

C'zozo Town Council Considers Tax Hike

Consistent problems at the Carrizozo swimming pool have caused the Carrizozo Town Council to consider asking voters to approve a general obligation bond on property taxes to pay for renovation of the pool.

Trustee Eileen Lovelace explained the situation at the town council meeting

Tuesday, June 11. She said the pool was in really bad shape, the town does repairs every summer but it is not enough. She said trustees were going to discuss a general bond, but would not decide until all costs and figures are available. These figures would include total costs to completely re-do the pool and building and how

much property taxes would increase to pay for the general obligation bond.

One man asked about the one-eighth of one percent gross receipts tax voters had approved several years ago when Alesca was planning to build an industry in Carrizozo. The gross receipts money was to be put into a

special account to be used to pay Alesca's loan in the event Alesca defaulted. Alesca has relinquished the town property it was going to lease and will not build the industry.


When asked about the gross receipts money, Lovelace said that money can only be used for economic development and there is under \$4,000 in

the account.

A few months ago, during a town council meeting Lovelace had asked about completely renovat-

ing the swimming pool. No costs were obtained at that time and it was decided to make repairs to the pool. Evidently the repairs were not long lasting because town foreman

County Hears About Nogal Road Access

Glencoe Volunteer Fire Department will get a new to them fire truck, thanks to an emergency purchase authorized by the Lincoln County Commission and state fire marshal.

At the June 10 county commission meeting held on a Friday in order to canvass the results of the June 4 primary election, commissioners discussed the situation with the Glencoe Fire Department. Able to afford only a used water tender truck, Glencoe Fire Department representatives on March 21 requested county commissioners authorize purchase of a used water tender truck. But there were several assumptions which led to a delay in the purchase. By June 10, Glencoe Fire Dept. was back to the county commission because of a misunderstanding with the state fire marshal on whether the water tender should be new or used.

In a letter from George Chavez, state fire marshal, to the Glencoe Fire Dept. it states that the former Glencoe Palo Verde Dept. fire chief and the county had made a commitment to earmark carry over money (for the Glencoe department), for a new tanker. "The County, as well as Glencoe-Palo Verde need to understand that re-designation of ear-marked money is not

accomplished arbitrarily, rather through invocation of appropriate measures and authorizations. Both Glencoe and the county have failed to accomplish this."

Chavez allowed for the purchase of used equipment. In the last paragraph of his letter he stated he would "very reluctantly extend authorization" for the county to

County Amends Subdivision Rules

After 18 months of discussions and hearings, Lincoln County Commissioners adopted changes to the county subdivision ordinance that are more lax than what the state engineer has recommended.

During their meeting Friday, June 7 in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, county commissioners adopted the changes to the county subdivision ordinance on a three to one vote. County commission chairman Rex Wilson voted no while other county commissioners Bill Schwettmann, Leo Martinez and Rick Simpson voted yes to adopt.

Wilson voted against the amendments to the

request the "appropriate authorizations to re-earmark and expend funds" for purchase of used equipment.

At the June 10 county commission meeting, Larry Mulligan, representative for the Glencoe Fire Dept., said the department needs the truck. County commissioner Leo Mar-

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Fire Restrictions Continue Within Village of Ruidoso

As drought continues, so do the fire restrictions within the Village of Ruidoso.

Under the restrictions no outdoor burning is allowed, no charcoal or gas grills are allowed outside, and no smoking is allowed outdoors on all public and private lands within the village.

During the Ruidoso Village Council meeting June 11, village manager Alan Briley reported there were six fires, charcoal and campfires, in Two Rivers Park recently. "We are enforcing the fire restrictions and we mean it," Briley said.

Councilor Ron Anderson asked if there are signs at the parks about the fire restrictions.

Briley said the barbecue grills at the parks have plastic bags over them and there are large lighted signs on the highways coming into Ruidoso advising of the fire restrictions.

Anderson then requested that signs be placed at all parks advising of the fire restrictions and the fines for violating the restrictions.

Councilor Deborah Byars said the lighted signs into town catch the attention of travelers.

Any person violating the fire restrictions, including no smoking outdoors or throwing any lighted material out of a vehicle, can be fined up to \$500.

Briley also reported that the purple thistle, an invasive problem weed, is now in bloom. He encouraged residents to at least remove the unopened blossoms which can produce up to 4,000 seeds that easily blow in the wind. Briley has more information about the purple thistle by calling his office at village hall.

Councilors also: -Postponed action on an offer for the village to purchase 4.98 acres located at 2705 Sudderth Drive in the midtown area for \$600,000 until the last meeting in July to allow for staff to develop a proposal on how to pay the purchase price. Sugges-

tions were to impose an additional gross receipt tax, raise property taxes or raise lodgers taxes.

-Postponed action until a July meeting on an offer for the village to purchase 33 acres of land with 10 acre feet of water rights for the well on the land which is west of the Eagle Creek ball field complex until village staff can provide more information about the actual water

availability with the well, and postponed action on a request from a realtor to purchase village owned Eagle Creek property in order to have a full scale residential development.

-Approved a zone map amendment for the Bowers Tract No. 1, Marvin W. Ashbury applicant to change from C-1 commercial to C-2 commercial to allow expansion of an existing RV park.

Capitan School Seeks Applications To Fill Board Vacancy

Capitan Board of Education is seeking applications to fill a vacancy of Position 4 on the school board.

The position became vacant by the recent death of school board member Glen Crane.

Any registered voter residing within the school district who is interested in applying for the position should submit a letter of application addressed to school board president Gary R. Tregembo, Capitan Municipal Schools, POB 278, Capitan, NM 88316.

Letters of application must be delivered in person or by mail to the school administration office by 4 p.m. Monday, July 8.

Letters must include the applicant's name, home addresses, home phone number, reasons for applying and what the applicant believes are the responsibilities of a school board member. Applications will be reviewed, and applicants interviewed.

Tregembo told THE NEWS that applications submitted for the last board vacancy will not be considered for this vacancy. Any former applicant who is interested in the current vacancy should submit a new letter of application and other information.

The new school board appointee will serve in Po-

sition 4 until February, 2003, when the position is up for re-election.

Capitan School Board directed Tregembo to take care of filling the vacancy on the school board during the regular school board meeting June 13. This is the second vacancy on the school board since Tregembo has been a member, and he too was appointed.

The school board did discuss how to deal with prior applications and school board member James Hobbs favored re-considering former applications. Tregembo said he was concerned how that would affect new applicants. Hobbs made the motion to let Tregembo handle the logistics of getting with the superintendent to make a formal notification about the application process.

Jim Payne announced at the June 11 meeting that there were problems at the pool, there was another leak. He said the pool was being filled and if no further problems the pool would be open the next day.

Also during discussion about the swimming pool a few months ago, it was announced grants might be available to help pay for renovating the pool. No mention was made during the June 11 meeting about applying for grants.

In other business June 11 the town council received requests from three residents.

A Carrizozo resident said her family has to wait until after 10:00 p.m. to take a shower because there is no water pressure. Cathy McAllister, a resident on 19th Street, requested better water pressure and paved roads. She also said the fire hydrant on 19th Street needed to be fixed so she can get fire insurance.

McAllister said when people in town water their lawns there is no water pressure at her home, often just a trickle of water.

The council discussed the matter with town foreman Jim Payne and asked him if he was aware of the low water pressure. Payne said there used to be no water pressure at all across the tracks. He said the town might look at water towers to increase the water pressure. He said there had been a four inch line and now there is a six inch line out in the pasture and down E Ave.

Volume of water was another concern. Payne said he didn't know if there was enough volume. If there is volume of water the only thing needed would be to increase the water pressure. One option would be to put in a water pressure station or two water pressure stations, one above and one below the low pressure area.

McAllister also said

there is a consistent problem with the sewer. Apparently the town flushes 500 gallons of water down the sewer regularly trying to get the sewer to work. Payne said that a septic had to be put in at one place because water won't flow uphill.

Emergency funds may be available to correct the water pressure problem.

Gena Torricelli requested the town council ask Tularosa Basin Telephone Company (TBTC) to change the local calling area. She said it was a hardship on senior citizens to have to pay long distance toll fees to call Alamogordo or Ruidoso. She said TBTC in Tularosa allows calls from Tularosa to Alamogordo or Ruidoso to be local calls.

Jeff Hammond spoke to the council about two issues, stating his rights had been violated and he asked for an apology from the town and from the police department. Hammond said he had called the police department May 13 to report a burglary at his home and as of Tuesday, June 11, which was 29 days later, no officer had taken a report of the burglary. Hammond also said that on Saturday, June 8 a police officer told his father that he had a citation to issue to Jeff and that Jeff had 10 days to clean his property. Hammond lives in his own home and his parents are not financially, legally or morally responsible for him. Hammond said he had not been served a citation as of that day, June 11.

Hammond said he believed the town council and police department should apologize to him and to his family for treating them in this fashion.

It was reported Clean Up Day was a success with lots of participation.

New police officer Albert Padilla was introduced. He has three years experience with the department of corrections, one year as juvenile probation officer in Roswell, and a short time with Capitan police department.

Police chief Angelo Vega asked the town council to look at some kind of fireworks restrictions. He said

he was thinking of banning all fireworks.

Resident Gary Stout said if fireworks were in a controlled atmosphere it would be better.

Lovelace suggested they look at it at a special meeting that was to be held the next week. She said maybe it would be no fireworks in town, only at the park July 4 with the fire department there.

The town is conserving water by cutting down on use in the big parks.

Peter Wolfe reported on the Rec Center, giving a breakdown for 2001. Gross income was \$28,348.88 and general expenditures for payroll, food, etc., was more than \$24,000.00. He said parts and supplies for the bowling machine were \$10,474 and it cost \$6,400 for a certified Brunswick worker to install. He said the hardware had loaned the Rec Center \$8,297.84.

He said Jim Mack Jr. would be hired to run the Rec Center. He is a gradu-

ate of the University of Kansas. Mack plans to work with the school to get students involved.

Wolfe said the Rec Center is classic 60s. He asked the council to get the plumbing fixed.

Web site manager Gary Stout reported there were 1,547 visits to the town web site, an average of 49 a day with a maximum of 83. Foreign countries visiting the web site were Mexico, Malagua, Brazil, and Belgium. The Carrizozo Lodger's Tax pays for the web site.

Tommy Guevara was appointed to the Capitan Carrizozo Natural Gas (CCNG) board.

Trustees approved the planning and zoning recommendation for conditional use for Celia Sedillo to place a mobile home on her property.

A public hearing on the ordinance for the water contingency plan will be held at the regular meeting in July.

the 2002-2003 school year. The new principal will come to work in late July. No other information was given on the new principal during the meeting. Current high school principal Darrel Stierwall will retire at the end of June.

The school board also approved a request from the high school student senate to rename Yard Road to Tiger Drive. The name change was a student initiative headed by student senate president Andrew Murtaugh.

As a cooperative effort to achieve a 10 year old project to install flashing warning lights at the school zone on Highway 380, Capitan Mayor Steve Sederwall attended the meeting and requested the school board form a committee to work with the village.

Sederwall explained his experience in dealing with the state highway department in trying to get that agency to install a light. He also said the highway department might help with some of the sign but the village and school would have to install the sign and then pay the electricity for the flasher. Sederwall said he plans to seek funding from legisla-

tive sources.

School superintendent Dr. Larry Miller also updated the school board about the SB-9 projects. Voters approved a two mill property tax levy for school capital projects and expenditures. As of February 28 the school district had \$340,025 in SB-9 funds available. Dr. Miller reported that some expenditures had already been made. These expenditures included \$29,225 for a Ford truck and \$1,350 for new hurdles; \$2,800 for an aerifier for maintenance; \$5,000 for a 30 foot Genie personal lift for maintenance; \$400 for fertilizer broadcaster; \$3,177 for Electrolux vacuums for each building; \$499 for commercial wet/dry vac; \$879 for floor stripper/scrubber; \$849 for floor varnisher.

Other SB-9 projects listed include a vault in the administration building estimated to cost \$30,529 which is in the design phase.

Sombrero Construction has been employed to do door repairs in the middle school for \$2,618 and to do ceiling fans in the middle school classrooms at the cost of \$4,779. Dr. Miller said.



Ruidoso Increases Yard Waste Fees

In a "life or death situation" for potential wildfire, the Village of Ruidoso beginning next month will bill all lots, including vacant ones, a \$5 a month fee to pick up yard waste.

During their meeting Tuesday, June 11, Ruidoso Village Councilors adopted an ordinance that increases yard waste fees from \$3.50 a month to \$5 a month, and will allow the village to bill property owners of vacant lots up to one acre in size the same \$5 a month, plus \$5 for each additional acre for multiple contiguous lots under common ownership.

The yard rate increase and billing of vacant lots were recommended by the newly organized Forest Task Force as a way to provide funds for the village to purchase additional trucks and employees to deal with yard waste to help reduce fire danger in the village. Currently vacant lots are not assessed any charge for yard waste.

With increasing awareness of the potential for wildfire, more village residents and property owners are cleaning their lots, resulting in twice the tonnage of yard waste this year than last year. And with proposals from the Forest Task Force for new ordinances requiring the cleaning and thinning of all lots for fire safety, the village is anticipating even more tons of yard waste. The Forest Task Force will present its proposed ordinances to require cleaning and thinning at the first regular

July meeting.

Currently Ruidoso has two trucks specially designed with grapple hooks to pick up the piles of yard waste set out by property owners, but even with working 10 hour days the crews are falling farther behind. The rate increase of \$1.50 a month per lot on residential lots with a structure, plus \$5 a month per acre of vacant lots will produce revenue for the village to purchase two more trucks and hire three more employees just to pick up yard waste. Village solid waste department supervisor Leonard Corona said with the additional trucks and employees working 10 hours a day, six days a week the village can catch up with the yard waste.

Councilor Deborah Byars supported the \$5 a month charge for vacant lots as a way to protect the community. She supported the charge even for her commercial asphalt parking lot because it will help protect the community, neighbors, homes and property.

Debbie Haynes, a member of the Forest Task Force, said the yard waste charge gives everyone a "sense of community" in becoming a FireWise village. She said the task force considered an option of charging property owners by the load, but the task force members found that more distasteful than the \$5 a month fee to all lot owners.

Resident Joe White said he thought the \$5 a month was reasonable, as the village is getting slower in picking up the yard waste now. "In view of the fire hazard it behooves us to get more trucks," White said in favoring the ordinance.

William Smith, owner of several rental units, was concerned the \$5 a lot fee would cause him to have to raise rents. He also said it would be cheaper for him to pay for someone to pick up and dispose of the yard and tree waste. Smith also questioned the fee for vacant lots and considered it unfair to those who have very small lots.

Bob Williams said no one will be there discussing the need for trucks and fees if the village has a fire. "We've got to take this very, very seriously," Williams said. "It is a life and death situation and a deep, deep problem."

Councilor Ron Anderson said Ruidoso crews are currently concentrating on picking up piled yard waste in the southwestern part of the village, because a fire started in that part of the village could spread quickly throughout the community due to the direction of the prevailing winds. "So other areas of the village have to wait for pick ups," Anderson said about the current situation.

Councilor Bob Sterchi asked what would happen if someone refused to pay the yard waste fees. The yard waste fees are included in residential water/waste water and solid waste billings sent to owners of properties with water taps. Owners of vacant lots without a water meter or other improvements will receive a separate \$5 a month bill for the yard waste collection services. The village plans to

set up accounts to charge vacant lot owners by researching their names and

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
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County 4 H Teams Win At Estancia

Board appointments

Public business is supposed to be public, and all public business is supposed to be conducted in open meetings, with the exception of a few things that can be discussed in closed meetings. We continue to hear about decisions that are being made by elected officials, only the decisions are not being made in open meetings, they are being made when a few of the elected officials get together outside the city limits. These are not impromptu meetings, it seems they are scheduled in advance, more precisely than any of the public meetings are scheduled. Yes, it is happening.

Oldtimers can remember when officials were allowed to conduct business when ever and where ever they wanted. Seems the powers that be keep appointing the same people to the same boards, or rather to the boards that pay a very generous stipend to attend.

There could be another person willing to serve or willing to get that hefty pay for a two hour meeting, but they are not appointed. Like it or not guys, it gives the appearance that money is more important than performing duties properly. It gives the appearance that certain people are the only ones qualified to serve on the high-paying boards. Then there are those other mundane boards that really need people to work for no pay, and who is appointed? Does this mean that some people's time is worth lots of money while other people's time isn't worth anything at all?

If you agree, please remember what is happening. Many people complain about what is happening but they are afraid to say anything in public. Sounds more and more like Hitler's regime doesn't it? Want to live this way?

Citizens deserve better treatment than learning about things after they happen. Citizens deserve better treatment than being afraid to say anything for fear of retaliation. And citizens deserve to be treated fairly, and that might mean appointing someone else to a high paying board position.

SANTA FE INSIDE THE CAPITAL

SANTA FE -- Is New Mexico really first in everything bad and last in everything good? It's a refrain that will be heard from politicians of both parties for the next six months.

How true is it? How does New Mexico really fit into the national pattern of commitment relative to our population, size and wealth?

"Governing," a monthly magazine published by Congressional Quarterly, Inc., covering state and local government, recently issued a "Sourcebook," containing what it claims to be the most complete ranking of state and local government spending. Most of it is Census Bureau data, but since anything from the government lags the real world by several years, the data is supplemented from other sources with more current information.

The charts confirm much of what we already know. New Mexico's economy is bad -- 48th in per capita personal income. Unemployment is fifth in the nation. But there is hope. Something called the Index of State Economic Momentum, measures the most recent one-year change in employment, personal income and population.

New Mexico ranks 10th on his index, up from 25th three years ago. That gain of 15 spots in the rankings was the sixth highest gain in the nation and shows we have the Big Mo going for us. Arizona had it last year, but dropped from first to 18th this year because of its negative job growth.

In education, New Mexico ranks second in higher education and fifth in public school education spending as a percent of personal income, figures Gov. Gary Johnson often cites to show New Mexico is spending plenty on education. Part of the reason for our state's high ranking in K-12 spending is because so much of our population is school age. We rank 11th in the percent of school age population per capita. That figure used to be even higher; so there must be good news in a declining birth rate. Utah has been a perennial first in this category.

Surprisingly, New Mexico ranks first in the percentage of the state's

population enrolled in higher education. This may have something to do with the large number of community and junior colleges New Mexico has for its small population.

Despite its apparently high spending on education, NM ranks 34th in public school spending per pupil and 46th in teacher salaries. Many reasons are given by school administrators for why New Mexico can't do better on salaries when its spending level is 12 notches higher. The most common explanation is our state's small schools and wide open spaces.

But other Western states with similar characteristics do better. Arizona is 48th in per-pupil spending but 38th in salaries. Colorado is 45th in spending and 20th in salaries. Nevada is 44th in spending and 22nd in salaries and Utah is 50th in per-pupil spending but 35th in teacher salaries.

Another chart shows New Mexico ranks 37th in salaries for all state and local employees combined. It seems clear that New Mexico's school system is missing the boat somehow in getting its money into classrooms.

Here's the biggest surprise. New Mexico ranks third in the nation in state and government revenue as a percent of personal income. That's due to several factors. We're eight highest in federal aid. We have a high and broad sales tax, much of which is paid by out-of-staters. And the biggest reason is that New Mexico has a large amount of state land from which it receives significant rents, royalties and taxes. Those are put into two multi-billion dollar permanent funds which earn a very large investment income.

Consistent with our governor's interest in building prisons and highways, we rank fourth in corrections spending and third in highway spending. We also rank fourth in parks and recreation spending, probably because of our Legislature's love of funding pork barrel projects.

And as we've heard so often, we're first in the percent of residents without health insurance.




"I am honored to have been selected to participate in these important higher education endeavors. I look forward to bringing the message of higher education in New Mexico to my colleagues in other states," Campos said.

be .5 acre feet of water per year per lot to provide for any future lot splitting. The argument during the hearings was if the water allotment was at .5 acre feet then people who buy those lots will use that entire amount. While if it was only .25 acre feet then residents would ultimately use less water and thus be a conservation model.

In April the county commissioners came to agreement about several proposed changes to the county subdivision ordinance, including the .25 acre foot requirement. As required by state law, before the proposed changes could be adopted into the ordinance, the county had to send the proposed changes to seven state agencies for review and

recommendations.

Only the State Engineer's Office responded with recommendation that the county's proposed amendments to the county subdivision rules require developers to show at least .35 acre feet of water a year per lot availability for 100 years not just 40, plus some new very stringent language about water reports the state engineer would like all the counties to adopt.

"We need further consideration on the state engineer's and the planning commission's suggested higher numbers (for water requirement)," County commission chair Rex Wilson said after his vote at the June 7 meeting. "So I think it warrants to make the requirement at .5 acre feet a year."

In the comments from the State Engineer's Office, staff Brian Wilson wrote, ".25 acre feet per lot per year may be adequate for the high mountain areas in Lincoln County where water requirements for evaporative cooling and landscape irrigation are very low, however at lower elevations like Carrizozo, water requirement would be higher." Wilson then went on to figure that .31 acre feet per year would be needed in a normal weather year for a family of three in a 1,700 square foot house with evaporative cooling and 800 square feet of irrigated Bermuda grass, a family of four would use .38 and family of five would use .45 acre foot. "In a drought year landscape requirements would be higher," Wilson continued. "Thus we would suggest a minimum water requirement of .35 acre feet per lot per year and the total irrigated area per lot be restricted to 800 square feet."

County attorney Alan Morel said during the public hearing on the proposed changes to the county subdivision rules that the State Engineer's Office would like all the counties to adopt their proposed water availability assessments rules that would require extensive geohydrology reports and proof of water availability for 100 years. Currently water reports must show water will be available for 40 years.

Attorney John Underwood, representing developers, said the water requirement was the "most discussed number" of all the hearings on the proposed subdivision ordi-

nance changes. He said as the ordinance is written, the county commission can make a determination based on a water analysis. "The .25 acre feet is just a guideline," Underwood said. "The county commission has the power to say how many acre feet based on the (proposed subdivision) water study."

"The county commission had ultimate authority on approving all subdivisions," Underwood added.

The water availability report is required for developments with community water systems only. All other types of subdivisions are allowed domestic wells which at this time are allowed to draw up to three acre feet a year per well. Morel said the State Engineer's Office wants the counties to restrict wells, but Morel thought that recommendation will lead to lawsuits and would be very hard to enforce.

County commissioner Leo Martinez suggested a "Blue Ribbon Committee" to study the water availability issue by bringing experts.

County commission chairman Wilson tended to the higher requirements, because of the future potential for lots to be split.

Morel said already the county ordinance prohibits lot splitting for seven years after the subdivision is approved.

Martinez suggested the prohibition should be 10 years.

Underwood said the county commission has authority to not approve lot splits.

When asked by Schwettmann why the

county needs to set a water availability number, Morel said the state statutes require it.


County commissioner Rick Simpson said just because someone has water rights does not prove there is "wet water."

Underwood said state statutes require proof of "wet water" to back up the water rights.

After some comments from Larry Mulligan, assistant Glencoe Palo Verde Fire Department chief, about the need for higher water requirements because of fire protection, county commissioners closed the hearing and voted to adopt the new changes to the county subdivision ordinance.

Tahoe, NV, in conjunction with the Council of State Governments - West's conference.

Moeller commented about "wrangling" between departments and the concerns of the state fire marshal that the county commission had not approved the purchase request. "They need the truck," Martinez agreed. "We are in a severe fire situation. And these are volunteers who are trying to be frugal about their money."

With little more discussion, Martinez made the motion to change the wording from new to used in the authorization for Glenora Palo Verde Fire Dept. to spend state fire funds earmarked for purchase of a water tender truck. All commissioners unanimously approved the change.

Commissioners also approved a resolution that makes the county commission a participant, not a stakeholder as now listed, in all state and federal policy processes. The resolution was presented by the New Mexico Association of Counties of which Lincoln County is a member.

In an ongoing issue involving the unbuilt east end of Moore Ave. in the Ngal townsite, county commissioners authorized a meeting to be held at the location where property owners wanted to extend the old unbuilt street across the Ngal Creek bed for access to properties east of the creek. Susan and Robert Moeller had requested the county vacate the end of the old street because they had constructed a swimming pool that was within the street's platted right of way.

County commissioners had denied their request because of protests from the adjacent property owners that vacating would cut off their access.

**Quick Response Keeps Alto
Fire To Three Acres**

Quick response by local fire crews kept a grass fire started by a private property owner welding a pipe fence along Airport Road on Tuesday morning from spreading beyond three acres.

According to Eddie Tudor with New Mexico State Forestry office, the fire was reported at 10:08 a.m. Tuesday, to the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office dispatch in Carrizozo. Bonito Fire Department responded to the fire which was about a half mile west of the new Ranches of Sonterra station. Engines and crews from New Mexico State Forestry, US Forest Service, BIA Mesalero, Capitan Fire Department, and the two Single Engine Attack Tankers (SEATs) stationed at Sierra Blanca Regional Airport also responded. The SEATs dropped six loads of fire retardant on the fire, Tudor said.

Tudor said deputy Robert Shepherd from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office investigated the fire and the investigation is still pending.

Tudor said the fire burned mostly grass and into pines and juniper and some Ponderosa pines on the north side of State Road 220 across the street from an RV park and a landscaping and greenhouse business.

Although crews kept the fire to three acres, winds spread embers causing several very small fires on the south side of State Road 220 that were near structures.

Tudor said the fire was considered contained by noon and controlled by 8 p.m. on Tuesday.

Now seeking access through the old street, property owners wanted to know if they needed a permit to do the creek crossing.

County attorney Alan Morel said any road and creek crossing needs to be built to county standards, even if the street and crossing were to be private.

Martinez said it was interesting to see these growing pains which he said the county has ignored. While not wanting to impede private property rights, Martinez said in this instance county standards should prevail on the egress to the properties. "Eventually it (the street and crossing) will come to us," Martinez said. "When they cut up and sell the land and the new ones come to the county to help, it's not fair to tax payers for the county to fix a mess of what should have been done right the first time," Martinez added.

Robert Moeller said the project was misguided by absentee land owners and he wanted them to find an alternative path.

There had been a question as to whether a county permit for a road cut was needed to do the low water crossing. Morel said he had met with two different attorneys about the issue and they concluded the county road ordinance had nothing to do with the issue. He said the main question was whether the county would improve these old streets.

Property owners Archie Witham and Jim Crouse said the problem is the Moellers built their swimming pool in the road and the Moellers would not allow anyone access on the old road

right of way. "Get the Moeller's off people's back," Crouse added. Moeller said the neighbors have access to their properties across the creek on other old and unbuilt streets. He also said his survey for his property showed Moore Ave. vacated by the county, which they later found out was not true.

Finally after more discussion, Morel said the county could not give up the public property right of way. Morel then asked for a meeting at the location, and he also asked for

a deputy escort. "If the public agree the county needs to vacate the old right of way, we can sit down and discuss it," Morel said. "But I think we can fix this issue."

County manager Tom Stewart said he contacted the Army Corps of Engineers which advised the county should request an appropriate low water crossing for the old street access.

County commissioners also tabled appointments to the county planning commission to fill vacancies created by the resignations of Van Patton and James Sanchez. Citizen Jerry Carroll suggested the county advertise for a pool of interested volunteers willing to serve on the county committees and boards.

County commissioners also delayed action on appointments to the Ag and Rural Affairs Committee and the Public Lands Use Advisory Council (PLUAC) until the two groups discuss and reach agreement on possibly combining the two.

County commissioners also: -Approved a resolution adjusting the 2001-2002 fiscal year budget to account for the income generated and the transactions involved with the county's refinancing of the detention center bonds. The resolution
