Does the U.S. Supreme Court decision override that because it ays it's legal to give money to parto the

If so, New Mexico's constitution has an added kicked. In this state it is illegal to give public money to privati ndividuals or entities. This antidonation clause was added because too officials, and their busincsses, were on the receiving end of public money without performing any service.

Attorney General Madrid thinks a constitutional amendment is the only way to solve that problem. Since the anti-donation clause also has stifled there might be some support for an amendment removign that clause.

But even with constitutional issues resolved, New Mexicans still are split on the subject of vouchers. Public schools are what made America great some say. Siphoning money from students hurt. It Will drain the good cun't get into another school because of disabilities. behavior problems. high tuition or parental disinterest.

Others say if there is a possibility America might be made greater through school choice, it should be given a chance. And that's what the Supreme Court ruling will do. New Mexico is very unlikely to be in the experimental gevp may be menting. We know from their experiment with charter schools that there wer surprises. New schools couldn't find buildings. When I was growing up in New Mexico we had a home in Capitan, a small ranching commonCity on the edge of the In the 1950 a liellish wildfire swept through taking out everything in its path except for one lucky bear cub. One of our neighbors actually kept the little bear for a time and had many phocos of the cute cub with his paws bandaged. The forest rangers that found had no idea the impact had no idea the impact on the nation's policy toward fire. Smokey Bear posters admonished us with the slogan, "Only you can prevent forest
Now, after decades of fire suppression in the west horrific fires are burning in several westmorn states including the Arizona. The normally

Capitan Village trustees are sending their mayor to negotiate with five propinto the old Bonito Lake water pipeline that once serviced Capitan, and to bring back options to continue providing water. Ait 10:20 p.m. during their regular meeting on Tuesday, July 9 trustees unanimously voted on a motion by trustee Bobbi meayor to negotiate with property owners and bring back options for continuation of water," and in an amendment to the motion, "to authorize the mayor to negotiate with the City of Alamogordo for a time exBonito Lake water, ${ }^{n}$
Shearer had tried
tion to accept a proposed contract drafted by truistee George Tippin that would have those with taps pay
for a pump to pressurize for a pump to pressurize
the old water line with Capitan well water. But she got no second, not even from Tippin who had drafted it. Trustee John Whitaker continued to be against the idea of providing the five taps water, because of the 1994 village moratorium on providing lage limits.
Much of the discussion at the July 9 regular meeting was similar to what was said at the June 11 regular meeting and at the July 2 special meeting. Trustees have been grappling with the water
tap situation since March tap situation since March
when Alamogordo advised it was cutting off the Bo-
nito Lake water to the old Water line on July 31 and
subsequently to all taps on subsequently to all taps on
that pipeline. Individuals that pipeline. Individuals village requesting the village provide water. Since 1994 Capitan has had an agreement with Alamogordo whereby Capitan purchased raw untreated water at a very low price, then resold it to
the five taps at one and a half times the rate that village residents are charged. At their June 11 regular trustees meeting, it appeared trustees were mov ing toward a resolution of the situation because they called for the attorney to for the five property own for the five property owners. But on June 27, trustes and Tippin called for a special meeting to be held on July 2 to discuss the contract drafted by village attorney Don Dutton. At the July 2 special meeting Shearer voted 3-1 with Shearer voting no, to reto provide water to the five tape.
During discussion at the special July 2 meeting Montes, who missed the regular June 11 meeting, was especially concerned about THE NEWS article about the meeting that ing to provide water to the five tapss. "I don't know what's going on," Montes said. The paper said the

trustees had given the people on the pipeline waGeorge (Tippin) he said George (Tlippin) he said contract:"
Dutton admitted that when he went away from the June 11 meeting he too thought it was "pretty much decided to sell water to the five taps."
"But that was not the 11 motion (made at the June 11 meeting), Dutton conmade by truistee Shearer at the June 11 meeting was to have the attorney draft an agreement to allow the water service on the basis the five taps were grandfathered in, these is not feasible, they be cut off.
Dutton said he had anticipated having the trustees review and act on the contract at their regular July meeting, then take the contract to the five property owners.

more taps not shown in the old agreements, but the taps are not-being used. Dutton also said he learned that Nogal Fire Department has a fire hydrant on the pipeline easement forfire service. and the fire hydrant is located ofr Highway 37 on Nogal Mesa, said the hydrant is metered and Nogal Fire Dept paid for all the water it has used.
