

Hospital Suggests RFPs for All Clinics, Including Capitan

Lincoln County should enter into an agreement with the Rose Clinic in Capitan, then make request for proposals for operation of the Carrizozo, Corona, Hondo and Capitan clinics.

Such was the recommendation made by Lincoln County Medical Center (LCMC) administrator

Jim Gibson to the Lincoln County Commissioners at their August 15 meeting held in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. Gibson said he polled the LCMC board members about the Rose Clinic's request to be covered by the county. "Their recommendation is the county enter into an agreement with Rose Clinic," Gibson said. "Then

put all four county clinics out for rfp as a group."

Gibson said one mill of property tax "ought to be an acceptable financial arrangement" for the clinics.

"You do need to do an rfp for the existing clinics," Gibson added. "If you choose to do this, we (Presbyterian Healthcare Services which manages LCMC and Carrizozo/Corona Clinics) will

respond to the rfp."


As for the Rose Clinic, Gibson said there is "evidence there is need for a clinic in Capitan." He said patients with Medicaid, Medicare and self pay are not usually well served by private enterprise. "That was how it was like for many years in Carrizozo," Gibson said. "The Carrizozo clinic did not do well until it had

stable providers. Having the county involved lends stability to the operation."

Rose Clinic owners Kathleen and Cliff Smith approached the county

commission in July requesting the county to bring take over management of their clinic, even offering the clinic for sale. They said then, as well as



Carrizozo Partly Owns LCSWA Says Martinez

Carrizozo Awarded \$1.6 Million RUS Sewer Grant/Loan

The USDA Rural Utilities Service (RUS) has awarded the Town of Carrizozo a \$1.6 million grant/loan for improvements to the town wastewater plant.

Of the \$1.6 million total, \$1,229,400 is a grant which requires no payback or matching funds, said Carrizozo town clerk Leeann Wehbrecht. The \$409,850 is a loan, based on bonds, which will have 4.5 percent interest rate. Wehbrecht said because the loan portion is based on bonds, the town will have to go through a bond counsel. The project is not expected to start until next year, she added.

Carrizozo received a state appropriation for the project and will be submitting an application for a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) for additional money for the waste water project. The town will soon hold hearings on ordinances to raise sewer and water rates in order to pay for the loan.

"I wanted to get up and say to Carrizozo and Capitan 'you own this,'" said Leo Martinez, county commissioner and county representative to Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority, (LCSWA) at the LCSWA meeting August 20.

Martinez was referring to the Carrizozo Town Council meeting August 15 where the mayor wanted to go to rfp for trash services, but got no motion to support that. Instead Carrizozo trustees asked for more information and wanted a public

hearing on the issue.

"I don't know how you could dump something you're a part of," Martinez said of LCSWA. "There are a lot of personality things."

Martinez said he thought it appeared that the Carrizozo LCSWA representative was not going back to his board and saying what was going on. "The point did not get across that they should not just leave, they are part owners," Martinez added.

"To leave just because you like or dislike some-

Carrizozo School Increases Substitute Teachers Salaries

Carrizozo Board of Education during the school board meeting August 20 approved increase in substitute teacher pay and held the first reading of a proposed policy change that would do away with the tape recording of all open meetings

During the school board meeting school superintendent Sergio Castanon recommended and the school board approved a change of board policy giving substitute teachers a \$5 a day raise, with non-certified subs going from \$38 to \$41 a day and certified subs going from \$41 to \$46.

Substitute teacher Julie Carter thanked the board for the raise, which she said she had requested. School board president Steve Harkey said the pay raise was important for the school to get the best substitutes. "Or lose them to other schools," Castanon said.

The school board also held the first reading of a proposed policy change to eliminate tape recordings of meeting. Current policy requires the meetings to be tape recorded, the tape saved until the minutes are adopted by the school board, then the tapes are erased. Castanon said the school board has discussed not taping the meetings, since the min-

utes are taken and the secretary compiles them for approval by the board.

THE NEWS asked if there have been problems with the taping Harkey said at times there are problems. "It's best to attend the meetings to get everything first hand," Harkey said.

Area Youth Crowned National High School Rodeo Champion

Shayla Smith of Nogal was recently crowned National High School Rodeo Association (NHSRA) National Champion Girl's Cutter for 2002. To earn this honor, Smith earned the most points in the girl's cutting at the 54th annual National High School Finals Rodeo held in Farmington.

Smith's cutting horse, Dual Nurse, a nine year old AQHA mare, won the Reserve Horse of the Year award sponsored by AQHA.

For being named the NHSRA National Champion Girl's Cutter, Smith was awarded numerous prizes, including college scholarships, a Circle Y trophy saddle, Wrangler apparel, a hand engraved Gist buckle, an NCHA official cutting trophy, Ariat boots and many other awards.

Castanon said most schools are getting away from taping meetings and going to just the written minutes. "This is nothing drastic, but it is something the board needs to handle," Castanon said.

School board member Lisa Shivers said the district is looking to have to cut costs. Business manager Linda Brown said she has had to make several copies of meeting tapes over the years and while the people requesting tapes pay for them, the amount does not cover her time in making copies.

Castanon said he would be glad to meet with THE NEWS after the meeting about reports to the board and action taken. An audience member asked if the people in the audience can tape the meetings with their own recorder. Harkey said there was no problem with that.

The second reading and possible adoption of the proposed policy change to eliminate the tape recordings of the board meetings will be held during the

at the August 15 meeting, that their clinic served many of the self-pay and Medicare/Medicaid patients in Capitan.

At the August 15 county commission meeting, county manager Tom


Stewart said he had assumed the Smiths wanted the county to acquire the Rose Clinic. But subsequently in meeting with Cliff Smith, he found this to be in error, because the Smith's main focus is to

take care of the citizens of Capitan as opposed to concerns for the clinic.

Cliff Smith, present at the county commission meeting, said the clinic is owned by he and his wife Kathleen. He said their goal was affordable health care with focus on the uninsured who are 71 percent of the clinic patients. "Capitan has an abundance of uninsured who are not indigent but are hard working people just left out of the system," Smith said.

"Why should the county compete with private enterprise?" asked county commissioner Leo Martinez.

Kathleen Smith said she agreed about private enterprise, but wanted to know why the county provides assistance to clinics in every other community, except Capitan. "Capitan is

the second largest community in the county," Smith said. She said they did not want to sell the clinic, and they were not struggling financially. "We just think the people of Capitan need to be offered care because there is a tremendous amount of working uninsured."

Martinez said he "cherishes private enterprise. When government does it, you get short changed."

Martinez then said he thought the county Indigent Health Care Fund (IHCF), which is building from gross receipt revenues, would take care of the clinics and providers who are not under PHS. "Why doesn't the Indigent Fund take care of Dr. Ray Seidel's medical office in Capitan, the Rose Clinic, Dr. Nishitani (immediate care clinic in Ruidoso)?"

Stewart said by state law, the Indigent Care funds cannot be used for "preventative or non-life threatening" care. Stewart said the problem is most care given by Rose Clinic would be considered preventative. "We need changes to the state law for the Indigent Care funds," Stewart said. He also suggested the clinic do a sliding scale to be eligible for RIFKA funds.

Gibson said only non-profits are eligible for the federal RIFKA money, however Rose Clinic could get the RIFKA money if it contracted with PHS which is nonprofit.

Cliff Smith said they have considered going nonprofit, but RIFKA process is very complicated.

County commission chairman Rex Wilson said the Rose Clinic could not for three years qualify for mill levy money because the wording on the mill levy election ballot specifies property tax money would go for the Carrizozo,

Corona and Hondo clinics. "In three years we could go to the voters and change the (language) on the mill levy," Wilson added.

County commissioner Ray Nunley said he wanted to clarify how many uninsured there are in Capitan. "I don't think there are hundreds not being treated because they're too poor," Nunley said. "I assure you the clinics are taking care of a big part of the people who can't afford health care."

"It's not real truthful they are receiving no care," Nunley added. (Nunley is a pharmacist.) "As there is the emergency room at the hospital, a situation less than desirable."

Gibson said emergency room (ER) care is the most expensive health care. "It is better to get primary, preventive care at the clinics than having to go to the ER," Gibson said.

Martinez said he thought the county was getting in too deep with another clinic, and the taxpayers out too much. "Yes it is more expensive in the emergency room, but that is where they get free help," he added.

Encouraging the county to help the private enterprise, Martinez said the county subsidized clinics are not making money, but the nonprofit LCMC was making a \$1.2 million profit a year.

Dr. Nishitani and his wife Marilyn, who operate a private owned primary care office in Ruidoso, said they take care of a lot of people who cannot pay. "We eat it," Nishitani said about their charity care. "We are based on the capitalistic system—if we make no money we close."

Nishitani said Seidel's office in Capitan is very busy and successful and the county should give him support. He com-

plained that every time he came to Carrizozo the clinic parking lot was empty of patient cars, and filled with staff cars, and now the Carrizozo clinic was asking for more money for more dental equipment for an office where new patients are put on a long waiting list. "My vote says support successful clinics instead of another cost," Nishitani added.

Nunley responded that many of the Carrizozo Clinic dental patients come from Tularosa. Nunley said Tularosa is looking for a dentist for its village health clinic.

Martinez said that "ticked me off" because the Carrizozo clinic should take care of Lincoln County residents before taking Tularosa patients.

"They can't turn people away," Nunley said.

County resident Michelle Rebstock suggested for maximum patient care and cost, to move the Rose Clinic to Carrizozo because "people will travel there."

Wilson then asked Cliff Smith if their clinic was accepting insurance.

Smith said they had been approved by Blue Cross Blue Shield for a contract to be completed in September.

Nishitani said nurse practitioners are not covered by that insurance company.

Kathleen Smith is a nurse practitioner. Cliff Smith said they have been approved. "It was a little political but it was solved," Smith said.

Martinez then said the state law needs to be changed so the indigent health care funds, derived from gross receipt taxes, can go to clinics that provide preventative care.

County commissioners took no action about the clinic.

Don't labor on Labor Day

It takes very little time to prepare a safe area for a campfire and it takes very little time to make sure fires are completely out before leaving them. And what time it does take is worth it.

Letting others be safe while you are being unsafe is not only unwise, it is stupid. That makes about as much sense as letting others make decisions you should be making. Do you allow an acquaintance to decide which vehicle you should own? Probably not. Do you allow an acquaintance to decide where you should live? Probably not. Do you allow an acquaintance to decide what clothes you should wear today? Probably not. But too many people let others make decisions they should be making about their lives.

If you aren't willing to ask questions of elected officials and demand answers, that is the same as allowing them to make decisions that will affect your life without your input. If you don't care what happens, why should anyone else care? And if you don't care, you deserve what you get. If your basic services are being threatened you should let the officials know what you think. If you don't tell them, who will tell them? It's a proven fact that some people won't take the time to build a safe campfire. Do you want that same person representing you when it comes to your life?

Decisions are those things you make when you decide whether to wear blue or white clothes. Decisions are those things you make when you decide whether you want to drive a car or pickup. Decisions are those things you make when you decide whether you should live in town or live in the country. Decisions are those things you should make that will improve your life, not be best for someone else. Decisions might be difficult at times, but you have a right to make decisions, and you have a right to be informed before making decisions that will affect your entire family.

Asking questions is usually the best way to get answers. If you don't get answers, ask why. If the powers that be won't answer questions it could be an indication there might be something not quite proper about the matter. And if the decision will affect your life, you have a right to know.

Yes, it is up to you to decide who will make important decisions. Let's hope the most important decision you make this weekend is to be safe while enjoying the holiday. If you travel, be safe. If you go camping, be safe. If you stay at home for a quiet three day weekend, be safe. And may each and everyone have a safe Labor Day holiday.

You decide, it's your life.

The school board also adopted the 2002-03

School Year Vision and Mission Statements and Board Goals that were developed during a recent school board retreat, and reviewed and approved by staff. The vision of Carrizozo Schools is to "provide a safe and respectful environment, which will support each student's journey toward academic excellence and life long learning."

The mission statement is "educating the leadership of tomorrow."

They are Cecilia Cieplenski, Steve Gore, Everett Greer Jr., Sharon Hefker, Pat Jiron, Barbara Roper, Bryan Wetzel, Hayden Smith, Marvin "Buddy" Hill, Melody Gaines, Shelley King and Lerry Bond.

Castanon also had good news that night. Just that day (Tuesday), the state building inspector had given the school district an excellent report and temporary approval to occupy the new elementary building. The inspector gave a list of about 20 items that needed to be remedied before the children could be in the building. Elementary students began class on Monday, August 26.


"The teachers are moving in as we speak," Castanon told the board Aug. 20. "The teachers are very excited!"

INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE -- Should it be illegal for political party officials to offer other parties money to enter candidates in elections? Can you guess which party thinks this is a good idea?

You're right. A resolution proposing the idea to the 2003 Legislature unanimously passed a state Democratic Party central committee meeting earlier this month. It was the latest salvo in the battle among the state's three leading political parties over who plays the dirtiest.

As far as Democrats are concerned, it's only illegal for "party officials" to do such things and only if it involves money. Nothing was said about a candidate offering influence, if elected governor. Perhaps the Republicans can propose with that one.

Actually both parties should cool it on the subject of eliminating each other's back room dealing. The practice has been around since long before Niccolo Machiavelli made a science of political manipulation 500 years ago. And no stupid little law is going to stop it.

That's the way the game is played. Winning politicians will always try to maneuver themselves into the most favorable position. A commentator recently referred to the practice as high schoolish, an indication the person was aware of it happening in student council and prom queen elections but hadn't yet caught wind of it among the big boys.

And maneuvering for an advantage is not confined to politics. It has long seemed un-American to criticize those engaged in free enterprise of being manipulative but the recent corporate scandals should make everyone aware of what goes on in board rooms.

Bill Gates' efforts to preserve a competitive advantage in the computer software business have been well publicized but he isn't the only one striving for a monopoly in a market niche. Everyone does it, including the public school community when it opposes vouchers.

State GOP Chairman John Dendahl's offer of a special interest group's money if the Green Party

would run candidates for Congress is no better or worse than Bill Richardson's purported offer of action if he is elected governor. And it must be said here that only one person says Richardson even implied such a thing. All others present in that "back room" say it didn't happen.

Money is just one tool for political manipulation. After Green Party officials turned down Dendahl's offer, Green Party co-chairman Xubi Wilson (the guy who thought he heard an implied offer from Richardson) followed up privately with Dendahl to see if the GOP could help secure nominating petition signatures if the Greens ran congressional candidates.

Ten thousand signatures can be more valuable than \$10,000 or even the \$100,000 Dendahl was offering. Those suckers are hard to get. Some candidates purchase them from political operatives who charge \$1 to \$2 apiece.

Certainly Dendahl wasn't the first person to offer money to get candidates on the ballot. Recently a prominent Republican couple in Washington State helped two Green candidates by organizing Green Party conventions to nominate the young men for the state Legislature and the King County Council.

Then they paid those candidates' filing fees, one of which amounted to almost \$1,000. They also turned out a number of Republicans for those conventions to be sure everything went as planned. Afterwards, Green Party officials complained their party had been hijacked. Democrat officials condemned back room deals.

Dendahl's attempt to get ringer candidates into a race certainly wasn't the first time that has happened in New Mexico. Incumbents who draw a challenger sometimes will talk others into filing in order to split the opposition. Candidates also will try to dilute their opposition by recruiting others who are the same sex or ethnicity as their opponent.

And then there's the old trick of recruiting someone with the same name as an opponent. The most prominent instance was when a Joe A. Montoya appeared on the ballot against Rep. Joe M. Montoya. That was the famous "Little Joe vs. Crazy Joe" election.



Lost in Las Vegas, NV in the MGM with only 5036 rooms. Where do you go, what do you do? Guess what I did? The plane trip, the connections, and all went so well, with the 105 temperature making for a warm welcome.

NM has bid on the National Convention for 2007 so we had a booth explaining all the things to do and see in New Mexico. I stayed there after church most of the day and then went to bed very tired about ten that night. Most of you who know me know I don't dress up and wearing low heels for 12 hours that day was a killer. Came away with much more faith in many things.

Monday was spent going to the general sessions and seminars. A sister to the Gatlin brothers LaDonna Gatlin was one of our speakers and what a presentation she presented. She sang every song from God Bless America to Amazing Grace and the 2500 postmasters wanted her to do more.

Training in the afternoon had me attending the Stamp Camp and Stamps for 2003. The "Louisiana Purchase" stamp, "The Year of the Ram", and a set of flags are some we will be issuing in 2003. The Stamp Camp was where I spent the remainder of my time in Las Vegas. A postmaster from Pennsylvania loves to teach about stamps like I do, so we began our class with 41 students from Las Vegas. LCSWA meeting as a citizen, said the issue she has as a Capitan trustee with LCSWA is not a question of personalities. "My concern is this (LCSWA) board sitting here in Ruidoso. Downs is setting rates for Capitan," Shearer said. "I feel the buck stops with the Village of Capitan Trustees. I want public hearings in Capitan and approval by the Capitan Board of Trustees before you raise any rates."

Martinez said he had the same thoughts before he was appointed to the LCSWA board and he fought the increase proposed for county trash collection. "It was proven to me by Rick Simpson (county commissioner and former LCSWA manager) the LCSWA board needed the power to raise rates because they were too low. He really had to convince me it was right," Martinez said.

"But in reality, LCSWA couldn't do it for the old rates," Martinez continued.

"That is where we come in as part owner," said Shearer about the Capitan board.

Whitaker recommended the LCSWA board not consider any more fees or rate changes until public hearings are held with each LCSWA member board, because of the atmosphere at the recent trustee meetings.

"Even though the people have asked for it, you have not given the Capitan board an opportunity to vote on rate increases," Shearer said. "I want the buck to stop in Capitan."

A Capitan resident asked why Capitan trustees think they know more about what is needed to operate LCSWA than the LCSWA board.

Martinez said that was his point. He also said some of the services to be offered through LCSWA, such as the forest debris removal are not needed in Capitan.

Shearer said 17 percent of the population in Capitan is retired and they

would be impacted by higher rates.

Martinez said he has objected to paying trash for rental properties also.

Whitaker said LCSWA has not gotten Capitan to pay a bill in the last few months.

Shearer said there was an excuse.

"Don't get ugly," Whitaker responded. "We had to make sure LCSWA was right."

Another Capitan resident said he had not heard the public raising heck about higher rates.

"I don't have a problem with the rates," Shearer said. "Only with the procedure. Capitan has been involved with quasi entities in the past and sometimes we have to keep these under control."

"How can you guys (Capitan trustees) know about the rates? You should have participated in the rate hearings," Martinez added.

"All we want is accountability and public hearings," Shearer said.

Another Capitan resident told Shearer to get the mayor to put a public hearing on the next meeting agenda.

Coleman said he tried to talk to Carrizozo LCSWA representative Angelo Vega but he never got a return phone call from Vega.

Finally Coleman closed the discussion and said it was time to move on.

In other business, the LCSWA board:

-Heard Martinez say he used to get an average of two calls a week about trash before Ingle was hired. He also made the last comment about the Carrizozo trustees meeting. "I did not like how (the mayor) personally attacked our attorney," Martinez said.

Whitaker said the Carrizozo LCSWA representative is never at the LCSWA meetings.

LCSWA will meet next at 2 p.m. Tuesday, September 24, a week later than usual because Coleman was unable to attend on September 17.
