

LCSWA Budget Is In Black; A. I. Vega Objects

For the first time in many years, Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) adopted a preliminary budget that is in the positive.

LCSWA met Tuesday, May 21 in a room crowded with guests and LCSWA workers who stayed after their work-

ing hours to hear the proceedings and support LCSWA operations manager Debra Ingle. The most important item of business at the meeting was approval of the 2002-03 preliminary budget that included a three percent cost of living raise for employees and which had a bottom line in the black.

But perhaps the most

concern was the future of Ingle.

At the first of the meeting newly appointed Carrizozo member Angelo Vega asked that the executive session for litigation and limited personnel matters be the second item of business, instead of the last. When he made the motion for the executive session he said it was with the members of

LCSWA only. Members approved the motion and did not ask Ingle or LCSWA attorney Don Dutton into the executive session, saying they would call Dutton in if needed.

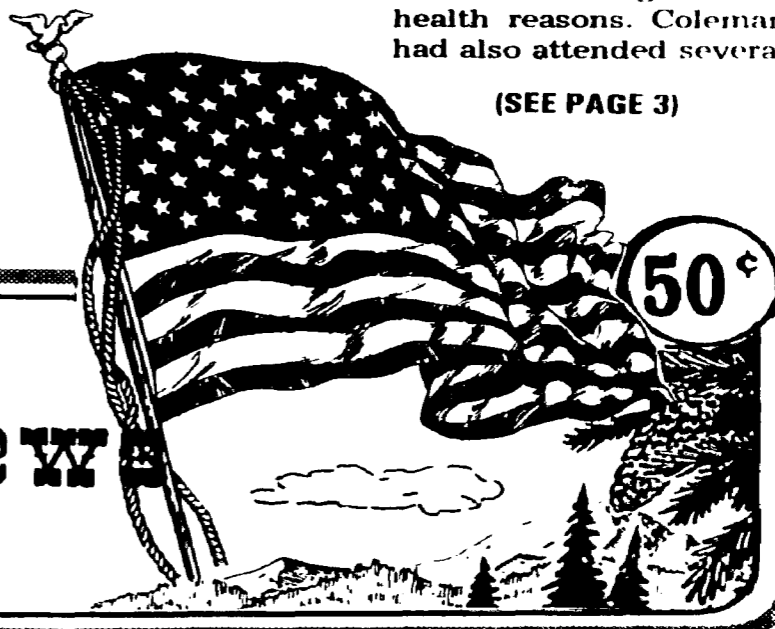
When the LCSWA board came out of the closed session, they attested that they had discussed nothing except what was on "the call of the motion

for the executive session."

After the closed session, the LCSWA board took action on the agenda item to elect a new chairm.

They unanimously approved of new Ruidoso Downs member Don Coleman as chair. Coleman replaced Jake Harris who had resigned for health reasons. Coleman had also attended several

Capitan Mayor To Meet With Alamogordo Over Water Line

The Capitan Village Trustees are sending mayor Steve Sederwall to convince the City of Alamogordo to take over the five water connections on the old water line from Bonito Lake to Capitan.

At their regular meeting Tuesday, May 14, trustees grappled with the question of what to do with the five water connections. In February, the City of Alamogordo sent Capitan a letter advising that Alamogordo was going to shut down the old water line from the Bonito Lake pipeline to Capitan because of the potential health liabilities to the five connections because of the non-treated water. Sederwall said he has been battling the city of Alamogordo back and forth over the issue and finally got

Alamogordo to continue providing water to the five connections until July 31.

The seven miles of asbestos cement water line was installed in 1957 under agreement with the

City of Alamogordo for Capitan to obtain raw water from the Bonito Lake water line. Capitan for years relied on the Bonito Lake water as its only source of water. Then in 1988 the Alamogordo

shut off the water line to Capitan. Capitan had drilled a well and converted its water system solely to ground water from the wells east of Capitan.

A new agreement was made between Alamogordo and Capitan in 1989 that left the line active for the five customers, who are currently billed by Capitan at one and a half times the water rates charged to customers within the Capitan village limits. Also with the 1989 agreement, the five Bonito line customers were advised that Alamogordo could shut off the water any time with 30 days notice.

But what will Capitan do for the five customers now as Alamogordo plans to shut the water off on July 31? Trustees were concerned that providing the five Bonito line customers with village water would break the current moratorium on no new water connections outside the village limits. Trustees also were concerned it would set precedent and cause more people living on the outside edges of the village to seek connections to the village water system.

Newly appointed "environmental advisor" Dr. Bernhard Reimann offered another issue—the old six inch water line is made of asbestos-cement and, if allowed to go dry, is a health hazard that must be properly removed. Reimann said in a scientific perspective keeping the line full of water, even if pumped from the village, would be beneficial and more cost

Because of the extreme fire danger, Lincoln National Forest and Bonito Lake which is owned by the City of Alamogordo have been closed to the public as of 8 a.m. Wednesday, May 22 and will remain closed until rains diminish the extreme danger.

City of Alamogordo, which owns Bonito Lake, also closed the lake and campground facilities because of the fire danger.

The forest closures do not affect federal and state highways that lead into the mountain communities of Ruidoso and Cloudercroft and outlying forested private properties.

Residents living within the closed areas and their guests, and landowners or lease holders of land within the closed area will be allowed access to

Sederwall May Appoint New LCSWA Member

At a special meeting Friday, May 17, Capitan village trustees okayed the preliminary budget for Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas (CCNG).

Only two trustees, George Tippin and Bobbie Shearer, and mayor Steven Sederwall were present at the special meeting. This was called a quorum and the meeting started. On the short agenda was appointment to Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, (LCSWA). Trustee John Whitaker currently serves

on the LCSWA board, appointed by the former mayor.

Sederwall, after announcing that he made the quorum, said he wanted to remove the LCSWA appointment from the agenda. "I need to talk with John (Whitaker) first," Sederwall said. Whitaker was not at the meeting.

"I did talk with John but I will postpone any action until John can attend the meeting," Sederwall added.

With that Shearer made

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Investigation Results In Man Being Arrested

A joint investigation conducted by Capitan Police, Lincoln County Sheriff's Office and Narcotics Enforcement Unit, State Police, Otero County Narcotics Units, and NM Motor Transportation K-9 unit resulted in the arrest of David Lambert at a Capitan business on April 26.

Lambert, 39, of Capitan, was booked into the Lincoln County Detention Center on charges of two counts of trafficking a controlled substance, heroin, a second degree felony; one count of possession of controlled substance with intent to distribute, marijuana a fourth degree felony; one count of possession of a controlled substance, heroin, a fourth degree felony.

Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. set bond for the three felony charges at \$20,000.

Lambert was also booked on one count of possession of a controlled substance, marijuana and one count of possession of drug paraphernalia, both misdemeanors. Dean set the bond for these two counts at \$7,000.

According to Judge Dean's court, Lambert's attorney Pat Ortiz waived Lambert's preliminary hearing and the case was bound over to district court.

According to the police report provided by Capitan police chief Chuck George, he originated the investigation after local residents complained about drug trafficking out of a business.

Undercover officers purchased both heroin and marijuana out of the business, and observed other clientele purchasing controlled substances at the store. With the help of the New Mexico Motor Transportation K-9 Unit drug dog police found illegal drugs at the location, which were seized. George said the arrest was made with no incident.

their owned or leased property.

Also persons engaged in delivering goods, packages or services to private property owners or contractors performing services for the government or persons with written and approved entry permits or authorization letters will be allowed into the closed areas.

County Continues Burning Ban For Another 30 Days

Last weekend a change in wind direction brought moisture into the county, resulting in scattered thunderstorms with heavy rains and hail in isolated locations, mostly in the higher elevations.

Precipitation was not significant or widespread enough to diminish fire danger, so the Lincoln National Forest closed the forests to all visitors on Wednesday, May 22.

Dry westerly winds returned on Tuesday and are predicted to continue through Friday.

Lincoln County Commission at its meeting May 16 continued the county-wide ban on open burning and fireworks for another 30 days.

Federal, state or local officers or firefighters will be allowed into all areas for official duties.

While there are no campgrounds open in the Smokey Bear Ranger District of Lincoln National Forest around Ruidoso there are 10 hosted camp areas open in the Sacramento Ranger District near Cloudcroft. Campgrounds open are Silver, Saddle, Apache, Sleepy Grass, Deerhead and Pines and the Aspen Group, Black Bear Group, Slide Group and Fir Group sites.

Violators can be fined up to \$5,000 for individuals and \$10,000 for an organization, and/or jail for not more than six months.

LCSWA meetings to take information for the mayor of Ruidoso Downs. Newly elected Capitan mayor Steve Sederwall at a special Capitan meeting Friday, May 17 had wanted to replace LCSWA member John Whitaker, but did not because Whitaker was unable to attend that meeting.

Carrizozo at its last meeting replaced its former member Lloyd Nickerson, who had resigned, with police chief Angelo Vega.

For his first LCSWA meeting, newly appointed Vega made two requests on the agenda—"review and action" on the LCSWA operating procedures personnel policy and CSWA "office hours." Vega said the board needs to look at the policy and revise what he considered "too many open ends and discretions" that allows the operations manager to do things without board approval.

Dutton said the function of the LCSWA board, as defined in the Joint Powers Agreement (JPA), is to set policy. "Then you let your professional people operate the day to day operations," Dutton added. LCSWA board adopted a new personnel policy manual in November, Dutton told Vega.

Dutton offered to assist Vega in addressing specific issues and questions in the policy manual, but Vega said he would handle that himself.

Vega got unanimous approval from the other board members for his motion to review the policy manual at the June 18 meeting.

Vega got no second to his motion to issue a memo to Ingle requiring her to be in the LCSWA office from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and state who is responsible for answering questions to the board. Vega began the discussion about Ingle's office hours by saying he had requested this also because he was concerned the public will call LCSWA in the morning without getting proper response. "I want the board to set hours for the operations manager," Vega said. "I want her to be here to answer questions from the community and the board."

"Sounds like procedure rather than policy," Whitaker said.

Ingle said LCSWA office hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and recycling 8 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Vega wanted to know what hours Ingle worked. Ingle, a salaried employee, said her hours vary from 8 a.m. to 7 or 11 p.m. Also she is on call at all times, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Finally Vega said he had tried to contact Ingle by cell phone and had been unable to contact her.

Ingle said she had been out of the office recently helping with the drainage and other closure projects at the old Capitan landfill.

Vega continued to question what Ingle was doing as operations manager.

Ruidoso councilor Frank Cummins (the Ruidoso representative on the LCSWA board) said it was in the operations report. "A lot of things are being done," Cummins said.

"With all due respect with that," Vega continued. "I do not object to her being at the landfill but not at Smokey Bear (a restaurant in Capitan)."

"At all?" Ingle asked.

Vega said Ingle was entitled to a lunch break.

Dutton responded that Ingle is an executive employee who does not have to be in the office during regular hours. Dutton said while he served as a LCSWA board member, he had watched many managers come and go. He said Ingle has a cell phone with which she can be reached at any time.

New LCSWA member Coleman said he got questions answered from Ingle within 15 minutes.

Dutton also said Ingle is an "employee who does an exemplary job."

"Look at the bank account and the number of faithful employees," Dutton continued.

Vega said he did not challenge the job Ingle does, just the hours she keeps in the office.

Ingle said she did adjust the schedule for the customer service staff for a staggered shift as a budget measure. Ingle said she has also been out on the trucks in early hours when there have been mechanical breakdowns and medical emergencies. She offered to show Vega the log sheets she maintains. "I clock off when I go into the Bear," Ingle said.

Dutton, looking around the room, said there were six LCSWA employees present. "Many here since early this morning," Dutton added. "Here to say they are happy with the administration because they are getting direction and are seeing improvement."

When employees tried to speak, they were told to wait until the public comment portion of the meeting. When it came to that agenda item, LCSWA driver Jamie Smelling spoke in Ingle's defense. He said in the last 10 years LCSWA has been in the red, with no pay raises, bailing wired trucks broken down. "As far as the time she (Ingle) has been here she has

been more accessible than the others (managers)," Smelling said. (SEE PAGE 10)

Male Dominance?

Several people are questioning what the true motive is of Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board of director member Angelo Vega. Apparently Vega was the only person at the LCSWA meeting Tuesday that objected to LCSWA operations manager Debra Ingle doing a good job. Many LCSWA employees and other people praised Ingle for her work and dedication, both traits which should be admired, not undermined. Actually, these two traits just might be in character counts, a program for children, but unfortunately not for adults. Why would anyone object to LCSWA being run properly? Why would anyone object to LCSWA finally having a budget in the black instead of being in the red? Why would anyone object to a person doing the job they were hired to do and doing it efficiently?

The fact that a female has been able to do what most of the males were not able to do might be the answer to those questions. Is it because a female is in charge? Wise up guys, this is the 21st century and females are capable of doing many different types of things and accomplishing many of those things. People want to believe that officials will do what is best for everyone they are supposed to represent, but it doesn't happen as often as it should. Any official, whether elected or appointed, should be willing to speak openly about why they are doing what they are doing. Didn't happen that way with the new Capitan mayor. He wants to appoint another person to the LCSWA board but he has not said why. He also said he would discuss it in open session and later he said if it is discussed, sounds like a bunch of double talk.

It does seem as if neither Vega nor the Capitan mayor read the operations report. Should we offer to read it to them? And to imply that office staff are not able or capable of answering questions about LCSWA is very demeaning.

Doesn't it sound as if two little boys got mad because they didn't win the game? Maybe what they need is to be reminded that demanding of others what you are not willing to do is counter productive, and only shows selfishness.

SANTA FE INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE -- Being lieutenant governor must count for something. Otherwise, why would so many people want the job so badly?

Twenty years ago, the lieutenant governor of Illinois resigned his post after only a few months in office, explaining that the job was one "a person of average intelligence can learn in a week." But for the most part, that's not how most lieutenant governors look at the position.

The post often is viewed as a political steppingstone, although it hasn't worked well in New Mexico since Joe Montoya went to Congress in 1957. Lieutenant governors do move up when the governor dies. That has happened in this state, but not since Lt. Gov. Andrew Hockenhull took over in 1937.

New Mexico is one of 25 states in which the lieutenant governor gets to be acting governor when the governor leaves the state. Current New Mexico Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley may hold some sort of record for that. He already has logged almost 500 days when Gov. Gary Johnson has been out of state for one reason or another. That is more than one day a week of experience Bradley has gained over the past eight years.

But lieutenant governors don't assume all the responsibilities of office when they fill in. Former Lt. Gov. Casey Luna discovered that when an emergency occurred on his watch and Gov. Bruce King's staff handled the problem before Luna started trying to issue orders. Normally governors make their lieutenant governors' sphere of authority very clear before leaving town.

The scope of lieutenant governors' duties varies from state to state. In most states they preside over the Senate, but in some they don't get to break ties as they do in New Mexico. In a few states, such as Texas, they appoint committees and some even assign bills to committee.

The ability to preside over the rowdy state Senate is the most visible duty of lieutenant governors and the reason so many lieutenant governor candidates have legislative experience.

This year, Democrat Diane Denish is the only one of the five candidates of both parties without such experience. She views it as a plus because she's not tied into the system.

But others are playing up their experience. Sen. Rod Adair of Roswell says he has become very familiar with the rules, which will give him an advantage. Former Sen. Bill Davis of Albuquerque correctly claims to have been acknowledged as the expert on Senate rules during his two terms.

Denish might have an especially big problem if she were to become lieutenant governor. Last month she was successful in disqualifying Sen. Linda Lopez from the ballot because of defective nominating petition signatures.

A similar instance occurred in 1990, when Casey Luna was elected lieutenant governor after having knocked Sen. Tom Rutherford of Albuquerque off the ballot. Luna ran into two problems. He never became completely comfortable with Senate rules and procedures and Rutherford's friends, who happened to be the Senate leadership, weren't going to let him get comfortable anyway. Denish could be in for the same treatment.

But it may have been worth it to Denish. By eliminating Lopez, she became the only Albuquerquean and woman on the ballot. Lopez also would have been the only Hispanic on the ballot. Also running for the Democrat nomination is former Rep. Jerry Sandel of Albuquerque, who calls Denish's move "racial and gender politics at its worst."

Lt. Gov. Walter Bradley got to take advantage of being acting governor when President Bush recently came to the state. He made the announcement of Bush's trip and he took the governor's place in welcoming the president.

But Bradley had to back off and share some of the spotlight with his two Republican opponents. The Bush camp already is in some hot water about favoring one candidate over another. They weren't about to let things get worse.

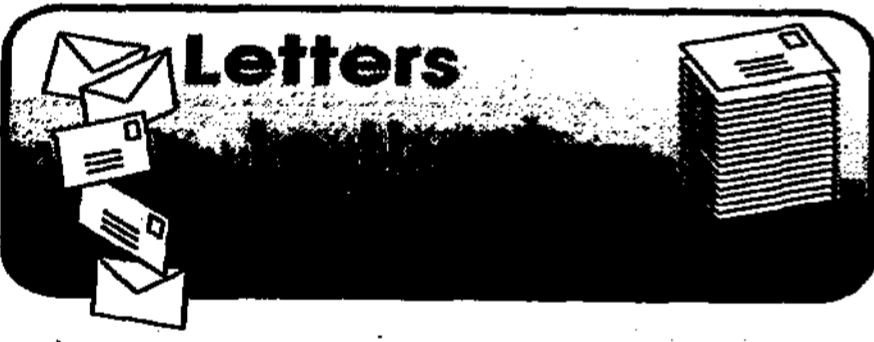

BLM Camping Allowed With Fire Restrictions

Bureau of Land Management (BLM) fire restrictions remain in effect and are especially critical during the upcoming Memorial Day weekend.

Restrictions prohibit building or using an open fire, campfire, charcoal broiler or wood stove without a permit, except in developed camping and picnicking areas. Use of gas or petroleum fu-

eled stoves, lanterns or heating devices is allowed.

Smoking is allowed only in enclosed vehicle or building.

Operating a chainsaw without a permit and using explosives on BLM managed public lands are also prohibited.

Violators may be fined up to \$1,000 and/or jail up

to 12 months.

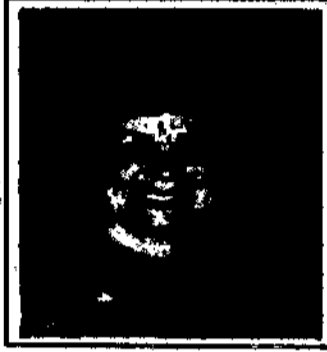

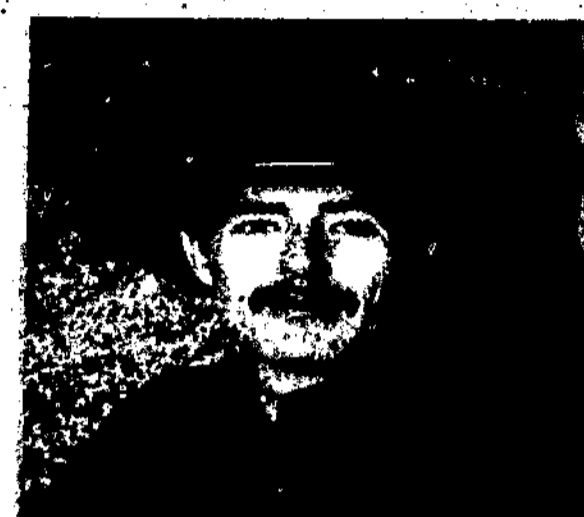

effective than allowing the line to go dry and having to hire a certified asbestos removal company at a very high price.

Reimann said that it is unfair to cut these people off from water they have received since 1957. Village maintenance supervisor Terry Cox said it would cost the village \$5,600 for a pump and the electricity would cost \$52 a month to keep the line full of water.

"If you let these lines go dry, the EPA will be down your necks in a month," Reimann said. "And seven miles of tubing will have to be removed with very specific conditions. It will be very expensive."

Sederwall said he talked with the village engineers who said such removal could cost \$8 a foot. "And we have seven miles!" Sederwall said.

Resident Joel Crossno was concerned about cross contamination from the old asbestos lines if connected to the village system.

Cox said the village would have to install a vacuum breaker, check valve similar to what must be installed on sprinkler systems to prevent contamination.

During discussion, Capitan Municipal Judge Jack Johnson asked if there was a chance Alamogordo actually owns the water line. Village water supervisor David Cox said the Capitan put in the line in 1957.

Terry Cox said in 1980 an Eagle Creek Water Association project installed a PVC plastic pipeline next to the old original asbestos cement pipeline but that the PVC line was "plagued with problems" and never used. Terry Cox suggested Capitan retain that PVC pipeline in case Capitan ever drills new wells west of Capitan.

Discussions about the health issue to the five customers led to questions of how many customers are on the Bonito line who receive raw wa-

ter. Terry Cox said there are about 50 customers from Bonito Lake to the top of Nogal hill.

Sederwall then suggested Capitan try to get Alamogordo to take over the five customers. "Let's sell the city (Alamogordo) our customers," Sederwall said with some humor.

Terry Coe, who lives in Bonito and gets raw Bonito water, said he had received no notice from the City of Alamogordo and he just recently paid his water bill.

"How is it an environmental issue to our customers," village attorney Don Dutton said. "If it is not an issue with their (Alamogordo) customers (using the raw water)."

With that reasoning, trustee Leroy Montes made a motion, that trustees approved, to table any decision on the water line and its customers until Sederwall was able to meet with Alamogordo.

Private Military Training Range To Open In Arabella

A federal defense contractor will open in June an 8,000 acre private military range in the Tinnie-Arabella area to provide technical tactic training to U.S. and allied foreign military personnel and police.

The Tinnie Range Complex will be owned and operated by High Energy Access Tools (HEAT) corporation, which currently operates the Tactical Training Center at the Roswell Air Center. HEAT deputy of operations Mike Payne brought his sales pitch to the Lincoln County Commissioners at their meeting Thursday, May 16 in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

"There will be no tanks or rockets in Tinnie," Payne said. "Our training is more for first response emergencies and urban operations on a smaller scale."

HEAT was founded in 1995 in Casper, Wyoming and moved to Roswell Air Center in 1997. The company provides state of the art technical tactical training for military special operatives and federal, state and local law

One of the customers on the Bonito water line threatened to get a lawyer if the Bonito water is cut off, because it is his only

source of water.

David Cox asked if Capitan was obligated to the five customers since Capitan has provided water on the line since 1957.

Dutton said just because these people have received the raw water since 1957 does not mean anything. "All of them are subject to the 1957

agreement (that allows Alamogordo to shut off the water.) So let them go hire attorneys."



the motion to approve the agenda with the mayor's requested removal of the LCSWA appointment. There was no more discussion on this until after trustees reviewed and approved the CCNG budget. At the end of the meeting, visitor Lincoln County News editor/co-publisher Ruth Hammond asked if the LCSWA appointment will be discussed in open session.

"Yes," Sederwall replied. "To be fair he needs to be here (for the discussion.)"

Hammond asked if Sederwall planned to appoint someone else (to the LCSWA board).

"I had planned on it," Sederwall answered.

"Will it depend on discussion in open session?" Hammond asked.

"If we discuss it," Sederwall replied.

"If you discuss it," Hammond said, adding, "First you said it would be discussed in open session and now you say IF it is discussed."

At that point Tippin called for adjournment, which Shearer seconded.

Resident Dick Dickerson then commented that the street B.S. is Sederwall was going to get rid of Whitaker from the LCSWA board.

Sederwall asked Dickerson to talk with him about the situation.

Dickerson then asked the reason why Sederwall wanted Whitaker to step down.

Sederwall said he told Whitaker he would be there (for the discussion) to be fair.

Editor's note. Whitaker attended and presided over the May 21 LCSWA meeting. Sederwall also attended the LCSWA meeting, saying he wanted to address the LCSWA board in executive session. However, he was not invited into the closed session with the board when it went behind closed doors.

During the special Capitan meeting, Capitan trustees also accepted the CCNG budget for fiscal year 2002-2003. Estimating income of \$1,027,418, CCNG also estimates expenditures of \$1,024,582. The CCNG budgeted amounts did not include the three to five percent pay raises for employees that the CCNG board of directors had approved at its May meeting. The preliminary budget presented to trustees did not include any raises or cost of benefits.

The CCNG board had held a special budget meeting on May 8, and had approved the preliminary budget without the pay increases, said Shearer, who is the Capitan trustee representative on the CCNG board. She also said CCNG finance officer Kay Strickland did not ask for salary increases at the budget meeting.

CCNG employees are evaluated (and given subsequent raises) on their anniversary dates of employment, Shearer said. "One pay increase was to Kay, which we did at the CCNG meeting (May 15) when we did her evaluation."

"We also had an amendment to pay \$70,000 in attorney fees," Shearer added.

Shearer said if the Capitan board of trustees did not pass the CCNG budget, CCNG would be "behind the curve to DFA." CCNG budget must be submitted to the state Department of Finance and Administration before June 1 for review and approval.

CCNG board member Cliff Smith said CCNG had the budget meeting, then a week later approved the salary increase.

Capitan trustee George Tippin asked how the \$2,000 pay increase will affect the cost of the employee's benefits. The proposed budget without the pay increase showed

a profit of \$2,836 above required reserves.

Smith said \$6,000 to \$7,000 should have been projected in the budget for the employee raises.


"So we approve this budget," Tippin commented. "But it has

changed from what we have here."

"We need to get the budget to DFA," Strickland responded. "We make amendments to the budget all year long."

Also in the budget are director fees. CCNG board members get \$150 a month to attend the once a month meeting, the CCNG board chair gets \$350 a month. Currently the Carrizozo mayor is chair of CCNG board.
Sederwall said the three Capitan representatives on the CCNG board donate their fees to charities. Shearer's monthly fees go to the baseball field, the other Capitan CCNG members are Tom Sullivan and Cliff Smith and their monthly fees are donated to the Capitan Public Library.
Hammond commented the Carrizozo town council meeting that he had cut the director fees, with mention about the director's fees being cut in half. Hammond asked if the director's fees which are budgeted at \$13,200 for the 2002-03 fiscal year are usually \$26,400, or double the budgeted \$13,200.
Strickland said the director fees had been reduced only for April, May and June of the current year and were figured at the full amount for the next fiscal year (which begins July 1).

The biggest concern for the CCNG budget was the cost of gas to the customer. Smith said the price is a big problem because the budget was projected with the price of \$9.23 per mcf (thousand cubic feet).

Smith discussed with Strickland the difference in figures, which Strickland said did not include the gross receipt taxes.

Strickland said she budgeted the price of bulk gas at 50 cents more per mcf than the current price. She said in consulting the bulk gas supplier, it appears prices in November could be 50 cents per mcf higher than now. "But really we have no clue what the price will be," Strickland said.

"Either way you look at it," said Shearer, "The prices are going up from where they are now."

Highlands University Offers On-campus Housing Scholarship
Students who have not received other scholarships may qualify for free on-campus housing at New Mexico Highlands University (NMHU).

The Connor Residence Scholarship is available to first-time freshmen who have a grade point average of 2.5 and who have not been awarded any other scholarship. The scholarship waives the cost of a double room in Connor Hall for the fall semester and is available for 10 male and 15 female students. The scholarship recipient would only pay for the housing application fee and the meal plan.

NMHU also has lowered the GPA requirement for its bridge scholarship, which is awarded to freshmen who may qualify for the lottery scholarship in their second semester. Students need only a GPA of 2.5 an no ACT score to qualify.

enforcement. "Only a commercial company can change quickly enough to keep up with technology changes," Payne said. The company also provides "overflow training" for U.S. military forces due to base closures and return of military from overseas. "Our military bases are so overloaded there is not enough terrain and time to train the military," Payne said. "We support U.S. and Allied governments." Payne assured all subject matter and clients will be reviewed and approved by government agencies before HEAT contracts with any client group. He also said each contract includes a non-disclosure agreement because of the sensitivity of some tactics. "We don't

want the bad guys to see our tactics," he added.

HEAT has hired 12 primary instructors who have extensive military and police backgrounds, said Frank Fish, director of security.

"We have a great reputation," Fish said. "Everything is above board. We have no secrets, we just have sensitivity."

HEAT is certified by the Education Support Specialists for consistency on presentation, and everything goes through "validation."

Payne listed the benefits provided by the training center. He said HEAT is more responsive so it can meet current training needs for U.S. military. "It takes a long time for the feds to change," Payne said.

HEAT will also provide training for allied governments, through approval of the US government, to increase their internal capabilities and support for coalition operations.

Regional benefits Payne listed were the increased need for services such as recreation, food and lodging for the company workers, and entertainment and souvenirs for visiting clients.

Also Payne said HEAT plans to work closely with local law enforcement. He said he had

worked with Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan and undersheriff Rick Virden.

County commissioner Rick Simpson said he was real familiar with the ranch being sold to HEAT and it is very isolated with only one neighbor to the north.

Fish said their plans are to put up barricades and notices on ranch roads when any firing is to take place.

Wilson asked how many the facility will employ when fully operational.

Payne said they will employ 35 to 40 people.

Wilson then asked how many clients will be trained at a time.

Payne said the groups will be 50 or less.

A visitor asked if HEAT could train local law enforcement officers.

Payne said, "Absolutely."

Then Nunley asked, "for free?"

"Everything has its cost," Payne answered.


Wilson ended the presentation by saying he did not think HEAT officials violated county laws, "to my knowledge," and he would not instruct the sheriff to escort them out of the county. "Your mission is a public relations job," Wilson said.

Schwettmann asked HEAT to send the county literature on the cost of training.

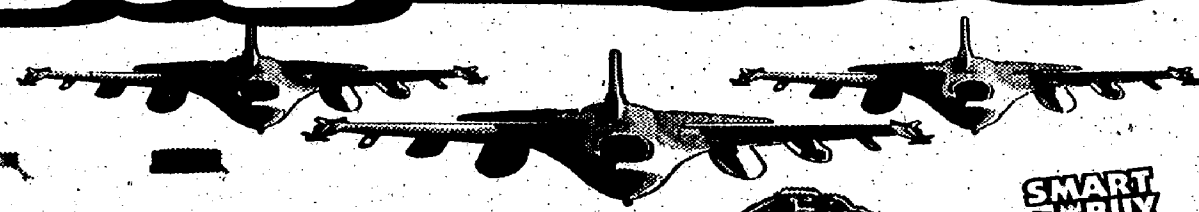


