tion who send her tion, who send her envelopes inside separate envelopes addressed to the postmaster. A publication produced by the U. S . Postal Service lists all commemorative stamps available at post ofrices across the country, includoiner's.

In his final quar terly report for the grant, dated September 30, Stewart Wrote that he adfinance conimittee that the DDA grant awward of runds would not be extended past the end of September. Stewart also reported that he had teaticied about the EDA grant
before the legislative fi-
mpespite repeated er Corts, and while the mittee did reauest conpedi Hittee did request expediof the project as stipulated in the (grant) award, an agreement has not been provided by the state of New Mexico," Stewart read from the granits final quarteriy report letter he ofrice in Austin, TXX
"While the (New Mexico) Property Control Division telephonically, reported working on a solution; the deaduine (for the grant re County of Lincoln has no alternative but to recom mend that the funds nevert to the EDA for other appropriate uses," stewart continued.
