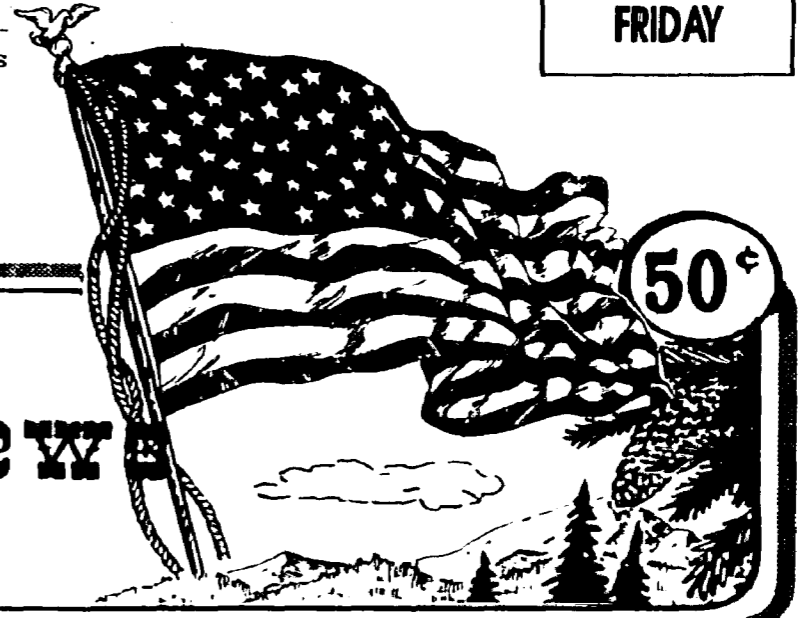

## County Amends Jail Contract With CSI

At a special telephone conference meeting held May 28 at the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, Lincoln County Commissioners approved amendments to their contract with Correction Systems, Inc. in order to comply with IRS rules for tax exempt bonds.

Lincoln County recently refinanced the loan for the new detention center, being financed with revenue from tax exempt bonds. While reviewing the county's contract with Corrections Systems, Inc. (CSI) the tax attorney for the county's bond counsel firm Sherman & Howard of Denver found the wording in the CSI jail management contract to be in violation of IRS rules for

issuance of tax exempt bonds.

It took a tax attorney looking at the CSI contract to say this doesn't pass muster for tax exempt bonds," said Lincoln County manager Tom Stewart.

According to a memo from the tax attorney, under federal law, if more than 10 percent of the proceeds from a tax-exempt bond issue are used to finance a facility that is used by private parties, and more than 10 percent of the debt service on the bonds is derived from private payments, then the bonds could become taxable.

"The cost of issuance of

taxable bonds is estimated at \$80,000 a year or more," Stewart said.

The memo from the tax attorney went on to state that IRS permits five different types of contracts, including contracts for a fixed fee, without jeopardizing the tax exempt status of the bonds. CSI offered a proposed contract amendment that would provide compensation from the county for a fixed fee of \$85,000 for the first 82 prisoners and \$24.90 per day for each prisoner above that number, with a 60-day exit clause for either party.

"Under this proposal CSI's total monthly fee could not exceed \$170,000

per month under any circumstances," Stewart added.

The difficulty with the wording in the CSI contract, on how the county would compensate CSI for its management services at the detention center, affected both the former loan with the New Mexico Finance Authority (NMFA) and the refinanced loan, Stewart said.

With the refinanced tax exempt bonds scheduled to have been issued at 11 a.m. May 28, Stewart told county commissioners the "bond issuance will not occur unless this is resolved." County commissioners started the special meeting at 9 a.m.

"I'm glad we found this now, it could have been disastrous later," Stewart added. "The penalty from the IRS for not resolving this with our current (NMFA) loan could have been substantial."

County commissioner Bill Schwetzmann wanted to know how the new contract amendment will affect "the bottom line" cost to the county.

"I think it will continue to be okay," Stewart answered. "If we have up to 120 inmates."

## Cogdills to Leave C'zozo

Carrizozo School Superintendent Rick Cogdill will be leaving at the end of his contract this month.

Cogdill told THE NEWS that he will be at Carrizozo School through June and will attend the June 18 school board meeting. However, Cogdill told THE NEWS, he will not participate in the selection process for the new superintendent, rather that is the responsibility of the school board.

Cogdill said he and his wife Phoebe will be moving to Aztec where he will be counselor at the high

school which has about 1,000 students.

Cogdill gave no reason for leaving Carrizozo where for the last seven years he has been a classroom teacher, principal and now superintendent.

The school board will be searching for a new superintendent by posting the notice of vacancy with several educational employment networks.

Coach Mel Holland will also be leaving this summer. The school board at its last meeting approved Holland's retirement effective this month.

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# Magistrate Judge Dean Will Retire On July 31

Lincoln County Division 1 Magistrate Judge Gerald Dean Jr. will retire at the end of July after 16 years on the bench.

Judge Dean told *THE NEWS* he submitted his letter of retirement to Governor Gary Johnson on May 14. By law magistrate judges must advise the governor of their retirement. The governor's office will be responsible for interviewing and appointing a new judge to fill the position until the newly elected judge is sworn into office in January 2003. Appointment is

expected sometime in August.

Judge Dean told *THE NEWS* he had planned to retire for some time.

Judge Dean was first elected Magistrate Judge in the November 1986 general election.

Running as a Democrat against S.M. "Sally" Ortiz in the primary of 1986, Dean went on to defeat Republican Leroy Montes

in the general election. "I really just wanted the half time judge's job in Capitan," Dean said. But that year the state consolidated the Capitan magistrate court into the Carrizozo magistrate court for one full time position to which Dean was elected. Since 1986, Dean has been re-elected every four years, with his last election in 1998.

Dean said he can now comfortably retire knowing he has fulfilled the goals he set when he was first elected. The first was to restructure and rebuild the Division 1 magistrate court. "The court had major problems when I inherited it," Dean said. "It took a lot of sweat, grief and about two years to get the court on its feet."

The second goal Dean had was to hire competent and trustworthy court clerks. "It took a while to get that done, but I do believe that has been accomplished," Dean added.

The third goal is the new court building, just completed and occupied in May. "I had three major goals set and they are now completed," Dean added.

New Mexico Administrative Office of the Courts

recently dedicated the new magistrate courtroom in Judge Dean's honor.

"Being a magistrate judge has been a great learning experience in trying to understand compassionate injustice and impartial fairness," Dean continued. "I've tried very hard to fulfill the post to the best of my ability in all situations. I hope I have served the citizens of Lincoln County and State of New Mexico in an equitable and honorable manner."

"I wish to thank my family, friends and people of Lincoln County for the opportunity to serve in this position," Dean said. "It is kind of heart wrenching to leave."

Dean said he hopes to continue to hold his law class at ENMU-Ruidoso which he has conducted for several years. Also he plans to continue to do judge pro tem work for other magistrate courts on a contract basis. "Being a magistrate judge has been a very serious experience for it is dealing with people's lives and freedoms and money," Dean said. "I thank you all for allowing me to serve four terms in this office."

Lincoln County Commissioners will meet at 8 a.m. tomorrow, Friday, June 7 in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

County commissioners meet this Friday to meet state requirements for canvassing the votes of the June 4 primary election. The canvass of the votes is listed on the agenda after the 9 a.m. public hearing on proposed changes to the county subdivision ordinance and before the 11 a.m. scheduled time for visitors comments.

On the day of the meeting, the Lincoln County Detention Center had 92 inmates, of whom 25 were federal prisoners. The county receives payment for each federal prisoner through contract agreement with the Federal Marshall's Service.

"We had this problem even before we transferred the county employees to CSI," Stewart said. "I think this is good."

County commission chairman Rex Wilson asked how the fees as outlined in the new contract amendment for fixed payment will be affected by the new DWI annex.

John Foren, CSI president who was on conference call with the commissioners, said compensation for the annex will be complicated in order to "pass tax muster".

Stewart said when the county gets the annex completed the sustained operational costs will be figured.

County attorney Alan Morel said the "bunk house" issue will not be addressed in the new CSI

amendments. Also under the new contract amendments, all county detention employees (there were nine at the time of the meeting) may elect to become employees of CSI, and the county will reimburse CSI at 1/12th of the total salary and personnel benefits of the transferred employees.

Stewart offered a cost comparison chart of the CSI proposal and county proposal of \$80,000 a month fixed rate. Stewart said more federal prisoners will result in more revenue to the detention center to offset the cost of CSI services to the county.

Foren said CSI is planning to increase the number of federal prisoners by 10.

Other items included in the CSI contract amendment included wording that makes liability insurance based upon \$3 million, and had CSI provide inmate escort in county insured and maintained vehicles.

Within an hour of adjourning the meeting, the new refinanced, tax exempt bonds were issued.

Maybe you haven't read the Capitan Mayor's report that was mailed to Capitan residents this week. In the report mayor Sederwall refers to The Lincoln County News as a liberal newspaper. Now, if you happen to know what he means, please let us know. We asked several people what liberal means and got a variety of answers, ranging from liberals started Social Security, to - liberals are more permissive, and we were even told that it could be a good thing to be called a liberal, depending on how it was used.

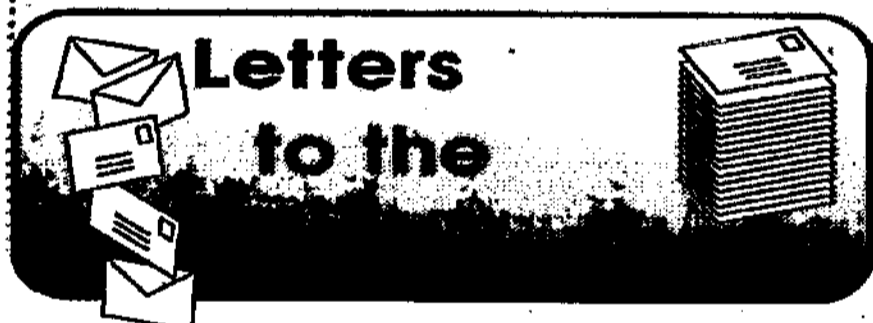
Obviously being called a name is not important, but what is important is the mayor's blatant refusal to fulfill his duties to "cause the ordinances and regulations of the municipality to be obeyed." One of the mayor's duties is to make certain the municipality is fiscally responsible and yet in the same paragraph of the report that the mayor touts his obeying state statutes, the mayor explains not paying a bill the Village of Capitan owes. The mayor says that Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) is overcharging Capitan residents for their trash and cites action taken at a village trustee meeting June 14, 1999.

Now, mayor, don't you suppose that we also know about the ordinance Capitan approved June 14, 1999? And don't you suppose that we also know one of the reasons for the ordinance including trash rates? Do you know why? It is a shame you didn't ask questions in an open meeting instead of making accusations, withholding money needed by a governmental entity to remain in the black, and giving the impression that you are "hollower than thou" and should be put on a pedestal. If you really care about people knowing the truth, warts and all, you might start by reading the joint powers agreement (JPA) signed by Capitan and LCSWA and by the other entities in Lincoln County. You might note that the JPA gives LCSWA the power to set trash rates. Apparently Capitan did not have an ordinance in effect prior to 1999 that stated what the trash rates would be. Capitan Trustees chose to approve an ordinance setting the trash rates at exactly what LCSWA was charging. The only thing wrong with that was that the Capitan Trustees did not make changes to the ordinance when LCSWA changed rates. Does this mean LCSWA is overcharging? No, it means that Capitan has two regulations in effect and Capitan should, in open session, find satisfactory solutions.

Even if you don't like it, LCSWA has the legal right to set rates. And each time LCSWA increased rates, or rather the LCSWA board increased rates, member entities were informed, including Capitan. LCSWA rates were set at \$12.00 on May 15, 2001 and with the \$1.00 fuel surcharge the amount due is \$13.00 per customer, the amount that is being billed by LCSWA. And commercial accounts are set as agreed upon between the customer and LCSWA and the agreement signed. Not the standard \$54.00 you said.

Yes, we believe that it would have been far better for the mayor to conduct village business in an open meeting instead of in a report. And we believe that asking questions is much better than making foolish unfounded statements. And we believe the back stabbing should stop immediately.

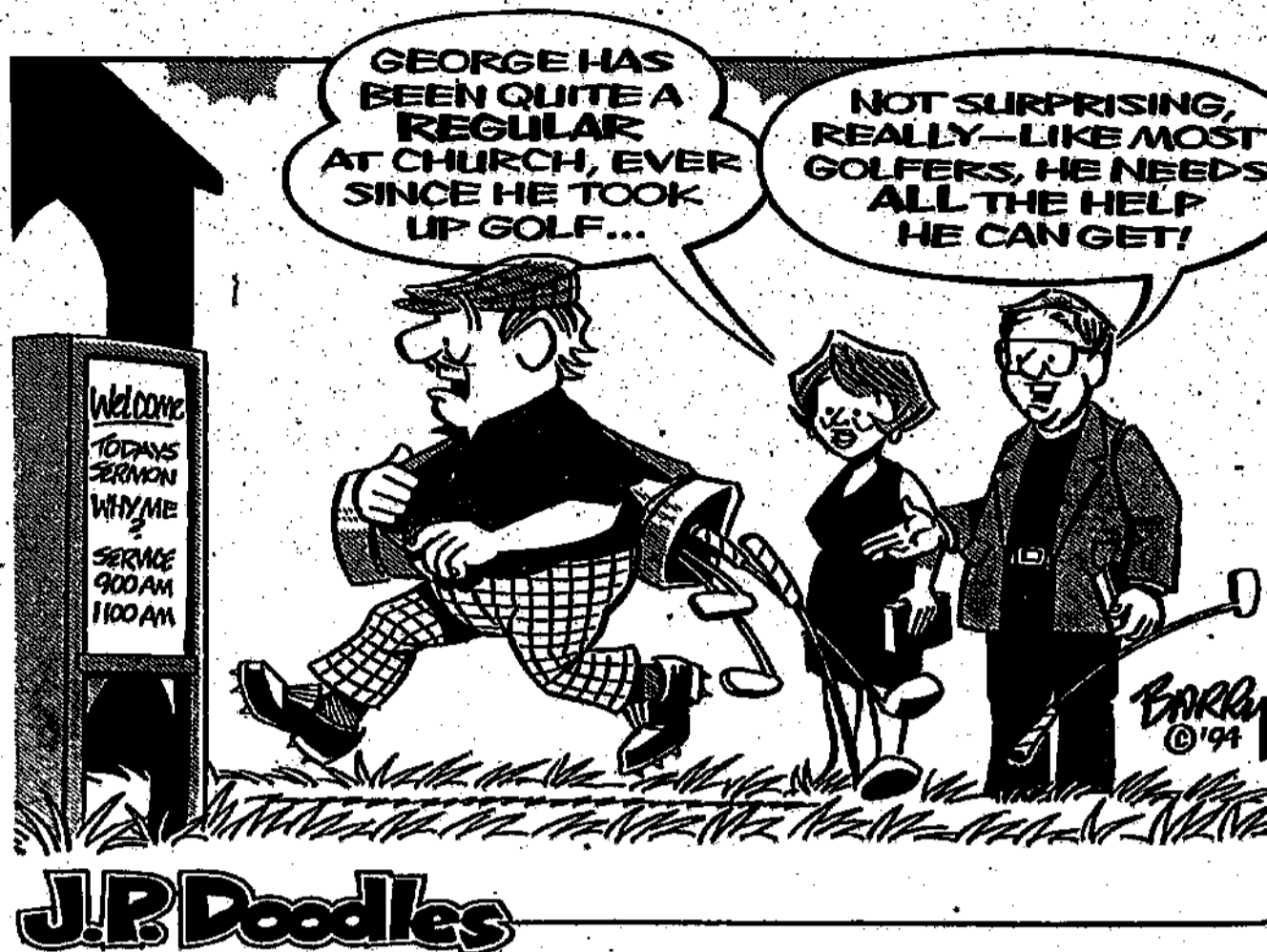

**SANTA FE INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** - Are they educational experiences or junkets? About this time every year, some inquiring reporter will sift through legislative travel vouchers to find who has spent the most money during the previous year.

Lawmakers who get named criticize the press for sensationalizing educational experiences that provide valuable contacts on a variety of issues facing all state legislatures. So, is legislative travel playing for those in power or well worth the money? As with most such things, it is some of both.

This time, it was Steve Terrell of the Santa Fe New Mexican staff who did the digging. He found that the top 10 legislative travelers in 2001 were seven Democrats and three Republicans. That's weighted a little heavier on the Democrat side than their majorities in both houses would justify, everything being equal.

But of course everything isn't equal in a partisan legislature. The House speaker and Senate president pro tem have to approve all out-of-state travel and they're sure to take care of their own first.

Nevertheless, the three Republicans ranked in the top five travel money spenders and two of them led the list. Sen. Joe Carraro of Albuquerque was tops and so was picked on to justify his travel. He said he tries to go to as many out-of-state meetings as he can because they enable him to compare notes with legislators from other states.

Carraro says he can save the state time and money by knowing more about the issues and not having to constantly reinvent the wheel. He says he makes 20-30 phone calls every legislative session to contacts he has made at various conferences and that these contacts help him introduce much legislation.

Carraro is correct about introducing a large amount of legislation. He also has much to say in committees and on the floor of the Senate. He maintains that he knows more about the issues than just about anyone else in the Legislature. And he's probably right on that too.

Why does Carraro get to travel so much? He puts in lots of requests because he has time to travel and then, some conferences ask for bipartisan representation. It also might have something to do with Carraro not being in a leadership position among Senate Republicans. He's also fairly unpredictable, making him a possible Democrat ally on some issues. And he talked about running for Senate president pro tem last January but withdrew, allowing Sen. Richard Romero, an Albuquerque Democrat, to win all 17 Republican votes.

Not surprisingly, considering Romero's alliance with Senate Republicans, the only three Senators in the top 10 legislative travelers were two Republicans and Romero, who was the only Democrat senator. He ranked fourth in travel spending. In prior years, former Senate President Pro Tem Manny Aragon was up at the top.

Ranking second in travel spending last year was Rep. Jeanette Wallace, a Los Alamos Republican. Wallace's district borders House Speaker Ben Lujan's and she sometimes votes with Democrats for veto overrides.

Lawmakers also were ranked by their total expenses, which include in-state travel. In that ranking, Democrat leaders bubbled to the top. Sen. Majority Whip Mary Jane Garcia of Las Cruces was first; House Democrat Caucus Chairman John Heaton of Carlsbad was second and House Speaker Ben Lujan of Nambé was third. The reason for those rankings was the number of interim legislative committees on which each serves.

Twenty interim committees, composed of members of both houses and both parties, meet when the Legislature is not in session. Most lawmakers serve on more than one committee. Garcia likely wins the prize for serving on the most. Interim committees are the alternative to legislatures that meet nearly year-round, but we have too many of these committees and they are too large, some of them over 20 members.

Basically, we get a good deal because our legislators are unpaid except for expenses.

## Assistance Is Available For Livestock and Ag Producers

Deadline is June 28 to apply for technical and financial assistance to New Mexico farmers and ranchers who face serious threats to soil, water and related natural resources.

US Department of Agriculture Farm Services Agency (FSA) and Natural Resources Conservation Services (NRCS) are accepting applications for financial and technical assistance under the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP). Applications may be submitted in person, email or fax to any location NRCS or conservation district office.

Conservation program for agricultural producers. Eligible land includes crop land, rangeland, pasture, forest land and other farm or ranch lands. Assistance is given to plan and install structural, vegetative and management practices.

USDA assistance is provided through a conservation plan developed with the landowners and by contractual agreement of one to 10 years. Cost sharing may pay up to 75 percent of the cost of specific conservation practices. Total cost-share and incentive payment are limited to \$450,000 for the length of the contract.
