

## Property Tax Bills Have Been Mailed

Trick or Treat! It's property tax time!

Lincoln County property owners will get their 2002 property tax bills this week.

Lincoln County Treasurer's Office staff mailed out 28,329 bills on Monday, October 28, said Lincoln County Treasurer Joan Park. "The 28,329 tax bills printed this year are an increase of 599 over last year's total of 27,730," Park told *THE NEWS*.

The 28,329 bills represent a total billing of \$13,315,398.81, also an increase from last year's \$13,209,647.10, Park continued.

Lincoln County is not the only beneficiary of the property tax revenues. The treasurer's office collects taxes and distributes the appropriate revenues for several other entities that receive property tax revenues.

Those other entities for which the county collects taxes are the State of New Mexico; Village of Ruidoso; City of Ruidoso Downs; Village of Capitan; Village of Corona; Town of Carrizozo; Chaves County Soil and Water Conservation District; Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation District; Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District; Lincoln County Medical

Center; rural health clinics in Carrizozo, Corona and Hondo; Ruidoso Municipal Schools; Capitan Municipal Schools; Carrizozo Municipal Schools; Hondo Valley Schools; Corona Schools; Eastern New Mexico University learning center at Ruidoso; Alpine Sanitation District; Sun Valley Sanitation District and Predator Control.

By state statutes, property taxes may be paid in two installments.

Property owners can pay the first half of their taxes, or make payment in full, by November 10. If no payment is made by December 10, the taxes will become delinquent and subject to a late charge.

The second half installment is due by April 10,

2003 and becomes delinquent after May 10, 2003. Delinquent tax bills will be subject to a late charge.

Coupons for paying by installments, or for full payment are included on the tax bill.

Taxes can be paid by mail, or in person at the treasurer's office in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. Questions regarding tax amounts or payments should be directed to the Lincoln County Treasurer's Office by calling 505-648-2397.

## County Unemployment Is Fifth Lowest In NM

Lincoln County has the fifth lowest unemployment rate in the state and a very low number of people on welfare. But one county commissioner thinks the welfare numbers are too high because businesses cannot find people to work.

At the Lincoln County Commission meeting October 17, county commissioner Leo Martinez griped about the lack of workers to fill the minimum wage positions in the fast food industry in Ruidoso primarily. While not mentioning his own

business directly, Martinez referred to fast food businesses that have to reduce their open hours or close entirely because they cannot hire and keep minimum wage workers. Martinez made the comments after Gary Cozzens made his quarterly report on the operations of the Regional Workforce Development Board. Cozzens is director of the Lincoln County Work Center, a division of the state Department of Labor, with office in Sierra Center on Mechem Drive in Ruidoso.

Cozzens said in August there were 7,934 employable workers in Lincoln

and 7,641 of them had jobs. "That means only 293 were unemployed," Cozzens said, "Making Lincoln County 26th in the state with 3.7 percent unemployment."

"We attribute this to the good job the Department of Labor is doing with the One Stop Work Center in Ruidoso," Cozzens added.

The Eastern Area Workforce Development (EAWD) operations expended \$1.32 million last fiscal year on adult programs, \$1.02 million on dislocated workers when the Furr's, KMarts and call centers closed in the eastern counties included in the EAWD. This fiscal year, the EAWD has \$2.2 million for adult programs and \$1.9 million for youth programs.

Ruidoso's One Stop Work Center serves about 400 people a month. At this time some of those served are enrolled in a nurses tech class at ENMU and NMSU; on the job training for travel agents, jewelry manufacturing which is considering moving to the Ruidoso area. Cozzens said the Dept. of Labor is looking at a training program for casino workers. And the center is collaborating with ENMU, Region IX Educational Cooperative, and the Welfare to Work program to teach a life skills employment program where workers will learn about interviewing, writing resumes, dressing and other skills to enhance their employability.

"There are about 75 in the TANF (temporary assistance to needy families) program currently," Cozzens said. "These people are employable and several of those are at the end of their benefit period."

"There is no work force in Lincoln County (from welfare)," Cozzens continued.

Cozzens went on to report on changes in the unemployment insurance reporting, now being called, "client management." He also told of how job seekers can sign up with the Dept. of Labor on the Internet.

## Carrizozo Streets To Be Renamed

Have you ever had the nightmare where some horrible thing has got you trapped and immobilized - you can look out the window and see help but you can't call to them or let them know where you are? That's bad enough in a dream but apparently there have been enough situations in real life for 911 emergency responders where they are called to an address but it turns

out it was in Capitan instead of Carrizozo or Ruidoso instead of Lincoln. It seems there B Avenues and Cedar Streets and 17th streets in almost every little town in Lincoln County, making it difficult to find fires and sick or injured people when reported by frightened or worried callers.

As a result of several close calls the county-wide 911 organization has

mandated that all the towns in Lincoln County do a way with duplicate named and numbered streets. While I can understand the need to do this I can't think of anything else that is as guaranteed to get just about everyone upset.

Here in Carrizozo, and probably in every other town, this means virtually every street name has to be changed. That task

was turned over to the Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Committee to offer suggestions to the Town Council who will have the final say-so. This coming Monday, November 4th the P&Z committee will be discussing several proposals at it's meeting at 5:30 p.m. at city hall in the Recreation Center Obviously there will be

**Constitutional Amendments**

(1): Proposing an amendment to Article 8, Section 5 of the Constitution of New Mexico to phase in an additional exemption from property taxation of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) of property of honorably discharged veterans who served in the United States Armed Forces during an armed conflict.

(2): Proposing an amendment to Article 7, Section 1 of the Constitution of New Mexico to remove the prohibition against certain persons exercising the right to vote.

(3): Proposing an amendment to Article 6 of the Constitution of New Mexico to eliminate an outdated section regarding designation of judicial districts.

(4): Proposing to repeal Article 2, Section 22 of the Constitution of New Mexico, which states that aliens cannot own land or any interest in land in the state unless otherwise provided by law.

(5): Proposing an amendment to Article 8, Section 15 of the Constitution of New Mexico to exempt from property taxation the principal place of residence occupied by a veteran of the armed forces of the United States of America who has a one hundred percent permanent and total service-connected disability.

(6): Proposing an amendment to Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico to permit the state and local governments to provide land, buildings or infrastructure to create affordable housing.

(7): Proposing an amendment to Article 20 of the Constitution of New Mexico to designate the last Friday in March as a legal holiday in honor of Cesar Chavez.

(8): Proposing an amendment to Article 9, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico to broaden eligibility for Vietnam veterans' scholarships.

(9): Proposing to amend Article 5, Section 14 of the Constitution of New Mexico to change the name of the State Highway Commission to the State Transportation Commission.

**Bond Questions**  
 (A): The 2002 Capital Projects General Obligation Bond Act authorizes the issuance and sale of Senior Citizen Facility Improvements and Acquisitions Bonds. Businesses in Lincoln County can post job notices on the website also. "It is very user friendly, and we encourage workers to use it," Cozzens said.

"Service jobs in Lincoln County are lacking," Martinez commented. "People on welfare get more than \$7 an hour, so there are no workers for minimum wage jobs in Ruidoso anymore."

Martinez said that results in many businesses that pay minimum wage having to go above \$7 an hour. "It's a critical situation, as (restaurants) are closing because they have no one to work," Martinez said no one wants to address the problem of people not wanting to work because they get better benefits on welfare.

"We have no welfare population in this county," Cozzens said. "The county is down to 75 people on TANF," he said again.

Martinez said a lot of people are on unemployment and don't want to work.

"The major issue (for Ruidoso businesses) is af-

fordable housing," said Eddie Beagles, assistant bureau chief for the Department of Labor Employment Security Division for the south and eastern part of the state. He said the department is considering importing a labor force to the Ruidoso area. "Most minimum wage workers can't afford to stay in Ruidoso to live."

Martinez then said there are high school kids who could work, but "where's the work ethic gone?"

Beagles said the work ethic questions need to be addressed at the high school level before kids get into the work force. But again he said the major issue in Ruidoso is the cost of living. "Ruidoso is so expensive it is tough," he added.

County commissioner Ray Nunley challenged that by saying that gasoline, food and utilities were not higher cost in Ruidoso.





# Santa Rita to Celebrate Dia de los Muertos

On Saturday, November 2 at 10:00 a.m., people, young and old, are invited to participate in a procession to Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Cemetery in Carrizozo. Celebration will begin with participants meeting at the parish hall with sack lunches and will then walk to the cemetery (weather permitting) where the group will honor our beloved departed by gathering trash in the area. Flowers which have been made, bought at stores or fresh from home will then be placed on the graves.

The group will then walk back to the parish hall to enjoy their sack lunches and music. Weather permitting this will be a picnic at Fred Chaez Park. The group will then gather at the church to prepare an altar. Everyone is encouraged to place photographs of departed relatives and friends on the altar. Or one can place mementos that the departed liked (for example, toys, candy, knick-knacks, holy pictures, etc.) The altar will be on display on Saturday and Sunday, November 2 and 3.

Following is a history of 'Dia de los Muertos':

*Dia de los Muertos* means love. It is celebrated on November 1 and 2, when Indian and Catholic traditions come together in an expression of love for the dead. It is an opportunity to reflect on our dearly departed.

The original celebration is a holiday with a complex history, varying by region. It is not a morbid holiday, but a festive remembrance of *los angelitos* (children souls) and *los difuntos* (adult souls). This celebration originated with the indigenous people of the American continent -- the Aztecs, Maya Toltec and Inca. With the arrival of the Spanish, the celebrations were altered to coincide with the celebrations of All Saints Day and All Souls Day on November 1 and 2.

People of Hispanic ancestry celebrate the holiday with local and regional variations. Families lead down cemeteries with *zempoalxochil* (marigolds). They place marigolds in the form of a cross in memory of friends and relatives who have died. They place food at grave sites, to feed the dead when they come to visit.

Throughout the Americas, people begin pre-

paring for *El Dia de los Muertos* late in October. Altars are built to honor loved ones. Candles are lit, incense is burned and music is played. Offerings such as candy skulls and *Pan de Muerto* (Bread of the Dead) are

prepared and figured on the altar. Figures or skeletons in various poses are displayed.

*Dia de los Muertos* is a celebration of life and remembrance of our deceased. It is a day for music, food and flowers.

strong opinions about what to name YOUR street. We'll also try to keep things as non-controversial as possible -- like not naming any streets after people,

living or dead, on the assumption that one person's hero is often someone else's bad guy.

We realize that this is going to cause a lot of grief and confusion for a lot of people -- at least for a while -- but we will try to make it as painless as possible. And remember -- we don't really have a choice whether to do this or not -- but in the long run our lives and homes will be safer because of it.



Early voting eliminates the guesswork about the weather and you won't have to go to the polls on election day to vote.

Considering that the election and who might or might not win is uppermost in people's minds, it is interesting that other important issues are also being discussed. A News reader from out of state recently wrote, "I especially appreciate the coverage of the on-going struggle between the forces of Light and Dark in the form of the LCSWA debate. It seems to me that laundry will grow moldy if it's not aired out." It is refreshing to know that other people care about what happens concerning the LCSWA issue.

Each person has a right to an opinion, whether it is who to vote for or whether to vote yes or no on bond questions and amendments or whether local government entities have the right to do some of the things they do. One thing is certain, your vote will count and is very important.

**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** -- Five bond issues will be on your general election ballot, this year. Put there by the 2002 Legislature, the bonds total \$140 million. Those that pass will be paid off by a statewide property tax levy. The state Board of Finance estimates that if all bonds pass, the tax impact on a house valued at \$100,000 will be just under \$20 a year.

For each major renovation or construction project funded by these bonds, one percent, or \$200,000, whichever is less, will be spent for artwork to decorate the structure.

According to the Legislative Finance Committee, all the projects proposed for funding are of high priority, but not high enough to be funded from the meager amount of money the 2002 Legislature had available to it. This year, all general fund surpluses had to be used for the state's operational emergency account. Severance taxes, another source of construction funding, weren't high either.

Some capitol observers might quibble with the Legislature's priorities. Yes, some of the projects are ones the Legislature decides to send to the public to see what it thinks about them. But many others are the most popular and needed of all projects, which lawmakers figure voters are sure to pass, especially since they spread the money statewide.

The problem is that the state has other needs that aren't so popular, like new state office buildings, especially prisons and additions to the Capitol. If these were sent to voters, they'd likely never pass. And then there's the little projects that are popular locally that lawmakers love to fund out of available money and proudly take home to constituents. We call that pork.

Explanations of the five bonds take up around a dozen lines apiece on the absentee ballot but convey very little information that would help you decide how to vote. Your county clerk has complete information.

You also may go to the secretary of state's Web site at [www.sos.state.nm.us](http://www.sos.state.nm.us), choose "Bureau of Elections," then "General Election Information."

then "General Obligation Bonds." This will bring up House Bill 89. Scroll down to Section 10, which gives you 21 pages of projects contained in the five proposals.

The following is a summary of the five bonds taken from material prepared by the League of Women Voters. It also appears on the secretary of state's Web site.

**Bond Issue A: Senior Citizen Facilities.** \$10.8 million for 166 projects in 32 counties, 19 pueblos, and the Navajo Nation. That gets just about everyone. Projects include purchase of vehicles, construction of and improvements to senior centers and purchase of furniture, equipment and appliances. Since seniors vote, this issue usually passes, even though senior facilities are generally considered to be a local responsibility.

**Bond Issue B: Higher Education Capital Projects.** \$93 million for renovation, infrastructure improvement and new construction at all six universities, eight two-year postsecondary schools, and three state schools. In addition, \$5 million for classrooms to accommodate full-day kindergarten throughout the state, \$2 million for handicapped access and safety requirements, and \$2.3 million for technology infrastructure at higher education institutions.

**Bond Issue C: Public Libraries.** \$7.7 million for public school libraries, \$3.4 million for higher education libraries and \$4.9 million for public library acquisitions statewide.

**Bond Issue D: State Facilities Capital Projects.** \$2 million for statewide armory renovation, rehabilitation and infrastructure improvements and \$4 million for improvements at the state fairgrounds, in Albuquerque. Legislators hope local armories and the State Fair are popular enough to pass.

**Bond Issue E: Water Projects.** \$10 million for purchase of water rights to meet the state's obligation under the Pecos River Compact and \$2 million for dam renovation and rehabilitation and well monitoring. If the money to send Pecos water to Texas isn't approved, cities along the river may be without water. It's likely we'll see more water bonds in the future as New Mexico wakes up to its water problems.

Former Ruidoso Attorney and Lincoln County Probate Judge, John W. Thompson, died at home in Ruidoso, on October 24.

John was born in Albuquerque, September 27, 1920 to John Wesley Thompson and Daisy Schelke Thompson. John was a graduate of Santa Fe High School, and a student at NM School of Mines in Socorro and Mackey School of Mines in Reno. After Pearl Harbor he enlisted in the Army and attended OCS at Fort Belvoir, VA, where he was commissioned. He was assigned to the U.S. Army Amphibious Forces, Demolition Company, and was part of the Normandy Invasion at Utah Beach.

He was awarded the Purple Heart Medal, Distinguished Unit Citation, WWII Victory Medal, American Campaign Medal, European African Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with 2 Bronze Battle Stars & 1 Bronze Arrowhead. After he was wounded he was sent to England for hospitalization where he received notice of the death of his younger brother, Robert Charles, four months earlier, in the explosion of the bomber during bombardier training over Louisiana.

After the war John completed his education in law receiving a Juris Doctor degree from the University of NM first Law School Class in 1950.

He married Patricia Lyons of Albuquerque and UNM on November 3, 1950. Later he established his law practice in Alamogordo, Carrizozo and finally Ruidoso in 1958. He served as Assistant District Attorney for Lincoln County in 1959 and 1960. In 1960 he became the Village Attorney for Ruidoso in which position he served for 25 years until 1985. He was elected and served three terms as Probate Judge of Lincoln County.

John is survived by his wife of 52 years, Patricia, and his son Robert L. Thompson, both of the home; a sister in law, three nieces and a nephew, and seven grandnieces and nephews and a great grandniece.

His ashes will be interred at Forest Lawn Cemetery at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, October 31.



# County Applies for Forest Grant

by Doris Cherry.

Lincoln County has submitted an application for a grant for \$400,000 to continue thinning private forested lands.

At the October 17 Lincoln County Commission meeting held in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, county manager Tom Stewart reported that the application for the 2003-2004 Phase 2 private forest clearing grant had been finalized and submitted by deadline of October 11. The county submitted a request for \$400,000. The village of Ruidoso, because it is trying to build a forest department capable of

providing all requirements of the grant, submitted another separate application for a grant for \$400,000.

In order to help facilitate the grant, Stewart reported that he will be hiring a grant administrator on November 11. The unclassified grant administrator will assist with carrying out the county's grant that will provide reimbursement funds to qualifying owners of private forested lands who make application and are accepted for the program. The grant administrator position will continue as long as the county receives the grant funds to carry out the forest programs.

The grant administrator will be located in the county manager's office at the station now occupied by the Emergency Services Coordinator who will be moved to the sheriff's area of the Lincoln County Sub-office in Ruidoso.

Stewart also reported that he had attended an organizational meeting of a water networking group on September 28 at Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso Learning Center. The organizer of the initiative is Dr. Bill Midkiff and the group consists of members from Lincoln and Otero counties. "The group is in the process of defining its

mission and name," Stewart reported.

The water group is focused on defeating the philosophy of "use it or lose it" for water rights, practical management of water resources, protests and the offering of alternatives when protesting, Stewart said. "The group emphasizes that we are mining water, in that we are not replenishing it," Stewart said. "One interesting fact revealed is that a golf course's water use is equivalent to 1,000 homes."

County commissioner Ray Nunley challenged the figure used for a golf course considering it faulty.

The next meeting of the water group will be at 9:30 a.m. Saturday, November 9 at ENMU in Ruidoso.

Nunley said that company has the same problem with the work force.

Beagles said people in Lincoln County who want to work are working.

County commissioner Bill Schwettmann said the problem is affordable housing. He said the Region 6 Housing Authority is doing all that is possible and is looking at such options as buying an old hotel to convert to low cost housing.

"Business needs to invest in affordable housing," Schwettmann said. "They can get help to do this from HUD, but no one from the business community shows up."
