

# Capitan Stalemates on LCSWA

The Capitan mayor continues to have hard feelings about how Capitan residents get billed for their trash services, but there was no resolution to the problem at the recent village trustees meeting.

At the Capitan village meeting on Tuesday, January 14 the first item of business was for trustees to approve the meet-

ing agenda. Agenda item 12 was listed as "discussion/action on LCSWA." Trustee Bobbi Shearer requested clarification of the item. She said she wanted to discuss the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) grappling truck service for yard and forest waste because some residents had expressed interest in having it.

"I don't care," responded

the mayor to Shearer. "We could also discuss billing."

Mayor Steve Sederwall said he was concerned about reading in the newspaper how Capitan is one month behind on paying for trash service. "But we have no money to pay it," he added.

Shearer said she was unsure the village could take action on billing or adding the grappling service due to the way the agenda was

written. But trustees approved the agenda with a defined LCSWA discussion to include the grappling truck and billing.


More than an hour after the meeting started trustees had worked their way down the agenda to the LCSWA item. Sederwall said the grappling truck service would cost another \$1.25 a month to each trash billing.

LCSWA operational

manager Debra Ingle who attended the meeting, explained the grappling truck service to be offered by LCSWA. She said the LCSWA board of directors

at its January 28 meeting is planning to approve a bid to purchase a grappling truck that will provide service to the City of Ruidoso Downs and to areas in the county that have requested the serv-

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

## Seven Arrested After "Minor-riot" at Amity

New Mexico State Police arrested seven participants of the AMITY at Fort Stanton program for probation violations stemming from an incident during the late hours of January 1.

According to State Police Lt. Bill Bowers, one state police officer responded to a report from the Amity program at Fort Stanton at 10:09 p.m. January 1, that there was a mini riot that occurred "over alcohol either brought in or made at the facility."

Bowers said by the time the officer arrived at the scene he found that the situation was under control by Amity staff. The

state police officer immediately requested assistance from the Lincoln County Sheriff's Office to transport six individuals, who were arrested for probation violations including assault, to the Lincoln County Detention Center in Carrizozo. One other Amity participant was transported to Lincoln County Medical Center for treatment and was later arrested and booked into the detention center for parole violation.

Bowers said it is protocol that state police respond anytime there is an incident at any of the state corrections facilities or any operations under the state corrections department such as Amity or Camp Sierra Blanca for

youth.

Amity is a private organization that contracts with the state department of corrections to provide a

## LCSWA Responds To Mayor's Report

The Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) continues to be accused and verbally attacked by certain individuals. An example is the January 2003 Capitan Mayor's Report by Steve Sederwall, mayor. Two pages of comments and accusations against LCSWA.

The following response was issued by LCSWA Chairman Don Coleman, representative for the city of Ruidoso Downs, and signed also by Leo Martinez, LCSWA representative for the County of Lincoln.

This letter is in response to the Capitan Mayor's Report that was sent to the citizens of the Village of Capitan in their water bills. The Capitan Mayor sends this report every month and most of them have been information about Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority. The Board of Directors of Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority request that this report be responded to, for all the citizens of Lincoln County including Capitan's citizens.

It seems that the Mayor's Report does not give the complete truth about LCSWA. He wishes to keep the pot-shots and personality thing stirred up until it stinks. His report for January is slanderous against the Board of Directors of LCSWA and the Operational Supervisor.

Mr. Don Coleman, Chairman, Mr. Leo Martinez, Secretary, and Mrs. Frank Cummins, Ruidoso representative have tried very hard to work with Mayor Sederwall on his questions about LCSWA to no avail. They now want the public to know the truth.

**The Mayor's Report:** "My personality cries out that it's wrong to call the Operational Supervisor applicants in for an interview and tell them they are over qualified for the job. It's wrong to tell those applicants the job would only pay \$20,000 per year, and then 21 working days after hiring the chairman of the board, one of the inside group, to double her salary."

**FACT:** Modesto Chaves, Vice Chairman of the LCSWA Board of Directors, at the time, was in charge of the interviews along with Jake Harris and Lloyd Nickerson. Modesto Chaves states, "no applicant was told that they were over qualified, out of the five applicants only Ms. Ingle was qualified for the position due to the requirement of at least (1) year of solid waste experience."

**FACT:** Salary did not double after 21 days. Ms. Ingle had worked overseeing the operations as Chairman of the Board from May 16 to June 30, 2001, without any pay, from July 1 to November 16, 2001 she was only paid expenses based on the \$20,000

## White Oaks Fire Dept. Gains Grant

White Oaks Volunteer Fire Department was among four New Mexico fire departments to gain funding through the last round of Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) 2002 Assistance to Firefighters grants.

White Oaks Volunteer Fire Dept. was awarded \$18,252. Corrales Volunteer Fire Dept. was awarded \$81,900. Fort Sumner Fire Dept. \$163,620 and Pueblo of Isleta Volunteer Fire Dept. \$47,882 to make for a total of \$311,654 acquired by New Mexico fire departments in the last round of 2002 FEMA fire fighting grants.

The grants will be used to help improve basic fire service delivery within the four departments, including fire protection, EMS delivery, vehicle purchase and prevention programs.

To pay for this service those customers are charged an additional \$1.25 a month. Ingle said if Capitan wanted to be included in the program, it would be put on a schedule with pick ups perhaps four times a year. She also

suggested that old appliances and other metal items could be left at the fenced area for the roll off container near the village maintenance yard. But resident Lonnie Lippmann who lives in downtown Capitan said the charge will be on all

trash bills, whether the customer uses the service or not.

"It's all or nothing," Sederwall and Shearer said about the service when trustee George Tippin asked if the service and additional fee would be optional to each customer.

Village clerk Kathryn Griffin said the village lost \$1,094 in the last six months for the roll off service currently now offered. The village provides an employee after hours to man the roll off, which has been under-utilized in the recent winter months.

Resident Al Barton said just recently the trash rates went down because LCSWA removed its "fuel surcharge" of \$1 and it would not be so different to add the \$1.25 for the pick up service.

Trustee Leroy Montes asked why the grappling truck service is not for free. "Since we collect the bills for you (LCSWA)," he added.

Ingle said the joint powers agreements for LCSWA state the municipalities will do the billings for LCSWA. And Capitan is paid a fee per customer to do the billing with the monthly water and sewer bills. (Editor's note: the mayor's newsletter is also sent in the monthly billings.)

"I don't like that if someone doesn't pay for their trash, we (the village) have to cut off their water," Montes said.

Sederwall said the village should not be billing for LCSWA.

Resident AnnaGail Grassie asked if LCSWA bills the county to bill county customers. Ingle said LCSWA does not charge the county to the county billing. However, the county does not get any administrative fee for its customers either. Also county residents are billed on a quarterly basis.

Again Sederwall said he had read where Capitan was a month late on its payments. Shearer asked how the village can pay out more than it takes in. Griffin said the solid waste account was always close, and in the past the village had paid the bill to LCSWA before it had collected the payments from village residential customers.

"If we pay on time, we haven't collected all our money yet," Griffin said.

Sederwall reminded that currently if an entity is late on its payments to LCSWA, it will get a surcharge.

"That is not right," Montes said.

But Ingle said LCSWA bills the village for the previous month of trash collection service.

"We do not get enough in the solid waste fund to pay on time," Griffin repeated. "And it continues to get worse."

After Sederwall again said he wanted LCSWA to bill the village residential customers, trustee John Whitaker said he was tired of "this dog being kicked."

"Every time I pick up a paper someone is making us look like fools," Whitaker said. "I'm tired of complaining about it because it is a real disservice."

Sederwall said he did "not care to get out of the trash business" but wanted LCSWA to take over billing. Shearer said it could cost the customers more if LCSWA takes over the billing of village

residents.

After shuffling papers and allowing noisy discussion among the audience, Sederwall finally requested trustees either do a motion about the solid waste or to go on to the next and final agenda item.

With no motion coming

from trustees, they moved on to a brief report about Capitan-Carrizozo Natural Gas without taking action on the LCSWA situation.

Scheerer requests that any village resident interested in the grappling truck service phone Capitan City Hall at 354-2247 and leave her a message.

that was in the budget and was hired at that same \$20,000 till January 1, 2002. When the Board of Directors (Modesto Chaves - Lincoln County, Trustee John Whitaker - Capitan, Lloyd Nickerson - Carrizozo, Jake Harris - Ruidoso Downs, and Frank Cummins - Ruidoso) did the mid year budget revision in December, they discussed the salary for the operational supervisor. After several comments by the board members the resolution was approved unanimous, this budget included the increase in pay for the operational supervisor. (This action would have taken place had it been any other applicant that may have been hired).

**Mayor's Report:** "It's wrong to pay the kind of mileage payments we pay her without one board member checking that mileage and just writing a check from the people's checkbook."

**FACT:** Ms. Ingle's mileage is logged daily and turned in to the Financial Coordinator every two weeks. The Chairman of the Board signs the checks and verifies the mileage with the Financial Coordinator who has been with LCSWA eleven years.

**Mayor's Report:** The Joint Powers agreement, "the mortar that holds the board together, does not provide for proxy votes."

**FACT:** On November 16th, 1992 the Board of Directors passed, approved and adopted the VOTE BY PROXY.

**Mayor's Report:** "In November 2002, that the Corona Rep. advised that the Mayor of Corona pulled his proxy from Ms. Ingle in May of 2001. Yet the minutes show she was voting his proxy until November 2001". Another issue my personality screams in a loud voice, that it is wrong.

**FACT:** The proxy from Corona was issued to Ms. Ingle on May 10th 2001, and no longer used after September 2001, and how could the Corona rep. advise the Mayor at the November 2002 meeting, considering they were not present at that meeting.

**Mayor's Report:** "Your Village does the billing for LCSWA each month. Each month your village dips into your coffers to make up the difference as we come up short."

**FACT:** LCSWA does not have anything to do with how the municipalities pay their bills, the billing clerks call the LCSWA office and report the number of trash bills that they are billing and the LCSWA billing clerk generates a bill for the municipalities for payment. The LCSWA office has no way of knowing how much money is collected by the municipalities.

**Mayor's Report:** The mayor also comments on a letter dated October 4, 2002 in regards to the cost for LCSWA to do the billing for the Village of Capitan.

**FACT:** The mayor fails to tell the people that the Joint Powers Agreement states "there will be no duplication of services" and that the \$47,988.05 was the total cost to LCSWA and of that amount quoted the cost to the Village of Capitan would be \$15,521.28.

**Mayor's Report:** The mayor believes that the Lincoln County News is hearing one side of an already slanted issue from the supervisor.

**FACT:** The Lincoln County News reports the facts by doing their research.

Mayor, your personality thing should stop, or have yourself replaced on this board by another person from the Village of Capitan, who has been here for years, knows the facts, and would at least be willing to do their research before comments are made to the newspaper. Therefore, your personality thing and pot-shots would stop, at least with LCSWA.

# Carrizozo Youth Arrested After School Brawl

An 18 year old Carrizozo area man was arrested on two counts of battery stemming from a fight at a Carrizozo high school junior class meeting the evening of January 8.

Carrizozo police and ambulance were called out to Carrizozo school at 7:35 p.m. on a report of a fight in progress. According to information from Carrizozo Police Department, officer Johnny Rivera responded and found a 18 year old student at the high school who had facial cuts and abrasions as the result of a battery by a former student.

According to Carrizozo School Superintendent Sergio Castanon, the victim was attending the class meeting where students, school sponsors and adults were in attendance. Castanon said eye witnesses stated that the victim was called out of the meeting to the outside, where the battery occurred.

Another juvenile had been allegedly battered at a different location by the same suspect, said Carrizozo police chief Angelo Vega.

Carrizozo ambulance transported one of the victims to Lincoln County Medical Center in Ruidoso, the other was trans-

ported by private vehicle.

Vega stated that Rivera contacted the district attorney's office that night and charges were authorized to be filed on two counts of aggravated battery. Magistrate Judge Martha Proctor then issued an arrest warrant for 18 year old Samuel D. Green who lives in the county east of Carrizozo. State police arrested Green at his residence the next afternoon. Later another victim came forward and an additional charge of assault was added.

Green was booked into the Lincoln County Detention Center (LCDC) on the charges and was arraigned before Proctor who set bail at \$10,000. Green remains in LCDC at this time.

Vega told THE NEWS that the assault incident allegedly occurred because Green was accused of being involved in a recent action which occurred at Carrizozo School that was investigated by school officials. Vega said the school officials found that the allegations of that incident were unfounded. "Certain factions demonstrated their dissatisfaction of the (school) findings through destructive behavior," Vega added.

"The student attack on (January 8) was under

control immediately upon arrival of Officer Rivera, assisted by sheriff's deputies," Vega said. "Officer Rivera gathered enough information to bring charges and obtain an arrest warrant."

Vega said he has been and continues to be in contact with all parents

who were involved with the class meeting and other concerned parents and citizens. "It is important that we all work together in these instances," Vega added. "School should be a safe environment where education needs to be emphasized, not self defense."

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# BLM Open House In Capitan To Discuss Fort Stanton ACEC

Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will host an "open house" in Capitan on Jan. 23 to discuss proposed plans for roads and trails around Fort Stanton, according to Ed Robinson, BLM-Roswell field office manager.

The meeting is scheduled for 6 p.m. at the Capitan Senior Citizen Center, adjacent to the Capitan High School. BLM employees will present information and answer questions about the Fort Stanton Area of Critical Concern (ACEC) Route Designation Plan and Environmental Assessment Draft. The draft document is available online at [www.nm.blm.gov/www/rfo/index.htm](http://www.nm.blm.gov/www/rfo/index.htm).

The document, prepared as part of on-going management plans for the Fort Stanton ACEC, presents suggestions for mountain bike, equestrian, hiking and off-highway vehicle trails and which vehicle routes would remain open. It proposes to reduce maintained roads from 54 to 34 miles and add 60 miles of multi-use trails in the ACEC.

The ACEC included approximately 24,000 acres of publicly owned land surrounding the state-managed 2,000-acre historic Fort Stanton site in Lincoln County. The area

includes recreational trails, and the Billy the Kid Scenic Byway.

"The majority of existing roads and trails have not been adequately developed for recreational use," said Paul Happel, BLM natural resource specialist. "We want potential trail users and others to have access that also will preserve the ACEC's environment."


# Obituary

*Two should resign now*

Very often when people are deprived of their rights it is because someone in power is not doing the job they were elected to do or were appointed to do. More than 1,000 people in Capitan and more than 800 people in Carrizozo are not being represented on the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA) board of directors at this time, which is the same as being deprived of their rights. Each of these people deserves to be represented. The Capitan LCSWA representative, mayor Steve Sederwall, and the Carrizozo LCSWA representative, police chief Angelo Vega should immediately resign from the LCSWA board. Neither Sederwall or Vega attended the December meeting and neither Sederwall or Vega contacted LCSWA offices to inform them about not going to be at the LCSWA meeting.

And the mayor of Carrizozo should demand that Vega resign. It is the mayor's responsibility to make certain that people appointed to positions fulfill their duties. Vega has not attended several LCSWA meetings. The mayor has also not asked Vega to make a report about LCSWA at town council meetings. Other departments are required to make monthly reports at town council meetings. Why is Vega not required to report about LCSWA business?

Considering that appointees do not take an oath of any kind when they are appointed, it would seem that Vega and Sederwall are not really required to do anything as LCSWA representatives. Their situations are completely different than other appointees because Sederwall took an oath as mayor to fulfill his duties, and Vega took an oath as chief of police to uphold the law and fulfill his duties. The duties of both Sederwall and Vega did not include a disclaimer that they did not have to uphold appointed position duties.

Awareness of responsibility should be uppermost for both Sederwall and Vega, and it would seem they should both be aware of being courteous to everyone, not select people. When Sederwall left the state in December it seems he would have informed employees at city hall and it seems Sederwall should have asked an employee to call LCSWA. And any time Vega is not able to perform his duties as police chief, someone should be informed. Would it have been that difficult for a secretary or the town clerk to call LCSWA? Or were both absences deliberate acts?

Two LCSWA representatives not attending meetings is not a coincidence, especially with both of them objecting to LCSWA being in the black, LCSWA running smoothly, and LCSWA having happy customers around the county. If these two men really object to a female being in a position of authority, they should admit it and resign as appointees and let someone more dedicated to fulfilling duties attend LCSWA meetings and report monthly at council meetings.

Evidently other people are concerned and are asking some of the same questions we are asking. LCSWA chair Don Coleman responded to Sederwall's latest volley. That response is on the front page of this issue of The News. Fallacies and facts are presented by Coleman and are well worth reading. Maybe these facts will help explain why we want Sederwall and Vega to resign from the LCSWA board.

**Capitan Won't Give Up Historical Street Names; Trustees Sic Mayor After Valor To Remedy 911 Problems**

Capitan village trustees don't want to give up the more than 100 year old street names that are duplicated elsewhere in Lincoln County.

Especially not to remedy the 911 emergency system problems that are actually originating with the Valor telephone company.

During the Capitan trustees meeting January 14, Connie Stone, county 911 coordinator and county planning officer Patsy Sanchez requested the village change the names of White Oaks and Nogal Streets. Stone again said the changes were necessary because there is a White Oaks street in Ruidoso also, and the Enhanced 911 emergency phone system can not accommodate duplicate names. She also said another problem is Ruidoso now has direct home mail delivery on its White Oaks street.

But trustees and many audience members objected to having to change the street names that are more than a century old. Trustee Bobbie Shearer was also concerned about the legal ramifications of changing the White Oaks name because of old easement agreements between the Brewer Ranch and the village.

Shearer said all the trustees have objected to

changing any of the historical names of streets in the downtown core area.


Trustees and the mayor questioned why in other places county-wide 911 systems are able to accommodate duplicate street names. Stone said that many of the problems with duplicate street names in the 911 system originate with the local telephone companies. There are four companies that provide land based phone service to Lincoln County.

When asked about why the E-911 system will not show the towns where the 911 calls originate, Stone said that when the E-911 system works right street addresses in the correct towns will come up on the 911 system maps. But currently the more sophisticated E-911 system is not up and running anywhere in the county, Sanchez said.

Fees for the 911 system are added to all phone bills. And Stone said the phone companies get \$12 every time a change is made to the phone listings and 911 map locations. "But I waste a lot of time," said Stone, "on disconnected phone numbers from Valor."

Resident Don Brothers asked why then do the streets have to be changed

**INSIDE THE CAPITOL**

**SANTA FE** -- Hang on to your hats. The Bill Richardson Express has left the station and we're about to get a ride like we've ever experienced.

Sure, we've had some wild rides in the past. Gary Johnson and his drug experience was something we'll never forget. And Toney Anaya's bullet train zoomed us through some uncharted territory we may want to forget. But Gov. Bill Richardson and his ambitious visions for New Mexico will be a truly new adventure.

And the experience will be totally different from that to which we have become accustomed the past eight years. Never have two governors ever been more unlike. In many ways, we are quickly transitioning from the least ambitious governor our state has ever seen to the most ambitious governor.

The most obvious level of ambition is political. Gary Johnson told us from the beginning that all he wanted to be was governor and that he would never run for anything again. That allowed him a great amount of flexibility.

Gary Johnson never had to worry that what he let slip from his mouth would ruin his political career. He could speak his mind on any issue he wanted. In fact, that is how he wants to be remembered: for speaking out on those issues that others were afraid to address.

There's a certain freshness to that approach. We knew Gary Johnson wasn't hiding anything from us. But there was also a lack of accountability. There was no way to punish him for his sins. All the people who disliked his advocacy of drug legalization, couldn't do much about it, other than punish those who agreed with him and who do want a future political career.

Bill Richardson is completely at the other end of the political ambition spectrum. His ultimate goal is the White House. He doesn't say it publicly, but he's told enough staff and friends that it is hardly a secret. History shows us that over the past 30 years, being a successful governor is the best route to

the presidency. That may be one reason Richardson is where he is right now.

But even though he knows this is a stepping stone, Richardson also knows the chances of an Hispanic governor from a small state in the West being able to put together a winning presidential effort is small indeed. If things fall right and it happens, that's great, otherwise, being governor of New Mexico is quite an honor and quite an opportunity and Richardson would like to be an outstanding, noteworthy governor of New Mexico.

For one thing, he has something to prove. He saw taking over the U.S. Department of Energy as his opportunity to prove he could manage a bureaucracy. If he could do that, he might be able to bypass being governor in order to demonstrate he can handle the administrative responsibilities of the presidency.

Washington insiders told Richardson the DOE was too hopeless a mess for him to straighten out in the brief two years remaining in the Clinton administration. But Richardson has great confidence in his abilities and felt that with his energy and enthusiasm, he could do it. As we have seen since then, the DOE is even a bigger mess than anyone had known.

Richardson was headed in the right direction with reforms at Energy but the wheels came off all too soon because of security problems at the Los Alamos National Laboratory. Now we see there are many other problems too. Current Secretary Spencer Abraham has commended Richardson for the roadmap he had laid out to start shaping up the department, but that isn't enough to make Richardson feel exonerated. He has to prove himself as a great governor for his own personal satisfaction even if it leads to nothing else.

And don't worry about him leaving during this term to run for president. The race has already begun.

for the 911 system. Sanchez said so the county can get the E-911 system working. "When you get it up and running and we need to change street names, then come back to us," the mayor said.

Trustee John Whitaker suggested the street names be changed only in the 911 system, such as adding "aka" or White Oaks/Capitan, without having to change the actual street signs. But Stone said that could confuse emergency response teams.

"We need to lean on the phone company," the mayor said. "Valor is a wreck and we should not have to fix it."

Sanchez then suggested the town take its complaints about the phone company to the Public Regulation Commission (PRC) which regulates the phone utilities.

Shearer said the village does not want to be difficult, but "these 1900 street names we will not give up."

Mayor Steve Sederwall said the problems with the 911 system is a Valor

switching problem, "not a village of Capitan problem."

"You're doing Valor's job," Sederwall said to Stone. "We need to get on their cowboy butts about this."

Stone said the village also has flaws in its addressing, with confusion over east, west, north and south streets. Sederwall said the village needs to hold a workshop about the street names, or "jump down Valor's throat."

Village staff also reminded that changing street names will be expensive to adjust on the new village maps. But Sanchez said the new village maps are not official anyway until they are filed with the county

clerk. Sederwall said he would call the county manager to put on "war paint with Valor."

"It is largely their problem," Sanchez agreed.

Trustees did approve Stone's request to change the names of two streets—Tiger lane to Tiger Drive and the spelling of Dockery to the original spelling of Dockray.

Shearer told Stone and Sanchez that the village understands the county 911 coordinators are not the "enemies" in the street name dilemma.

## County Commission Meets 21st

While the state legislature opens its newest session, the Lincoln County Commission will have its first regular meeting on a Tuesday in many years.

At the request of citizen Jerry Carroll, county commissioners at their December meeting voted to return their regular meeting dates to Tuesday. Commissioners had met on Tuesdays for many years prior to the hiring of county manager Tom Stewart who requested the Thursday date because of the difficulty in providing financial reports on time. But Carroll said the Thursday date prevented THE NEWS from having an opportunity to report on the meeting in a timely manner. So commissioners obliged.

The January 21 meeting begins at 8 a.m. in the commissioners' chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo.

There will be three public hearings, beginning at 9 a.m., on three proposed ordinances. The first is on a proposed ordinance providing a county-option property tax rebate pursuant to the state Income Tax Act for low income tax payers. Offered each year since the state act was passed, Lincoln County Commissioners have turned down the ordinance because it would raise taxes for all higher income property owners to pay for the rebate.

The second hearing is on a proposed ordinance requiring individuals and entities to make application and obtain permission from the county prior to constructing access through or across platted townsites or dedicated county rights of way.


The third hearing is on a proposed ordinance that would repeal and replace the 1988 ordinance regulating refuse, solid waste and litter in the county.

## LEGAL NOTICE COUNTY ASSESSOR NOTICE OF REQUIREMENTS TO REPORT CERTAIN MATTERS RELATING TO PROPERTY VALUATION AND FOR CLAIMING EXEMPTION FROM PROPERTY TAXATION

The County Assessor, hereby publishes notice to property owners, pursuant to Section 7-38-18, N.M.S.A. 1978, as follows:

- 1.) If you or your spouse are 65 years old; or if either of you will become 65 years old in 2003; and if your "modified gross income" was not greater than \$18,800 in 2002, you may be eligible for a limitation on the taxable value of your residence. If you think you are eligible, you must apply to the Assessor no later than 30 days after the Assessor mails the notice of value for your residence. The application must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-21.3, N.M.S.A. 1978.
- 2.) If you own real property not valued by the Assessor in 2002 for property taxation purposes, it must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003, unless it is not subject to valuation for property taxation purposes in 2003. The report must contain certain required information and be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-8(A)(B), N.M.S.A. 1978.
- 3.) If you have made improvements to real property during 2002 and the improvements cost more than Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000), the improvements must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. The information required and the form of the report may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-8 (C), N.M.S.A. 1978.
- 4.) If you believe that you or your real property is entitled to exemption from property taxation, you must apply to the Assessor for exempt status no later than February 28, 2003, in order to be entitled to exemption from taxation in 2003. Exception: If an exemption from taxation was in effect for 2002 and the basis of the exempt status or use is unchanged from that year, application for exemption need not be made for 2003. If required, application for exemption must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-17, N.M.S.A. 1978.
- 5.) If you or your real property was exempt from taxation in 2002 but the basis of the exempt status has changed during 2002 so that there is no longer eligibility for exemption, you must report that fact to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-17, N.M.S.A. 1978.
- 6.) If you claim "residential" status for your real property, you must declare this status to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003 unless the property was classified as "residential" by the Assessor in 2002. In the event that the predominant use of your real property has changed from "residential" to "nonresidential" during 2002, that fact must be declared to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. The declaration must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-17.1 and 7-36-2.1, N.M.S.A. 1978.

7.) If you own property that has decreased in value during 2002 and that property is subject to valuation for property taxation purposes, you must report the decrease in value to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-38-13, N.M.S.A. 1978.

8.) If your land was valued in 2002 in accordance with the special method of valuation for land used primarily for agricultural purposes, and the land is still used primarily for agricultural purposes, you need not reapply for that special method of valuation in 2003. If your land was not valued in accordance with that method of valuation in 2002, and it is now used primarily for agricultural purposes, you must make application to the Assessor in order to obtain that valuation method in 2003. If your land was valued in accordance with that special method of valuation in 2002, but it is no longer used primarily for agricultural purposes, you must report that fact to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003, and must contain certain required information and be in forms that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-20, N.M.S.A. 1978.

9.) If you own "livestock" that are subject to valuation for property taxation purposes, you must report such livestock to the Assessor. All such livestock that are present in the county on January 1, 2003, must be reported to the Assessor no later than February 28, 2003. If the livestock are transported into the county after January 1, 2003, they must be reported to the Assessor no later than the first day of the month following the first month in which the livestock have been present in the county for twenty (20) days. The required reports must contain certain required information and must be in forms that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-21, N.M.S.A. 1978.

10.) If you own a "manufactured home" and it was present in the county on January 1, 2003, you must report it to the Assessor by February 28, 2003. The report must contain certain required information and must be in a form that may be obtained from the Assessor's office. Section 7-36-26, N.M.S.A. 1978.

11.) Certain mineral property and personal property of contractors operating in more than one county are required to be reported to the State of New Mexico, Taxation and Revenue Department-Property Tax Division in Santa Fe. Information about property to be reported to the Taxation and Revenue Department, Property Tax Division, can be obtained from the County Assessor or the State Assessed Property Bureau, P.O. Box 25126, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87504-5126. Phone: (505) 827-0895.

THIS NOTICE is only a brief statement of the provisions of Sections 7-36-21.3, 7-38-3, 7-38-8, 7-38-13, 7-38-17.1, 7-36-2.1, 7-36-20, 7-36-21, and 7-36-26, N.M.S.A. 1978, and related Taxation and Revenue Department regulations. 
