

# C'zozo Sewer Rates to Almost Double in Cost

Town of Carrizozo has applied for a \$1.4 million low interest loan from the federal Rural Utilities Service (RUS) to upgrade the town sewer plant which has been out of compliance for several years. To pay for this loan, town water/sewer rates for residential customers could increase \$8.75 a month or more.

Carrizozo town clerk Leann Weibrecht held a public hearing on Monday, August 12, at the town hall offices in Carrizozo Rec Center. There were no elected officials at the public hearing. The hearing was part of the requirement for the RUS loan.

Three residents, town water treatment technician Cathie Eisen, and THE NEWS attended the

hearing.

The town has received \$534,000 from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Colonias program for the sewer plant. And the town plans to apply for another colonias CDBG for an additional \$400,000 which will be added to the \$1.4 million RUS loan in order to complete the project at one time.

Engineering design for

the \$2.4 million project has been done for which the town has paid \$128,000. Engineering Inc. is the company that designed the proposed project that will involve construction of four lagoons, bar screen, chlorination chambers, operations building at the site, disinfection, septage receiving station and effluent piping for discharge, Eisen said.


The engineering esti-

mates for the project is \$2,038,300 for actual work, \$127,926 for engineering, \$127,926 for construction inspection and \$130,000 for gross receipt taxes at 6.375 percent for a total of

\$2,427,094. Weibrecht said.

The existing sewer plant, located west of town south of Highway 380 was built in 1957. The plant has never had a discharge

## Construction Begins On Hwy. 70 Project

Transportation Secretary Pete Rahn announced that Sierra Blanca Constructors were given notice to proceed on August 1. Construction and widening of the 38 mile segment of US 70 from Ruidoso Downs to Riverside will continue in the coming weeks. This segment of US 70 is one of New Mexico's most dangerous highways, with accidents claiming more than 21 lives in the past two years.

Sierra Blanca Constructors were selected as the contractor for the state's first ever highway design-build contract. The design-build method has been used in many of the largest and most complicated highway construction projects in the country. This method has been heralded by the construction industry as a modern approach that encourages innovation, allows shorter construction time, and promises environmental stewardship.

"Since receiving the notice to proceed, Sierra Blanca Constructors have begun mobilizing equipment and personnel," said Rahn. "Hondo Valley residents should be seeing quite a bit of activity in the area."

Project offices will be located near milepost 286.7 at the Gutierrez Ranch property in Hondo. Temporary offices will be in

place while the project offices are being constructed, with surveying and exploration drilling already underway in the project area. Initial construction activities, including installation of right of way fencing, will begin at the eastern end of the project (Hondo to Riverside) starting in late August.

The public is invited to meet members of New Mexico State Highway and Transportation Dept. (NMSHTD) and the Sierra Blanca Constructors team at a reception at Hondo

Valley School Friday, Sept. 6 from 6:30 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. An open house and archaeological site tour will be held Saturday, Sept. 7 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at Hondo Valley School. Information on project schedule, project timelines, construction schedules and public involvement activities will be provided at the open house.

"We are looking forward to working with the people who live in the Hondo Valley on this project," said

## Ruidoso May Purchase Mid Town Property

Ruidoso Village Council at its meeting Tuesday, August 13, took no action after a closed session held to discuss purchase, acquisition, and/or disposal of real property and/or water rights, once again leaving the offer for the village to buy property in the mid town area unanswered.

Although discussions in closed session are not usually revealed to the public, it was common knowledge at the meeting the closed session discussion was to be about the village buying a piece of property in the mid town area. At the start of the meeting during the public input portion of the agenda, resident Michelle O'Brien asked if she could

comment on what would be discussed in closed session--the land purchase.

O'Brien said she favored the purchase and she encouraged the council to educate the public that gross receipt taxes from that two mile section (mid town business district) go to support the police department, streets, water and schools.

"I encourage you to teach the public to understand that rather than raise property taxes, we should invest in our downtown district so we can have more gross receipt taxes," O'Brien said.

Resident Dick Goings had different thoughts. "I am against the village

## Valley of Fires Reopens Again

The Valley of Fires Recreation Area, operated by the U.S. Bureau of Land Management (BLM), has reopened after completion of repaving projects, according to Tim Kreager, assistant manager of the Roswell BLM office.

The recreation area has been closed since June 18 while repaving was com-


pleted on about a mile of road and on parking and campsites areas. WWWW Construction of Ruidoso completed the approximately \$280,000 repaving project.

The recreation area is about four miles west of Carrizozo off U.S. Highway 380. The area includes a group tent camping area, one group picnic shelter, 22 campsites suitable for recreation vehicles and 10 tent camping sites.

Valley of Fires is adjacent to the Malpais Lava Flow, which is between 1,500 and 2,000 years old. The youngest such flow in the continental United States, it is between 4 and 6 miles wide and is 160 feet deep at its thickest point.

In addition to the Valley of Fires Recreation Area, the BLM Roswell office also maintains the Haystack Mountain Off-Highway Vehicle Area 45 miles east of Roswell on U.S. Highway 380.

permit from the state and is currently out of compliance. Eisen said the state is aware of the town's efforts to upgrade the plant.

In order to pay for the \$1.4 million loan, it will cost Carrizozo about \$22,000 to \$24,000 a year in debt payment. To make that payment the town is proposing to increase water/sewer rates. Currently residents each month pay \$10.25 for the first 3,000 gallons of water used and \$2.25 per 1,000 additional gallons used. Currently residents pay a flat sewer rate of \$6.75 a month.

Weihbrecht said the town is proposing to in-

crease water rates to \$14.75 for up to 4,000 gallons of water used a month, with \$2.25 per 1,000 additional gallons used. The sewer rate will increase to \$11 a month. The total monthly water/sewer rate for residential customers will increase to \$25.75 a month, but water minimum use will also be increased by 1,000 gallons, Weihbrecht explained.

Weihbrecht said the town has not had a sewer rate increase for a long time. "I know this will be a jump for the sewer rates," Weihbrecht

Residents Barbara Ward

and Pat Voss said the town had no choice but to go for the loan. "We want the loan," Ward said.

"We don't have a choice," Weihbrecht said. "We have to do this, we are out of compliance. And we need a discharge permit."

Eisen said the town never had a discharge permit for the sewer plant.

The other resident at the public hearing, which Weihbrecht said had to be held in order to satisfy the rules of the RUS loan, made no comment about the proposed rate increases or the loan, but later told *THE NEWS* she was unsure about the rate increases.

Weihbrecht said the RUS loan application for the sewer plant had already been submitted. The next step in the project is for the town trustees to call for public hearings on a new town ordinance to increase water and sewer rates.

buying any property," Goings said. He referred to a village council discussion in May about the village having a tough time meeting the financial needs for forest health, water and other critical needs. "Is that property more critical

than water?" Goings asked the council.

Goings said the village should only tax those downtown businesses who would benefit from the land purchase.

Councilor Deborah Marcum Byars said the village's basic services are funded by gross receipt taxes. "Many municipalities provide their infrastructure needs through property taxes," she said. "But our property taxes would only pay for the police department."

"We rely on our gross receipt taxes," Byars continued. "Because of that we must protect our sources of revenues. If too many downtown businesses are neglected, they will move out of the village. That is why I am in favor of the property purchase."

Councilors then discussed where they would get the money to purchase the acreage that was offered to the village for about \$750,000.

Byars said the village can take funds from the existing economic development gross receipt tax revenues, which are used for the airport and water system improvements.

Mayor Leon Eggleston said the water system improvements are from a specific gross receipt tax the voters approved.

Councilor Ray Nunley said everyone would benefit from increased gross receipt taxes. "With more sales we get more gross receipt taxes," Nunley added. As for the water situation Nunley told Goings that the village is doing "pretty good" with water and will be better in the upcoming months.

After Goings said the residents should not be required to pay more taxes for any land purchases, Eggleston said the village can rededicate gross receipt taxes already in place.

"This would not be an increase in property taxes," Eggleston said.

Goings then asked if the village talked to the home owners adjacent to the property offered for sale to see how they feel about the proposal.

Both Eggleston and Byars said they had people talk to them, but did not say they talked with the property owners.

"Can we assure that in one year from now we won't raise property taxes?" said councilor Bob

Sterchi. "I can't say that because forest health will become very expensive."

Goings said a lot of older people in Ruidoso can't afford any raise in property taxes.

Village assistant attorney Charles Rennick said that three of the four sides of the property in question are owned commercially.

When asked if there will be any public meetings about the property purchase, Eggleston said there will be no specific public meetings for the purchase, beyond discussions by the council.

Rennick said the property offer was discussed by the council at its July 30 meeting.

At the July 30 meeting councilors discussed how the property could provide additional downtown parking, could provide a green space park area for special outdoor events such as the chili cook-off, and could provide a buffer between the residential zones and the commercial zone along Sudderth

## Judge Okays Petition to Change Polling Places

Lincoln County Clerk Tammie Maddox on August 8 filed a petition with the District Court for a court order to change the polling places for Precincts 6, 7A, 7B, 8A, 8B and 9 back to the Ruidoso Convention Center. District Judge Karen L. Parsons signed the petition the same day, making the change official.

For several years these precinct polls had been in the convention center. But last year former Ruidoso mayor Robert Donaldson advised then county clerk Martha Proctor that there was a conflict with using the convention center and the polls had to be moved elsewhere for the June 2002 primary election.

In March, fulfilling one of his campaign promises, newly elected mayor Leon Eggleston made sure the convention center was available for the November 5 general election. Since the election procla-

mation listed the polling places for the precincts in various other locations, the county clerk had to request the Lincoln County Commission to approve a resolution that would re-designate the convention center as polling place.

On July 18, Lincoln County Commissioners adopted Resolution 2002-5 that redesignated the polling places. With the resolution most polling places remain the same as in the June primary, except for the polling place for Precincts 6-9 which are now back in the convention center, located at 111 Sierra Blanca Drive in Ruidoso.

Copies of the petition filed with the court were sent to chairs of the political parties in the county.

Anne Ferguson, a cow-calf operator from Carrizozo, served as a USDA appointed member of the Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board (CBB) during the Cattle Industry Summer Conference June 18-20 in Reno, NV. In light of ongoing market challenges, the budget for fiscal 2003, which begins Oct. 1, 2002 focuses on continuing to build demand for beef.

Board members approved the \$48 million checkoff budget to address market challenges and heard the results of the June 2002 producer attitude survey, which were released during the summer meeting. The research indicates that 68 percent of beef producers support the beef checkoff program and 91 percent of producers responding said it was important to them to know how their check-off dollars are being invested and what the results of those investments are.

**Meeting tonight**

The Carrizozo Town Council meets this evening at 8:00 p.m. at the Rec Center and one agenda item is discussion and approval to go out for RFP's for a waste disposal service. During the last regular Carrizozo town council meeting, July 9, when LCSWA was discussed, trustees determined the town needed answers and asked that the operating manager of LCSWA be asked to attend the next regular town council meeting, which is the meeting to be held this evening, to provide information. The agenda for tonight does not list LCSWA at all. Why is the decision made last month by trustees being ignored this month?

Residents of Carrizozo have a right to know why the town council is aborting previous decisions without any kind of explanation. Residents of Carrizozo have a right to know why the information that was discussed and discussed last month is not necessary this month before discussion and approval to go out for RFP's for a waste disposal service. Residents of Carrizozo have a right to know why the town council is avoiding getting accurate information about LCSWA this month as was determined last month.

And if the officials want to make a decision that will be in the best interest of the residents, it seems the first thing they should do is get accurate information about LCSWA. The town did on July 12 send a letter requesting the LCSWA operational manager to attend the next regular town council meeting, which at that time was scheduled to be held August 13. Even though the meeting date was changed to August 15, it seems the agenda should include a discussion about LCSWA, not "discussion and approval to go out for RFP's for a waste disposal service." There may be a reason for not wanting the public to be informed about LCSWA and we wonder what that reason could be.

Sometimes officials assume that people don't care or that people won't remember, but many people commented about LCSWA after the last town council meeting and they want answers to some of the questions that were asked July 9. And people in other places have similar situations that they care about. Capitan village hall was packed with people for the village trustees meeting Tuesday and many of those people had definite opinions about certain issues. Thank goodness the mayor of Capitan allowed people to speak during the meeting and to ask several questions.

Hearing what the public has to say is important. And it is the public that is supposed to be served, not private whims and fancies. And the public should be allowed to ask questions and expect to receive answers. Government of the people and by the people is supposed to be reality, not make believe. Representation is supposed to mean that you have an official representing you, not undermining you. And you should be guaranteed that your rights will not be violated by the very people you helped elect to protect your rights. Wouldn't it be nice if all elected officials would honor their oaths of office and do everything in their power to do what is best? Unfortunately not all officials care and some prefer a dictator type government where decisions are made in private and only announced later, if at all.

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**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** -- Po'Pay is finally on his way to becoming a statue that will be displayed in the U.S. Capitol beside other famous persons from all 50 states.

Jemez Pueblo sculptor Cliff Fragua hosted a "marble breaking" ceremony at his studio recently, accompanied by Gov. Gary Johnson and members of the state's Statuary Hall Commission.

After \$60,000 of fundraising, the commission was able to purchase a seven-foot tall block of marble, which Fragua will turn into a statue of the Pueblo activist who organized the 1680 revolt that sent Spanish colonists down the river to El Paso to spend 12 years thinking about how they might be nicer to the natives the next time around.

From all reports, it was an impressive ceremony. Gov. Johnson called Po'Pay the leader of the first American revolution. According to one newspaper account, Johnson's voice broke and his eyes filled with tears when he spoke of the pueblos' pride in having a statue of one of their own in such famous company.

But it isn't without controversy. Johnson's emotions can be contrasted with those of Republican Sen. Rod Adair of Roswell. In the 1977 Legislature, Adair tried to block the designation of Po'Pay as New Mexico's second representative in Statuary Hall, not because he was Indian, but because he led an uprising that killed hundreds of Spanish colonists.

Adair was successful that year only in getting the spelling of Po'Pay's name changed to the Spanish version, "Pope." (I use the Indian spelling because tildes get lost in cyberspace between me and my newspapers.) Besides, the Indian spelling seems more appropriate and I hope it is changed back before the statue journeys to Washington.

While the commission struggled for several years to raise money, because Johnson had vetoed its appropriation, Adair picked up the support of Hispanic historians in his attempt to head off Po'Pay's recognition. Bills were

introduced in subsequent legislatures to undo the action but none passed.

The Spanish version of the Pueblo Revolt is the one that survived because the Spanish eventually prevailed and victors get to write history. The lack of a written language also hampered the Indian cause. But the recent unveiling of the stone gave Fragua and other proponents an opportunity to tell the Indian side of the story.

Fragus says that the Pueblo stories passed down by elders, Po'Pay was driven by concern for humanity, not by hatred. It was the Pueblo belief that the entire world would be doomed if Spaniards continued to suppress pueblo songs and ceremonies that kept the rains coming and the world spinning.

Fragua's rendition of Po'Pay depicts him as a simple man, concerned for the survival of his family, culture, history and beliefs. His actions against the Spaniards were not acts of defiance, but of survival. Sure to cause additional controversy are scars on Po'Pay's back that remain from the shipping he received for his participation and faith in Pueblo ceremonies and religion.

Gov. Johnson told the crowd outside Fragua's workshop on the pueblo that the sculpture will represent many first. Fragua will be the first Indian to create a piece for Statuary Hall and his statue will depict the oldest figure chronologically in the exhibit. The first claim is likely true, but several states have chosen early explorers, dating back to the mid-1600s that would seem to predate Po'Pay.

We may not have seen the end of controversy about the choice of Po'Pay. Some of New Mexico's Spanish colonial scholars believe he may not have been Indian. Others say he never existed. But the main problem with his selection seems to be that he killed people.

Sensitivities currently run high on that issue. The pueblos objected to honoring Oñate during New Mexico's recent 400th anniversary because of his cruelty.



We will never forget the kindness shown by wonderful people. My husband is the City Planner in Roswell and he wants you all to know that he has never seen such compassion from a community. May God bless each and everyone of you -- one-hundred fold.




