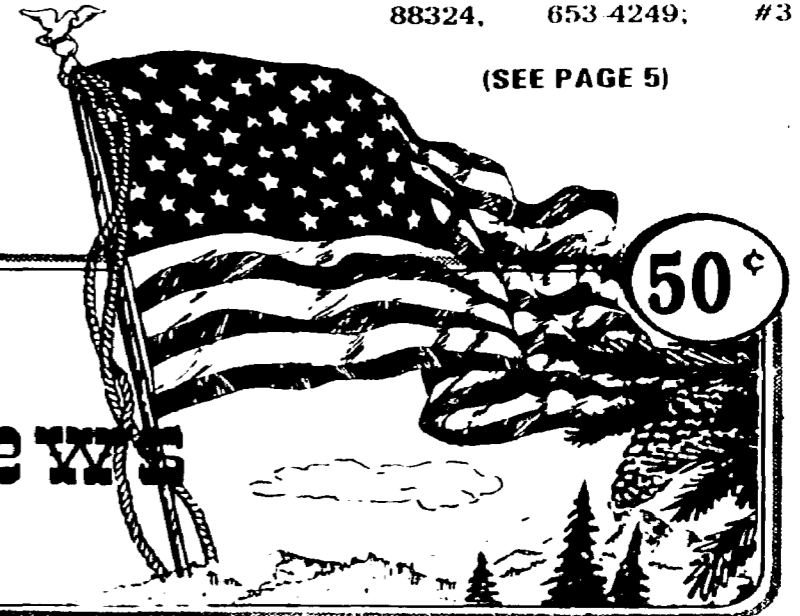

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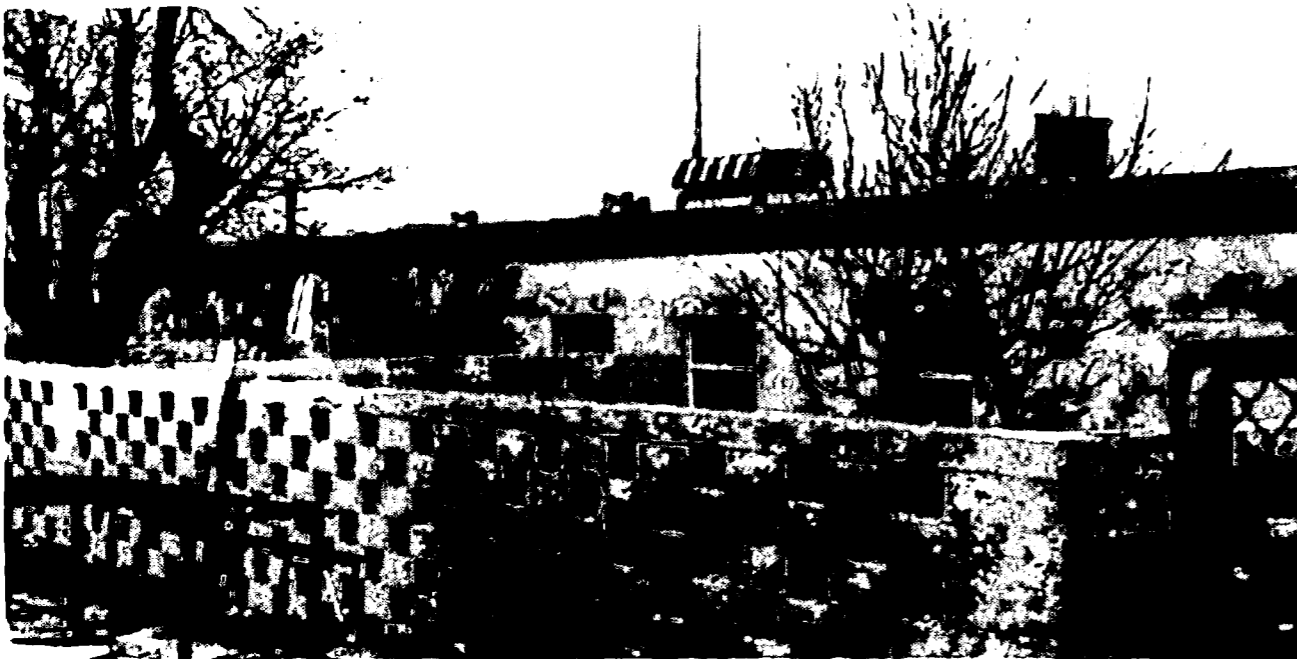

Carrizozo School Rehires Barron

Carrizozo Board of Education re-hired principal Steve Barron for the 2002-2003 school year.

On Tuesday, March 19, Carrizozo School board members Steve Harkey, LeeRoy Zamora, Lisa Shivers, Eldon Offutt and James Grider began their monthly school board meeting by hearing from several parents who highly encouraged the board to re-hire Barron. About 25 parents and concerned citizens attended the school board meeting held in the school library.

Grandparent Barbara Ward said the school belongs to the community and taxpayers who should make an effort to attend the school board meetings. She said she was concerned that citizens are excluded from decisions of the board, especially when the board discusses important personnel issues in closed session.

Ward and many others said there were rumors the school board was not going to re-hire Barron. "He has not been here long enough to judge whether he is doing a good job," Ward added.

Don Payton commended the school board for recruiting and hiring Barron. "I've had no dealings with Mr. Barron that were not complimentary to the school board," Payton said. He said he was also concerned about the instability of having eight administrators in 10 years at the school. "That sort of instability suggests there are more problems in the school than just with principals and superintendents," Payton added. "I am impressed with Mr. Barron, whose central focus is on

Golfers may enjoy the Carrizozo Golf Course, but the Carrizozo Town Council is concerned with how much it costs to keep the golf course in as good condition as it is. One of the main costs is for electricity to operate the pumps for the wells that are used to water the golf course. During the month of February electricity cost for the golf course pump was \$699.67 and the electricity cost for the golf course building was \$141.61. The town also has man hours for one and 1/2 employees at

the golf course.

The possibility of selling or leasing the golf course was discussed during the organizational Carrizozo Town Council meeting March 12. The mayor said a couple from Alto are very interested in the golf course. The mayor then polled the town council about giving the couple from Alto the golf course with the town paying some of the costs and the couple maintaining the golf course and hiring their own help. They would pay insurance. After a year they could decide if they wanted to buy it or ease

it. Town foreman Jim Payne said it would free up an employee. When further comments were made about the time involved watering the golf course Payne said maybe the fire department could water the golf course.

The mayor also mentioned if "we were to sell it" we would keep the water rights. Town trustee Eileen Lovelace said the town can not sell the golf course.

No definite decision was made as to whether the town would pay the

New Capitan Council Holds Short Meeting

The new Capitan Village Board of Trustees and mayor organized in a short meeting March 12.

New Capitan Mayor Steve Sederwall opened the organizational meeting by thanking former

mayor Norman Renfro for his service the last eight years. "This job is not what I thought it would be," Sederwall acknowledged. "I can use all the help I can get."

Having been sworn in as mayor on Thursday, March 7, following his

election on March 5, Sederwall said he would have closed the doors to village hall on Friday if it had not been for village clerk Kathryn Griffin. "I couldn't do the job without her (Griffin)," he added.

"We have good employees, so why don't you all call them up and tell them they are doing a good job," Sederwall encouraged the standing room only audience.

Before making any appointments, Sederwall said he wanted to remove the public comment portion of the meeting agenda. He said he did not want meetings with people pointing fingers. "If you have a complaint my office is open and I have a procedure," Sederwall said. "I will not have free-for-alls. We need solutions because we've got lots of problems and I will look to you folks for solutions."

As the first order of organization, Sederwall appointed Leroy Montes as mayor pro tem and the council unanimously accepted the appointment.

entire electricity cost for operating the wells or if the couple would split the electricity cost with the town.

The town will benefit from another situation. It was announced that Anthony Scaggs had released the 40 acres at the McBride well site. The town is supposed to receive a letter from an attorney concerning the matter. Scaggs had previously proposed the Alesca carbon recycling industry that was to be installed at the McBride well site, which is town owned property on E Ave. Scaggs had previously applied for a loan of

\$250,000 from Economic Development Revolving Loan Fund and received approval for the loan on the condition that the town would impose an additional one-eighth of one percent gross receipts tax with that money to go into a special fund to repay the loan in the event Scaggs (Alesca) defaulted. Even though Carrizozo voters approved the gross receipts tax and that money has been being collected for several years, no mention was made at the town council meeting March 12 as to the amount of money in the account and what the town intends to do with

that money or if the additional gross receipts tax will continue to be imposed.

In other business during the organizational meeting trustee Leann Weibrecht was re-appointed town clerk/treasurer, David Stevens was re-appointed town attorney and Angelo Vega was re-appointed chief of police. All three were sworn in by Carrizozo Municipal Judge C.O. Rominger. Wes Lindsay was re-appointed mayor pro tem. The position of maintenance director was listed on the agenda as an appointive position but was deleted from ap-

pointment because it was made a full time employment position, not an appointed position.

The three members appointed to the Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas board were Angelo Vega, trustee Tommy Guevara and the mayor.

A 30 minute executive session for personnel was held early in the meeting. Stevens, Vega and Weibrecht went into the closed session with the town council. No announcements were made after the closed session.

The town council approved resolution no. 2002-5 which authorizes the execution and delivery of a loan agreement between Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas (CCNG) joint powers authority and the New Mexico Fi-

nance Authority. A similar resolution was presented to the Capitan Village Trustees at their organizational meeting March 12, at the same time Carrizozo town council was meeting. Capitan tabled taking any action on approval of their resolution. CCNG, which is owned jointly by the Town of Carrizozo and the Village of Capitan, is proposing to request a loan from the New Mexico Finance Authority in the amount of \$417,015. Resolutions authorizing the loan agreement must be approved by both the Town of Carrizozo and the Village of Capitan.

Lovelace asked if the town would be liable for the loan in the event CCNG would be sold. She was told that if CCNG was sold the first proceeds from the sale would be used to pay the loan.

Bobby Strickland with USDA Rural Develop-

ment explained several programs USDA provides. Strickland said USDA is working with the town on the sewer plant and also helps with water, clinics, hospitals, fire departments, etc. Assistance provided by USDA includes helping purchase homes as well as home improvement grants for the elderly over age 62, and low interest loans for other people. All applicants must meet income guidelines. Lovelace has applications or people may call Strickland at 887-3506 for more information about services offered.

The disturbance at the Lincoln County Detention Center (LCDC) March 10 was discussed. Vega said it was a good drill about how it feels to be called to a riot.

The town has received no response to information requested about costs and time frame for completely refurbishing the swimming pool. The town will do the temporary repairs this year and consider more extensive work on the pool next year.

Cathle Eisen reported she had passed Level III water certification. She said the water plant will be run as much as it can, and she continues to research the railroad water rights.

Lindsay explained the situation of no one wanting to be on the cemetery board. It was agreed cemetery board members should be the town council. The cemetery is owned by the town. Apparently it is difficult to locate some graves because the old maps are difficult to read. Lindsay said some bodies had been dug up in the middle of the road and other bodies had washed up.

The town council approved the planning and zoning commission recommendation of conditional use for Lindsay to place a mobile home on vacant property at 1410 West 8th St.

Trustees approved having Engineers Inc. do the preliminary engineering report for the waste water treatment plant (WWTP).

The scope of the work was approved without the cost.

The police department will purchase a new car using Law Enforcement Protection Funds (LEPF).

Apparently spring being official is supposed to be different, but you couldn't convince many people because they know it is spring and they don't need any kind of official designation.

And it doesn't have to officially be spring for people to appreciate the end of drab winter days and look forward to bright sunlight when they awaken each day. the students and schools."

Several other grandparents and parents spoke in support of Barron, including Rose Kratochvil. However Kratochvil also said she was concerned about a particular teacher whom she claimed has publicly embarrassed and emotionally abused children for many years. She claimed the reason so many children have been transferred from Carrizozo to Capitan schools was because of the incompetency and abuse. She said it seemed "idiotic" considering the number of people at the meeting in support of Barron for the school board not to rehire Barron.

School board president Steve Harkey said he could not divulge information about personnel.

Parent Paul Baca said there are many rumors about the school and bad things happening. He said he has heard these rumors from students, but a lot of the rumors are hearsay.

"We as a board deal with facts as they come to us," Harkey replied. "We do not deal with rumors."

Baca suggested the board investigate the rumors to find out if the rumors are fact. Kratochvil agreed.

Offutt said rumors are flying and he wanted parents and concerned members of the community to come to the board members with facts and accusations for the board to investigate. "We could spend months chasing

rumors," Offutt said. "If some rumors are true, we need to deal with them."

"We never take anything lightly," Shivers said in response to a comment from Kratochvil about the board having access to records. Shivers agreed the school district has had a "revolving" door of administrators mostly due to being a small district with limited funds for salaries.

Gray Gallacher said the district can only solve problems by being positive. "If we want to help the kids, let the people on the board make their decisions," Gallacher said to the audience.

Ward said people need to get involved and come to the school board meetings. She too was in support of Barron.

Several teachers spoke in support of Barron. Becca Ferguson and Kelly Gallacher said he had been very supportive of them and helpful solving problems.

Parent Angelo Vega also supported Barron but also was concerned that sports is taking over academics at the school. He asked the board to look into academics and grade point averages and work on the academics by keeping good staff.

Another mother supported Barron because he had helped her daughter. However the mother was concerned that the school counselor was no longer there and now the school only has a counselor once

SANTA FE
INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE - Surely you've noticed the little crosses that dot New Mexico's roadsides throughout the state. They're usually called descansos, and sometimes crucitas or memorias. It's primarily a Hispanic tradition. There are many in northern New Mexico and southern Colorado, placed beside the road in memory of someone who died at that spot.

The Colorado highway department currently is trying to get rid of them saying they are a dangerous distraction to drivers. Supporters of the crosses respond that they may even benefit traffic safety by warning of danger zones where people have been killed.

Unmoved, Colorado authorities have made public announcements that families that have put crosses along the roads should remove them before the highway department does. The news media seem to be on the side of government up there too.

A column in the Denver Post suggests that if drivers need to be warned about dangerous roads, someone should publish a guidebook noting the mile marker on every highway in the state where a fatal accident has occurred. Families that want to commemorate a relative who has died, could buy ads in the guide to help pay for it.

In New Mexico we are more culturally sensitive. Our highway department has never had an official policy on the crosses but the unofficial policy has been to let them be as long as they aren't a haz-

ard. Someone complained about them several years back and the department considered a ban but quickly backed away because of a large public outcry.

The transformation of New Mexico 44 into U.S. 550 from Bernalillo to Farmington was accompanied by what appears to be a new unofficial highway policy. Because the road was expanded from two lanes to four, most of the crosses along the 118-mile stretch were displaced.

But there was no bulldozing of the crosses as Colorado threatened to do. Instead, each cross was photographed, sketched and measured. Each memorial was surveyed so that it could be returned to as near its previous location as the new road alignment would allow. Any items accompanying the crosses were measured, numbered, catalogued and entered into a computer database. The dozens of memorials were then carefully stored for the length of the project. In November they were aken out of storage and returned to their places along the newly-completed road.

Why the new-found sensitivity toward the roadside memorials? After all, this is a Republican administration that didn't get many votes out of Bernalillo, San Ysidro and Cuba or from the people who erected the descansos. Some credit should go to Highway and Transportation Department Secretary Pete Rahn, who is from Farmington and who has riven the road many times.

But much of the reason for the recognition of the New Mexico tradition revolves around the controversy caused by the widening of the road. The project was not on the state's priority list when Gov. Gary Johnson took office. But Johnson had promised the folks in Farmington he would build them a fine new road.

Rahn's justification for moving the project to the top of the list was the same as his reason for canceling improvement of the highway between heavily Democrat Santa Fe and Espanola in favor of widening the highway between heavily Republican Ruidoso and Roswell - the road was more dangerous.

And what better reminder of the dangers of that highway than to preserve all the memorials to the people who had died along the road? As Rahn put it: "The number of crosses said a lot about that road."

Expect to see similar care taken of the descansos along the stretch of U.S. 70 between Ruidoso and Roswell. Many people along that stretch of road are not happy about the widening project. They say it will change the nature of the narrow valley where they have lived for generations.

But at least their crosses will be treated nicely.

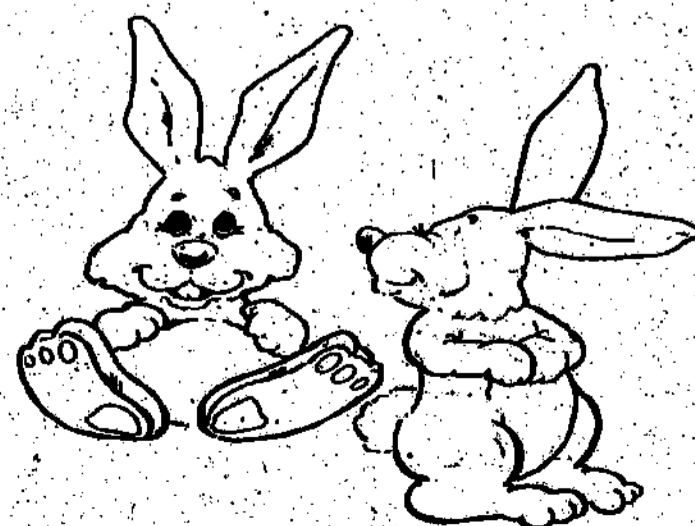

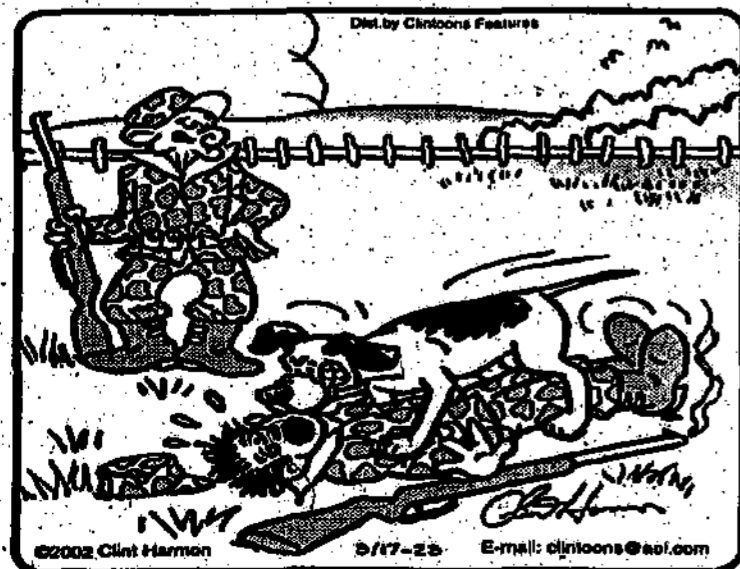

Sederwall said Montes was the longest serving member on the board and he would look to Montes for guidance.

Sederwall then appointed Griffin as village clerk. New trustee George Tippin made the motion to accept the appointment, all trustees voted in favor.

When it came to appoint a new police chief,

Sederwall said he had a real problem with the existing village police manual which requires all officers to live within the village limits. "The way I see it is we can't strap the new chief of police with this old procedures manual," he continued. "I think the old manual dies with the new administration."

Village attorney Don

Dutton said the police manual is adopted as policy of the former mayor and trustees. "So now we have a new mayor and new trustees so you should do a new manual," Dutton added.

Dutton said the problem is the new chief of police Chuck George lives less than a mile outside the village limits, yet the manual says all officers must live in the village. "This is not an ordinance," Dutton added. "Only a policy."

Trustee John Whitaker suggested the manual state officers should live "in or around" the village, but not so far as Alto or Lincoln.

Dutton said he looked at the surrounding villages and found they have no such policy for their officers.

Montes explained the reason for the policy was because the village needed quick response time from the officers because the village cannot afford full time coverage.

Whitaker made the motion to accept the appointment of Chuck George as chief of police. All trustees voted yes with a roll call vote.

All current employees were also rehired with a unanimous vote of the trustees. All appointments and employees were sworn in immediately after each motion to approve the appointments.
