

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

MOVING OUT FIRE CAMP. Lincoln County Sheriff's Officers man the road block on State Road 532 as the federally contracted fire camp moves out on Sunday, Nov. 1, when the six day fire was declared contained. Human caused, the Ski Run Fire burned 271 acres of forest on the Lincoln National Forest near Oak Grove Campground and into the Mescalero Reservation. The fire, estimated to cost \$1.19 million to fight, caused evacuation of Villa Madonna and Eagle Creek Summer Homes twice, but no structures were burned and there were no injuries. There were 460 fire fighters on the ground at the peak of the fire, with firefighters from the year round Smokey Bear Hot Shots and other US Forest Service fire units, Ruidoso Fire Dept., Bonito Volunteer Fire Dept. (VFD), Carrizozo VFD, Fort Stanton VFD, BLM, State Forestry, BIA, US Fish and Wildlife, US Park Service and the Mescalero Apache Nation. Lincoln County Road Department and emergency management from the county and Ruidoso also helped with the fire.

Rick Simpson Charged With Per Diem Violations

Former Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority manager Rick Simpson has been ordered to appear in Division III District Court in Carrizozo at 8:30 a.m. Friday, November 14, in answer to charges he violated the state per diem and mileage act nine times in 2000 while acting as LCSWA manager.

Charges allege Simpson authorized or accepted payment of mileage and/or per diem in excess of the excess payment. The alleged violations occurred every pay period from May 26, 2000 to August 30, 2000 and ranged from \$400 to \$100 each time for a total of \$3,850.

LCSWA current board has been requesting criminal action on the alleged excess payments for a number of months. The excess payments were first discovered by the annual audit of LCSWA finances conducted in 2001. Although Simpson had tried to repay the alleged excess payments, under an arrangement by former LCSWA attorney Don Dutton, the current LCSWA board has refused to cash the checks and turned the issue over to the district attorney's office.

The 12th Judicial District Attorney's office filed criminal case CR-2003-193, State of New Mexico v. Rick Simpson on Monday, October 27, in the Division III district court in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo. The case alleges Simpson committed nine separate violations of the New Mexico per diem and mileage act statute 10-8-5 and 10-8-7 which carry "special penalties." The special penalties means if found guilty, there will be no fines, rather the violator must make repayment at twice the amount of the excess payment.

Draft Plan for Rio Bonito Now Available

The draft activity plan for the Rio Bonito Acquired Lands was developed by BLM specialists

based on comments and recommendations from numerous public scoping meetings held in the Lincoln area.

The draft contains two chapters, the first chapter outlining the management goals, planning team, interested parties and participants, planning process, custom and culture, resource management plan issues as they pertain to the Rio Bonito, issues considered and settled in the scoping process.

Chapter two outlines the proposed management prescriptions for watershed, riparian habitat, vegetation, fire and fuels, livestock grazing, wildlife and fisheries habitat, visual resource, recreation trails potential designated trails and hiking, equestrian use and wheeled conveyance, day-use picnicking, hunting, fishing, cultural resources prehistoric and historic, special recreation use, interpretation, signing, buildings and structures for recreation facilities such as toilets and kiosks, field across from the pageant grounds, land and reality actions for easements and rights of ways, water rights and agricultural use of the acquired lands.

BLM acquired the lands in Lincoln in a trade deal in 1996. A private real estate firm traded to BLM the old farm fields in the Lincoln Valley that were acquired

County Asks State for Higher Speed Limit on Cedar Creek

Speed limit on Cedar Creek Road out of Ruidoso may increase to 30 miles per hour if the state Department of Transportation agrees to a request from the Lincoln County Commissioners.

At their meeting October 21 in their chambers in the Lincoln County Courthouse in Carrizozo, county commissioner Maury St. John said no one drives 25 miles per hour on Cedar Creek as the signs are posted. St. John said she talked with Lincoln County Sheriff Tom Sullivan who agreed the 25 mile per hour speed limit was too slow. "Especially at the beginning in the open stretch," St. John added.

County manager Tom Stewart said he spoke with Buck Sanchez, the new Lincoln National Forest Smokey Bear District Ranger, about the increase of speed and he saw no reason to leave the speed at 25. Stewart researched state statutes to find speed limits which in

a residential area are 30 miles per hour. Stewart recommended the commissioners direct him to contact the NM Department of Transportation to explain the situation and to request an engineering survey and traffic investigation to establish a reasonable speed for the road.

County commissioner Rick Simpson made the motion to change the speed, jokingly to 65 miles per hour. "We don't want 65!" St. John responded. "A residential area is 30."

St. John then made the motion to direct Stewart to contact the transportation department. Simpson seconded the motion which got unanimous support.

Also at the October 21 meeting, county commissioners denied a request to vacate a road in Brady Canyon in order to widen the roadway for emergency access and approved closing a county road that goes to a ranch house. County commissioners accepted the recommendation from the county road review committee to close County Road E033, which turns off Highway 70 near the eastern border of Lincoln County. The road is completely on deeded land and goes to one ranch house. Closure did not appear to deny access to any public land, wrote road review committee chair Duane Williams.

In discussing the recommendation it was mentioned that county planning officer Patsy Sanchez grew up at the ranch house in question. Rio Hondo Land & Cattle Company, Diamond A Ranch, Gerald Ford owner, recently purchased the ranch property.

The second request from Ray Munson to vacate road easements in Brady Canyon near Ruidoso was a continuation from February. Williams in his report on the Road Review Committee on site review, stated that in

LCSWA Will Recycle Cell Phones During November Recycling Month

Old unwanted cell phones can now be recycled at the Lincoln County Solid Waste Authority (LCSWA).

November is Recycling Month and LCSWA will be taking unwanted cell phones for recycling throughout the month. Unwanted cell phones can be dropped off at the LCSWA offices on 2nd Street in Ruidoso Downs, and also at all the municipalities in the area. Call LCSWA at 378-4697 for more information about the cell phone recycling

program.

LCSWA staff will also be going to local schools to present educational programs on recycling to students, said LCSWA operational supervisor Debra Ingle at the October 28 meeting of the LCSWA board.

LCSWA will give out t-shirts, books and other materials on recycling at the schools. And at Ruidoso elementary school, LCSWA will take its scales to the school and weigh aluminum cans collected by the stu-

dents as part of a recycling power program, Ingle added.

Residents and visitors, while urged to participate in recycling during the month of November, can recycle at any time by depositing recyclable materials in several locations throughout the county. Recycling roll off containers (painted blue with large LCSWA letters in white) are located at the Alto Village Maintenance Yard, Eagle Creek Shell Convenience Store, Cedar Creek, Sun Valley, Capitan next to the senior center, and at Spencer Park in Carrizozo, and at the LCSWA recycling center in Ruidoso Downs.

LCSWA currently recycles used carpet padding, all numbers of plastic, metal (food cans, and scrap metal) aluminum cans and scrap aluminum, cardboard, newspaper and computer paper. Check your local recycling containers to make sure there are containers for all of these recyclable materials.

The LCSWA recycling center in Ruidoso Downs will take all these recyclable materials. And the recycling center will purchase aluminum at the market rate. The LCSWA recycling center is open 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday, and 8 a.m. to 12 noon every second Saturday.

LCSWA also accepts, for

fees, used tires and white goods at the recycling center in Ruidoso Downs. Yard waste will also be taken at the LCSWA recycling center for a fee, or at Sierra Contractors for a fee. Residents may also call LCSWA to arrange to have yard waste picked up for a fee, unless they are in an area participating in the LCSWA grappling program.

Because there has been such an overwhelming response to the yard waste clean up and forest thinning, Sierra Contractors is overloaded with composted materials. As such the company is giving away the compost/mulch material at its yard located just east of Ruidoso Downs (to the south of Highway 70) at no cost to all who produce a recently paid LCSWA or municipal trash bill.

February the issue was tabled because it was in litigation. Williams wrote that the litigation was settled so the case was reactivated resulting in the on site review. The issue is the Village of Ruidoso advised the property owner the village emergency vehicles will not service the area because the road was substandard.

Munson tried to get his neighbors to dedicate property to upgrade the road, but he was unsuccessful, Williams continued. So Munson requested the county condemn enough property to widen the road. Such action by the county would require compensation to the affected property owners. The question was raised as to who would pay for construction and maintenance of such a road if the property was available and no one stepped forward. Williams stated that Munson advised the property was on the market which limited his interest in such an outlay.

With this the road review committee recommended the commissioners deny the request because of the cost of construction and maintenance and it appears the majority of affected property owners are opposed to the improvement.

Also at the meeting, commissioners:

--On a 4-1 vote with Leo Martinez voting no, tabled a request from San Patricio land owner Michael Hurd for county funds to upgrade a well which is sometimes used to provide water to the county road department because there are other wells in the area that provide water to the county and might need upgrade also.

Capone Goes Free After 8-Year 'Rap'

But Mantle of Glamor Is Strangely Missing From Scarface Al

Chicago -- They tell you in this town about the heyday of "Scarface Al" Capone who was so rich he could squander \$7,500,000 in eight years of gambling, whose fine Italian hand was seen in some 250 Chicago gang deaths between the years of 1925 and 1930, and who "beat" two murder charges and a couple of miscellaneous legal entanglements before the federal government caught him -- on the small item of income taxes covering \$215,000!

The Chicagoans don't quiver or goggle when you tell them Al Capone leaves prison this month. Since the spring of 1932, when he rode to Atlanta penitentiary handcuffed igominously to a small-time auto theft suspect, the one-time beer baron has lost face among Windy City citizens. When he steps from Terminal Island Correctional Prison at San Pedro, Calif., this month, there will be few to cheer, sigh or groan.

Underworld Has Passed

Not even the underworld will call a holiday, because Chicago's underworld isn't what it used to be. Moreover the muggs who once worked for Scarface Al have heard stories about him.

First there's that paresis report -- the story that Al is suffering from decay of the brain tissues and consequently has been deranged to a "dangerous" extent one week in four. Then there's his reputation as a model prisoner at Alcatraz, which is anathema for a gangster's reputation.

One story says this former enemy of society has subscribed to a magazine devoted to social progress, "Survey Graphic."

Despite his efforts to win parole by good behavior, Capone had at least two scraps in Alcatraz. The first was in 1936 when James C. Lucas, Texas bank robber, knifed him in the back with a pair of barber scissors. Al dealt a return blow on the chin that sent Lucas reeling before they were both carted off to the hospital.

In 1938 a mail robber named Roy Gardner was freed from Alcatraz, bringing forth the story that he and Capone had mixed it up one day, and that Al was sent to solitary confinement four days as a result. Another paroled convict said Capone has been branded a "yellow rat" for refusing to join a mutiny.

But Capone's resolution did bring one result. He succeeded in getting three years lopped from the original 10-year sentence, and last January he left Alcatraz with only a year's imprisonment (on a misdemeanor count) and payment of \$50,000 in fines standing between him and freedom. But after freedom, what next?

Even if the paresis story is untrue, the glamorous and reckless life of the mad twenties is no longer open to Al. He can only return to his home in Florida and relax with memories of the most insane period of American history, when organized crime fought with itself and with the law -- usually to the latter's distress.

Johnny Torrio's Protege.

Al came from Naples originally. He had just turned 22 in New York when the notorious Johnny Torrio took him to Chicago to be bodyguard for "Big Jim" Colosimo, a former street sweeper who pulled himself into a place of power in Chicago's south side night life. Torrio was a henchman of "Lefty Louie" and "Gyp the Blood," who with others were supposedly hired by a Manhattan police lieutenant in 1912 to slay the gambler, Herman Rosenthal.

They were nice, clean fellows, all of them. Torrio seized control of Colosimo's kingdom when the latter was shot down behind his own liquor bar. He taught Capone the ropes of racketeering and built vice and crime into a \$100,000-a-week business before he made the mistake of engineering Dion O'Banion's murder. Dion also had a gang, and they took a few shots at Johnny in retaliation. So Torrio left town to save his skin

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Prior to the discussion of the PLURAAC requests, PLURAAC alternate member Jerry Carroll submitted his resignation from the committee. County commissioners Leo Martinez and Rick Simpson wanted to refuse the resignation, asking Carroll to continue to participate in the committee. Carroll said he will continue to be at the PLURAAC meetings. "And I will embarrass people," he added.

In his letter of resignation, Carroll wrote that he thought his experience and attendance at the PLURAAC meetings would be of value to Lincoln County. "I was wrong, so I resign," he wrote.

County commissioners Earl Hobbs and Maury St. John thanked Carroll for his volunteer time. Hobbs told Carroll he respected his opinions and St. John said she is against infringing on private property rights and she hoped Carroll would continue to go to the PLURAAC meetings.

Tony Seno, PLURAAC member, asked county commissioners to table Carroll's resignation for two months and "let him think about it. We need him there."

County commission chair Rex Wilson said the resignation was Carroll's decision, and the commission does not typically vote on resignations. "When it comes time to appoint someone to fill the vacancy, Jerry can reapply if he wants to be on the committee," Wilson said.

County commissioners then turned to the list of requests and comments from PLURAAC.

Seno said the committee would like for the county to have an MOU with the Game and Fish Dept., like the MOUs the county has with the Forest Service and BLM. An MOU gives the county a standing leadership role as a participant with the Department, Seno explained.

Wilson then asked why PLURAAC wanted the county clerk to send the letter of invitation to Game and Fish. County manager Tom Stewart responded first, and said he is reluctant to invite governmental agencies to the PLURAAC meetings until they are better treated.

"Why is this?" Martinez asked. He said he was going to make one of the PLURAAC meetings to see how they treat folks. "I see no problem in asking questions," Martinez added.

Seno said the committee is made up of citizens who are not so eloquent or reasonable. He said there was an incident when a person from a federal agency was raked over the coals because PLURAAC wanted to get to the bottom of an accusation that the agency had lied to a citizen in federal district court.

"We're not going to take it easy on anyone if they are affecting private property rights," Seno said. "We will be voicing our opinions on this committee and if our first amendment rights are derailed I'll hand in my resignation, even though I don't want to."

Stewart said it appears to

him that Seno and others on the PLURAAC think they have a right to abuse governmental agencies. "I view this as a circus and I am embarrassed by it," Stewart said.

Rhonda Burrows, sitting for county clerk Tammie Maddox, said Maddox did not feel it is appropriate for her to write such a letter.

Carroll, speaking as an ex-member of PLURAAC, said the situation occurred when fraud and perjury were conducted before PLURAAC when public officials lied and produced false documents against federal law. Carroll considered it "political sabotage" when the county manager found it inappropriate because some of the PLURAAC members talk too loud. Seno said he did not admit to abusing the federal employees.

"If you don't want PLURAAC to protect private property rights, then you should re-write the ordinance (that created PLURAAC)," Carroll told county commissioners. He said what was thought of as abuse was just method of delivery by the PLURAAC members.

PLURAAC member Ken Nosker, who attended the county commission meeting, said PLURAAC is "not a circus."

"We do not comply with Tom Stewart's idea of how the committee should be conducted," he added.

Nosker said he disagreed the PLURAAC is radical as there have been good things come out, with recommendations that are not radical. "We have invited the county commissioners to attend our meetings to give us direction," Nosker said. "And we've had no cooperation from the county manager or his staff. It seems this committee has stepped on their toes." "As for being embarrassed when we ask questions of public officials whether for or against is part of our constitutional rights as citizens," Nosker continued. He then said a member of the PLURAAC brought up concerns about not getting fair treatment in the Lincoln Historic District. "A county commissioner was at that PLURAAC meeting and called us radical," Nosker added. "I will not be part of a committee considered radical."

When St. John asked if there is a procedure to invite the NM Game and Fish and other agencies, and if there is none, these officials should come to the county commission. Stewart said he would prefer the officials come to the county commission meetings to be questioned.

"Then there is no purpose of PLURAAC," Seno exclaimed.

Wilson said in past years, the PLURAAC did invite the government agencies by formal letter. But over the years the invitations turned into notices of the PLURAAC meetings. However, he agreed PLURAAC should function on a professional level.

Nosker said the PLURAAC have made requests for agencies to be invited and the county manager's office only faxed an agenda of the PLURAAC meeting to the agencies. Nosker asked that the coun-

ty employees give PLURAAC the same respect as they do to the other county committees.

Wilson went back to the PLURAAC requests. He said the county should write a letter to Game and Fish for an agency response to the county's request for a MOU. He said the county currently has MOUs with the Forest Service and BLM.

Nosker said PLURAAC has requested the county manager three times to have the county attorney attend a PLURAAC meeting to help draft a MOU and answer legal questions, but it never happened.

County attorney Alan Morel said he cannot spend

eight hours at a PLURAAC meeting. "But I will attend if the county commission wants me to," he added.

Wilson asked Nosker to let Morel know about the legal issues for PLURAAC and to pursue the MOU with Dept. of Game and Fish.

Martinez then asked county commissioner Hobbs his opinion of PLURAAC.

Hobbs said he thinks the PLURAAC is a valuable tool to look at issues that are appropriate under its charter. "The problem with PLURAAC is a lack of civility and respect for the people who come before it," he added. "It's not so much



INSIDE THE CAPITOL

SANTA FE -- Health care is the most pressing and most complicated issue facing our state. America has the world's best doctors and medical facilities but 45 million Americans have no medical insurance, which means most of them have little or no health care.

That figure translates to 16 percent of the nation's population. That is high among developed countries, most of which have even greater government involvement in health care than we do. And no nation yet has come up with a solution good enough for us to copy. Both President Bush and Gov. Bill Richardson want to avoid a government-run plan of universal coverage.

We know what the government bureaucracy can do to any program. Actually, any bureaucracy has far too much red tape and the more it becomes a monopoly, the less incentive there is for peak performance.

But how do we stop the alarming fact that the nation's number of uninsureds are growing by a million a year as companies find employee coverage too expensive to continue? More government involvement of some sort seems necessary to consider.

New Mexico's problem is even worse. We lead the nation, according to some studies, in the percentage of our population that is uninsured, some five percent above the national figure.

Gov. Bill Richardson has created the Governor's Health Care Coverage and Access Task Force to look into solutions for New Mexico. The group came up with some recommendations, but on the question of extending health care coverage through expanding Medicaid or adding others to the state's pool of government workers, the committee said it just did not have enough answers.

Americans want unlimited medical care that includes all the latest technology and the best doctors, but at a low cost. That doesn't work without a tremendous employer or government subsidy, the latter of which is an additional cost to every taxpayer.

One of the logical solutions is to place limits on the kind of care and how much of it is received. In the '80s, insurance companies began devising plans of managed care, meaning that policyholders could no longer pick their

specialists and how often they would see them.

That was a bitter pill for Americans and is still difficult for many to swallow. Ironically people receiving free health care services through Medicaid didn't start going under managed care until former Gov. Gary Johnson introduced the Salud! Program. Medicare recipients still can choose their doctors.

For those who still are disturbed about managed care and the Health Maintenance organizations that administer it, the following explanation, which has been floating around for several years, may be helpful.

Q: What does HMO stand for?
A: It's a variation on the phrase "Holy Moe," a concept pioneered by a doctor named Moe, who discovered a poke in the eye would make a patient forget about the pain in his foot. Modern medicine has replaced the finger poke with pre-approvals, referrals, and the like, but the result remains the same.

Q: Under an HMO, how difficult will it be to choose the doctor I want?

A: Just slightly more difficult than choosing your parents. Your choices are between doctors who no longer accept new patients and those who will see you but are no longer part of the plan.

Q: What are pre-existing conditions?

A: This is a phrase used by the grammatically challenged referring to existing conditions. Unfortunately we appear to be pre-stuck with it.

Q: Can I get coverage for my pre-existing conditions?

A: Certainly, as long as they don't require any treatment.

Q: What happens if I want to try alternative forms of medicine?

A: You'll need to find alternative forms of payment.

Q: What should I do if I get sick while traveling?

A: Try sitting in a different part of the bus.

Q: My pharmacy plan only covers generic drugs. I tried the generic, but it gave me a stomach ache. What should I do?

A: Poke yourself in the eye.

through a bankruptcy in exchange for thousands of acres of BLM land east of Las Cruces.

Along with the Rio Bonito lands were 891 acre feet of old water rights, all of them dating from the mid-1800 and some of them dating to 1850 mostly associated with eight old ditches, most no longer in use.

BLM will continue to convene a series of meetings about the draft activity plan for the Rio Bonito Acquired

Lands. At the meetings, BLM officials will review and make changes to the draft activity plan that will benefit the community of the Lincoln Valley and the general public land users.

Red Ribbon Week

Carrizozo's National Honor Society (NHS) sponsored a drug awareness assembly on October 29 in the multipurpose room to commemorate Red Ribbon Week, Oct. 27 to Oct. 31. Mr. Watkins, the sponsor of NHS, said that "this assembly is a reminder of the devastating effects of drugs and alcohol on our society."

There were four guest speakers: Carrizozo Police Officer Archie Romero, Pam Dobbs with the District Attorney's Office, Juvenile Probation Officer (JPO) Sergio Castro, and Victim's Advocate Kaylynn McWilliams. Officer Romero went through the steps of Driving under the Influence (DUI) and Driving While Intoxicated (DWI). He told the students the consequences if they got stopped while driving intoxicated or under the influence of drugs. He said that they would get sent to the probation office, and that their licenses could be revoked. After four DWI's a juvenile could get sent away for two years in a juvenile detention center. Before this happens, the District Attorney's Office reviews each case and the juvenile probation officer's recommendation, and then presents the case to the judge.

Sergio Castro (JPO) discussed possible scenarios for those convicted of DUI from probation restrictions, to incarceration at a juvenile facility, to the assignment at a rehabilitation center.

The last speaker was Victim's Advocate Kaylynn McWilliams she read two letters, one from a victim whose high school life was physically and emotionally shattered by a drunk driver. She read another letter from a parent who lost a daughter to a drunk driver. The letters can be presented to a judge but more importantly they were read to students to keep them from driving drunk.

Another activity conducted for Red Ribbon Week was a drug free poster contest for the elementary grades 1st through 5th. Entries were judged by NHS. Awards were presented to the following winners: 1st Clay Hogwood, 2nd Nicholas Chavez, 3rd Sierra Anaya, 4th Mariah Ventura, 5th Jordan Hill. Overall winners were 5th Joel Ferguson and 3rd Andrea Vigil.

and Al Capone inherited the empire.

The Business Grew.

Not many young men reach such eminence at
28, but Al was already a veteran. Undeniably a
keen executive in his line, he streamlined gang
warfare by introducing the machine gun. He
expanded the business adding gambling, dog
races and politics.

This was a billion-dollar enterprise and he
protected it by stifling the competition. O'
Barion, O'Donnel, Gennas and Saltis gangs
were liquidated.

But it was bloody business. Capone once said
they blamed him for everything except the
Chicago fire, and that was no exaggeration. A
new death was chalked up almost daily, and for
two of them the beer baron was hauled in. Joe
Howard, a small-time hijacker, told police before
he died that "young Al" had done him in. Later
William H. McSwiggin, assistant Cook county
states attorney, was murdered. His old father, a
police officer, is supposed to have confronted Al
with the charge that he, Capone, was responsible.
Whereupon, says the story, Al handed his gun to
the elder McSwiggin with the admonition: "If
you think I did it, kill me."

Law Caught Up at Last.

But even a ring of steel couldn't protect him at
the end. They couldn't get him for murder, for
election fraud or for violating the dry laws, but
tax evasion was Scarface Al's Waterloo.

His notoriety reached a climax during the trial
and in subsequent months when he languished in
Atlanta prison. But there were rumors of an
escape plot and the charge (which reached
congress) that Capone was given special favors at
Atlanta.

So one dark night in August, 1934, a heavily
barred railroad car slipped into the prison siding.
At midnight the great Capone and 52 other dan-
gerous prisoners were hurried away. A few days
later they were safely stored away in Alcatraz.

The beer baron died that day. When they rele-
ase him this month, he'll just be plain Mr.
Alphonse Capone.

the questions to issues, rather than the manner questions are presented."

"I don't blame anyone for not wanting to come before PLURAAC when they perceive they will be treated disrespectfully, harshly and contemptuously," Hobbs added.

Hobbs then asked Stewart to tell what happened at a PLURAAC meeting that had no items on its agenda, yet the meeting lasted five or six hours.

Stewart said there were no agenda items, except "other business" and yet the meeting went on for eight hours. "In my opinion this violated the Open Meetings Act," Stewart added.

Hobbs said they need to be careful if it is a violation because that would reflect upon the county as a whole. Hobbs also said he is not always civil and respectful, and he admitted he "lost his cool, and was wrong" when he attended the PLURAAC meeting.

Stewart said in his opinion personal agendas of some of the members are creating a liability to the county.

Hobbs said everyone has a personal agenda but most keep it under control.

Carroll said he could not handle Stewart's accusation about the PLURAAC violating the Open Meetings Act.

Martinez said he appointed Seno even though he does not agree with 99 percent of what he does. He told Seno to "tone it down" and treat people with respect even if they disagree. "That is why there is a lot of distrust of the PLURAAC," Martinez added.

Seno then said respect is earned.

Finally, Wilson concluded the PLURAAC discussion by directing Stewart to write a letter to the Game and Fish inviting them to a PLURAAC meeting to discuss a MOU. Wilson suggested PLURAAC members submit request for funds for members to travel to attend water and other resource meetings outside the county. He said the new accountability forms that request follow-up information on county commission action on PLURAAC requests are fine.

Wilson also said PLURAAC member Jay Walley's request for information on the BLM plans for Fort Stanton and Rio Bonito lands was a good idea and it would be good to invite BLM for an update. He said concerns about the water resource committee will be forwarded to that committee and he acknowledged that the grazing board proposal is being developed by Ronnie Merritt.

The final request, the recognition of the Jicarilla Mining District was postponed after Jicarilla miner Jerry Fennell gave a long history about the old town of Jicarilla. Fennell said several people live in the Jicarilla Mining District which is very old, yet the forest service is wanting to evict Fennell from a dwelling on a mining claim he has held for several years.

Morel said he "had no clue" about what was being asked. He said there was no definition of "mining district" in his law dictionary and he did not understand what he was being asked to

do. Fennell said the Jicarilla Mining District is historical and conforms to the Lincoln County Comprehensive Land Use Plan's recognition of custom and culture of a mining district.

"Jicarilla is part of Lincoln County's oldest history," Fennell said. "It should be recognized as such."

Wilson said the Jicarilla residents want recognition with specific boundaries for the mining district.

Hobbs said he was in favor of the principle but would not approve such a

district until the language was drafted as a resolution. He also said the state historic office may be interested and should be advised.

Wilson instructed Morel to meet with Fennell.

Carroll said Fennell has tried for three years to get the county commission to recognize the custom and culture of Jicarilla. "It exists," Carroll said. "All the documentation is there. I don't see why there is no resolution in compliance to the land use plan. I don't see where it is so complicated."

Carroll also said that in

older editions of Black's Law Dictionary "mining district" is defined.

Wilson's final comment was to say they will have a better product if Fennell works through Morel. "You guys work it out," he concluded and finalized the discussion on the PLURAAC requests.
