

# LCSWA Makes Profit In July

Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority made a \$3,025 profit in July.

So reported Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) chair Debra Ingle at the LCSWA board meeting August 21 at the LCSWA offices in Ruidoso Downs. To date, LCSWA revenue collections were at eight percent,

while budget indicated collections should be at seven percent, Ingle said.

To accommodate the increasing number of customer requests, the LCSWA board approved advertising a request for proposals (rfp) to purchase 36 additional new dumpsters. The board also authorized advertising an rfp for the 40-yard roll off containers and an rfp for a roll

off transport truck. Ingle said she will bring the proposals back to the board for review. Funds have been budgeted this year to purchase the dumpsters and roll off containers and a lease on the transporter, Ingle added.

The rfps for the roll offs and roll off transport truck will give the board an idea of the costs for these items, Ingle said. She said she

would compare the proposals for the items to what it will cost to purchase the same items through state contract, with another government entity such as Roswell or Santa Fe.

Ingle said LCSWA crews completed 79 or 83 customer requests received in July. She said 18 commercial dumpsters were placed in the county, 18 residential dumpsters were placed

in various locations in the county and two poly carts have been delivered. LCSWA crews also completed three calls to empty recycling containers, made eight dumpster repairs, made 12 special pick ups and relocated two containers.

Within the next 30 days, LCSWA should have sites

for the 40-yard roll off convenience stations in Sun Valley and Hondo Valley, Ingle continued. She said LCSWA crews, with help from the Lincoln County Road Department, removed 13.3 tons of illegally dumped trash from the Sun Valley site. Ingle said the county road depart-

## C'zozo School Project Delayed By Asbestos

Carrizozo Board of Education learned that despite the unforeseen six week

delay in the elementary remodeling project, the building may be ready by the end of Christmas vacation.

During their meeting Tuesday, August 21, the school board approved several payments for work done on the elementary and middle school remodeling, including for asbestos removal. The unforeseen asbestos removal delayed the remodeling by six weeks, forcing the elementary and middle school classes to be relocated throughout the campus.

Prior to the approval school superintendent Rick Cogdill answered several questions about the project. Cogdill said the kindergarten, first and second grade classes were relocated to unused classrooms in the high school; third grade was in the board conference room in the administration building and in the high school home-ec kitchen; the fourth grade in the Ag classroom and fifth grade in the old gym.

Cogdill said the multi-purpose room which is undergoing asbestos removal should be ready by mid-September. "Then that room will be available for classes," he added.

"I expect the elementary to be ready by Christmas," Cogdill continued. He said the contractors were ahead of their construction schedule when the asbestos was discovered. The original completion date was October 31, and prior to finding the asbestos the contractor thought he would be out by September, Cogdill said.

## Lincoln County To Seek CDBG For Health Office

Lincoln County will apply for a 2002 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) to remodel the county sub-office in Ruidoso in order to expand the health department area and provide space for a Center for Independent Living.

During the Lincoln County Commission meeting of August 16 in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, county commissioners held a public hearing to take ideas for projects to be funded by a CDBG.

Tony Elias, executive director of Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD), presented guidelines for projects and told about changes in the income level. CDBG funded projects must benefit people who are low to moderate income and now that is defined as \$23,850 a year for a family of three.

Several ideas for CDBG funding were discussed. Lincoln needs improvements to its water system. Ralph Dunlap of Lincoln said about 79 percent of the water use in Lincoln is by tourists. However he was unsure if the residents would qualify under the income guidelines.

Another idea was a new senior center for Ruidoso Downs, but the village is applying for a grant and county commission chair Rex Wilson said there was some type of "roadblock" with that project.

Another proposal was a senior care facility, which county commissioner Leo Martinez asked to be added for CDBG consideration because of the closure of the Ruidoso Care Center. However, county commissioner Ray Nunley was unsure the project would qualify.

Elias said he sees the care facility situation as a business in need of operating funds, and CDBG money cannot be used for operations. Elias said the county could apply for a CDBG for a building.

"We would build it, then lease it to someone to run it," Martinez said. "Or we could buy it."

Nunley said the maximum grant amount, (\$400,000) would not build a new kitchen.

Elias suggested some other source of funding be found for a care facility, because he was unsure if it would qualify for CDBG.

Martinez said the county could do a joint venture with another entity to meet the demands for the elderly.

Another suggestion was a fire station for Glencoe. County manager Tom Stewart said the fire station would be eligible for CDBG, but there is an open bay in the main station and he thought this proposal to be a low priority.

Jeannie DeConditis of Ruidoso suggested a Center for Independent Living (CIL) for disabled and elderly. She said the county needs such a center.

Larry Lorenzo, from the statewide independent council representing southern New Mexico, said they are looking for seed money for such a center in Lincoln County. "Once it is going the state will provide funds," Lorenzo said.

Wilson said the county cannot apply for a CDBG for seed money.

Elias said a CDBG could provide funds for a facility (SEE PAGE 2)

## No Explanation Given To Teacher Suddenly Being Placed On Leave

Carrizozo High School social studies teacher John Gosek was placed on administrative leave suddenly on Tuesday afternoon.

According to Carrizozo Board of Education president Steve Harkey, school superintendent Rick Cogdill and Harkey made the decision to relieve Gosek immediately on Tuesday (August 28) afternoon.

The school board hired Gosek as social studies instructor during a special meeting on August 16.

Harkey said at this point the administration has asked for Gosek's resignation. Harkey said he could not give any more information.

## Nothing Taken During Break-In At Narcotics Office In Ruidoso

Deputies from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office are investigating a break-in at the Lincoln County Narcotics Enforcement Unit (NEU) office in Ruidoso.

According to Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan, the break-in occurred sometime between the end of the work day on Monday, August 27 and the beginning of the work day on Tuesday, August 28. He said workers at the office found the front glass door broken.

Sullivan said nothing was taken, but a shot gun was moved from one room and placed beside the front door. He said officers lifted several fingerprints from the office which are now being analyzed for identification.

"We think who ever broke in saw the video monitor in the front room and left," Sullivan said.

Sullivan said the office did not have a video camera in the front room where the break in occurred. The tape

from the video cameras in the back portion of the office where the evidence safe is located showed no one in that portion of the building.

Prior to the incident, the office had no alarm system, and no video cameras in the front portion of the office. "We've now beefed up the monitoring system," Sullivan said.

The NEU has never had a break-in, Sullivan said.

for a center.

Wilson asked how the county could go about doing a CDBG for a CIL facility.

Elias said the county could get approval to do the income survey for the CIL beneficiaries. "I think people with disabilities would generally qualify," Elias said.

DeConditis said more than 27 percent of the county population is disabled.

Martinez suggested the county pursue a CDBG to expand the sub-office in Ruidoso to include a CIL.

Stewart said he would get with the architect to see how far the \$400,000 (from a CDBG) would go toward expanding the sub-office. The county has federal funding to expand the health department portion

of the sub-office.

Stewart suggested the commissioners pursue addition of the sub-office to include a county extension office and assessors office.

Elias said the CDBG is not for government facilities so an assessor's office would not qualify.

The county owns the sub-office facility and surrounding property, and the CDBG would be to expand the health office. Elias said the \$491,000 federal funding for the health office would go a long way as a good match for the CDBG application for the expansion of the sub-office.

County commissioners unanimously approved applying for a CDBG for the sub-office health office and CIL.

As for the rocks and debris on the elementary playground, which a parent at the meeting considered to be too inviting for small children, Cogdill said the first two weeks of school the elementary students will be kept off the playground and will have recess on the football field. "After the rocks and concrete are removed, we'll reopen the playground," Cogdill added.

The school board approved the contract with M&E Engineering, Inc. for the elementary project and payment to Keers Environmental for the asbestos removal. The board also approved payment of \$11,506.51 to Greer-Staf-

ford, the general contractor for the remodel project, and \$84,419 to Greer-Stafford for architect fees. For demolition services, the board approved payment of \$68,936 to Rebcon Services. The school board had approved a payment of \$17,071 to Rebcon at their August 17 special meeting.

This fall Carrizozo 8th graders will complete a "Brockman Life-skills Pre-post Test" and again participate in a life-skills training program. The survey is a follow-up to the first year Brockman life-skills training given to students last year. Genevieve Phelan, from The Counseling Center which has a state contract under the state Department of Health, said the funding for the program comes from the state Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention and Center on the Study of Violence. She said after the first year program of 15 sessions with students, with tests given at the start and end of the training to help determine whether there is any change. Phelan said the results of the test given last school year at the end of the training showed Carrizozo students had statistically significant improvement in student communication skills.

For the second year students will again be surveyed at the beginning and end of the program that involves 11 booster sessions and similar surveys for the third year that has five booster sessions. All sessions are done in the classroom, "in the round" and involves a lot of role play on various issues including substance abuse, goal setting, resistance skills, relaxation techniques and three new sections on violence prevention, TV and anger management, and social skills based on 40 developmental assets.

The sessions this school year will be given once a week.

Phelan said by all reports students should be given the training for three years to get an accurate "fix on how much good was done."

Last school year students were given the a modified shortened version of the Brockman survey. She said they had an independent evaluator shorten the original Brockman survey which she, Phelan, and many school board members thought to be too invasive.

"There are some real intrusive questions," Phelan said. "We removed such questions as whether the students' parent do drugs or alcohol."

Even with the modified shortened test, they had a problem with the results of that first test given to the Carrizozo students. She said the problem was in the way her office tried to code the tests, without using the students names. She said they had to reject a number of surveys which she thought had affected the statistical outcome for Carrizozo.

School board member James Grider questioned the statement in the test report that indicated there was no overall significant statistical change after students completed the first year of the program. He asked if the school district had to participate in the program.

Phelan said all school districts, except Ruidoso which has its own program, are participating in the training given by her office. "Department of Health demands the survey be given in all the schools that receive department services," Phelan answered. She also said she thought the survey results would have been different if they had not had to reject so many, especially with a sampling involving a small number of students.

**Conference or fun time?**

When you pay money for something, you usually like to have something to show for it, whether it is a material type thing such as clothes, food, vehicles, etc. or whether it is a non-visible thing such as fuel for vehicles or to heat your home. You usually assume that you will have something to show for the money that was spent, which is only natural.

It is also natural for you to expect your tax dollars to be spent wisely. This week many tax dollars are being spent by the majority of the municipalities in the state to pay for registration fees, lodging and mileage for municipal officials to attend the 44th annual New Mexico Municipal League conference in Gallup which is being held August 29-31.

Lincoln County municipalities will have many officials at the conference which is for mayors, members of governing bodies, judges, managers, police chiefs, fire chiefs, public works directors, attorneys, clerks and librarians. There will be programs on different aspects of municipal government in addition to a golf tournament, socials, and a dance. The registration fee for municipal members is \$215.00 for the full conference, or \$105.00 for the Wednesday session.

Lodging costs are not included in the registration fees. Wednesday morning after a continental breakfast there will be break-out sessions for each group. The governing body forum will be municipalization vs privatization, housing and gross receipts. There will also be subsections for judges, managers, chiefs of police, clerks and finance officers, attorneys, fire chiefs, public works, and librarians. Each subsection will have programs specific for those groups.

The guest speaker at the general session today will be Gov. Gary Johnson. There will be more workshops: one about e-government services, others at the same time will include Connecting Leadership with Reality: Democracy at Work, and new ideas for small communities. Each of these workshops should be worthwhile for those attending. Through the years whenever any municipal officials attended a New Mexico Municipal League conference the only report that was given to the public was, "I learned a lot." There were no actual reports of what specific subjects were presented or what the official learned at the meeting.

However, this year we are challenging local officials who used our tax dollars to attend this meeting to not keep what they learned a secret. We are asking local officials to report on what they learned and what, if any, methods are to be incorporated into our local governments. We want local officials to share with the public any innovative ways of conducting local government business more effectively.

Even if they think it was dull, it is our community and we do have a right to know what ideas they might have to try and make our community a better place to live, other than requiring skirting on a mobile home to be painted or having to apply for a permit to move a mobile within the town.

Yes, we want to know that public money was spent wisely and that what was learned at the conference could help our area. Do you suppose any of our local officials will share this information at any of their council meetings?



**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** - Tensions are increasing as we near the expected September start of a special legislative session on redistricting. Many other issues may rank higher in the minds of Mr. and Ms. New Mexico, but nothing is more important to legislators, because it involves their political lives.

A legislative redistricting panel has been holding hearings around the state this summer getting feedback from communities about a series of proposals for redistricting the Legislature, Congress, the State Board of Education and the Public Regulation Commission.

Judging from public comments at these meetings, many of our state's citizens are fully aware of the importance to everyone of where the redistricting lines are drawn. They know these decisions will affect who represents them, whether they are Democrat or Republican and whether they are neighbors or strangers from two counties away.

In Las Cruces and Las Vegas, the committee heard concerns that minority voting rights aren't being protected. In Roswell and Clovis, the panel heard charges of "racial gerrymandering" that would take seats from eastern New Mexico. In Santa Fe and elsewhere they heard from lawmakers who will submit their own plans.

Republicans, figuring they wouldn't get anything helpful out of a Democrat-controlled Legislature, hired their own mapmaker to develop proposals to benefit the GOP as much as some of the committee's proposals will help Democrats.

A side-bar controversy arose over the committee's selection of Albuquerque pollster Brian Sanderoff to be the official mapmaker. In the past, Sanderoff has been a consultant to Democrat candidates and the Democrat Party. Republicans were careful in criticizing Sanderoff, calling him a respected professional in his field and "no one's pawn." But, they said, they can't leave his work unexamined and unchallenged.

Sanderoff defended himself saying he has been easing out of politics for

the past 15 years and no longer works for Democrats. He says about 98 percent of his work is now corporate and governmental.

Nevertheless, the state GOP hired state Sen. Rod Adair of Roswell to draw maps for them. He has produced a congressional district map making Republican U.S. Rep. Heather Wilson's district much more Republican and U.S. Rep. Tom Udall's district much more Democrat. State GOP chief John Dendahl says it is fairer and promotes competition. Democrats say it is blatantly political and packs Democrats into Udall's already heavily-Democrat district.

The federal government doesn't like to see "packing," which is sometimes used to cram minorities into one district, thus keeping them out of others. The present districts are evenly enough divided that the 2nd and 3rd districts have been represented by both Democrats and Republicans.

Wilson's 1st Congressional District has never been represented by a Democrat, but that is certainly not due to its make-up. Democrats should be able to win it, but haven't, so the party is trying to make it a little more Democrat than it already is. And

Republicans are trying to make it more Republican. There's nothing wrong with that, but neither party wants to admit to its real motives.

Another complaint is that there are no minorities in New Mexico's five-member congressional delegation, which for a half-century, until recent times, had usually been balanced between Hispanics and Anglos. Hispanics say they want an Hispanic seat in the U.S. House. Sen. Manny Aragon proposes a plan that extends Wilson's 1st district from the Albuquerque Valley to the Mexican border.

It is a very Hispanic-looking district, but it would require that Hispanic candidates be nominated by their party and then win the general election.

There is no reason why an Hispanic can't win any of the three congressional districts, now. Manuel Lujan and Bill Richardson have represented the 1st and 3rd congressional districts, but recently neither party has nominated an Hispanic for either seat.

Democrats have nominated Hispanics to challenge Rep. Joe Skeen in the 2nd Congressional District in the last five elections, evidently believing that ethnicity isn't a problem.

# County Expands Indigent Coverage To EMS & Clinic

Lincoln County EMS ambulance service and the Rose Clinic in Capitan are now included in the list of medical providers that are eligible to receive indigent health care funds.

During the August 16 meeting in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, Lincoln County Commissioners approved the additions to the indigent health care provider list.

Jim Stover, director of the Lincoln County Emergency Services (EMS), said the ambulance service is billed by Presbyterian Healthcare Services (PHS) that leases the county owned Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) but does not receive any of the sole community provider funds provided to LCMC. Sole community provider funds,

which are used to pay for hospital costs incurred by indigent patients, come from the county special hospital mill levy property tax. EMS, which contracts with the county for ambulance services to all residents outside of Ruidoso, also did not previously receive indigent health care funds which come from a special gross receipt tax (sales tax).

Prior to his request for the indigent funding for the EMS, Stover gave a report on projects at LCMC on behalf of LCMC administrator Jim Gibson who was on vacation. Stover reported on the roof project underway but had some delays due to the rain. Stover said the bid prices for the roof project were in line with estimates. The new roofing seems to have resolved leaks, and damaged ceilings have been replaced. No struc-

tural damage was found under the old roofing, Stover added.

The new ADA compliant toilet project at LCMC had to be redesigned because of space constraints, Stover continued.

Ten emergency medical technician (EMT) students recently tested and completed a 140 hour EMT training course, Stover said. Students came from Carrizozo, Capitan, Corona and Pine Lodge Road to classes held in Carrizozo.

"I am thrilled we have an EMT on Pine Lodge Road again," Stover said. The next step for the students is licensure to become fully certified EMTs, Stover said.

This fall Stover plans to conduct an EMT Intermediate course in Carrizozo. "We would like to take our EMTs to a higher level in the more rural areas," Stover added. He said the state is expanding the scope of services the EMTs can perform. "Often in Corona, the EMTs care for very critical patients," he said as example. Stover said Corona is the only ambulance in the county without an intermediate EMT, which he hopes to change within six months.

EMS bills patients for ambulance service. However, if EMS had a deficit in its operational costs at the end of the year, that deficit is made up from the county general fund. "It's your discretion as what tax money is used to offset the EMS," Stover said.

County manager Tom Stewart said he and county attorney Alan Morel had reviewed the proposal from EMS and highly recommended adding the EMS to the indigent fund list of providers. County commissioners agreed and unanimously voted to add the service.

County commissioner Ray Nunley asked Stover to look into having a narcotic antidote on each ambulance to be used for narcotic overdoses.

County commissioner Leo Martinez said he was concerned about county indigent funds being used to pay for ambulance runs into Ruidoso. The Village of Ruidoso also has a contract agreement for ambulance services within the village.

Stover said PHS does the billing and whatever is not paid is a loss to EMS.

Stewart said there is no problem about covering the unpaid ambulance billings county wide, since the Indigent Health Care Fund has \$832,928 in the budget for

this fiscal year. Last fiscal year (that ended June 30, 2001), the county paid out \$47,479 in indigent health care costs. "I am pleased how the fund is being administered," Stewart said. "We have targeted those who most need help."



## White Oaks and Jicarilla News

The White Oaks Miners Group participated in the First Annual Lincoln, Chaves, and DeBaca County Billy the Kid Familiarization Tour that began in White Oaks on August 23.

The tour was created by REDTT, "Rural Economic Development Thru Tourism", of the Cooperative Extension Service of NM State University. Lincoln County has been a part of this service for nine years since the inception of this organization.

Various grants are awarded to rural communities such as Lincoln and White Oaks to enhance and develop the historical history of that era and to further educate people of our country's heritage.

There were approximately 20 writers and photographers that participated in the tour. They

were met by Ruth Birdsong aka Madam Varnish, wearing her well known red dress of the 1800s era, on the steps of the Lincoln County Court House in Carrizozo. She was the group's step-on guide. The group visited the Miner's Museum, the Old School House Museum, the "No Scum Allowed" White Oaks Saloon and was told stories of the saloon by the owner/operator Grady Stewart. From there they went to the Mock Cedervale Cemetery and were given a sampling of the "Voices of the Past" program.

Bob Reyneirson portrayed Jack Winters, Evelyn Sidwell portrayed Susan McSween Barber, and David Scott portrayed John Burchem Slack and last but definitely not the least Ruth Birdsong portrayed Madam Varnish.

The White Oaks Fire Department hosted the event with cookies made by Carrie Scott and Barbara Spencer made lemonade and Dave Spencer drove to Carrizozo to pick up late arrivals.

The tour group then traveled to historic Lincoln, for the second part of the tour and then on to Roswell.

Fort Stanton Returns, January 1800.  
Record of Events

Co. F and M transferred to Fort Bayard, NM. The detachments at this Post under command of their respective Captains left Post January 12th and 13th respectively enroute to Fort Bayard. Co. A and G 9th Cavalry transferred to this Post from Ft. Bayard, NM arrived at Post January 9th, 1880. Distance marched 168 miles.

Co. A, 9th Cavalry Lt. Conline and 29 enlisted men on scouting duty since January 13, 1880. Co. G, 9th Cavalry, one Sergeant and 13 privates stationed at Tularosa, NM since January 12th, 1880.

Detachment of 26 enlisted men on scouting duty since January 13th, 1880. Under command of Lt. D.M. Clark 15th Infantry, Co. C 15th Infantry has been doing Garrison duty during the month. 2nd Lt. Garst, one Captain, one mason and five privates on detached service at Mescalero Agency from January 18th, 1880 till January 25th, 1880.

Co. G, 15th Infantry ordered to report to C.O. Fort Stanton to take Post

at Mescalero Agency per telegraph instructions from District Headquarters confirmed by S.O. 12 c.s., Dist. NM arrived at Agency January 26th, 1880.

January 31st, 1880. Commanding Battalion 9th Cavalry, Co. A and G in the field operating against hostile Indians since January 13th, 1880.

### DIARY OF A SOLDIER Part 3

\* January 4th, Thurs., 1866: Fine Day. Indian (hostiles) signs around camp everywhere. Why don't they make a raid and capture our dear Commander, but no such luck.

\* January 5th, 1866: Mail no news. On guard. "Regulars" are said to be at Yuma to relieve us. But will they before our three years are out?

\* January 6th, Sa-turday, 1866: Off guard and detailed on police, P.M. on water wagon. Coleman gone to Maricopa Wells as escort for forage teams for the cavalry.

\* January 7th, Sunday, 1866: All hands at work. A.M. Inspection. P.M. had to go on inspection in spite of coming off guard. No regulation for a soldier.

\* January 8th, Monday, 1866: All hands at work building, fixing parade grounds etc., handling adobies. Had row with "Buckskin", a teamster of K Company. Was put in guardhouse for quitting at dinner call and recall from fatigue: Hell, hell and more hell!!!

\* January 9th, Tuesday, 1866: Under guard without sentinels all day. Released from guard at "Roll Call".

\* January 10th, Wednesday, 1866: Paymaster arrived today. Heavy rains this forenoon and last night splashing the adobies. There is eight months due now. Boys feel joyful in anticipation.

\* January 11th, Thursday, 1866: Fine day. Inspection and mustered for pay. Inspection Officer grumbles at my gun and the bad condition of arms generally. Told him I just came off guard and no time to clean anything. He told the Col. that we were soldiers not laborers.

\* January 12th, 1866: Received only six months pay. But that makes things lively in the gambling line. Everybody happy and some drunk. don't know how the whiskey got here.

\* January 13th, 1866: All hands at work, clearing ground etc, etc. Gambling going on. Sent for chuck-o-luck outfit but the mail carrier could not get it in Maricopa Wells.

\* January 14th, 1866: Heavy rains A.M. Our new underground house very comfortable. It was crowded with others who came in out of rain.

\* January 15th, 1866: Fine day. Indians were paid off today. (Pimas and Maricopa) Monte and Fara etc, all they go. Many of the boys getting broke. Gambled some myself in spite of resolution not to play unless the percentage was on my side. Cleared brush for Bennett.

\* January 16th, Monday, 1866: Fine day Boys commenced making adobies again. Gambling going on lively. Lost some more.

\* January 17th, Tuesday, 1866: Fine day. Made adobies. Indians went back to their villages, on the Gila River. Great soldiers, no regulation in theirs. They go when they like, and come when they get hungry!!!





also unanimously voted to add Rose Clinic in Capitan to the list of eligible medical providers for the indigent health care funds. Kathleen Smith, certified nurse practitioner, requested she be added to the list.

The Lincoln County Health and Wellness Planning Council, the result of the combining of two health boards, now has new by-laws. County commissioners approved the bylaws that were changed mostly to reflect the new council name and role. The bylaws were developed and adopted by the Health and Wellness Planning Council of Lincoln County, reported Terri Elliott, Presbyterian Medical Services, Maternal Child Health Coordinator. PMS is fiscal agent for the council, Elliott said. The bylaws were changed to more closely reflect ties with the New Mexico Maternal and Child Health Act, which funds the coordination for the council, she added.

During discussion of the proposed bylaws, county commissioner Bill Schwettmann suggested the bylaws limit the number of volunteers on the Council to 21. The council currently meets at 9:30 a.m. the first Tuesday of each month at the PMS office at 117 E. El Paso Road in Ruidoso.

In the consent agenda portion of the meeting, county commissioners, acting as the county indigent health care board, approved sole community provider payments of \$11,511 for 14 claims. A total of 17 claims were filed, but three were rejected because the patients' income levels exceeded the program limit. The largest claim paid was for \$3,007 for one patient. County commissioners also approved two claims, averaging \$250 each, to be paid from the indigent health care fund for two ambulance runs to the hospital in Alamogordo.

School board president Steve Harkey asked if there is a way to determine if students are lying on the test. Phelan said there are several built in questions to detect if a student is exaggerating drug use for example.

In response to a question, Phelan said the Brockman Life-skills training was developed about 12 years ago and has been used extensively in the eastern U.S. and nationwide with different socio-economic and cultural groups. She said the program has found reduction of substance abuse by up to 80 percent, if the program is given all three years.

Phelan said the program is mostly built on asset building to reduce sub-

stance abuse. Kelly Shaw will present the program to students during their P.E. hour.

The school board also got a report from principal Steve Barron. He said, there was not much to report since school had only started, but he did have four tardies the first day. He said one student claimed he was late from lunch because his bike, which was holding three kids, broke down. "I addressed tardies in the student assembly," Barron said. "I let the students know I will do something about tardies." He

ment is informing LCSWA of any illegal dumping. She said the illegal dumping next to dumpsters is a daily problem.

Another discussion was about the 177 variances that exempt county residents who have more than 200 acres and who can certify they can deal with their own trash from having to pay the monthly trash fee. Ingle said she developed a letter to send to these residents to make them aware of the rules of the variance. "But some have started paying the monthly trash bill," Ingle said.

To determine new county residences, Ingle said she is working with the county assessor's office. Also she has contacted the local realtors who seemed to have forgotten LCSWA is a utility and the Ruidoso-Lincoln County Extraterritorial Zoning authority about trash services from LCSWA.

In response to a question from county representative Modesto Chavez, Ingle said she is working with residents in the Arabela area, especially an RV park, about paying their trash bills. She said the RV park had been under a variance,

but was putting trash in the dumpsters. "But no longer," she added.

Ingle said she had tried to deal with the calls and letters about the variance and other problems on an individual basis. "Most of those who do not understand about the billing are those who don't live here full time," she added. "Many of those part time residents feel they should have another rate."

Ingle said she would meet with the county manager to discuss how to determine if a resident lives here part time.

Lloyd Nickerson, Carrizo-

zo representative on the board, said it would be hard to police when these part time residents are here. "If we exempt these part time residents, then we'll open a can of worms," Nickerson added.

Ingle said she would go to the municipalities to see how they work with absentee home owners and report to the board in September.

The LCSWA board also approved a change of the September meeting date, from September 18 to September 25.
