

Waste Water Board Seeks Solutions To Pollution

By January 1, 2004, the Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant on the Rio Ruidoso must be able to meet strict phosphorous levels imposed by the federal Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the New Mexico Environment Department (NMED).

Because of this the communities along the Rio Ruidoso are working

to identify and remedy sources of phosphorous pollution in the Rio Ruidoso.

The Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant Joint Use Board governs the operation of the regional sewer treatment plant on the Rio Ruidoso at Seeping Springs/Biscuit Hill east of Ruidoso Downs. The joint use board membership is Village of Ruidoso mayor Leon Eg-

gleston and village manager Lorri McKnight, City of Ruidoso Downs mayor Bobby Miller and city administrator Frank Waters and county commissioner Leo Martinez. The board held a special meeting Monday, May 5 at Ruidoso Village Hall where they received the report on identification and reduction of non-point source phosphorous discharge into the river.


The report was prepared by the Rio Ruidoso Watershed Task Force which was cooperatively established by the village of Ruidoso and city of Ruidoso Downs.

Ruidoso village attorney Chay Rennick explained the history of the task force and the reason for the report. Rennick said EPA imposed the high extraordinarily high phosphorous standards in Rio

Ruidoso because of nuisance algae in the river. Since 1994 complaints were made by agricultural interests in the Ruidoso valley below the treatment plant that there was a pro-

liferation of nuisance algae that inhibited proper ditch irrigation, Rennick said. Finding the high levels, EPA fined the waste water plant and placed a strict phosphorous limit which must be met by January 1, 2004.

Deadline To Protest Valuations Is May 29

Thursday, May 29 is the deadline for property owners to file a formal protest over the Lincoln County Assessor's notice of valuation mailed out on April 29.

Property owners have 30 days after the mailing of the notices from the assessor's office to file a protest, said county assessor Rick Silva.

Property owners who wish to file protest should call the county assessor's office at 648-2308 or visit the office in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo in person and request a formal protest form. The form must be completed, signed and returned to the assessor's office before 5 p.m. Thursday, May 29.

Silva encourages property owners to examine their 2003 Notices of Valuations as a majority of the notices will show land values increased from their 2002 assessments.

"This year we concentrated on reevaluating the land values," Silva said. This year was a "reevaluation year", mandated by state law, when

the assessor's office must re-evaluate property values.

"We found some lands that were greatly underassessed," he added.

Silva said his office in the past concentrated on bringing up the assessed values for improvements, but this year he decided to concentrate on the land values.

Property values indicated on the notice of valuation are used to determine property taxes sent out in November. Taxable value of property is one-third of the total assessed value. Property tax rates are determined by the county's 2003-2004 budget with anticipated revenues and expenditures.

Also May 29 is deadline to sign up for the exemptions for veterans and head of household.

Sheriff's Office Comes Under 'Attack' From County Budgets Slashed

With proposed expenses exceeding the projected income for the next fiscal year, Lincoln County Commissioners put their proposed budget, on the chopping block at their special budget hearing on Friday, May 2.

"Sheriff, prepare to defend yourself," announced county commissioner Earl Hobbs to sheriff Sullivan when commissioners got to the sheriff's proposed budget.

Hobbs, who also had

questions for other entities requesting funds, had "serious questions" about the sheriff's department which Hobbs said is "grossly over staffed."

"You have too many deputies," Hobbs said. "And dispatch is over funded."

As a way to save money, Hobbs said dispatch services should be centralized with Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs. "We should be consolidating these," Hobbs said. "I realize and

Scholarship Fund Established As Memorial For Bill Winkler



But engineering studies show upgrading the existing wastewater treatment plant to meet the phosphorous levels could cost between seven and eight million dollars, and perhaps not even solve the problem in the river because nuisance algae has been identified in the river above the plant.

With little hope of finding funding for plant upgrades, and with questions of where the pollution is coming from, the wastewater group went to Santa Fe in December 2002 to meet with NMED officials about the phosphorous issue. NMED agreed to let the municipalities establish a task force to look into sources of pollution. The task force then hired Living-

ston and Associates to do a series of river testing to compile data to show where phosphorous pollution is occurring, to identify the stakeholders and proposed solutions.

"Broadly everybody in the community is a stakeholder," Rennick said. "Specifically the stakeholders are enterprises that effect the watershed."

"Now we are looking for information," Rennick continued. "So we can recognize it will take a community wide effort to alleviate the problems."

The report given to the wastewater board will also be presented to the NMED. The report identified potential non-point sources of phosphorous/nutrient loading in the river above the waste-

water plant. Testing will be done monthly at stations that will be placed into the Rio Ruidoso in 17 different locations, reported Eddie Livingston.

Waters also explained that phosphorous exists in all living organisms. While the wastewater plant is the most obvious source of phosphorous in the river, there are other sources of potential pollution from leaking septic tanks, forest fire ash, animals, and chemicals such as detergent and pesticides.

"Everyone wants to keep the river clean and protect the environment," Waters said.

The goal of the study is to see what is going on in the river. If tests show the phosphorous level is high above the wastewater plant, that information can be taken to the federal and state agencies to challenge the allegations that the waste water plant is causing the nuisance algae in the river.

Martinez suggested that it would cost to construct a new wastewater plant to replace the 20 year old facility that has outlived its usefulness. Martinez suggested the communities and county apply for Colonias funding, seek federal funding and for Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs to raise their sewer rates.

Dick Wisner, founder of the Ruidoso River Association and a member of the task force, said the solution is to fix the river first. Wisner spoke of the pollution potential from the race track where 1,200 horses are contained in a one-third square mile area along the river.

As to the cost of a new facility, Rennick said just to remodel the existing facility will cost \$15 million, then add to that the phosphorous removal at the \$7-8 million cost, then a yearly cost of \$178,000 for chemicals for treatment. Rennick said the number one area of concern to look at is individual septic systems.


At this time, Rennick said the stakeholders need to be aware and examine their practices that might possibly contribute to phosphorous levels in the river.

While Martinez suggested recycling of treated wastewater, Rennick said such recycling would reduce the actual amount of water in the river below the treatment plant.

A representative from the Bureau of Land Management at the meeting said he had seen pipes coming from houses in Upper Canyon that discharge directly into the river. He suggested a public notice be done about such problems. Eggleston said the study would be looking at such problems and at septic systems along the river. Rennick suggested the Ruidoso village manager serve as a contact person for residents who want to report such problems.

"We're doing the testing in the river so we know what is contributing to the phosphorous," Eggleston said.

At that point, the joint use board went into a discussion about its proposed 2003-2004 budget. It was then that City of Ruidoso Downs and Village of Rui-

understand the territoriality but we need to get past that."

Sullivan said the centralized dispatch idea had been "kicked around" and tried in other areas that turned out to be a "disaster."

Hobbs said he had no idea what the chiefs of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police departments think about a centralized dispatch. "All I know is I am in the business of saving tax payers money," Hobbs said. "And from an operational standpoint this should be a piece of cake."

Sullivan then asked who would pay for the centralized dispatch equipment which could cost up to \$1 million. Hobbs acknowledged the high cost of such a project, but with Ruidoso's "Taj Mahal" police station the combined dispatch could be put there and in five years result in substantial savings for the county.

"Get with the chiefs of police and see if a centralized dispatch can be funded," Hobbs said.

Next Hobbs questioned why the confiscation funds are not put into the county general fund. "I personally do not think you are doing anything wrong," Hobbs said to Sullivan. "But I think the confiscation funds should go to the general fund."

Sullivan said the law enforcement protection funds that come from the state are separate by state law. Hobbs acknowledged these but wanted the confiscation funds to go into the general fund so the commission could have oversight over them.

"You want us to put the confiscation funds into the general fund so you can dish it out wherever you want?" Sullivan responded.

"As you need money we would allocate it," Hobbs said.

"That is not the way for seizure funds," Sullivan said.

Then Hobbs pushed the scissors in further.

"You also have too many deputies," Hobbs said. "You are grossly over staffed."

"Oh come on," Sullivan responded, "When I was sheriff before I had 16 deputies, now I have only 12 who have 5,000 square miles to cover. Don't give me that crap! I will go to the mat on that."

Hobbs said he believed the sheriff's office was over staffed because much of the populated areas of the county are covered by municipal police departments, state police and "Department of Transportation officers in those gray cars that sneak up on you." Also a tremendous part of the county is empty rangeland, he added.

Then Hobbs tore into the overtime budgeted for the sheriff's office, which he said seemed high especially since there are other law enforcement entities in the county.

"The sheriff's office is too large, it is over staffed and over budgeted," Hobbs said. "In my point of view we need changes in dispatch and general management of the department."

"I think you are attacking me," Sullivan responded. "I feel singled out." Sullivan then explained that now the de-

partment does not have 24 hour patrol, deputies must have time off and cannot by labor agreement work more than 40 hours without overtime. "Try to find a state police officer," Sullivan said. "They already have a skeleton crew."

The sheriff's office does back up for the municipal police departments, Sullivan said. "And you see our vehicles in Ruidoso because we serve a tremendous number of civil papers."

"Your friends bitch about speeders on Fort Stanton road and want a deputy with a radar," Sullivan said to Hobbs. "But you say I have too many deputies."

"This is my eleventh year as sheriff of Lincoln County, so I think I know what my department needs," Sullivan added.

Hobbs said he was not attacking the sheriff, rather it was just his point of view. "Ultimately we as county commissioners decide how much money there is for your operations," Hobbs said.

"I just want justification, I am not attacking you. I have the deepest respect for you, but that does not mean I agree with you," Hobbs added. "So far I am not persuaded."

Sullivan said if the number of deputies is cut it will be a dis-service to "the people who elected you."

"This is not personal," Hobbs again assured. "It is just my judgment about an operation. This is what I used to do for a living."

Commission chairman Rex Wilson said there is a direct correlation with overtime and adequate staffing. "We have the same deal in the road department," Wilson said.

Commissioner Leo Martinez joked and said he was glad Sullivan was mad at Hobbs instead of him. "I pick on everybody," Martinez said. "Because I represent the taxpayer and it's my job."

Martinez questioned why the sheriff does not utilize private paper servers. Sullivan said by law some papers, like writs, must be served by a deputy.

Martinez then said with all the police in the county from all the agencies, "Lincoln County is one of the safest and most covered in the state."

Sullivan said Ruidoso police department has 26 officers just for Ruidoso and he has only 12 officers for 5,000 square miles. And he said as the population in the county increases, the request for services increase. "Right now we have to prioritize calls," Sullivan said. "Should we just say to call commissioner Hobbs when we need more deputies?"

"I am now going to anticipate those calls," Hobbs responded.

Commissioners Maurie St. John then asked that they have time to review recommendations on the budget made by the county manager before making any decisions. St. John said she is not in favor of imposing the last discretionary mill for the county budget this year. And she said she understands the reason for the county manager asking for a five percent overall

Welcome Gov. Richardson

Governor Bill Richardson will be here in Lincoln County tomorrow. He will be in Ruidoso early in the morning and in Carrizozo just before noon. Gov. Richardson has been in Ruidoso several times, but this will be his first visit to Carrizozo, which is the county seat. The public is invited to attend either or both places. It would be nice for people to show their appreciation to the governor for his support for this area, the money which was appropriated by the state legislature, and other support, including the Fort Stanton Commission. Richardson's recognition of the importance of Fort Stanton to the county should be acknowledged by all.

Requests for money this year at the state legislature far exceeded the amount of money available, which is true for nearly every year. Lincoln County areas received less than they wanted, but all money which will help with necessary projects and infrastructure is appreciated. Improvements to existing structures as well as construction of new projects and acquisition of new equipment have been long awaited.

Evidently others agree because some of the money that was requested was appropriated. It would also be helpful if the governor or the state legislature or someone in power could reduce the power of the wind that has been steadily moving topsoil to the east. We don't really care if all the errant tumbleweeds move elsewhere, but topsoil is needed here more than in Missouri, Arkansas and Tennessee. We do send our sympathy to everyone affected by tornadoes that hit Kansas, Missouri and Tennessee last Sunday.

Earlier in this column we complained about the wind, but the wind in New Mexico is far less than that received in the area referred to as "Tornado Alley" east of here. When the wind leaves this area it increases in velocity and then the tornadoes originate. We have been told that Pierce City, Missouri is in far worse shape than shown on TV and it makes us realize that wind here could be more severe.

Tomorrow when the governor is in Lincoln County the wind may continue to blow, but no one will be blamed. The governor know the wind blows, and not all the wind comes from politicians. INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE -- Move the state capitol building? Heavens, we just paid for an expensive renovation 10 years ago and an expensive addition two years ago.

But it is being talked about according to the last column the late Ernie Mills wrote for the state employees newspaper. Ernie long had been an advocate for moving the capitol complex to a place that isn't landlocked and which has adequate parking. His preference was for land south of town where the state penitentiary and new National Guard headquarters are located.

It is scary to many people to be near the prison, but if anyone knows the horrors of what can happen during a riot, it was Mills, who was demanded by inmate leaders for negotiations rather than prison officials, whom they didn't trust. Mills said the first thing the inmates did was to carry its legs. But then Mills had done two tours in Vietnam, seeking out New Mexico soldiers to interview, so he's

New Mexico's previous penitentiary was only about a mile from the Cordova streets, where a state office building now stands. Just northeast of the spot is the Pen Road Shopping Center, the only remnant of the street that led from downtown to the prison.

Some of the space crunch in the capitol complex may be about to be alleviated with the purchase of the last piece of private property in the block immediately west of the capitol.

A state capitol master plan prepared by the Capitol Buildings Improvements Commission in 1963 called for the purchase of the block of land. A tunnel was dug from the present capitol, constructed in 1967, out to Don Gaspar street in preparation for connecting it to a cafeteria in the basement of the large office building that was to be on the corner of Don Gaspar and South Capitol streets.

The tunnel is still there but the land purchase was never funded. A bill to appropriate the money in the late 1960s failed for political reasons. Democrats weren't enamored with the fact that the Prince estate owned a large parcel of the land. Republican Bradford Prince had been a territorial governor in the 1890s and his grandson Brad was Republican whip in the state House at the time. And Republicans weren't too pleased that the National Education Association of

New Mexico owned much of the rest of the block.

Little by little, the state has bought parcels of the block and only the NEA-NM building and its large parking lot remain as private property. A purchase was almost completed at the end of the Johnson administration, but didn't quite make it. The process is now starting over with the Richardson administration and reports are that situation looks the most promising in 40 years.

Once the state has the entire block, parking problems can be considerably eased with the construction of a multi-story parking lot, with possibly two of those stories below ground. The current surface parking areas are adequate for state employees. The problem is for the rest of us who have business at the capitol or who want to visit the Legislature.

Mill's suggested location has the advantage of being closer to Albuquerque and the airport. Albuquerque has felt it should have the capital ever since it became bigger than Santa Fe back when it became a railroad town. When the state's second capitol building burned down in 1892, just six years after it was built, fingers pointed at Albuquerque, which had wanted the new capital down there.

The move south of town would have some technical problems, however. Santa Fe would have to annex an area that currently is well outside its city limits because the state's enabling act says the capitol will be in the city of Santa Fe unless voters deem otherwise.

The most frequently reported crimes involve property. Property crimes include vandalism, theft, and burglary. The following home security tips can help you protect your family and home.

HOME SECURITY "Protecting Your Home"

Doors

Let's go to the front door. As I walk up to the door, can you see me from the inside? Do you know who is outside before you open it?

Install a wide-angle viewer (peep-hole) in the door. This will let you know who is on the outside before the door is open. A 190 degree view is recommended.

Strike Plates

While we are looking at the door, let's have a look at the strike plate on the door frame. Is yours of light weight metal installed with short wood screws?

The recommendation here is that your metal strike plate should be installed with wood screws of a minimum length of 3 inches. Better yet, install a heavier gauge security strike plate and again use the longer screws. The screws should take you past the frame into the structural 2x4s.

Locks

Do you economize on a padlock that will not give you the protection you need?

The most common assault on a padlock is with a large bolt cutter or pry bar. The following description is the minimum standard for an exterior padlock.

* Case hardened steel, with a 9/32 inch shackle.
 * Locking mechanism in both the heel and toe.

Music

dosos had a break down in communication. Waters accused Ruidoso of unfairly raising the Ruidoso Downs share of the cost of the operation of the waste water plant. He said Ruidoso Downs does not contribute 20 percent of wastewater going into the treatment plant, yet the budget shows that Ruidoso Downs must pay 20 percent of the cost of operations. Waters then broke down the costs in the proposed budget by line item.

One of the operational costs Waters questioned was transport of the sludge from the waste water plant. While the regional waste water plant pays \$90,000 a year for transport and disposal of the sludge, city of Carlsbad spends nothing for sludge transport and disposal because the city composts its sludge and sells the final product.

"I really feel strongly about composting as our landfills are filling up," Waters said. "And we can't continue to pay up to \$90,000 a year to dispose of something that can be recycled."

As for raising sewer rates, Waters said Ruidoso Downs raised its rates by 33 percent and they are now higher than the rates in Ruidoso. He said it would be difficult to increase the rates again.

Waters also said Ruidoso Downs is willing to agree to paying 15 percent of the share of the cost of operation, because that figure is based on the influent from Ruidoso Downs into the waste water plant. He said Ruidoso started last year asking Ruidoso Downs to pay more. "But the numbers do not add up," Waters said. He said Ruidoso has a number of new hotels, new residences and businesses. While Ruidoso Downs has Wal Mart which creates a lot of waste water, the city still does not contribute 20 or more percent into the treatment plant.

Instead of raising rates, Waters recommended the joint use board reduce the proposed \$968,093 budget by 31 percent by eliminating a \$55,000 administrative cost, reducing phone use, vehicle operation and

professional fees and cut personnel overtime by 50 percent.

"One of the partners is saying we can't afford what is being dished out with this budget," Waters said.

Eggleston said the comparison between the Ruidoso wastewater plant and the plant in Carlsbad was not close. He also said Ruidoso Downs had not always had higher sewer rates, that until a year ago were much lower than Ruidoso.

McKnight said it was impossible to absorb the information Waters presented and she asked for a special meeting to further discuss the budget. She said the proposed budget is actually four percent less than the previous year. As for the share McKnight said all they are asking is for each entity to pay a fair share based on usage. Eggleston said if the sewer meters were calibrated everyone would know exactly how much was coming from each community.

Members agreed, but no meeting date was set.

cut in all departmental proposed budgets. She also agreed with keeping all requests from external agencies and groups flat with no increases, as recommended by the county manager.

Martinez said the county manager should take direction from the county commissioners.

Commissioners argued over the amount of funding for the Humane Society that wanted an increase from the \$25,000 a year to \$40,000. Society representatives said the requested amount was based on number of animals brought into the shelter by the county animal control officer, and from people living in the county. Martinez was in support of the \$40,000 for the Humane Society because it provides a needed service and has not had an increase in several years.

Hobbs and Martinez also challenged the budgets for the hospital and clinics. Hobbs attacked what he perceived was the excessive funding for La Casa de Buena Salud which operates the clinic owned by Hondo Schools. Commissioners were concerned because they had received the La Casa budget just that day with no time for review. Martinez challenged the request from Lincoln County Medical Center for funding for the Phase 3 ambulatory surgery remodel.

Friday morning, commissioners heard requests for funding from representatives and letters from outside agencies seeking

county funds. After discussion, the county manager recommended the following be funded at the current level of funding:

- the NM Book Mobile for \$1,050;
- South Central RC&D \$1,000 from special programs funds;
- Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) dues of \$5,000 from special programs funding;
- Capitan Library \$2,000 (requested \$3,300);
- Cooperative Extension Service \$52,406 as the county's one-third match from special programs fund;
- Ruidoso After School Club (RASCALS) \$1,000;
- Claunch Pinto Soil and Water Conservation District \$2,000 from Taylor Grazing funds;
- Big Brothers/Big Sisters \$2,000;
- White Mountain Search and Rescue for \$4,700;
- Zia Therapy \$3,000 (requested \$4,035);
- Humane Society of Lincoln County \$25,000 (requested \$40,000);
- NM Association of Counties \$22,800 from special programs;
- Noxious Weed Program \$8,000 from forest grant;
- Village of Corona clinic \$20,000 from clinic mill levy;
- Ruidoso Public Library \$10,000 (requested \$20,000);
- Lincoln County Community Cooperative \$2,000.

All requests for vehicle and equipment purchases and increases for employ-

ees will be considered at budget mid-year in January 2004.

At the workshop commissioners started with a proposed 2003-2004 budget that had projected general fund revenues of \$6,170,083, proposed expenditures of \$4,301,201 and proposed transfers of \$2,236,304. But those proposed figures left the ending cash balance at an estimated \$914,921 which was \$151,000 short of the state required reserve. With that in hand, commissioners ordered all departments to cut their proposed budgets by five percent.

The county budget also includes funds that are not classified under the "general fund." Those other funds include the Road Fund, Farm & Range, Recreation (which in the past was dedicated to the town of Carrizozo requests for the swimming pool operations), special programs, recording fees, Arabela, Bonito, Fort Stanton, Hondo, Lincoln, Nogal, Glencoe and White Oaks Fire Departments, agreements, legislative appropriations, special gas tax, lodgers tax, corrections with its \$2 million budgeted expenditures, ambulance, health clinics, hospital, senior citizens centers, 911 system, forest health, indigent health care fund, juvenile detention fund, and debt funds.

Commissioners will again review and take action on the proposed budget at their regular May 20 meeting.
