

# LCSWA Budget Is In The Black

Members of the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority approved the 2001-02 budget which shows the organization to be in the black.

After ending the 2000-01 fiscal year with a deficit of \$42,224, the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) approved a budget for the 2001-02 fiscal

year that showed an \$80,000 surplus above the required reserves, without using all the environmental gross receipt taxes to offset the costs versus revenues.

The LCSWA board earlier this year raised its residential rates in order to achieve a balanced budget for 2001-02. At the LCSWA meeting on July 17 in Ruidoso Downs, members approved the 2001-02 budget, as re-

viewed and adjusted by the state Department of Finance and Administration (DFA). The 2001-02 fiscal year began July 1.

The 2001-02 budget shows LCSWA projects it will collect \$1,265,361 from trash collections and recycling, will receive \$44,053 from a solid waste grant and collect \$309,299 in environmental gross receipts. With a total of \$1,618,713 in reve-

nues, LCSWA has budgeted \$1,560,066 in expenditures. No cash transfers will be made, and a total beginning cash balance of \$135,408 from the 2000-01 fiscal year, will bring the estimated ending cash balance for 2001-02 to \$194,053 plus the required reserve of \$113,984.

A bulk of the expenditures is for salaries. LCSWA chair Debra Ingle said the

expenditures for personnel services in the administration department includes \$20,000 to, if the board decided, pay her expenses while serving in the managerial capacity. On May 18 the board voted to have Ingle serve in a managerial capacity for six months, at no pay. However, they agreed to pay her expenses and provide her a cell-

phone. LCSWA member Frank Cummins (who represents Ruidoso) said he thought the \$20,000 should be in the budget. LCSWA member Lloyd Nickerson (who represents Carrizozo) asked what the plans were "post Debra."

### Carrizozo Police Make Arrest After Shooting

A Carrizozo man remains in Lincoln County Detention Center on a \$250,000 bond on charges stemming from a shooting at a domestic incident.

On Wednesday, July 18, Carrizozo Police Officer William Green and Carrizozo Police Chief Angelo Vega arrested Carlos Garcia, 19, Carrizozo, on charges of felon in possession of firearm, assault with intent to commit a violent felony, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, battery, false imprisonment and possession of marijuana less than one ounce. Garcia was booked into the Lincoln County Detention Center (LCDC) on a \$250,000 bond set by Magistrate Judge William Butts and no bond from the adult probation/parole office. Garcia is on state probation for a felony conviction for trafficking in Otero County.

Garcia was arrested for his involvement in a domestic dispute concerning a juvenile female.

According to information from Vega, he and officer Green responded to a 911

call about shots fired at a residence on the 400 block of C. Ave. on July 16.

When police arrived Jonathan Sedillo alleged that Garcia had discharged a handgun at him, missing his person by only inches. Sedillo also alleged that Garcia had forced a juvenile female into Garcia's pickup and left the scene.

Police found Garcia at a nearby location lying in his truck with a gunshot wound to his right buttock. Police contacted an ambulance which responded. Garcia told police that the handgun was sitting on the truck seat between he and the juvenile female. There was a struggle between Garcia and the juvenile female for control of the gun, when the gun went off. Garcia was taken to Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) in Ruidoso for treatment.

In the course of searching Garcia's clothing, officer Green located a package of cigarettes including one partially smoked cigarette the officer believed to be marijuana. A field test confirmed the substance was

burglary at the Antique Liquidators on July 8 and another burglary at Richmond Tire on July 10.

Magistrate Judge William Butts signed the arrest warrant for Morgan and set his bond at \$75,000 with no 10 percent allowed.

A 17 year old male juvenile from Carrizozo was referred to the Juvenile Probation Office for his involvement in the two burglaries.

According to Vega, evidence left at the scene and interviews of several individuals enabled he and police officer Eddie O'Brien to locate the suspects. Items taken from the Richmond burglary were all recovered at a location in Carrizozo. The cash taken from the Antique Liquidators was not recovered, Vega said.

Morgan remains in the LCDC and will have a preliminary hearing before Judge Butts on Friday, July 20 in the Municipal Court Complex in Carrizozo.

### LCSWA Holds Grievance Hearing For Employee Supervisory Authority Questioned

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) acted as a grievance board at the July 17 meeting in Ruidoso Downs.

The LCSWA board held a grievance hearing for Harold Dean Shelby, who had been fired by Ingle in late June for "abandonment of duties" for having failed to come to work for three days without notifying the office. At Shelby's request the hearing was held in open, not closed session like most personnel issues. At the end of the two hour long hearing, LCSWA member Frank Cummins, sitting as chair with a proxy vote from vice-chair Modesto Chavez, announced that the board would make a decision about the grievance appeal within 10 days.

Shelby's attorney Robert Beauvais began the hearing by objecting to having Ingle sit on the grievance board while serving in a managerial capacity. "It has an appearance of impropriety,"

Beauvais said. "And I object because there will not be a fair hearing with Ms. Ingle as a member of the board and management. It has the appearance of impropriety because the person who fired Mr. Shelby is sitting on the grievance board."

LCSWA attorney Don Dutton said in his opinion the hearing could proceed with Ingle recusing herself from the grievance board. Finally Dutton advised the board to note Beauvais' objection and get on with the hearing. Ingle did not act as a member of the grievance board, but did provide testimony during the hearing.

Throughout the hearing Beauvais challenged Ingle's ability to serve as chair of the LCSWA board while serving in the managerial capacity. Beauvais contended Shelby was wrongfully fired and his constitutional right to employment was affected.

During direct questioning Shelby said he came to work before 6 a.m. on June

25, but did not feel well as his gums were bleeding and he was in lots of pain. Shelby said he decided to go to the dentist so he left a note on the call-in clipboard at the LCSWA office that morning of June 25, that "Dean called in sick". He said the next day he also did not come to work because he took a pain killer and could not drive and the third day he finally was able to see the dentist who pulled his tooth. Shelby said he did call transport driver John Emberlin to let him know he had left a note about having to go to the dentist. Also Shelby said he had tried to call John Cox, a transport driver and transport coordinator, to let him know about the situation, but was unable to contact him.

When asked why Shelby did not call Ingle or the office during those three days Shelby said he was unable to use his cell phone because the battery was down and the charger was at the

house. He said he had a restraining order to stay away from his house while his wife was there and he was unable to get to the house until the last day. Shelby said he and his wife were having domestic problems.

Beauvais questioned Emberlin and Cox asking who served as supervisors. All, including Shelby, said Ingle was their boss.

During questioning, Ingle said Shelby has a 31 percent absentee rate. Shelby had recently returned to work after being off work for more than a year on a workers compensation injury. Shelby had been with LCSWA about 10 years.

Ingle said she never found the note from Shelby at the LCSWA office and she never heard from Shelby. She said she tried to contact Shelby at his home in Capitan with no luck, but finally found him driving around the village. Ingle said she asked Shelby to go

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after you?" Nickerson asked Ingle.

Ingle responded that LCSWA needs someone to be with the operation to keep it going. "It is an everyday job," Ingle said, indicating she has been at LCSWA every day since May 18.

Ingle said she has not been able to go to work at her other job since she took over the managerial capacity. She said she thought that her "expenses" include her salary lost by not working.

During discussion on who serves in supervisory roles, Ingle agreed LCSWA needs a supervisor, but she said most of the current employees do not want the added responsibility. "Most of the guys have been here so long they don't want to be responsible for the others," Ingle added. "The guys do their jobs as they know what is needed."

Other items Ingle noted in the budget was how LCSWA does not plan to use all the projected Environmental Gross Receipt Tax revenues. Instead any fund left from the special tax will be invested in a certificate of deposit or put toward capital outlay for emergency expenditures.

After the LCSWA board approved the 2001-02 final budget, they heard a report from Ingle on how she "begged" the state Environment Department (NMED) for three days to extend the solid waste grant to close the Capitan construction landfill by another year.

The NMED had advised LCSWA it would not extend the grant for closure of the Capitan construction landfill. LCSWA has had the grant for seven years, but

has yet to complete the closure. Ingle said as a result of her begging, the NMED agreed to extend the grant for another year. Ingle said the closure is moving ahead, as the topographic maps of the landfill are done, two monitor wells have been located nearby eliminating the need to drill such wells, and the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District has donated seed to reseed the site. Ingle said she thinks the closure is in "really good shape."

Also at the end of the meeting, Lincoln County Commissioner Leo Martinez who was in attendance commended LCSWA for its improvements. "I see the authority moving forward," Martinez said. Martinez said at one time he wanted the county commission to change the name of the LCSWA because of the many complaints about the service. "But now I am proud it is called Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority because in the last weeks since Ingle took over I have had nothing but positive calls," Martinez said he had witnessed the improvements also.

"You need to stick up for your chairwoman," Martinez told the other members of the LCSWA board. "It's a tough road when you have personnel issues."

The board also heard from Mr. and Mrs. Smith who live in the county outside of Capitan. They complained that they should not have to pay the full amount for trash services every month because they do not live full time at the Capitan area property, and produce little trash. They asked if some other arrangement could be made for seasonal residents and visitors.

After the Smiths left the meeting, Ingle said the LCSWA office received about 50 or 60 calls when the billing with the increased rates was mailed. She said she tried to speak to each personally and resolved issues with all but 10. She said she was unsure how criteria would be established to provide the seasonal residents with a different rate.

Ingle also pointed out a memo from the Department of Game and Fish and a letter from the US Forest service thanking LCSWA for its diligent effort in eliminating problems with wildlife, bears especially, by keeping dumpsters cleaned. Ingle said LCSWA crews are emptying dumpsters daily in bear problem areas.

## Local Teachers Get Tech Training

Two Lincoln County teachers were at New Mexico State University June 7-10 to take part in "Professional Development 2001" workshops on how to incorporate technology into the classroom.

Carrizozo High School math and computer teacher Bob Hemphill and John Hemphill who teaches math at Eastern New Mexico University in Ruidoso participated in the project. Both live in Carrizozo.

The workshops were sponsored by the Regional Educational Technology Assistance program, a federally funded program based at New Mexico State University (NMSU). Participants learned Web site development programs "Go Live, Live Motion and Photoshop." Teachers who participated receive a \$100 stipend and free software.

to the office to discuss the situation. She said Shelby called her later and asked her if he should turn in his equipment but she did not say he was fired at that time.

Shelby later testified that Ingle told him he was fired when she caught up with him in Capitan.

Ingle also testified that Shelby did not submit any doctor's notes for his visit to the dentist on the days he was on the unauthorized absence.

At the close of the hearing, Beauvais said he would obtain copies of Shelby's dental records to show how Shelby had been to the dentist for an emergency procedure.

**Circumventing the rules**

When all else fails, follow directions. If you bake a cake you need to measure ingredients, and follow directions or your hoped for delicacy could be flatter than a pancake. If you drive a vehicle, you must follow a certain procedure or the contraption won't move. If you want to watch a video, you first have to have the TV and video machine turned on. Most people realize the importance of following directions in everyday things such as baking, driving and watching TV, but many of the powers that be don't or won't follow simple directions when conducting official governmental business.

Each elected office has rules that are supposed to be followed. Each elected official should know those rules, but sometimes authority figures try to circumvent the rules which are usually set down by the state. Anytime a person in authority breaks the rules, everyone pays, whether it is through increased taxes, or because the trust was broken. It is a shame that some authority figures assume that "what the public doesn't know won't hurt them" because the public will learn of the discrepancy eventually. Some news spreads faster than other news, but any hint of a person doing wrong is usually known by some people very quickly.

And eventually the truth will become known. It is too bad that some authority figures are more interested in padding their bank accounts than in providing the service to the public that they were entrusted to provide. It is too bad that some authority figures justify their actions by saying that everyone is doing it. But everyone isn't doing it, and many of us are asking why they are doing the things they are doing and the only answer we get is double talk. One group is pocketing mucho money for supposedly doing their civic duty when actually they are doing many things in secret.

The state insists on open meetings because the public definitely has a right to know where and how public money is being spent. The public has a right to know and should know. Many of those "secret" shenanigans will not benefit the public, but most certainly will benefit the people doing the double talk. If they conducted governmental business in an open meeting, there would be no need for double talk.

However, certain decisions are being made in private and the public continues to pay. Ask some of these people why they are doing what they are doing and they will not give a direct answer. They will look away, turn their head, and respond with gibberish. Beware of the gibberishites.

Even if you think you know what is going on, how about those meetings where people sitting at the front don't speak loudly enough for people to hear. Quite often at some of these meetings we have to guess what is being said. And at other times the person in charge recommends that certain actions be taken without giving an explanation.

Refusing to divulge information to the public happens too often at public meetings. Why don't the people in charge do their duty and follow the rules? Doing their duty is much like following directions when baking a cake if they want the right results. All it takes is common sense and respect for the public they are supposed to be serving.

**NM AG Madrid Advises Consumers To Respond To Privacy Notices**

New Mexico Attorney General Patricia Madrid is advising consumers to give immediate attention to the privacy documents being mailed to consumers.

Madrid said in a press release that consumers have about 30 days to respond to the privacy notices if the consumers do not want private financial information sold or made available to anyone that asks for it or buys it as part of a marketing list.

"Pay special attention to these privacy statements and call or write to these companies if you do not want your private financial information sold," Madrid said.

Some of the privacy information being sent to consumers has language from the 1999 Financial Services Modernization Act, which Madrid considers confusing to most consumers. "Bottom line is to look for a toll free number to call and make your wishes known, or an address that you can mail back a form if included."

Financial companies must have their privacy notices mailed by July 1. By federal law consumers have 30 days from the day they receive the notice to respond.

Brokerage firms, insurance companies, banks, credits unions and credit card companies must comply with the new Gramm-Leach Bliley Act. However, the law places the burden on the consumer to restrict these companies from sharing the

consumer's financial data.

Due to rainfall and higher humidity, the Cibola National Forest supervisor is lifting campfire and smoking restrictions at 8 a.m. Friday, July 20.



**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** - Is it better to have an elected Public Regulation Commission that is responsive to the public or an appointed one comprised of experts with a statewide focus who make decisions after thorough study?

That's a tough question. We all want government that is responsive to the public. That's what a democracy is all about. But we don't want a provincial bunch of amateurs making uninformed decisions. And that's what many in Albuquerque are claiming happened when the PRC made its decision about who will get a new telephone area code.

The debate is hot and heavy at the Capitol now and it will come to a head during the special legislative session on redistricting in September. The PRC is one of the bodies the Legislature is charged with redistricting every 10 years.

Representatives from the urban area that will end up with the 575 area code are expected to try to find ways to redraw PRC district boundaries so that so it will be more likely that three commission members will be elected from their area and only two from rural areas. It is the other way around now. Both sides have approximately the same number of legislators.

That is about all lawmakers can do in September, but a fuller discussion of the matter can be expected next January when the Legislature convenes for a regular session. It will be only a 30-day budget session but constitutional amendments also can be introduced and that is what would be required for issues such as whether the PRC should be elective or appointive.

The PRC was created only five years ago, when a constitutional amendment proposal slipped through the Legislature in its final hours. The following November, voters approved the measure. One reason for the approval was that it streamlined government, since the elective State Corporation Commission and the appointive Public Utilities Commission were combined into the PRC. Another reason was that the Corporation Commission didn't enjoy a very healthy reputation.

But the Corporation Commission was elected statewide and so never was charged with making decisions based on regional interests. The PRC was split into five districts - a more popular concept in recent decades.

Lawmakers have long debated whether they should represent the nar-

row interests of their district or focus instead on the good of the entire state. On issues of great importance to a legislative district, lawmakers know they had better represent their constituents desires even if their judgement indicates otherwise. Not representing constituents desires is the best way to draw an opponent in the next election and risk possible defeat.

In the case of the area code decision, Albuquerqueans charge it was made solely on politics. Rural folks say politics isn't necessarily bad, especially when it benefits them.

What decision would the old Corporation Commission have made? Since its three members were elected on a statewide basis, they likely would have made the opposite decision. The company responsible for assigning area codes nationally recommended giving the new area code to rural New Mexico. So did an industry group that in-

cluded the phone companies serving rural areas. And since an equal number of people were going to be mad either way, the old commission probably would have gone with the recommendations.

The national trend is toward appointed regulatory commissions. The thinking is that governors can appoint knowledgeable people with a background in the subject. The PRC and its current chairman, Tony Schaefer of Las Cruces, have come in for considerable criticism for snap decisions and for not doing an analysis of the economic impact of its area code decision.

We probably won't see a switch to an appointed commission anytime soon. New Mexico voters have frequently indicated a desire for electing as many public officials as possible. But look for legislative efforts to clip the PRC's wings by eliminating some of its duties.

**Three Juveniles Apprehended For Starting Fire In Area**

Three young juveniles, ages 10, 12 and 13 were apprehended by Ruidoso Police officers for starting a fire on University Drive in Ruidoso.

According to information from Ruidoso Police, at 2 p.m. Thursday, July 12, the police department, Ruidoso Fire Department and the New Mexico State Forestry Department (NMSE) responded to a 911 report of a fire in a wooded area on the 100 block of University Drive in Ruidoso. Police and fire units arrived within four minutes of the call.

A single engine air attack (SEAT) aircraft staged at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, through an agreement between the

Bureau of Indian Affairs, NMSE and the Village of Ruidoso, proved a major element in the fire fighting effort. The quick response time and the utilization of the available resources allowed the fire to be quickly extinguished.

The fire burned about two acres, no structures were damaged and no one was injured.

Investigators found evidence that the fire was started by a fireworks type "smoke bombs" which had been ignited in the area. Three young juveniles were apprehended and referred to the Juvenile Probation Office. The juveniles were released to the custody of their parents.

marijuana. Vega told THE NEWS that the juvenile female was forced to go in the truck with Garcia. Vega also said the incident was the result of an "on-going relation feud" between the individuals involved.

Vega said he and officer Green conducted interviews of all involved in the incident. Information obtained was taken to the Assistant District Attorney Ken Wilson who finalized the charges on July 17.

Once the charges were finalized by Wilson, Vega went to Magistrate Judge Butts for an arrest warrant. Butts set bond at \$250,000 with no 10 percent.

"It was fortunate we had such good response from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office dispatchers who handled the 911 call very well and got our units to the scene in a short time," Vega said. He also thanked the sheriff's office for helping during the course of the investigation.

No date has yet been set for Garcia's preliminary hearing.



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## White Oaks and Jicarilla News

No news from White Oaks this week. We have had some nice rain showers along with some very colorful lightning storms. Only one small snag fire on the Carrizo last week with the quick action of the White Oaks Fire Dept. and the Forest Service it was put out quickly with Hot Shot crews and the aid of the forest service helicopter to transport them to the area and the equipment brought in from below.

**Point of Interest:** As you come into White Oaks, one of the first things that you see is a large square rock building. It is called the Brown building. I have often heard it referred to as the Bank Exchange Building. The Bank

Exchange Building was further to the west of the Brown building and in no longer standing.

The Brown Building was built by John Y. Hewitt in the early 1880s. The building sits on the corner of White Oaks Ave. and Pine St. The native stone was quarried from the local hills and brought into town. The Brown building was owned by Mr. Hewitt until his death in 1932. The ownership passing to the late Judge A.H. Hudspeth, then to the Kirkpatricks and on to Robert "Bud" Crenshaw, and it currently belongs to Fred English.

The west half ground floor was the dry goods store operated by Solomon Werner until he

purchased the Ziegler Dry Goods adjoining the bank building further to the west and also not standing.

The upper floor contained three rooms, it was where school was held until the new school was built in 1894. The lower east half was a post office from 1897 to 1909. It was also a general merchandise store and was run by John A. Brown until his death in 1910. John A. Brown had been a Corporal in Co. "E" in the 12th Kentucky Cavalry. The building is known by the lessee rather than the owner/builder Mr. Hewitt.

Anna T. Brown operated the store for almost 20 years after the passing of her husband. She was

91 years old when she passed on in 1941. The store still functioned as the Masonic Lodge in the upper west half of the building until the chapter was moved to Carrizozo. The upper east half was where the Ladies Aid Society had their meetings and social functions.

There was also a dentist in the front upstairs rooms and miners rented rooms with Ah Nue and Wah Sing's restaurant doing their cooking and laundry. The restaurant was west of the building, the laundry is the old log cabin building on the east end of White Oaks and is private property.

Bob Reynieron has his art gallery in the west lower half of the building and the other side is currently used for storage.

The White Oaks Census for 1900\* has recorded approximately 945 people, this includes, all men, women and children.

### Fort Stanton Post Returns for Oct. 1878 in part.

**Record of Events:** Letter of instruction from Post Hdqtrs. dated October 13, 1878 orders Lt. G.W. Smith, 9th Cavalry with ten enlisted men of Co. "H" 9th Cavalry to proceed in pursuit of horses belonging to the Jicarilla Apache Indians stolen from the military reservation.

**Record of Events:**  
Remarks - M.F. Goodwin 2nd Lt. 9th Cavalry

Co. "F" stationed at Tularosa, N.M. since Sept. 1878, per post special order #96 forcing Indians to remain on the reservation and prevent illicit traffic of whiskey to the Indians by the white men.

On December 1878 Chief Nana arrived at Mescalero with 63 men. Report of the commission of Indian Affairs for 1900. "A Brief History of the Mescaleros" by Luttrell.



very important and a huge issue and needs creative solutions. "I think we are off to a good start," Wilson said and referred to the first Firewise Workshop held in Lincoln County in 1995.

Barrows said when she did research on the forest product industry, she found three areas need to be addressed—the need for continuous supply of materials; transportation, with the need to have processing plants close to the materials; and the need to find ways to make a profit to keep the industries going. "It's right to thin the forest," Barrows said.

In the final comments, moderator Zee said that while many are sympathetic to requested changes in forest management poli-

cies, many are not. She asked if any local governments or agencies had tried communicating with the environmental groups. Wilson said it is important to distinguish between those who are concerned for the environment and those who only want control. "It is those who want control who are the problem," Wilson said. "Those with the control agenda do not listen to logic."

Zierlein said everyone there is for the environment, but some want to stop all use in the forests. "Those like the Forest Guardians have nothing to lose and everything to gain," Zierlein said. "But we should not give up our customs, cultures and livelihood."
