moving from Nogal.

It was quite hot in the town hall due to the swamp cooler not working. The sweltering temperatures might have had an influence in trustee's decision to approve purchasing a new swamp cooler from Holly Mechanics of

Temperatures were close to normal last week, with scattered hit and miss rain storms.

Precipitation amounts in Lincoln County so far this year continue to be below the average. According to the New Mexico Agricultural Report, Carrizozo had received 4.98 inches of precipitation from January 1 to July 1, below the 5.55 inches average for the same time period.

Precipitation in the Ruidoso area lagged further behind, with 6.84 inches of precipitation measured from January 1 to July 1. The average is 10.99 inches.

cerns about having federal prisoners at LCDC.

LCDC administrator Buffington, who is an employee of Correction Systems Inc. (CSI) that contracts with the county for management of the LCDC, said they are anticipating that within 10 days the LCDC will be taking the federal prisoners. He said he and the county have been working with the U.S. Marshall's Service for about three months on this contract to take federal prisoners.

Last week, representatives the US Marshall's Service came to inspect the LCDC and to talk with the county manager.

"We've been told the federal prisoners will mostly be illegal aliens," Buffington said. "In my opinion an inmate is an inmate. Today here in LCDC we have a range of inmates."

Buffington said he and the county manager will be reviewing the proposed agreement with the US Marshall's Service. Buffington said CSI will provide proper training for LCDC staff, as part of the terms of the management contract with the county.

Since the early planning stages for the LCDC, the county has considered taking federal prisoners as a way to help pay for the costs to operate the LCDC, Buffington added. Currently inmate population at LCDC averages 75. The facility has capacity to house up to 125.

"The bottom line is nothing is finalized," Buffington added. "They (US Marshall's Service) want us, because they think we are a good detention center with quality management and staff that is outstanding."

County manager Tom Stewart could not be reached for comments.

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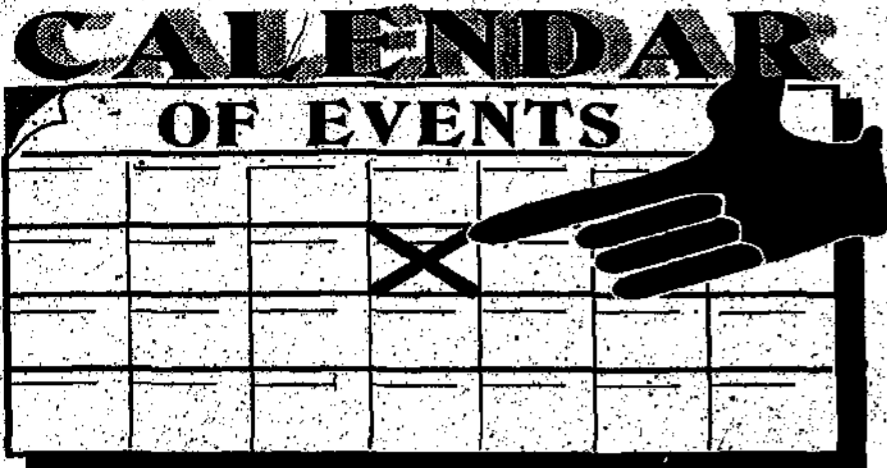

*Ask those questions now*

Perhaps you haven't heard yet, but the news is that the Lincoln County Detention Center (LCDC) may begin to take federal prisoners within the next 10 days. Seems the powers that be have been considering the possibility of the new facility housing federal prisoners as a way to help pay for the costs to operate the detention center. We agree with Sheriff Tom Sullivan's concerns that the design of the new detention center does not allow for a "lock down" in the event something should happen. The safety of all the workers at the new detention center is our main concern.

Regarding the types of federal inmates that might be sent to the LCDC, we heard that most might be illegal aliens. If that is true, it seems the illegal aliens would not be in the detention center very long. It shouldn't take that long to do the processing and paperwork. We do wonder about other illegal aliens, those creatures that invade our space and sometimes crash land their UFOs. Will those illegal aliens also be taken to the Lincoln County Detention Center without being allowed to call home? Apparently there were no survivors when a UFO crash landed in this area years ago, but if there had been survivors where would they have been housed? That was years before the Lincoln County Detention Center had even been designed.

One thing we definitely do wonder about is whether the group that met yesterday will make the final decision or if the matter will be decided by the county commissioners at a public meeting. Several people have concerns that need to be addressed, and we believe these concerns should be discussed during a public county commission meeting. And some people want to be assured that everyone receives proper training for responding to any incidents that might happen. Proper training for everyone is definitely a must.

But we wonder if training will be provided for taking care of those illegal aliens from outer space. Maybe those guys from outer space don't speak our language. Maybe those guys from outer space have the ability to communicate with thoughts and don't need to talk. Maybe those guys from outer space won't be able to eat earthly food. Will training be provided in methods of preparing different types of food? We certainly don't want our county jail facility to be accused of starving anyone, especially illegal aliens from outer space. Those guys from outer space may not know that it is against the law to crash land in this area and might assume they will be treated fairly and kindly.

Lack of information about how to treat illegal aliens from outer space is minor compared to the lack of information about housing federal prisoners. Local people should be told how much the federal government will pay for each prisoner to be housed in LCDC and how this money will be used to help pay for the costs to operate the LCDC facility.

Every question asked should be answered and we do hope the county commission will allow time on their agenda for all the concerns of local residents to be addressed.

More than anything else, there must be communication between everyone to talk about all concerns, even ET's.

**SANTA FE**  
**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** - We won't have to wait until September's legislative special session for things to get hot and heavy concerning the redistricting issue.

Halfway through the schedule of the Legislature's interim Redistricting Committee tensions are high, charges are being hurled and police are investigating a possible death threat.

Redistricting involves the most brutal hardball politics of any issue to come before lawmakers because it involves their political lives. And maybe that's what the "death" threat was all about. At the Carlsbad hearing on June 20, Rep. Dan Foley of Roswell passed a note to Rep. Earlene Roberts of Lovington saying, "Godbey is a dead man." Rep. Ron Godbey is from Albuquerque and is not an ally of Foley's, even though all three are Republicans.

Every 10 years, lawmakers must redraw boundary lines for legislative and other districts. Because New Mexico doesn't grow as fast in some areas as others, some districts just disappear. The two areas most affected by stagnant population this time are Eastern New Mexico and Central Albuquerque.

Logically, that's where the seats will be lost. But it doesn't necessarily happen that way. By drawing the lines just right, someone between Eastern New Mexico and central Albuquerque could get caught in the middle. And that's where Rep. Godbey happens to sit in Albuquerque's far Northeast Heights.

Some have guessed that Foley's disagreement with Godbey involves drugs. Foley supported some of the package of drug bills presented to the Legislature by Gov. Gary Johnson. Godbey was its biggest opponent.

State GOP Chairman John Dendahl got in trouble with Godbey and others for supporting the governor's package. Godbey ended up challenging Dendahl for his party chairman post. Foley recorded a telephone message supporting Dendahl and attacking Godbey. Rep. Roberts seconded Godbey's nominating speech. So there's bad blood.

At the very first meeting of the Redistricting Committee, its consultant, Brian Sanderoff, told members: "Don't look at your own seat in a vacuum, because your neighbors might be looking at you as dinner." It appears there

may be some of that going on already.

But squeezing out Godbey, if such is really being attempted, isn't the only agenda currently being run. Albuquerque's West Side, one of the fastest growing areas in the state, wants to be sure it gets another senator and representative. But central Albuquerque could solve its problem if several of its districts took little chunks out of the West Side, instead.

And minorities want to assure their voting strength is maximized and not diluted, especially in Southeastern New Mexico, where the lost district easily could be Hispanic. And that led Jose Luis Aguilar of Artesia to ask many questions of the committee and to propose a rudely drawn map of his own. Committee Co-chairman Leonard Tsoisie, a Crownpoint Democrat, directed the committee staff to draw a map for the next meeting incorporating Aguilar's proposal.

That led Beverly Dow, a Roswell mother who brought her daughter to the Roswell hearing, to ask

questions about how the process works and how she could get a map drawn. Democrat committee members became defensive and were scolded by Republicans on the committee for hassling Dow.

Later Rep. Foley reportedly called Aguilar to the microphone and tried to back him into a corner by pushing for a commitment to support a remapping plan that would give Artesia its own representative but likely would take away a minority district. Ten years ago, Artesia lost its representative when it was carved up and put in other districts.

Rep. Earlene Roberts tried to assure the audience that the lawmakers weren't fighting, but only engaging in healthy debate. But not everyone bought it, especially when they saw members of the audience getting caught in the crossfire.

Ten years ago, Los Alamos also lost its Senate seat when it was carved up. That sort of thing will happen again this year. And it has tensions running very high.

## Ray Pleads Guilty

A plea agreement was reached in the trial of David Parker Ray, 61, of Elephant Butte. Under the plea agreement Ray pleaded guilty in an Estancia courtroom to first degree kidnapping, conspiracy to commit kidnapping and second degree sexual penetration.

The plea agreement ended a week long trial that centered on accusations by a 23 year old woman that he kidnapped two years ago, taking her to his Elephant Butte home and torturing her.

Ray's initial arrest was made in March 1999 after the woman escaped and fled, wearing nothing but a collar with a chain. Ray was convicted of 12 counts in April in a separate case involving a Colorado woman.

After pleading guilty on July 2, Ray faces a possible 36 years imprisonment, bringing the possible term of imprisonment to 238 years on the state charges alone. In another stem of the agreement, Ray will plead guilty to charges of white slavery which exposes him to the possibility of an additional 20 years bringing the total possible years of imprisonment to 258.

## New Prison In Clayton?

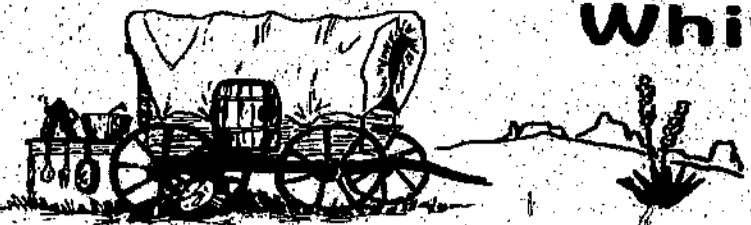

Events got off on a positive note last week for the supporters who propose that a \$90 to \$100 million federal correctional facility be built on a 1,700 acre site owned by the Town of Clayton, U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici declared his support for the project in a letter to Pamela Chandler, Site Selection Specialist for the Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP).

However, this week the local ad hoc consortium of government representatives, business leaders and interested individuals, got the bad news. Dr. Michael Jenkins, a spokesman for the group and a member of the Clayton Town Council received a letter from David Dorwarf also from the BOP's site selection team. "He said they were not seeking new sites in New Mexico, stated Jenkins. "His letter indicated they are looking at California, and Arizona, for three new facilities."

While the news was treated as a setback, Jenkins and the other members of the group who have dubbed themselves Clayton Planning and Revitalization (CRP), are not ready to abandon an effort that has been in the works for the past six months.

finance projects in multi phases.

During the regular meeting trustees also tabled awarding the bid for gravel until they could have tests done of the materials offered. Two bids were received for gravel, the first from Ruidoso Paving at \$9.95 per ton of gravel delivered and \$6.60 per ton of gravel picked up at the pit. The other bid was from Pat Huey at \$12 per ton of gravel delivered. Village attorney Don Dutton said both bids appeared to comply with the requirements for gravel that meet state highway department specifications. The gravel is to be used in state highway cooperative projects.

Dutton said in considering the award of the bid the village can use experience in dealing with the contractor's ability to meet the village's needs. Griffin said village maintenance supervisor Terry Cox had contacted an independent testing company which will test the gravel before awarding the bid. Also the village has enough gravel inventory to do current projects.

With that Dutton recommended trustees wait for the test analysis. Renfro said last year they had problems with the gravel from low bidder Ruidoso Paving, because the gravel would not compact. Because of the problems, the village worded the request for bids to allow the trustees to reject a bid from a company whose product was not acceptable.

Trustees unanimously voted to table the awarding

of the gravel bids until the products were tested. Dutton said the bid prices are good for 60 days.

Capitan planning commission now meets on the fourth Wednesday of each month. The next meeting of the planning commission is 7 p.m. Wednesday, July 25, at village hall. A planning commission subcommittee will meet at 6 p.m. Wednesday, July 18 at the Friends of Smokey visitor center (old Margaret Ranch house) west of Shell Station. Renfro said both groups will welcome public attendance and input.

During the public comment portion of the meeting, Mary Brothers expressed concern about two occurrences at the July 4 parade. She said the sirens from the fire trucks were deafening, and a horse with the youth rodeo club float got out of control and almost stepped on her grandson. "Otherwise the parade was beautiful," Brothers said.

Renfro said this year's parade was the biggest in five years, and the crowd was estimated at more than 8,000 visitors.

Trustee Debra Ingle said similar suggestions, comments and concerns were discussed by the Friends of Smokey (FOS) parade committee the day after the parade. FOS sponsors the parade.

Resident Harold Dickerson said he thought the parade ran real smooth and just the one incident with the horse was not enough to make a "catastrophe."

Trustee John Whitaker

said he thought the parade was "lovely and my only complaint was I had to work." Whitaker works at the Shell Station.

Another resident asked why the Capitan High School band did not march in the parade. Ingle said FOS sent 56 invitations to bands to be in the parade and got no response. *THE NEWS* said many of the high school band students work in the summer and are not available to march in the parade. Ingle said FOS has contacted Ruidoso High School band to march in the 2002 parade and has received some indication that band may be interested.

Renfro also reported that the construction on the vil-

lage hall expansion started on July 3. Crews had removed the wooden coverings on the basic metal building. The expansion project has a 150 day construction schedule with completion by November 16. The project will double the size of the building which will feature the old west wooden facade and porch.

The village's Rural Utility Services (RUS) loan/grant for the subdivision water systems improvements has been finally approved by the Denver regional RUS office, Renfro said. Project engineer Rob Richardson will be issuing an invitation to bid on the project within the next 10 days, Renfro added.

The village was turned down in its request for funding through the state highway department Municipal Arterial Program to

chip seal Long Road, Renfro also announced.

After a brief report on the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA), Dickerson commended the LCSWA crews for doing "an exceptionally good job."

At the end of the meeting, just before adjournment, Mary and Don Brothers offered to give a 24 by 32

foot metal building to the village. Dutton said he would make the arrangements for the donation.

taxes.

There is a new law on the books effective as of July 1 that will increase our motor vehicle license plate fees: There will be an increase of \$2.00. The governor signed this into law. The governor created this tax to fund a proposed computer program to track uninsured motorists. This "fee" is a tax.

For your information the governor farmed out the making of our license plates, not to another state but to another country, Canada. To save money. Where is the savings?

Would it be impossible for the insurance companies to notify the NM Motor Vehicle Dept. when a motorist cancels their insurance after receiving the vehicle registration? Both entities are computerized and could easily handle the transactions. When the insurance is cancelled the vehicle registration should be cancelled as well. Notification to local police and sheriff department will identify those motorists driving without insurance and registration. The state could use the "savings" from farming out the license plates to offset the costs, if any, incurred by the insurance companies.

My question to the voters and taxpayers would be, how did your representatives and senators vote on this increase in taxes? I would be interested to know how representatives Marquardt, Vaughn, and Williams and senators Kidd, Rawson, and Duran, voted on this issue. They all campaigned on no new taxes.

No matter what you call it, how you dress it up, the additional fee on the license plates is a tax. I feel strongly that in the next legislative session this increase should be recinded.

Think about this and give your legislators a call or e-mail them and find out why they voted the way they did.
